WORK HAS COMMENCED AT DRYDOCK CONTRACT LET FOR GRADING SLIPS NEW ROAD IS BEING CONSTRUCTED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Work has actually commenced at the shipbuilding plant. A number of men have been put to work grading a road into the dock, and the contracts have been let for the grading of two slips between the shipyard and Cow Bay.

J. R. Morgan & Co. have already commenced assembling their equipment and will employ a good many men. The work will take some time and it may be nearly two months before the first slip is laid. There is much preparatory work to be done, however, and many men will be employed.

There had been a suggestion of using the side launching plant on the dock on which to build the ships, but this plan has been abandoned and the slips will be prepared immediately. They are on the city side of the dockyard fence, between that point and Cow Bay. The slips will cut off the present road to the dock, and the need of building a new road.

MINERS ADVISE REJECT TERMS OF GOVERNMENT

Resolution Passed by South Wales Colliery Employees Against Terms of Commission.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, April 1. — At a conference of the South Wales miners a resolution was passed last night advising the Miners' Federation to reject the terms suggested by the Government in regard to wages and working conditions of coal miners.

The action of the Government is based on the recent report of the Coal Commission with which the miners do not seem to agree.

At the meeting of the City Council held last night it was decided that the city would delay in conforming to the new time regulations, but adopt the new time tonight, when the city clocks will be put forward to conform with the other clocks in the city which have tried to conform with the provincial law.

50,000 LBS. HALIBUT WAS SOLD TODAY

Prices Obtained Were Slightly
Over Fourteen Cents for
First Quality Fish.

Seven fishing boats sold their catches at the Fish Exchange this morning and received good prices as follows:

The Senator with 16,000 lbs.; Flattery, 7,000; Yale, 4,000, and the Siren with 800 lbs. of halibut sold to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd., for 14.3c. and 10.2c. per pound.

The Wilson with 12,000 lbs.; the Grayling, 8,000, and the Alton with 5,500 lbs. of halibut, sold to the Booth Fisheries, Ltd., for 14.3c. and 11.1c. per pound. Altogether 50,300 lbs. of halibut were sold today.

PROHIBITION AMENDMENTS.

The amendments to the Prohibition Act which have been introduced by the Attorney-General are mainly those which the supporters of the measure have sought in the interest of general efficiency. In submitting them for incorporation in the measure Mr. Farris has earned the thanks of all who wish to see both the improvement and the enforcement of our laws.

One amendment should assist in checking the prescription evil and another the misuse of the bonded warehouse privilege. The two main amendments relating to agencies and advertising have been sought for practically since the act was passed.

With these amendments and capable administration such as Colonel Selater is giving the full benefit of the law should be obtained.

BUILDING FUND ON GOOD START

Present Opportunity Cannot Be
Lost in Providing for New
Residents.

The campaign for building funds is going on apace and the committee is confident that if all unite in the endeavor the required money will be secured. The committee is meeting with much encouragement and a few set backs. The majority feel that this is the one opportunity that must not be lost. The few are careless as to what happens to the city provided they do not have to put up any money. That is what the committee find.

It is pointed out by those who are keen on seeing the city take advantage of its present opportunities, that unless all do their bit just now it cannot be expected that the best results will be obtained. Co-operation of all is necessary at a time like this.

At Council.

The building question was mentioned by the mayor at the Council meeting last night. He said that the money expected from the Dominion Government through the Provincial Authorities has nothing whatever to do with the present campaign which was being conducted in the city. It was a totally different fund and would be used chiefly by returned soldiers, they getting the first opportunity to use the money.

Member Urging Speed.

The Mayor said that Mr. Manson who had just returned from Victoria said that the member for the district was urging on the Dominion the desirability of forwarding the cash at once so that work could proceed. It is expected that Prince Rupert will get from \$50,000 to \$75,000 as her share. This money would help to relieve the situation if available soon. He was keeping a list of returned men who were applying for some of the money.

