RETURNED SOLDIERS OBJECT TO APPOINTMENT OF GALE UTILITIES COMMISSIONER

MASS MEETING IN VANCOUVER DEMANDS CANCELLATION OF APPOINTMENT AND RESIGNATION OF THE GOVERNMENT—POSSIBLE REVIEW OF SITUATION

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, April 19.—Providing a special steamer can be chartered, the Vancouver branch of the G. W. V. A. will proceed to Victoria in a body next Tuesday morning to wait upon the Provincial Cabinet to protest against the appointment of Mayor Gale as utilities commissioner and other appointments made by the Government in which the claims of returned soldiers have been ignored.

At a mass meeting at the Old Court House Square, resolutions calling for the cancellation of the appointment of Mayor Gale and the resignation of the Provincial Government in view of the feeling against recent appointments to public offices were presented and carried unanimously amidst enthusiasm.

Captain Whittaker charged the Victoria authorities with a gross breach of faith in the appointment of Mayor Gale.

Victoria, April 19.—There is a report in circulation in returned soldier circles that a cabinet minister had intimated that the whole question of the appointment of Mayor Gale of Vancouver as Utilities Commissioner would be reconsidered next week by the cabinet. It was stated that one soldier's name put up to the Government for consideration was Lieut.-Col. J. A. Clark who left in command of the 72nd and is now Brigadier General Clark, D. S. O., commander of the Seventh Brigade.

Yesterday four boys, wandering along the shore of the harbor not far from the Salt Lakes, found a lifebelt with the word "Galiano" printed on it. They left it on the beach but are going over to fetch it today.

The boys who found it were Elmer Smith, Harry Ward, Willie Lambie and Theodore Hainvarson. It was near Picnic Bay.

This lifebelt must have been carried by the current or wind from the region where the Galiano was wrecked last fall to the south of the Queen Charlotte Islands.

POLITICAL UNREST IN SOUTHERN SLAVONIA

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Trieste, Italy, April 19.—A new proof of the political unrest prevailing in Southern Slav territory and the difficulties being encountered in organizing the new state is furnished in the perplexities of the constitution of the kingdom of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes. The official journal of Belgrade publishes the full text of the constitution of the new state promulgated by the council of ministers in the name of the king, Peter Karageorgevitch.

The impression given among the Croats and Slovenes was exceedingly unfavorable, because a few days later, after the text of the constitution had been copied, even in some newspapers in Zagabria and Laibach it was sequestered and withdrawn from publication. This provoked a tempest of criticism and the question today is as far from settlement as ever.

TAMING THE WILD ASS.

SHIPBUILDING PREPARATIONS AT VICTORIA

One Slip Completed and Other Being Prepared—Not Far Ahead of Rupert's Yard.

Victoria, April 18.—One of the slips at the new shipbuilding yard of the Harbor Marine Company is nearly completed and the other one is started. The steel is expected here any day. This yard is the one that is to build the two 8,100-ton steel ships similar to those which are to be built at Prince Rupert. The contracts were originally let to C. H. V. Spratt of the Victoria Machinery Depot, but that concern found the job too big for it and tried to turn it over to the Foundation Company. Again the deal fell through and finally a new company was formed known as the Harbor Marine Company with Spratt at its head. This is the company that is proceeding with the work. The yard is located on the old Songhees Indian Reserve.

Already many thousands of dollars have been spent and at present about 125 men are employed, the wages paid being the same as at Coughlan's yard at Vancouver, and plenty offering. A large fabricating shop 300 by 100 feet is being erected and the machinery for it is arriving.

RESIST EVICTION BY FORCE IF NECESSARY

Regina, April 19.—Four officers who are tenants of houses which have been sold to a German, have been given eviction notices.

The Great War Veterans have decided that they will demand that the officers be given necessary time in excess of the legal notice to find accommodation and will resist eviction by force if necessary.

C.P.R. TO HAVE AIR SERVICES

Big Railway Corporation Takes Steps to Keep in Line With Modern Transportation.

Ottawa, April 19.—Notice is given in the current number of the Canada Gazette that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company will apply for an act of Parliament authorizing it to establish, maintain and operate services by aircraft between points within or without Canada.

Air travel is now being recognized as the most modern method of transportation and the C. P. R. seems to have been the first of the big transportation firms to look upon it as a practical method which might be made auxiliary to the railway and steamship systems.

