HON. C. J. DOHERTY'S SON FAILS TO REPORT UNDER MILITARY SERVICE ACT

ROYAL COMMISSION TO BE APPOINTED TO INQUIRE INTO
QUELPH NOVITIATE AFFAIR IN WHICH A
MEMBER OF UNION GOVERNMENT
WAS INTERESTED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, April 8.—Following a promise by Hon. Arthur Meighen, Acting Minister of Justice, that a Royal Commission will inquire into the Guelph novitiate affair, Sir Sam Hughes' resolution calling for an investigation by a Parliamentary Commission was withdrawn. The investigation will not begin until the return of Hon. C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice, who was chiefly interested officially in the matter.

D. D. McKenzie expressed regret that the long discussion on the Guelph incident had taken place. He took the ground that it amounted to contempt of court to discuss the resolution after the Acting Minister of Justice had announced that there would be a judicial investigation.

Failed to Report.

In connection with his announcement that a royal commission would be named to investigate the matter, Hon. Arthur Meighen said that a thorough inquiry had made it clear that none of the young men of the Novitiate were liable for military service. They all came within the exemption under the Military Service Act.

General Hughes said the Novitiate failed to report men for medical examination or under the Military Service Act for any purpose or to recognize in any way the authority of the provost marshal.

Dr. J. W. Edwards asked whether exemptions of the Novitiate were possession of exemption certificates.

The Minister of Militia replied that subsequent investigation showed that they were not.

Sir Sam asked if the Minister was aware how often military officers had asked for production of these documents previous to a raid.

General Mewburn said he understood they had been asked for.

Sir Sam: "Twenty times."

No Certificate.

General Mewburn stated that Sir Sam Hughes had made special reference to the son of the Minister of Justice. He wished to state that his information was that this young man was not of military age and was medically unfit.

Sir Sam remarked that the young man was not in possession of a certificate of unfitness from the Military Board.

NEW STORES ON THIRD AVENUE

Frizzell's Meat Market to go into
New Building at Corner of
Fulton Street.

While there are a number of residences planned and the program under the new building society will be inaugurated at once, most of the new buildings for which permits have been taken or applied for, have been for business purposes.

The latest announcement made is that George Frizzell has purchased the two lots on the corner of Third Ave. and Fulton Street where the Bank of B. N. A. stood and will proceed at once with the erection of a business block consisting of three commodious stores. The block will be 61 feet by 100 feet deep.

The corner store will be fitted up as a modern meat market, to which Frizzell's Market will be moved as soon as completed. This store will have a marble front and tiled floor and a large cold storage vault which will make it the most complete and up-to-date meat market on the coast.

William Bruce is drawing the plans which will be ready in a few days and work will commence on the building immediately.

GRAND TRUNK STOCK RISING

Canadian Government's Offer to
Railway Company Causes
Stiffening on the Lon-
don Market.

Montreal, April 8.—A most significant fact in connection with the acquisition of the Grand Trunk Railway by the Government, is that while the British interests claim to be very much dissatisfied with the offer made by the Government of Canada for the taking over of the road, the price of their shares on the London market immediately improved.

ENEMY ABLE TO PAY 20,000,000,000 POUNDS

Commission to Inquire Into Possibility So Reported to British Government.

London, April 8.—In the Commons yesterday Claude Lowther confirmed the statement that a Commission comprising Premier Hughes of Australia, Mr. Henderson, Labor Leader, and the Right Hon. Walter Hume Long has been appointed by the late Government to inquire into the enemies' capacity to pay indemnities and had reported they could, if given time, pay £20,000,000,000 sterling.

PREMIER AND PRESIDENT BOTH IN BED WHEN PEACE COUNCIL WAS ABOUT TO SIT

SESSION WAS HELD BY LLOYD GEORGE'S BEDSIDE WITH
WILSON ABSENT—REPATRIATION WAS
UNDER DISCUSSION AND CHIEF
ISSUE SETTLED

Paris, April 8.—The Peace Conference yesterday apparently reached a turning point between definite and speedy results and a further prolonged delay. There are indications toward action but new doubts began to appear as to whether the desired results could be accomplished within a fortnight, as Premier Lloyd George predicted.

