STEMMING GERMAN ONRUSH WAS ALMOST MIRACLE SAYS THE BRITISH COMMANDER

SIR DOUGLAS HAIG IN FINAL DESPATCH TELLS OF DIFFICULTIES OF CARRYING ON WAR AND MAKES REMARKABLE STATEMENT

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, April 11.—Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig in his final despatch presents a review in detail of the expansion and achievements of the British army, with many remarkable facts and figures. "The highwater mark of our fighting strength in infantry was reached only after two and a half years of conflict, by which time heavy casualties had been incurred. It was not until the mid-summer of 1916 that the artillery situation became even approximately adequate to the conduct of major operations."

During the Somme battle, artillery ammunition had to be watched with the greatest care. During 1917 ammunition was plentiful but the gun situation caused anxiety. It was only in 1918 that military operations could be conducted without any limiting consideration beyond that of transport. The margin with which the German onrush of 1916 was stemmed was so narrow and the subsequent struggle so severe that the word "miraculous" is hardly too strong a term to describe the recovery and ultimate victory of the Allies.

TEACHERS GET MORE SALARY

Board Will Hold Meeting This Afternoon to Make Final Decision as to Amounts.

The school teachers of the city are to have their remuneration increased. That seems certain now. The matter was discussed at length last night by the school board and the meeting was adjourned until this afternoon when the salaries will be set.

The principals of the schools appeared before the board last night and laid the claims before them for the whole staff. Some recommendations from the meeting of the Teachers' Association were read by Principal Macdonald in which it was suggested that the salaries for experienced teachers should vary from \$1,200 to \$1,800 a year according to the length of service.

J. C. Brady of the High School also spoke on the matter, as did Miss Tingley of Borden St., Miss Marcellus of the Domestic Science department and Mr. Shockley of the Manual Training section.

The trustees expressed themselves as fully in sympathy with the request, L. W. Patmore being very emphatic that the teachers were scandalously under paid, considering the importance of their work.

The discussion took a long time and it was too late to complete the list before time for adjournment came.

QUEBEC VOTES FOR BEER AND LIGHT WINES

English Counties Only Ones That Favor Complete Prohibition; Race and Religion Factors.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Montreal, April 11.—By a majority of 100,000 votes, Quebec pronounced itself in favor of light wines and beer. At least fifty per cent of the voters went to the polls out of 400,000 registered. Though all the results are not yet in, the outcome is not in doubt. The Island of Montreal contributed a majority of 61,799 and the returns from Sherbrooke, Three Rivers, Quebec City and Hull also showed substantial majorities. The surprise came from the agricultural districts which have been dry in all years past. Counties like L'Assomption with 1219 for to 64 against and Soulanges with 1105 for to 94 against are typical.

A number of speakers in favor of wine and beer introduced the race and religious cry into the campaign addresses, adding that English speaking Orangemen and Methodists of Ontario were anxious to see prohibition introduced as a blow to French speaking Catholics, who needed wine for sacrament. No women voted on the referendum.

In only one locality was temperance sentiment emphatic enough to offset the wet organization. This was in English speaking eastern townships. Majorities for a complete dry state were, however, quite small.

At the meeting of the school board last night complaint was made that the plaster of the walls in the room used by the Red Cross at Seal Cove was broken badly, and that when entertainments are given at that place the classrooms are opened and used for smoking rooms by men. As these were left locked it was the opinion of Mrs. Kirkpatrick that pass keys must be used. After Trustee Shaw had mentioned that the school was needed for recreation purposes in that district it was decided to draw the attention of the Red Cross to the condition of the room and to have a chair rail placed all around it.

In answer to a question from Trustee Shaw at the school board meeting last night, the principals of the schools explained what was being done in connection with breathing and athletic exercises in the schools. It developed that certain definite instruction in these health subjects are given regularly.

NO TERRITORY FOR FRANCE

Will Control Saar Coal Mines as Return for Destruction of Mines in Lena District.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, April 11.—Lloyd George is regarded as occupying the balance of power at the Peace Conference. The disunion of yesterday is apparently past. France is now asking no territory, but complete reparation damages.

It is expected the French will be given access to the Saar coal basin and control of the labor in the mines without paying export duties, thus securing economic advantages without actual possession of the country. This is regarded as a fair return for the destruction of the French coal mines in the Lena district.

Germany is to have political control but provision is made for a plebiscite to determine the permanent possession of the country.

It is also stated that the Italians are prepared to accept the internationalization of Fiume.

NINETEEN FISH BOATS SELL CATCHES TODAY

Salmon Price Drops to 17c. for Reds and 4c. for Whites.

