COLONEL PECK AND B.C. MEMBERS OF UNIT SHOULD ARRIVE HERE ABOUT MAY 12 SHOULD THE PLANS MATURE

Lieut.-Col. Peck is expected to arrive here about May 12. That is the news which is conveyed in a telegram received this morning from Ottawa by Acting Mayor D. C. McRae.

Colonel Peck says he has just received information that his battalion is sailing on April 26 and should arrive at Halifax about May 4. At the ordinary speed of travelling that should bring them to British Columbia about May 12.

Col. Peck further says that he is using his best endeavors to get the British Columbia members of the unit routed by way of the G. T. P. but will not be sure whether or not he is successful for some time. There should be over 150 men in the British Columbia section of the unit.

ENGLAND MUST LEAVE EGYPT, SAYS AGITATOR

Proclamation Issued by Nationalists at Berne Headed by Ferrid Bey.

(Special by G.T.P. Telegraphs.)
Geneva, April 23.—A proclamation issued by a handful of Egyptian Nationalists at Berne, headed by Ferrid Bey, says: "The English must leave Egypt."

Ferrid Bey recently arrived from Berlin and is engaged in spreading religious and political propaganda through Egypt and India. Pamphlets are being prepared at Berne and Constantinople and smuggled across the frontiers the principal object being to start a revolution in the East.

WILL ASK TENDERS FOR CITY LUMBER

Number of Streets have to be Planked and Million and a Half Feet Required.

At the meeting of the City Council last night a recommendation from the engineer endorsed by the Works Committee advocating the planking of a number of streets at a cost of approximately \$700,000 and the calling for tenders for a million and a half feet of lumber for the purpose was referred back to the committee for further report.

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ITALIAN SITUATION REMAINS UNCHANGED

Premier Vittorio Orlando Trying to Arrange Plan of Adjustment With Big Four.

Paris, April 23.—The Italian situation remains unchanged, according to an authoritative announcement after the meeting of the Council of Four. The Italian Premier, Vittorio Orlando, while not attending the session of the Council, had a series of private conferences and arranged a meeting with Premier Lloyd George, with a view to seeking a plan of adjustment.

SONS OF CANADA TO HOLD SPORT EVENT NEXT DOMINION DAY

The Sons of Canada will have control of the athletic grounds on Dominion Day. That was decided upon last night by the City Council when permission was given them to hold sports there on that date. It was suggested that the other societies and athletic organizations would take part. Any money that is made will go to the Returned Soldiers' Memorial fund.

CAR SHORTAGE SENDS BOATS TO SEATTLE

Owing to shortage of refrigerator cars yesterday, four fishing boats, the Panama, with 60,000 lbs. of halibut; Omaney, with 60,000 lbs.; Senator, with 50,000 lbs. and Atlantic with 40,000 lbs. left for Seattle yesterday, where they will sell their catch.

Seven cars arrived on the train last night, but not enough to take care of all the fish.

WILL DESTROY TWO UNFINISHED SHIPS

Will Either Burn Them or Blow Them Up to Make Room For Others.

According to a statement made by Mr. Samuel W. Taylor, Jr., assistant manager of the Taylor Shipbuilding Corporation at Cornwells, Pa., two unfinished cargo vessels now on the ways of the company will either be burned or dynamited in a few days to make room for the construction of ships of an entirely different design, says the New York Journal of Commerce. The two vessels in question are more than 40 per cent completed, the work and material on both representing an outlay of nearly \$700,000.

In addition to these two vessels, which are of 3,500-ton dead-weight type, is still another ship, similarly constructed, which was launched recently. It is learned that the Shipping Board several days ago notified the Taylor Shipbuilding Corporation to discontinue work on the two vessels, and requested the company to devise the best means for getting the half-completed hulls out of the way, as work must be commenced as soon as possible on ships of another type. Thus far the Taylor plant has turned out eight ships under Government contract. According to Mr. Taylor, the ships will either be burned or dynamited to expedite their disposal.