NOT GUILTY OF RIOTING AT KINMEL

Gunner R. W. Burton Released From Double Charge—Defended by Capt. Geo. Black.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, April 19.—At Kinmel Camp Court there was a case against Gunner R. W. Burton charged with joining in a mutiny by combining with other soldiers to resist lawful authority and to destroy the property of No. 2 camp, Kinmel Park. There was a second charge of having used violence to a superior officer. Gunner Burton was found not guilty on all charges and re-released.

Pte. Charles Sherstotoff, a Russian, pleaded not guilty to charges of joining in a mutiny and striking a superior officer. By arrangement with the Agent General for British Columbia, Capt. Geo. Black, former Commissioner to the Yukon, defended the accused.

GREAT BRITAIN HAD IMPORTANT SECRET SERVICE

Much Work Done By Branch of Which Little Has Been Generally Known.

One branch of effort by Great Britain during the years of war, and before that too, of which nothing official was ever permitted to be known to the public was the Special Intelligence Department. Better known as the Secret Service in the pages of fiction in which it has figured largely of late years, it has accomplished wonderful things, from over which the veil has been lifted for a moment by Brigadier General George K. Cockerill, C. B., M. P., in his farewell message to the staff over which he has been head since 1914.

From Small Beginnings.

"The Directorate of Special Intelligence, to give it the title by which it is best known to you," said Sir George, "grew from small beginnings. When the war broke out it consisted of three General Staff officers (all of whom at once joined the Staff of the British Expeditionary Force), and a special bureau of four officers which in the five years preceding the war had been instrumental in tracing and exposing many of the activities of the German Secret Service in this country and in bringing number of its agents to trial. "as soon as war was seen to be inevitable a scheme for censorship of British cables was put into operation. This scheme was prepared with such remarkable prevision that it has never been found necessary to modify its principles in any important particular. These two services — viz., the contre-espionage and the cable censorship were designed to safeguard our naval and military secrets and to discover those of the enemy; and every new organization intended to assist in defeating the enemy's spy system naturally came under his control.

So rapidly did the work extend and the necessary staff expand, that in March, 1915, the branch was reorganized as the Directorate of Special Intelligence, whose function it has since been to expose and frustrate the clandestine activities of enemy agents under whatever form they might be encountered. Being thus charged with duties of supreme national importance, the Directorate has gradually attained a size never contemplated in peace, and actually numbers today over 6000 persons. It is, in point of mere size, the sixth largest Department of the Government. But so silently and unobtrusively has it worked that its very existence is almost unknown to the general public.

Spies Quickly Arrested.

The detection and conviction of enemy spies has been your primary business. It is satisfactory to note that in most cases the arrest of the spy has followed quickly upon his entry into this country. You have been in point of fact the chief agency in preventing the leakage of naval and military information. To mention but a few instances of your success, the withdrawal from Gallipoli, the construction of tanks, the preparations for the offensive at Cambrai, and also for the counter-offensives which destroyed the German armies, were all known to numbers of people in this country, but were concealed from the enemy. There is I am informed on the best authority, no evidence that enemy submarines have ever received information of the departure of shipping from British ports. Thanks largely to your efforts, no act of destruction or incendiaryism has been committed by enemy agents in this country. This is the more remarkable when the number of enemy aliens at large is considered. You have obtained information of incalculable value to the Naval Intelligence, the Military Intelligence, and the War Trade Intelligence Departments. In the opinion of the Minister of Blockade, your work has contributed in a very large degree to the satisfactory working of the blockade and, so far as the suppression of enemy trade is concerned, the information provided by you has been the most valuable acquired from any source during the war as a means of detecting enemy merchandise carried as neutral goods in neutral ships. The significance of this statement will be better appreciated when it is added that the estimated value of prize cargoes, exclusive of ships, is over £30,000,000. You have, moreover, stopped enemy remittances to the value of about £70,000,000, and you have completely destroyed the enemy's overseas communication, so far as they were vulnerable.

One branch of the Directorate of Special Intelligence has prepared and published the "Daily Review of the Foreign Press," with its many supplements, political, economic, and technical; another has been responsible for the study of enemy methods of propaganda. One small section not content with closing certain channels of enemy propaganda, has kept others open for the express purpose of distributing British propaganda in enemy covers on which the postage has been paid by the enemy. Military material suitable for our own propaganda has been collected, prepared and distributed by balloons on the British fronts. Tribute to the startling effectiveness of your work in this connection has been paid by the chief of the German General Staff himself, who in a recent order made specific reference to certain leaflets, all of which were prepared in and distributed under arrangements made by the Directorate of Special Intelligence.

