ATION-WIDE SOVIET SYSTEM FOR GERMANY IS DECISION OF THE SOVIET CONGRESS IN SESSION AT BERLIN

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Berlin, April 15.—In spite of adverse votes by independent socialists, the Soviet Congress today adopted a resolution sponsored by Majority Socialists for incorporation of every ounce of national and economic energy into a nation-wide soviet system which will culminate in a national workers' chamber representation of all crafts, arts, professions and industries. Owners and workers in all branches of production are to be organized. The national council will then elect delegates to the workers' chamber, which will supplement the national assembly and definitely establish a two chamber system in the national legislature. A resolution provides for strict parity of representation of employers and employees.

GERMANY MUST PAY TWENTY- FIVE BILLIONS

Billions in Two Years, Ten
Billions in Thirty Years, and
Ten Billions Otherwise.
Paris, April 15.—Twenty-five
billion dollars is amount Germany
must pay for the losses and dam-
ages caused in the war plus other
amounts to be determined by a
special commission on which
Germany is to be represented.
The five billions must be paid
in two years, and ten billions
in the next three years beginning
in 1921, and ten billions when a
special commission shall determine how
much shall be done.

BETTER TRANSPORTATION ASKED FOR STEWART BY RUPERT BOARD OF TRADE

RESOLUTION PASSED ASKING DOMINION GOVERNMENT TO
CO-OPERATE WITH UNITED STATES IN A
RAILWAY UP SALMON RIVER TO
RICH MINES

C. F. Caldwell, a mining man with thirty years' experience,
who has recently bonded the Forty-nine and Yellowstone groups
of mineral claims in the Salmon River Valley near Stewart, was
the speaker at the meeting of the Board of Trade yesterday after-
noon. He told of the wonderful riches of the Stewart district
and of the ore bodies that had already been opened up there and
as a result the Board passed the following resolution:

LIBERALS LOOK FOR A LEADER

Ottawa Says Progressive Man is
Being Sought who Would
Inspire Confidence.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, April 15.—Owing to the
opposition developing to Mac-
kenzie King as leader of the
Liberal party and the heavy-
weights among the Liberals are
casting around for a suitable
man. Up to the present the
leadership of D. D. Mackenzie has
not inspired the country with any
enthusiasm. Both he and King
are looked upon as being Liberals
of the older type, whereas what
the party is looking for is a man
who would be progressive and
who would inspire confidence
among the more radical elements
which are growing in strength.

For such a man the party is
casting its eyes westward, but
there comes the trouble. The
western prairie men are all free
traders, but in British Columbia,
especially in the farming com-
munities, there is not any more
enthusiasm for free trade than
there is in Ontario.

Chinese Quarters on Second Ave.
Described by Medical Health
Officer as Filthy.

regard to the filthy condition of
some Chinese quarters on Second
Ave. near the old Phoenix Theatre.
The place was reported as over-
crowded and insanitary.

"Whereas the present mining
situation in the Salmon River
district of Portland Canal, B. C.,
requires a railroad for the trans-
portation of a large tonnage of
ore now in sight;
"Be it resolved that the Prince
Rupert Board of Trade recom-
mend that the Dominion Govern-
ment in conjunction with the
Government of the United States,
assist the mine owners of that
district in getting a railroad built
to facilitate the handling of the
output and development of the
district in general.

"Be it further resolved that
this resolution be forwarded to
the Associated Boards of Trade
of British Columbia for their en-
dorsement."

Immense Ore Body.
Mr. Caldwell recounted some of
his experiences in other mining
districts but said that Stewart ex-
celled them all. He told of the
Premier Mine, usually known as
the Bush mine which had recently
been shipping ore that went \$360
a ton in gold and silver. The ore
vein was 80 feet wide and had al-
ready been traced 1,400 feet. He
had estimated that there was three
tons of ore in sight in this one
mine and from 100 to 1,500 tons
could be produced daily if there
was proper transportation.

