G.T.P. in Public Eye at London

ENGLISH PAPERS DISCUSS THE GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY AND GOVERNMENT POLICY

FINANCIAL NEWS EXPRESSES OPINION THAT THE GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC WILL YET BE ABLE TO EARN INTEREST ON ITS BONDS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, April 7.—Papers here are still giving prominence to the Grand Trunk controversy. The Times contests several points raised in the Canadian Government's reply, including the statement that Smithers' contention that the present situation was brought about by the war, is wholly unfounded. In this connection it cites the fact that the British railways are being worked at less than the estimated hundred million pounds per year. It, however, welcomes indications that the Government is wishful to approach the question in a conciliatory manner and thinks that with signs of good will on both sides there ought not to be any difficulty in arranging a settlement.

Financial News.

The Financial News says what the Government has to justify its offer to buy the Grand Trunk bonds in terms which will guarantee its liabilities forever to the advantage of Grand Trunk shareholders, whereas in due time the Grand Trunk Pacific is certain to be able to earn interest on bonds without help from guarantees.

Morning Post.

The Morning Post notes that the Canadian Government's tender had no ill effects on Grand Trunk stock quotations, but rather the reverse. It says there was, nevertheless, a disposition in the market to question the Government's statements on some points particularly that regarding the competition of the Canadian Northern, which led in many ways to the Grand Trunk's present difficulties. The paper enlarges on the results of the extensions of the Canadian Northern upon Grand Trunk territory, adding that the result was that neither could be worked on a commercial basis.

Chronicle.

The Daily Chronicle thinks everything depends on what the Government means by the words: "fair and generous," used in its reply. Moreover, the tone prevailing in certain sections of the reply does not indicate any very material change of attitude.

TWO FISHERMEN DROWNED WHEN DORY UPSETS

Walter Warner and A. Hanson of Fishing Schooner Constance Meet With Fatal Accident At Portlock Banks.

Walter Warner and A. Hanson, fishermen on the schooner Constance, were both drowned when their dory upset near Seward, Alaska, on a fishing trip from which the Constance arrived here yesterday. The body of Warner was picked up but no trace could be found of Hanson.

The accident happened on the second day out when fishing off the Portlock Banks near Seward. The sun was shining brightly but the sea was rough. It was the middle of the afternoon and the schooner was making regular rounds of the dories to pick up the catch and see that everything was right.

On reaching the dory which was manned by Warner and Hanson they found it overturned. Warner's body was caught in the gear but he was quite dead. No trace of the other man could be seen, so after cruising around while there was nothing to do but to come away. Fishing was stopped at once and the schooner put into Seward where the body of the unfortunate man was left. Then the boat came on to Prince Rupert, fishing on the way.

Neither Axel Hanson nor Walter Warner of the fishing schooner Constance were very well known in Prince Rupert, but Warner was a shipmate with Harry Meagher, secretary of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union here, seven years ago on the Commonwealth. Both were unmarried.

METAL TRADES OF TORONTO ARE COMBINED

Men Ask 44-Hour Week, Double Pay for Overtime and Triple Pay for Sundays.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Toronto, April 7.—Employers in the iron industry have received from the Metal Trades Council a schedule of wages and conditions with a request that it be put into operation on the first of May. This is the first time the unions have combined upon a general schedule of conditions.

The unions included are: Pattern makers, moulders and core makers, electric workers, boiler-makers, machinists, blacksmiths and kindred trades.

Six thousand men are involved. The request is for a forty-four-hour week. Overtime is to be double time and triple time on all Sundays and all legal holidays, and night work at ten cents per hour over day work.

MAY MAKE EFFORT TO RAISE SOPHIA

Salvage Steamer Tees Will Come North in May to Make Survey.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Victoria, April 7.—It is probable that an effort will be made during the summer to salvage the C. P. R. steamer Princess Sophia which struck on Vanderbilt reef and sank two days later in October last. The vessel lies on top of a submerged hill 700 feet high and it was reported that the hull had broken in two. Diver Jacobson who went down later reported that she was still intact and since that time the question of raising the wreck has been debated.