The Council of Four were to have met at President Wilson's residence where the President was confined to bed. It developed, however, that Lloyd George became affected in a similar manner and was confined to his bed also. It was then determined to have the council meet at Lloyd George's residence and there the session took place at 3:30 p. m. with Premier Clemenceau, Premier Orlando and all the financial experts present.

Repatriation was again the chief issue and although settled in the main principle, a number of essential details will remain open.

IMMIGRATION BILL EXTENDS RESTRICTIONS

Introduced Into House of Commons Yesterday by Hon. J. A. Calder.

Ottawa, April 8.—In the House of Commons yesterday, Hon. J. A. Calder, Minister of Immigration and Colonization introduced a Government Immigration bill. The measure will generally extend the restrictions on immigration and extends the time during which immigrants may be deported from three to five years.

Officials who may be in charge of Government boats will be responsible for the carrying out of the law just as are officials of ordinary transportation companies.

POSTMEN DEMAND MONEY AND HOLIDAYS

Ottawa, April 8.—Bearing the demands of 11,000 postal employees of Canada, a large petition will be laid before the postmaster general. It includes demands for an increased salary schedule and improved working conditions and a half holiday each week.

LIFE OF A LOCAL MEDICO IN THE WILDS OF MESOPOTAMIA

DR. L. W. KERGIN TELLS SOMETHING OF HIS ADVENTURE
UP THE TIGRIS RIVER ON THE SITE OF
ANCIENT BABYLON

To have lived in Mesopotamia is not uncommon, and to have died in Mesopotamia is very commonplace, but to have lived and worked there for a long time, to have been down with typhoid and ague and then in the end to have cheated death and returned to Canada, is an exploit. That is what Dr. L. W. Kergin did, however, and he looks hale and hearty after his adventures. And yet he was there at a time when, owing to the surrender of General Townshend, affairs were somewhat disorganized, and what was left of the army had to shift for itself to a certain extent.

Red Salmon Still Commands High Price on Market.

The catch of twenty boats sold this morning as follows:

The Brothers, 45,000 lbs.; Pres-ho, 8,000; Alten 70,000; Helge-land, 87,000; Tillicum, 8,000; Happy, 11,000; Roald Amundsen, 8,000; Gyoa, 9,000; Acme, 2,500; Saturn, 5,000; Adaline, 5,000; Margalice, 7,500; Thelma, 8,000; Giffen, 8,000; D. C. F. no. 1, 5,000; Kubein, 4,000; Clara N., 3,000; Washington, 25,000. Three of the boats sold at 10c. and 7c.; nine at 11c. and 7c.; and six at 12.5c. and 7c.

Two salmon catches were the Hazel with 2,500 lbs. selling at 19c. and 4c. to the Atlin Fisheries, and the Rambler with 1,800 lbs. sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage at 19.3c. and 4c.

LIQUOR REFERENDUM IN QUEBEC PROVINCE ON THURSDAY NEXT

Montreal, April 9.—A referendum on the liquor question will be submitted to 486,136 voters of the province of Quebec on Thursday next in 81 electoral districts, and both wets and dries are working strenuously to get out the vote.

In the last provincial election less than half the vote was polled and it is not expected that as many will vote for the referendum.

GOVERNMENT RAILWAY TO ENTER KAMLOOPS

Kamloops, April 9.—D. B. Hanna and the Canadian National Railway officials have completed arrangements with the city for the entrance of their tracks along front street. The line now stops on the other side of the river.

Miss Katherine Pillsbury, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Pillsbury of this city, has been elected president of the Women's Undergraduate Society at the University of B. C. at Vancouver. This position is one of honor and only students of marked ability are chosen to fill it.

The body of the late James DesBrisay, who died at Port Simpson Hospital on Saturday, will be sent to Vancouver for burial this evening. His brother, Alexander, will accompany the remains and arrangements were made by the B. C. Undertakers. Mr. DesBrisay was well known in this district where he was engaged in the cannery business at Wales Island. He was 59 years of age.

The case of J. R. Morgan Ltd. vs. G. T. P. Steamship Co., Ltd., which was set down for trial in the County Court yesterday, was postponed until a later date.

Dr. Spencer, of Port Simpson, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon on a short visit.