Other Mines.
This was not the only rich mine
in the district. There were many
and he expected to see a Denver
at Stewart in the near future.
The Joker mine had a 60-foot
vein of solid ore which assayed
\$52 a ton and the picked stuff
\$500 to \$600 a ton. The cost of
treating it at the smelter was
\$2.50 a ton and it could be done
for less.

Mr. Caldwell said that there
was a charter granted for a rail-
way and he was asking that the
line be built or that they hand
over the charter to someone who
would build. The Dominion and
United States governments should
co-operate.

Once the railway was built they
would see all sorts of develop-
ment going on.

Mr. Caldwell also asked for
more frequent steamer service as
the development of the mines
would mean much increased travel
and freighting.

Constitution of Bolshevik Government.

In view of the wide interest taken in anything pertaining to the Bolshevik movement many people would like to know something about the constitution of the Russian Soviet Government. From a perusal of a section of it there seems no doubt that it is what we should call class legislation of the most striking kind. Jerrimandering the list of voters is provided for and political opposition will be avoided.

The following are quotations from it:

The all-Russian Congress of Soviets is the supreme power of the Russian Socialist Federative Soviet Republic. (Paragraph 24.)

The all-Russian Congress of Soviets is composed of representatives of the town Soviets in the ratio of one delegate for every 25,000 voters and of representatives of the government (or country) Soviets in the ratio of one delegate for every 125,000 voters. (Paragraph 25.)

(This paragraph guarantees the predominating influence of the urban proletariat.)

The all-Russian Congress of Soviets must be summoned by the all-Russian Executive Committee not less than twice a year. (Paragraph 26.)

(The Congress meets in practice about once every three months. Its sittings last from two to three days.)

The all-Russian Congress of Soviets chooses the all-Russian Executive Committee to the number of not more than 200 delegates. (Paragraph 28.)

The Central Executive Committee is responsible in every way to the Congress of Soviets. During the interval between the Congresses the Central Executive Committee is the supreme authority of the Republic. (Paragraphs 29 and 30.)

The Central Executive Committee is the legislative, administrative and controlling organ of the R. S. F. S. R. (Paragraph 31.)

The Central Executive Committee forms the Council of People's Commissars for the general administration of the affairs of the R. S. F. S. R. (Paragraph 35.)

The Council of Commissars is responsible to the Central Executive Committee, who can control or cancel all its actions.

Paragraph 64 gives the rules governing the elections to the Soviets. Both sexes over the age of eighteen may vote if they belong to one of the following categories: (a) All those engaged in producing the necessary means of life, and also those engaged in household work for the maintenance of the above-mentioned toilers of production—that is, workmen and servants of all classes engaged in industry and agriculture, peasants and cossacks, who do not employ hired labor. (b) Soldiers and sailors of the Soviet army and navy, (c) Citizens mentioned in (a) and (b) who have lost their power of working.

Then follows a significant amendment under the heading of Note No. 1.

Local Soviets may, with the approval of the Central authority, lower the age limit fixed in the present statute.

Paragraph 65 gives the list of those who may not vote, even if they belong to the categories mentioned in Paragraph 64: (a) All people employing hired labor for the sake of profit. (b) All those who live on profits not made by their own labor—i.e., people living on interest from capital, income from industrial enterprises or from property. (c) Private traders, trade and commercial agents. (d) Monks and religious employees of the Church. (e) Servants and agents of the ancient police and likewise all members of the Imperial Russian family.

The real safeguards of the Soviet Constitution, however, is to be found in paragraph 23, which runs as follows:

"Guided by the interests of the working class as a whole the R. S. F. S. R. deprives certain individuals and certain groups of their rights, which are used by them contrary to the interests of the Socialist Republic."

This statute is aimed at the anti-Bolshevik Socialists, and has been applied with the usual Bolshevik rigor.

