JAPANESE GOVERNMENT URGED BY PRESS OF COUNTRY TO SECEDE FROM THE LEAGUE—BRITAIN IS BLAMED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Tokio, April 21.—Declaring that Japan should secede from the League of Nations and that the principles of humanity underlying the league are falsehoods, the Japanese press are unanimously attacking Great Britain and demanding a Monroe Doctrine for the Orient.
The outburst was occasioned by the publication of the news from Paris that the League of Nations had rejected the Japanese amendment providing for the principle of the equality of nations regardless of color or race.
Japan has insisted from the first that she must be treated as an equal. She is the only Oriental nation represented, but her material aid to the Allies and her adoption of modern methods of Government and the development of the country along modern lines are given as what she considers good and sufficient reason for her recognition as an equal with western nations.

SEBASTAPOL IS EVACUATED

Eight Days Armistice Arranged, Expiring April 25—Retiring to Constantinople.
(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, April 21.—Sebastopol has been evacuated by the Cretan Government which is proceeding to Constantinople.
Sebastopol is now in the hands of a revolutionary committee. The announcement is made by a Russian wireless despatch which adds that, after negotiations with the allied command, an agreement has been reached for an eight days' armistice, expiring April 25.
Early in April the Allied troops were driven back in the Crimea, when Bolshevik forces captured the city.

PROTEST AT ADMISSION OF HINDU WOMEN

Hon. J. W. deB. Farris Says It Means Hindu Population of Fifteen to Twenty Thousand.
A note of protest at the action of the Ottawa Government in passing an Order-in-Council permitting the wives and children of Hindus now residing in British Columbia to enter here, has been sounded by the Hon. J. W. deB. Farris, Attorney-General and Minister of Labor. He said that the lack of criticism with which the alteration in the law opening British Columbia to the Hindus had been received suggested that there was "a conspiracy of silence" on the matter, and he expressed the opinion that it was necessary for the public, private citizens, the newspapers and all labor and public organizations to make themselves heard in a protest against what he termed the new Asiatic menace.
Ottawa's Previous Orders.
Reviewing the history of British Columbia's problem with the Hindu, Mr. Farris pointed out that in order to protect the Province from being flooded by Hindus, the Government of Canada had, in previous years, been obliged to pass restrictive Orders-in-Council providing that East Indians could only enter here by direct steamer route, and prohibiting the further landing of Hindu women. As a result of these restrictive measures the Hindu population had been reduced to about 3,000 men, a number which Mr. Farris added, was found ample under present conditions in British Columbia, having regard to their non-assimilable characteristics.
"Now at the time when European immigration is restricted and when it is of greater importance than ever to keep the Hindu population already here lessened, the new Order-in-Council sweeps away one of the most effective barriers from an excess of Hindu population," asserted the Attorney-General.

Wanted for Ottawa.

"I have been withholding comment on the matter," Mr. Farris added, "feeling that it would be better first to have the issue raised by our Dominion representatives now at Ottawa. But I have been waiting and waiting in vain for any protests from them, either in the House of Commons or elsewhere. I have also been surprised at the fact that there has been no comment publicly in other directions. I feel that this is a matter of such vital importance to Canada and to British Columbia particularly that somebody must speak out. It is estimated," proceeded Mr. Farris,

GERMANY MUST SEND REAL REPRESENTATIVES WHO ARE TO BE TREATED AS ENEMIES

ITALIAN DIFFICULTY STILL LOOMS LARGE IN NEGOTIATIONS GOING FORWARD AT PARIS—CLAIMS FULFILMENT OF SECRET TREATY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, April 21.—The Council of Four has notified Germany that the associated powers cannot receive representatives at Versailles who are merely messengers. The German Government must appoint representatives with plenipotentiary powers.
According to the terms of orders Marshal Foch is to have received, the German plenipotentiaries are to be treated as enemies until the treaty is signed and anyone communicating with them will be subject to prosecution before a court martial on a charge of dealing with the enemy.

Italian Difficulty.

