ALDERMAN CASEY REPORTS TO FEDERATION OF LABOR ON CALGARY CONVENTION

EXPLAINS WHY GREETINGS WERE SENT TO BOLSHEVIKI OF RUSSIA AND SPARTACANS OF GERMANY; IDEA OF ONE BIG UNION

There was a large gathering of workmen and returned soldiers last night to hear Alderman Casey tell of his visit to the Calgary Convention which was held recently under the auspices of the American Federation of Labor, and many were unable to get admission owing to lack of standing room. It was an orderly affair and at the close only a few questions were asked. Mr. Casey gave a long account of the proceedings at Calgary, an account of most of which has already been published. He then proceeded to discuss the sending of greetings to the Bolsheviki and the Spartacans of Germany. He said that the present situation of labor was not of their making. No one individual was responsible for the system. It was the natural product of an industrial system. By organization and education they hoped to change the capitalist class and inaugurate a co-operative commonwealth.

"That order is to come," said Mr. Casey. "You and I cannot stop it. The masses will be compelled for their own very existence to adopt the way that we do and have the same philosophy but the men of Russia beat us to it. We will not get our greetings because there is no way of sending them, but we have displayed good feeling toward them."

Spartacans.
Speaking with the message to the Spartacans Mr. Casey said the Spartacans were an auxiliary of the Bolsheviki. Germany had known as the home of Socialism, but it was a heresy on Bolshevism. When the test came Socialists went with the Kaiser. That Socialism did not represent all the workers, however, represented their action. These men at the institution on the inside as faithfully as the Allies fought it on the outside. He read from a manifesto issued during the war which called on German soldiers in the trenches to quit and depose the Kaiser from the throne.

All had read of the activities of the Spartacans and others of the leadership who were imprisoned for expressing their views. He was not in favor of sending fraternal greetings to men who acted along these lines.

Political Prisoners.

CLOCKS TO GO HOUR FORWARD

Order Passed Saturday and in Effect Yesterday; Confusion Throughout Dominion.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Victoria, March 31.—A proclamation of the Lieut.-Governor in Council promulgated on Saturday made it obligatory to put all the clocks forward one hour yesterday morning throughout the province of British Columbia.
At Ottawa.
Ottawa, March 31.—Great confusion and vexatious complication is the prospect as a result of the present uncertain situation regarding daylight saving. In spite of the fact that Parliament went on record last week against a resumption this year in Canada the railways adopted the new time and most of the cities and towns appear ready also to adopt it.
Still in Force.
Sir Henry Drayton, chairman of the Railway Commission, has brought down judgment that the Daylight Saving Act of last year is still in force on the statute books, and that only a proclamation by order-in-council is necessary to make it effective in the Dominion. In spite of the opinion of the Justice Department it is not necessary to pass a new act. Drayton has set next Tuesday on which the railway companies can come before him and give reasons why they should adopt new time, regardless of the action of Parliament. The railways will have some heavy backing from city councils, boards of trade, retail merchants, etc. Farmers also will be represented and will press for an order compelling railway companies to at least run on standard time where local lines are concerned.

ASK GOVERNMENT TO ADVANCE THEM CASH

Employees of Dolly Varden Railway Met Here Yesterday and Passed Resolution.

At a meeting of former employees of the Taylor Engineering Co. on the Dolly Varden Railway held here yesterday the following resolution was passed and ordered wired to Premier Oliver at Victoria:
"A mass meeting has been called at the city hall, Prince Rupert, by the labor men holding labor cheques for the work done on the Dolly Varden Railway. These men are financially straitened through the postponement of the settlement by the company.
"We as a body of men appeal to the Government for financial assistance, and ask that the Government use its influence to procure a speedy settlement, so that the hundred men now here may secure cash for their cheques. We further beg that the Government advance the amount of money necessary to cover the labor cheques issued by the Taylor Engineering Company.
"Signed J. P. Hawkinson, Secretary of the Meeting."

NINE FISHING BOATS SOLD THEIR CATCHES FOUR MORE ARRIVE

To-day's Arrivals Will Be Offered on Fish Exchange To-morrow at Noon.

