## HELIGOLAND QUESTION IS SETTLED BY BIG THREE; GERMANY HAS PROPOSAL

### ITALIAN PEOPLE REPORTED TO BE UNIT BEHIND THEIR DELEGATES — KIEL CANAL DISCUSSED AND ALSO DISPOSITION OF GERMAN CABLES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, April 26.—The question of Heligoland was disposed of by the council of three yesterday afternoon while the matter of Kiel Canal and the disposition of German cables was also discussed. It is understood that the economic question was settled, although no details was given out. The council met again this morning.

#### Italians a Unit.

Rome, April 26.—The impression grows today that the Italian nation is a unit in supporting the claims upon which its representatives in the Peace Conference have taken an irrevocable stand.

#### Germans Have Plan.

Berlin, April 26.—Professor Schuecking, a member of the German Commission of Peace scheduled to leave Monday for Versailles, outlined Germany's plans for a league of nations. They are rapidly being whipped into shape for presentation at the conference. "President Wilson's plan which the Paris conference adopted is not satisfactory because it is a league of diplomats or governments rather than of peoples," said Schuecking.

#### Full Peace Terms.

Ottawa, April 26.—The Dominion Government expects to receive a detailed draft of the peace terms. If the draft is received here it will be released for publication at Ottawa at the same time as at Washington.

## ANDREW HUBER DIES FROM HEART FAILURE

### Falls Down Outside the Empress Hotel When on Round With Milk Wagon.

The death took place this morning suddenly outside the Empress Hotel of Andrew Huber, the driver for the Prince Rupert Dairy. He had been employed by the Prince Rupert Dairy for four or five years and lived with Mr. and Mrs. Robert McKay as one of the family. He was much esteemed as an employee and well-respected in town.

He seems to have been on his rounds when just outside the hotel he was seized with heart failure and fell down and died immediately. The body was found by Mrs. J. C. Morrison on the back steps, and the police at once notified. When he left the dairy this morning he seemed to be in good health.

Huber was of Swiss nationality, coming here from Portland, Ore., where he has sisters. His brother was here until about three months ago and was intending to return in a few weeks.

## CAR SHORTAGE IS PROTESTED

### Board of Trade Passes Resolution Calling Attention to Need of Proper Service.

### CALLS ON GOVERNMENT TO MAKE PROVISION

### Fish Being Diverted to Other Ports is Loss to City and Railway.

At a special meeting of the council of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade held yesterday a complaint was made at the shortage of cars during the last few days and the following resolution of protest was passed:

"Whereas the principal business for the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway from this port consists of shipments of frozen and fresh fish, the former shipped in refrigerator cars, and the latter shipped by express,

"And whereas this traffic is of a highly desirable nature for the railway on account of the high rate which it enjoys, and the maximum haul which it furnishes for the joint interests of this city and the railway that this traffic be given not only the greatest consideration but an effort should be made to increase the volume beyond its present stage.

Left the Port.

"Therefore be it resolved that this Board go on record, and doth protest against the inadequate facilities for handling express fresh fish. We are constrained to make this protest by reason of the fact that this week no less than four American halibut boats having a catch of approximately two hundred and seventy thousand pounds of halibut, which would aggregate from ten to twelve car loads, arrived at the port of Prince Rupert, B. C., to sell and discharge their fish, but on arrival learned that no cars were available, and consequently they immediately took their clearance and set sail for Seattle, thereby not only losing the business for our Canadian railway, but diverting it to an American road, and further rendering it impossible for this community to benefit by the sale and handling of such a large quantity of this commodity and also their sharing in the circulation of the money which would be involved.

#### Call to Government.

"It is further resolved that this Board representing the business interests of this city, do request and petition the Government to take immediate steps to see that ample equipment is provided for the handling of all the fish that can be brought through this gateway from the vast fishing banks adjacent to its port, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Hon. the Minister of Railways and Canals, the official receiver of the Grand Trunk Pacific, Mr. W. P. Hinton, vice-president and general manager, and Mr. Pullen, president of the Canadian Express Company."

## PEACE DELEGATE ARRIVES IN PARIS

### Fiume Reported Full of Italian Soldiers; Great Reception For Orlando.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Paris, April 25.—The first of German peace delegation arrived at Versailles today.  
Paris, April 25.—Italian headquarters announced that Premier Orlando had arrived in Italy and had been accorded a great demonstration. It also announced that Italian troops were guarding the American Embassy in Rome.  
Paris, April 26.—A United States officer who left Fiume three days ago and who has just arrived in Paris says it is reported there that a total of 14 divisions had been moved to Fiume by Italians. He said the city was full of Italian soldiers.

## COMMUNISTS BADLY BEATEN BY ROUMANIAN ARMY; SOME SURRENDER, OTHERS RETREAT

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, April 26.—A Berne despatch to the Times today said that Foreign Minister Bela Kun had appealed to Premier Lenine to begin immediately an offensive to compel the abandonment of the Roumanian invasion of Hungary. The situation in Hungary is desperate, says the dispatch. The peasants are clamoring for the restoration of the monarchy.