INTERNATIONAL FOOTBALL GAME ENDED IN DRAW

Both Teams Show Good Form in Opening Match of the Season.

The first football match of the season took place yesterday afternoon at the exhibition grounds between the Sons of England and the St. Andrew's teams, resulting in a draw.

Although the weather was very disagreeable, causing only a small crowd to be present, it did not stop the players from showing their ability.

During the first half, the Sons of England had the advantage of the wind at their backs, which was reversed at the second half.

Defence Strong.

The rain having abated a little at the start of the game, the players commenced with great enthusiasm, special notice being taken of the way in which the backs and half-backs of the Sons of England held their own. These were their main support, as the forward line unfortunately was not extra strong.

The goal-keeper, C. Youngman, of the Sons of England, deserves special mention for the skill shown in stopping the repeated onrushes of the opposing team.

Fine Play.

The St. Andrew's team, with W. R. Martin as goal-keeper, did some exceedingly fine playing, and the Scots' forwards several times put the hearts of the Englishmen into their mouths when making forward rushes. Skillful playing on the part of the Southerners was needed to stop the repeated attacks, which might have proved fatal if the backs and half-backs had not come into action at the critical moment.

One disadvantage in the game was the rough condition of the ground, causing a great deal of avoidable discomfort to players.

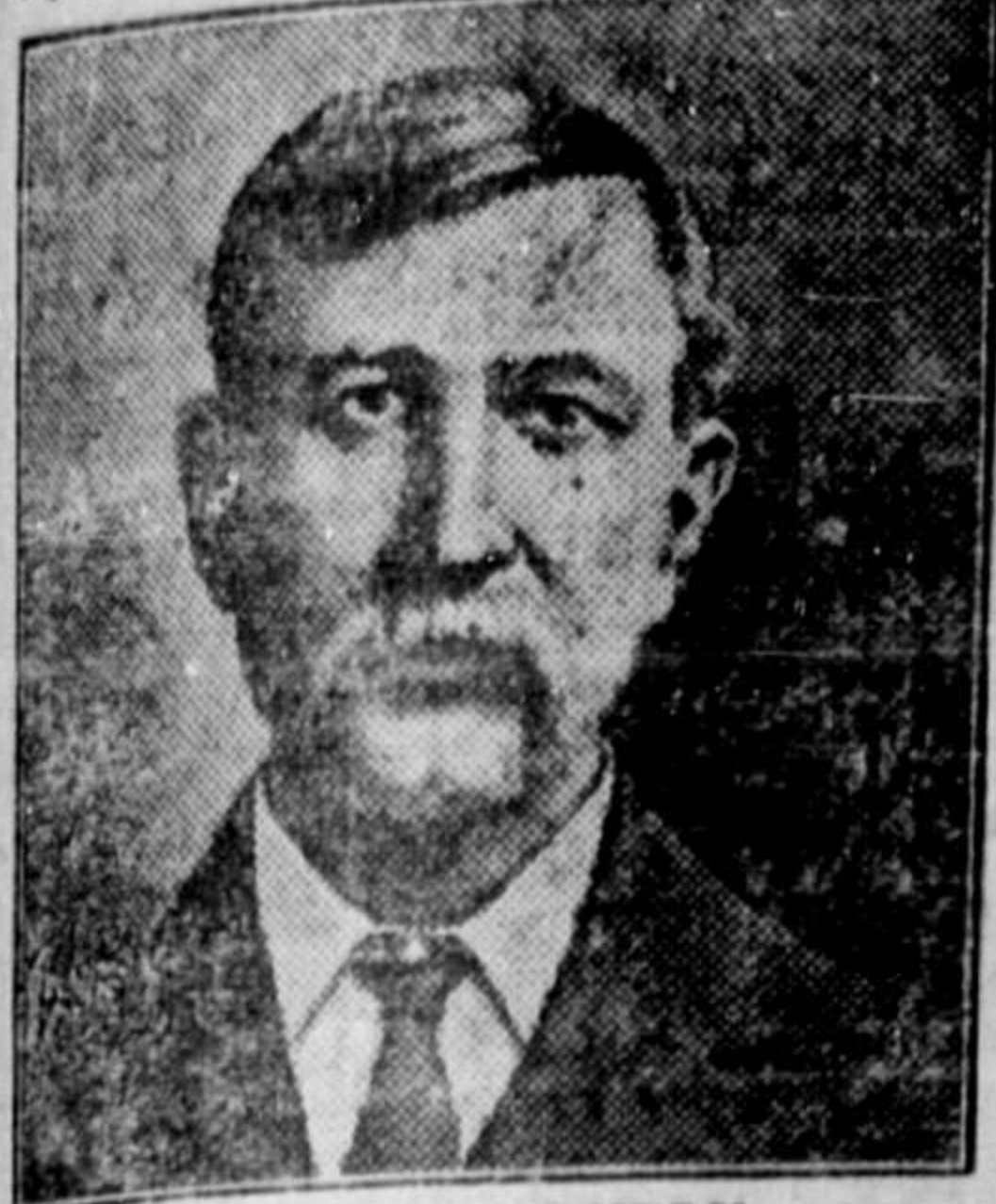

PROGRESS MADE ON SLIPWAYS

President J. L. Mullen Gone East On Business But Will Return In Few Weeks.

J. L. Mullen, president of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., left this morning for Pittsburg and New York on business in connection with the firm. He expects to return in about three weeks' time.

Before leaving Mr. Mullen said he was well satisfied with the progress they had been making. Plans were now about ready for the fabricating building which is to be erected here and progress is being made on the excavations for the slips. Starting had been a little slow but now they were getting ahead. Steel should begin to arrive before long.

The fabricating building, Mr. Mullen said, would be of wooden construction but well built and permanent in character. It would be located at a point convenient to the slips.

Machinery.

Speaking of the machinery and plant he said that most of the fabricating machinery would have to be purchased in the United States as the Canadian firms would not guarantee delivery under about eight months. The engines and boilers and other machinery for the ships, however, would be all made in Canada if it seemed a pity, he thought, that Canada could not supply everything.

