### More Money May Come for Housing.





## LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes

and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, be-

fore receiving Crown Grant. Where | 3-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-kealth or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent residence

may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of least 2 years.