The doctor left here in March, 1916 and almost immediately after joining the C. A. M. C. transferred to the Royal Army Medical Corps and it was with them he did all his army work. He lost no time in getting right into the thick of things and a little over two months from the time he left here, he arrived in Mesopotamia by way of England.

With Indian Troops.

It was chiefly with the Indian troops that Dr. Kergin served. He was through practically all the fighting there was in 1916, going up-stream and doing duty at various points. At Mudeli he established a hospital with the mobile column and subsisted and with them lived almost wholly on the country, and yet they were eighty miles from the nearest tree, and that was a date palm.

Hot! Sizzling hot! There are few words that can describe what 125 degrees in the shade means. In Prince Rupert when the thermometer reaches eighty everyone wants to lie down and rest. It was under extreme conditions of temperature that the Royal Medicals worked out there on the banks of the Tigris in the land of Babylon of which everyone has read.

It was in 1917 that Dr. Kergin was taken with typhoid. In that year he returned to Canada for eleven days but he was soon on the job again running a hospital in connection with the advance base depot at Baghdad which work he continued until he was transferred to France. He was in Egypt when the Armistice was signed on November 11 last, and a few days afterwards he left for home by way of New York where he took a six weeks' post graduate course in the hospitals.

Early Incident.

Dr. Kergin said it would take him weeks to recount his experiences. He told a News representative (Continued on Page Three).

Liberals Need to Rise to Situation.

There is to be a big Liberal Convention in the summer and it is now time for the party to consider its policy in view of the changes which have taken place during the last few years. If the party harks back to the old cries with the old platform and the old methods, nothing but defeat stares it in the face. If, on the other hand, it can rise to the occasion, throw off its lethargy and become something more than a mere opposition, it will in all probability secure the confidence of the electors.

In preparation for the big convention it will be for the individual electors to make suggestions. When a delegate is sent to Ottawa the suggestions can be passed on. The views expressed at the convention should be not only the views of the leaders but the views of the rank and file. The program should be evolved from the inner consciousness of the nation. It must be progressive else it will not be Liberal.

The Liberal policy must keep pace with the spirit of the times. It must grow else it will die. Stagnation always leads to death.

Liberalism means progress. It cannot be narrow or shallow or deceitful. When it is either of these it is not Liberal. The present condition of the nation is one which has to be handled with courage. People are no longer satisfied with the old conditions. It is useless to stand aside and say "Let us alone." Liberals have to act boldly and with energy and in that way only can they be a real factor in allaying the unrest and in steering the nation once more into smooth channels.

