JOINT CONTROL OF INDUSTRY BY CAPITAL AND LABOR SUBJECT OF INVESTIGATION BY COMMISSION

Hon. Gideon Robertson, Minister of Labor, Announces Five or Seven Men will be Appointed at once to Report on Feasibility of Government Scheme.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, April 3.—The appointment of a commission of five men, commanding the complete confidence of the labor and capital, to proceed to all the centres of the Dominion, to survey the situation and ascertain facts and report to the Government before May 15 upon the feasibility of the joint control and operation of certain industries capital and labor, was the announcement made to the Senate by Hon. Gideon Robertson, Minister of Labor.
The Government felt what was required was not so much the settlement of disputes and strikes, but the prevention. The policy of the Labor Department was to work in this direction.
Last year there was a conference of labor and capital, and a conference meeting together and surveying all the difficulties and accepted twelve principles upon which employers and employees could agree. Out of it had come wide acceptance of the Whitney and Rockefeller plans for industrial councils, which meant giving to labor a voice in the control and management of industries.

SKEENA CLUB AGAIN BEFORE MAGISTRATE

Evidence of Gambling Given by
Police Constable Before
Major McMullin.

The Skeena Club case was brought up again this morning before Magistrate McMullin in the police court, with L. W. Patmore acting as defendant. After hearing evidence for the prosecution the case was adjourned.

Constable Duff's evidence was as follows:

"On the evening of March 25, I entered the premises known as the Skeena Club and found about fourteen players engaged in stud and draw poker. I saw one player who was taking part in the stud game purchase \$15 worth of chips. The dealer took the money and handed it to Vic. Caruso who acts as manager, who in turn gave the dealer chips to that value. I also noticed one player engaged in the draw game purchase \$5 worth of chips and as the game progressed I saw the dealer in the stud game rake off three red chips, equivalent to 75c, and the dealer in the draw game rake off two red chips valued at 50c.

Saw Rakeoff.
"I returned to the place shortly after 9:15 p. m. and again noticed the dealer engaged in the stud game rake off chips to the value of 75c. I left and again returned about 10:15 p. m. and noticed the same thing going on.

"I left the premises again and this time returned at about 10:40 p. m. with Constables Bailey, Adams and McGlinchey.

"I made signs for the other constables to enter, upon which I stated to the inmates of the room that I had a warrant for their arrest. I then proceeded to gather up the chips and cards used in the stud game, while Constable Bailey attended to the draw game.

Settled with Players.

"On commencing to gather up the chips, D. Zarelli (the accused) came up to me and requested me not to mix the chips until he had settled with the players. I granted him his wish whereupon he straightway proceeded to pay them cash for the chips they held. Four tables were in the place, but only two were being used at the time.

Constable Adams.
Constable Adams was then asked to give his evidence in the case which was that he held one of the inside doors and stated that he saw eight men engaged in the game of stud poker and nine men playing the game of draw poker. The rest of his evidence tallied with Constable Duff's.

Constable Bailey.
The evidence of Constable Bailey was the same, except he added that D. Zarelli was in charge of the place and when absent it was looked after by Vic. Caruso.

Constable McGlinchey.
Constable McGlinchey stated that he took one of the doors as his post and counted about thirty men standing on the floor. The case was adjourned by his worship until tomorrow morning.

ARCHBISHOPS AND PRIESTS ARE BUTCHERED

Atrocities of Bolsheviks at Perm
Recounted by Siberian Min-
ister of Justice.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, April 3.—The Siberian Minister of Justice detailing the atrocities by Bolsheviks prior to the evacuation of Perm, said the Archbishop of Andronique was buried alive, Archbishop of Tchernigoff was killed, Bishop Theophanus, after great tortures, was drowned by successive immersions in a hole made in the ice.

The official list contains the names of fifty priests butchered at Perm.

NEW OUTBREAK IN BERLIN IS AVERTED

General Strike Stopped by Re-
lease of Radical Agitator,
Daumig.