Nineteen fishing boats sold their catches today, the Speculator with 10,000 lbs.; Sadie K., 8,000; Dolphin, 12,000; Moltke, 3,000; Haysport No. 1, 5,000; Haysport No. 2, 16,000; Verna, 3,500; Ingrid, 4,500; Victor H., 1,000 Tramp, 6,000, and the Katie, 670 pounds.

The salmon catches were the Virginia, 160 lbs.; Polar Bear, 2,000; Stella, 650; Kyea Mauk, 2,100, and the Swan, 200 pounds. The average price for salmon was 17c. for the reds and 4c. per pound for the whites. The average price paid for the halibut was 14.5c. for the first class, and 7c. per pound for the second class.

BIG UNION NOT WELL RECEIVED IN KOOTENAYS

J. Naylor Gets Cool Reception and Asked to Move on From Some Towns.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Nelson, B. C., April 11.—On the ground that anyone holding "unpatriotic views is unfit to mould public opinion" the Slokan District Board of Trade, at Silverton, passed a resolution that J. Naylor, member of the central committee of the One Big Union, shall not hold meetings in that district and shall leave it at once.

The meeting further resolved that the matter of all such undesirable citizens being allowed entire freedom of movement be taken up with the Dominion authorities. Naylor was told to get out of Cranbrook a few nights ago, and at Trail was told he was not wanted. Rosland also received him coldly.

ASSESSOR'S CLERK ALLEGED TO HAVE APPROPRIATED CASH

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, April 11.—A special inquiry is being made into the administration of the office of the provincial assessor and collector by Controller General Mouat. The reason for the audit was the discovery of a defalcation on the income tax payment of a Seattle firm owning British Columbia property. It paid \$350, but only \$50 appeared on the Government books. The assessor's clerk who put through the deal is alleged to have made a written confession.

The investigation is to determine whether this is only an isolated case or not.

Hon. John Hart stated that in any event the office would be re-organized.

Welcome Peck And His Men.

Kaiser Must Expiate Crimes.

General satisfaction was expressed here yesterday afternoon when it was made known through the medium of The News that the ex-Kaiser was to be tried for his crimes and that the Germans would have to pay the heavy damages which have been set at five billion dollars within two years and a regular assessment for another thirty years. That will cover the present generation. The next generation will be free from the tax.

Many people doubt if William Hohenzollern will allow himself to be taken to Belgium to be tried. It would be too much of a nightmare. The hand of fate is working to bring home to the criminals the true significance of what they have tried to do to others. "Frightfulness" may be all right for the winner, but it is no policy for a loser.

School Grounds To Be Improved.

The Junior Athletic Association, headed by J. C. McLennan, is doing good work in drawing attention to the need of improved school grounds. They last night made some valuable recommendations to the school board, which, it was promised would be well considered with a view to action. The school board is alive to the need of better conditions, but the action of the association strengthens their hands and will help to bring public opinion into line so that the demand may be insistent. Nothing should be too good for the young people who are growing up here.

Increased Pay for School Staff.

The evolution of the teaching profession is proceeding at a goodly rate. Little more than a generation ago teachers were paid almost nothing and in some districts were boarded around among the people of the district. Those were the days when it was considered that children were little creatures who were born to obey severe and unreasonable parents. With a change in viewpoint in regard to children has come a change in regard to the teacher. She has had to fight for her right and for the rights of the children and it has been a long struggle. Today we are just beginning to recognize that the teaching profession is the most important in every community, ranking far ahead of the law or medicine. While the work of lawyers and doctors is only to patch up, or possibly to cure, the work of the teacher is to prevent the ills and in the last analysis to entirely eliminate the other two professions.

Recognizing the value of the work of teachers in any community the school boards are gradually improving the conditions under which the teachers work and are also recognizing the importance of their labors with the result that they are receiving better remuneration. With better pay, the better class of men and women will be attracted to the profession and will be induced to make it a life work.

SCHOOL GROUND IMPROVEMENTS RECOMMENDED

Junior Athletic Association Makes Suggestions to School Board For More Expenditures.

Last night J. C. McLennan and D. C. Stewart met the school board and made certain suggestions to them which they incorporated in a letter as follows:

"We the members of the Prince Rupert Junior Athletic Association, formed for the purpose of assisting your board and any and all other legal and voluntary associations which have for their object the moral, mental and physical development of the youth of the city have spent some time for the last few weeks in endeavoring to find out what is possible in the near future that can be done in our schools to better the conditions in regard to recreation and physical development of the pupils attending.

"We recognize how you are handicapped in regard to funds and fully sympathise with you in that regard; we also appreciate the good work you have done and are doing and wish you to regard us as an annex to your board in as far as at all times our wish that your board will call upon us to assist you in any movement needed to mould public sentiment to make our schools institutions which will worthily do their part in developing the youth of our city and fit them to untrammelled enter the higher order of citizenship which we feel is soon to come as the result of the Great War just ended.

