GRAND TRUNK AFFAIRS STILL ARE SIMMERING

Dominion Will No Longer Pay
Interest Guaranteed By
Saskatchewan and
Alberta.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, April 5.—A statement
from Sir Thomas White that the
Dominion would not pay interest
on the Grand Trunk Pacific bonds
guaranteed by the various prov-
inces, develops the statement that
such interest has been paid out
of Federal advances in previous
years. Now, apparently, the Do-
minion authorities have decided
the provinces will have to foot
the bills, according to the Dray-
ton-Ackworth report. G. T. P.
branch lines have outstanding
bonds amounting to \$9,887,808
guaranteed by Saskatchewan and
\$3,589,596 by Alberta, a total of
\$13,469,004 on which \$12,688,544
has been raised.
The provinces could acquire
the branch lines under their
agreement covering the bond
guarantees but such action is not
considered likely.
Particulars of the negotiations
with President Kelly are not given
but it is stated that the new
proposals are not more favorable
than those already offered the
company.

PEACE TREATY NEARLY READY FOR SIGNING

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, April 5.—A Paris cor-
respondent of the Daily Telegraph
states that on the highest author-
ity by next Sunday a complete
agreement will have been reached
by the Council of Four. The
opinion is expressed by respon-
sible British authority that the
peace treaty will be ready for
signing by Wednesday.

IMMENSE BILL FOR SOLDIERS' DEPENDANTS

Germany to Pay to Keep Widows
and Orphans of Those Killed
in War.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, April 5.—Pensions to
disabled soldiers and widows and
orphans are included in the bill
to Germany for repatriation. The
peace conference leaders decided
that such relief to individuals
for losses and sufferings will be a
proper charge under the armis-
tice provisions.
Repatriation of losses to the
civilian population will consti-
tute a very considerable propor-
tion of fifty billion the amount of
the repatriation bill as now approx-
imately estimated. In the case of
Great Britain, the pension bill
will probably constitute the larg-
est item of the total claim. It is
understood that the United States
will not lodge any claim under
this head, the U. S. soldiers being
covered by the United States
soldier insurance system.

ONTARIO TO GIVE WIDOWS MORE CASH

Important Change in Workmen's
Compensation Act in That
Province Increases
Allowance.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Toronto, April 5.—Important
additions to the scope and regu-
lations of the Workmen's Com-
pensation Act are provided in a
bill introduced in the Ontario
legislature by Hon. I. B. Lucas,
Attorney-General.

The principal change is a fifty
per cent increase in the pension
allowed to widows, who are to re-
ceive a minimum of \$30 a month
with an additional \$7.50 for each
child. The allowance was former-
ly \$20 for the widow and \$5
for each child.