RECOMMEND A FISHING DOCK AT SHAWATLANS

Board of Trade Passes Unanimous Resolution Asking Dominion Government to Acquire and Develop Property.

At the special meeting of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon with President McCaffery in the chair the following resolution was passed:

"Whereas the facilities for the accommodation of the fishing fleet making Prince Rupert its headquarters is entirely inadequate and,

"Whereas, unless steps are taken to provide accommodation in keeping with the requirements and importance of the fisheries at this point, the fishermen are liable to seek quarters more in keeping with their needs. And,

"Whereas nothing, with the exception of the accommodations now being provided at Cow Bay, (which are only temporary) has been done by the city of Prince Rupert or any other public body. And,

"Whereas the fishing industry is and will always be one of our most substantial and wealth-producing industries.

"Be it therefore resolved that this Board of Trade go on record as recommending to the Dominion Government at Ottawa, through our representative, Lieut.-Col. Peck, M. P., that they take immediate steps to acquire from the Provincial Government that part of the foreshore on Shawatlans Passage at a point in line with Morse Avenue and thence in a westerly direction for about 2000 feet, and,

"That this resolution be wired to Lieut.-Col. Peck and a copy to Mayor McClymont and J. G. Scott, delegates at present in Ottawa representing the City of Prince Rupert."

Object of Meeting.

President McCaffery explained the object of calling the meeting. Major Hull had recently visited Victoria and taken up with Mr. Pattullo the matter of utilizing the Provincial property on Shawatlans Passage for the purpose of providing accommodation for the fishermen. Mr. Hull as an engineer recommended that this was the only place where they could ask the Government to spend money for the purpose. He was now on his way to Ottawa and they would communicate with him in regard to it.

Permanent Centre.

G. W. Nickerson then introduced the resolution. He said that the people here looked at this matter from different angles. Some thought the place too far out. It was important, however, that they establish a centre for all time. Mr. Hull, as an engineer, reported that it was the only place and there should be no question about endorsing it.

Marine Ways.

Another scheme which might be made a part of the larger one was the establishment of a marine ways, boat building and repair plant. Mr. Thomas had the establishment of such a plant in view at that point. A road could be built to it for less than \$2,000 and the railway ran through the property. The advantage to the fishermen would be that they would have a place which they could call their own. Most of them were quite willing to adopt it and they admitted it was the most suitable place.

Capt. Rorvik and H. St. G. Lee also endorsed the proposal and the resolution was carried unanimously.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title can be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown land in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