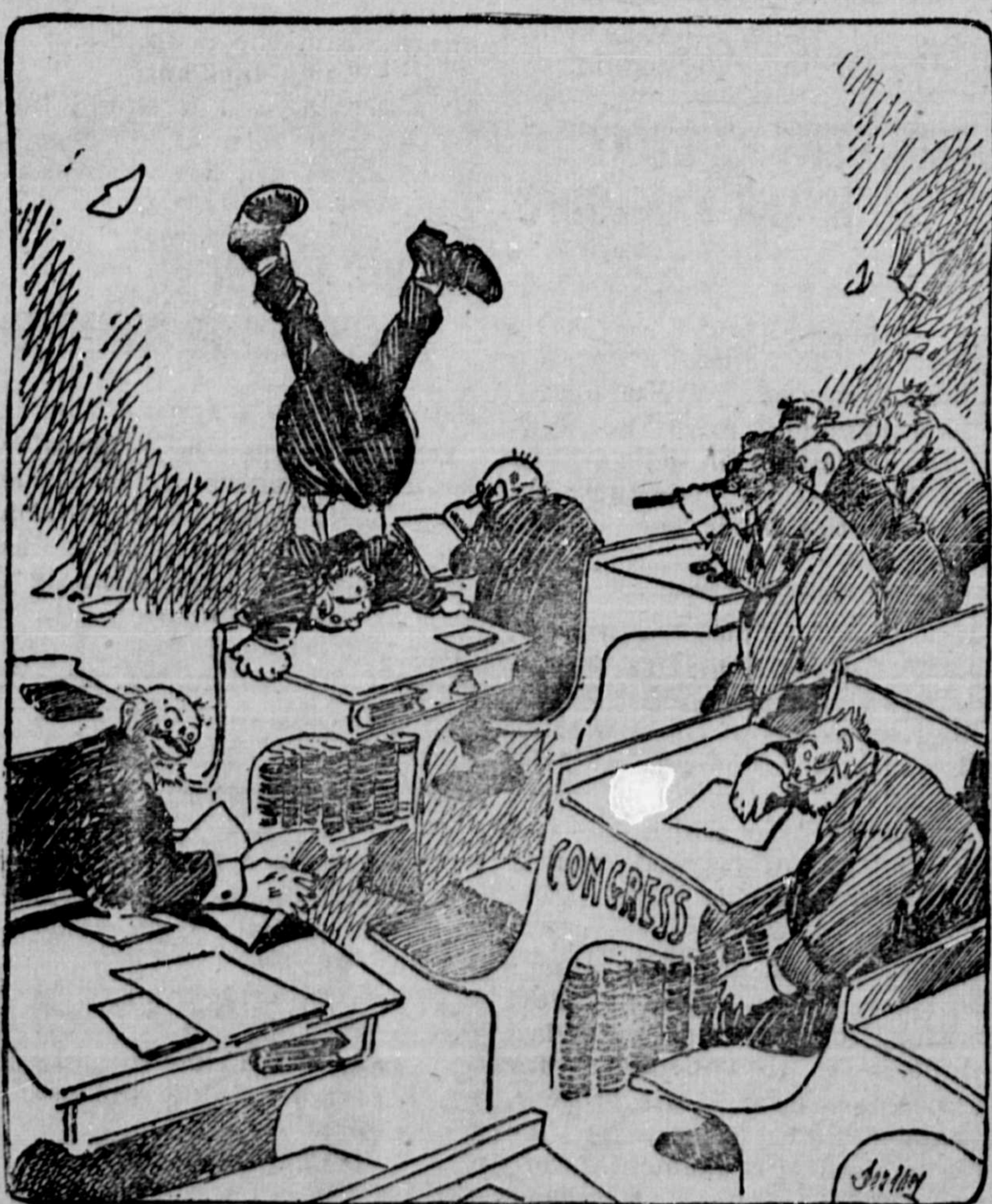
Sign of Times Seen in Japan.

According to a newspaper report the master of one of the Japanese liners has paid off the Japanese crew and hired Chinese in their places. Apparently the Chinese were cheaper and more docile than their Japanese cousins. The Japanese workmen are beginning to feel their position after hearing of all the wonderful things workmen in other parts of the world are doing.

Japan is a nation evolving. At present labor is very cheap, measured after our standard. This cheap labor in a verile country is a danger to the rest of the world. It gives manufacturers an advantage over every other nation.

The Japanese are a sober, observant, clever people. When the Japanese warships visit Victoria or Vancouver, the men do not make a rush for the barroom, the dive or the brothel. They walk the streets perfectly sober and self contained, but observing everything. They look with contempt on our frailties. Even before prohibition came into effect they were never seen in a barroom nor were they ever drunk.

A nation of such people is something to be reckoned with. They stand to gain in prestige and power as the years roll by. There is nothing they cannot do if they set their minds on it. It is because of this that Canadians have to consider their position as neighbors to the Japanese. Nothing but the pond separates the two nations.

**LIFE OF A LOCAL MEDICO IN
THE WILDS OF MESOPOTAMIA**

tative of a little incident on his arrival at Basra. That was way back in 1916. The party landed at 8 p. m. and it was pitch dark. There were 105 other medical officers in the draft, and as was mentioned before organization was somewhat upset following the surrender of Townshend. It was some time before it was decided what camp the party was to occupy. Finally they were ordered to proceed to what was known as the Old Dorset Camp about a mile and a half through the date palms with the country all flooded and the temperature 112.

The medical officer was told that the surest way to arrive that night was to follow the bullock tongas loaded with the baggage. They had a great time wading through the mud and clay sometimes up to the ankles and sometimes to the hips.

Unpleasant Visitors.