The idea of converting the hulls into craft of another kind is not entertained, as the cost would greatly exceed the salvage. The Taylor Corporation plant has ten shipyards, and the contracts on hand call for more working space than is at present afforded, hence the necessity of getting the condemned hulls out of the way. The ships thus far turned out at the Cornwells yard were ordered by the United States Government at one time on a cost-plus reasonable profit basis, the estimated cost of each being \$750,000. The Taylor Company will be paid by the Government a reasonable price for the two unfinished hulls.

The Government originally appropriated approximately \$4,000,000,000 for ship construction, and it is figured by practical shipping men that if the fleet can be disposed of at a 50 per cent sacrifice the \$4,000,000,000 will not have been wasted, as the balance can be used for the purposes of peace.

BOLSHEVIKI POSITION IS UNTENABLE

Advance of Siberian Army to Within 100 Miles of the Volga River.

(Special via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

London, April 23.—The Siberian army of Admiral Kolchak's Government in making an advance of 190 miles in five weeks on the Ural front has achieved a success which endangers the entire Bolsheviki position in Eastern Russia. The Siberians are now within 100 miles of the Volga, the most important river of Russia, and new successes on the River Kama in the centre of a 400 mile front, make untenable the Bolsheviki positions east of the Volga.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP GIVEN TO CAPT. JOHN MCGREGOR BY THE ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY

ONLY "PLAYED THE GAME," SAYS VICTORIA CROSS HERO IN NEAT SPEECH FOLLOWING PRESENTATION—CLUB CONSIDERS ITSELF HONORED BY ACCEPTANCE

On being presented with a beautiful scroll representing life membership in the St. Andrew's Society by President Macdonald on behalf of the members in the club rooms last night, Captain McGregor said they had indeed paid him a high honor. However, speech making was not his strong point. All the speech making he had done was to soldiers in connection with their duties.

The Captain said he remembered the time when a small party met four years ago and were given a splendid sendoff. It did his heart good to come back and find the same old spirit. He did not know if any of the 33 who paraded then were back. Many of them would return but others had paraded for the last time and now lay beneath the poplars of Flanders or on the fields of France. He hoped all those at home would "play the game" as well as those who had died out there.

Capt. McGregor thanked them all for the splendid time they were giving him. He had done nothing unusual but had just tried to play the game as a good British soldier. There had been hard times over there and although in some ways they did not altogether like the job, it was a pleasure to get out and fight. He was exceptionally lucky in that he had only missed one engagement. He had been wounded twice slightly but anything he had done was just to carry on in the same spirit as the men who had given their all.

Speaking of his experience as an officer the Captain said that he had found that if you treated men as men you got the finest results. He thanked the members of the society for their splendid present which he assured them was thoroughly appreciated.

In making the presentation, S. D. Macdonald on behalf of the society expressed the pleasure it gave them to be the first to have an opportunity to tender Capt. McGregor a reception and to confer on him a mark of their appreciation. There was a small society, but the majority of them had gone to the front, not conscripted, but of their own free will.

In presenting a life membership in the St. Andrew's Society to Captain McGregor, Mr. Macdonald said it was the highest honor they were able to confer, but in this case they considered they were honored in its acceptance. Four years ago Mr. McGregor had gone away as a private and now he had returned to them as a captain, a V. C., M. C., D. C. M., and with a Mons Star. It was a privilege to honor him. As an addition memo of the event they were giving a small pin which they asked him to accept.

Be a McGregor.
"Who would not be a McGregor tonight?" inquired Alex. M. Manson, M. P. P., in opening an address of appreciation of Captain McGregor's services. "We cannot all be McGregors but we can all be proud of our nationality. All belong to the Empire. We delight to do honor to the Captain because he represents the best spirit of the British Empire."