Berlin, April 13.—A new general strike and political outbreak has been temporarily averted through the release of the radical agitator, Daumig. It is still smouldering today. The Government is preparing to use every force to crush the demonstrations.

Frankfurt is quiet again. The strike at Essen and in Rhur district is less threatening. The situation in Stuttgart is still critical.

CHINESE EDITOR IS COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, April 3.—Chen Sue Yen, a prominent Chinese resident of Victoria and editor of the New Republic, was formally committed for trial by Magistrate Shaw on a charge under the War Emergencies Act, of being a member of an unlawful organization, The Chinese Nationalist League, which is under the ban of the Federal authorities. He is allowed until Friday to furnish bail bonds. Five other Chinese are held under the same charge.

THIRTEEN BOATS WAITING FOR SALE

Halibut and Salmon to be Marketed
Tomorrow — Thirteen
Catches in All.

The fish catches ready for tomorrow's buy are as follows: The Vienna with 5,000 lbs; N. Cape 6,000 lbs; Navigator 6,000; Seattle 45,000 lbs; Star 10,500; Lenor 8,000; Arctic 19,000; Atli 7,000 and the Molly May 5,000 lbs. of halibut.

Salmon Catches.
Four salmon catches are in port today, the Pug with 10 lbs. of reds and 25 lbs. of whites; the Cub 225 lbs. of reds and 100 lbs. of whites; the Karl 350 lbs. reds and 150 whites, and the St. Eloi with 700 lbs. of reds and 300 lbs. of white salmon, totaling 1,950 lbs. of salmon, which will be sold tomorrow together with the halibut.

GOVERNMENT POSITION ON RAILWAY SITUATION, WHICH INVOLVES THE LOCAL LINE

WHILE OTTAWA WILL NOT REcede FROM STAND RE-
GARDING RESPONSIBILITY, DISPOSITION IS
TO BE GENEROUS TO THE
COMPANY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, April 3.—The discussion on the railway question continues. On the Government side it is urged that the inception of the railway enterprises, the guaranteeing of which brings the Grand Trunk Railway to its present position, originated with the railways themselves.

When Sir Wm. McKenzie first approached the Grand Trunk Railway with a proposal for linking up the Canadian Northern Railway in the west with the Grand Trunk lines in the east, the meeting point to be North Bay, the Grand Trunk Company was only willing to conclude such an arrangement on terms which practically gave it the control of the whole situation. As Sir William was not willing to do this, the Grand Trunk decided to invade the west itself, and the Canadian Northern, for its part, started eastward to get the eastern terminals it felt to be necessary to complete its line.

Will Be Generous.
The Government will not recede from the former position of holding the Grand Trunk responsible for the guarantees of the Grand Trunk Pacific issues and it is understood that the offer made last July is still open. The Government is disposed to be generous on the ground that the Grand Trunk Railway has done great service to eastern Canada since it was built and partly because the directors of the company have made the English shareholders believe that the Government had been treating them in a very hard and harsh manner. As Canada will have to borrow frequently from London in future, it is not desired to leave any ground for such impression.

BAIL ALLOWED FOR HAYWOOD AND OTHERS

Sum Required is \$274,000 to
Cover Thirty-six I. W. W.
Leaders.

Chicago, April 3.—Attorneys Clarence Darrow and George F. Vandever today endeavored to obtain \$274,000 bail necessary for the release of "Big Bill" Haywood and thirty-six other I. W. W. leaders now serving terms in Leavenworth Federal prison. The men were ordered bail pending the hearing of the appeal by the United States District Court of Appeals.

TWO FAMOUS ADMIRALS ARE NOW PROMOTED

Both Jellicoe and Beatty Made
"Admirals of the Fleet" in
Recognition of Services.

London, April 3.—The promotion of Admiral Viscount John Jellicoe and Vice Admiral Sir David Beatty to be "Admirals of the Fleet" in recognition of their distinguished war services, is announced. Jellicoe was created Viscount Jellicoe of Scapa, a year ago. He served as commander of the Grand Fleet during the early part of the war, also as First Sea Lord and Chief of Naval Staff. Beatty succeeded Jellicoe in command of the Grand Fleet.

