## EASTER PEACE LATEST TALK

Agreement Reached on All  
Important Questions Includ-  
ing Reparation and Re-  
sponsibility.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, April 12.—Talk of an  
Easter peace has today given way  
to the promise of a May Day  
peace. Persons close to the "Big  
Four" intimated that an agree-

ment had virtually been reached  
on all important questions, such  
as reparation, responsibility for  
the war, Saar Valley, disposing  
of Fiume and Danzig and the Ger-

man boundaries.  
Military, naval and aerial terms  
of the treaty have been completed  
for weeks.

A revised League of Nations  
Covenant is ready for submission  
to the plenary session.

## ESTABLISH FISHING HEADQUARTERS ON SHAWATLANS PASSAGE IS LATEST HARBOR IMPROVEMENT SCHEME

A meeting of the Board of Trade is being called for Monday  
at 4:30 for the purpose of considering a proposal to establish a  
fishing headquarters at Shawatlans Passage and to provide proper  
docks and accommodation for the fishermen at that point.

There has never yet been any proper accommodation in Prince  
Rupert for the fishermen. The waterfront is such that it is diffi-  
cult to make arrangements to tie up small boats in a secure place.  
None of the floats have space enough for more than a few of the  
many boats that come here or that make this their headquarters.

Pattullo Co-operates.

Having in view the difficulties, Mr. Pattullo was recently ap-  
proached with a view to securing from the Provincial Government  
a piece of land in the sheltered waters of Shawatlans Passage.  
He at once agreed that, if this site would be suitable for the  
fishermen, he would use his influence with the Government to  
secure it for them. More than that, he said that he was ready to  
use any influence he might have with the Dominion Government  
to induce them to provide the dockage facilities. Failing their  
doing it he would take it up with the cabinet at Victoria with a  
view to having the Provincial Government do the work.

Will Be Discussed.

The whole matter will come before the Board of Trade on  
Monday and be thrashed out. Those who are interested will then  
have an opportunity to discuss the matter.

Major Hull is going east in a few days to take up a number  
of matters with the Dominion Government Public Works Depart-  
ment and it is the desire locally that he shall be fully informed  
in regard to what the people here want. As the building of  
wharves is a purely Dominion matter it is confidently expected  
that the Government will take this matter up and provide for the  
local needs. There is needed not only wharves but drying sheds  
for the nets and tackle and a general fishing headquarters for the  
local industry.

Only Site Available.

It is pointed out that the site suggested is the only one where  
proper accommodation can be provided and where the boats will  
be perfectly safe from the sudden gales that pring up at certain  
seasons of the year.

## PERMANENT LABOR BOARD TO REMEDY THE INDUSTRIAL EVILS WHICH MAR SOCIETY

THAT IS PROPOSAL IN REPORT OF PEACE CONFERENCE  
PLENARY SESSION OF LABOR AT PARIS—ANNUAL  
MEETING TO BE HELD

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, April 12.—At the Peace Conference Plenary Session of  
labor a report to adopt the establishment of a permanent labor  
organization to remedy industrial evils and injustices "which mar  
the present state of society" was viewed as indispensable. An  
international labor conference is to meet at least once annually  
and consist of four representatives of each, including two repre-  
senting the Government, one employers and one workers.

Each delegation may have two advisors, one of whom must  
be a woman. When questions affecting women are under dis-  
cussion the voting shall be in-  
dividual. Employers and employ-  
ees must be able to express their  
views with complete freedom and  
frankness representative to all  
things concerned with industry,  
the report says.

The first meeting is recom-  
mended for next October at Wash-  
ington. The program will em-  
brace the principle of an eight-  
hour day and forty-eight hour  
week, the prevention of unem-  
ployment, women's employment  
before and after childbirth, wo-  
men and children's employment  
during night or in unhealthy pro-  
cesses, and a minimum age for  
children.

## QUEEN MARY GOES SLUMMING NOW GETS BUSY

Stung by Personal Discoveries  
She Summons Housing and  
Health Authorities.

London, April 12.—Stung by  
personal discoveries in slumland  
Queen Mary took the unprece-  
dented step of summoning the  
leading British housing and health  
authorities to discuss and draw  
up plans for immediate better-  
ment of living conditions of the  
workers. King George made a  
speech of welcome to the dele-  
gates who numbered about one  
hundred and evinced the liveliest  
interest in the proceedings.

## VANCOUVER LABOR COUNCIL APPROVES THE ONE BIG UNION

## LARGE VOTE FOR MILITIA DEPARTMENT

Cost of War to Canada to End of  
This Financial Year Esti-  
mated at Billion and  
a Half.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, April 11.—Details of  
Canada's war expenditure have  
been laid before the House. Up  
to the end of last month Sir  
Thomas White informed the  
House it was estimated the cost  
of the war to Canada was \$1,-  
277,273,000 and the cost up to  
the end of the present financial  
year will be in the neighborhood  
of a billion and a half.