Mr. Manson said it made them wonder sometimes whether the victory was all that it might have been. No greater defeat had ever been inflicted on a nation but the conditions today were not pleasant to look at. Capt. McGregor and the men who had defeated the Hun had defeated for all time that tendency in the U. S. to twist the lion's tail. There was a spirit of comradeship as never before. This was one of the greatest things that had been accomplished. If they learned to treat each other as men the war would have been truly won.

Ontario Housing Book Interesting.

The Ontario Housing Committee has issued a report which is printed as a Government bluebook. It takes up the whole question of housing and gives a number of more or less useful plans. The difficulty with most of the plans is that they are ugly. The artistic seems to have been sacrificed in favor of the useful.

On the Pacific coast most of the cottages and bungalows are very pretty. They may not be economical but they answer the purpose well and they create a good impression in anyone coming into the city for the first time. That is particularly true in the city of Victoria and the suburbs of Vancouver.

Anyone interested in housing might gain a good deal of information from the publication just issued and a copy of it may be seen at The News office by anyone interested.

Difference Between Bolshevik and Man.

What is the difference between a Bolshevik and a man? The difference is purely one of point of view. These two species of the human race stand on a different elevation. One sees the whole countryside and the other only a part of it. One is educated and the other is ignorant.

Many people who are not Bolsheviks also have a limited outlook. They see about as far as a man looking into a mirror. They are self-centred and a self-centred person is always an ignorant person. Many of these dwarfs look on a Bolshevik as useful material for bayonet practice, or as a target for a rifle, and yet the Bolshevik is several leagues in advance on the march of progress along the road which leads to something better. Possibly as a factor in the general uplift of the masses we shall eventually find that the Bolshevik is one of the most powerful that has yet been felt.

Log Destruction Is Great Waste.

The destruction of logs of great value by teredoes is something that might have been prevented. When the logging and mill work closed down in the autumn an effort was made to store some of the logs in safe places. Some of them, however, were left in the salt water and these are the ones that have been injured by teredoes.

The teredo does not live in fresh water, neither will it live in a log that is out of the water part of the time. For that reason the logs are usually stored at the mouth of a stream or on mud flats where the tide leaves them stranded a good deal of the time. That this was not done in this case is the fault of somebody. Had the work been in charge of a commercial institution it would have been looked after, but being for the Government nobody cared. That is the reason Government ownership is a failure.

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PREMIER VITTORIA ORLANDO of Italy.

The despatches on Monday told of some of the difficulties which the Peace Conference was having and mentioned particularly that the Italian Premier, Vittoria Orlando, had to leave for home and must have a settlement of the Adriatic question before leaving. He had to be home for the opening of the Italian Parliament.

Professor Vittorio Emanuele Orlando, Premier of Italy, was born in Palermo, fifty-seven years ago, of one of the old and well known professional families of Italy. In early youth he displayed phenomenal intelligence and activity, and at the age of 22 was appointed Professor of Constitutional Right in the University of Palermo. He held this chair for a number of years. In 1892 he was elected member of the Chamber of Deputies from the province of Partinico and his election has been confirmed ever since. He is considered one of the foremost of the great Italian orators and enjoys great popularity with the entire population of Italy.

In August of last year Orlando addressed the after-the-war commission of Italy upon the prob-

lems confronting the nation and the world. His high-minded breadth of thought is apparent in the following extract from that speech:

"We should consider," said the Premier, "that the country never before has called together such an assemblage of all its vital forces, without distinction of party or class—representatives of parliament, of the administrative bureaus of the state, of the industrial establishments, business and agricultural interests, federations of labor of every kind and tendency, with a sprinkling of men of science and men of action, and a representation of women which represents a sympathetic assertion of new social energies. It is probable that other elements will yet be added.

"Nothing can be judged beforehand. England, and even Germany, which is master of system, as has been demonstrated by its skill in organizing evil, have estimated the needs and projected remedies to meet the new situation, thus providing before hand for the formidable situation that will follow the war. The business of reconstruction after destruction.