It is expected that the Tees will be sent north next month to make a complete survey and in all probability she will not return to Victoria until she takes the Sophia with her. It is probable that at least two salvage ships may be required and possibly the Santa Cruz may be brought north to aid in the work.

MINE MAGNATES INVESTIGATE STEWART ORES

Half Million Dollars Will be Spent At Camp This Year, Says Mr. Mahood.

The Bush mine is the greatest discovery that has been made in British Columbia, considering the amount of development work done. That is the statement of one of the partners, G. Mahood, of Los Angeles. He was in the city this morning along with another partner, S. J. Silverman, of New York, and Chas. Caldwell of Kaslo.

On the strength of the wonderful results obtained from the Bush mine, Mr. Caldwell has options on adjoining properties which he expects to take up. The Forty-pins group and the Yellowstone group are the properties which he expects to take over.

Mr. Silverman is already interested in mining on Vancouver Island. He organized a company to take over the old Dewdney copper mine at Sidney Inlet and it has been shipping ore for the last several years. It is a low-grade ore and could not be worked when the price of copper was very low.

Mr. Mahood says that Stewart is better known in New York than it is in Vancouver and that it has a great future. At least half a million dollars will be spent there during the coming year.

BORDEN AND KEMP DEFEND THEIR POLICY AT LUNCHEON GIVEN SIR ARTHUR CURRIE

DEMOBILIZATION TAKING PLACE AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE—COMMANDER IN CHIEF SAYS ALL CRITICISMS CAN BE ANSWERED AT RIGHT TIME

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, April 7.—At a luncheon given by Sir Edward Kemp to meet General Sir Arthur Currie, the overseas minister took the opportunity to voice his sentiments upon the criticisms from Canada.

Sir Edward Kemp said he had, ever since the armistice, urged that Canadian soldiers be repatriated as fast as possible and his own view was entirely contrary to that urged in some quarters in Canada, that the soldiers should not be demobilized too quickly, or else they would find no work to do at home. He was absolutely satisfied that they had arrived at the best conclusions possible regarding demobilization and he was quite prepared to defend the form it took. Equally sure was he that the Canadian people would approve his action directly they understood the situation.

No Intrigue.

Before the end of this month half of the Canadian troops would be back on the water. "However," he proceeded, "an odd man now and then returns to Canada, misrepresents the situation and reflects upon the officers here. One of the favorite themes is that there is an intrigue proceeding, that there is a possibility of General Currie being replaced in command of the Canadian troops. Such a thing was never heard of at any time. Since General Currie took over the corps, he had never heard anyone mention it. More than that, it would be presumption on the part of anybody here to have thought of it."

The Premier.

Premier Borden followed with "strongest and most willing testimony to your own service," mentioning that he had often urged Sir Edward to release himself from his duties for a few weeks.

General Currie spoke brilliantly, expressing the conviction that every effort had been made by those responsible to get the men repatriated as soon as possible. It was an undertaking, the difficulties of which could not be appreciated by those unaccustomed to it. "I for one expect criticism," added General Currie. "I don't know that now is the time to make any definite statement myself. Any criticisms that have been made can be answered."

PEACE TREATY WILL BE READY FOR EASTER

Paris, April 7.—The preliminary peace treaty will be ready by Easter and the German will be asked to come and sign it at the beginning of May, Premier Lloyd George declared in an interview.

BOLSHEVIK DEAD LYING IN PILES AFTER BATTLE

Crushing Defeat Administered to Red Army in Mekhrena Sector of North Russia.

Archangel, April 7.—The Allied forces, principally British and Russian, operating in Mekhrena sector, delivered a crushing defeat to a large body of Bolshevik attackers. Piles of Bolshevik dead indicated the severity of the enemy's losses.