Berne, April 26.—Part of the Hungarian Communist army facing the Roumanians southwest of Budabest has surrendered and the rest is in flight, according to a Roumanian official statement received here. West of Budapest the Czecho-Slovaks have occupied Komorn and Raab.

Geneva, April 26.—Czecho-Slovak forces have attacked Waitzen, twenty miles northeast of Budapest. It is expected to fall soon. French troops are said to be aiding the Roumanians in their advance in eastern Hungary.

## CAVE IN AT GRANBY UNDERMINES RAILWAY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Grand Forks, B. C., April 26.—An immense cave in occurred at the Granby mine at Phoenix, the rails of both the Great Northern and Canadian Pacific railways being suspended nearly one hundred feet above the cavity. Residents in adjacent homes are being moved.

## VIOLENT FIGHTING AMONG THE GERMANS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Geneva, April 26.—The German Government troops are attacking Munich and violent fighting is going on, the losses being heavy on both sides. Government troops are said to be gaining ground.

Munich is virtually isolated from the rest of Germany.

## COLONEL PECK TAKES PART IN TITLES DEBATE

### Is Opposed to Knighthoods; Committee to Recommend Cancellation of Hereditary Distinctions.

#### DISTINGUISHED SERVICE IN WAR IS CONSIDERED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, April 26.—The committee considering the granting of titles to Canadians met yesterday morning. The committee decided to make a report to the House in the form of an address, embodying their recommendations.

It was unanimously agreed to recommend that hereditary titles in Canada should cease on the death of the present holders.

Titular distinctions were discussed by the committee. Col. Peck referred to the question of the giving of titles to men who have served with distinction in the army. He pointed out that a number of military men already had been honored and that others equally deserving would feel they had been unfairly treated if not similarly rewarded.

Col. Peck further said he was opposed to knighthoods, but the men who had rendered distinguished service in the war should be considered. He suggested a time limit on the giving of such titles.

**Spiritualistic Seance  
 With Benjamin Franklin.**

Having no particular message for the people of Prince Rupert the editor last night went into a trance, called up the shades of Benjamin Franklin and conversed with him and the following wise sayings were among those which were communicated to him by the great American:

"Wouldst thou enjoy a long life, a healthy body and a vigorous mind and be acquainted also with the wonderful works of God? Labor in the first place to bring thy appetite in subjection to reason.

"I am convinced that truth, sincerity and integrity in dealings between man and man are of the utmost importance to the felicity of life.

"If you teach a young man to shave himself and keep his razor in order, you may contribute more to the happiness of his life than in giving him a thousand guineas.

"It is much better to make good citizens than to make Methodists, Presbyterians or Catholics.

"We are not sure that we have arrived at the end of progression nor at the perfection of spiritual or theological knowledge. For this reason there is danger in printing our confession of faith lest we should feel ourselves bound and confined by it and perhaps unwilling to receive further improvement and our successors still more so.

"Mankind are very odd creatures. One half censure what they practise and the other half practise what they censure; the rest always say and do as they ought.

"The use of money is all the advantage there is in having money.

"Be civil to all, sociable to many, familiar with few, friend to one, enemy to none.

"Reading makes a full man, meditation a profound man, discourse a clear man." (Ben refused to give an opinion on the movies because he said he had never attended one.)

"Keep your eyes wide open before marriage, half shut afterwards.

"Kings and bears often worry their keepers.

"Men differ daily about things which are subject to sense. Is it likely then that they should agree about things invisible?"

"If you'd lose a troublesome visitor, lend him money.

"Let thy maidservant be faithful, strong and homely.

"It would be a hard government that should tax its people one tenth part of their time to be employed in its service. But idleness taxes many of us much more, if we reckon all that is spent in absolute sloth, or doing nothing, with that which is spent in idle employments or amusements that amount to nothing. Sloth, by bringing on disease, absolutely shortens life. Sloth like rust consumes faster than labor wears; while the used key is always bright. Dost thou love life? Then do not squander time for that is the stuff life is made of."

With this final shot at the six-hour day the shade gradually melted into the darkness and was seen no more.

### CONDEMNNS SOLDIER SETTLEMENT BOARD

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Moosejaw, April 25.—At the closing session of the third annual convention of the Saskatchewan Great War Veterans Association, a resolution was passed condemning the present Land Settlement Board of the Union Government and asking for a complete reorganization.

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements will result in same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

### PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

### TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. The land considered available for division is that covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value, selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

## SUSPENDED SENTENCE FOR SELLING WINE TO WHITE INDIAN

The charge against H. W. McKerrow, manager of Thorpe & Co. Ltd., at Vancouver, for selling an Indian by the name of William Dudoward "ginger wine" which after being tested by H. T. Cross was shown to contain 2.4 per cent alcohol, was brought before C. C. Perry, Indian agent, yesterday afternoon in his office. He was found guilty and let out on suspended sentence.