The Canadian was first to arrive and he found a dozen or more huts made of matting and bamboo, the floors of which were all under water with the exception of the corner of one. This one he bagged and proceeded to try to make himself comfortable. The four legs of the bed were under water but that was nothing. The visitors were the bother.

That tent being on a little island all the flees in the neighborhood had assembled just as did the natives at the time of the great flood. Also the lack of netting left the would-be sleeper open to attack from mosquitos. The result can be easier imagined than described. It was a superlative bed for the doctor, but there was the satisfaction that while hungry himself he was feeding many others.

First Meal in Asia.

Morning came but the breakfast was still three miles away and it was reached in a bullem or native boat. It was the first meal eaten in the country and consisted of something like dried pancake with rice and mutton boiled together and eaten with the fingers and was the only meal eaten that day. This was obtained in a native khan. The next day no boat was available to take them to breakfast so they fasted, until tramping through the forest they reached a hospital and begged a meal. The third day they proceeded upstream.

Well Known Men.

A number of well known British Columbians were met on the Tigris. There was Capt. Wm. Paterson of Vancouver, known out there as Yukon Bill; Capt. Powley who made the record for the trip from Busra to Baghdad and back, a distance of 940 miles; Captain Smith, formerly of the Steamer Hazelton; Capt. Jordan, formerly of the Skeena river, and Captain Macdonald, not long since of the steamer Quadra; who had charge of the buoying of the channels in one section of the Tigris. Dr. Kergin pays a tribute to these men for the excellent work they did there.

**JAPANESE SHIPS
EMPLOY CHINESE**

One of Vessels of Osaka Shosen
Kaisha Pays Off Japanese
Crew.

The Osaka Shosen Kaisha is reported to have engaged a number of Chinese seamen. The Tokyo News Agency announces that many Japanese seamen are quitting their vessels on the pretext of returning home for a rest, and the consequent scarcity of labor at sea is serious.

In view of this state of affairs the Osaka Shosen Kaisha has taken drastic action in removing the whole crew, except officers, of one of the company's liners in the South Seas (the Batavia Maru, Chekiang Maru, and the Kiangsu Maru) to a steamer on a more important run, at the same time engaging Chinese seamen for a vessel mentioned at a certain port which the Toyo News Agency is not at liberty to disclose. This innovation is partly due to the scarcity of efficient seamen and partly to the question of wages. The news agency understands that the company will gradually engage Chinese seamen for the company's services in the South Seas and in the direction of Australia. The inevitable result of this new departure will be the question of Japanese and Chinese labor at sea. The introduction of Chinese labor into Japan is prohibited except by permission of the Government, and as the authorities seem to be opposed to the new measure taken by the Osaka Shosen Kaisha, says the Toyo News Agency, the matter will shortly prove a great question in shipping circles.

RETAIL CLERKS CONDEMN THE ONE BIG UNION

Pass Resolution Condemning the Actions of Radical Labor Leaders at Calgary Convention.

At a meeting of the Retail Clerks Association held last evening in the Union Hall the following resolution was passed:

"That the organization go on record as deploring and repudiating any connection whatever with the labor movement known as 'One Big Union' recently formed in Calgary.

"That we condemn the actions of the radical labor leaders who have advised labor to break away from all international organizations, sowing discord, extreme and vicious methods, urging and adopting by vote the calling of a general strike on June 1.

"That we resent the sentiment and sympathy passed in the said convention with the Russian Bolshevik soviet government and the Spartacans of Germany, also the word and actions of I. W. W. propaganda.

"Further resolved that a copy of this resolution be circulated through the press urging other labor organizations to demand a refutation of the resolutions expressed by the said convention towards alien anarchists and revolutionary government, failing which the leaders of the One Big Union labor party be deprived of their rights as unpatriotic citizens."

It seemed to be the opinion of all present that the action taken by the extremist party at the Calgary convention was not in any way beneficial to true unionism. The chairman of the meeting urged the delegates to be present at the meetings of the Trades and Labor Council in order that the opinion of the clerks' union should be upheld there.