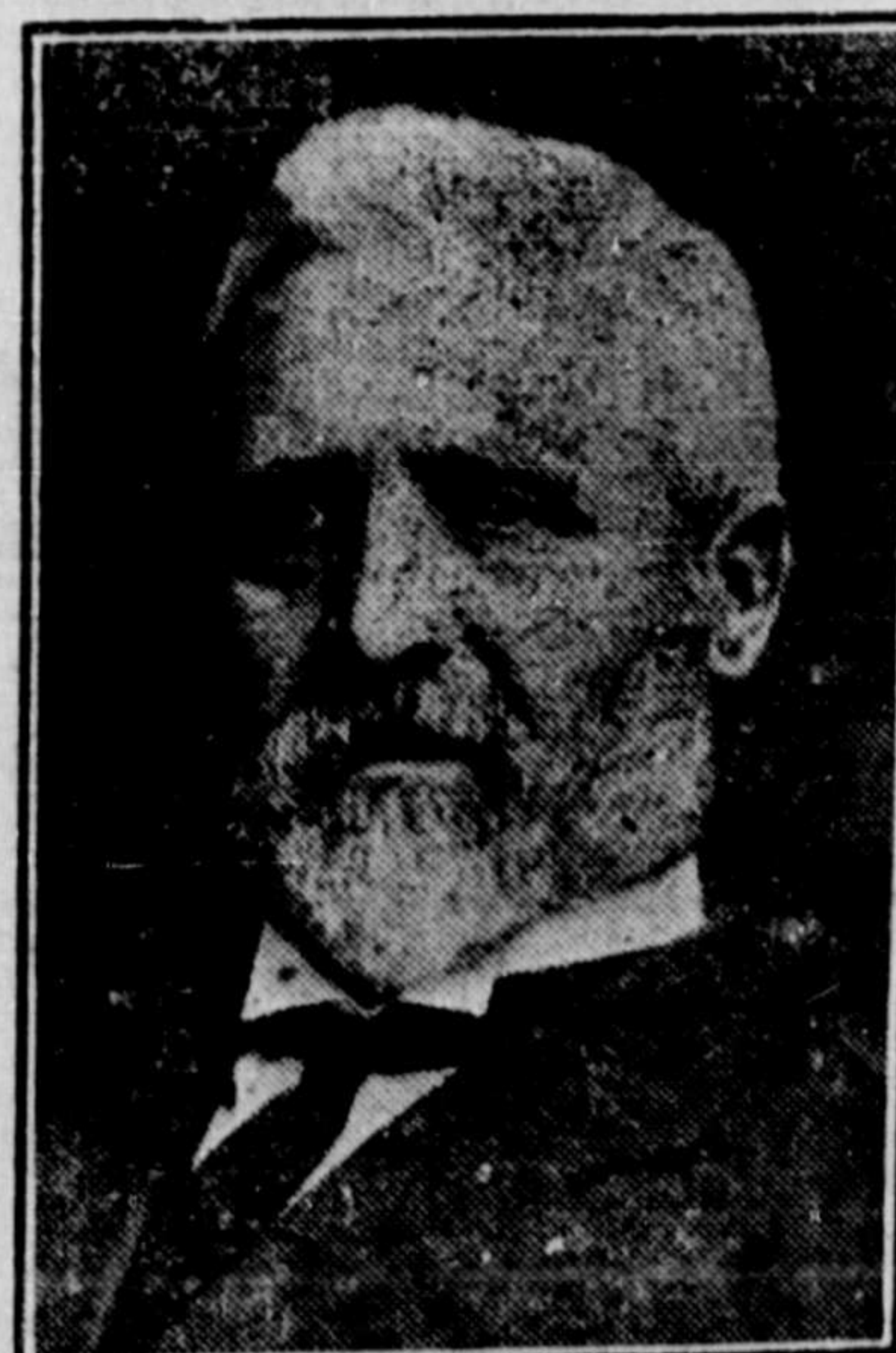


LIQUOR MEN LOSE APPEAL

Court Throws Out Decision of
Chief Justice Hunter on Legal
Technicality.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, April 4.—The court
appeal unanimously quashed the
decision of Chief Justice Hunter
which declared illegal the inquiry
being made before Mr. Justice
Clements on the liquor question.
The Court of Appeal declared
Chief Justice Hunter was not sit-
ting as a court in reviewing the
Clement inquiry and so did not
apply the proper remedy.

The Court of Appeal decided on
this technicality and failed to give
opinion on the merits of the case.
Charles Wilson, K. C., who chal-
lenged the legality of the Clem-
ents inquiry will apply for an in-
junction to prevent a continuance
of the inquiry.

ALLIES UNITE WITH SIBERIANS

Troops Command Murman Rail-
way and Should Be Reinforced
Next May.

London, April 5.—News has
reached London that a detach-
ment of Admiral Kolchak's Sibe-
rian forces have succeeded in
getting in touch with a detach-
ment of the Allied forces in the
neighborhood of Archangel. The
position of the latter is causing
some anxiety. Allied troops com-
mand the Murman Railway and
consequently the western ports
on the White Sea and it is believed
there should be no difficulty in
getting reinforcements there by
the middle of May.
Recent reverses to the Bolshe-
viks have improved the Allied
prospects of holding out.

RE-ENTRY TIME OF CHINESE EXTENDED

Owing to Labor Conditions They
Are Allowed to Remain in
China A Year After
Peace.

Ottawa, April 5.—In view of
conditions of the labor market in
British Columbia, the Govern-
ment has decided to extend the
period of free entry of Chinese
immigrants.

Chinese registered out since
April 1, 1914, and who have
registered out before March 31,
1919, may prolong the period be-
fore return to Canada without in
any way affecting entry, until one
year after a proclamation has
been issued declaring that a state
of war no longer exists. At pres-
ent Chinese are entitled to free
re-entry, but are required to re-
turn within six months after the
signing of peace.

BUDAPEST SOVIET NOT RADICAL ENOUGH

Wing of Communists Break Away;
Situation There Serious
Owing to Food Scarcity.

Vienna, April 5.—A disagree-
ment has occurred in the Soviet
Government in Budapest which
has led to the formation of a still
more radical wing of the com-
munist party.

The situation in Budapest is
declared to be serious owing to
food conditions.

COAL OUTPUT FOR MONTH OF FEBRUARY

Telkwa Comes at Bottom of List
With 236 Tons—Granby
2,891 Tons.

By reason of the fact that the
Crow's Nest Pass mines did not
work more than a dozen days in
February, the output for that
month is naturally not so heavy
in volume as that of January.
Moreover, it must be borne in
mind that the Vancouver Island
mines were two working days
short on account of the short
month. The total tonnage mined
for last month, therefore, is an-
nounced by the Hon. William
Sloan, Minister of Mines, as 195,-
000 tons.

