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MATHERS COMMISSION HOLDS ITS FIRST SESSION IN VICTORIA AND HEARS RADICAL VIEWS EXPRESSED

Employment and High Cost of Living Blamed for Unrest; Institution of Public Works, State Insurance Against Unemployment and Joint Management of Industries Among Plans Favored to Allay Feeling.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Victoria, April 29.—Unemployment and the cost of living are principal factors in the existing unrest in labor circles in Canada, according to evidence heard yesterday before the Mathers commission. About twenty witnesses were heard in the three sessions, commissioners concluding in time to take the night boat for Vancouver, where the next two days will be spent. The institution of public works by the Federal Government, so employment might be found for those now idle, was advocated freely. State insurance against unemployment was popular. Other co-operative schemes deeply, most of them agreed that a system in which workmen would share the responsibility and receive rewards of industrial management might be expected to accomplish a good deal in the solution of industrial and economic problems.

The suggestion was made that the Government operate a saw mill for training returned men in lumbering. The importance of better housing and social conditions for workmen was also emphasized.

Radical Views.
The most radical views came from E. S. Woodward, president of the Victoria Trades and Labor Council, who gave his personal opinion after the council, as a body, had refused to recognize the commission. If he were "dictator of Canada," he declared, he would start work by expropriating the Canadian Pacific Railway, roadbed as a public highway and would advertise for tenders for the operation of trains. The second act of his dictatorship would be the cancellation of all land titles. Mr. Woodward told the commissioners frankly that he had no faith in the Government which appointed them, little faith in themselves and none whatever in their mission. He declared that the collapse of the present economic scheme was due either later, and he only favored the present commission because it might "ease the sore places and make the operation of the system a little less onerous during the transition from this to the next."

SHORTAGE OF FARM LABORERS

Sask., April 29.—Hon. A. Dunning, minister in charge of the bureau of labor for Saskatchewan, says there will be a shortage of farm labor in the province this spring, despite all the efforts of the department to bring in labor.

TRANSATLANTIC FLIGHT DELAYED

St. Johns, April 28.—A cross wind, sweeping at 25 miles an hour from the southeast, was the only thing that prevented the "hop off" in the transatlantic flight of Capt. Frederick P. Raynham in a Martinsyde seaplane at Mount Pearl plateau yesterday. The British aviator and his navigator, Capt. Chas. W. F. Morgan, stood by the craft for three hours, ready to start at the first favorable shift in the wind but abandoned hope at dusk when it became certain that the landing on the other side would have to be made in darkness.

New York, April 28.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, was seriously injured this afternoon when the taxicab in which he was riding was struck by a Broadway surface car and hurled 20 feet to the curb.

WARK CHANNEL WATER POWER

Report of Engineer on Records Made Shows Possibility of Securing Power There.

T. C. Duncan reported to the City Council at length last night by means of a written report on the tests made at the north arm of the Wark Channel in regard to the water power there. A man was stationed there during the winter for three months and the lowest readings were 56 second feet. Mr. Duncan recommended that the city would be quite safe in putting in a 250-kilo generator and then connection could be made with the drydock. He said that this would be the cheapest and most feasible power for the city to use. The report was laid on the table for the aldermen to study it.

PROVINCIAL CELLS FOR WOMEN PRISONERS

Alderman Kirkpatrick Recommends Asking That Provincial Government Repair Lockup.

On the suggestion of Alderman Kirkpatrick it was decided at the meeting of the City Council last night to take up with the Provincial Government the desirability of renovating the cells in the provincial government building in order to do away with the necessity for making an addition to the local jail to accommodate women. It was pointed out that there were four cells in the government building and that most of the prisoners were not city prisoners but government prisoners. The present city jail was too small to make provision for women.

PREPARE TO WELCOME PECK IN VICTORIA

Comrades of Great War Taking Him With View to Giving Him Fitting Reception.