Dominion Constable A. J. Watkinson told of having seized from William Dudoward, chief of the Port Simpson Indians, on the Port Simpson wharf, six cases of ginger wine from Thorpe's Limited. It was tested by H. T. Cross of the customs department, and his test showed the wine to contain 2.4 per cent alcohol. The Indian is living on the Port Simpson Indian reserve.

**Tested for Alcohol.**  
The evidence given by H. T. Cross was that he was employed as an appraiser and part of his duties were to test wines, alcohols, etc. This particular sample of wine handed to him by Constable Watkinson contained 2.4 per cent alcohol, but he did not think it intoxicating.

Evidence was also given by J. F. Maguire, agent for Thorpe & Co., Ltd., who sold the Indian the wine. He did not think it contained any alcohol, neither did he know that Dudoward was an Indian, either by his appearance or his manner of speech. He took him to be a white merchant.

Mr. Perry ordered the goods to be confiscated and destroyed.

## FOOD SCARCITY IS BEING FELT IN ITALY

Rome, April 24.—The critical food situation in Italy is augmented by serious epidemics. The foot and mouth disease has reappeared among the cattle, which die off as they did in the terrible epidemic of 1908. Already meat prices have risen fabulously. Beef which is a quarter bone, costs \$1.40 a pound; lard costs \$2 a pound; ham, \$3.50. Mutton, which previously could be had for 30 cents, now is hard to get for 90 cents. A small pork spare-rib costs 35 cents and cold storage veal costs \$2.20 a pound. An increase in these prices is predicted.

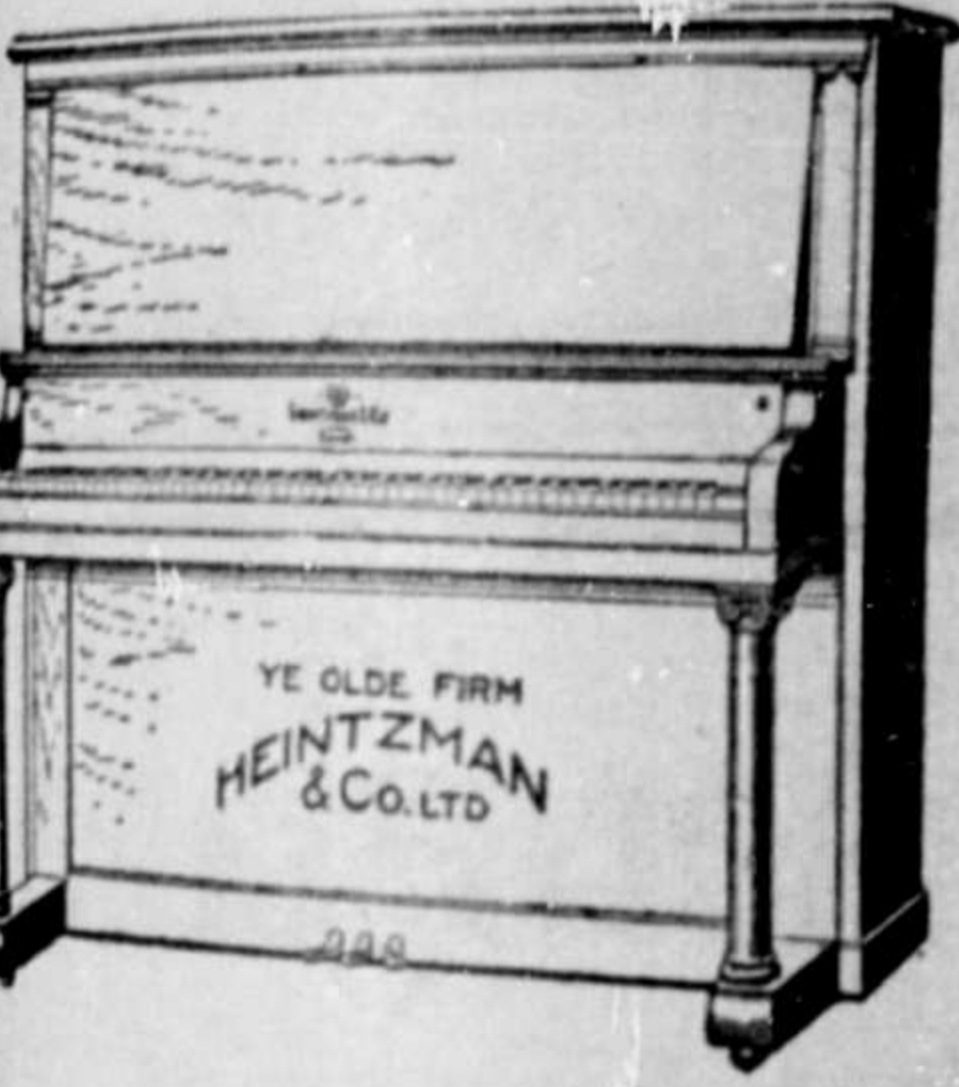