Just now money is the thing that counts, for it is badly needed to provide homes for the people who are coming here.

MUCH LOOTING AT BUDAPEST

Anti-Capitalism Continues; Women Joining Red Army; President in Royal Castle.

Budapest, April 1.—The plunge of Budapest into anti-capitalism continues. There are feverish efforts to show that reign of law and order is undisturbed. The city is quiet since the first few days, in which there was much looting of jewelry shops. As a result of the looting 150 persons have been executed by the new regime. Women are joining the red army. Bela Kun has installed his office in the royal castle. House rents have been reduced twenty per cent.

The homes of the wealthy are being searched and the paintings and works of art are being requisitioned for the purpose of establishing national galleries at Moscow.

The Grand Trunk steamers will call at Victoria southbound but not coming north. They will sail direct from Seattle to Vancouver and then north. The Prince George is expected to leave Victoria to inaugurate the double service on April 30.

There will be a baseball game on the Market Square grounds tomorrow afternoon at 5:30 when the King Edward Entrance class team will meet the Colts. A lively time is expected and doubtless there will be a number of spectators present.

Tenders for the supply of large envelopes to the city were opened at the City Council meeting last night, the successful tenderer being McRae Bros., \$49.00; Franks \$50.50 and Rauk \$58.25.

GRAND TRUNK AFFAIRS ARE AGAIN AIRED

Correspondence Between Government and Company Tabled
in House of Commons.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, April 1.—In the House of Commons yesterday Sir Thomas White tabled additional correspondence relating to negotiations for the purchase of the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific railways. The correspondence showed that the company suggested it was willing to accept \$1,163,000 rental without arbitration. Another suggestion was that the Government should guarantee an issue of \$3,000,000 of Grand Trunk notes to assist in meeting the obligations falling due October, 1918.

Sir Robert Borden while promising consideration, said he could not hold the slightest hope that either of two alternatives would be accepted after returning to Canada. Sir Robert advised the Company that the Government could not guarantee the proposed note issue without authority of Parliament, adding that the Government did not think it practicable to ask Parliament for this authority.

Sir Robert stated that there were strong objections in the cabinet to any increase in the offer made for the two roads and that it would be unwise, without the report of a commission or vote of Parliament, to pay a rental which represents a capitalization of from eighty to one hundred million dollars.

MINE EXPLOSION IS CAUSE OF 11 DEATHS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Trinidad, Colorado, April 1.—An explosion in a mine near here caused the death of eleven men. The rescue crews are searching for two additional bodies believed to have been buried.

LAWS VIOLATED.

"That whereas the Prohibition Act and the laws pertaining to the prevention of gambling are being violated daily in the city of Prince Rupert, it is resolved that this council hereby requests the police commission to instruct the chief of police to prosecute more vigorously any branch of said laws, irrespective of person or nationality."

This was a resolution passed at their last meeting by the Prince George Police Commission.

S. S. Princess Mary is due in from Alaska this evening at 8. It was expected by the local agent that she would have been here yesterday, he having been notified to that effect, but something interfered and she is on her usual time.

NEWFOUNDLAND IS ISOLATED FROM CANADA

Steamers Unable to Penetrate
Blockade of Ice Which Surrounds Island.

St. John, April 1.—Newfoundland is isolated from the rest of the world. For more than a week the whole island has been cut off from Canada by the great ice blockade surrounding it. Island steamers have been unable to penetrate the floes and the result has been complete isolation.

Winnipeg, April 1.—Daylight saving is held up for three weeks as a result of action by the City Council. Last night the bylaw passed its first reading by a vote of seven to six.

FATAL ACCIDENT AT LAUNCHING NEAR BRISTOL

Unknown Number Estimated from
Ten to Forty Killed as Scaffold
Collapsed.

New York, April 1.—An unknown number of men, variously estimated at from ten to forty, were drowned or killed when a temporary scaffolding around a boat at the Harriman yards near Bristol, Rhode Island, collapsed yesterday afternoon.