Nine fishing boats sold their catches yesterday at noon as follows:
The Nidaros with 12,000 lbs. of halibut; and the Lovera with 10,000 lbs. both sold to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company, Ltd., for 14.3c and 11.5c per lb.
The Niagara with 9,000 lbs.; the Tyee 8,000; and the Dip with 7,000 lbs. of halibut, sold to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd., for 14.1c and 10.6c.
The Olympic having 16,000 lbs.; the Director 8,000 lbs.; and the S. and E. with 3,000 lbs. of halibut, sold to the Booth Fisheries Ltd., for 14c and 9.9c respectively.
The Condor arrived with 400 lbs. of spring salmon and received 8.2c for the reds, and 6c per pound for the whites.
Today's Catches.
Today's fish arrivals were the Grayling with 8,000 lbs.; the Alton 5,500; and the Siren with 800 pounds of halibut. The Iona brought in 750 lbs. of spring salmon, 500 lbs. of reds, and 250 lbs. whites, and sold for 18.4c and 5c per pound. The halibut catches will be sold tomorrow morning in the Fish Exchange.

SHOT BY BURGLARS

North Vancouver, March 31.—Martin Grellich was shot twice and seriously wounded by two burglars who were attempting to rob his home. The assailants escaped. One of the bullets went through his lung.

INDEMNITY IS FIXED AT VERY LARGE AMOUNT

Commission on Responsibility for War Recommends International Tribunal to Try Ex-Kaiser.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, March 31.—The "Intransigent" prints a report that the indemnity which Germany must pay for the damages of the war have been fixed at between 150,000,000,000 and 250,000,000,000 francs. Yearly payments will increase as Germany's economic life revives.
The commission on responsibility for the war has decided:
First, solemnly to condemn the violation of neutrality and all crimes committed by the Central Empires.
Second, the appointment of an international tribunal to judge all those responsible, including the former Emperor.
As soon as the text of the preliminary peace is adopted the German plenipotentiaries will be instructed to proceed to Versailles. It is not believed that the meeting of Germans and the representatives of allied and associated powers can be held before the day after Easter.

TWENTY HAVE ESCAPED JAIL

Sinn Feiners in Dublin Make a Clever Get Away and are Aided From Without.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Dublin, March 31.—Twenty Sinn Fein prisoners including J. J. Walsh, member of the British House of Commons, escaped from Mount Joy prison. Prisoners were exercising when some of them turned on the wardens and felled them while others were arranging a rope ladder over a 30 foot wall.
Outside the public noticed men sliding down a rope from the jail wall to the canal bank. They quickly gathered and assisted the fugitives. As the military guard came to aid the wardens the escaped prisoners dashed in various directions.

ARGYLL HOUSE IS IN THE LIME LIGHT

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Toronto, March 28.—Argyll House and the methods of administration employed at that institution over Canadian overseas forces, came under fire in the legislature yesterday when Lieut.-Col. A. C. Pratt, Conservative member for South Norfolk, spoke on the riots at Kimmel Camp and the conditions prevailing elsewhere among the forces still overseas.

CANADA WILL LEND CREDIT TO ROUMANIA

London, March 31.—Canada has signed an agreement establishing a credit with Roumania in order that the latter may purchase from Canada essential materials and manufacturers for reconstruction work, will supply Roumania with seed grain and agricultural implements. Roumania's import trade with Germany before the war exceeded \$110,000,000.

FISH TREATY WITH U.S.A.

Regulations Governing Sockeye Salmon Proposed to be Put Into Effect.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, March 31.—The State Department has made public the draft of a proposed treaty and regulations to govern the sockeye salmon fishing industry on the Fraser river system which includes the lower portion of the Gulf of Georgia and Juan de Fuca Strait in the State of Washington.
The proposed treaty provides for an international commission. Two men from each country shall conduct investigations recommended for consideration and modification that experience may indicate as desirable and the treaty shall remain in force for fifteen years.
The regulations contemplate the licensing of the fisheries by Canada and the state of Washington as heretofore; that no greater number of licenses for any class of fishing be issued at Washington than in 1918 and no more than 1,800 gill licenses to be granted on the Canadian side; that license restrictions in Canada are made to apply only to residents in B. C., or to companies licensed to do business in the province and in Washington state to resident American citizens or to companies authorized to do business in the state.

JAPANESE OPPOSE ANY DISCRIMINATION

Pass Resolution Against League of Nations if Clause is Not Included.

Tokio, March 29.—A mass meeting of prominent residents of Tokio adopted a resolution opposing any League of Nations covenant which does not contain a clause abolishing racial discrimination.

TROUBLE NOW IS IN KOREA

Many People Imprisoned and 100,000 Injured, Including Children, Says Dispatch.