"As to the work to be covered by the commission, it is boundless. The war is a revolution, the greatest mankind has known, and its effects cannot be measured, whether in law, politics, economics, social relations or ethics. None of the problems is independent of the others. Thus the demobilization of troops is a grave problem of military technique, but considered in its effect on the rest of the people and its economic and social bearing it becomes closely related to the other problems to be studied.

"The formidable return of 4,000,000 men to the workshops and the fields does not in itself include all the problems of the transformation of agriculture and industry, because the factories and farms will make room for those who have obeyed the call

of their country and have been absent for a long period of years. They will do this to prevent the dispersion and exhaustion of that great force of labor which the war itself created, if for no other reason. They will establish new conditions; they will perfect men with adaptability and skill to perform the new tasks.

"Hand in hand with demobilization goes the problem of emigration, which will be stimulated or retarded by the new conditions, but which must be guided and regulated. Emigration opens up a number of other problems no less important and perplexing,

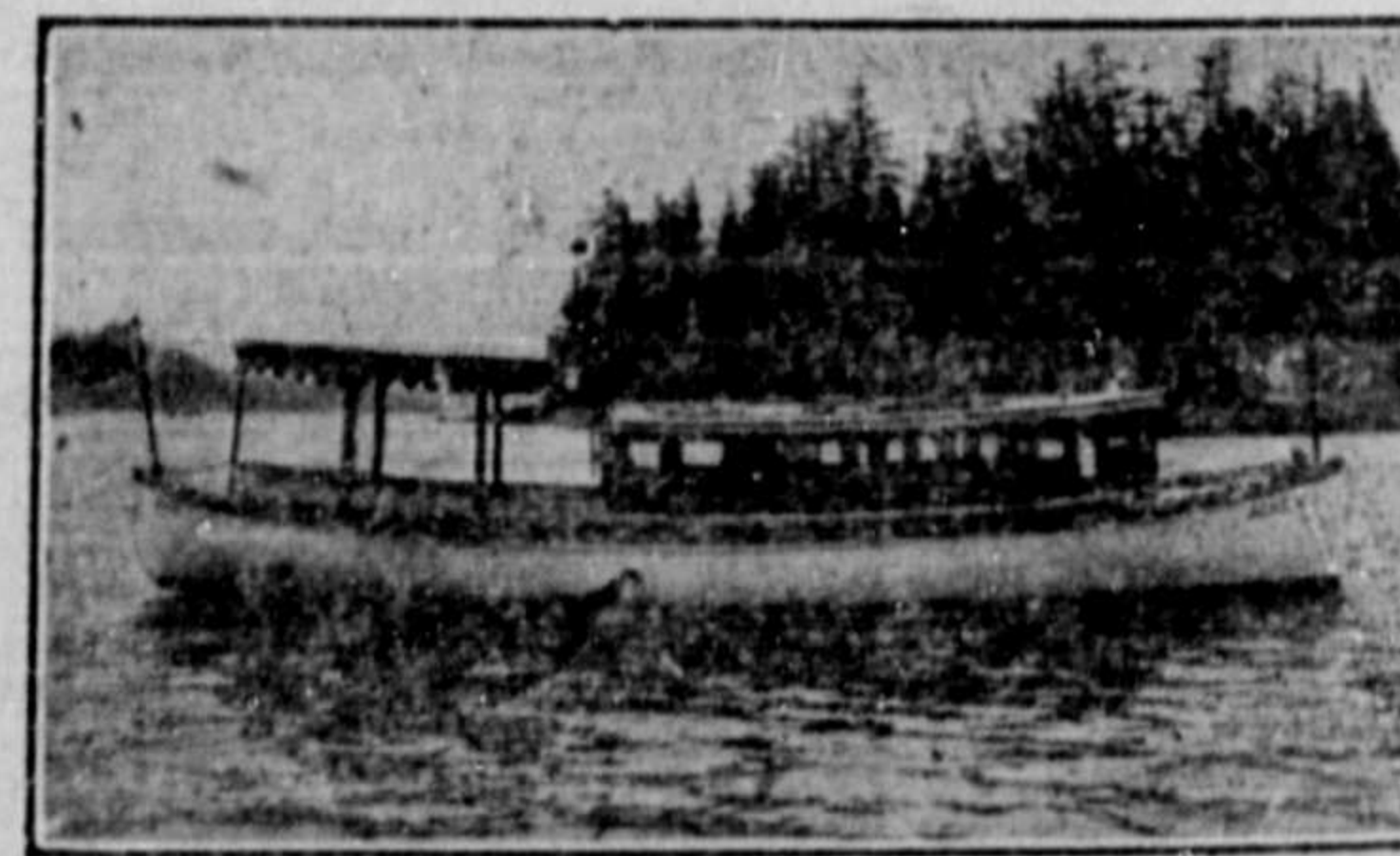

VICTORIA MAY NOT UNDERTAKE HOUSING

Deputation Waits on Mr. Pattullo, Discusses Subject With Him And Secures Information.

Pattullo, Minister of Lands, a few days ago and made it clear that the City of Victoria and the Municipality of Saanich are not anxious to go ahead with their shares of the National Housing Scheme. This he provided and while there was no definite undertaking given to Mr. Pattullo the Minister is under the impression that Victoria may yet agree to shoulder the responsibility under the Act passed at the recent session of the Legislature.

Vancouver has made its plans and a copy of the agreement between that city and the Government will be sent to the Victoria City Council for consideration. The Municipality has no relish for the loss, which it considers a certainty, and the Government is not in the mood to go ahead itself. Failure on the part of the city and the Government would mean that Victoria's allocation under the national division of the \$25,000,000 fund would go aglimmering—elsewhere.