SOLDIERS TAKE EXCEPTION TO W.C.T.U. TAG DAY

WORKMEN ALL RETURN TO THEIR POSITIONS

After Year of Industrial Strike
All Shipyard Workers Have
Reported Back.

HEAVY FINE FOR CONDUCTING STILL

A penalty of \$900 was imposed
on Steve Attilio in the Edmonton
police court Monday morning,
when he pleaded guilty to the
charge of operating an illicit still
at Dominion Park, in the city
suburbs. The court fine consist-
ed of \$400 and an order to pay
\$500, being the double cost of a
license under the inland revenue
act. In default of payment of
these sums the accused will serve
nine months in jail. An order
was also issued for the confisca-
tion to the crown of the distillery
apparatus and the whiskey found
on the accused's premises.

**EDMONTON DISCUSSES
HOUSING QUESTION**

Outline Given of Application of Dominion Government Loans; Scarcity There But Rents Low.

Edmonton, April 4.—At a meeting held here to consider the question of housing it was shown that there was a scarcity of houses but the building societies complained that the rents did not provide a sufficient income to make building profitable and also here were provincial regulations making it difficult for them to collect the principal loaned. That was why the companies refused to loan money in Edmonton.

C. F. Newell outlined the purposes and scope of the housing scheme as inaugurated by the Dominion government, stating that it was intended only to apply to the erection of homes for working men; that the amounts available would range from \$3,000 to \$5,000, depending upon the character of the house erected, that the money would be loaned only to persons who would occupy the building when erected, and that no one earning over \$3,000 would be assisted in this scheme. Certain conditions were set forth before the money would be available, among them being that the province or municipality would set up some uniform scheme which would be followed in all cases where houses were erected under this plan; that the money would be entirely spent for working men's homes, and particularly those for returned soldiers. The loan would be for a 20 year period and it was stipulated that the houses erected under the plan must be modern in every sense, and that the cost of the land should not exceed one-tenth that of the house. Not less than 1,800 square feet of land must be used, though Mr. Newell pointed out that this was apparently ill considered, or an error, because it would mean a lot only 30 by 60 feet which would obviously not be suitable for western conditions.

**CITIES UNITE FOR
PUBLICITY WORK**

As a result of a conference between the publicity commissioners of the two cities, a tentative plan has been drawn up by which Victoria and Vancouver will co-operate in their publicity work. It remains for the executive of the Development Association to endorse the idea.

Commissioner McAdam and J. C. Pendray, president of the Development Association, met Vancouver's commissioner on Friday and several plans were discussed.

An effort will be made to have consolidated advertising of the Georgian Circuit, all the big cities along the route contributing toward the cost. If the money can be raised, suitable maps and literature will be got out and distributed mainly in California.

If the attempt to raise money from the other cities fails, then Vancouver and Victoria will unite their forces and advertise the Circuit. Later on the two cities will co-operate in advertising on the prairies for the winter visitors.

HOUSING SCHEME IS PROGRESSING WELL, ACCORDING TO REPORT

Everything Will Be Handed Over
To the New Directors Tonight
By Preliminary Committee.

A report of the committee which had fathered the housing scheme was made to the Board of Trade last night. Mr. Williams explained that the chief difficulty was in getting canvassers. They had been very successful whenever they had been able to get out after the money. He expected to be able to get the \$100,000 for which they were asking.

President McCaffery said they had already \$35,000 and by Saturday night expected that there would be at least \$45,000 if not more. Then they would hand the affairs over to the new board of directors who would have charge from that time on. He thought this would be the nucleus of a big thing for the city. He expected the co-operation of the ship-building company. It was a sound proposition and he did not see why they should not get the \$100,000 needed.

SOLDIERS' CIVIL RE-ESTABLISHMENT HAS OPENED HERE

The Provincial Government Labor
Bureau Also Will Use Same
Office Under J. M.
Campbell.

Bert Weirmouth of this city has opened an office here in connection with the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Department of the Dominion Government. He will take up officially all questions relating to returned soldiers such placing them in employment or in business. The office is on Second Avenue.

J. M. Campbell who has been appointed by the Provincial Government to open an employment bureau will have Mr. Weirmouth's office for the present. This bureau is in connection with the bureau being opened by all the provinces throughout the Dominion and is designed to keep workers properly informed as to the wages and conditions of labor and the needs at every point.

No permanent arrangements in regard to the employment bureau will be made until J. D. McNiven, Deputy Minister of Labor in the Provincial Government arrives here. He is expected soon and the bureau will then get into permanent quarters. Mr. Campbell is a returned soldier and a member of the Typographical Union and is well and favorably known here where he has lived for a number of years.