San Francisco, March 31.—Demonstrations throughout Korea are growing stronger; 32,000 persons have been imprisoned and 100,000 injured including children. Christian churches, schools and stores have been closed, according to a cablegram received at the headquarters of the Korean National Association.

**House building
 A Public Duty.**

Advertisements on the front page of the Daily News on Friday and Saturday drew forceful attention to the need of houses in the city and the duty of every person to help in the campaign which is now going on. While the language used in those advertisements was calculated to draw attention to the need in a rather spectacular way the general condition was not overdrawn. The houses are needed by the hundred and that at once.

We were all very keen on getting the shipbuilding here. Everyone worked for it and looked forward to it as the one thing that would put the city in the running as a commercial centre. Now that we have it we must do our duty by the people who have ventured their money here. We stand to gain by every development that takes place and it is for us now to see that no neglect on our part injures our prospects.

**Rooming Houses are
 Filled to Overflowing.**

The hotels and rooming houses in the city, with a few exceptions, are filled to overflowing with boarders. Some of the men are not working, but are awaiting the movement which is now due. True there are some other buildings that may be improved and put in shape so that they may be used but not many and the accommodation they will provide is not always of the best. Men who will come to Prince Rupert will be men who have been used to some of the luxuries of life and they will not expect to be kept in cabins or in barracks here. The city is now beyond the mining camp stage. Let us build and build permanently so that the people who come here to live will be inclined to stay and make their homes.

**Fisheries for
 Returned Men.**

There has been plenty of talk of putting returned men on the land but little has been said about starting them in any other industries. On Friday the Prince Rupert Board of Trade suggested to the member for the district in the Federal House that returned men should be allowed to use gas boats in the salmon fishing and that they should be given the same help as those who go on the land. The idea seems to have been an excellent one. Here is a place where the natural resources of the province may be utilized to help out the men who are getting back from the war. It is to be hoped that the possibilities of this port to provide for some of the soldiers and the utilization of the great natural resources of which this is the centre will not be overlooked.

**Change of Time
 General Muddle.**

The Dominion Parliament undoubtedly made a mistake when it refused to conform to the rest of the continent in the change of time. In this country we do not need the daylight saving as much as they do in the south, because our summer days are longer than theirs. What we need, however, is to be in conformation with our neighbors. It is now borne in upon us that we cannot exist independent of the United States and yet get along comfortably. That was made clear this morning when our railroads and telegraph services were forced to adopt the daylight saving as a protective measure. Happily the provinces have power to enforce a law dealing with the question and the B. C. Legislature has acted promptly. The result is that we shall all conform to the new requirements and do it legally.

PRINCE RUPERT

The climate, industries and social conditions together with a prophesy as to the future.

First Prize Essay in the Daily News High School Contest, by Caroline Mitchell, aged 16.

On a little island five and one half miles long and three miles wide just north of the fifty-fourth parallel the city of Prince Rupert nestles. This location was chosen owing to its fronting a great natural harbor, fourteen miles long, with deep water, good anchorage and devoid of tidal currents. The site is not deep as it terminates against a high ridge of mountains about two miles in a direct line from the waterfront.

Prince Rupert, the Northern Metropolis of British Columbia, is the western terminus of a great railway, namely the Grand Trunk Pacific, and the veritable front door to the Yukon and Alaska. This city is the centre of the North Pacific fisheries, which industry is considered the finest in the world. A six-storey concrete is situated at Seal Cove, and about a mile northeast from the city.

Climate.

The climate of Prince Rupert is similar to that of Vancouver or London—mild, humid and invigorating. It differs from Vancouver—its rival—in that it has an almost entire absence of fogs. In summer the temperature never rises above eighty degrees or even in the coldest time in winter does it scarcely reach zero.

Industries.

The chief industries which are carried on around Prince Rupert are fishing, lumbering, agriculture and mining. The fisheries is an extensive trade from which our city greatly profits. Immense catches of halibut, salmon, herring and black cod are landed at its wharves and besides the cold storage plant there are four separate companies, the Atlin, Booth, San Juan and Royal fisheries.

Lumber.

In our city there are two lumber companies, the Prince Rupert and Georgetown. The Prince Rupert Lumber Co. has secured most of its logs from the Queen Charlotte Islands and Simpson Bay and has shipped many a car load of lumber to the old country during the past four years. The topography of the neighboring country is mountainous and heavily timbered with spruce, hemlock, cedar, larch and other varieties of evergreens, but of these spruce has been in greatest demand.

Fertile Valleys.

