WHAT COALITION?

Yesterday a successful local businessman who is also keenly interested in politics was asked what he thought or the propoed coalition movement. He gave a grunt of disapproval and asked: "What coalition? Shall we coalesce with the people whose policy we heartily disapprove, who have proved themselves incompetent and whose aims and objects in life are as far from ours as is the east from the west? Coalition with these people would be more than foolish. It would be almost criminal. If they had either policy or personality they would have shown it during the past few years during which they have had the administration of affairs in their hands with a huge majority in the legislature to back them up. Such a coalition would be unthinkable for Liberals who value their principles or their characters."