MINING TO FORE AT MEETING OF BOARD OF TRADE LAST NIGHT

A letter read at the meeting of the Board of Trade last night from the Free Miners' League asking the Board to help them to secure an assay office here, was referred to the mining committee after being favorably commented on by W. E. Williams and A. C. Garde. The latter suggested that every person buying a license should with the license receive a number of coupons which would enable him to get assays from any government assayer. The proposal had been brought before the Vancouver convention and endorsed unanimously.

Mr. Garde reported on his attendance at the mining convention as a representative of the Board. He told that there were 500 delegates present and that local representatives in addition to himself were George Frizzell, Martin O'Reilly and T. H. Johnson. The report of Geo. Clothier on this mining district was the best report given and attracted wide attention. Mr. Garde also said that he had been given an opportunity to bring the district before the mining men.

A hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Garde was passed by the Board.

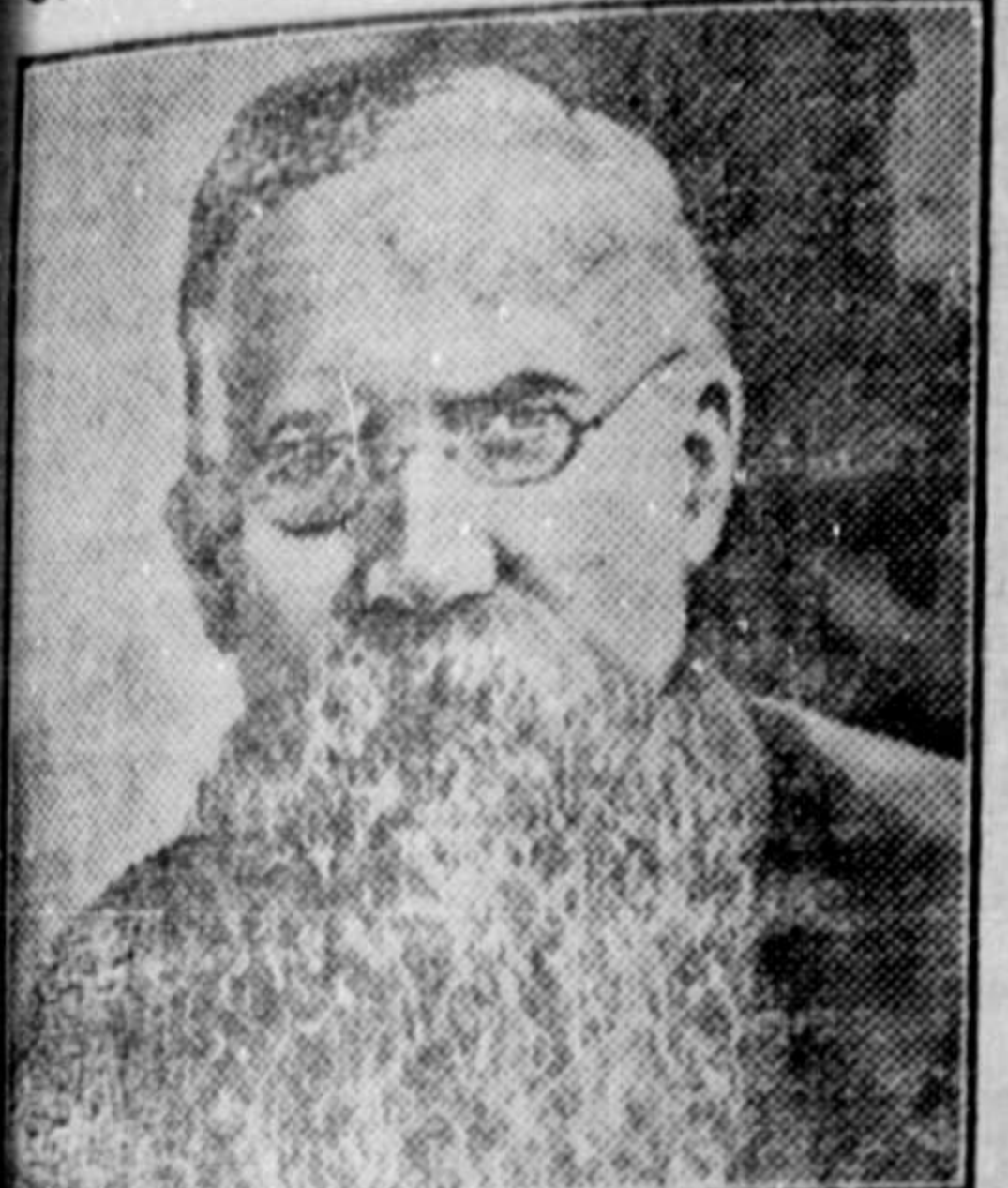