The agricultural possibilities of the fertile valleys of the Skeena, Naas and Bulkley Rivers cannot be over estimated. These districts which are variously adapted for the production of fruits, vegetables and grain have not been cultivated to the same extent as they might have been, so as yet agriculture is not such an important industry as the others.

Mining.

At Granby Bay there are large copper mines and a huge smelter which has just been built recently and copper is found in large quantities at Rocher de Boule mines. Silver and gold is very extensive in Stewart and from that point via Prince Rupert over two hundred and fifty tons have been shipped to Tacoma and Trail. Large coal mines are being developed at Telkwa and already many earloads have been shipped out to the various points.

Education.

The educational facilities of Prince Rupert are just as good as in any other city. We have one high school, which at present occupies three rooms of the Borden Street Public School; there is also another public school situated at Seal Cove and also one on Seventh Avenue; moreover on account of the overcrowded schools a class or two are being taught in the Hays Block.

Merchandise.

In the business section of the town various banks have their branches established. Among these are: The Canadian Bank of Commerce, Bank of Montreal, Union Bank, and the Royal Bank of Canada.

The business district of Prince Rupert is one worthy of any city, and is marked by beautiful store fronts, prettily dressed windows and full shelves. It is a well known fact that no man has failed who had a knowledge of his business and sufficient capital at the outset. This city, being the front door of commerce to the Yukon and all northern British

Columbia carries on a large trade with these countries rich in lumber, minerals and other natural products. Already many keen business men have established themselves for taking care of this trade and we have wholesale houses well equipped with large stocks to do business in all lines. Among those established here are Kelly, Douglas & Co., Ltd., Stewart & Mobley, F. G. Dawson, Ltd., and G. W. Nickerson & Co.

Social Conditions

The social condition of our city is something concerning which we have a great deal of criticism. There is little or no provision made for healthy recreation or amusement for either young or old—there are few places for the homeless youth to spend the evening. If there was an up-to-date Y. M. C. A. in our city with a gymnasium, swimming pool and library combined, it would be very helpful to the young people of Prince Rupert.

Religious life.

The religious life of the community is looked after by the churches of the various denominations. Much good is done by these institutions in counteracting the evil of our city, but perhaps still more could be done if all these churches were united and were working together at the same problems.

Faith in City.

Many of the large cities started with a more doubtful outlook than Prince Rupert did and so as long as her citizens have faith in her she is bound to rise and become one of the leading cities on the coast. Her position, her industries, resources, trade and commerce all are helping to build up the town.

Near Orient.

Prince Rupert is several hundred miles nearer the Orient than any other sea port on the coast and is particularly suited as the entrepot of business from Siberia, China and Japan. This nearness to the ports of the Orient makes it capable to ship silk and other valuable cargoes quicker than by any other route. This town being surrounded by a country rich in natural resources will be able to provide cargoes for steamers operating from this port and in time will become the shipping point and market for farmers between here and the Rocky Mountains.

Development in Sight.

During the reconstruction period a great deal of lumber will be shipped through Prince Rupert to be used in building up European cities. This industry will increase and a great many more men will be required. Again the fisheries will, in a short time, be finding new markets, one of the chief exports from Prince Rupert to the Orient will be fish.

Shipbuilding.

The drydock and ship building plant which is to commence work some time in the near future will make great changes. Thousands of men will be engaged in this work and as a result many men will start in business; no one will hesitate to invest their money and all will be lively and bright.

Perhaps, when that day comes there will be some sort of playgrounds and a place where children can go and spend their leisure hours without seeing all the evil and vice of the street life.

Shipping.

Everything is in favor of Prince Rupert's progress—she will be connected with the eastern points by means of an aeroplane service and with the Oriental points by means of mighty steamers sailing every day from our port. It is also planned to ship the majority of the output from Swanson Bay and Ocean Falls through Prince Rupert and as this includes large shipments of paper, lumber and pulp, the prosperity of the town will be increased a great deal.

I.O.D.E DOES VALUABLE WORK

Three Local Chapters Have Been Very Active During Year Just Past.

The first annual report of the municipal chapter of the I.O.D.E. as compiled by the secretary, Mrs. Duncan, shows that the membership of the order in this city numbers 135, made up of 71 members in the Queen Mary Chapter, 34 in Hill 60 Chapter, and 30 in the Adair Carss Chapter. The total money raised by the three chapters amounted to \$2,218.14.

Donations.