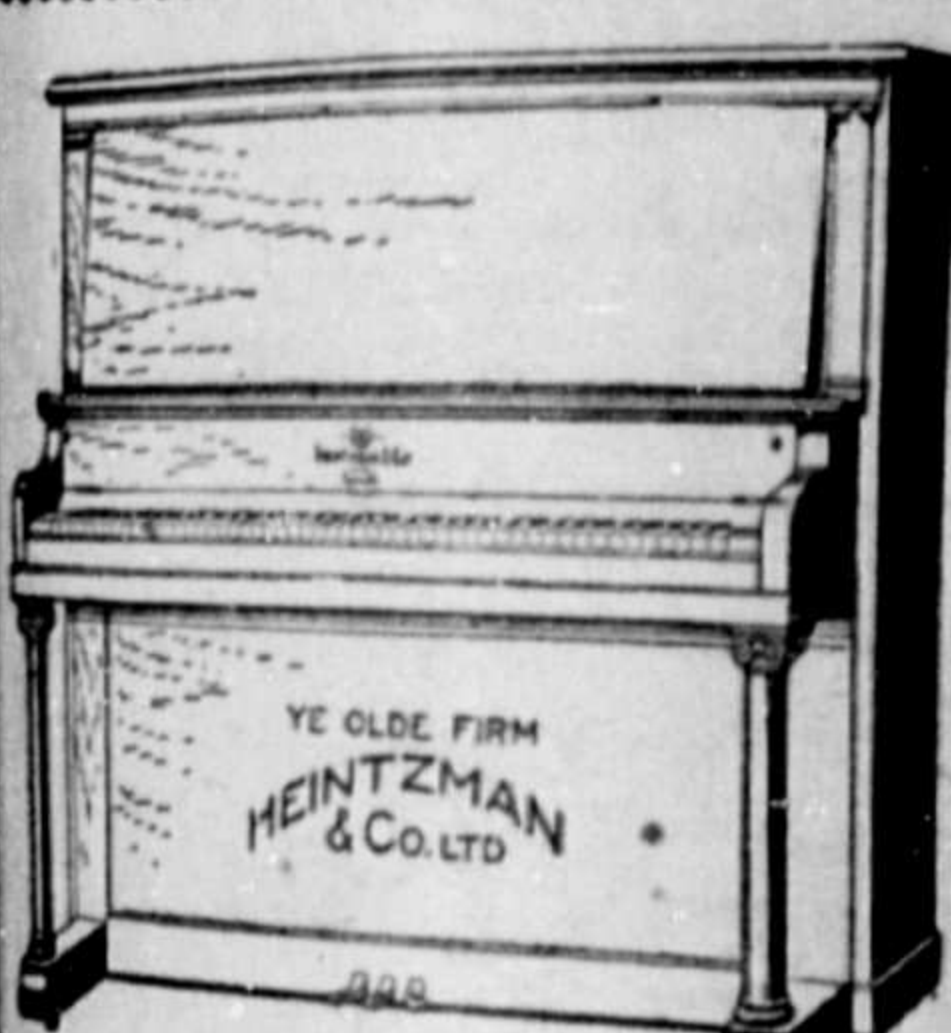

