"Yes, we are very busy, but nobody has any business to be anything else than busy at this juncture when there are so many things to be done," said Hon. T. D. Pattullo to a Daily News man yesterday. "Our government has necessarily had to do a great deal of spade work. Previous to the signing of the armistice practically everybody was profitably employed and it was not thought desirable to engage in an extensive program of public! works. In view of the fact that everybody was bending his efforts to war purposes it would have been folly to take, for instance, men from spruce production to engage in construction of public works.

We are also going after foreign trade in respect to our timber in an aggressive way. In fact in every line with regard to our natural resources we are reaching out looking for development. We must have people here, but we have got to be able to assimilate them when they come and the only way we can assimilate them is to make Fishing Industry.

"With respect to the development of the waterfront in Prince Rupert, I of course, look with every sympathy upon the desire of the fish industry to have much better accommodation than now exists," continued the minister. "Major Hull recently discussed with me the question of the Dominion Government undertaking certain work upon Provincial water front at Seal Cove and I informed Major Hull that if the Dominion Government would undertake the work that I would recommend that the necessary waterfront be provided. I incline to the opinion that the Dominion Government will likely take action, but should they fail to do so the question must be faced from a provincial standpoint.

"What we are trying to bring about is the spirit of co-operation amongst our people. Everybody should try to understand and try to help everybody else.