Angling is Sport With Possibilities.

Judging from all that is heard here, it is very evident that enough is not made of the fishing privileges of the district. The few pet streams where big baskets can be secured are the drawing cards where a few anglers go once or twice a year. To the man or woman who loves being outdoors that is a mere nothing. The smaller streams and lakes or the ones that are not so noted as basket fillers provide for these at more accessible points, and there is no reason why they should not be frequented a good deal.

There is really better sport in fishing where the trout are a little shy. There is skill in luring the big fellow who sulks or who carries off the bait without getting caught. The true angler will fish all day if he gets an occasional nibble.

Many anglers scorn to use any lure but the fly, and these are carefully studied and changed as the seasons change. To catch a trout with a fly is far better fun than pulling him out from the depths after he has swallowed some beef or worms. Everyone to his trade, however. The bait fisherman and the angler who uses a fly are usually two different species. Those who prefer a breakfast of trout to a day's fly casting, often without much result, dig worms or frequent the butcher shop just before the outing. There is good fun and healthy recreation to be had either way.

Public Library May Be Secured.

There has been a good deal of talk about establishing a public library in Prince Rupert. At the recent session of the Legislature a Library Act was passed which makes a public library possible in every municipality. The following three clauses of the bill will give the method to be adopted in connection with the organization of an institution of that kind:

"Upon receipt of a petition in the Form No. 2 in the Schedule, signed in the case of a city municipality having a population of over five thousand by at least one hundred electors, and in the case of a city municipality having a population of less than five thousand by at least fifty electors, and in the case of a district municipality by at least twenty-five electors, the Municipal Council shall pass a by-law for the establishment of a municipal public library in the Form No. 3 in the Schedule, and submit the same for the assent of the electors at the next election held in the municipality for any other purpose.

"On the taking effect of such by-law, the Municipal Council may establish, equip, and maintain a public library, or maintain and support any public library already established, or enter into an agreement for library service as provided in section 37 of this Act; and may annually levy and cause to be collected as part of the general municipal taxes an amount to provide a library fund, which fund shall be kept separate from the other money of the city, and shall be used exclusively to establish, equip, maintain, and support such library. The moneys standing at the credit of the library fund so provided shall be paid over from time to time, upon the order of the Library Board, by the treasurer of the municipality.

"For the government of such library, a Public Library Board of five members shall be appointed, and shall have charge of the management, regulation, and control of the library. The Board shall be composed of the mayor or reeve of the municipality, or a member of the Municipal Council designated by the mayor or reeve, and four other persons appointed by the Municipal Council, chosen from the citizens of the municipality with reference to their fitness for such office."