Thousands of people had gathered to witness the launching of the vessel and the overcrowding is supposed to have been the cause of the accident.

Bolshevism Not A New Idea.

Bolshevism is a new name for an old idea. It is the rechristening of the revolutionary socialist. The principles and platform are much the same as they were twenty years ago except that whereas formerly the socialist was not able to say how his socialism would be brought about, today he points to Russia as the great example to be followed.

It must be remembered, however, that the conditions in Russia never could compare with the conditions here. In that country there was no such thing as real democracy. Here all that is necessary to bring about a reform is to convert slightly more than half the electorate and at once the machinery of parliament can be invoked and the idea implemented in legislation. That is the safety valve of the country. We already have a big soviet at Ottawa, lesser ones at the capital of each province and another which meets Monday nights in the city hall. Changing the name of the government will not change its effectiveness or its reality.

Labor Represented Already Here.

A few weeks ago the people of Prince Rupert had an opportunity to elect a city council composed of all labor men or women. Three of them, Aldermen Casey, Barrie and Kirkpatrick were the chosen candidates of the labor people in the city. Both of the police commissioners were chosen by the labor unions as their representatives. Looking at the other members of the council it is quite evident that neither one is what might be called a drone. Each is a worker and doubtless that was the reason for his election.

But this present soviet form of government does not suit the few who think that they are dispossessed of their rightful share of worldly goods. They object to anyone making profits, no matter how small or reasonable. It is the system they are after. They are lyingly told that everything is lovely in Russia where the Bolshevik rule and they think that it would be lovely here if a similar condition obtained.

Some Are Always Dissatisfied.

Under a soviet government such as is advocated by the few men who are dissatisfied with the present system, it would soon be found that work would be a necessity and that those who were to be elected to the soviet would have to have the confidence of the people. The result would be just as it is now. There would be an element who would object to real work and who would want to hold office. When they had been voted down a few times they would be forming another revolutionary party to abolish the soviet and establish a "won't work" party.

There are a good many people who are always against the government, no matter what that government may be. It is their nature to oppose. The only way to satisfy them would be to put them in office, and then they would not know what to do with themselves. These will never be satisfied and it is useless to try to satisfy them. When they go to heaven they will take strong exception to the type of hap used and will organize a revolutionary party to secure shorter hours for the musicians.

Bolshevism a Symptom, Not Really a Disease.

Some people imagine that Bolshevism is a disease which is following the war. That is not correct. Bolshevism germs are always with us. They have been with us since the beginning of time and now and then they break out. When there is a violent outbreak it is usually the sign of a diseased condition of the national system.

Dr. Steinmiz who himself was once a German revolutionary and who came to America to get away from the unbearable conditions of his own country, writes interestingly of Bolshevism in the current number of the American Magazine. There he argues that when there is a violent outbreak of the revolutionaries in any part of the country it is a sign that there is something wrong at that point which should be remedied. As long as the conditions of life are healthy there can be no outbreak for the very essence of Bolshevism is rule by the majority. We are in no danger here for the movement is not taken seriously. Here any man can go into the fishing business, for example, and earn as much as any capitalist. He has every chance in life. He is not repressed or held down as long as he behaves himself decently.

A. M. MANSON TALKS ABOUT AGRICULTURE

Drastic Powers Given Land Settle-
 ment Board to Ensure
 Speedy Action.

Alex. M. Manson, member of the
 Legislature for the Omineca con-
 stituency, is home after a stren-
 uous session at Victoria. There
 was a good deal to do and all were
 anxious to get home, so they
 worked night and day in order to
 get finished up. Speaking of the
 session Mr. Manson said that a
 good deal of useful legislation
 had been passed. The Land Set-
 tlement Board had been strength-
 ened, giving the Board more
 powers.

Powers Drastic.