Paris, April 21.—The Italian issue over the Adriatic has reached an acute stage, where a decision one way or another cannot longer be deferred and a decision either way may be fraught with serious consequences.
Despite Easter, the Council of Four continued its sessions.
Italian Premier Vittorio Orlando and Italian Foreign Minister Baron Sonnino were both present and made it known that the opening of the Italian Parliament on Wednesday has necessitated their leaving Paris Monday with the definite knowledge of what is going to be done. Baron Sonnino continues insisting upon the integral fulfillment of the secret Treaty of London, giving to Italy the entire Dalmatian coast, and islands and also claiming the city of Fiume without internationalization or division with the Jugo-Slavs.
"that there are 3,000 Hindus in the Province today, and with the modest allowance suggested in the Order-in-Council of one wife to each Hindu, together with their existing families of children, who are also to be allowed to come in, it will only be a few years at most before this province will have a Hindu population of 15,000 or 20,000, who will multiply with each generation."
"It seems to me," added the Attorney-General, "that the slogan of British Columbia today must be that this province shall not be allowed to become the cradle for Orientals; especially now when the labor situation is intensified and we are facing the enormous task of assimilating our returned men into industrial life is the Order-in-Council illimed."
Wants Public Action.
"British Columbia is the garden of Canada. Her position on the Pacific coast of Canada makes her a possible dumping ground or immigration both from Europe and Asia, and we must protect ourselves against such incursions—the present all the more dangerous because of the apparent 'conspiracy of silence' which is reigning over the Order-in-Council of March 28."
"My object in making this statement at the present time is in the hope of stimulating the public mind to an appreciation of the situation, so that the private citizens, the press and the organizations of public-minded citizens will make representations immediate and urgent to our Federal representatives, and to the Dominion Government, demanding the repeal of the Order admitting Hindu wives and children to aggravate and perpetuate the Hindu problem in British Columbia," said the Attorney-general in conclusion.

MINE SWEEPERS ARE SOLD TO PHILIPPINES

Halifax, April 21.—Of the 149 mine sweepers sold to the Anderson Company of Montreal six have already been disposed of to the Government of the Philippine Islands.
Although the boats were built as mine sweepers they are well fitted for fishing in the deep seas. They cost a considerable sum but are now being sold for an average of \$7,000 each.

Air Service By the Railways.

The C. P. R. is applying for permission from Parliament to establish air services in Canada and adjoining territory. This big transportation corporation is recognizing that air transportation is some to stay and is likely to become a popular means of travel.

Doubtless other lines will follow the C. P. R. and any new railway charters that may be granted will have included in them the right to establish air lines. The Dominion Government, as the owner of one of the big lines of railway will have to step in line and establish air services where necessary.

Native Paper Very Interesting.

The pupils of the native school at Hyaburg, Alaska, are publishing a paper known as "The New Native," dealing almost exclusively with Indian affairs. It is a bright sheet of four pages, four columns to a page, is all set by hand and contains a good deal of advertising.

Suggestions for native industries contained in the editorial columns are that oars and yellow cedar chests should be manufactured. That also applies to Prince Rupert. We look to learn a great deal from "The New Native" and must congratulate the Indians of Hyaburg on their production.

Question of Titles Still a Live One.

The question of the granting of titles to Canadians by the British Government was discussed recently at Ottawa and referred to a special committee of the House of Commons to consider. There was a great deal of interest taken in the question and the vote on it was close, the motion to refer to a committee being carried by 71 to 64.

The Government leaders seem anxious to postpone action until such time as their friends have been properly provided with handles to their names. They have shown this by making recommendations for titles. This may make it necessary for Parliament later to forbid the use of all titles in this country.

Psychopathic Inferiority.

A copy of the Immigration Amendment Act shows that persons of "constitutional psychopathic inferiority" are debarred from entering the country.

Reference to Webster's dictionary shows that psychopathic indicates abnormal sensitiveness to spiritual phenomena or being characterized by extreme susceptibility to religious emotion, conscientious doubts and fears. A person who is subject to hallucinatory ideas in regard to religious matters may be classed as psychopathic.

A person must not be too religious or in other words he must not take his religion too seriously else he would be odd and not acceptable to the powers that be. If Jesus of Nazareth were to apply he would, in all probability, be promptly turned down as one of psychopathic inferiority and would be sent home to his own country at the expense of the transportation company.

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LLOYD GEORGE GIVES ADVICE TO WORKMEN

Says Britain Must Give World Example of Civilization as It Has Done Before.

"I will say to the employers that they might get temporary advantage which might end in their ruination. It has got beyond merely getting temporary triumphs. If they want the whole fabric of society to endure they must look at the long run; they must see that the foundation of the social structure is secure. They are not. There is a great deal of what is rotten beneath them. They have to underpin the foundation of the state."