London, April 7.—Arrangements to despatch a British relief force to Russia are being pushed forward. The advance guard leaves in April for Murmansk to proceed at the first opportunity to Archangel. The main force proceeds in two sections, the first at the beginning of May and the second a fortnight later.

Nothing Radical About a Soviet.

There is nothing radical about the soviet form of government. It is much the same as ours. It may be conducted on radical principles or on conservative principles. A series of councils or parliaments is all it is. All depends on the view point of those who are in control of the soviets. Any form of democratic government is good if those in charge have enough commonsense to pass proper laws and then put them in force.

According to the press reports Saturday, the Budapest Soviet was not radical enough for some of the people of that city, so they started a rival under more radical control. Practically everything depends upon who is in control. The fact that it was a soviet did not of itself make it a radical soviet.

Supposing a soviet were started in Prince Rupert and an election took place, who would be its chairman or president? Just the same men who are head of the city council. Just now it would be McClymont, for the people chose him by a large majority vote. Possibly the workmen think it would be a member of the Trades and Labor Council. That does not follow. In Russia the head of the soviet is the son of a nobleman. He is not drawn from what is usually known as the ranks of labor.

If labor was united it could pass any laws it wished under our present constitution. There would be no need of a violent revolution. The difficulty is that laboring men are as much divided in their views as are those who do not labor. They may for a time agree, but there is no such thing as permanent agreement among a large number of people, no matter who they may be.

Commissioner For Board of Trade.

Mr. Mortimer has resigned the position of commissioner of the local Board of Trade. He has carried the institution through a dull time and deserves much credit for having done so. Since he has dropped out it remains for the Board to appoint another in his place.

As so much depends upon the commissioner of the Board, the appointment should be made without any considerations of favor. The great thing is to have a live man if possible at the job. It is difficult to find that kind of man, but he is valuable when found. It is better to wait a few days rather than rush in and get a poor man.

Better Deal For Prospectors.

There is a general opinion here that there should be a better deal for the prospector in this province. He is the man who risks everything. He gambles with his time and often comes out the loser. Anything that can encourage him to continue and to follow up the work of developing the property after he has found it is of benefit to the country as a whole.

There is a proposal that an assay office should be established here in order to facilitate mining in this district. That would be a great aid to the prospector. Expert advice can be obtained from Mr. Clothier who has a fine comparative collection of minerals in his office. That is not so good as an assay office, however.

As this is the most central point for mining in the province, it would seem that this is the first place to be given consideration in this regard.

PLANS MATURE FOR LIBERAL CONVENTION

Trades and Labor Congress and Great War Veterans Association Invited to Co-Operate.

Ottawa, April 7.—The parliamentary Liberal party held another caucus and gave further consideration to matters connected with the holding of the national convention on August 5, 6 and 7 next. Decisions arrived at were as follows:

The purpose of the convention will be, first, to draft, discuss and adopt the platform of the Liberal party of Canada; second, to deal with the question of party organization; thirdly, to select a leader in succession to Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Following as closely as possible the plan adopted for the national Liberal convention of 1893, the representation at the forthcoming convention will be as follows:

1—All the members of the senate and of the House of Commons who desire to co-operate with the Liberal party and all the Liberal candidates who were defeated at the last Dominion election.

2—The Liberal premiers and the leaders of the Liberal opposition in the several provinces.

3—The presidents of the nine provincial Liberal associations.

4—Three delegates from each nomination constituency which will be elected at a local convention to be called for that purpose. In the case of constituencies having two parliamentary representatives, six delegates will be elected. Women will be eligible for election as delegates in all constituencies.

5—The Liberal members of each provincial assembly and the Liberal candidates defeated at the last provincial election in each province, acting jointly, shall have the right to select from among themselves a number of delegates equal to one-fourth of the total number of representatives in each provincial assembly.