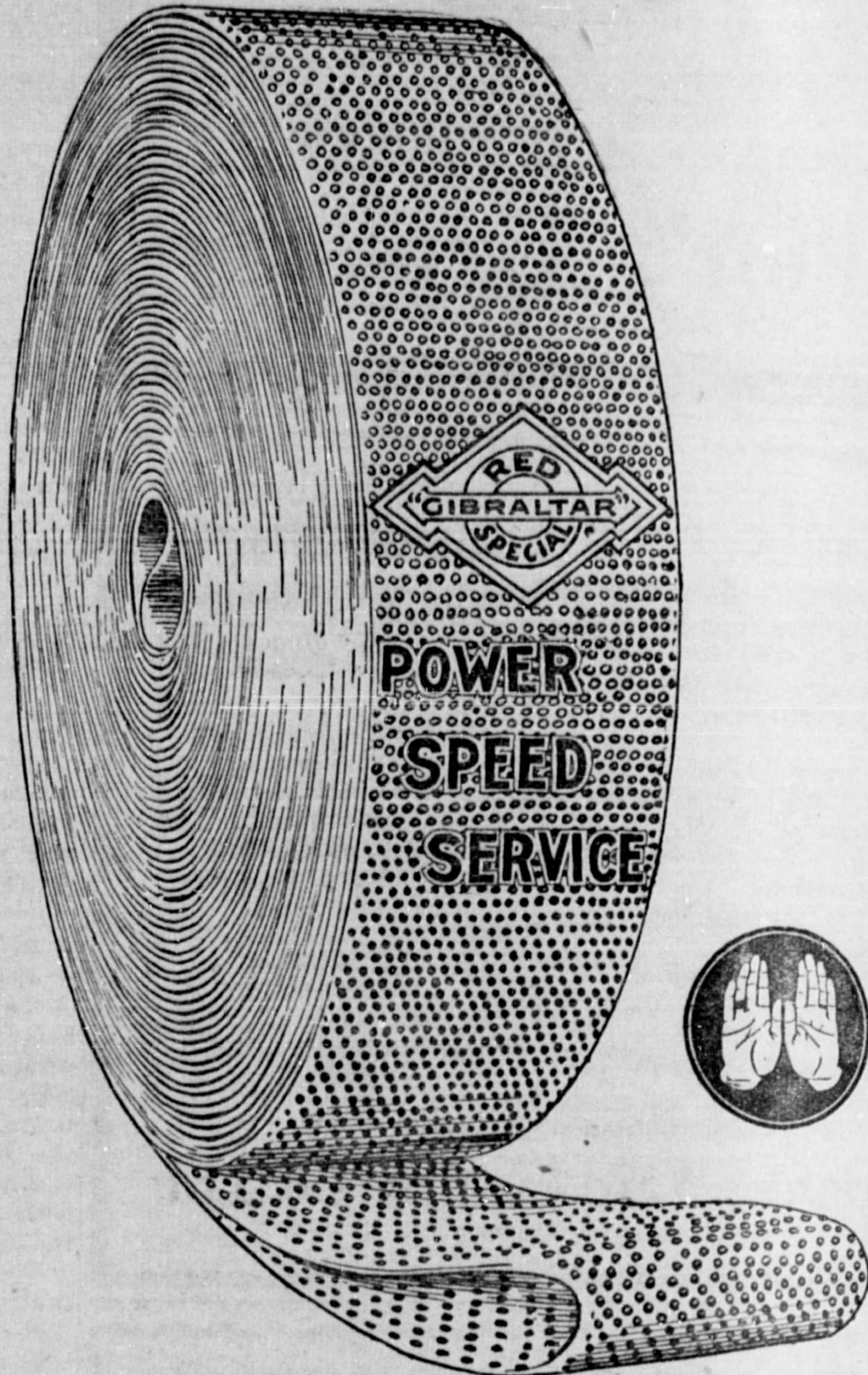

Scotty Dennis, one of Prince Rupert's first printers, who formerly owned the Premier Press, returned yesterday afternoon from overseas by way of Vancouver, coming north on the Princess Mary.

He left here in July, 1915, with the 62nd Battalion, transferred to the 48th and later became a member of a work battalion constructing light railways close behind the front lines. Needless to say he had a good many interesting experiences and can tell many tales of life in France.

George Sellers, another Prince Rupert man, arrived back with Scotty. Both were met at the boat and were received with hearty expressions of welcome by their old friends.

