## G.T.P. Probably Nationalized

### SIR THOMAS WHITE SAYS EXPECTS GOVERNMENT WILL TAKE OVER GRAND TRUNK

NO AGREEMENT ADMINISTRATION MAY RESORT TO  
FORECLOSURE—NEGOTIATIONS NOW GOING ON  
WITH COMPANY, HOWARD KELLY  
REPRESENTING RAILWAY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, April 4.—Sir Thomas White, Acting Premier, stated in the House last night that Howard Kelly, president of the Grand Trunk, has reopened negotiations with the Government for the purchase of the Grand Trunk Railway.  
That acquisition by the Government of the Grand Trunk Railway will probably be the outcome of the present railway situation, the statement made by Sir Thomas White when the bill affirming the appointment of a receiver for the Grand Trunk was being considered in committee. Sir Thomas said he did not make a statement definitely and suggested as possible alternatives that the Government might resort to a suit for foreclosure.

**Regrets Foreclosure.**  
Criticism of the Government by Sir Thomas Vren, who regretted that the order in council appointing a receiver had been issued before the Government had cleared its railway policy.  
Sir Thomas White explained under the receivership, the Government will not pay the interest guaranteed by the provisos. The Government would only be enough to operate the line. Sir Thomas denied that action of the Government had hurt the credit of Canada.

### WOODEN STEAMERS ARE SOLD TO THE FRENCH

All Were Built in British Columbia and Transferred on Arrival in England.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Victoria, April 4.—Eight of the 27 wooden steamers built to the order of the Imperial Munitions Board since their arrival in the United Kingdom have been sold to the French Government. They are the War Yukon, War Nootka, War Songhee, War Puget, War Selkirk, War Cariboo, War Comox and War Masset.  
The War Squash has left port on her maiden voyage to the United Kingdom.

### JAPAN HAS IMMENSE MERCHANT TONNAGE

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Tokio, April 4.—An official census just completed shows that at the end of 1918 Japan's merchant marine as registered at home ports was 2,641 vessels with the combined gross tonnage of 2,210,059 tons exclusive of smaller craft not exceeding twenty tons.  
Besides, seventy-nine vessels were registered at Chosen ports, their combined gross tonnage being 34,879 tons. At Taiwan ports fourteen craft were registered and their gross tonnage amounted to 7,319 tons. Dairen had a bigger commercial fleet, consisting of seventy-one vessels of the combined gross tonnage of 129,168 tons.  
Thus the whole fleet of Japanese merchantmen consists of 2,805 steamships above twenty tons, the gross tonnage of which totals 2,482,325 tons.

Anyox, April 4.—W. A. Williams, superintendent of the Granby Consolidated smelter here, announces officially that the smelter will be blown in tomorrow and work will proceed as before the shut down.  
A number of men have arrived from Vancouver on the last two boats from the south and there were a number of married men who were employed continuously. More men will be required, however.

London, April 4.—The remaining details of the third division having been evacuated from England, the first division will commence embarkation on the Carmania, sailing from Liverpool Saturday.

### WHITE MAN'S CAMP

Nanaimo, April 4.—The price of coal to employees of the Western Fuel Co. has since April 1 been \$4 a ton, an advance from \$2.50, which was the former price.  
This advance was necessary, the announcement stated, owing to the decision of the company to make Nanaimo a white man's camp by replacing Orientals now in the company's employ by white men who, owing to advanced age or injuries, were unable to continue their regular employment underground.

### TRADE UNIONS MAKE DEMANDS ON GOVERNMENT

Congress in England Wants Russian Blockade Raised and Troops Withdrawn.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
London, April 3.—A resolution demanding the withdrawal of all British troops from Russia, the raising of the blockade, withdrawal of the military bill from Parliament and liberation of conscientious objectors, was announced today by the Trade Union Congress. Robert Smillie, leader of the miners, in moving the resolution, declared that the miners would strike for the removal of conscription and the raising of the blockade. Winston Spencer Churchill announced in the House of Commons today that the Government had decided to liberate conscientious objectors who had served two years in prison.

### ZARELLI IS FINED HUNDRED DOLLARS

Thirty-One Frequenters Have to Pay Five Dollars Each For Being Present.

The case against the Skeena Club—evidence in regard to which was heard yesterday before Magistrate McMullin, was concluded this morning. D. Zarelli, president of the club having to pay a fine of \$100 and the members who were present got off with the nominal sum of five dollars each.  
W. E. Williams acted for the prosecution and L. W. Patmore defended.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Trade tonight at 8 in the city hall the committee dealing with the housing scheme will make a complete report to date, and there will be a discussion on the question of the establishment of a trans-Pacific line of steamers between this port and the Orient.

