## PRESIDENT WILSON REFUSES TO YIELD ON ALL POINTS RULED BY SECRET TREATIES

AS WELL AS ITALY AFFECTED BY STAND OF THE AMERICAN REPRESENTATIVE WHOSE STATEMENT NEARLY TOOK AWAY BREATH OF DELEGATES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)  
Paris, April 24.—President Wilson's emphatic declaration he will not yield on the Adriatic question has created a most profound sensation at the Peace Conference. He has thrown the gauntlet to supporters of secret treaties in a manner which almost took away the breath of the delegates who had been making compromise on points covered by many secret documents at variance with the fourteen points.  
Wilson's declaration, while aimed directly at Adriatic problems, also reaches the Kiaoo Chau controversy in which Japan is upon secret agreements made with Great Britain, France and Italy in 1917 to support her in her claims to concessions held in Germany in Shantung.  
London, April 24.—Under the Treaty of London, Italy was to be given Trieste, Pola and part of Dalmatia, but Fiume was to be given to Croatia. Great Britain has advised Italy to forego some of her claims, but the Italians insist on their rights under the treaty.

## PREMIER GIVES HIS REPLY TO RETURNED MEN

That Demand for Dissolution Demonstrates Their Unfitness To Be Public Advisers.

Ottawa, April 24.—In replying to a number of returned soldiers who waited on Premier Oliver yesterday asking for the dissolution of the Legislature, the Premier outlined many reasons which made dissolution inadvisable. "From the standpoint of the public welfare and the development of the province," he said, "to grant your request would demonstrate the unfitness of the Government to govern, as a demand for a dissolution has demonstrated your unfitness to be public advisers."

## ENGLISHMEN GATHER AT THE FESTIVE BOARD

Festival of Patron Saint Celebrated in Fine Style by Local Organization.

PATRIOTIC EXPRESSIONS BY MANY SPEAKERS

Patriotism and the upholding of the eternal principles of liberty and justice were the principal themes of the speakers at the St. George's Day banquet last night in St. Andrew's Hall. The spirit of St. George and Merrie Englands was much in evidence and the first annual banquet and dance was generally acknowledged to have been one of the best events of its kind ever held in Prince Rupert.

J. Hutchinson, president of the Sons of England, under whose auspices the event was held, presided as toastmaster. He explained that during the war their social activities had remained in abeyance, but now that the war was over they intended to renew them and this was the first fruits of their activities.

**Patriotic Organization.**  
The Sons of England was a patriotic organization and one of the obligations of the members was that each one had to be ready at all times to defend flag and country. When war was declared they had but 64 members, yet of these no less than 36 had gone overseas in defence of the Empire and seven had made the supreme sacrifice.

Mr. Hutchinson suggested that there should be a union of the patriotic societies. When men would send fraternal greetings to the enemy it was time they were taking action. He told of instances of brutality of the Hun that had come under his notice. When people would talk of fraternity with these people it was time for the fraternal organizations to get together and educate the people in citizenship.

**Not Mythical.**  
Rev. Canon Rix who spoke to the toast of St. George's Day said that the men in whose honor they had met that night was not a mythical being. He was a soldier in the army of Diocletian, who when Christians were being persecuted resigned as a protest, and was himself executed for the faith. He told of the myths which had grown up around St. George and of the adoption of the red cross as the emblem of the nation. With the cry "St. George and Merry England," and beneath that flag the English had defeated the Dutch and the French. Cabot had discovered Canada, the British navy had become mistress of the seas and it could be truly said that this flag of St. George had braved for a thousand years the battle and the breeze. The cross of St. George was the dominating feature of the Union Jack representing the senior partner and today the naval flag and the white ensign both bore only the flag of St. George.

**Tang of Britain.**  
Canon Rix spoke of the love of country which was inherent in the race. There were 54,000 aliens in this province, but he liked to hear the tang of old Britain in the language of the people. St. George had died for a principle. He had defended the weak and womanhood. The tragedy of St. George and the Dragon had been repeated recently. When the dragon sent out his fiery breath St. George again took the sword and in face of the power of the dragon, his venom and his poison went out to protect womanhood.  
When the first contingent left for France 64 per cent of them were English and the Scotch came next in numbers. There was so little difference between Scotch and English that it was difficult to tell them apart. He approved the idea of getting together as patriotic organizations. ## POLICE ORDERS ARE TO SHOOT

State of Siege is Proclaimed at German Port of Hamburg.