Mr. Barrow explained to the
 Legislature that while the powers
 given the Board were drastic, it
 was not the desire of the Govern-
 ment to exercise them unduly. It
 desired the fullest co-operation
 of landowners in colonizing and
 developing unoccupied lands, but
 the Government was determined
 that nothing should stand in the
 way of the speedy bringing into
 cultivation of the agricultural
 lands of the province. The first
 requirement of the province was
 a happy and industrious agricul-
 tural population and in view of
 the great number of returned
 soldiers the Government felt the
 time was particularly opportune
 to populate the land with men of
 their own blood instead of with a
 foreign population as in days
 gone by.

Dr. Warnock.

One of the most important
 moves in connection with the
 agricultural development of the
 province in recent months, said
 Mr. Manson, had been the ap-
 pointment of Dr. Warnock as
 deputy minister of agriculture.
 Dr. Warnock has not only a bril-
 liant record as a student of agri-
 cultural matters, but has had the
 advantage of ten to fifteen years'
 useful experience in actual ranch-
 ing. During the last eighteen
 months he was a valued member
 of the British Remount Commis-
 sion in Canada and the work was
 thought so highly of that he was
 made a member of the Order of
 the British Empire. He has also
 had parliamentary experience
 which makes his practical value
 distinctly great.

MISSION DAYS OF METHODIST CHURCH

Dr. White Gives an Interesting
 Address on His Experiences
 At Church Last Night.

The Rev. Dr. White addressed
 an interested audience last night
 in the Methodist Church, when he
 talked about his past experiences
 in the early mission days.

He spoke of the gold rush up
 the Fraser River in the year 1859,
 when his father, Edward White,
 had mentioned the great need of
 missionaries in the northern part
 of British Columbia and was the
 first volunteer to offer his services
 for the cause.

Dr. White then told how a small
 band was formed, headed by his
 father, leaving Toronto on the
 last day of the year 1858, reach-
 ing Vancouver Island in due
 course.

"These men took an interest in
 the development of the country,"
 the speaker went on, "they wanted
 to do something more than just
 preach. I have no sympathy at
 all for a missionary who talks
 about his hardships."

Dr. White also touched on the
 great work done by James Turner
 who was one of the first pioneers
 in the Yukon, and of the great
 hardships he suffered. He also
 told of his arrival in this city
 shortly before the steel came
 through. At that time he ex-
 perience some difficulty in find-
 ing a suitable site for the church,
 but after that was overcome,
 lumber was procured from
 Georgetown and work commenced.
 The Rev. C. S. Connor was pastor
 at that period.

At the meeting of the City
 Council last night the mayor an-
 nounced that the Council would
 soon appoint a clean up day when
 all yards would have to be tidied
 up.

BIRTH.

There was born to Mr. and Mrs. George Hill, of Green Street, at the Prince Rupert General Hospital on April 1, a daughter.

The question of repairing the road at Cow Bay and bridge in sand and gravel for the use of those engaging in building operations was referred to the Board of Works.

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted immediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted allotments to purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such allotments may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has been made, as well as the rights of the land, are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

WILL NOT SUPPRESS RED LITERATURE

Motion of Alderman Perry Asking for Action is Voted Down by City Council.

At the meeting of the City Council last night a resolution of Alderman Perry's asking that the Police Commission investigate the revolutionary propaganda which is said to be going on and report, was voted down, the council taking the view that no good result would follow such action.

In speaking to his resolution Alderman Perry said that in the absence of Alderman Casey he would not deal with the matter as fully as he had intended. He spoke of the insidious propaganda which was going on throughout the west in the form of I. W. W., Bolshevism and Soviet literature. It was designed to overthrow the established institutions of the country. He did not intend to knock labor but he did not want to see the propaganda here to the detriment of the city. It often got into the hands of well meaning men who were led away.

Mayor McClymont said the Dominion Government were attending to the matter. After a short discussion the vote was taken, the resolution being defeated by a majority of four to two.

