The question of the granting of titles to Canadians by the British Government was discussed recently at Ottawa and referred to a special committee of the House of Commons to consider. There was a great deal of interest taken in the question and the vote on it was close, the motion to refer to a committee being carried by 71 to 64. Nine Unionists voted for immediate settlement of the question by the House, seven of them being of October, 1917 (the date on which the Liberal Unionists.

The Government leaders seem anxious to postpone action until such time as their friends have been properly provided with handles to their names. They have shown this by making recommendations for titles. This may make it necessary for Parliament later to forbid the use of all titles in this country. There cannot be a true democracy where a few people are set on a pedestal by proposed action on my part. their political friends, the merit usually being purely a monetary Rupert, B. If titles are to be sold, the best method is to put them up to auction and knock them down to the highest bidder and let -the proceeds go into the coffers of the state rather than to replenish party funds.

A copy of the Immigration Amendment Act shows that persons of "constitutional psycopathic inferiority" are debarred from entering the country.

Reference to Webster's dictionary shows that psycopathic indicates abnormal sensitiveness to spiritual phenomena or being characterized by extreme susceptibility to religious emotion, conscientious doubts and fears. A person who is subject to hallucinatery ideas in regard to religious mattters may be classed as psychopathic. From all this it would seem that any person who has a wrong thinkery of any kind might be kept out of the country, which means of course that he must think as we do, or as the majority do, else he is not made welcome.