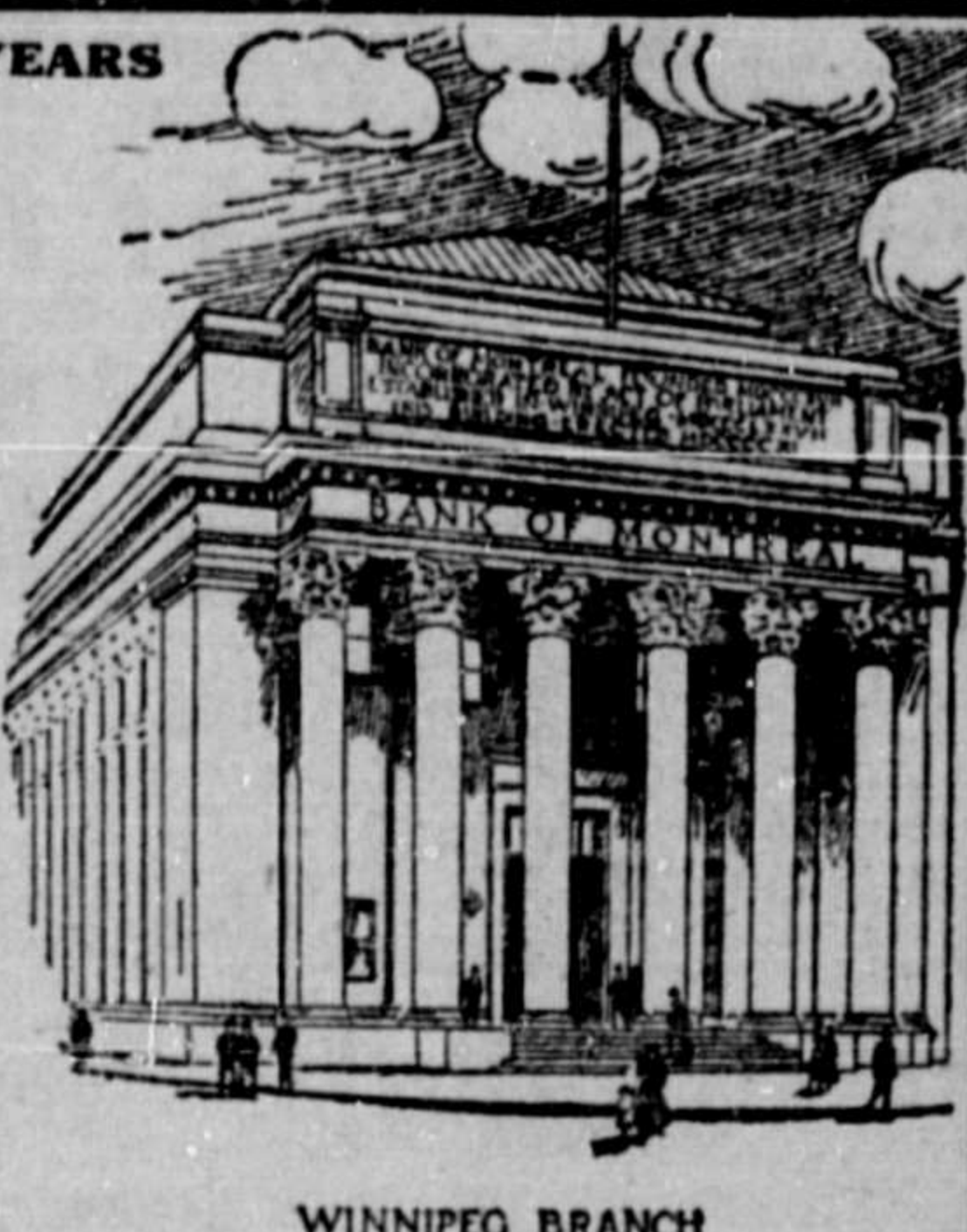

ANYOX COKE PLANT TO OPEN

June 1 is Date Set for Commencement of New Industry at Granby Smelter.

That labor conditions are better in the West than in the East, especially in the United States, and that eastern capital is looking favorably upon its western mining investments, and without fear of "Bolshevism," is the opinion expressed by F. M. Sylvester, managing director of the Granby Consolidated, who has just returned from a business trip to New York, where he held several conferences with copper and other mining interests.

Upon his return from the metropolis of the States, Mr. Sylvester announced that it was expected to open the Anyox coke plant by June 1.

Labor has been going forward rapidly to Anyox to man the plant, two furnaces have been blown in at the smelter, and the mine is working. The coke plant, which will manufacture scores of by-products, will be the only one of its kind on the Pacific coast, and will give added employment to many men.

Mr. Sylvester said: "Labor conditions, generally speaking, are better in the west than in the east. It appeals to one who has studied conditions in the labor world both east and west quite recently that the western laboring man has a saner view and a better idea of economic conditions and is disposed to co-operate more fully in maintaining business conditions on a favorable basis."