The schools this morning commenced at old time but dismissed at new. SOME CHANGES IN MUNICIPAL LAWS

City Treasurer Reports on Result
of His Labors at Victoria.

An interesting and somewhat
lengthy report from E. H. John-
son, city treasurer and acting city
clerk, was read at the meeting of
the City Council last night. It
dealt with the work accomplished
at Victoria in connection with the
revision of the Municipal Act,
which has now been laid over un-
til the next sitting of the Legis-
lature. There were 228 sections
in the new bill and Mr. Johnson
was successful in getting a num-
ber of changes made which would
be beneficial to this city.

One change is that dealing with
the assessment and taxing of cor-
porations and railway lands. The
Imperial Oil Co. here will, under
the new law, have to pay taxes
just like other people.

Under the new law tax sales
will be compulsory, to be held in
September of each year and tax
rebates will be eliminated. In-
stead of the rebate there will be
added percentages for those who
fail to pay on time.

At the conclusion of the report
Mr. Johnson was thanked for his
excellent work.

RIOT DAMAGES ARE SOON TO BE PAID

Extension of Poll Tax and Regu-
lation of Sale of Oriental
Eggs by Legislature.

(Special via G. T. P. Tel-grams.)

Victoria, March 31.—In its closing
hours the legislature passed a
resolution favoring the pay-
ment of riot damages to those who
suffered in the 1914 riots in the
coal producing areas of Vancou-
ver Island. The riot claims were
adjudicated upon three years ago
by Mr. Justice Gregory, the aggre-
gate amount awarded being \$56,-
878.

An amendment to the Poll Tax
Act to extend its provisions to
Chinese engaged in certain in-
dustries such as fisheries, passed
without discussion and the bill to
regulate the sale of Oriental
eggs also passed.

CITY GETS \$2,000

Check for That Amount Being
Forwarded by Provincial
Government.

A check for \$2,000 is being for-
warded to the city from the Pro-
vincial Government in repayment
of the larger part of the money
the city was forced to spend at
the Borden St. emergency hospital
last autumn.

The total cost of the institu-
tion was \$2,846 and in view of the
act that many of those treated
were indigent or from outside
points the Government is making
the special grant. The matter
was reported to the City Council
last night by the acting city clerk.

SILVER STANDARD RATES BEING FIXED

During the past few months
while Mr. Norrie-Lowenthal has
been in Vancouver he has been
able to get the freight rates on
the Silver Standard Ore fixed at
a figure which will enable them
to operate, says the Omineca
Herald. He has also been in-
vestigating a new method of
handling silver-zinc concentrates
which means a greater saving in
silver values. A firm in the U. S.

are using the method very suc-
cessfully at present.
Mr. Norrie-Lowenthal has met
several times in the city with Mr.
Errington, and the latter stated
that everything was ready to re-
sume operations on the Nine Mile
mountain properties. He also
stated that if the work developed
satisfactorily operations would
be on a large scale.

