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GOVERNMENT WILL OPERATE ITS STEAMSHIPS FROM PRINCE RUPERT IF THEY TAKE OVER THE RAILWAY

G. Scott, Delegate to Ottawa, Returns and tells of Plans to use this Port for Trade between Canada and the Orient

There will be a line of Government steamships running out of Prince Rupert to and from the Orient if the Dominion Government decides to take over the railway. That is the word brought by G. Scott from Ottawa on the authority of Dr. Reid, Minister of Railways. Mr. Scott arrived last night after spending several weeks away, along with Mayor McClymont, interviewing the Government and the department heads at Ottawa in regard to Prince Rupert's needs. Mr. Scott says he was well received everywhere. He laid before them the need for fishing wharves, of free for all in canneries and other matters in which the city is interested.

Proposal Refused.

The chief business of the delegation was asking the Government to sell or lease a number of the Government ships to be operated out of this port. This proposal was turned down absolutely, but Dr. Reid was quite clear on the fact that the matter of buying the ships from this port had already been considered and they took over the line the ships would be put on. He was also confident that the Government would get the railway.

Fisheries.

The fisheries question was discussed with Mr. McLean who is acting head of several departments and urged allowing competition in canneries and the use of gas boats on the river. He backed up in this by Col. Peck, who promised to take it up in the House if necessary.

The wharf question was discussed with the Deputy Minister of Marine and urged, and is being followed up by Major Hull who is now at Ottawa. Mr. Scott is well pleased with his trip and he says Mayor McClymont will make an official report on his return.

MANUFACTURER IS ON VISIT TO THE CITY

Mr. Carl Penderay, head of the Fish American Paint Co., of the Penderay & Sons soap works, both of Victoria, and president of the Fishermen's Association, is visiting the city on business. He is much interested in the progress of the city, as he has property here and does a good deal of business with local stores. Speaking to a Daily News representative, Mr. Penderay said he has a bright future for Prince Rupert. He believed we were on the eve of big doings.

MACHINISTS AT VANCOUVER LOSE THEIR CHARTER

Contribute to One Big Union and International Organization Steps in.

Vancouver, April 25.—The international organization of machinists has ordered a suspension of the local charter 777 and the seizure of local funds, according to a statement made to the Trades and Labor Council by Mr. Edwards. The president of the local said that \$400 had been contributed to the One Big Union and the international acted on this information.

The Trades and Labor Council appointed no delegation to represent the council before the royal commission on industrial relations which sits here next week. The secretary said the commission was engaged on a wild goose chase.

TITLES WERE DISCUSSED

Sir Thomas White Fences With Question in House of Commons Speech.

Sir Thomas White speaking in the Commons on the question of titles said: "Mr. Speaker, it is not my intention to discuss upon its merits, the subject of this resolution, because, having accepted the honor of knighthood, I should feel myself at a certain disadvantage in doing so. If I spoke in favor of titles, it might be considered that my view was biased or prejudiced. If on the other hand I spoke against titles, I might be regarded as ungenerous to those having greater merits than myself. My intention tonight is to indicate the present position of this matter so far as concerns action by the Dominion Government and by the Imperial Government, and to suggest a certain disposition of the resolution and of the amendment to the resolution, which disposition will, I trust, be of advantage to the Government in giving the matter further consideration and will meet with the views of the House."

Difference of Opinion.

"While this is a question upon which there is room for difference of opinion, a question upon which members may not agree, it is not in any respect a party question. Both Liberal and Conservative Governments have in the past recommended to His Majesty the bestowal of knighthood and other titular distinctions, and adherents of both political parties have been the recipients of such distinctions. I think I am correct in stating that every Prime Minister of Canada, with the exception of one, has accepted knighthood. That exception was the Hon. Alexander Mackenzie, who, I feel certain, must have been offered the distinction, although I do not know that that is so. I think, therefore, that in all probability he declined the honor, but with that exception, as I have stated, all the Prime Ministers of Canada—Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir John Abbott, Sir John Thompson, Sir Mackenzie Bowell, Sir Charles Tupper and Sir Wilfrid Laurier—accepted the honor of knighthood at the hand of their Sovereign. In addition to these distinguished men in the public life of Canada, many other members of Government were similarly honored. I recall amongst others Sir Richard Cartwright, Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, Sir George Ross, Sir James Whitney, in Ontario, and Sir Lomer Gouin in Quebec. I mention only outstanding men, for the purpose of showing that the acceptance of titular distinctions in this country has not been confined to any one party and that, therefore, the question is not in any respect a party one."

