BOLSHEVIKS MASSACRED 2,000 CIVILIANS IN AND NEAR THE TOWN OF OSA

**VIET CALLED MEETING AND PREPARED LIST OF THOSE
TO DIE—MAN SHOT BECAUSE HE LIVED
IN A BRICK HOUSE**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Omsk, April 16.—Indisputable evidence of a massacre by the bolsheviks of more than 2,000 civilians in and near the town of Osa has been obtained by Messrs. Simmons and Emerson and Radolph Teusler of the American Red Cross, who have just returned from Perm, Osa and other reoccupied Russian territory. The murders were without provocation and the victims were largely thrifty and intelligent classes, or servants of the church. It was announced that the intention of the bolsheviks was to exterminate.

A blacksmith was required to make 5,000 roubles and because he did not he was shot. A man was shot because he lived in a brick house. All attorneys and doctors were killed and doctors' servants were not required to be disposed of in similar manner.

The soviet called a meeting and prepared lists of those who were to be shot.

PLACE WILL BE SIGNED SOON

**Plenipotentiaries Invited to Meet
Versailles April 25; Nearly
All Questions are Settled.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, April 15.—A statement by President Wilson on behalf of the Council of Four says: "Questions of peace are so near a solution that they will be finally drafted. The agreement was contained in an official bulletin which added that the plenipotentiaries had been invited to Versailles April 25. The President hopes the question of Italy, especially that relating to the Adriatic, will be settled by a speedy agreement. The Adriatic question will be given precedence over other questions."

Agreements belonging especially to the treaty with Germany, the president says, will thus be got out of the way, and at the same time other settlements will be completely formulated.

CAPT. MCGREGOR, V. C., ARRIVES

**Terrace Man Who Left as Private
But Returns a Captain After
Winning Many Honors.**

**MILITARY CROSS WITH
BAR AND D. C. M. ARE HIS**

Among the arrivals from the south on the boat this morning was Capt. McGregor, V. C., D. C. M., who also was the winner of a military cross with a bar. He is a quiet unassuming officer hailing from Terrace, but according to all accounts his work was wonderful.

Capt. McGregor left as a private with the 2nd C. M. R. He was very soon in France and was first heard of when he won his D. C. M. at the Somme for machine gun work.

The Military Cross was obtained for skill and bravery when in charge of a raid at Hill 70, where he was very successful and brought in a large number of prisoners.

The bar to the cross was awarded for carrying an airman off the field between the lines under fire of rifles and machine guns of the enemy, with the utmost bravery and coolness.

The Victoria Cross, the crowning reward of the military man, which distinguishes him above his fellows, was won for work at Cambrai.

Capt. McGregor was a platoon mate of Jack Cargill of this city and the latter recalls that on the occasion of Dominion Day sports five or six years ago the Victoria Cross man beat Cicut-Col. McMordie at putting the shot.

A DOVE OF PEACE TO SUIT EVERYBODY.

DUBLIN NOW IN A STATE OF SIEGE; MILITARY GET MACHINE GUNS READY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Dublin, April 16.—This city is virtually in a state of siege, following the establishment of martial law. Barbed wire entanglements and machine guns have been placed at strategic points and armored cars are being used. The military authorities are taking every precaution to avoid surprise and to prevent any armed uprising.

There is at present no change in the general strike situation. All communication with outside points is cut off except under militia passes.

SIX MONTHS AT OKALLA FARM SITUATION IS FULL OF PERIL

**Rose McCoy and Mina Roberts
Convicted of Theft of \$200 by
Judge Young.**

Rose McCoy and Mina Roberts, who were charged with the theft of two hundred dollars on April 10, were each sentenced to six months' imprisonment, with hard labor, at the Okalla Prison Farm by Judge Young this afternoon.

The Judge said he sympathized with the accused very much, but as part of their evidence varied from that given in the police court he found it his duty to sentence them.

Some finger print data was furnished by Constable Bailey of the city police, which record showed that Rose McCoy had on two separate occasions been fined for disorderly conduct in Vancouver.

**Lloyd George Asks That Those
Trying to Do Their Best
Be Let Alone.**

London, April 16.—Lloyd George before the House of Commons today replying to criticisms said that the situation was still full of perils for all countries. He pleaded that those trying to do their best be let alone. There was a great gathering of members and visitors early. The Prince of Wales arrived and took his seat in the distinguished visitors' gallery where the foreign diplomats were accommodated.

