GERMANS HAVE ACCEPTED THE ALLIES' TERMS

They Will Have Plenipotentiaries in Attendance.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, April 22.—The German government has notified the Allies that they are prepared to accept all the conditions on which the plenipotentiaries may attend the peace conference. They will endeavor to act as fully accredited plenipotentiaries and in every way will conform to the regulations laid down by the "Big Four."

The Germans wished to send plenipotentiaries who would have no authority to act, but this the Allies refused. Last night word was received of the acquiescence of the German government in the demands of the Allied governments.

The plenipotentiaries will be sent to Versailles under guard and will be under close surveillance until the treaty is signed.

ROUMANIANS ADVANCING ON HUNGARY

Excitement is Caused at Budapest by News—Appeal To the People.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, April 22.—The Roumanian army is advancing against Hungary where the Bolsheviks are now in control.

Budapest, April 22.—News of the Roumanian advance caused some excitement here. The government has issued a series of appeals to the people to arm themselves and complete the revolution which is now declared to be in great peril. All reserve officers and soldiers have been ordered to join the Red army immediately and every effort is being made to organize a view to repelling the invaders.

MUCH DAMAGE FROM TEREDO TO CUT LOGS

Big Loss Will be Occasioned to
Aeroplane Spruce Estimated
At \$100,000.

Loss to the extent of approximately \$100,000 has been caused by the depredations of the teredo to spruce logs which were assigned to be cut at the Prince Rupert mill, according to an estimate made by J. Golden, a Government scaler and timber expert who is at present appraising the damage.

Some of the logs are so badly affected that the pulp mill at Ocean Falls will not accept them. They are practically wasted.

The large rafts are being opened and arrangements are being made to store the logs in Silver Creek where the fresh water kills the teredo and stops their depredations.

COMMISSION TO REPORT ON REORGANIZATION OF CANADIAN MILITIA

Prominent Military Men Appointed
To Report After Thorough
Investigation.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, April 22.—A commission has been appointed by the Militia Department to visit every military district in Canada to investigate and report upon a scheme for the reconstruction of the Canadian "peace" militia, which will link up the pre-war and war records of militia units already existing.

The commission is to consist of Major General Sir William Dillon Otter, Major General Sir Archibald C. MacDonald, officer commanding the First Canadian Division; Brigadier General Ernest Alexander Cruikshank, director of the Historical Section of the Canadian militia regiments, and General Andrew G. L. McNaughton of the Canadian artillery corps.

OPTIMISM PREVAILS IN YUKON TERRITORY

Navigation Expected to Open on
River About May 15 to 20.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Dawson, April 22.—Great optimism prevails here and throughout the Yukon on account of the extensive preparations being made for the Klondike dredging and hydraulic operations which open next month. Several new companies have been formed and the season promises to be a busy one.

One hundred men, the steamboat crews and the shipyard employees for the Yukon River fleet, have arrived at Whitehorse. The first steamboat from Labarge is expected to arrive between May 15 and May 20 and the first through steamers from Whitehorse should arrive about June 1.

RETALLACK IS NEW UTILITIES COMMISSIONER

F. A. Robertson Appointed Chairman of Provincial Returned Soldiers' Commission.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Victoria, April 22.—Major John Ley Retallack, a veteran of the Great War, has been appointed the first Utilities Commissioner for B. C. Retallack served for five years with the Royal Northwest Mounted Police and in 1889 he settled in the Kootenay District. He has had experience in railway construction, banking and mining, corporation accounting and public service. He was at Ypres and on the Somme and during the later stages of the war was at the Canadian Railway Headquarters in France.

The Provincial Government first appointed Mayor Gale of Vancouver as Utilities Commissioner, but owing to the demonstrations of returned soldiers Gale refused to accept the position and the appointment of Retallack, a returned man, followed.

Another appointment made was that of Major F. A. Robertson, D. S. O., of Victoria, to be chairman of the reorganized Provincial Returned Soldiers' Commission. Major Robertson lost his right eye at Regina Trench and his right leg at Amiens.

NEW CUSTOMS HOUSE ON STIKINE RIVER

C. Tervo, of the Victoria customs staff, formerly sub-collector for the outport of Stikine, has been appointed to undertake the erection of a new customs office on the Stikine River.

The new offices will be built about a mile and a half farther up the river than the previous customs house. At this point there is a suitable site and there is water and wood for fuel close by. The steamship men on the river have also indicated the suitability of the spot for landing.