In addition to the foregoing it was further decided that owing to changed conditions arising out of the war and to the desirability for co-operation among all ranks of Liberal democracy in dealing with grave national problems, invitations will be extended to the Canadian committee of agriculture, the Dominion Trades and Labor congress, the Great War Veterans' association and the Canadian Railroad brotherhood to send representatives to the convention for the purpose of presenting such views as the national bodies may desire to present prior to the drafting and adoption of a national Liberal platform.

When all the details connected with the holding of the convention have been settled they will be embodied in a call to be issued to the Liberals of the Dominion by the temporary leader of the party, D. D. MacKenzie, M. P.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

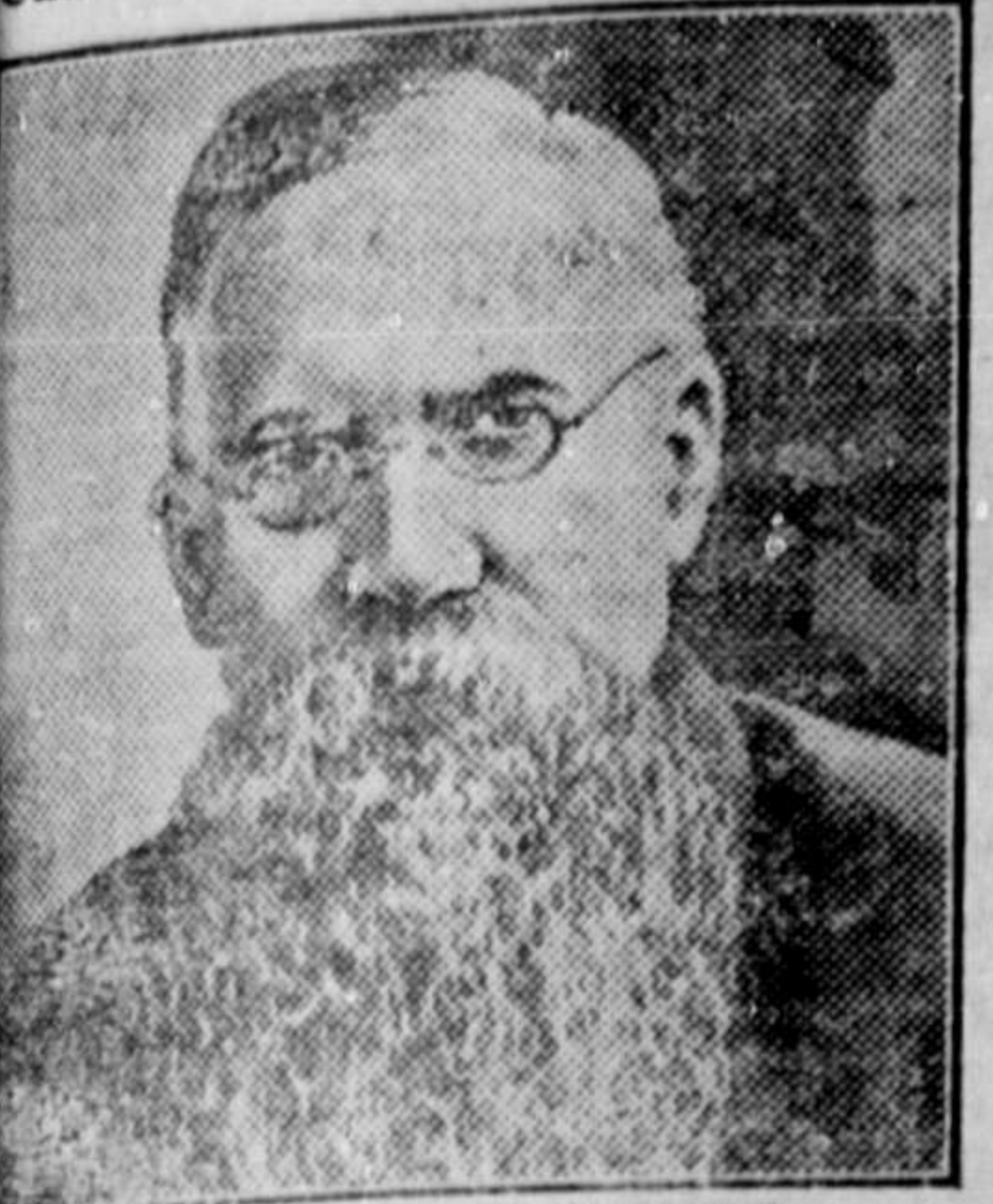

VICTORIA POLICE ARE NOW UNIONIZED

Victoria now possesses a full-fledged police union affiliated with the Trades and Labor Council and organized to the last point as a labor organization.