Donations were made to the following objects: Halifax Relief Orphanage, Daughters of Empire giant jam gift for the men in the trenches, Y. M. C. A. Prisoners of War fund, French Relief fund, St. Dunstan's Hostel for the blind, wool for French peasants, Daughters of Empire Nurses' Home, the Canadian Red Cross, Great War Veterans, Daughters of Empire Travelling Historical Gallery for the benefit of the schools. Two chapters took up Victory bonds.

Local Activities.

During the year members of the chapters assisted in the work of National Registration, undertook to canvass parts of the town in the Y. M. C. A. campaign, took charge on two occasions of the Red Cross weekly sales, held a tag day for the Navy League, cooperated with the Board of Food Control in their efforts at food conservation, assisted in the Victory Loan campaign, and were particularly active during the influenza epidemic in helping to care for the sick both in the General Hospital and in the Borden Street Emergency Hospital, as well as in private homes. Knitting meetings have been held by the chapters and 483 articles have been sent overseas, these being nearly all pairs of socks.

MEN COMING NORTH FOR GRANBY OPENING

Three Hundred Registered at the Offices of the Company in Vancouver.

Between two and three hundred men are registered at the offices of the Granby Consolidated in the Birks building, Vancouver.

Many returned soldiers were included among the applicants, over 40 of whom had been engaged in mining previous to their enlistment. O. B. Smith, mines superintendent, said that the company will give veterans preference wherever they are qualified to fill upon positions.

Most of the employment seekers, it was stated, are mechanics, although it was at first feared by company officials that the offering of that class of labor would hardly suffice to fill the needs of the plant. Miners are very much in demand.

The first coterie of workers are on their way north on the Camosun. This will include the kitchen force and waitresses, who will prepare for the coming of the workers, many of whom will be sent to the copper town on the Prince Rupert Monday morning.

Many Stay at Work.

Following the vote taken on the company's offer before the shutdown it was unanimously voted that should any of the married men having families at Anyox, and living there, desire to accept the company's offer they were at perfect liberty to do so without bearing the stigma of being "unfair." Whether they stayed or remained was quite optional, and many stayed, working at reconstruction of the property in order to replace buildings, tracks and ore bins which were seriously damaged by the fire on March 2.

PEACE TREATY MAY BE READY APRIL 21

Paris, March 28.—Hopes are expressed in Peace Conference circles that a preliminary treaty may be signed by April 20.

TWO YEARS IN PRISON FOR BAD CHINAMAN

How Hing Sent to Okalla Farm For House Breaking; Finger Prints Tell Tale.

The sentence against Chow Hing who was charged with house breaking on two different occasions a few weeks ago, was removed until Saturday afternoon, when the accused was brought before Judge Young in the County Court.

Constable Bailey of the city police produced some finger print evidence of which he had made a study, showing that the accused had been arrested on two previous occasions, one for the theft of a bicycle, getting four months for offence, and the other for having cocaine in his possession, for which he served six months in prison.

Judge Young sentenced him to two years' imprisonment at Okalla Prison Farm.

WOULD PROHIBIT ALL UNSEEMLY DANCES

Bill in Alaska Legislature to Prohibit "Bunny Hug" Referred to Game Committee.

Juneau, March 28.—A bill to prohibit the "Bunny Hug," "Turkey Trot," and "other immoral and suggestive dances," introduced in the House by Mr. Nordale for its "author," Mr. Collins, was the first joke put over on any of the members on the floor of the House since the beginning of the Fourth Session. After it was read, it was referred by Speaker White to the Committee on Roads, and later, upon suggestion of Mr. Collins, to the Committee on Game, though Mr. Sowerby, chairman of the latter committee, disclaimed any knowledge of the "game" mentioned in the bill.

Under the Table.

After a spirited discussion regarding the proper disposal of the bill, Mr. Pennington, who was seconded by Mr. Dunn, moved that it "be put under the table." Though there were several dissenting votes, Mr. Pennington's motion carried and the bill was "put under the table."

The bill, as introduced, follows: "An Act to prohibit certain dances commonly called the 'Grizzly Bear,' 'Turkey Trot,' 'Snake Wrestle,' 'Bunny Hug,' and other suggestive and immoral dances and to provide a penalty for the violation of the Act and declaring an emergency.

"Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska: "Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to do, or to attempt to do, or to take part in certain forms or kinds of dance, commonly known or called the 'Hootchie Koochie,' 'Grizzly Bear,' 'Turkey Trot,' 'Snake Wrestle,' 'Bunny Hug,' 'Lame Duck,' or any other suggestive or immoral dance.