Shortage of Cars Causes Delay in
Discharging—Six Expected
Tonight.

Seventeen fishing schooners are in port today and on account of a shortage of cars, will probably sell tomorrow morning. Six cars are expected in tonight.

The catches of the boats are as follows: The Panama, 60,000; Atlantic, 40,000; Minnie V., 4,000; Tide, 4,500; Muirnac, 5,500; Atli, 6,000; Molly May, 6,500; M. M. Chris, 3,000; Giffen, 9,500; Wanderer, 6,000; Eastern Point, 4,000, making a total of 270,500 pounds of halibut ready to be sold.

WILL LECTURE ON ATROCITIES OF THE ENEMY

R. Crowe-Swords Here on Tour
And On Return From Prince
George Will Give
Address.

R. Crowe-Swords, acting special representative of the Soldiers' Re-establishment, vocational branch, is here in the course of a lecturing tour. He has a double duty, that of depicting from first hand observations the atrocities of the Huns during the war, and also of interesting employers of labor and the public generally in the work of the vocational branch of the department and of educating disabled men.

Mr. Crowe-Swords proposes delivering a lecture here in the Westholme Theatre on Sunday, May 4. He is on his way up the line as far as the boundary of the province and will lecture here on his return.

Speaking of the work with which he is connected, Mr. Crowe-Swords said they were inviting close co-operation between employers and returned men. They were now in a position to supply men in any vocation who were qualified to fill the positions which might become vacant.

Mr. Crowe-Swords is said to be an excellent lecturer and he handles without gloves the matter of atrocities. Before undertaking his present work he was industrial adviser to the Dominion Government under the Military Service Act. He has seen active service both with the Imperial and Canadian forces and is also a veteran of the South African war.

EMPLOYMENT FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS

Many soldiers desiring to farm for themselves find it necessary to work on a farm for a few months to renew experience, to get new experience or to learn a district. They are to be dealt with by the farmer as a farm help, and paid according to their experience and ability by the farmer. Anyone requiring one or more should drop a line to Lieut. R. L. INCREASE TO CAPACITY OF COLD STORAGE

Tenders Being Called for Work
On Completion of Two
Upper Storeys.

Tenders are being called for the completion of the interior of the two upper flats at the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage plant at Seal Cove and it is understood that the work will be proceeded with almost immediately. T. H. Johnson, the local manager, is in the east in connection with this, and while there is nothing authoritative to be said in his absence, it is understood that the work will proceed at once if the cost is not too high and that also the freezing capacity of the plant is to be increased by the addition of powerful machinery which will enable an increased supply of ice to be manufactured.

The improvements which are contemplated will mean an outlay of close to \$100,000 and will increase the cold storage capacity of the plant to from three to three and a half million pounds. This means a great thing for the port as it will enable the plant to handle all the fish that is offered. The installation of new machinery will mean a great increase in the ice manufacturing capacity so that all boats which come here may be able to get their ice right at Prince Rupert. It will solve a difficult problem for the fishermen during the summer months.

The increase to the plant was forecasted in The News last autumn but it is only now that action has been finally decided upon.

SURVEYOR OPENING OFFICE AT STEWART

D. B. Morkill, provincial land surveyor of Vancouver, is opening an office at Stewart May 1. He says that a very keen interest in the reports from Salmon River District is being displayed by mining men from all quarters and predicts that the activity which is sure to follow the present phenomenal developments in that vicinity will materially add to the prosperity of Prince Rupert and district.

Another Concern With Faith in This Port.

The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. has faith in this port. They must have or they would not go to the expense of increasing the capacity of their already large plant at Seal Cove. They intend to spend a lot of money and naturally they expect to get it back.

The news of the addition to the cold storage plant follows the announcement yesterday that another fish buying firm was to open up here. All this means increased business. It is an addition to the development of the shipbuilding yards which it is confidently expected will secure other contracts in addition to those already let.

The application of William Bruce for permission to purchase lands from the city for a terrace of houses is another step along the road which leads to prosperity. It means permanent development and that is what is needed here.

Stewart Development Likely to be Rapid.

The movement toward Stewart is already apparent and is likely to increase rapidly. On another page is an announcement that D. B. Morkill, the civil and mining engineer, is to open an office there, and he will be only one of many who are expecting to go into the district to practice their profession or to engage in business.