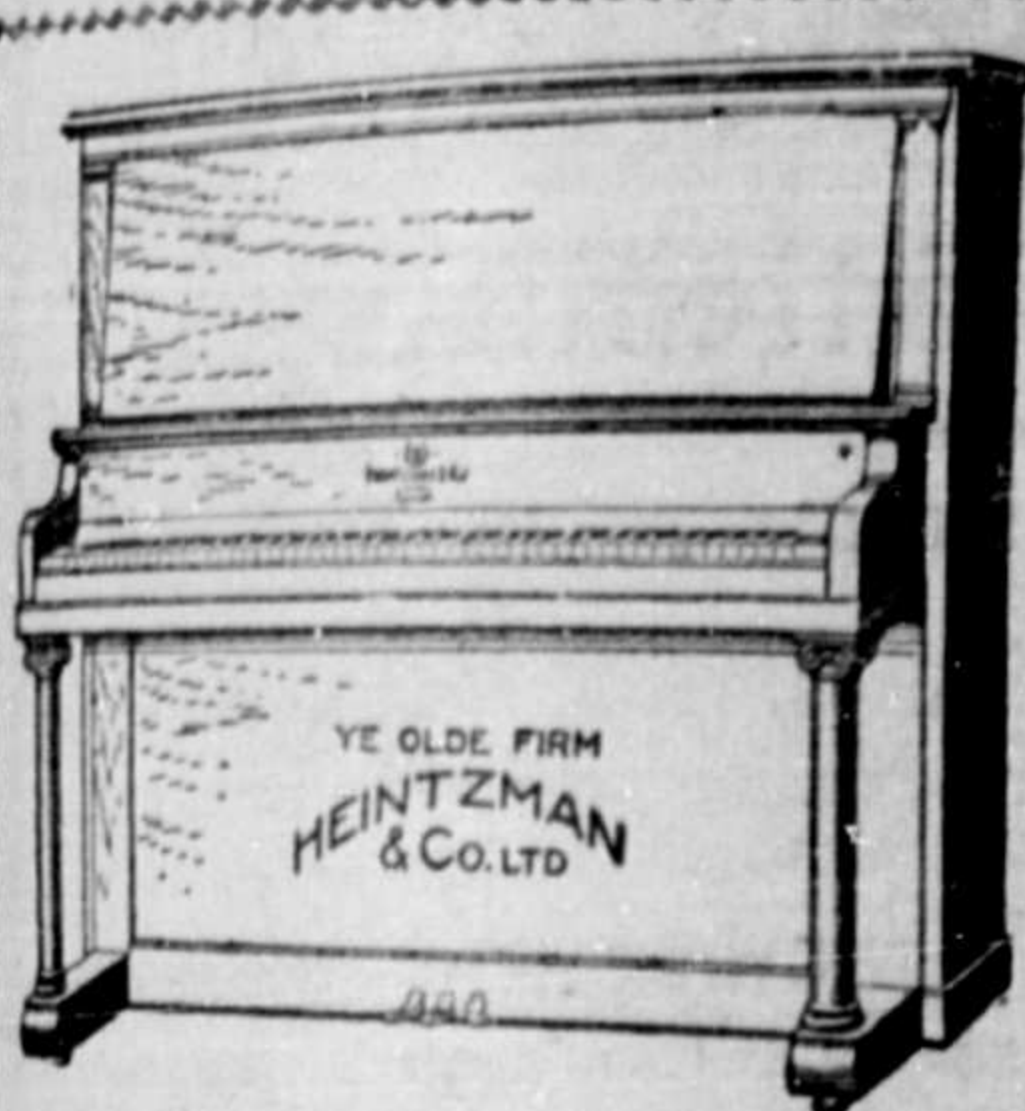

NEW PROPOSAL FOR CITY MARKET

Committee Recommends Renting Building and Reserving Three Stalls For Local Producers.

A report of the market committee to the City Council last night in regard to the renting of the City Market was laid on the table for a week for consideration. Alderman Casey who fathered the scheme and Alderman Kirkpatrick were for immediate adoption and the acting mayor said that he was prepared to vote for it, but the other aldermen wanted to consider it well before voting and on a vote of three to two this was decided upon.

The Scheme.
 The proposal is to lease the building for \$25 a month for one year, the tenant to pay all charges such as telephone, light and heat, which are at present paid by the city, and to run it as an independent concern.

The tenant is to take out a license in the usual way but to put up a \$2,000 bond and to sell local produce at a profit of 7½ per cent. Also three stalls would be reserved for anyone who wished to rent them to sell local products.

Vancouver Market.
 Alderman Casey intimated that he already had a tenant who was ready to go in on these terms. He said that he considered it a fair working proposition and ought to satisfy the community. While in Vancouver recently he had looked into the market proposition there and the scheme which he was proposing was based on the one in use there.

The alderman went on to quote a number of articles which he had seen on sale with prices attached and they seemed wonderfully cheap with some exceptions. The whole scheme seemed to be satisfactory.

Acting Mayor McRae said that he liked the proposal and he thanked Alderman Casey for his interest in the matter.

Alderman Currie, who is a member of the Market Committee, said he was not yet prepared to sign the recommendation until he looked into it thoroughly.

Ald. McMeekin also thought a week would give time to examine it. He had no kick coming, in fact he always supported the market and thought it should be a success. He wondered, however, if three stalls would be a sufficient number to reserve for local sellers.

Object to Dictation.
 Alderman Casey said that the retail merchants claimed the right to dictate the policy of the council, but he objected to that. They could not expect to reserve the whole of the market.

Alderman McMeekin again expressed the opinion that the matter should be discussed freely and not rushed through. A man to go into this business would need some capital if he had to put up a \$2,000 bond and also pay for a big stock of goods. There were a lot of things to consider.
