CONVENTION OF LIBERALS NEXT AUGUST

Choice of Leader, Compilings of a National Platform and Organization to be Arranged.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, April 2.—A National Liberal convention is to be held in Ottawa on August 5, 6 and 7. The choice of a leader will be the principal question, the second will be the preparation of a platform and arrangements for organization. Delegates will be chosen on a centralized plan. Each province to be divided into districts and in each district a convention will be held. At these conventions district organizations will be formed and the delegates named. In turn delegates are to be elected for the national convention.

FINAL CALL OF DOMINION TRUST ON SHAREHOLDERS

Vancouver, April 2.—As part of preparation to announce a liquidation, the Dominion Trust Corporation, J. C. Gwynn, liquidator, obtained leave from Mr. Justice Murphy to make a final call on shareholders who owe unpaid shares. About 173 individuals are affected. Calls are for payment of unpaid premium of \$35 a share, aggregate \$60,000.

TRADE RESUMED WITH THE ENEMY

War Trade Board Authorizes Business Resumption With Germany and Austria.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, April 2.—The resumption of trade and communication with Germany and Austria is authorized in an order issued by the War Trade Board acting in accordance with an agreement reached by the Associated Nations.

The only restrictions upon imports into Germany and Austria will be on commodities of a military nature. This constitutes the first direct trade relations resumed with any enemy state.

HOUSING PLANS IN THE DOMINION

Ontario and Quebec Deal With Matter by Legislation; Special Provision for Soldiers.

Toronto, March 29.—Progress is being made with housing legislation throughout the Dominion. The Ontario Legislature gave a third reading to its housing bill, which will make available practically at once from ten to twelve million dollars for the building of workingmen's houses costing not more than \$3,500 each, including land. The plan of the Act provides for the creation of housing commissions in such municipalities as desire to participate in the Government grant.

Borrow Money.
The municipality requires the necessary money from the Government issuing debentures therefor. The commission then advances the money to those individuals or companies which wish to make use of it. In the case of a company, the loan may amount to 85 per cent. of the value of the land and houses; in the case of private persons, other than returned soldiers, 90 per cent. and in the case of returned soldiers or their widows 100 per cent.

Repayment.
The loans to the municipalities are repayable within a period not exceeding 20 years and bear interest at 5 per cent. A loan made to a company by a housing commission is also repayable in the same terms in equal monthly instalments. Individuals to whom loans are made become purchasers from the commissions under an agreement of sale.

Amendment.
At the last reading of the bill an effort was made by the opposition to have an amendment introduced under which in addition to the loan to returned soldiers of the full value of the house, a grant of \$200 should be made. This would enable soldiers to buy their lot, which is a necessary possession before a building loan can be secured. The amendment was ruled out because of the Government's exclusive right to propose financial legislation.

Quebec.
In Quebec, the housing bill of the Provincial Government is also making progress. Here the chief opposition to the measure appears to be based on a fear that it placed power in the hands of the municipalities which might lead to exploitation and favoritism unless great care was taken. Industrial Developments Draw Many to This District From Other Parts.

The arrival of the Prince Rupert this morning from Vancouver and Seattle with all her accommodations sold out, gives an indication of the increased interest which is being taken in this district of late. While there were a number of people returning from visits to the south the majority were those who were coming to take advantage of developments on British Columbia's north coast.

A goodly squad of workmen were going to Anyox and there were something like fifty bound to the islands. Stewart is to receive its quota, while the mining districts of Hazelton and other interior points was the objective of some.

The shipbuilding work here is drawing very many who are looking for new opportunities of business or employment. A number of investigators have arrived for a few days and will have an opportunity to enjoy the spring sunshine of the industrial capital of the north coast.

ATTEMPT TO STEAL LAUNCH AT VANCOUVER

Caretaker Gagged and Bound But Escapes and Telephones to Police.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, B. C., April 2.—Two men and one woman were arrested by the city police Sunday night as a sequel to one of the most startling and mysterious criminal schemes that have come under the attention of the police for a long while.

An attempt to steal the 65-foot launch Isis, owned by Mr. Lang, of Powell River, was frustrated by A. McDonald, caretaker of the Vancouver Yacht Club, who, after being bound and gagged and carried into the bush at Stanley Park, managed to slip his bonds and row across Coal Harbor to telephone the police.

