## Everyone Help to Build Houses

### WIVES AND FAMILIES OF HINDUS TO BE ADMITTED TO CANADA UNDER ORDER

REGULATIONS WILL GIVE INDIA RIGHT TO EXCLUDE  
CANADIANS FROM THEIR COUNTRY OTHER  
REGULATIONS GOVERNING RECIPROCITY  
IN IMMIGRATION

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, March 29.—An order-in-council passed March 26 with reciprocity of treatment of several communities of the British Commonwealth and allows certain modifications of the restrictive provisions of the Immigration Act. It allows Hindus residing in British Columbia to bring in their wives and families. It is, in part, as follows:

The Minister, therefore, with the concurrence of the Minister of Immigration and Colonization, recommends that a declaration, unanimously adopted at the Imperial War Conference, July 24, 1918, be approved, viz.:  
It is an inherent function of the governments of several communities of the British Commonwealth, including India, that each should enjoy complete control of the composition of its own population, and means of restriction of any of the other communi-

British citizens, domiciled in British country, including those who should be admitted into any British country for visits, for the purpose of pleasure or otherwise, including temporary residence for education. Concurrence of such visits should be based on the principle of reciprocity as follows:—  
**Reciprocity.**  
The right of the Government of India is recognized to enact laws which shall have the effect of subjecting British citizens domiciled in any other British country to the same conditions in visiting India as those imposed on

### RETURNED MEN FOR FISHERIES

Board of Trade Offers to Co-Operate in Placing Them if Government Will Allow.

The following telegram was sent to Lieut. Col. Peck, M. P., at Ottawa, last night by the Council of the Board of Trade:  
"Will the Government permit returned soldiers who may wish to engage in salmon gill net fishing in District 2 to use gas boats? If so and they will assist them financially along the same lines as it is proposed to assist those who may go on farms, this Board will take upon itself to co-operate in placing as many returned men as possible in these fisheries. ### TRAITORS ARE DEPRIVED OF THEIR TITLES

Royal Dukes no Longer Bear Any  
British Honors—Both Were  
British Born.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
London, March 29.—The Duke of Albany, Duke of Cumberland and Viscount Taaffe, who adhered to the enemy during the war have been deprived of their British peerages by a King's order-in-council. Albany is a cousin of King George and Cumberland a cousin of King Edward. Both served with the German forces for part of the war. Each man was a Royal Duke of Great Britain, and both were British born. Albany served the Kaiser under the title of Prince Charles Edward of Saxe-Cobourg and Gotha, and Cumberland as Duke of Brunswick and Leningburg.  
Both Dukes had courtesy commands in the British Army, Albany being a full general.

### NAME CHOSEN FOR BUILDING SOCIETY HERE

"Prince Rupert Housing, Ltd.," is  
Choice of Board of Trade;  
Everyone Enthusiased.

At a meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade in their rooms last evening it was decided to adopt the name "Prince Rupert Housing, Ltd.," for the building society which is being formed by the citizens for the purpose of helping to solve the housing question here.

President McCaffery stated that it was the plan of the citizens' committee to carry on a campaign similar to that at the time of the Victory Loan. So far as he had been able to find out everyone was backing it. They were much enthused and expected to get the \$100,000 for which they were seeking.

The plan as outlined was to incorporate a company at once for the purpose of loaning money or of building if it was found necessary. They would make loans to half the value of the property and charge eight per cent for it. They had been assured of ten houses being built by one man and a great many individuals had promised to build just as soon as they could get the money. It was ex-

### PRINCE RUPERT'S MEMBER DEALS WITH FISHERIES IN PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

HON. T. D. PATTULLO SAYS INDUSTRY SHOULD BE CON-  
TROLLED FROM THIS CITY—RETURNED SOLDIERS  
SHOULD BE ENCOURAGED AND  
MONOPOLIES ABOLISHED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Speaking to the report of the Select Committee on the Rehabilitation of Soldiers in the Legislature, Hon. T. D. Pattullo dealt, among other things, with the conditions obtaining in the salmon fishing industry, as follows:—

"As representative of the largest fishing district of this province, and one of the largest fishing districts on the continent, I wish to draw the attention of this House to the fact that the waters of the north are today the major sockeye waters. In 1918, the Fraser River pack was 75,000 cases, while that of the Skeena was 374,000 cases; the Naas, 144,000 cases, and Rivers Inlet, 103,000 cases.

**From Prince Rupert.**  
"In this connection I would point out that the fishing industry being almost entirely in the north, it ought to be controlled from Prince Rupert and not from New Westminster, as at present. "I note that the Select Committee is of the opinion that the salmon fishing industry 'does not present the best possibilities for the successful employment of returned men.' Under present conditions in the industry this may be so, but I believe that these conditions could be remedied so that the salmon fishing industry will present one of the best possible opportunities for the returned soldier."