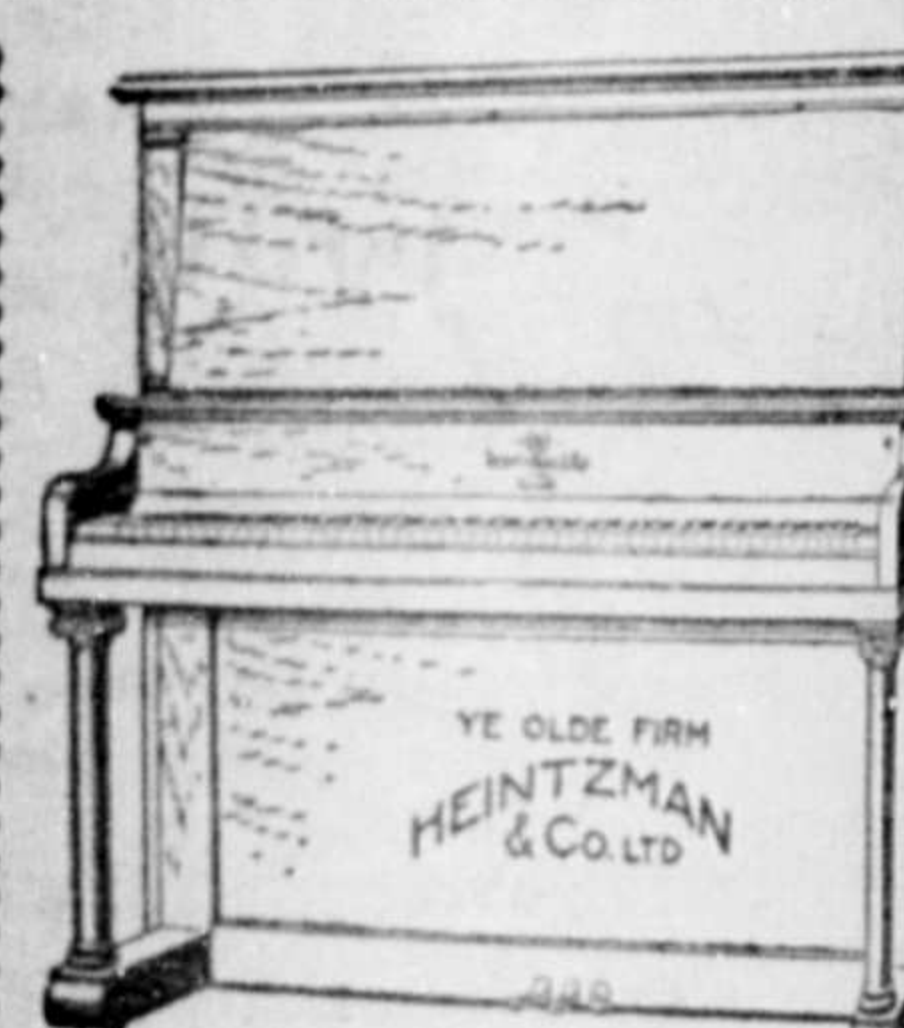

DOMINION HOUSING PROPOSAL DISCUSSED

Matter Left for the Finance Committee of the City Council For Report.

At the meeting of the City Council last night a letter was received from T. D. Pattullo further explaining the proposals in regard to loans to soldiers and widows of soldiers for house building.

Under the scheme the municipality must enter into an agreement with the Provincial Government to administer the fund under rules and regulations to be mutually agreed upon. The scheme for South Vancouver was enclosed and also a copy of the bill under which the Provincial Government is authorized to undertake the work. The points of likely difference of opinion arise chiefly over the matter of security and building regulations. In South Vancouver, for instance, no lot must be smaller than 50 feet by 120 feet, a wise provision, but unhappily under the conditions existing here it would be unworkable.

The proposal is left with the Finance Committee for a report.

In the Letter Box

NOW THE TIME TO BUILD

There appears to be considerable doubt as to the most opportune time to build, with a general impression that lumber and building materials will undoubtedly take a drop in the near future, and some people are endeavoring to persuade themselves that it will be wise for them not to go ahead with building operations this season.

