WILLIAM HOHENZOLLERN WILL BE TRIED BY ONE OF ALLIED POWERS PROBABLY BELGIUM, IS DECISION

Five Billion Dollars to be Paid by Germany within Two Years and Yearly Assessment for Thirty Years after that; That is Decision of Council of Four of the Peace Conference.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, April 10.—The responsibility of the German Emperor for the war and the means for bringing him to trial by one of the Allied Governments, probably Belgium, has been definitely determined upon by the Council of Four. This follows a definite decision on the terms of reparation for war damages whereby five billion dollars must be paid within two years, and the inter-Allied commission will assess the remaining damage for a period of thirty years, beginning May 1, 1921.

Thus two of the great obstacles which stood in the path of the rapid attainment of peace have been removed within the last twenty-four hours, and the period of extreme tension is over. Efforts to secure tangible results succeeded by a revival of confidence over the great advance towards a permanent settlement.

The question of the treatment of the Kaiser has not been discussed to any extent of late in the press but it has been before the conference a good deal. The question of payment for damages has been a more live question and the result has been that any people fancied nothing was to be done in regard to the personal responsibility of the ex-Kaiser. The announcement of the termination of the Council of Four to bring the Kaiser before court is received here with a great deal of satisfaction.

BOLSHEVIKI ODESSA GAIN IS IMPORTANT

Immense Resources of Grain, Coal and Other Minerals the Result of Occupation.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, April 10.—The chief cause of anxiety in connection with the evacuation of Odessa by the Allies and the occupation by the Bolsheviks lies in the fact that the most fertile regions in southern Russia have fallen into the hands of Bolsheviks giving them immense resources of grain, coal and other minerals.

The reason for the Allies' reticence was the constantly increasing menace of Bolshevik soldiery against the Allied garrison which was able to maintain its supplies with the greatest difficulty. The commander decided to withdraw his troops numbering approximately 50,000 to Roumania and Constantinople.

NEW HOTEL AT SHIPYARD IS NOW UNDER WAY

Will Have Fifty Rooms and Dining Accommodation for 250 At One Sitting.

Work on the new boarding house for the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. was commenced yesterday on the level land adjoining the new shipyards. The building is to be three storeys high, 36 ft. by 160 ft. and will contain fifty rooms. It will be a wooden building but well built and permanent in its character. Included in the structure will be a big dining-room, large enough to seat 250 men as well as appropriate kitchens and other offices.

It is anticipated that the new building will be up and ready for occupation in a month, as work is to be rushed on it and much of the material is already on the ground.

The contractors for the excavation work are also busy getting everything ready for expeditious work. The fence has been moved back in order to include the sites for the slips, but the boarding house will be outside the fence.

INCREASE NAVY YARD

Seattle, April 10.—Rear Admiral Charles F. Parks, of the bureau of yards and docks, after spending a day in expert inspection of the navy yard at Bremerton, gave it as his opinion that the Puget Sound Navy Yard has a future ahead of it that would make its wartime prosperity merely a starting point for its peacetime growth.

BEEF PRICES PROBABLY DROP

Dr. S. F. Tolmie of Nanaimo Constituency Tells Committee Feed Will Cheapen and Meat.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, April 10.—Dr. S. F. Tolmie, M. P. for Nanaimo, addressed the Agriculture Committee of the Commons yesterday and expressed the opinion that the price of feed would drop shortly.

The accumulation of steers in Australia would affect the price of beef. On account of lack of shipping Australian breeders unable to dispose of beef cattle would now be able to get these on the market.

BUILDING DURING 1918

Exclusive of Germany and Austria 5,477,444 Gross Tons Produced—Record Never Before Equalled.

During 1918 the shipyards of the world, excluding Germany and Austria-Hungary, produced 5,477,444 gross tons of merchant shipping, according to the annual summary just published by Lloyd's Register of Shipping. This figure has never been approached before in the annual summaries; it is over 63 per cent higher than the output of 1913, the record year prior to the war, which, of course, included the output of Germany, Austria-Hungary, etc.

Many Big Ones.