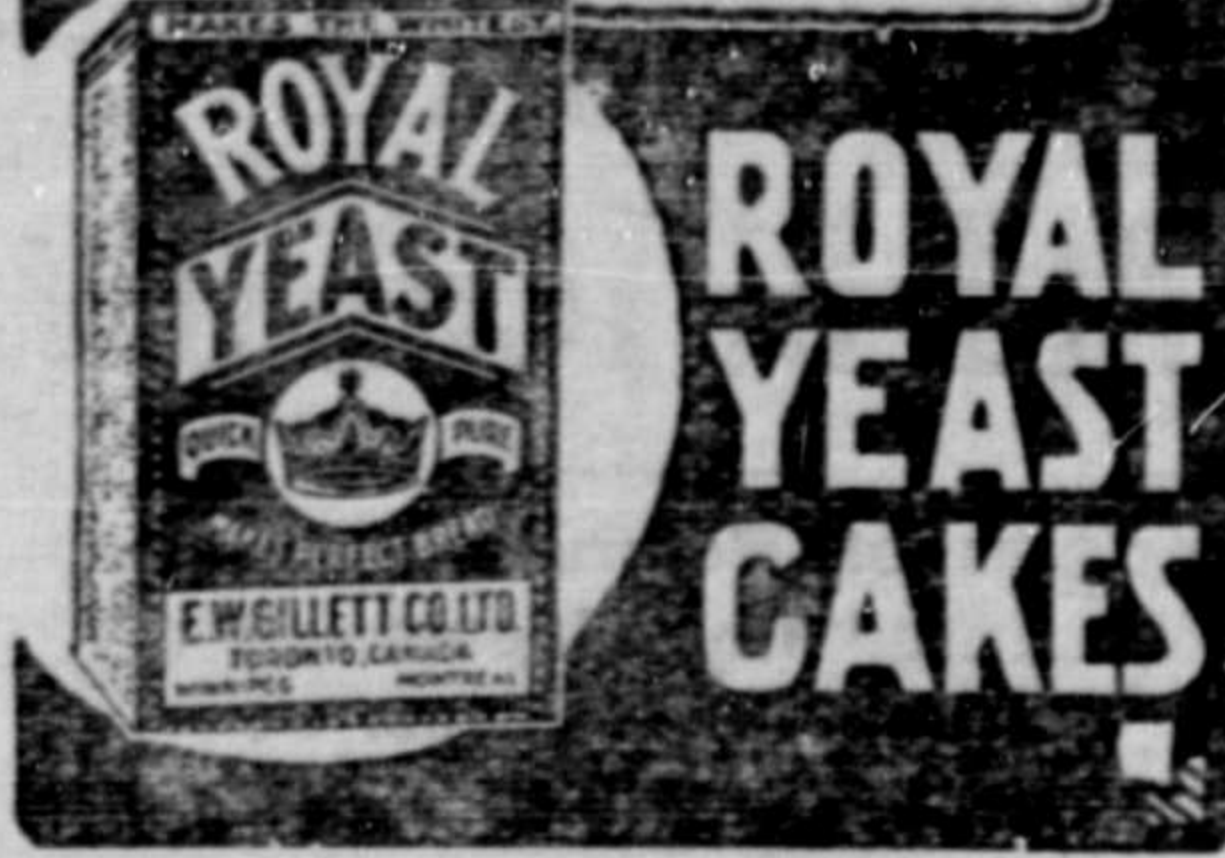

ROD AND GUN CLUB ELECTS NEW OFFICERS

Accommodation to be Provided at Lakes Up River for Members of Organization.

Active steps to improve the conditions for fishing at Khtada Lake and Mile 21 are to be taken by members of the Rod and Gun Club. That was decided at the annual meeting of the club last night when officers for the year were elected and an active campaign for membership arranged.

The hunting season last year had been interfered with a good deal by the attack of flu. All their good intentions had been set aside at the time of the epidemic.

A suggestion was made that there should be an effort to stock one of the local lakes with rainbow trout. This, however, was left in abeyance.

There was a good deal of swapping stories and recounting of experiences, especially in connection with fishing, after which the meeting adjourned, leaving the working out of the suggestions to the new executive who will meet in the near future and lay plans for the season and arrange for an active canvass for members.

DRYDOCK FOR ESQUIMALT

Definite Assurance Said to Have Been Given Island Members By Government.

That Dr. Tolmie and J. C. McIntosh, Federal members, have definite assurance from the Dominion Government that it will build the drydock at Esquimalt, is the message brought to Victoria by H. A. Morley, who has just returned from Ottawa, where he has been on private business. Mr. Morley spent a week with the two Island members, and when he left for home he asked if they had anything to tell their constituents. It was then that they told Mr. Morley that money for the drydock to be built at Esquimalt would be passed in the supplementary estimates before the session at Ottawa closes.

The Government does not yet know whether the dock will be built this year or next, it depending upon the acuteness of the labor situation.

Mr. Morley says that both Dr. Tolmie and Mr. McIntosh are working hard in the interests of the Island. He speaks of the unreasonableness of some people who wire to the members and expect replies right away.