W. B. Wilson, Secretary of Labor for the U. S. Government describes the situation as follows: "The belief that building materials are to be much cheaper may keep many men from getting into construction this spring. But to any man who feels that these materials are to become cheaper I would say, 'What is the foreign market on building materials?' The answer is that the foreign market is unprecedentedly high. What is the foreign market on labor? Higher than ever before in the history of the world. What is the production of building materials? Production has been practically nothing in Europe for four years and nothing here for two years. There is a decided under-production. What is bound to be the demand sooner or later? The demand is bound to be the heaviest in the history of industry, for the rebuilding is without end and we are years behind in new construction.

"Prices are up 60 per cent above normal pre-war prices on building materials. Prices on all materials, including building materials, are up more than 100 per cent. Prices on materials exclusive of building materials are up 109 per cent. Building materials have been much less affected by war conditions than have other materials. They have been less affected because there has been less demand for building materials. Now that a great demand logically may be expected, would it seem reasonable that these materials should go down?"

We in Prince Rupert are not the only ones feeling the acuteness of the housing situation, the same condition exists in every city or town of any importance from coast to coast. It is also

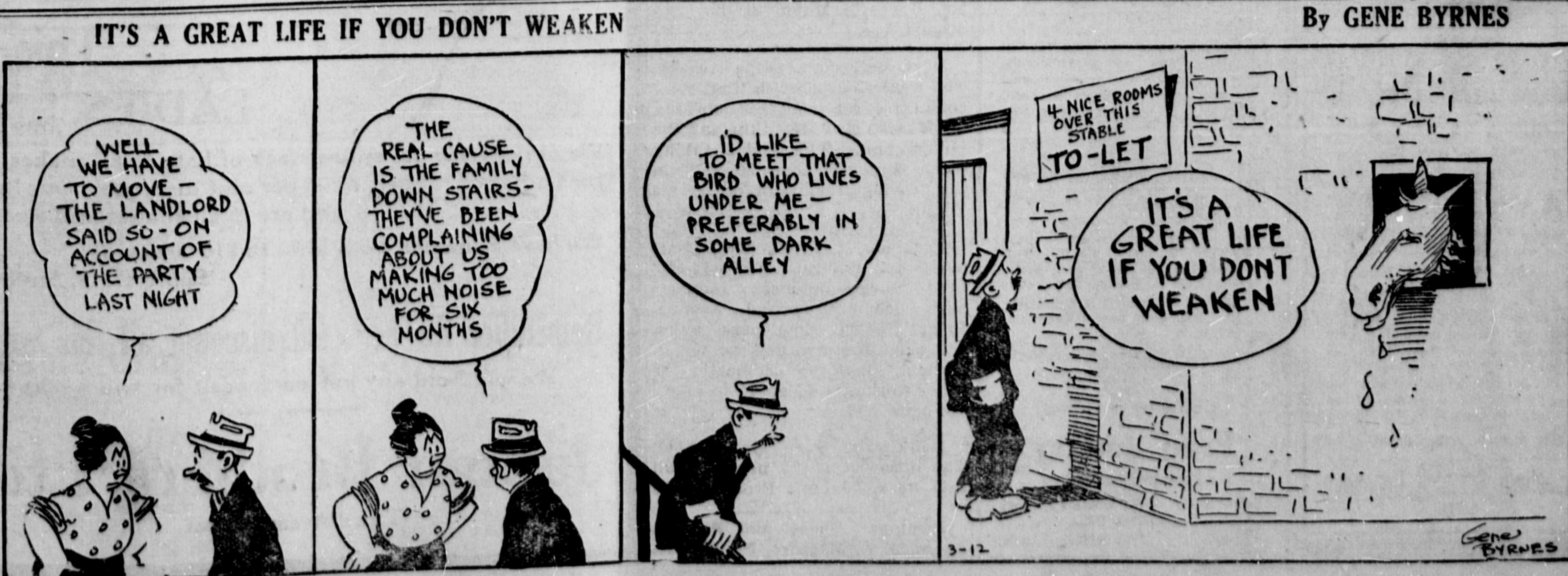