### DEPREDATIONS AND EXCESSES STRUCK HORROR

Rebellion in Egypt Was Organized Movement and the Whole Country Was Afame.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
London, April 4.—A delayed Reuter despatch from Cairo under date of March 24, reviewing the uprising, says that within a short time Egypt was aflame from Alexandria to Assouan. Depredations and excesses recorded struck horror to the heart. Owing to prompt military measures, the disturbances in Cairo and Alexandria were not nearly as serious as elsewhere.

The situation was rendered very difficult by the cutting of the railway and telegraph lines. There seems to be an organization behind the movement. The telegraphs were cut at the most vital points and the railways were destroyed by men evidently knowing the work. Tram railways employees, native lawyers and others ceased working.

The citizens of Seattle built 3,000 houses to accommodate their shipbuilders and influx of population. Can the people of Prince Rupert not raise sufficient money to advance 50 per cent of the cost of 400 houses. If we cannot we lack the proper spirit. #### More Arguments For A Library.

The librarian of the American Library Association and of the Juneau Public Library, Grace W. Bishop, recently made a report on the work. She told of the receipt of a number of educational books in which she said much interest was taken by the people served. To quote from the Alaska Daily Empire:

"It is impossible to estimate the tremendous amount of good the American Library Association has accomplished during the period of the war by supplying reading matter to all the army and navy camps both here and abroad. Supplementing the thousands of books of fiction donated by the people all over the United States they have endeavored to provide technical books on subjects of special interest and value to the enlisted men who were desirous of increasing their knowledge along certain lines.

"There books have been of great assistance to the men who wish to have more knowledge of work that perhaps have had to be taken up on account of war conditions. Vocational lists on 26 different subjects including gas engineers, automobiles, electrical engineering, carpentry, journalism, etc., were sent out to different camps and stations.

"Upon requisition by the men the latest books on these subjects have been sent from the A. L. A. headquarters. Some time ago the librarian of the Juneau Public Library was asked to be the A. L. A. supervisor for the camps in Alaska. There are nine navy and army posts in this district and several hundred books have been obtained for them in this manner."