Sergeant Yorke despatched Constables Knox and Proudlock, who manoeuvred the capture, which was done unless the two men were trying unsuccessfully to start the engine.

Mr. McDonald and his daughter, May McDonald, and a friend, Mr. Gandy, were conversing in the spar room of the Yacht Club late in the evening some time after eleven o'clock when they heard someone coming up the stairs of the club. Mr. McDonald investigated and was told by two men and a woman that they had missed their boat and asked if the caretaker would not assist them to find it. Mr. McDonald went with the trio and, when outside, a man appeared from the darkness and levelled a gun at the caretaker's head.

McDonald offered resistance, but the woman who formed one of the trio, placed the muzzle of the gun in the small of his back and he was gruffly ordered to move on. Realizing that resistance was fraught with danger, he did so. He was guided into a recess of Stanley Park and there tied hand and foot and gagged with a handkerchief. He was left in the park in this condition. He saw one man and a woman leave him and make their way back the way they came.

Miss McDonald alleges that the woman of the trio said: "There is big money in this for us if we pull it off. We are working for someone else," and also flashing her gun, said: "This is my war baby; I depend on this to keep me out of jail."

Caretaker McDonald had gripped loose by this time and had phoned the police. The two officers, on arriving quietly approached the boat and covered the occupants with their revolvers.

While Knox sent for more help, Proudlock kept for more help. Constables Quirk and Tuley arrived, and the arrest of the two men and the woman was effected without resistance. The trio were taken to the police office.

The accused gave their names as Sidney Lincoln Price, Blanche E. Price and Westley W. Douglas.

EBERT'S SALARY

CAMPAIGN IS IN FULL SWING FOR BUILDING

About \$25,000 Subscribed on First Day of Active Campaign in the City.

Twenty-five thousand dollars was approximately the amount subscribed yesterday towards the Prince Rupert building scheme. That is one fourth of the distance toward the objective which is in view. It was a successful start for much of the money came from unexpected places. For instance a Japanese restaurant keeper subscribed \$1,000 and there were many others who gave much more than was expected.

The canvassing committee reports that in some cases subscribers are inclined to postpone a decision relative to the amount they will take. They think it should not be necessary for them to have to go over the ground a second time but that everyone should be ready when the committee calls, with the amount of his subscription settled. No person is being paid for the canvassing, and a procrastinating subscriber makes the work doubly hard.

One of the members of the committee in discussing this matter with the News said that if the people here, and the businessmen in particular, could but realize the importance of the building campaign in the present juncture they would back it to the limit of their resources. Those who live here and make their money in the community should be willing to give practical support to the development and progress of the city.

Ice Everywhere Except Here.

When the despatches tell of the ice-bound coast of Newfoundland where the ice floes prevent ships approaching the coast the sunshine and balmy breezes of Prince Rupert are particularly enjoyable. At some of the Alaskan points we read that the ice is breaking up. Everywhere there seems to be ice except here!

Work Commencing at Shipbuilding Plant.

The announcement which was made yesterday by officials of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. to the effect that work on the plant had actually commenced and that the contracts had been let for grading the slips is an indication that no time is being lost and that the city will become busier every day. It will be an additional impetus to the building campaign which is being carried on with vigor and is meeting with much success.

Present Government Not Satisfactory.

There seems to have been some idea that the Daily News in objecting to Bolshevism was satisfied with the present form of government. There was no such intimation. There are improvements to be made in our methods of government, undoubtedly. We are a long way from perfect but evolution and revolution are two entirely different things. If the industrious and the clever are to be supplanted by those who have no ability to improve their condition here but who want to control by sheer force of numbers and restrain those who have ambitions, if they aim to do this by a process of confiscation, The News is opposed to their policy. It is dangerous and liable to lead to trouble.

Chances of Bolshevism On This Continent.

As so much interest is taken in the matter of Bolshevism just now and in view of the fact that some are advocating extreme measures in dealing with agitators, we take liberty in again quoting from the article by Steinmiz in the American Magazine for April:

"The chances of Bolshevism in this or any country are a plain matter of figures. Wherever a majority of the people is discouraged and hopeless under its present conditions, Bolshevism—or a revolution of some sort—will find receptive soil and may succeed. Where the majority is reasonably comfortable and believes that evolution is constantly lifting the people as a whole to a higher level of living, it cannot succeed.