The number of steel ocean-going steamers of between 5,000 and 10,000 tons launched during 1918 amounted to 439, which represents 28 per cent of the total number of such vessels in existence at the beginning of the year.

Exclusive of the United Kingdom, which produced 1,348,120 tons, the countries where the largest output has taken place during the year under review are the United States, Japan and Canada. The totals for these countries amount to 3,781,145 tons, and account for 92 per cent of the total output abroad.

United States.

The United States output for the year 1918, viz., 3,033,030 tons gross, is a convincing proof of the great development in the shipbuilding industry which is generally known to have taken place in this country. This total for one year is higher than the whole output of the United States during the ten years 1907-1916; it is more than three times the amount launched during 1917, and it exceeds by over 25 per cent the combined output of the rest of the world for the year 1918.

Pacific Coast Production.

The most striking increase has taken place in the yards on the Pacific coast. The average yearly output on that coast during the four years 1912-1915 was under 30,000, in 1916 it was 123,882 tons, in 1917 it amounted to 128,622 tons, and during 1918 it has reached 1,544,296 tons. Of the total launched on the Great Lakes (430,877 tons) only one steamer of 5,429 tons is for trade on these lakes, all the other vessels being intended for sea-going purposes.

The total figures for the United States include eleven steel steamers of between 8,000 and 9,000 tons each, and 204 of between 5,000 and 8,000 tons; 326 wood steamers of over 2,000 tons gross each launched at Gulf ports; 183 vessels to be fitted with geared turbines, the largest being three of 3,775 tons each; three vessels of 1,370 tons each, fitted with turbo-electro system of propulsion; 93 steamers built on the Itherwood system of longitudinal framing, 22 of which, together with five other vessels, are for the carrying of oil in bulk, and 67 sailing vessels fitted with auxiliary power.

BIG RAFFLE IN AID OF THE NEW BUILDING

Display of Prize Articles in Store Window Down Town Shown Today.

There is to be a big drive for the Returned Soldiers' Building Fund inaugurated by the Ladies' Auxiliary in addition to the work of the men's committee. This is taking the form of a monster raffle, the prizes for which are being displayed today in the window of the Kaien Island Hardware. There are something like twenty-five articles in all, including a gold watch and many other valuable things.

Tickets for these raffles will be sold during the next three weeks and on the evening of the drawing there will be a big supper and dance in St. Andrew's Hall. That will be on April 30.

On account of the value of the prizes as well as the cause to which the proceeds are to be devoted, it is expected that a large sum will be raised by the ladies. Everyone will be anxious to help and doubtless the result will be unprecedented in local drawings.

IMMENSE LINERS TO BE BUILT BY JAPAN

Vessels of 20,000 Tons Each Designed to Ply to This Coast.

Huge passenger liners of more than 20,000 tons with palatial accommodations and able to maintain a speed of more than eighteen knots, vessels superior to the great steamships Empress of Russia and Empress of Asia of the Canadian Pacific Ocean Services, Ltd., will be built in Japanese yards by the Nippon Yusen Kaisha for the Seattle-Far East route, according to advices received in this city.

News of the plans of Japan's premier shipping corporation to place still larger passenger liners in the Seattle trade and to add to its transpacific fleet, carriers second in size only to the famous Great Northern liner Minnesota, now operated on the Atlantic, has caused a thrill along the Seattle waterfront.

When the big passenger carriers Fushimi Maru, Suwa Maru, Kashima Maru and Katori Maru, largest of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha's 100 vessels, were diverted from the European service to the Seattle-Far East route, that port became the country's greatest gateway to the Orient and much travel from England and the Continent was sent this way. Now comes word from Japan that still larger and faster liners are to be built for the Seattle trade.

ODESSA EVACUATION HAS BEEN CONFIRMED

Paris, April 10.—Evacuation of the Black Sea ports of Odessa by Allied forces is confirmed officially.

DIFFICULTIES DEVELOP IN PEACE CONFAB.

Delegates at Cross Purposes and Showing Strain of Work; Must Agree Soon.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, April 10.—The Peace Conference, it was declared in certain official quarters today, reached a stage where there are just two alternatives, early agreement or a wreck. Everyone is showing the effect of the strain, and nervous tension is in the air. Every delegate carries an implied "ultimatum" on his lips. It is becoming not only a matter of political and diplomatic effort reaching the end of the string, but as it is human beings that are doing the work, the limit of physical endurance is beginning to manifest itself.