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RAILWAY BILL IS UNDER FIRE

Dr. Reid Announces that Oriental Steamship Line Will be Operated on Pacific.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, April 25.—A bill to incorporate the Canadian Railway Company once more engaged the attention of Parliament, but the opposition to certain features of the measure was less strenuous than on Wednesday. Seven amendments were presented by the opposition and some accepted.

Differences of opinion were expressed as to the measure of control over the directorate which Parliament and the Governor-in-Council should assume.

There was a discussion over the Government's steamship policy and a demand by the opposition for a definite declaration of policy. Hon. J. D. Reid in reply, announced that the new ships now under construction were intended to be used in connection with the national railways. They would run a steamship line to the Orient.

ONE BIG UNION DELEGATES ARE ALL EXPELLED

Edmonton Trades and Labor Council Takes Action in a Summary Manner.

Edmonton, April 25.—Something of a sensation was sprung at the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council, when President McCreath read the following ruling of the Executive Committee of the council regarding the organizations who have advocated secession from the ranks of the trade union movement as exemplified by the American Federation of Labor: "By order of the Executive Committee of this council and by virtue of the authority vested in me, I hereby declare vacant the seats of all delegates voting for and active in the interests of the 'One Big Union,' which attitude and actions are in every sense contrary to the constitution of the American Federation of Labor as set forth in article 11, section one, which reads as follows: 'No central labor union or any other central body of delegates shall admit or retain in their councils, delegates from any local organization that owes its allegiance to any other body, national or international, hostile to any affiliated organization, etc.'"

Unions Affected.

"The following local unions are included as being those to which this ruling applies and their affiliation is hereby cancelled: Local 1325 United Brotherhood of Carpenters; Federal Labor Union No. 49 and Local 4070 United Mine Workers."

This declaration was received with considerable protest by the delegates affected, who referred to the ruling as an autocratic act on the part of the executive committee. President McCreath stated, however, that the parties affected had the right of appeal to the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada and the American Federation of Labor. Until those bodies should rule otherwise, the president stated that he had no other prerogative but to abide by the constitution of the American Federation of Labor.

Leave Meeting in a Body.

Led by Delegate Berg, the delegates affected by the ruling then left the meeting in a body, and the business of the meeting went on.

ITALIANS PROTEST BUT EXPRESS NO INTENTION OF LEAVING CONFERENCE

PREMIER ORLANDO SAYS THAT PRESIDENT WILSON IS TRYING TO PLACE THE GOVERNMENT IN OPPOSITION TO THE PEOPLE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, April 25.—A statement issued by Premier Orlando says nothing of any intention of Italians to quit the Peace Conference. It merely states Italy's case concerning Fiume and the Dalmatian coast and does not appear in the form of an ultimatum. Orlando declares President Wilson's proclamation is an attempt to place the Government in opposition to the people. "He is treating the Italians as if they were a barbarous people, without democratic government." Orlando and his party left for Rome last night.

A despatch was sent out to some papers yesterday stating that the Italian delegates had withdrawn from the conference. This seems to have been incorrect as it is not confirmed.

DEPARTMENT HEADS FOR SHIPYARDS ARE ALREADY ON THE JOB

Four Arrive and Commence Their Work, But Find no Houses For Families.

Four of the heads of departments in connection with the shipbuilding operations have arrived and commenced their work. These are A. R. Jayne, chief engineer; John H. McHaffie, general foreman of ship construction; A. McIntyre, foreman shipwright; C. W. Alexander, master mechanic. All these men are married and expect to bring their families here just as soon as they can secure houses. At the present they find this impossible.

Supt. Schellenberg explained last night that this was only the vanguard but that there would be many more arrive in the near future and all would need accommodation. Materials are beginning to arrive in connection with the construction work and the yards are commencing to look like industrial activity.

The Army and Navy Veterans opening smoker at the new club rooms last night was well attended and proved to be quite a success. FOUNDRY WILL OPEN SOON AT THE SHIPYARDS

All Castings for the New Steel Ships Will Be Made Right Here.

The foundry at the shipyards is to be opened in the very near future as another of the industries of Prince Rupert. It was built several years ago but has never yet been used. It is one of the ornaments that has been shown to visitors, along with others in the city but which at last is to go into active service. Supt. Schellenberg announced last night that preparations were being made for opening the foundry and as soon as they were ready they would be undertaking business, not only their own work but would make castings for the whole countryside.