OLD HICKORY MINE OWNER HAS RETURNED

**Tells of Visit to California Where
Interest is Taken in British
Columbia.**

A. J. Kelch, owner of the Old Hickory mine at Usk, arrived on the Prince Rupert this morning. He has been wintering in California and was in San Francisco during the meeting of the mining Congress, where he was applauded for a talk on the mining resources of the North Central B.C. He says that A. T. Rickard, an eminent mining engineer, editor of the Scientific Mining Press of San Francisco, who gave an interesting talk at the mining convention at Vancouver recently, with Professor Folsom of Stanford University and three other mining engineers, will visit this district soon.

Mr. Kelch says he is glad to be back. He is returning to the Old Hickory mine which he intends to work this summer.

PARLIAMENT DISCUSSES MILITARY ADMINISTRATION BUT NO ACTION IS TAKEN

**SIR EDWARD KEMP AND SIR THOMAS PERLEY VIGOROUSLY
DEFENDED BY ACTING PREMIER AND
GENERAL MEWBURN**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, April 16.—The overseas administration of military matters engaged the attention of the House yesterday to the exclusion of other business.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux precipitated the debate. He dealt more particularly with charges made by Brig.-Gen. Smart, Col. Pratt and other officers who on their return to Canada during recent weeks made complaints against the overseas administration. He urged the appointment of an Imperial commission to inquire into the whole question.

Major General Mewburn referred to the fact that he was not responsible for overseas administration. He was quite prepared, however, to defend the officers against whom charges had been made. He announced Sir Edward Kemp's return to Canada soon, who will give a full report of his administration.

Sir Thomas White vigorously defended Sir George Perley and Sir Edward Kemp. He described Sir George Perley as the most capable man with whom he ever transacted business. The acting prime minister promised that an inquiry will be granted if any member of the House on his own responsibility as a member would make the charges. He declared the officers at Argyll House were doing the work at a great sacrifice.

Sir Sam Hughes said the cause of the first friction in England had been because of "kow-towing" to young subordinates in the War Office. The debate petered out and no action was taken.

GORDON HEAD BERRIES BOUGHT FOR THE EAST

James Wagstaffe, head of the firm of Wagstaffe's, Limited, the largest manufacturers of jams in Canada, when in Victoria a few days ago purchased 150,000 lbs. of strawberries from the Gordon Head Fruit Growers' Association for delivery this season. He will ship these berries back to his plant in Hamilton and manufacture them into jam there. This is the first time that an eastern manufacturer has purchased Vancouver Island berries, but Mr. Wagstaffe stated that it has been found necessary to do so, because the western manufacturers, using the famous Gordon Head strawberries, have been putting up so fine a product that they have been able to invade the eastern markets shipping as far east as Toronto. This has forced the eastern manufacturers to come out here to get the Gordon Head strawberries to improve the quality of their product.

Dr. Thomas of Victoria, returned this way last night, after several years spent as an officer in the Army Medical Corps with the Canadian forces overseas.

Captain Betts, of the Fish Oil & Products Co., Ltd., here, returned to town this morning from Vancouver, whither he had been on a business visit.

RUSSIA IS NOT IN FAVOR WITH DOUKHOBORS

**Peter Veregin Says Colony May
Go to South Africa or
Australia.**

Grand Forks, April 16.—That conditions now existing in Russia do not look inviting to Doukhobors in Canada, and that in leaving this country they would probably go to Australia or South Africa was made quite clear by Peter Veregin, head of the community of Doukhobors, in a discussion of the matter of their removal with the Reconstruction Board.

ROYAL COMMISSION

Ottawa, April 16.—Hon. N. W. Rowell in the House of Commons tabled an order in council which determines the scope of a royal commission which will commence an inquiry into industrial conditions. The resolution recommends that the commission be appointed immediately.

Capt. Alan Morkill, formerly of Oak Bay, Victoria, who recently returned from overseas service, has been appointed manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Golden, B. C., and will leave Vancouver during the week end to assume his new duties. Capt. Morkill is a brother of D. B. Morkill, mining engineer, who is well known in this city.

Germany Proposes New Kind of Soviet.

Judging by the dispatches which arrived yesterday the only difference between the Soviet Government proposed by Germany and the present government of Canada is that here the members are elected from districts, whereas there it is proposed to elect them from the various trades and professions. The result of the latter system would be that no calling would be over represented while others which today are not represented would have members of their trades or professions in the legislature. In spite of all that it would be found, just as it is found today, that the men who would really rule would be those who were most astute or who had the confidence of the people generally.