One person in authority declared it would not be wrong to say technically that the conferees are agreed on the principles of the main issues, but that the constant dragging in of details has caused an endless going over of every subject.

Diverse Interests.

It is a case of trying to do things in the usual way at an unusual period, he said. The result is the conference has degenerated into a scramble for individual desires.

The Italians are nursing a threat to withdraw, while the suggestion is quietly coming from Polish circles that unless they are given Danzig they will take it by force. The French and British are still struggling with repatriation details, while numerous other questions furnish constant ground for argument.

FINAL REPORT REGISTRATION

Interesting Figures Shown in the Statistics Tabled in House of Commons.

Ottawa, April 10.—The final report of the Board of Registration which on June 21, 1918, took a census of all the people in Canada over the age of 16 years was tabled in Parliament. It shows the number registered as 5,040,516 of whom 2,572,962 were males and 2,467,554 females; 202,075 were registered subsequent to registration. The number of people of alien birth was divided among the provinces as follows: Nova Scotia, 7,290; New Brunswick, 3,732; Prince Edward Island, 279; Quebec, 46,379; Ontario, 109,645; Manitoba, 30,805; Alberta, 50,549; British Columbia, 63,479.

Sane Reform But Not Revolution.

The union men of Prince Rupert rather resent an idea that seems to have got abroad to the effect that they are in sympathy with the Bolsheviki methods and movements. Naturally they favor any movement which tends to get rid of autocracy and oppression, but that does not mean that they are revolutionists or that they look for any violent upheaval in the body politic.

There are and always have been men who would like to see a general upheaval, hoping in the scramble to secure something better for themselves. There are also a few who are jealous of those who are doing better than themselves. Taken as a whole, however, the union men are just as sane and anxious for stable government as are the businessmen. They resent any idea that they are easily carried away by the glamour of a new movement, and they can be depended upon to look at every new proposal from the point of view of the general welfare.

Few people ever thought seriously that there was any real disaffection in Prince Rupert, but commencing with a joke, the idea seems to have gained ground in some quarters that the Federation of Labor was a revolutionary organization and that the Trades and Labor Council was closely allied with it. There are always a few hotheads in every community, but the mass of the people are sane and do not like their efforts for mutual betterment to be misconstrued.

Interior News' First Birthday.

The Interior News of Smithers under the capable managing editorship of L. B. Warner has just completed one year of life, and it looks to be in a healthy condition. In order to make a good showing and put up a readable paper the editor says that he has had to work sixteen hours a day. That is true of almost every paper that is making a success. There is no money in the newspaper game for anyone, but there is a fascination about it which makes it almost impossible to break away. The newspaperman is always looking to the future, a future that is as evasive as the foot of the rainbow.

Mr. Warner has been doing good work for Smithers and the Bulkley Valley. The Interior News is one of the most welcome exchanges the News gets and it is a compliment to that paper that we find something each week that we can pass on to the people of Prince Rupert. The growth and prosperity of the Bulkley is watched with keen interest from the coast and there is no better reflex of that prosperity than the columns of the weekly paper published at Smithers.

Liberal Leader Still Discussed.

The Vancouver Sun is very much concerned over the question of leadership of the Liberal party, the chief concern being that it shall not go to McKenzie King. Apparently that paper is willing to support anyone else. Day after day the matter is mentioned but with no very definite result.

Just why the Sun objects to Mr. King is not very clear. The paper admits his all round sterling qualities but refuses to allow that he has any qualification for leadership.

It must be admitted, and the attitude of the Sun is one of the proofs, that Mr. King has as good a chance of being chosen leader as anybody at present in sight. His name is constantly before the public, especially in the east, and he seems to have no rival except the present House leader.

S. P. PORTER IS ASSISTANT TO W. P. HINTON

Brother of Local Telegraph Manager Appointed to Important Position at Ottawa.