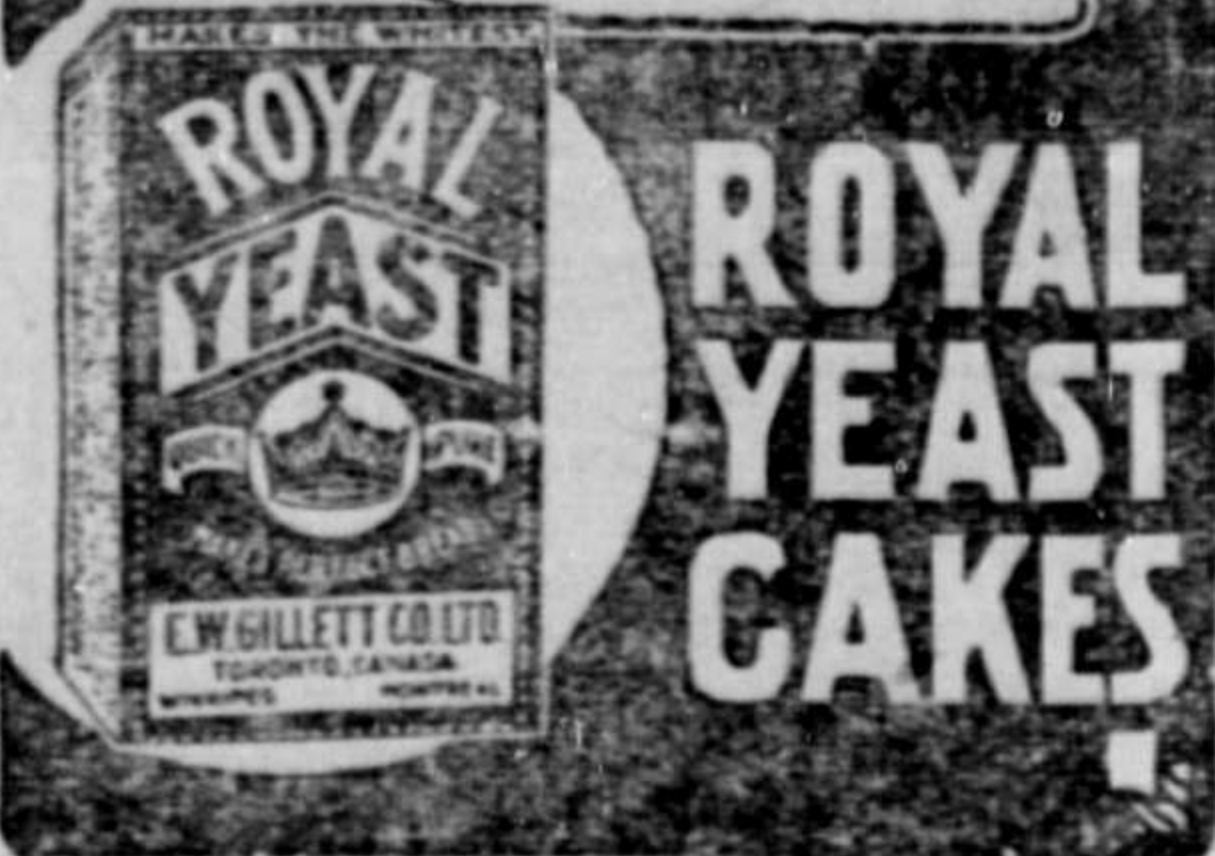

## PRINCE RUPERT

Part of the Second Prize Essay on this city in connection with a contest among the High School pupils, by John Fotos, aged 14.

(About one-third of the essay is omitted through lack of space.)

Before the white man had set foot on Prince Rupert, the Indians that live now across the harbor on their reservation known as Metlakatla had a little village here, but when the officials of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway were looking for a suitable Pacific terminus for the transcontinental railway that was then being built, they chose Prince Rupert.

Prince Rupert is situated in latitude 54 degrees 18 min. north, being on the same latitude as Edinburgh, Christiania and Petrograd, three capitals of Europe, and only forty miles from the Alaskan boundary. The longitude of Prince Rupert is 130 d. 20 m. west, or about three hundred miles due north of Vancouver. The city is built upon the west side of a little island known as Kaien Island.

### Suitable Position.

Before the railway officials had decided that Prince Rupert was to be the Pacific terminus of the G. T. P. Railway, Prince Rupert's proximity to the Orient, to the vast timber lands of Northern and Central British Columbia, its proximity to the mines, to the fishing grounds of the North Pacific were all carefully considered and before the first tree that covered the site was cut down the city was planned. Dynamite, the steam shovel and the woodman's axe had soon cleared and levelled the site and before the first train pulled into Rupert, it was a city with a population of over 6,000 and equipped with light, heat, power, telephone and sewerage systems installed as well as banks, restaurants, trust companies and all kinds of business houses to accommodate the people and to facilitate the commerce of the connecting steel.

### Japanese Current.

The climate of Prince Rupert is very mild. The Japanese current blowing across the Pacific ocean has its effect upon the whole coast of British Columbia and especially the northern portion of the province. The difference in climate is very small. In winter the temperature rarely falls below zero and flowers and vegetables, if left in the gardens, will live throughout the winter. In summer the climate is genial, the hottest weather ranging between 80 and 85 degrees. The westerly winds blowing over this district produce a heavy rainfall, making the annual rainfall of Prince Rupert range between 70 and 80 inches. Reports exaggerate the rainfall of Prince Rupert but these must be stopped at any cost for this is one of the reasons why people who would like to come here avoid coming. If the annual rainfall of Prince Rupert is compared with that of Vancouver, Seattle and Tacoma, it will be found that Prince Rupert compares favorably with the other cities.

### Cosmopolitan City.

The population of Prince Rupert comprises nearly all the nationalities in the world, in fact a more cosmopolitan city of its size cannot be found in any part of the world. Ninety-five per cent of the residents are British born—chiefly Scotch. The people of Prince Rupert are very enterprising as far as the meaning of the word goes, but a little bit more unanimity might be helpful on a few subjects.

The industries of Prince Rupert are yet few; perhaps if the great war did not come Prince Rupert might have been now a city with many industries and a population of over 25,000 people. It is a well known fact that Amsterdam and Copenhagen were said to be "built on herring bones." They formerly were fishing villages. The same thing applies to Prince Rupert for the railway and halibut have made the place. The few industries that we have are fishing, lumbering, canning, mining and shipbuilding.