**Wide Open.**

## New Policy of Land Settlement.

An Ottawa newspaper that is apt to be in the know says that the Dominion Government is about to give up the free homestead plan of settlement and instead put the lands up for sale by auction.

The proposal is a radical change of policy and smacks too much of a reversion to the policy which landed British Columbia in difficulties. One of the chief arguments against the Dominion handing its lands over to the provinces was that they were getting no revenue from their sale and that they were better able to settle them than the provinces could be. If, however, the Dominion is to make capital of its lands, then the province may have a right to demand that they get the proceeds.

## What is Better Class of Settler?

The despatch speaks of inducing a better class of settler by selling the lands than by giving them away. That is a matter of opinion. Just what is meant by a better class of settler has to be defined. It possibly means that rich men will buy, whereas only poor men would take the free lands under the restrictions that are imposed. And yet the history of prairie settlement has shown that in a majority of cases the poor men make better settlers than the rich and that the permanent prosperity of the country depends on getting men who are industrious rather than men who have money.

To bring in rich people to settle the lands means the establishment of large farms, something which they are trying to get rid of in England. The scheme on the face of it does not seem democratic. Possibly there may be restrictions, which will make the new scheme workable, but those who believe in developing the democratic spirit in this country will look on a measure of that kind with suspicion until they can be shown that it is all right.

## Pattullo Deals With Fisheries Regulations.

Mr. Pattullo has been taking up the cudgels in the Legislature on behalf of the people of Prince Rupert. He made an appeal for consideration for the returned soldiers in the fisheries business and especially in connection with salmon fishing. He suggests that the soldiers have first claim to the licenses, that the Indians and residents of the district get second chance.

A select committee of the Legislature under the chairmanship of G. G. McGeer had reported against the employment of returned men in the salmon fisheries, saying that the fish must be conserved for the purpose of making the industry profitable to those engaged therein. The following is the recommendation in part:

## Select Committee's Report in Part.

Your Select Committee was attended by Deputy Commissioner of Fisheries Babcock, and upon hearing Mr. Babcock and upon making further investigation, your Select Committee is of the opinion that in formulating measures for the rehabilitation of soldiers full consideration should be given to the fisheries, for two main reasons, the first being that your Committee believes that the fishing industry, if properly developed, would provide employment for a large number of returned men, and the second was that by the proper development of that industry the high cost of living problem would be solved in a measure in at least one of its many phases. While your Committee made some investigation into the possibilities of the returned soldier engaging in what is known as the "salmon-fishing industry" in such places as the Fraser River and elsewhere, your Committee is not of the opinion, in view of the condition of that industry, that it presents the best possibilities for the successful employment of returned men, the reason for such conclusion being that it is the opinion of your committee that a policy of conservation is at once necessary to re-establish that industry so that it may be made one of profitable possibilities for those engaging in it. For instance, your Committee ascertained the fact that in 1918 the total catch of sockeye salmon in the Fraser River was 75,000 cases, as compared with 553,000 cases which were captured in 1914, the brood-year of the 1918 run. It is the opinion of your Committee that similar depletions are being made on the Naas River, Rivers Inlet, and most of the minor sockeye waters.

## Duties of Dominion.

Your Committee also ascertained that in connection with the halibut-fishing carried on this coast the 1918 catch shows a decrease of 14,000,000 lbs. Your Committee, in view of the provisions of the "British North America Act" and subsequent legal interpretation of that Act, making it obligatory that the Dominion Government assume the full protection and encouragement of the fisheries of this province, and in view of the fact that a direct revenue during the past ten years has been collected by the Dominion Government of between \$45,000 and \$50,000 a year, and under the new provisions as provided in the regulations recently issued by the Dominion Government that revenue is to be increased to \$250,000 a year, deems it advisable that the Government of the Province of British Columbia should recommend to the Dominion Government in definite terms the necessity of developing the fishing industry in the Province of British Columbia along lines which will mean the engaging of large numbers of returned men, and at the same time amply protect that industry from depletion and ultimate destruction.

fishing and packing and all other fishing and packing should be thrown wide open.

"I understand that for the coming season the Federal authorities have abolished the iniquitous system of boat rating, and that all licences issued this year will be independent licences. I understand that 850 licences will be issued on the Skeena river, 700 at Rivers Inlet and 240 on the Naas. To my mind the Dominion Department of Fisheries ought to give first chance to take up these licences to returned soldiers, and the remainder to the Indian and British subjects resident within each district.

#### Could Make Money.

"That the returned soldier can not only make a living but make money in salmon fishing was demonstrated last year, when several returned men in the north were given a chance by reason of the fact that the canneries wanted everything with scales on. This year three of these men are spending \$5,000 in building a new boat, and I believe that, given a chance, other returned men can do equally well. To give the returned man a chance in salmon fishing, the use of traps and drag seines should be stopped.