As a result of the meeting of members of the department held at the Labor Hall, the union was formally completed. A charter had been obtained sanctioning affiliation with the central body of organized labor in this city. The first officers of the new union are: President, Jailer Hall; vice-president, Constable Thomas Palmer; secretary, Constable Bishop.

The question of organizing the force as a labor unit has been under consideration for some time past, and was not welcomed to any extent by the Police Commissioners. At the time the Vancouver force took steps to organize, the same course was agitated here, but nothing was done until recently, when the move for a union assumed definite shape. Other cities have followed the Vancouver example, the police departments of Winnipeg, Toronto and other leading eastern centres having become unionized.

George Clothier, district mining engineer, arrived north after attending the mining convention at Vancouver and conferring with the Minister of Mines at Victoria on the mining situation in this district. Mr. Clothier's report to the convention was generally acknowledged to be the most interesting given.

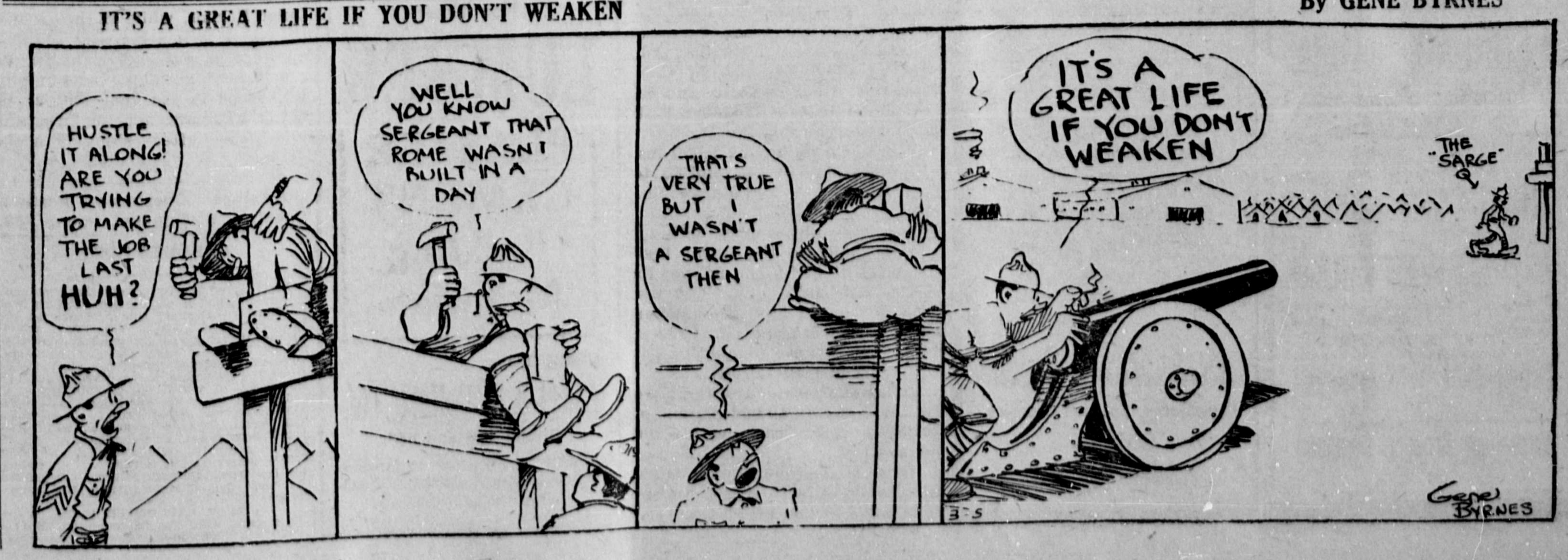

ASK FISHING LICENSES FOR BRITISH ONLY

Great War Veterans Pass Resolution Which is Forwarded to Ottawa.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Victoria, B. C., April 7. — A resolution calling for the granting of fishing licences to British subjects only and including clauses calling for the operation only by British subjects of purse seine and drag net, etc., was introduced by the Great War Veterans' Association at its recent meeting here. The following is the resolution in full, with its preamble:

"Whereas, many men are returning daily who are desirous of taking out fishing licences for the salmon fishing along the coast of British Columbia; and whereas, the bulk of licences in the past have been granted to alien foreigners; and whereas, in certain areas the licences are attached to canneries instead of being free fishing licences,

"Therefore be it resolved that this branch of the G. W. V. A., acting through the Provincial and Dominion executives as well as independently through our British Columbia members of Parliament at Ottawa, request that all fishing licences be granted to British subjects only; that the licences in British Columbia be free in place of being attached to any special cannery or group of canneries;

"Be it resolved, that in the event of purse seine and drag net licences being issued by the Dominion Government, that it be explicitly ordered that no one but a British subject be employed in operating them, and be it resolved, that the Vancouver branch of the G. W. V. A. and their branches on the Coast of British Columbia be informed of our action and their earnest and energetic support be requested.

"Be it further resolved, that all British naturalization be denied to any of the unassimilable races who have not served overseas with the C.E.F., and that stringent action be taken to prevent the illegal trafficking in naturalization papers.