Copenhagen, April 24.—The latest outbreak to take place in Germany is at the port of Hamburg where a state of siege has been proclaimed by the Government.

In order to quell the tumult the police have received orders to shoot persons carrying arms, plundering or fighting against the national police.

## ALASKA MAY ENTER SHIPPING BUSINESS

Authority Granted by the House of Representatives to Charter Ships.

Juneau, April 24.—The House of Representatives yesterday passed a bill authorizing the territory of Alaska to enter the transportation business with chartered ships. An appropriation of \$300,000 was made for the purpose. The Governor of the territory is made secretary-treasurer of the Shipping Board which will carefully investigate conditions before entering the shipping business.

## SEALS ARE RAPIDLY BEING EXTERMINATED

Total Catch for the Season on East Coast is 81,292.

St. Johns, Newfoundland, April 24.—The seal fishing season has ended with the second poorest catch on record in the century. The total for ten ships engaged numbered only 81,292 pelts.

The general opinion here is that the seals are being rapidly exterminated. The total catch for the year 1915 was 409,169.

## WHITE GOVERNMENT HAS A HARD TIME AT OTTAWA; IS UNDER FIRE CONTINUOUSLY

MANY AMENDMENTS OFFERED TO BILL TO INCORPORATE CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAY COMPANY; SIX MONTHS HOIST DEFEATED BY HOUSE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

Ottawa, April 24.—Keen, continuous fighting characterized the day's proceedings in the House of Commons at the afternoon and evening sessions. The Government's bill to incorporate the Canadian National Railway Company, which is to administer the Government Railway System, was under discussion. There was amendment after amendment.

A. R. McMaster had an amendment that the directorate of the company should be chosen from a list of fifteen furnished by the House, sixty per cent nominated by the Government and forty per cent by the Opposition. Eventually Mr. McMaster withdrew the motion.

Major Power moved that one at least of the members of the directorate should be a returned soldier. His motion was defeated by 38 to 23.

Ernest Lapointe had an amendment that at least two of the directors should be representative of the employees. This amendment also was lost. By the time for adjournment which took place at 11:30, four out of thirty clauses had been passed.

## Six Months' Hoist.

Hon. Arthur Meighen's Fire Prevention Bill came up for third reading. Immediately Mr. McKenzie, leader of the opposition seconded by Tobin, moved the six months' hoist. The House divided, for the six months' hoist, 51; against, 69, majority against 18. Sir Sam Hughes and Dr. Sheard voted with the opposition. The bill was then read a third time.

## KELLY BRINGS 120,000 LBS. OF HALIBUT

Large Catch Being Discharged; Foster Brings 30,000 lbs. Ground Fish.

The steam fishing boat Andrew Kelly, owned by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd., arrived in port yesterday with the large catch of 120,000 lbs. of halibut after a 17-day fishing trip.

The Andrew Kelly is a sister ship of the G. E. Foster, also operating out of this port and owned by the same company. She has a crew of 24 men, including twelve fishermen, whereas the G. E. Foster carries 23 men. She is unloading her catch today, and expects to be ready to go out again on Saturday.

The G. E. Foster arrived in with a catch of 30,000 lbs. of flat fish last night.