Until now it has been necessary to send to Vancouver for all foundry work. The result has been much delay and annoyance therefrom. When a casting has to be replaced it is wasted quickly. Very soon it will be possible to have castings of any kind made right here, either brass or iron.

The foundry building, which is part of the plant leased by the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., is commodious and was built for the purpose. When it gets running it will employ from fifteen to twenty men. All the castings for the new ships will be made there, and only the fact that it was not equipped kept the company from making the castings for their other equipment.

Secret Treaties Are Under Discussion.

When the United States went into the war the president on behalf of the people laid down certain principles which would guide them in their action. They refused to fight for place and power for any country, but were out to crush the German autocracy which was a danger to the world.

Now when peace comes to be made it is found that there are a number of secret treaties between some of the allied countries which stand in the way of the carrying out of the principles which were laid down. The president stands out against these treaties going into effect while the countries which stood to benefit by the treaties insist on getting what they were promised.

On the face of it and without full knowledge of the circumstances, President Wilson seems to be taking the correct attitude. Secret treaties ought to go, and this is the time to get rid of them. If they are ruled as of no effect there will be no desire in future to make them.

The objection taken by many to the position of the president is that although the great bulk of the fighting was done by the allies, the United States comes in at the end and wants to dictate the terms of peace. They feel that this is wrong. The Americans for their part say that had they not come in, there would have been no peace to dictate.

Those Britishers who have for many years taken exception to the European secret diplomacy, look on the stand of the president as the correct one. Italy will not consent to any dictation, however, and sees this an opportunity to hold on to what she has taken and possibly to take more. The result does not seem likely to make for a general peace for all time to come.

Need of Houses Is Clearly Shown.

Four heads of departments for the shipbuilding yards have arrived and commenced work. They wish to bring their families here but there is no house accommodation for them. The result is that the city loses the benefit of the increased population and the company loses the advantage of having their officials satisfied and comfortable and therefore likely to remain at their posts.

The Daily News has been consistently calling attention to the need for months past, but beyond the building of a few business blocks little has been done so far. The company is providing a big rooming house for a number of men but this will not begin to accommodate more than a fraction of the employees. It will be a pity if the same concern should have to provide more bachelor quarters when what is needed just now is houses where people can come to make for themselves homes. The prosperity of the place depends on the filling of this need.

Conferring Titles Is Childish Habit.

As long as the leaders of the people are men who have themselves accepted titles from the British Government it is hardly likely that they will take any action which would commit themselves against the granting of such ornamental appendages. That is clear from the speech of Sir Thomas White to the House of Commons. The chairman of the committee which has to consider the question and make recommendations is one of the newly ornamented. Whether this committee can give an unbiased opinion or one that will satisfy the people remains to be seen. The whole business is a relic of snobbery that has come down from feudal days.

There was a time when the king sold titles in order to keep himself in pocket money. Of recent years it has been the custom to sell titles in England and Canada for the purpose of raising campaign funds for the party. It has also been the custom for politicians to recommend each other for decoration, while the real men of the country have had no thought for such trumpery.

The name of W. E. Gladstone is especially revered because he was strong enough minded to keep away from childish toys which were offered him. He allowed his children and grand children to play "Sir Knight" in the nursery, but he had no time for such frivolities combined with the serious business of life.