"As to the first point, the great mass of Americans is living under fair conditions. I do not mean that these conditions could not be much better. They should be made better. But they might be much worse than they are.

"People here are free to express their will. If they make mistakes in doing so, the remedy is always in their own hands. Our form of government is uneconomical and inefficient, to be sure. But it is not class government. Everyone suffers alike from its shortcomings; so there is no reason why one class more than another should try to change it by a sharp upheaval.

"And we undoubtedly are working toward something better. The leaders of thought—I do not mean political leaders, but thoughtful men in all walks of life—are gradually working out ideas for a better conduct of the nation's interests. I believe that labor as a whole realizes this. In fact, labor is taking its own part in it."

DOLLY VARDEN RAILWAY IN LEGISLATURE

Creditors of Taylor Engineering Co. Win Out—Will Probably Be Settled Soon.

What developed into a somewhat celebrated fight closed on Friday afternoon when the Dolly Varden Mines Railway Act Amendment Act was given its third reading. The whole dispute between the Dolly Varden Co. and the Taylor Engineering Co. had been referred to a select committee of the House. The Committee's report received the approval of the Legislature, without a dissenting voice, as did the bill which the committee recommended.

Charge on Property.

In brief, the bill which was passed has the effect of charging not only the railway, but all the property of the Dolly Varden Mines Co. in British Columbia, including the Dolly Varden and Wolf Groups, with the payment of the cost of the construction of the Railway.

An existing mortgage in favor of the Goldfield Consolidated Mines Co. for \$150,000 and a charge in favor of Donald W. Cameron for a balance due him in connection with the Wolf Group comes first. After that comes a charge in favor of the creditors of the Taylor Engineering Co.

Will Appoint Judge.

In the event of the parties not being able to agree on the actual amounts due each of them, the Minister of Railways (Premier Oliver) will immediately appoint one of the Judges of the Supreme Court to ascertain the cost of the constructions of the Railway and the amount invested by the Dolly Varden Mines Co.

The Judge is to report with every speed possible and within fourteen days after his report the Dolly Varden Co. must pay all the laborers' wages or the property passes out of their control.

Pay Off Creditors.

It is understood that the Temiskaming Mining Co. of Ontario are likely to take over the property and pay off the Taylor creditors. If they will not do so, another concern, not now operating in British Columbia, are prepared to take over the property. It would seem reasonably certain now that the workmen will be paid with very little further delay and the property will probably again be operating this year.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

USEFUL WORK OF THE SESSION

Alex. Manson, M. P. P., Tells of Some Legislation Passed at Victoria Recently.

At the request of the Daily News Alex. M. Manson, M. P. P., has given a further synopsis of some of the work done at the session of the Legislature just concluded. Asked as to what part he himself had taken in the legislative work, Mr. Manson did not care to say much except to mention that he was responsible for the Administration Act which put women on the same footing with men in connection with personal property. Next year Mr. Manson thinks there will be an up-to-date bill governing the devolution of real property.

The Legislature also went on record for the extension of the dower right to women and there will be an extension of the Dower Act at an early date.

Legislation was passed to make the redemption period in the case of the sale of lands at tax sales in unorganized districts one year instead of two. This will aid somewhat in bringing the lands into speedier occupation.