### Fishing.

The common halibut (hipoglossus vulgaris) is found in huge quantities on the waters of the north Pacific. This fish is the largest among the teleost fishes. The male halibut weighs under fifty pounds and the female several hundred. The halibut grounds extend from off the Coquille river, Oregon, to the Bering Straits, but the best fishing grounds are found from the Hecate Straits to the Shennagin Islands, Alaska, and Prince Rupert is, therefore, the

metropolis of halibut fishing. Dixon Entrance, Hecate Straits and the Queen Charlotte Islands off Prince Rupert harbor are famous fishing grounds.

### Advantage of Position.

By a recent order-in-council American fishermen are allowed to sell their catches to Canadian Ports. To avoid a 500 mile sail to Seattle most of the American owned vessels sell their catches in Prince Rupert and from here they are sent east by the G. T. P. Railway.

Present facilities to accommodate the fishing industry in Prince Rupert consist of a large modern concrete six-story cold storage plant at Seal Cove, which can handle over 7,000 tons of fish. Besides this there are several American and Canadian agencies for buying fish established here.

### Salmon.

The salmon which habitates the fjords and inlets is also found in abundant quantities in the Skeena and Naas Rivers a few miles north and south of Prince Rupert. There are in all about twenty canneries and six cold storage plants on these two rivers which handle the fish; there is also a cannery across the Prince Rupert harbor owned by the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company which has a pack of 40,000 cases of salmon per season. All the fish pass through Prince Rupert on their way to the different destinations.

The heads of the fish which are cut off when brought into port are used in making a fertilizer. This is one of the newest industries that has sprung into life in Prince Rupert. There is a plant at Tucks Inlet six miles from the cold storage plant known as the Fish Fertilizing plant, which uses the heads and makes them into fertilizer.

### Lumber.

The lumber industry is just in its infancy. Now that the war is over and reconstruction will take place all the millions of feet of lumber that cover northern and central British Columbia will surely be needed. During the war there was need for aeroplane spruce to make aeroplanes, but now that the war is over this industry which had flourished on the Queen Charlotte Islands has died out. Prince Rupert will, of course, become the central point of exportation when this lumber industry is started. There is only one saw mill at Seal Cove known as the Prince Rupert Lumber Co. This saw mill can turn out about 100,000 feet of lumber a day when it is working to full capacity. There are about 150 men employed there.

### Mining.

The country north and adjacent to Prince Rupert is also rich in mineral deposits. At Hazelton, 185 miles from Prince Rupert, there is a mine known as the Rocher de Boule. At Telkwa, 290 miles from Prince Rupert, there are rich coal mines and at Granby Bay there are rich copper mines. There are so many mineral deposits that the Marquis of (Continued on Page 5.)

## CONTRACTORS GET EQUIPMENT ON THE GROUND

Two Shipbuilding Slips to be Each 420 Feet Long and 70 Feet Wide.

The contractors for the excavation of the slips where the new ships are to be built are getting the equipment on the ground and will be ready to start almost immediately. A tram line is being constructed to the open water inside the drydock where all the rock that is taken out will be used as filling to increase the available fill space.

Each of the slips will be 420 feet long and 70 feet wide and will slope gently down toward the water at a grade of half an inch to the foot. The whole slip will be below the present level, the lowest point being about 16 feet below grade or at a point where a ship would be waterborne on an eighteen foot tide. No less than 16,000 yards of rock will have to be taken out.

### Other Plant.

The office staff is now working on the plant layout. At least two new buildings will be erected. The most important of these will be a fabricating shop 200 feet long and 80 feet wide, plans for which have already been prepared and a building for the bending furnaces the size and position of which has not yet been decided upon.

In order that these buildings may be placed at convenient points there will have to be a rearrangement of the tracks. The fence is already being moved and the work may now be said to be well in hand and will be pushed forward as speedily as possible.

### Drydock.

At present there are only ships plying between here, Vancouver and Seattle, but before long we shall see trans-Pacific liners calling here.

Next Monday morning the case of J. R. Morgan, Ltd., vs. Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Co., Ltd. is set down for trial before Judge Young in the County Court. The amount of the claim is \$562.27.