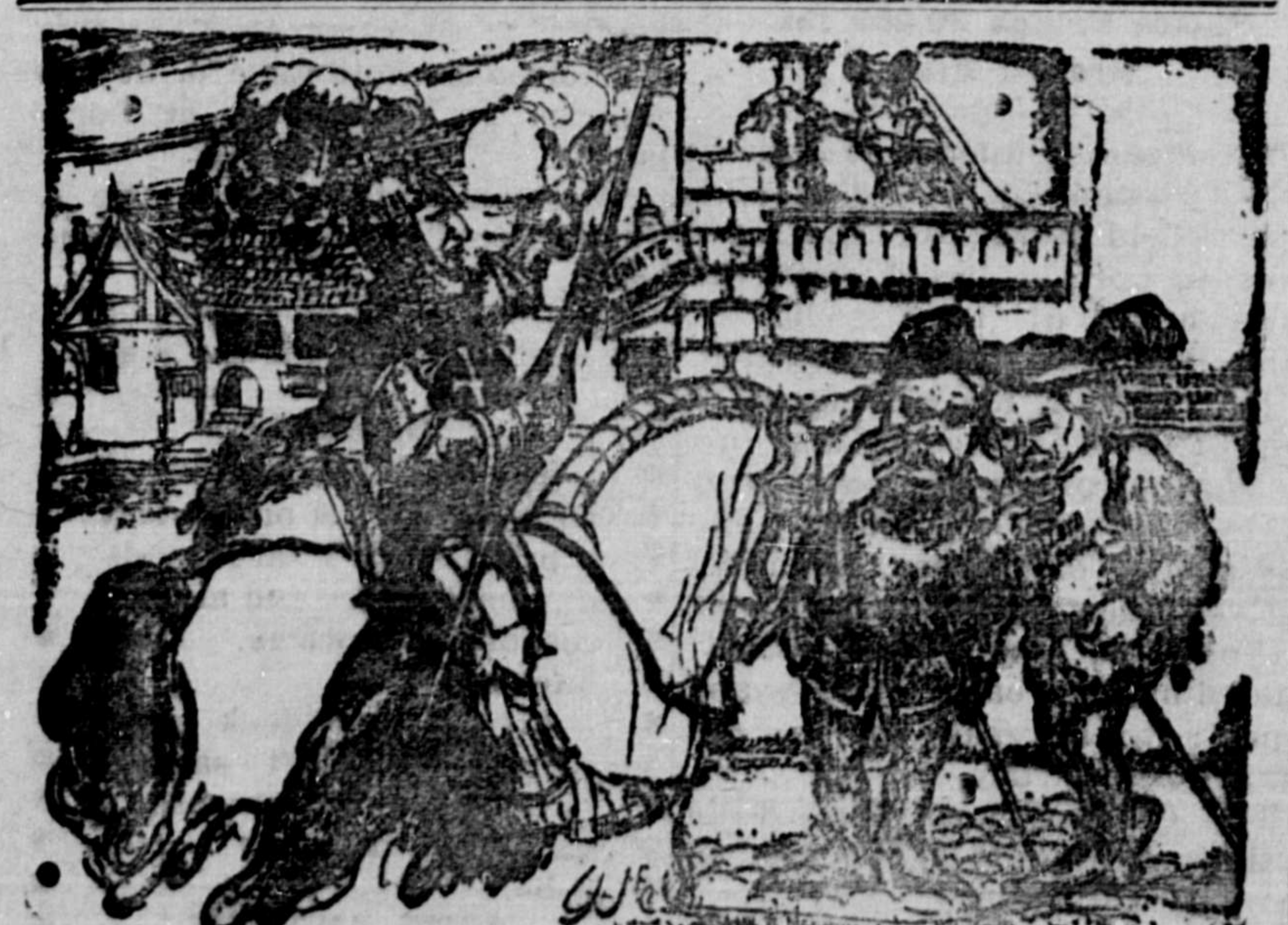
**More Money May Come for Housing.**

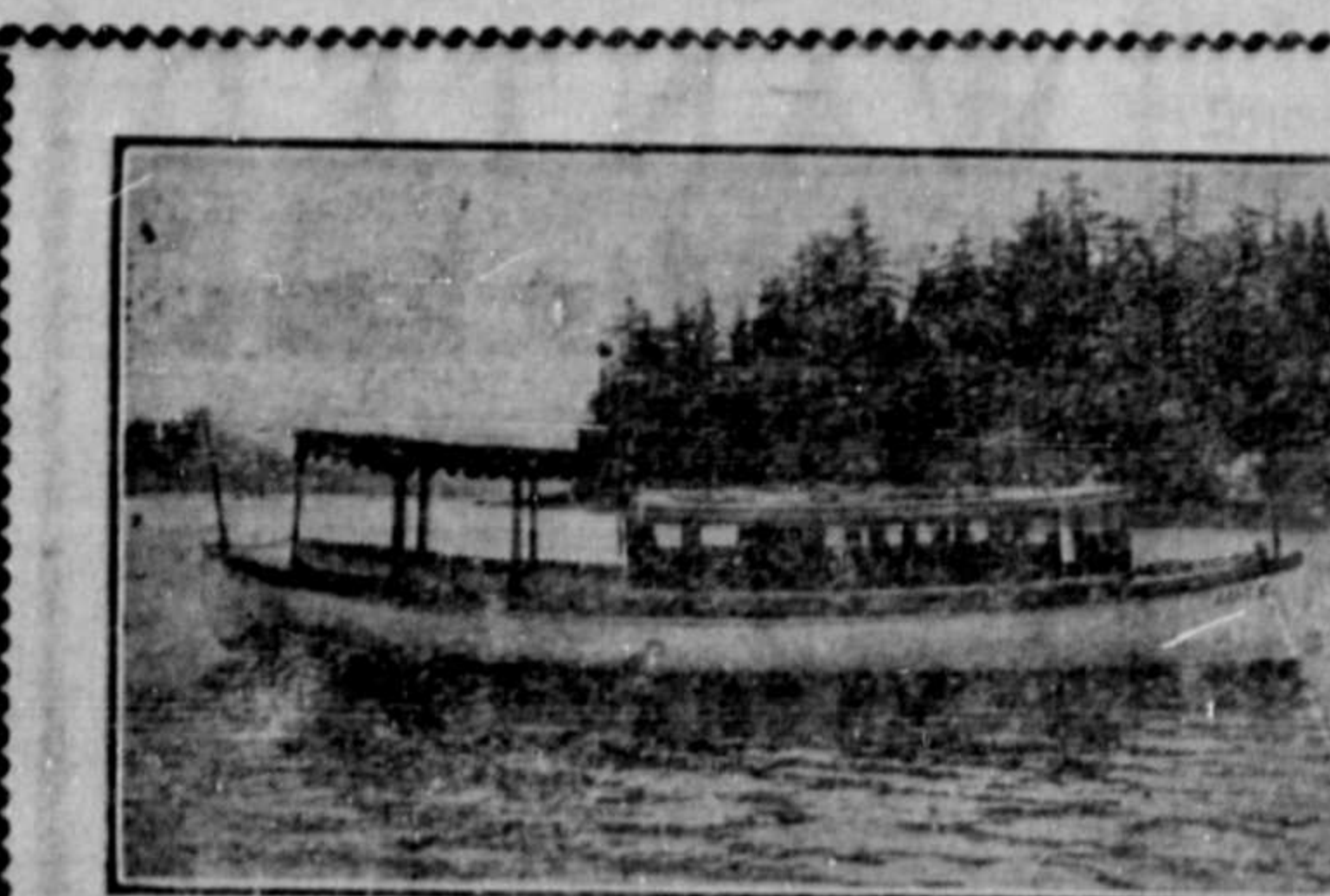
**Women in Jail Should be Protected.**

## ENGLISHMEN GATHER AT THE FESTIVE BOARD

Navy Tom Silversides said that the high pinnacle which the Empire had attained was made possible through the army and navy. While they looked forward to a lasting peace yet they would always glory in the brave deeds of the army and navy. They were always fond of the poems which glorified the exploits of the fighting forces. What their forefathers did the present generation had also done.

**Mr. Wakefield.**  
W. D. Wakefield on behalf of "Our Allies" said that after hearing of the glorification of the Empire the rest of the allies did not feel much. He said that with one exception the British had always fought for the right. They fought for freedom of thought, of press, of speech, of worship and of home. Germany on the other hand had been fighting for world domination. It was only the contemptible little army of Great Britain that had stopped them from accomplishing their purpose.

Mr. Wakefield said that when the United States decided to take part in the war they did it with no divided power, but they realized that they could not have sent the men but for the mightiest machine the world ever knew, the British navy.

**Miss Laura Pim.**  
Replying for "The Ladies," Miss Laura M. Pim said that the new womanhood had been evolved from the crucible of human suffering. A common sympathy was making men and women equal in the light of the law. She thought that what women had done showed that they had the ability to stand beside men. It would be a calamity, however, if women decided to remain in industrial occupations. She believed in Canada and she asked the Sons of England to subscribe to her creed.

**Kindred Societies.**  
S. D. Macdonald for "Kindred Societies" mentioned that the English and Scotch had not always been together, but they had fought like men and not like

Huns. He complimented the Sons of England on the record they had made in the great war and told of the work of the St. Andrew's Society which had sent 60 per cent of its membership. They fought for British ideals and British institutions. They had fought for democracy and it was up to them to see that they got democracy. He believed all were ready to co-operate.

Mr. Macdonald spoke of the men who had taken a certain stand in public but he reminded them that they must not take the expressions of a few for the many. Labor had obeyed the call to the colors and the head of the labor organizations in the city was most patriotic.