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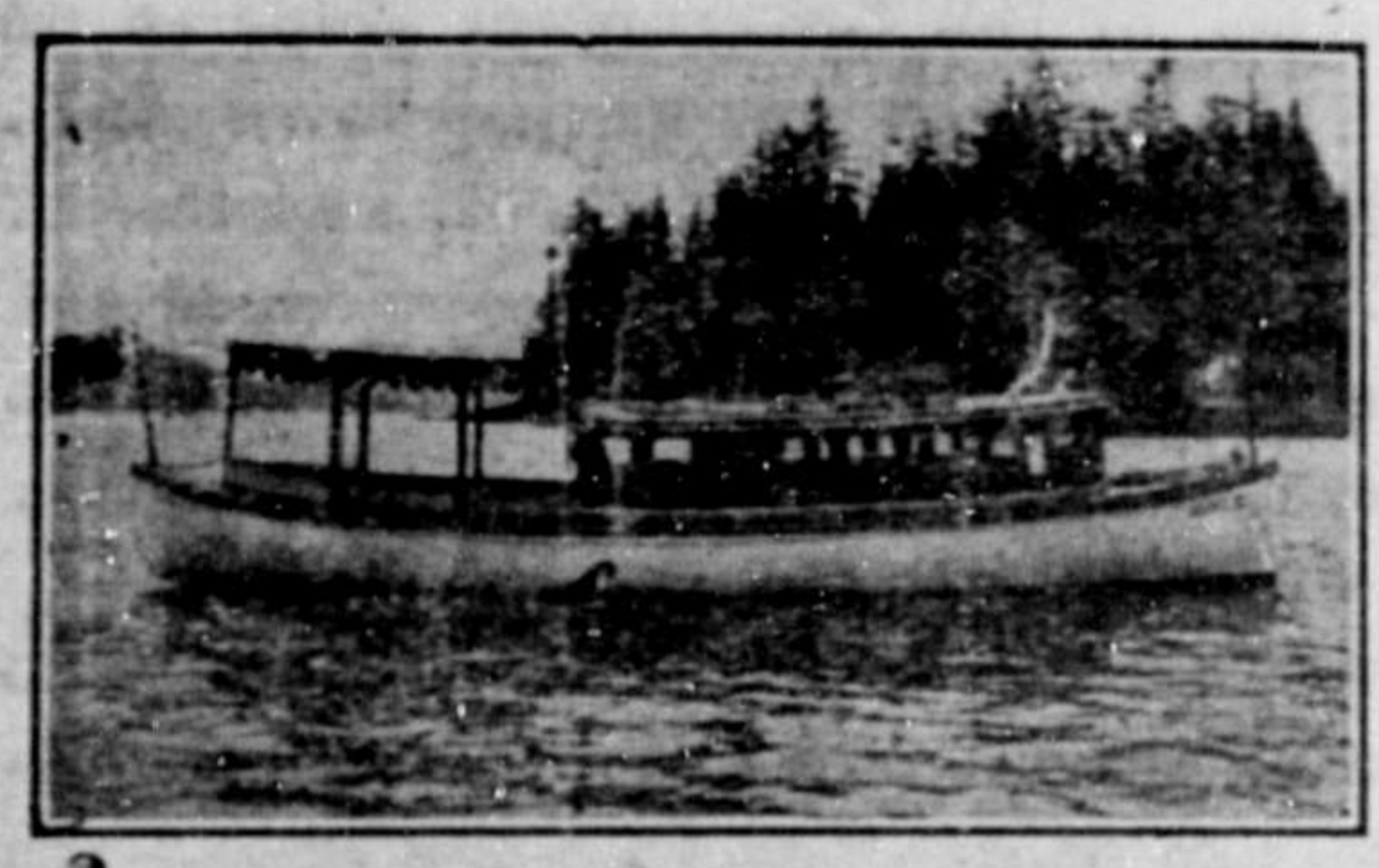

BARON SIDNEY SONNINO

Italian Foreign Minister
Had British Mother

Friction at the Peace Conference over the secret treaties and Wilson's fourteen points lends particular interest to the Italians who are figuring in the controversy. One of the foremost of these is Baron Sidney Sonnino, Italy's Minister of Foreign Affairs.

Thoroughly familiar with European affairs, commercial, financial and diplomatic, his clear view and analysis of the problems confronting the nations, have made him a strong figure in this great gathering.



ST. MAXWELL

Baron Sidney Sonnino was born in Alexandria, Egypt, in 1850. His father's family is one of the oldest Leghornese families and his mother was a member of one of the oldest British families. He graduated in law about the time he attained his majority, and immediately entered upon his diplomatic career as an attaché, serving in that capacity for several years. In 1881, at the age of 30 years, he was elected member of the Italian Chamber of Deputies for the College of Rocca San Casciano. He was Minister of the Treasury in the Crispi cabinet from 1893 to 1896. After ten years of public life as leader of the constitutional party of opposition he was appointed Premier in 1906, and served for 100 days, when he resigned. In December, 1909, he was again appointed Premier, and in March of the following year, again resigned. On November 5, 1914, he entered the Salandra Cabinet as Foreign Minister, and has served continuously throughout the war with the Bosselli Ministry and the Orlando Ministry.

Sonnino is considered one of the strongest and most prominent Italian financiers and a man of great character, even by his most bitter political opponents. He prefers acting rather than talking and the Italian people have great confidence in his policies.