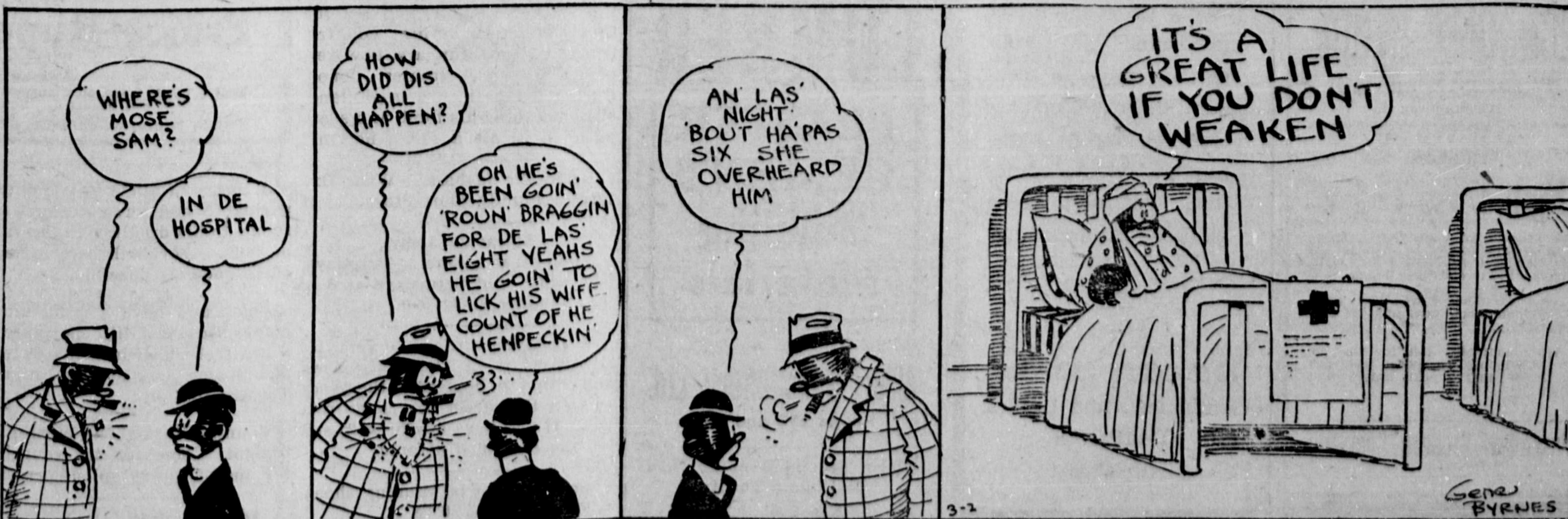

## MUCH FISH IS SOLD AT EXCHANGE TODAY

Several Boats Bring in Salmon, Which Sells at 19c. for Reds and 6c. for Whites.

The fish arrivals this morning were the Seattle with 45,000 lbs., which sold for 13.5 and 7 cents to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company, Ltd.; the Panama with 60,000 lbs. of halibut, to the Booth Fisheries for 14.1c. and 8c. the Orenna, 5,000 lbs. to the Atlin Fisheries, 14c. and 7c.; the Vesta, 11,000; the Neilson, 11,000, and the Minnie V., 3,000 at 14c. and 8c. to the Pacific Fisheries.

The Alliance, 5,000 lbs.; Renell, 3,000, and Tide, 5,000, at 14.3c. and 8c. to the Atlin Fisheries.

The Norma, 3,000 lbs.; Eastern Point, 4,000; Mayflower, 3,000, and Augusta, 11,000 lbs. at 14.3c. and 8c. to the Royal Fish Co., 14.1c. and 7c. to the Atlin Fisheries; 14.2c. and 7c. to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., Ltd., and 14.1c. and 7c. to the Atlin Fisheries respectively. Yesterday's arrivals were also sold at similar prices.

### Salmon Catches.

The salmon were the Stella with 250 reds and 110 whites; the Blue 150 reds and 55 lbs. of whites; Banks, 600 lbs. of reds and 40 lbs. of whites, and the Polar Bear with 2,000 lbs. of reds and 100 lbs. of whites.

The average price received for the salmon catches was 19c. for the reds and 6c. per pound for the whites. Total amount of salmon caught was 3,295 lbs.

## SALTED HERRINGS.

Centuries ago William Buckles, a Hollander of Bierwich, made the then astonishing discovery that salt would preserve fish and that salted fish could be packed and exported. Before his time herrings had to be consumed within a few days of their capture. Buckles salted them in 1386. William Buckles salted his first hundred of herrings, and, having salted them, he packed them in barrels. This exercise of common sense resulted in a singular development of the resources of the country. The English fisheries were not as prominent 500 years ago as they are now and Holland had for a time almost monopoly of a market which she was able to create and supply. Buckle had not to wait 500 years to have his claim to public gratitude recognized. Charles V. had a statue erected to the mackerel salter who became the benefactor of his country. Queen Mary of Hungary, however, paid him even greater honor. During her residence in Holland, she discovered his tomb and seated upon it, ate a salted herring.