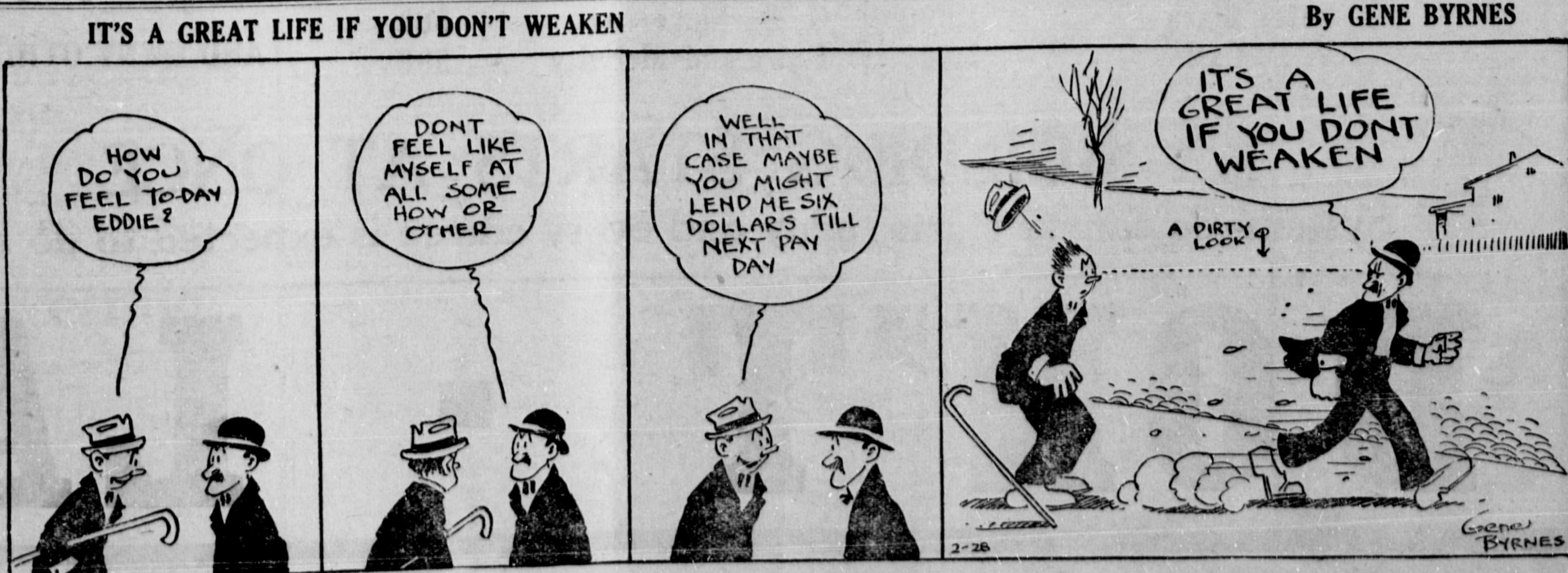

**EIGHTY-MILE GUN
WAS NEVER USED**

Signing of Armistice Prevented
Use of Winston's Pet Against
the Germans.

Since "Dora," the British Defence of the Realm Act, lost her sting stories of mystery ships and strange happenings in the war have been published, but at least one other story remains to be told. It concerns "Winston Churchill's pet," as the proud artisans of Sheffield named it.

"Winston's Pet" is not a mystery ship or anything of the sort that puts out to sea, but a great land gun to out-Bertha the notorious German "Big Bertha." It was so called because the Minister of Munitions had set his heart on having his gun just to show those Germans what the British can do when they want to. When the Minister made his last great munition tour a few weeks before the armistice was signed he was able to see his brand new pet on the stocks in the famous Vickers works ready for going forth to battle. "The boys" had chalked in a conspicuous place on the housing: "Winston's Pet. To Beat the Huns."

Standing beside this "toy" of a gun one felt a mere pygmy or like a microbe in a world of matter. The width across the breech end was almost as great as a moderate sized man is tall, and the length of the barrel was eighty-three feet or more. She was said authoritatively to be capable of firing a shell 80 miles. Others presumed to be well informed said that she would be destroyed beyond that distance.

She was, as far as an interested layman could judge, made on almost identical lines with the mammoth naval super-guns of which Sheffield has produced so many, but with the vital difference that double strength had been put into the barrel by the addition of another inner tube so that she would fire an eight inch shell instead of a fifteen inch shell. The breech charge apparently remained the same, so that the same explosive force used to pro-

pel a fifteen inch shell was behind the lesser and much lighter projectile. These conditions, therefore, apparently gave the gun its wonderful range.

Winston's eye beamed with delight as he walked up and down and around the gun and viewed its splendid points and marvelled at the engineering skill that could fashion such a monster from masses of rough steel.

Two men alleged to be draft evaders were again brought before Magistrate McMullin this morning in the police court and remanded until tomorrow morning.