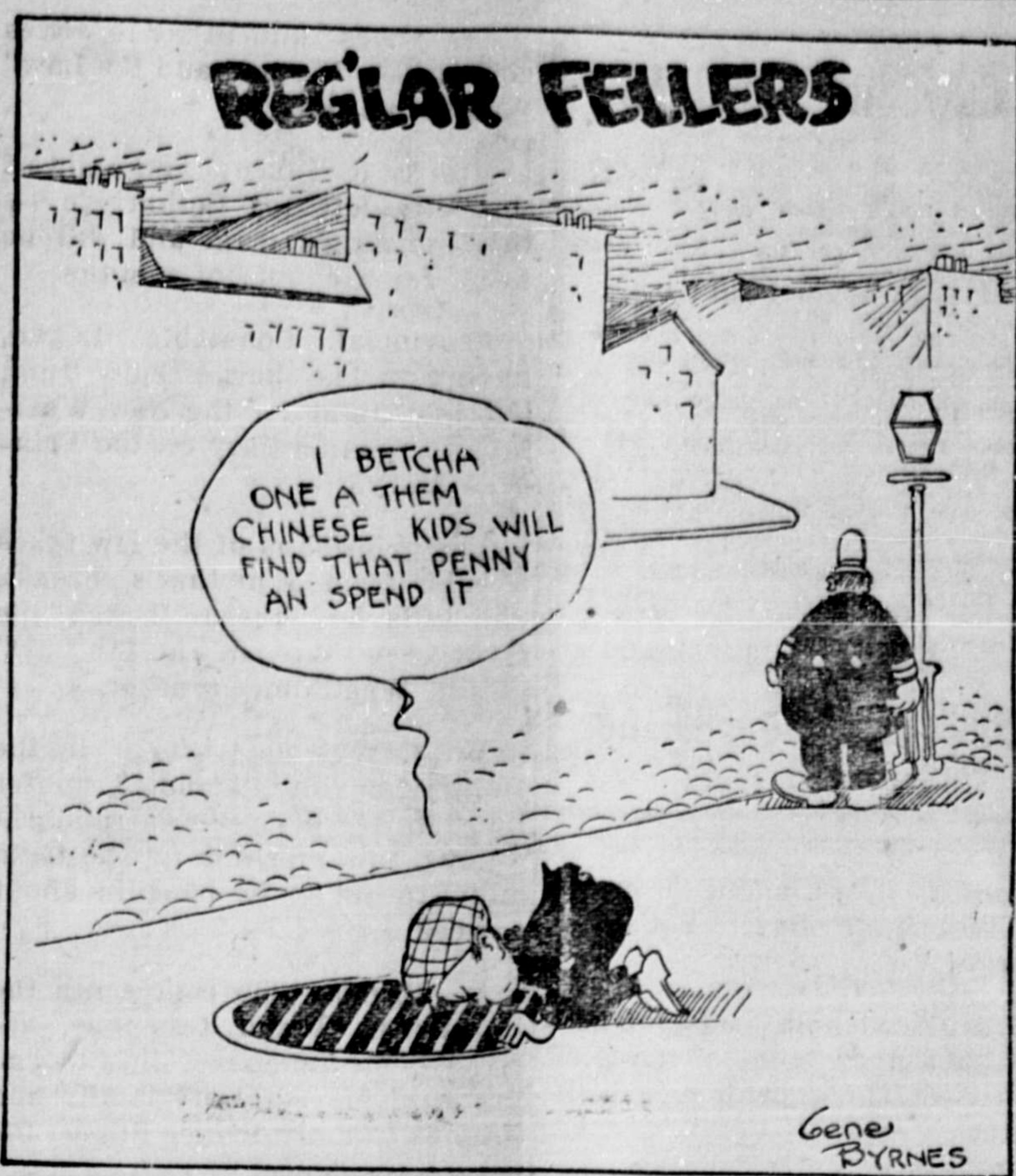
Public Utilities. The Public Utilities Act, while not of particular interest to the northerly districts, is important legislation. The most pressing problems for the commission to deal with is that of transportation in the larger cities to the south. The constant strikes and uncertain rates have resulted in much loss and inconvenience to the public. It will be the duty of the commission to fix fair and equitable rates for all the public service corporations and it is possible that smelters may ultimately be brought within the purview of the bill.

The Minister of Mines introduced legislation directed toward the establishment of an iron industry and enabling the Government to take iron ores not in excess of ten thousand tons from different properties for experimental purposes.

Minimum Wage. The Minister of Mines also introduced legislation establishing a board for fixing a minimum wage in the coal mines of the province and it is quite probable its immediate effect will be to eliminate Orientals from the coal mining industry.

Public Works. In the Public Works Department, in addition to the usual appropriations there was a special million and a half voted for provincial works. It was felt that after the policy of retrenchment during the war and in view of the grave problems connected with the returned citizens, it was time to undertake a liberal policy in connection with the public works. The special appropriation is to enable the Government to carry on necessary work and to provide employment for a goodly number of returned men, thus taking them away from the centres of population.

Local Member. The minister from this city maintained his reputation this session as one of the hardest working of ministers. Every member of the House appreciated the expeditious manner of handling the legislation he introduced. The irrigation policy which he inaugurated a year or two ago was supplemented by further legislation and appropriations this year. Even opposition members