Stewart is on the boundary line between Canada and Alaska and the Americans are an enterprising people. Unless we set out determinedly to capture the trade of this district we shall find much of it going to other communities. The businessmen here are alive to the situation but they must work without ceasing to bring the business here if they are to have a full measure of success.

Why Pension One And Not the Other?

Certain sections of the people are constantly asking for pensions. They want to retire from work at a certain age and yet to receive their pay. With the idea of pensions we are in complete sympathy, but why it should be given to a civil servant and not to any other person who works in the service of his country is more than most thinking people can understand.

The man who blasts out rock at the shipyards, who digs the sewers or who goes fishing is just as much entitled to a pension as the man who sits in an office and makes up the accounts in a government office. Both are serving the community equally well and should be recognized accordingly. If the Government takes over the railways there will soon be another set of civil servants who will be asking for pensions. To be sure they should get them, but what about the other people who do not get pensions? Their turn will have to come eventually. Because a person works for a Government or for a corporation is no reason why they should have pensions and others who work for smaller capitalists be neglected.

Sir Thomas White Is Playing Politics.

Sir Thomas White is undoubtedly playing the politician in that he is encouraging the idea that he favors lower tariffs. He intimates through his publicity channels that if only there were no war debt to pay he would come out strong on a reduction. As the war debt has to be paid, however, he cannot do that. In this way he gets the credit for being a tariff reformer and yet he stands pat, and stands in with the manufacturers.

Sir Thomas seems to be making a bid for popularity. He knows that the Unionist Government cannot stand together on an old Tory platform as so many of the members are Liberal Unionists. It is doubtful even if Sir Robert Borden can hold them together very long. With a shuffling of the leadership, however, no one can say what may happen. Sir Thomas was once a member of the Liberal party. While his sympathies and his allegiance are Tory, and were to a large extent even before he changed his colors he is looked on by some people as a possible leader.

Vancouver, April 22.—News of a rich gold strike in the Atlin district of British Columbia, surface dirt paying from 30 to 50 cents a pan, was brought to the city this morning by a Whitehorse resident who reached the city on the steamer Princess Mary. It is expected that there will be great activity in this district this summer as a large number of claims have been staked. The strike was made on the Morley River, a tributary which flows into Teslin Lake, about 50 miles northeast of Atlin.

The strike was made by two prospectors who were grubstaked by Dawson interests.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant. Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his present, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land. Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the allotment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