Mr. Macdonald said that he had before taken occasion to denounce the sending of greetings to the Germans, and the message did not represent the views of organized labor in Prince Rupert.

**Sons of Canada.**  
G. Johnson on behalf of the Sons of Canada said that his organization was for the purpose of promoting and teaching better citizenship in Canada. It was the youngest organization in the city. They would be found in line with the patriotic movements of all good sons of Britain.

After the banquet the tables were cleared away and dancing was kept up for several hours. Special mention was made by everyone of the excellent catering of Ben Self who provided the banquet.

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$50 per acre, and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in connection with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 540 acres may be leased by one person or company.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**  
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

## CAPT. MCGREGOR TELLS OF WORK OF CANADIAN 'Y'

Always Right to the Front, He Told Vancouver Interviewer, Supplying Smokes and Drinks.

### WINNING CROSS ONE OF FINEST FEATS OF WAR

(By mail.)

Vancouver, April 24.—Captain J. McGregor, V. C., D. C. M., M. C., one of Canada's greatest and most modest heroes, was sitting in the Red Cross Triangle Club swapping yarns with Tom Armit, D. C. M., of their days together in the 2nd C. M. R. "Mac," as the boys call him, is ranked a hero even among the men of the 2nd C. M. R. which boasts of over two hundred decorations and innumerable valorous deeds which went unrecognized. With a clean, frank and open countenance which, however, shows a world of strength and determination, it is not hard to understand that this quiet, unassuming young Scotchman could develop a righteous fury that would carry him through as many Huns as could get in front of him.

### Always Up to Front.

Although he will not talk of his own deeds, there is one thing of which he will talk quite freely, and that is the Canadian 'Y' M. C. A. "After all that the 'Y' has done for us fellows over there, it is the best we can do to help it all we can over here," is the way he put it. "The work done by the Canadian Y. M. C. A. as I saw it at the front was the best of any organization there," he went on. "Speaking as a fighting man, and I was at the front for all but five weeks out of three years and four months, what we appreciated most was what was done for the fighting man while he was fighting. I never was in a fight where the 'Y' was not right up in the forward or battle area."

### Smokes and Drinks.

The captain recalled incident after incident where the "Y" man was in his dugout or his tent, or by the side of the road with no shelter, handing out hot coffee or tea, biscuits and cigarettes to the boys either going into the fight or coming out tired and often wounded. He told of the man going right into the trenches where the men could not get out, supplying generously the hot drinks and the smokes that cheered the boys and made them better fighters. He recalled particularly the time when they were traiking through the mud of the Albert-Bapaume road, dragging their machine guns with them. It would have been impossible for them to have gone through if it had not been for the refreshments they got every once in a while from the "Y" men who were holding their positions along the dangerous road. "Anyone who has been in the fighting area must have a good word to say for the 'Y' if he tells the truth," was his concluding remark.

### Served in Ranks.

Like many of the officers of the 2nd C. M. R., Capt. McGregor rose from the ranks. He came from Prince Rupert to Vancouver to enlist, and went overseas as a trooper. He served in the ranks until Vimy, where he won his D. C. M. and was recommended for his commission.

### Won Coveted Cross.

It was on September 29th last that he won the Victoria Cross. In the heavy fighting before Cambrai his company was being held up by a nest of German machine guns. He located them and accompanied by one man who was killed before he got half way across, McGregor rushed across the 300 yards of open shell-swept ground with his rifle and bayonet. He killed the four Huns and captured their eight guns. All the officers had been killed or wounded. He made a personal reconnaissance of the ground and went back, taking the rest of his company. They swept the Germans out of Neuville St. Remy and established a line back of the Cambrai Canal. The 2nd C. M. R. had taken the most advanced positions on the Cambrai line through his daring action. It was one of the finest feats of the whole war and all the more remarkable because of his being wounded early