Borden St.

"Granting and feeling you will so consider us, we respectfully suggest (being informed your funds are small) that for this year the grading of Borden Street grounds; the putting in of a good drain, to remove heavy sewage water that at present flows across ground; the moving back another 35 feet of the school fence on the west side. By doing so you will give the children a better ground to play on, and enable the teachers the better to keep children from playing on the street.

"As soon as it is possible we would advocate building a large play-shed about 40 x 60 on the west end of the play-ground at the west of the school, to be used for recreation and physical exercise purposes.

King Edward.

"The area of King Edward block is at present 230 x 300, or 69,000 square feet. We would recommend that 16 feet adjoining 7th Avenue be added and the same width on 8th Avenue, and on Cotton Street that a strip 28 feet wide be added to the school ground, and a like amount on Green Street, which would give an increased area of 24,272 square feet or an increased area of 35 per cent. We would also recommend the increased area be graded, following the same plan that the school board has so admirably inaugurated. Also here, too, we would recommend a play-shed 40 x 60 on Borden Street.

"Attached hereto you will please find a rough sketch of a proposed play-shed which will, we think, be suitable for all kinds of school physical exercise, costing from \$1,500 to \$2,000, should it be built at present or if materials such as lumber are reduced in price from present quotations may be substantially less.

TO INCREASE POWER OF FLYING MACHINES

Paris, April 10.—Dr. Auguste Rateau, of the Academie des Sciences, has invented a contrivance enabling aeroplanes to fly at a rate unheard of hitherto and at heights considered until now impossible. It renders it possible for the turbine to make 30,000 revolutions a minute. The invention also comprises a small centrifugal ventilator for the purpose of compressing the air at lofty altitudes, at which the instrument is used. It is thus possible to furnish the engine with compressed air at the pressure usual at lower altitudes. The engine then works at full strength and not only do the machines climb thousands of metres higher, but their speed becomes much faster than when near land. This invention of M. Rateau's will enable a flight from Paris to Algiers to be made in five hours, to Constantinople in eight hours, and to Cairo in eleven hours.

LINE UP CHURCHES FOR RECONSTRUCTION

Winnipeg, April 10.—For the purpose of marshalling all the Church forces in the big reconstruction movement, plans are now maturing among the different denominations of Winnipeg for a joint campaign to be conducted next fall. Presbyterian, Methodist, Anglican, Baptist and other denominations are co-operating in the scheme, and a joint committee is now at work arranging the details.

It is proposed to make an appeal for funds for the work in this connection, although no pooling of the amounts is contemplated. Each denomination will keep its contributions separately and spend them in accordance with its own plans.

George Warburton, of Toronto, is acting as national director of the movement, and arrangements are now progressing to have distinct organizations in each of the provinces. In Manitoba the initial steps have already been taken and Saskatchewan was organized last week. Archbishop Matheson presided at the opening meeting held here last week, and the bishop of Saskatchewan was in the chair at a meeting held in Regina for the same purpose.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSHIP PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.
Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

U. S. DESERTER IS ALSO A HERO

Leaves Uncle Sam's Army Without Permission to Fight with Canadians in France.

Attired in uniform and covered with medals, a young and handsome Canadian soldier, his pretty bride at his side, a day or two ago limped into the office of United States Attorney Robert C. Saunders at Seattle. He had been wounded in the leg at Lens—and gassed at Marycourt.

Mr. Saunders looked up admiringly—he himself had three sons in the service.

"I am a deserter from the United States Army," said the wounded fighter quietly.

As the federal prosecutor gaped in astonishment, his visitor pulled from his pocket an honorable discharge from the Canadian Expeditionary Forces with which he had fought in France since November, 1915. The discharge bore the date of March 14, 1919.

Can He Square Himself.

Can a man who deserted from the United States Army in peace times clear his record by subsequent service at the front with the forces of one of Uncle Sam's Allies?

This is the knotty problem Enos C. Smith, a native of Goldendale, Wash., American citizen who longed for a chance to battle the Huns, put up to District Attorney Saunders.

The question has not yet been answered, but the War Department's reply will be in the affirmative, if Mr. Saunders in his capacity as a private citizen, has his way. The prosecutor yesterday passed on Smith's request for an honorable discharge from the United States Army to The Adjutant General at Washington, D. C.

"Prior to the great world war," Mr. Saunders wrote the army officer, "I never thought I might learn to honor a deserter from the army of the United States, but permit me to say that I take pleasure in serving in any way in my power a man who deserted from a place of safety to one of danger in order to help keep civilization alive in the world."



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

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