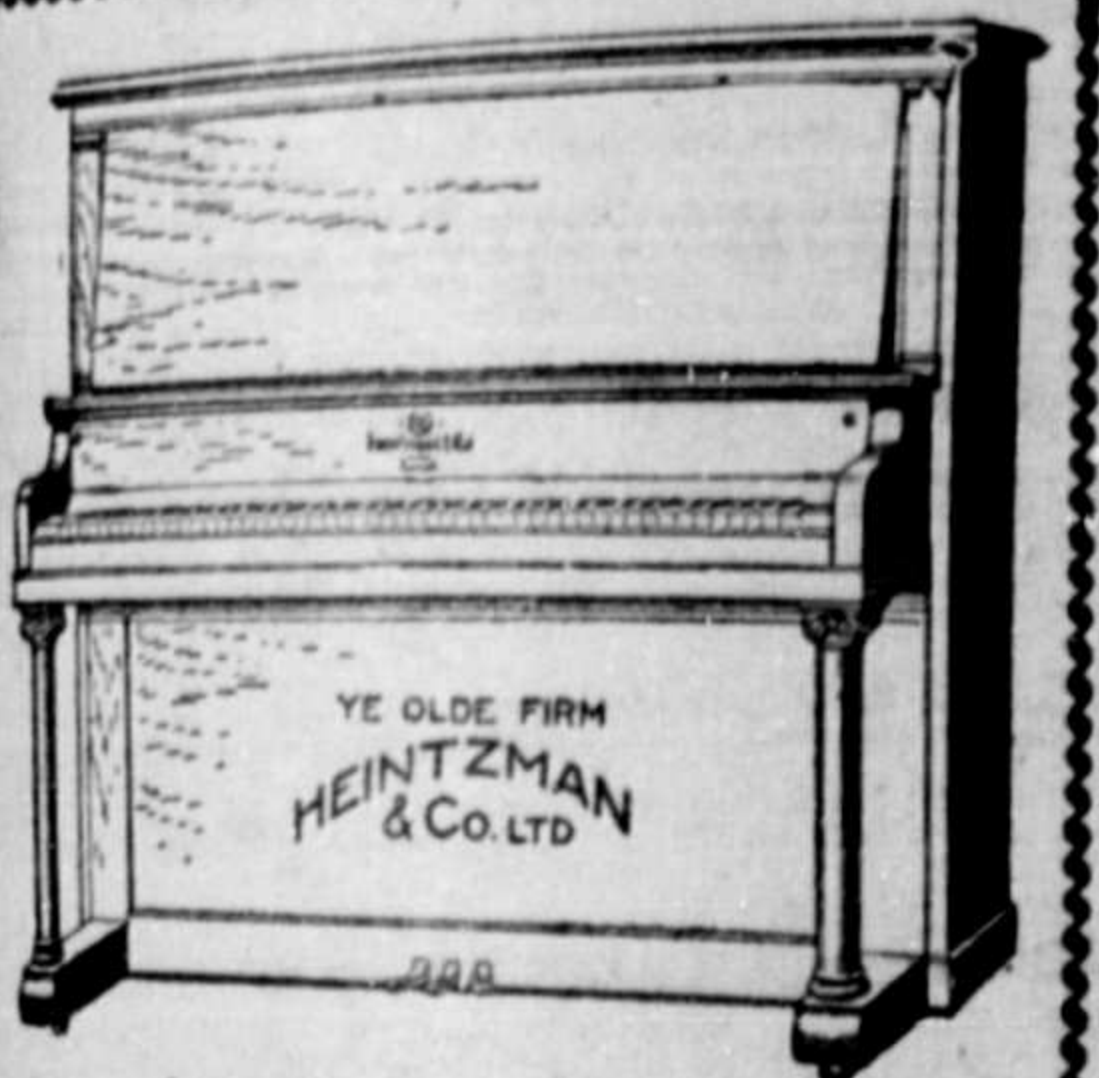

Expect to Start Operations in Two Or Three Days—S. Antonsen Buyer.

A. Antonsen, buyer for the National Independent Fisheries Co., is in the city and expects to start buying fish in a couple of days. The premises on which the Royal Fish Co. is now working, including all the machinery, is leased by the National Independent Fisheries Co.

The company will have its own boats selling here, the King & Winge, which is now out at the fishing grounds, the Constance, and the Scandia, which will add greatly to the amount of fish landed here.

It is understood that the two fish companies will use the same wharf and outfit, but otherwise will be entirely independent of each other.

RETURNED SOLDIERS ARE APPOINTED

Major D. D. Young and Major James Brechin to be Lumber Market Commissioners.

Major D. D. Young, Croix de Guerre with star, and Major Jas. Brechin have been appointed by the Provincial Government to positions as British Columbia Lumber Market Commissioners, associated with the Trade Extension Department of the Forest Branch. This announcement was made by the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands.

It will be the duty of these two officials to cultivate the Prairie and Eastern Canadian market and generally to conduct an aggressive campaign for British Columbia's forest products. It is expected that one of the appointees will make his headquarters at a point on the Prairies and the other in Ontario. The Minister explains that the object the Department has in view is to continue on a bigger and a more effective scale the work originally carried on by Mr. Beale at the Toronto office, the closing of which some two years ago having been determined by the peculiar conditions prevailing at the time.

LATE E. H. HONEYMAN DIED BRAVELY SAYS FRIEND, R. J. CLARK

Honeyman who was killed on the Somme in 1916 says: "It was my good fortune to have known him as a friend and comrade while with us in the 3rd Field Ambulance. We had several views in common which enabled me to get a good insight into his inner nature and so speak of him as I knew him."

"When in the ambulance as a bearer, he was always one of the first to volunteer for anything that turned up, and one of the few who would never complain. Especially was it noticeable on a long tiring march, no matter what kind of weather, he was an example to others for endurance and sticking it."

"He considered he was not doing as much as he ought and so joined the machine gun section of the 16th Battalion. He had been in it six weeks when I saw