Lenin rules Russia today. He deludes the people into the belief that they are doing it, but he knows and the outside world knows that Lenin is almost absolute. He is the player with the chess board in front of him and he sacrifices a pawn or a more important figure on the board whenever it suits his purpose. It would be about as near the truth to say that the chessmen won the game as to say that the people of Russia govern.

Great Movie Actor On Another Stage.

Sidney Drew, the movie actor, is dead, but his work will remain for many a year. He lightened many a heart with his humor and did more real work than many a man who really fancied himself an uplifter. To do real clean work in any walk of life is the best uplift or reform that any man can accomplish. There are a few that move nations by securing legislative enactments, but the great majority influence their neighbors for good or ill by their work. Drew was a clean worker. He brought much enjoyment into the world and left it the better for his having lived.

Council Alive to Need for Sports.

The City Council seems to be alive to the need for encouragement of sports and games in the city. At their last meeting they gave the Works Committee power to go ahead and improve the athletic grounds so that all the young people may be able to have the use of it. Football, baseball, cricket and tennis will be seen this year at Acropolis Hill. Tennis players have already been out several times and the football teams will meet there on Friday afternoon. Baseball among the seniors will have an opening day later. Cricket is talked of among the Englishmen here. The City Council has promised to do its part so that all may enjoy themselves.

Rush Northward Similar to Early Days.

A man who is in close touch with transportation affairs remarked last week that the present movement northward was greater than it had been since the early boom days of this city. Now the development is along industrial lines and seems destined to continue. As a result of the pressure on transportation the steamer Prince George is being hurried back to the run a week earlier than was intended. Big financiers are looking this way. Workers and businessmen are coming. It is the day of prosperity.

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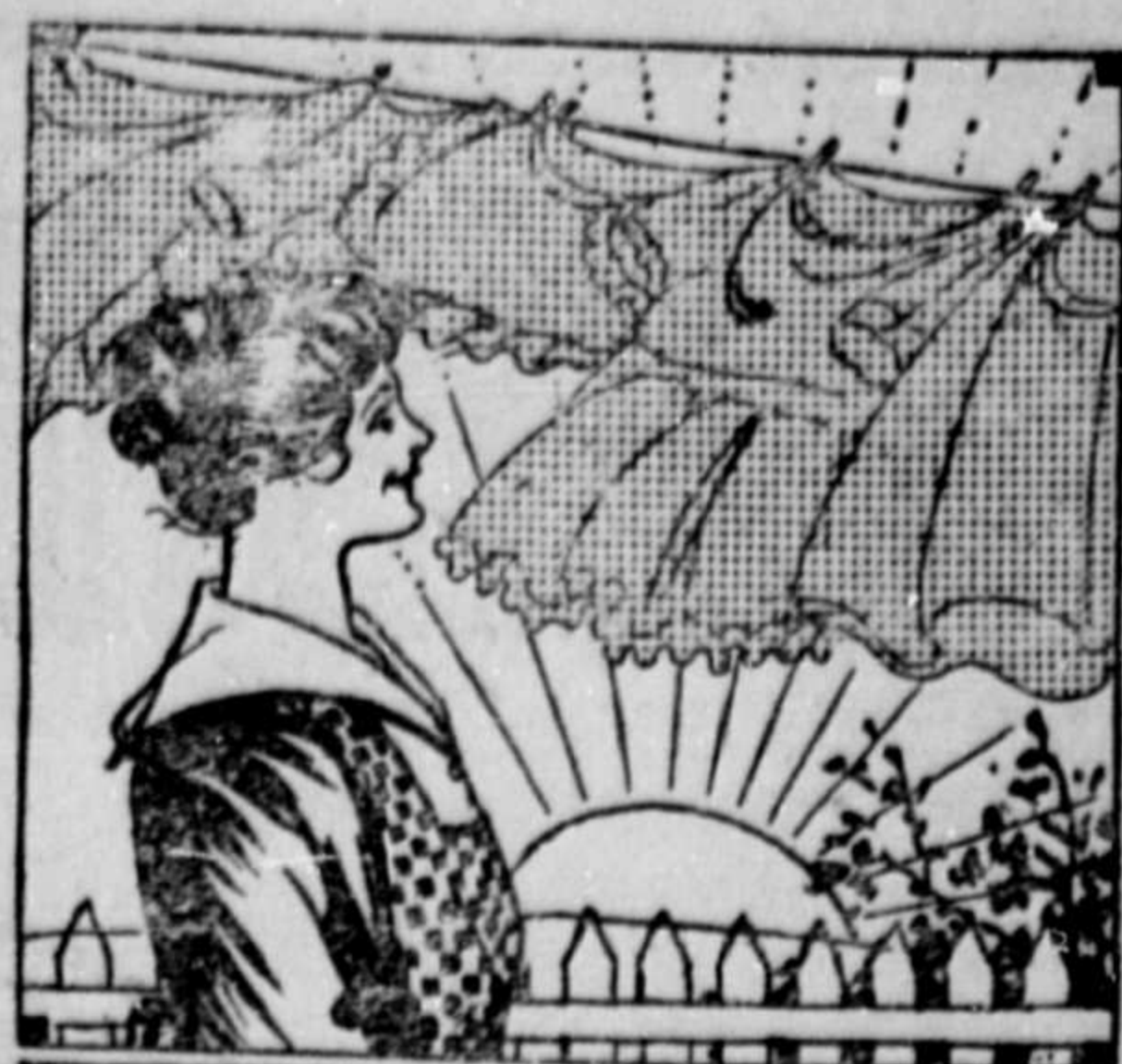