Word has been received from Victoria that the Comrades of the Great War at a recent meeting made preliminary arrangements to give a proper welcome to Lieut.-Col. Peck, V. C., on his return from overseas with the British Columbia members of his battalion. The meeting was held in the Comrades Club rooms on Douglas Street.

BOLSHEVIKS THREATEN TO SHOOT CITIZENS

Berne, April 29.—Reports from Bavaria state that the communists of Munich threaten that when the city is besieged the citizens will be shot in rows on the Marienplatz. Numerous peasants, tradesmen and workers are volunteering to march against Munich.

REVISED COVENANT OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS ADOPTED BY CONFERENCE

Paris, April 29.—The revised covenant of the League of Nations was adopted by the plenary session of the Peace Conference yesterday without a division.

The resolution in regard to the covenant was moved by President Wilson, who said Sir Eric Drummond of Great Britain was named as the first secretary-general of the league. Regarding the composition of the executive council, the president said Belgium, Brazil, Greece and Spain would be represented on the council, in addition to the five great allied powers, Great Britain, France, Italy, the United States and Japan, until a permanent choice had been made.

SHOWDOWN WITH JAPAN TODAY

Delegates Meet With Big Three to Discuss Situation in Far East.

Paris, April 29.—A climax is predicted in the Chino-Japanese territorial controversy when the "Big Three" met today. According to authoritative information the Japanese representatives were summoned for a "showdown." Just prior to the session the Japanese delegates conferred with President Wilson. They are understood to have insisted on their rights to valuable concessions in Shantung Peninsula, which they claimed were supported by a secret treaty with Great Britain. The President, his associates declared, is prepared to take just as firm a stand as he did in the Italian situation. He is said to have the full support of the British.

STRIKE AT WINNIPEG ALMOST INEVITABLE

Railway Employees Demand 70c. An Hour—Company Offers 50c.

Winnipeg, April 29.—Trouble is brewing in many departments of labor and May 1 may see drastic developments. Present indications suggest that the street railway employees strike is almost inevitable. The motormen and conductors are demanding a maximum of 70c. per hour and the company has offered 50c. It is not at all likely that the men will accept this and on the other hand officials of the road declare that the earning power of the road is not sufficient to warrant the payment of such rates.

Meet the Minister And Discuss Matters.

The member for the district in the local house and the head of one of the important departments in the Provincial Government is in the city. Tomorrow afternoon he is to address the Board of Trade in the council chamber on things which interest this city, and he is meeting many people individually and discussing matters with them.

This is the time to keep in touch with what is going on in Victoria. Mr. Pattullo is naturally very elated on the success of the Government in rescuing the finances from a very low condition and feels pleased at the large amount of work they have done. He says that practically everything the returned men had asked of them recently had already been discussed and practically decided upon.

The city council expects to meet the minister in regard to the housing scheme. The details of the agreement between the city and the province have to be worked out and the council realizes that the best thing to do is to get first hand information.

Now that Mr. Pattullo is here is the time to take up any public matters that may be of pressing interest to Prince Rupert people as long as they fall within the jurisdiction of the provincial authorities.

Clear the Way For Development.

There have been recent inquiries sent to the City Council in regard to the use of the waterpower on Falls River. The city at present has first claim on it, but it is generally realized that to bring power from that distance and to provide the mechanical appliances to develop it would be much too big a job for the city. Financing it would be an impossibility.

Apparently there must be some other concern that has the use of that power in view. It is known that there have been people looking for power for pulp and paper mills and for other purposes. If there is a possibility of some big industry being established up the river, it would hardly be wise for the city to continue to hold on to its reserve and keep the industry out. It is wise to look well ahead, but foolish to be guided too much by sentiment when opportunity is knocking at the door. Nothing will build up this city like encouraging big industries to come. We are in a difficult position insofar as laying out and improving the city, and it will take all our resources for many years to come to construct roads and sewers and parks and put in water mains.

City Park is Beauty Spot.