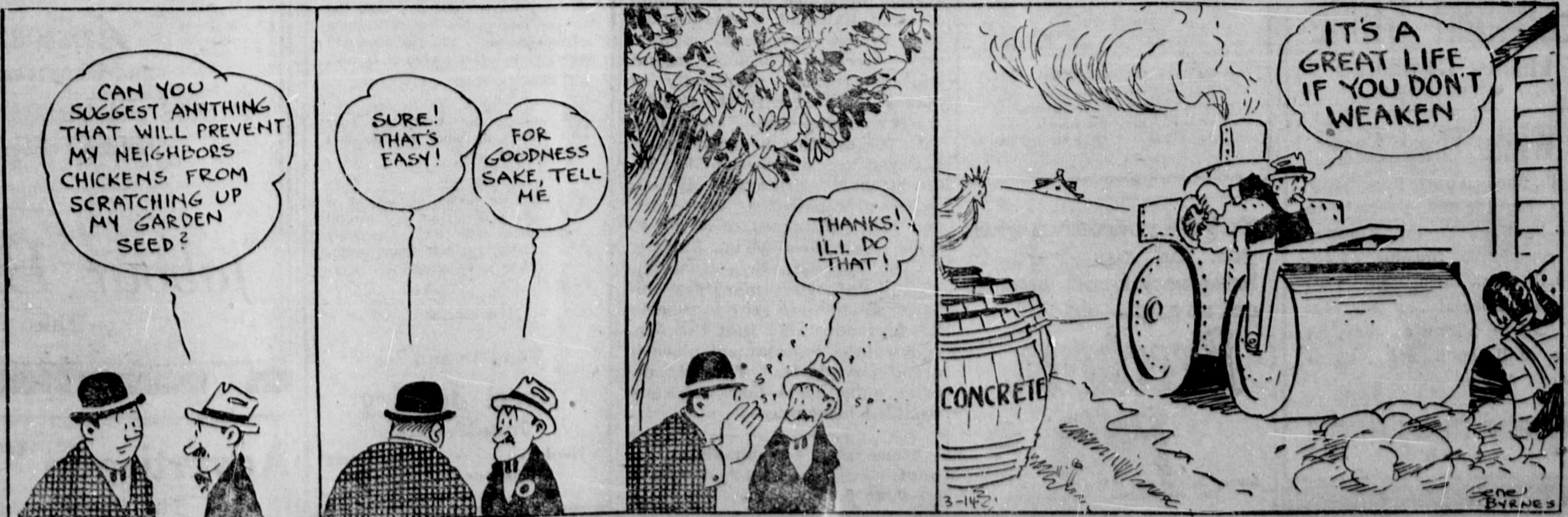

WAS EASY MARK FOR NEW YORK SWINDLERS

Satkatchewan Farmer Tries to Get Rich Quick, But Becomes Suddenly Poorer.

The time-worn wire-tapping swindle with two men, giving their names as A. J. Smith and G. Minter, who had a "tip" on the steel market, cost Fred Seckinger, wealthy farmer of Humboldt, Sask., \$3,900, he told police officials. Five weeks ago Seckinger left Humboldt for Rochester, Minn., where he was to undergo a serious operation at the Mayo hospital. Before the operation he contracted influenza and it was while recovering from this malady that he met Smith, who also had come to Rochester for an operation. They became great friends and Smith confided to Seckinger that he had just made a fortune through his friend, Minter.

One day while they were talking high finance, Seckinger said, they ran across Minter. It was agreed to let him in on a deal if he could produce \$3,900. Seckinger was convinced the men were honest when he saw Smith hand Minter \$1,000 to invest for him, so he returned to Humboldt, drew \$3,900 by increasing his mortgage on his \$40,000 farm, and returned to Rochester. All three then went to Winona, where Seckinger paid over his money. The men asked Seckinger to wait for them while they went inside a building for a moment. He has not seen them since, he told the police. Seckinger left for Rochester where he will undergo the operation.

JAPANESE ARE NOT VERY GOOD FLYERS

"Aviation with the Czech forces in Siberia was a washout," declared Capt. J. A. LeRoy, M. C., a member of the British Military Mission to Siberia, who returned to Victoria on the steamship Empress of Asia on his way through to Ottawa.

Capt. LeRoy was recalled from France seven days before the armistice and ordered to Siberia to take charge of the aviation branch of the Czech forces. Twenty-four aeroplanes were assembled at Vladivostok, but it was found impossible to put them in the field. Owing to the congestion of traffic on the trans-Siberian Railroad it was impossible to get necessary supplies and materials to a base inland, and as a result practically no planes operated with the Czechs.

Upon completing his duties with the aviation branch Captain LeRoy was attached to the international Military Mission, which was instructed to investigate that railway and civil conditions along the Siberian Railway.

Capt. LeRoy saw a great deal of the Japanese machines and flyers which were sent to Siberia. He does not think that the Japanese take a prominent place in aerial navigation. They do not make good flyers and they lack qualified mechanics.