LOCAL MEMBER AT EMPRESS THEATRE

"There was a time when we dreamed great dreams of the wonderful things that were to take place in Prince Rupert. Now one of these dreams is about to become an actual fact and it is our duty to see that it is a success." That was the line of talk put up by Alex. Manson, M. P., last night at the Empress Theatre during a short intermission.

"To make the most of the present opportunities," continued the speaker, "we must provide houses for the workers, not only to make the men who come contented but to encourage them to bring their wives and families here and make permanent homes."

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record improvements will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown, of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction. \$2,500,000 FOR CIVIL SERVANTS EXTRA BONUS

Interesting Business of House of Commons — Is Canada at War With Russia?

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 Ottawa, April 3.—Government business, including the voting of supply, occupied the attention of Parliament yesterday. The estimates and the department of external affairs taken up. Hon. N. W. Rowell in connection with these votes, dealt at considerable length with questions relating to the activities of the Imperial War Cabinet and Imperial War Conference.

Mr. Rowell was unable to confirm the report that the French Government had donated Vimy Ridge to Canada, but said that the French Government had donated in perpetuity the land in which Canadians were buried. **Siberian Forces.**

Rowell explained that Canada had agreed to send forces to Siberia at the request of the British Government. After it had been decided that it was not possible for the Dominion to place a fifth division in the field.

There was quite a breeze late in the evening, when Major Power of Quebec wanted to know if Canada was at war with Russia, a question Mr. Rowell did not undertake to answer.

Civil Service.
 A supplementary estimate tabled by Sir Thomas White, without mention being made of the amount, was for the sum of \$2,500,000 to extend the bonus granted to civil servants last year over the months of April, May and June.

A return tabled in Parliament shows that since the passing of the Civil Service Act in 1918, 1,672 permanent employees and 14,570 temporary employees were appointed by the Civil Service Commission. Of the appointments made 1,834 were returned soldiers.

ASK CHANGE OPEN SEASON FOR DEER, GEESSE AND DUCKS

Rod and Gun Club passes Resolution With View to Action Being Taken.

At the meeting of the Rod and Gun Club held in the court house last evening with President D. C. Stuart in the chair, it was decided to recommend to the attorney-general that the open season for deer in this district should commence September 1; for geese, September 15, and for ducks, October 1. These dates are earlier than those at present in force.

It was pointed out that in this district the best hunting for deer is early in the season before the woods get very wet. The geese arrive in September and are all gone in November. On the other hand ducks are often at their best just before Christmas.

The resolution will be forwarded to the attorney-general at once with a view to securing action this year.