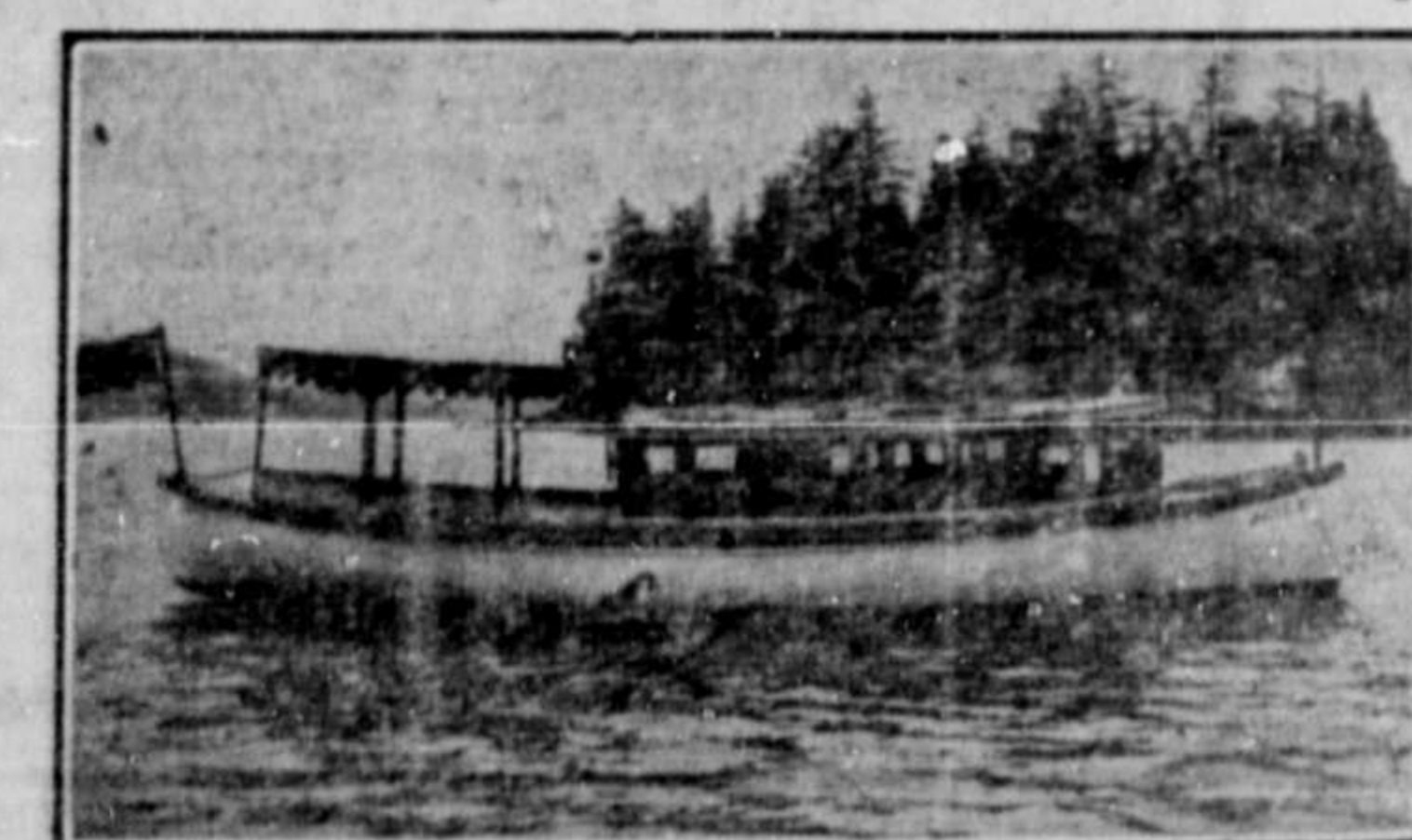