NEW EVIDENCE IN THEFT CASE

Lost Pocketbook Was Picked Up On Street by Fisherman Who Is Now Away.

Rose McCoy and Mina Roberts, accused of stealing \$200 from Julius Johnson and who were committed for trial by Magistrate McMullin, appeared before Judge Young yesterday afternoon and elected for speedy trial. The evidence for the prosecution was given, Johnson telling of having been out driving with the girls and of missing the money. Mr. Willett of Lipsitt Cunningham & Co., told of having paid the money to Johnson.

Some new evidence was put in by Constable Duff and others. According to the evidence, on the morning of the 10th Constable Duff had given him from Cary Johnson of the Knox Hotel a pocket book which was recognized as being the property of Julius Johnson, in which he kept his money, and which he claimed to have lost.

Fisherman Finds Book.

It appeared that early on the morning of the 10th a fisherman by the name of Jacobson, who is now out on a fishing trip, while going to work found this pocket book somewhere near the Windsor Hotel in the mud and handed it to Carl Johnson, who recognized it to be the property of Julius Johnson.

Signs False Name.

Evidence was also produced to the effect that on the morning of the alleged theft, the accused, Rose McCoy and Mina Roberts, together with the two car drivers, Walter Gormley and Fred Syrotuck, procured rooms 10 and 12 at a rooming house on 3rd Ave., of which a Chinaman by the name of Sing attended the register. Walter Gormley signed for himself and Fred Syrotuck, who were to occupy one of the rooms, and Rose McCoy signed herself Mrs. Leonard and sister.

Also it was admitted in the Chinaman's evidence that on that particular morning the girls handed him a sum of money which they asked him to keep for them and for which he gave them each a receipt. After the girls had given their receipts back and received the money the police procured these slips from the Chinaman to be used as evidence.

The case was adjourned until this morning. W. E. Fisher appeared for the prosecution and L. W. Patmore for the defence.