#### Cannery Licences.

"I note that Ottawa has passed an Order-in-Council stopping the issue of any new cannery licences for five years. I think a cannery licence should be issued to any man who will use it legitimately.

"To tighten up the salmon monopoly is no step towards conserving the fish. Throw the whole business wide open and regulate the hours of fishing. Shut down the fishing each week long enough to allow the necessary number of fish to reach the spawning grounds and leave the fishing and canning industries to straight business competition.

#### Gas Boats.

"I note also that, while gas boats are permitted in salmon fishing in the south, they are expressly prohibited in the northern waters. Another case of discrimination. If gas boats are permitted in the south, they should also be permitted in the north.

#### Drastic Revision.

"It seems to me that the regulations governing the salmon industry require drastic revision, and that they should be revised with a view to making the industry one of the best possible means of earning a living by returned soldiers. The opportunities are there, but the returned man is fenced off from them."

## PARTICULARS OF MILITARY SERVICE ACT

Report Shows Grave Misjudgment of Conditions in British Columbia.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, March 28.—A report on the operations of the Military Service Council tabled in Parliament shows that up to April 18 of last year, 35,655 men had been actually placed on duty out of a total of 50,954 recruits obtained under the Military Service Act.

Total registrations amounted to 397,671 out of which 373,184 claimed exemption and 24,487 reported for service.

Registration fell far below the estimate made by the military authorities, except in Quebec where ninety per cent of the number expected were registered.

In British Columbia it was estimated 57,000 would be registered and there were only 16,000, this estimate proving wider from the facts than any of the others.

## NURSES NEEDED AT GENERAL HOSPITAL

Difficulty in Securing Professional Help Mentioned at the Meeting of Association Last Night.

There is still a need of more nurses at the hospital, according to report from the house committee to the Association last night, at their meeting in the council chamber with D. G. Stewart presiding. It was pointed out that there were two or three pupil nurses needed, but if it was not possible to get them they must then have more graduate nurses.

The president mentioned that Miss McGregor, the new matron, was now in charge and they expected that before long the staff would be completed and everything running well.

It was further reported that Miss Fraser would be leaving and her place would have to be filled before long.

### Secure Orderly.

The board authorized the House Committee to secure a male orderly as soon as convenient, it being found necessary that there should be one, especially for night duty.

Miss McDougall who was formerly a member of the staff but who left owing to ill health, is returning.

### Want More Money.

The Finance Committee was authorized to approach the City Council to ask for the annual grant. They were going to be under heavy expense this year and the opinion was expressed that the council should "spring" the grant this year, especially in view of developments in the city.

A resolution in regard to securing a line of credit at the bank was passed.

### Final Exams.

The secretary reported that Miss Stewart had passed her final examination and received her diploma.

A letter was read from G. H. Arnold thanking the board for their expressions of sympathy at the time of his recent bereavement.

## COMMODORE SALVAGE TO BE DISTRIBUTED

Mr. Justice Martin Allocates Amounts to Owners, Officers and Fishermen.

The award of \$4000 to the steamer Andrew Kelly for salvaging the tug Commodore has been allocated by Mr. Justice Martin in handing down his reasons for judgment. Three-fourths of the award, or \$3000, go to the owners of the Andrew Kelly, the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company. The master of the ship receives one-third of the balance, or \$334. The pilot, the mate and the chief engineer are given \$90 each, the second and third engineers receive \$65 each, and six of the crew an done fisherman who assisted in salvaging the Commodore get \$38 each.

The Commodore is owned by the B. C. Mills Timber & Trading Company, and was rescued by the Andrew Kelly in a storm off the coast of Alaska in October, 1917, and towed into Yakutat Bay, together with a barge load of copper she was towing. Her rudder was broken at the time.

The claims of the fishermen of the Andrew Kelly for damages for loss of fishing, owing to the time occupied in the rescue work, is not allowed.

**D. D. McKenzie Charges It Is Stored Illegally By Customs Department Under License.**

## WILL INCREASE LICENSE FEE FOR CANNERS

In Future Each Cannery Will Contribute \$500 to Revenue Instead of \$100.

Ottawa, March 29. — Hon. A. K. MacLean introduced into the House a resolution to increase the annual license fee for British Columbia salmon canneries from \$100 to \$500. He said that the commission which investigated the fisheries two years ago, recommended that the annual license be increased to \$1,000. The Department of Fisheries however did not deem it expedient to make the increase so large.

The resolution and a bill was introduced and given its first reading.

At the evening session the bill to amend the Fish Inspection Act, to make inspection compulsory was introduced. Mr. McKenzie, leader of the opposition, thought the bill capable of imposing a hardship on fishermen. The House adopted the resolution and a bill will be introduced.