Discussion of the bill to pro-  
vide a \$350,000,000 appropriation  
to the Militia Department for ex-  
penditure arising chiefly out of  
demobilization. For this depart-  
ment there will be required  
approximately \$275,000,000, of  
which \$184,000,000 will be ex-  
pended in Canada, and \$91,000,-  
000 overseas.

Sir Thomas pointed out the  
necessity of an export trade and  
of furnishing credits to allied  
countries for purchases in Can-  
ada.

In the evening the House dis-  
cussed in detail the bill to create  
a Department of Public Health,  
which went through committee  
and now stands for third reading.

## BREWERY STOCK GOES SKYING AFTER VOTE ANNOUNCEMENT MADE

Montreal, April 12.—The de-



**OIL COMPANY TO PROSPECT PEACE RIVER**

Concern Controlled by British Government Asks Exclusive Right on 60 Miles Square.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, April 11.—Application has been made to the Provincial Government by the Darcy Exploration Co. for the exclusive right to explore for petroleum in the area of the Peace River country sixty miles square. The Government is considering the request.

It was the Darcy Co. through which the Imperial Government purchased the Persian Oil Fields, said to be the largest in the world, in order to secure them from German influence. The Imperial Government owns 62 per cent of the stock in the company.

The request for permission to prospect is accompanied by an offer to pay a royalty of 12.5 per cent. to the Provincial treasury on the product of any wells.

**J. C. BRADY IS OPTIMISTIC AS TO FUTURE**

Lecture to St. Andrew's Society On W. E. Gladstone He Strikes a Happy Note.

It was an optimistic note that was struck at the St. Andrew's Society last night when J. C. Brady gave a lecture on the life and times of W. E. Gladstone. His vivid picturization of the conditions of life in England when Gladstone was a young man set many of the audience thinking of the great progress that had been made in so short a time and thus inspired them with hope for the future.

**His Appeal.**

Mr. Brady spoke of the interest that should be taken in Gladstone by a Canadian because he was the first statesman who seemed to grasp the importance of the colonial empire outside of purely material gain; to the Welshman he appealed because he lived much of his life at Hawarden Castle in Flintshire; to the English because he brought that country to the highest stage of her parliamentary power; to the Irish because he brought home rule into the realm of practical politics, and to the Scotsman because he came of an old Scots family.

**His Ideals.**

Gladstone was unselfish and truthful. He gave up his old friendships and much that he held dear in breaking away from his party and aligning himself with the Liberal movement in the country. He did this because he recognized that to stay with his party meant to be a barrier in the path of democracy.

At the close a hearty vote of thanks was given the lecturer for the interesting and timely address.

H. A. Harvey and Miss Stevens played most acceptably, Mr. Craggs sang and a trio by Messrs. Harvey, Waddell and Clapperton was much enjoyed.

**HEAVY LOSSES FROM TORNADOES IN TEXAS**

Dallas, April 11.—The latest figures show that eighty-six persons lost their lives in tornadoes in northern Texas and part of Oklahoma. Over 200 were injured and the loss is placed at over a million dollars.

**SYNOPSIS OF**

**LAND ACT AMENDMENT**

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per acre and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

**TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.**

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.


## PRICE OF MUTTON ADVANCES FIVE CENTS



## END OF WORLD IS NEAR SAYS HOWATT

Canon of Holy Trinity, Hamilton, Says King George Will Place Crown at Feet of Christ.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

Hamilton, April 12.—That the end of the world is near and that King George will probably have the honor of placing the crown of the British Empire at the feet of Christ, for which honor his grandmother, Queen Victoria, had prayed so reverently, were statements made by Rev. Canon Howatt last night in an address delivered before a large audience in the parish hall of Holy Trinity church.

## NEW SCHEDULE OF TEACHERS' SALARIES

Fifteen Per Cent Added to Rates Paid in the City of Vancouver.

At the school board meeting last night the teachers' salary schedule was completed. The school teachers in Prince Rupert will receive an increase of 15 per cent, plus a war bonus of \$150, against Vancouver's \$100 war bonus. They will get credit for four years' service plus the war bonus as follows:

### Vancouver's Schedule.

First year, 780 per annum (this is the wage paid to unexperienced teachers); 2nd year, \$840; 3rd year, \$900; 4th year, \$960; 5th year, \$1,020; 6th year, \$1,080; 7th year, \$1,140; 8th year, and succeeding years \$1,200 per annum.

### Prince Rupert Schedule.

Prince Rupert will follow the same schedule as above except that 15 per cent will be added to the above amounts. It has also been decided that all teachers shall receive credit for four years plus the \$150 war bonus.

Manual training instructors and domestic science instructors will receive a 15 per cent increase as will also the principal of the public school. All teachers are allowed to work up to a maximum of \$2,160 after eight years' service.

### High School.

J. C. Brady has been advanced to \$2,700 plus the war bonus of \$150, and Miss McLenaghan, \$1,680 plus the same bonus, making a total of \$2,850 per annum for J. C. Brady, and \$1,830 per annum for Miss McLenaghan.