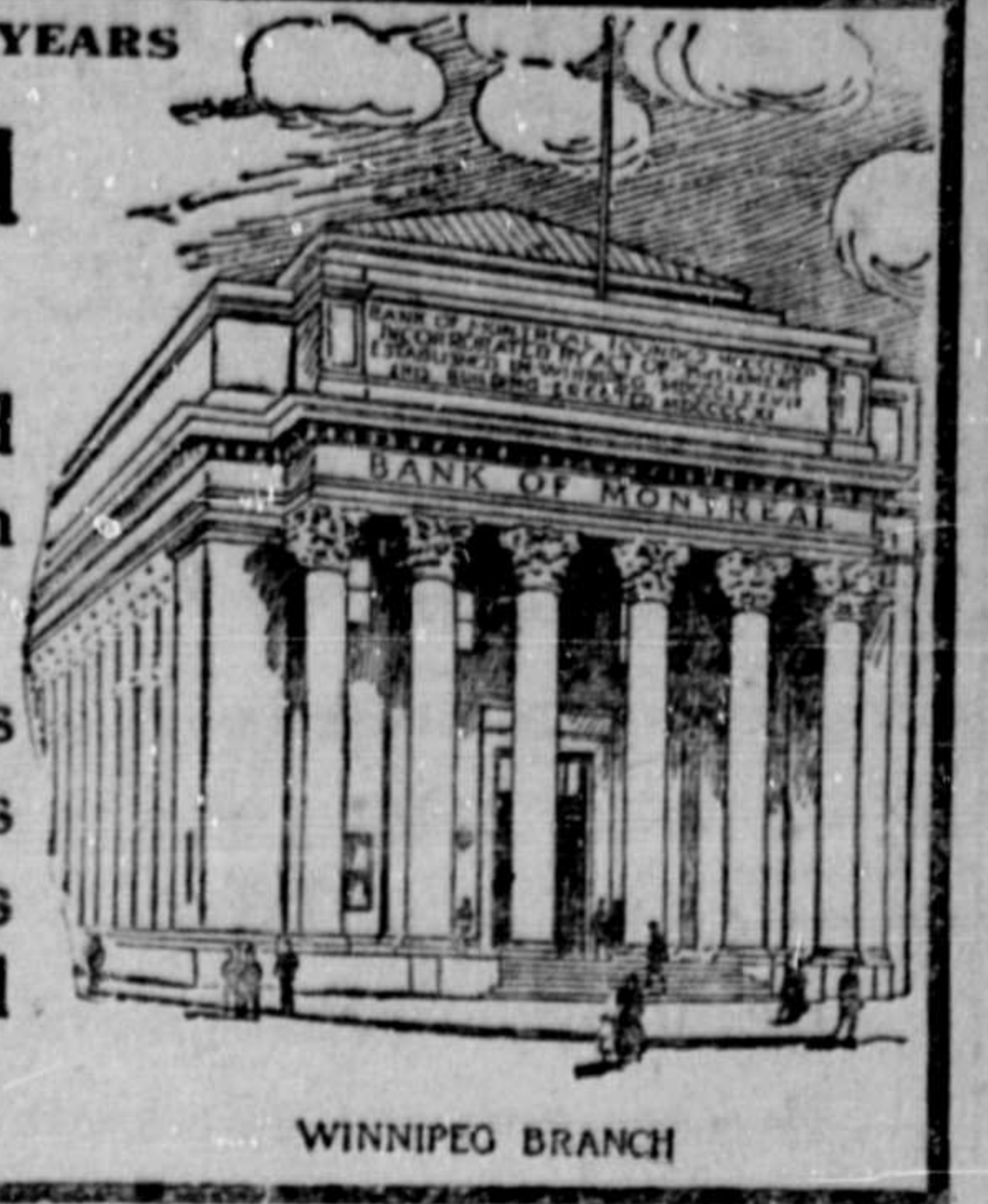

AEROPLANES TO BE BUILT IN JAPAN

New Market Created for Sitka Spruce Should be Taken Advantage of.

The Canadian Trade Commissioner at Yokohama reports that it has now been decided to build aeroplanes in Japan and that 600 will be constructed this year. The engines will be imported, but the fuselages will be constructed entirely in Japan. The Commissioner adds:
 "This will mean a new market for Canadian aeroplane spruce and also for the many materials and parts necessary for aeroplane construction, such as wire, screws, bolts, nails, forgings, stampings, turn-buckles, varnish, aluminium, rubber and 'dope,' etc."

The latest issue of The Weekly Bulletin of the Department of Trade and Commerce contains inquiries from firms in Japan for quotations on aeroplane spruce and aeroplane accessories. The Trade Commissioner warns that, as the authorities intend to begin their aviation campaign at once, Canadian exporters should lose no time in answering these inquiries.

HERRING DRIFTER IS SUGGESTED TO OPERATE ON COAST

Advisory Board of Six Members Asked By Fishery Section of Vancouver Association.

Pointing out the increasing importance of the herring fishing industry to British Columbia, the fishery section of the British Columbia Manufacturers' Association has appealed to the department of marine and fisheries, urging that a steam herring drifter be obtained by the department and put into operation on this coast.

The fact that the herring during the summer months frequents the inshore waters of the Alaskan coast but forsakes the inshore waters of this coast, has been pointed out to the department, as well as the necessity for devising some means of overcoming the disadvantage which the herring fishing industry in this province is subjected to.

Should the department accede to the request, the drifter will be engaged the whole year round seeking new fishing grounds. One local firm has endeavored to carry on this work itself, it is pointed out, but has had to abandon it after spending something like \$30,000 on the work.

LAND ACT AMENDMENT SYNOPSIS OF

PRE-EMPTION now confined to surveyed lands only will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished. but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with Joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.
Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per acre, and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.
Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 500 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
 The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.