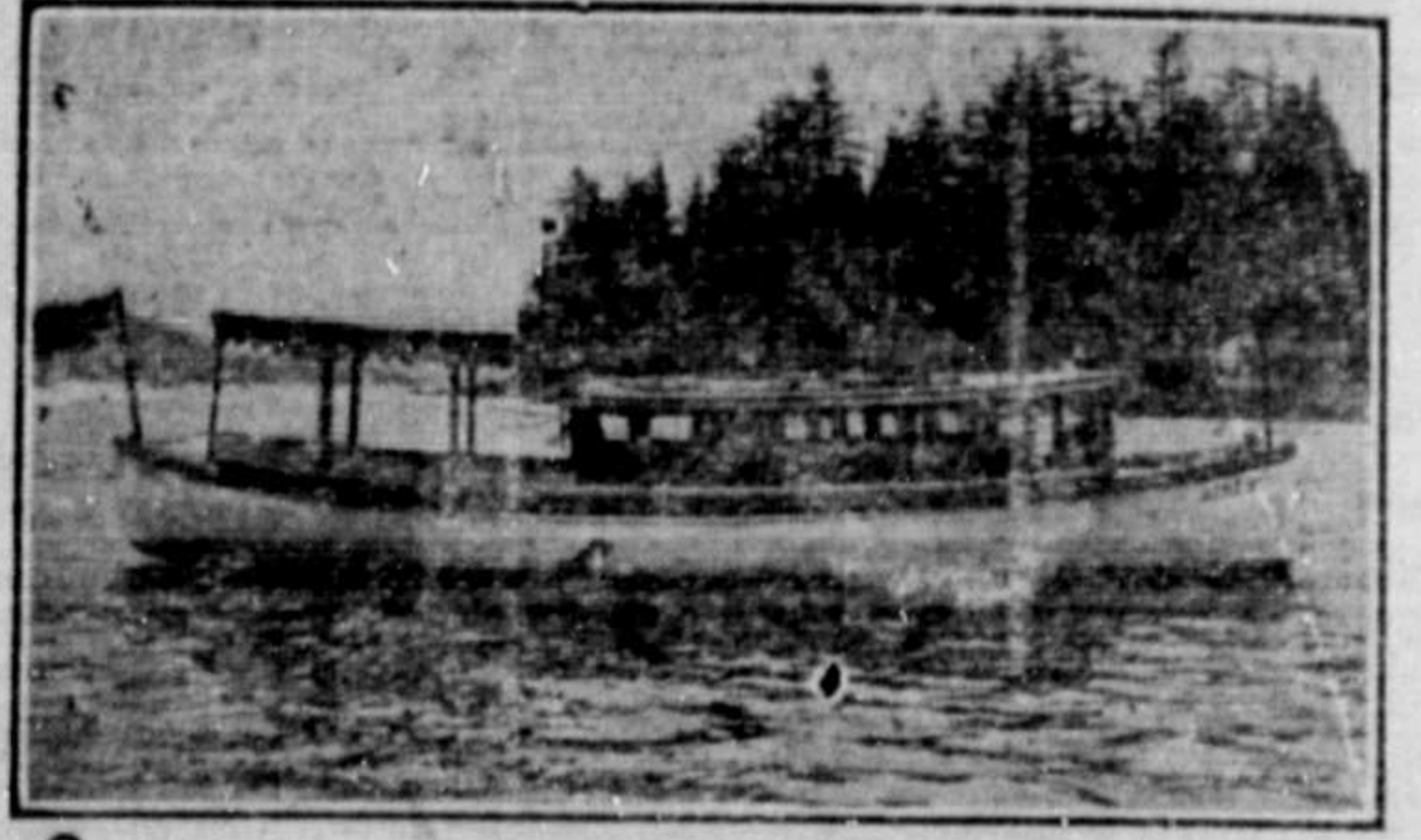

Old Company Being Wound Up and Larger One Taking Its Place.

Victoria, April 7. — With a capital of \$550,000, the Pacific Salvage Company has been incorporated in place of the B. C. Salvage Company, which has gone into voluntary liquidation. This move has been taken owing to the decision of the company to increase considerably its scope and equipment. Fore-seeing a great shipping development along the Pacific Coast, the officials are reorganizing with a greater capitalization to be in a position to handle all salvage needs along the coast line.

A meeting of creditors has been called for April 14, when the affairs of the old company will be wound up. A. C. Burdick will continue as manager of the salvage concern.

The Pacific Salvage Company has now quite a fleet of vessels. Completely outfitted as salvage ships, the Tees, Alaskan and Santa Cruz lie at the wharf in the Inner Harbor, while if the sloop-of-war Algerine, recently acquired by the salvage concern, is found to be suitable, she too will be added to the fleet, which is ready to render marine first aid and look after shipping accidents.

MORE STOCK FOR THE GRAND TRUNK

Commons Railway Committee Reports Bill Granting Company Permission.

There was opposition to the bill authorizing the Grand Trunk Railway to issue new consolidated debenture stock not exceeding \$12,500,000 at the session of the Railway Committee of the Commons at Ottawa.

W. F. Cockshutt referred to a report that the company was willing to carry on for four years if it should receive a grant of \$7,000,000.

Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Railways, said that no such proposal had been made by the Government.

The Minister said it was the desire of Sir Thomas White that the bill should pass. Mr. Minister assured the Committee that the negotiations for the purchase of the Grand Trunk would be continued but not prolonged. He expressed the conviction that the Grand Trunk should be joined to the Government system of railways, making two first-class railways.

Dr. Reid criticized Grand Trunk financing methods. He was not disposed to criticize the Grand Trunk management in Canada, but his fight was with certain financial manipulators in London who had raised the bogey of the credit of Canada. They always took care to get their dividends, he said. The Grand Trunk was so overloaded that it could not succeed, and it was not proposed to load it up with more capital indebtedness. It would, he said, all come back on the people of Canada.

The Committee, in view of the request of the Minister of Finance, and the statement that the money it is proposed to raise, will be required even if the system should be taken over by the Government, reported the bill, Mr. Richardson alone objecting.