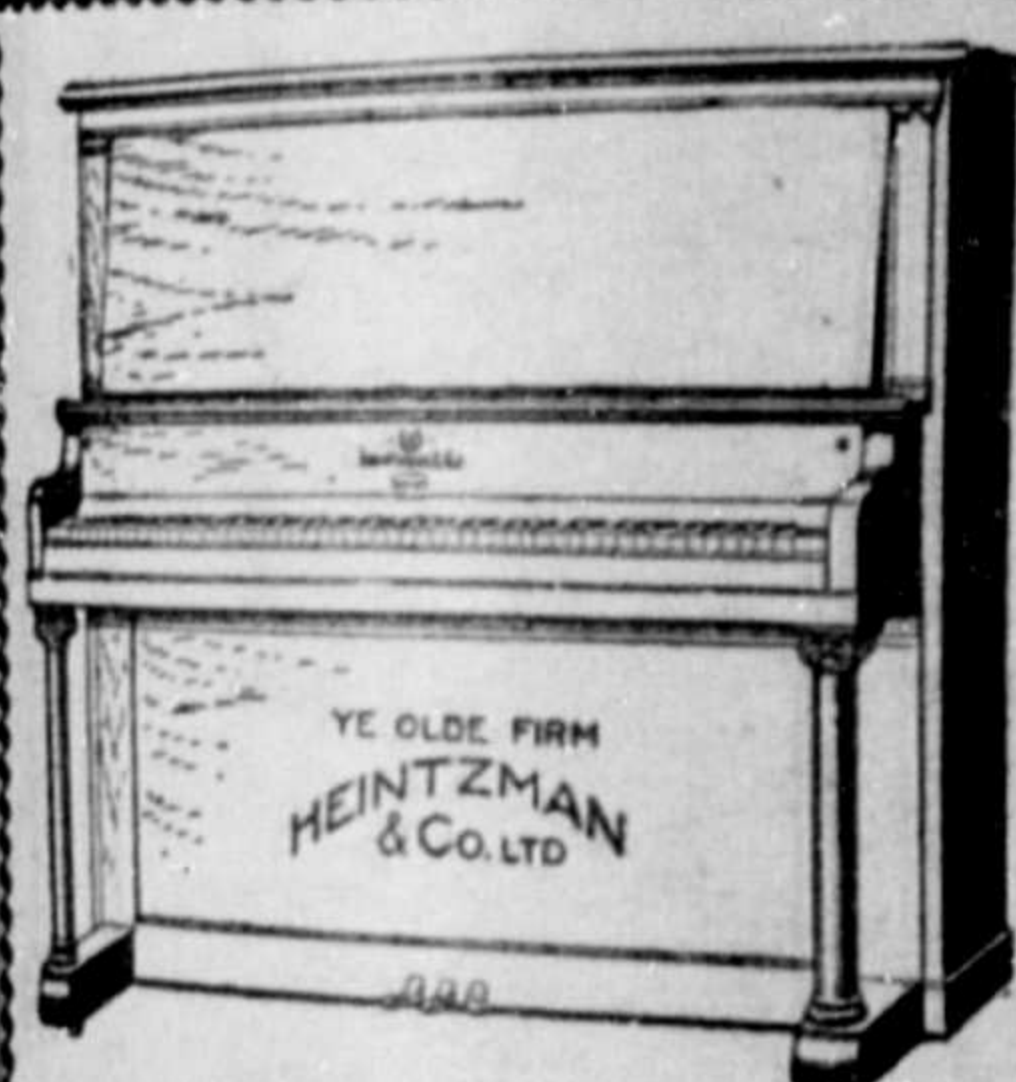

A GOLD STRIKE ON THE STUYHOK RIVER

Forty Cents to Pan Reported, But Grub There is Scarce.

Information has been received here in regard to a gold strike in Alaska not far from Fairbanks. The scene of the strike is on the Stuyhok river, a tributary of the Bonisilla, and is twelve miles from the Yukon river, opposite the Dogfish village below Holy Cross. Concerning the activities, the message states that prospects have been found in Henderson, Last Chance and Flat creeks. One hole put to bedrock on the Hazel bench netted forty cents to the pan from a general average of ten pans taken out. The ground is wet and it is fourteen feet to bedrock. The pay was evidently taken from slides as no gravel was found. About a hundred men are on the scene at the present time. The sender of the message stated that grub was scarce and it would not be advisable to stam-pede for a while.

The Stuyhok heads in about opposite the Dogfish village and runs parallel to the Yukon, running in the upstream direction. It joins the Bonisilla about twelve miles above the Yukon, the Bonisilla running at right angles to the Stuyhok, heading to the eastward.

Those intending to take in the new strike would probably do better by continuing down the Yukon from Holy Cross, striking in from the big bend on the right limit a few miles above the fish village, at which place it is not over twelve miles across.