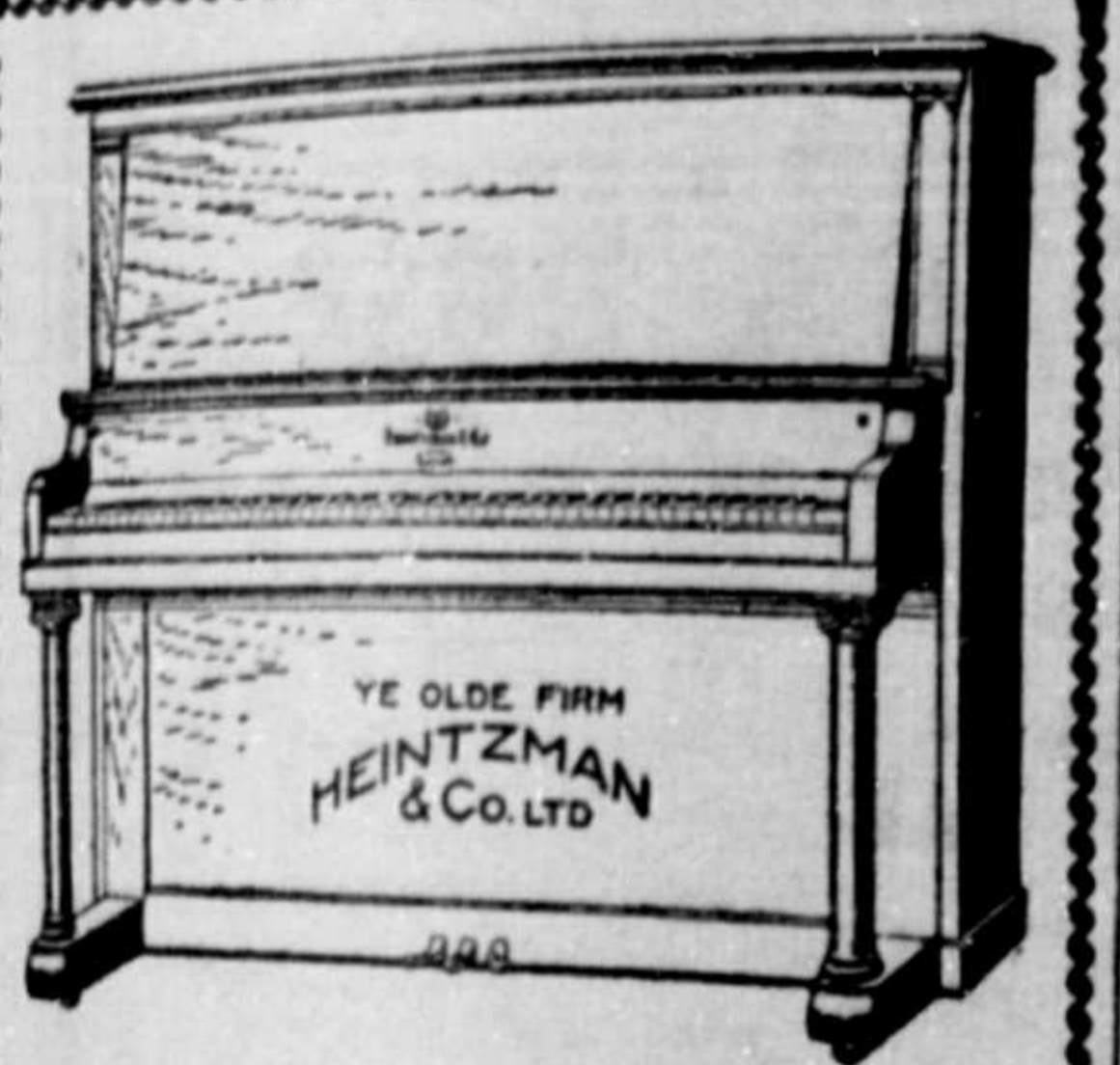

## LATE SERGEANT DIED HELPING COMRADES

Following is part of a clipping from a San Francisco newspaper stating men who had won honors on the battlefield, among whom the name of Sergeant Myron Hoffman was mentioned. He is a nephew of Harry Hoffman of this town, and was killed October 31.

"The only other Distinguished Service Cross to be awarded to any one in Company 'M' has been presented to the parents of Sergeant Myron Hoffman of San Francisco, who was killed on the night of October 31 in Belgium by shell fire while out on the battlefield under a terrific fire attempting to bring in some men who had been wounded earlier in the day. A number of his comrades in Company 'M,' have planned to visit Hoffman's parents when they return to their homes, and tell them of the bravery of their son personally.

"They are bringing home with them Hoffman's rifle, which will be given to his" parents.

(Note). The parents of Sergeant Myron Hoffman have both been dead a number of years, dying when Sergeant Hoffman was quite young. No doubt the rifle and the Cross will be given to his brother in San Francisco.