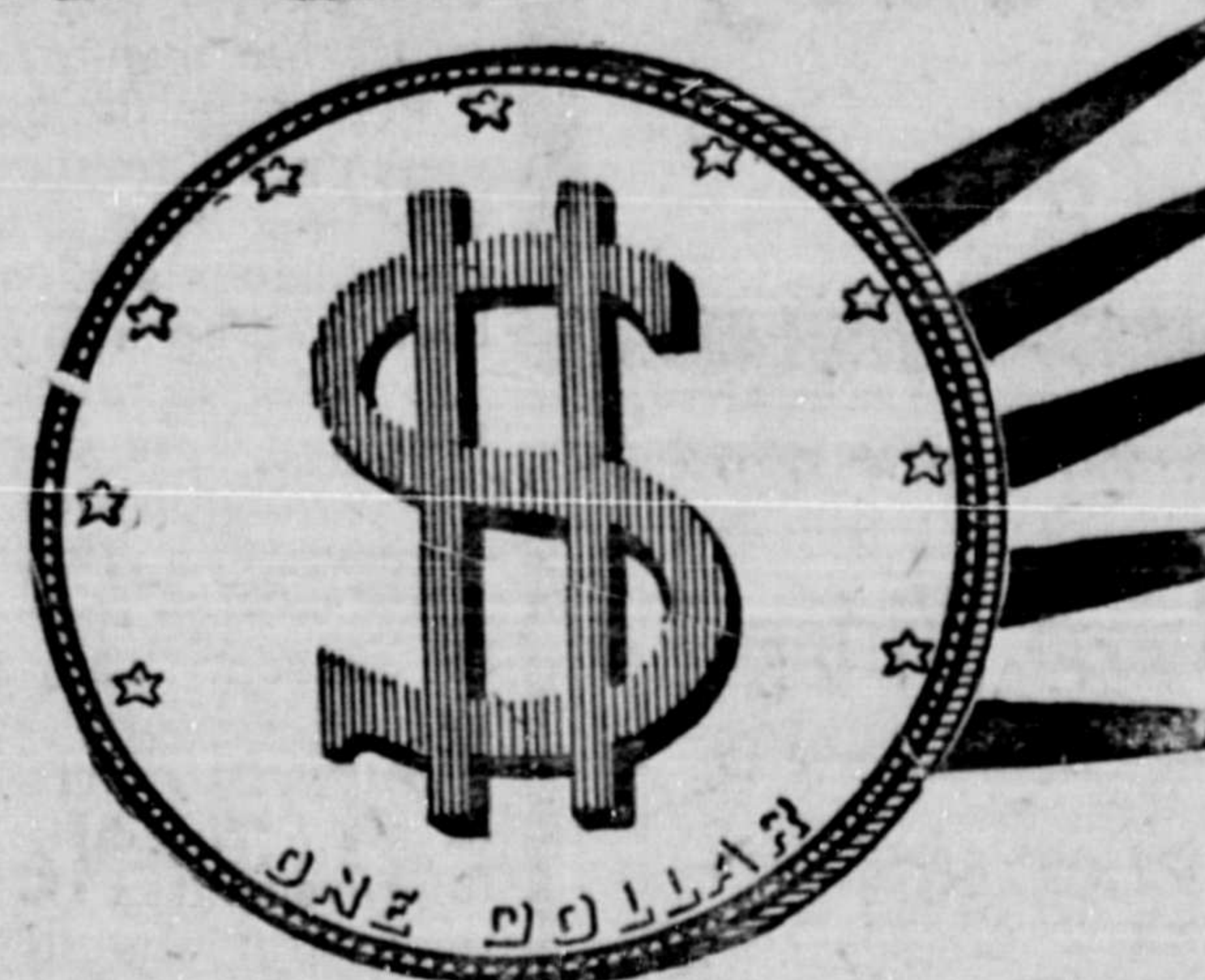

TIMBER TRADE OF PROVINCE

Annual Report Tabled by Hon. T. D. Pattullo Shows Immense Business Done During 1918.

Victoria, April 2.—As was to be expected, the annual report of the forest branch of the department of lands for the year 1918 is an interesting document. It covers a period in the history of the province when the forest wealth was called upon to play a far greater part in war than could have been thought possible a quarter of a century ago. While much of the business came within this emergency category the eastern Canada market sold strong throughout the year. It is estimated that over 150,000,000 feet of lumber, lath and dimension was shipped during 1918.

This constitutes a record and when compared with the 40,000,000 to 50,000,000 feet volume of pre-war business is eminently satisfactory.

Demand for Spruce.

As already mentioned the year 1918 British Columbia timber has been most prominent in connection with the war and in the report tabled in the legislature by the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, the interesting story is set out. It tells of the rapid development of the Royal Air Force and the ever-increasing demand for aeroplane spruce.

First of all there was the order-in-council for January, 1918, and the ratifying bill at the session of the legislature which followed in the spring. These measures removed all the red tape in connection with timber sale and made possible the rapid recovery of the much-needed timber in huge quantities.

Big Values.

Included in the report is a tabulated statement giving estimated value of production for year for all grades of lumber as compared with the figures for the three preceding years. Those show that in 1918 the value reached \$54,162,523; in 1917, \$48,300,469; in 1916, \$35,528,000; in 1915, \$29,150,000. Waterborne export of lumber from British Columbia during 1918 shows a large increase over 1917. The 1918 figures are 88,069,029 feet board measurement; in 1917, 43,922,563; in 1916, 43,676,523.