Friends in Victoria of S. P. Porter, executive agent of the Grand Trunk Pacific, will be pleased to learn that in connection with the changes brought about by the passing of the G. T. P. system into the hands of a receiver appointed by the Dominion Government, he has received an important and highly responsible appointment, says the Victoria Daily Times. According to a general order issued by W. P. Hinton, general manager of the G. T. P., and approved by Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Railways and Canals, receiver, Mr. Porter has been named assistant to the general manager with headquarters in the Department of Railways and Canals at Ottawa, where he will represent and act for the general manager in all matters pertaining to the receivership. H. H. Hansard, solicitor of the G. T. P., will act as solicitor to the receiver to assist him in all legal matters.

Whatever the outcome may be of the passing of the G. T. P. railway into the hands of a receiver, the selection of Mr. Porter, a western man of over thirty years' experience in the west, will be pleasing to the people of this part of Canada. Mr. Porter has had a long and varied experience in railroad affairs which should stand him and the people in good stead. He comes of a family engaged in railroad work in England and he himself started railroad-ing in the Old Country over thirty-five years ago, while still very young. After spending some time in the employ of the C. P. R. in the west, Mr. Porter became a homestead inspector in what is now Saskatchewan, and obtained an intimate knowledge of the needs of the settler. Upon the formation of the Saskatchewan Department of Railways, he became its first deputy minister and later still passed into the service of the Grand Trunk Pacific as its executive agent, and has now, under the receivership, become assistant to the general manager of that system. Mr. Porter's home is in Victoria. Mr. Porter is a brother of W. C. Porter, Prince Rupert, manager of G. T. P. Telegraphs.

The Ameer made no reference to the weird sight, and in the end Sir Charles ventured to observe. "Your Highness seems to have been busy of late."

The Ameer smiled and said, "Oh, that's your little lot. You will have no more trouble in that quarter."

Sir Charles afterwards learned that the Ameer had arrested every man member of the family of the native of whose conduct he had complained, and had hanged the whole of them.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with a residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims if less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his claim, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 50 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

LORD CURZON PESSIMISTIC OVER FUTURE

Says Vienna Appealed for Military Aid—Sees Clouds on Horizon Which May Burst.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 London, April 10.—Defending the Military Bill in the House of Lords, Earl Curzon of Kedleston, Government leader, declared that Vienna "being in a serious position and being apprehensive lest it should share the fate of Budapest, had turned to Great Britain and said 'If you will send 10,000 British troops we can guarantee the situation.'"
 Earl Curzon was not sure that war conditions would not revise. He said: "I see clouds on the horizon which may burst at any moment in a more sinister form than anything yet seen. If critics of this bill can show the Government how to rule Ireland without maintaining 40,000 troops there, they will confer a great favor on the Government."

BIG LUMBER DEAL CLOSED

Three and Half Million Feet Sold To New York Firm by Local Dealer.

As an indication that there is a demand for British Columbia lumber in the east a deal has just been put through for 3,500,000 feet of spruce which is at present piled at the mill of the Giscombe Lumber Co. not far from Prince George. The purchasers are a New York firm and the sale was put through by F. G. Brynolson, wholesale lumber dealer of this city.
 The lumber is to be shipped at once and is only one of many similar deals likely to be consummated in the near future, as the local lumber is of good grade and is in demand in the eastern cities where spring building operations are commencing.

SUMAS RECLAMATION SCHEME GOING AHEAD

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 Victoria, April 10.—Next month the Government will be ready to call for tenders for a portion of the Sumas reclamation scheme whereby 20,000 acres of land will be rendered available for agricultural purposes. The estimated aggregate cost will be about \$1,000,000.

FLYING FOR ALL

Paris, April 10.—The firm of Farman have been studying means to place flying within the reach of all, and to promote this end the flying school at Toussaus-le-Noble, near Versailles, is to be reopened. Aerial trips will be organized, beginning with a tour over the aerodrome for beginners then pleasure trips round Paris, and finally visits to the battlefields and picturesque regions of France, also business trips. For aerial transport it will be possible to hire aeroplanes by the day or month at moderate rates. As soon as flying is authorized again by the military authorities it is predicted that aerial trips will become the new craze of Paris.