This was the admonition which Premier Lloyd George gave to the Joint Industrial Committee which was recently elected at the National Industrial Conference held in London earlier in the month. He stated that he was about to attend the peace congress which he hoped would settle satisfactorily the peace of the world.

"On the other hand," he continued, "let me say a word to the workers. What has happened in Russia, and what may happen in Germany shows they are the class whom anarchy suits the least, because they are suffering inconceivable horrors in these countries, where they appear for the moment to be triumphant. A small section may be doing well, but the vast multitude of the working classes there are suffering unimaginable distress. Therefore, what is needed is a prosperous community, with a prosperity ensured for all. See that the stream of prosperity irrigates the whole land, and that there are not barren, storm-swept passages where nothing grows, and where life withers, but something that irrigates the land and enriches it for everybody. That is a state of society where we can all live and enjoy life, with a knowledge that everybody else is participating in the enjoyment of life."

"I am not going into the various problems before you, the problems of wages and the problem of hours of labor. It is a mistake to keep men working longer than is absolutely necessary for an efficient discharge of the duties of the trade. On the other hand, we must have to deal with foreign competition, but we have to produce an adequate supply for distribution amongst the whole of a great community of 45,000,000 people. There must be a limit both ways, and what you want is to find exactly where the legitimate boundary is."

Must Increase Productivity.
"I should like to say another thing, if the workmen will allow me, and I know it is a very delicate task because they are conscious of it, and they are suspicious for good reasons. The employers can help to remove that cause of suspicion. I am convinced that the future success and prosperity of this country depend upon increasing its productivity. You have got to do it. Of course, there is a great deal of waste in the organization of industry. I saw enough of that in the organization of the ministry of munitions to know; at any rate that there was a good deal of unnecessary waste. When we had to put pressure on, and everybody did his best, and all manufacturers were pulling together as they did somehow or other, we were able to get a bigger output. Well, I am sure it is possible by scientific methods, by better organization, by having a complete understanding with the working people, and making them feel that where they will get their fair share of it, to increase the prosperity of the country."

An Enormous Debt.
"Where the charges have gone up, and the charges on the state have gone up—we have a debt of £8,000,000,000—and the wages have gone up, the cost of living has gone up, and that is an increased charge. Where the charges have gone up they must be met somehow, either by saving or by increased productivity. I should like some sort of dead level of talk—if you will allow the phrase—between workmen and employers upon that topic. Let each of them tell the other exactly what their views are, and do not take offence so readily. It is better that the employers should speak out quite plainly what is in

their minds. I am perfectly certain that no workman would resent that, and I am equally certain that if the workmen say exactly what is in their minds the employers would rather hear it. (Hear, hear.)

"The world is in a state of convulsion and unrest and I would not like to predict what will happen in the next year or two. Russia has gone to pieces and the reports we are getting from there are reports of inconceivable suffering. We are getting appeals not so much for arms as for food, because the people are dying by hundreds of thousands. I am sorry to say the symptoms are that Germany is going to pieces also. There is a lack of cohesion; there is a lack of definite, clear indication of the way in which that country is going to march and the suffering is there and is beginning to be very acute and it is spreading.

Will Save Civilization.

"I should not be a bit surprised if this old country, not for the first time, will be the land that will save civilization in more senses than one—(hear, hear)—and I should like you to do it, but it will only save civilization if all classes feel that civilization here is on the basis of justice and fair play to all. There must be a sense of confidence in the minds of all classes that they are getting what is right and what is just from the community, and the appeal I am going to make to you here today is this: You are really a peace congress, you are settling the future of this country, but you may be doing more than that; you may be settling the future of civilization; you may be making a model for civilization upon which all lands will turn to you and say, 'Let us follow Britain.'

"It is not the first time that Britain has given the principles upon which liberty and democratic government have been settled in other lands. I want you to do something here, so that all lands in their despair will turn once more to Britain and say, 'See how they have settled things there. They have settled things in such a way that justice has been done to all classes; all classes are contented. Grievances have been removed, wrongs have been redressed, and a new country has been built up. Let us follow the example of that little island in the sea once more.'"

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.
Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or records same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.
Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may recede after pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.
Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown on to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1910. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.