PRINCE RUPERT GETS \$50,000 FOR HOUSING

The Money is to Be Applied to Providing for Returned Soldiers.

Prince Rupert is to get \$50,000 from the Dominion Housing fund to be used for the purpose of helping returned soldiers to own their homes, and if any should be left to be loaned to others for building purposes.

The amount at first allocated to this city was \$18,000, but as a good many municipalities did not require any money and the need here is great, the Government has set aside \$50,000 for this point.

Already there are a number of applications in from returned men and a good many men have not yet returned from overseas, so that it is possible the returned men may use the whole of the money.

It is left to Acting Mayor McRae to advertise for applications for the money from returned men.

ANOTHER DEAL SOON ON HUDSON BAY HILL

That another of the more promising mining properties on Hudson Bay hill will figure in a deal and be taken over for operation this summer is well within the range of possibility, negotiations to that end now being under way, says the Interior News. The arrangements are being handled by an engineer who inspected the property last summer, and he is dealing with an American syndicate attracted by the high silver values in the ore of this section.

Nothing definite is available beyond the bare fact that a proposition is now in the hands of the owners, but the terms are such that there is a good prospect for the deal going through.

With silver alone standing up under the test of post-war conditions, Hudson Bay mountain and the entire district is sure to command considerable attention this summer.

Offers were accepted by the City Council last night for lots 1, 2 and 3, Block 30, Section 2; for John A. Murray for \$101; and for lot 9, block 11, Section 1 from David H. Hays for \$210. These lots are liable to be redeemed before next autumn.

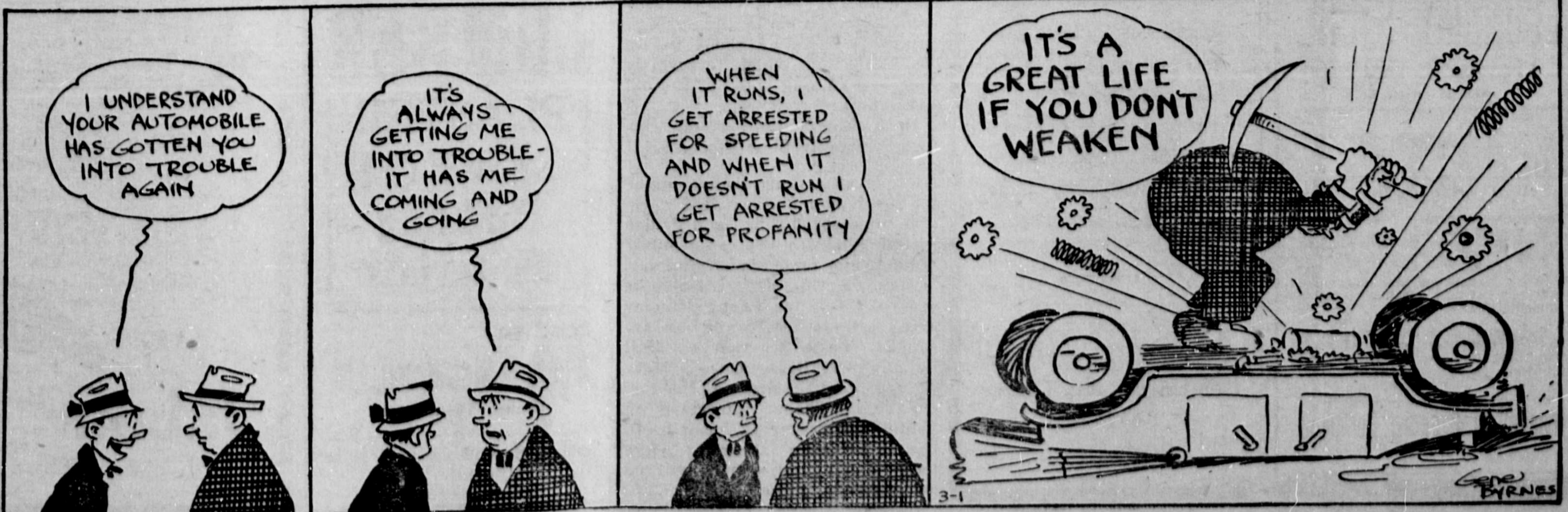