WOULD HAVE BEEN BOMBED

Preparations Had Been Made for Air Raid on Berlin When Armistice Signed.

Ottawa, April 3.—That preparations for the first great air raid on Berlin had been completed just before the armistice was declared and that had not hostilities ceased when they did a great squadron of high-powered planes, led by Major Mulock, of Winnipeg, would have bombed the heart of Germany, was a statement made by Mr. Rowell, president of the Council in the Commons. His authority for the statement was Lord Weir, British Air Minister, and that a declaration had been made to the Imperial War Cabinet in 1918.

Lord Weir stated that if the war had lasted another year every city and town in Germany would have been bombed out of existence.

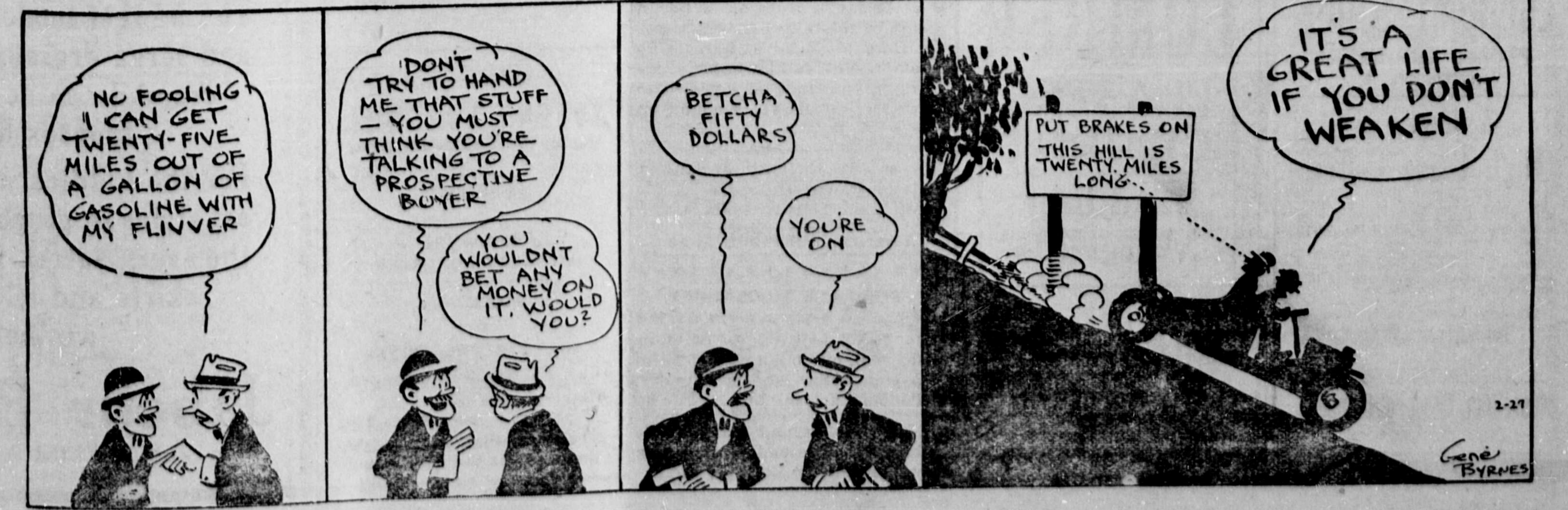

CLIMBED A TREE TO PULL DOWN PANTHER

It is an Otter Point episode.

It was now quite dark in the woods, and as Mr. Burke happened to have an electric torch with him he directed the rays of this on the panther. Guided by the green eyes, Mr. Vogel fired several times, the animal never making a sound. The hunters then decided the panther was dead but he was lying on two branches. So Mr. Vogel announced that he was going up to get his victim. He climbed by the rays of the torch. The panther did not notice him. His interest lay afar in another world. He happened to be dead.