Heavy Fine.

"Section 2. Any person violating the provisions of the Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars, or imprisonment in the Federal jail for not more than ten (10) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

"Section 3. An emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Act shall take effect from and after its passage and approval."

QUARANTINE FOR ALASKAN PORTS

Seattle, March 29.—A five-day quarantine against influenza has been established at all southwestern Alaskan ports. This covers all travel at Skagway. The Canadian authorities will continue the quarantine against travellers bound up country via Skagway.

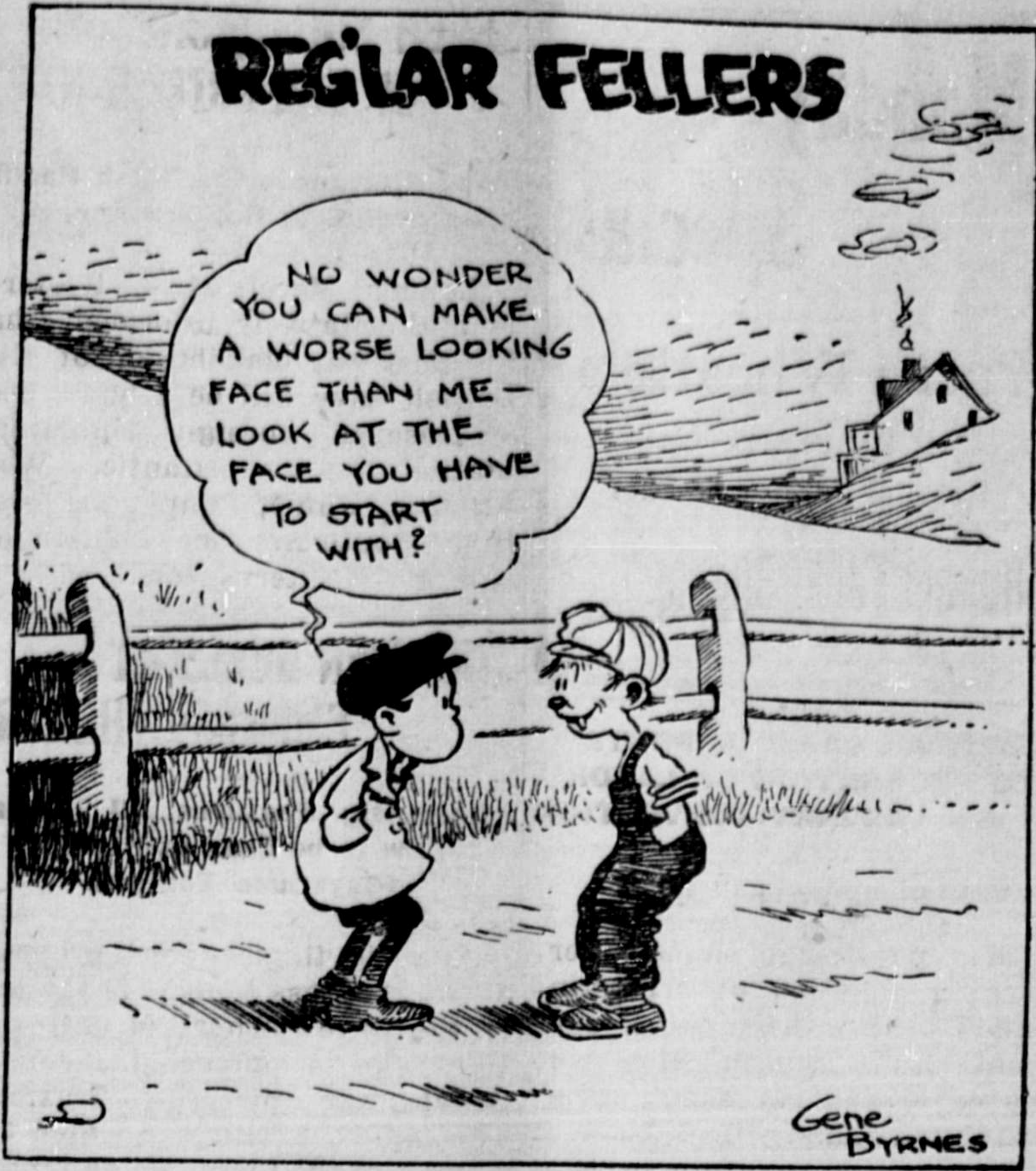