Those who have not visited the new park at the corner of McBride St. and Eleventh Ave. should lose no time in enjoying the beauties of this pretty place. The city engineering department has done wonders with the small amount of money at its disposal and it may confidently be expected that in a few years Prince Rupert will have there as pretty a park as is seen anywhere on the coast.

The particular beauty of the place is the stream that flows through it. This has been partially cleared of logs and the change in its appearance during the last weeks is a delight.

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MEMBER OUTLINES THE WORK WHICH HAS BEEN DONE AND IS TO BE PROCEEDED WITH

HON. T. D. PATTULLO GIVES INTERVIEW ON WORK OF THE GOVERNMENT IN VARIOUS DEPARTMENTS; BUSINESSMEN OF VICTORIA AND VANCOUVER MAY COME HERE

"Yes, we are very busy, but nobody has any business to be anything else than busy at this juncture when there are so many things to be done," said Hon. T. D. Pattullo to a Daily News man yesterday. "Our government has necessarily had to do a great deal of spade work. Previous to the signing of the armistice practically everybody was profitably employed and it was not thought desirable to engage in an extensive program of public works. In view of the fact that everybody was bending his efforts to war purposes it would have been folly to take, for instance, men from spruce production to engage in construction of public works.

With the signing of the armistice it was necessary to immediately prepare an extensive program having in view two objects: (1) works of a productive character, (2) to relieve unemployment.

Appropriations.

We have appropriated for this year some twelve millions of dollars; some three and one half millions for public works, a considerable amount of which will be spent on capital account; \$1,250,000 for construction of houses for soldiers; \$1,500,000 for construction work on the Pacific Great Eastern Railway; \$2,000,000 for the operations of the Land Settlement Board; \$500,000 for the development of the South Okanagan irrigation project and \$700,000 for the protection of the irrigable lands in the dry belt and \$2,000,000 for the new department of industry. This is a large expenditure to add to our present indebtedness, but British Columbia is a huge territory with immense resources, and we must view the situation from a broad gauge aspect. Our problem is to get more people into the country and the only way to get more people is to develop our resources. This we propose to do with all the energy we possess.

Northern B. C.

As far as Northern British Columbia is concerned, in addition to the land situation, which is now being taken care of in comprehensive fashion, and to the opening up of our mineral resources, we must look to the development of our timber resources. There are a number of projects in hand of which it is not possible to make any announcement at the present because they are still in tentative form, but we will leave no stone unturned, as far as we are concerned, to bring these matters to a head.

At the last session we passed legislation to encourage the pulp industry by enabling the conversion of limits now held as timber licences to pulp licences. This will considerably lessen the carrying charge for the operator. We took power also to enter into special agreements during the first years of operations in respect to our water powers, in order to encourage the establishment of the industries. We are also going after foreign trade in respect to our timber in an aggressive way. In fact in every line with regard to our natural resources we are reaching out looking for development. We must have people here, but we have got to be able to assimilate them when they come and the only way we can assimilate them is to make it profitable for them to live here.

Fishing Industry.

"With respect to the development of the waterfront in Prince Rupert, I of course, look with every sympathy upon the desire of the fish industry to have much better accommodation than now exists," continued the minister. "Major Hull recently discussed with me the question of the Dominion Government undertaking certain work upon Provincial water front at Seal Cove and I informed Major Hull that if the Dominion Government would undertake the work that I would recommend that the necessary waterfront be provided. I incline to the opinion that the Dominion Government will likely take action, but should they fail to do so the question must be faced from a provincial standpoint.

"What we are trying to bring about is the spirit of co-operation amongst our people. Everybody should try to understand and try to help everybody else.

Businessmen's Trip.

"I have just recently suggested to the Board of Trade in Victoria

that they should co-operate with the Board of Trade in Vancouver and go on a business man's trip through British Columbia in order that the businessmen of Vancouver and Victoria should become better acquainted with the resources of the province. I suggested that they should take a trip this year to Prince Rupert, Prince George, thence down the Pacific Great Eastern to Vancouver and I am asking the president of the Board of Trade here, Mr. McCaffery, to take the matter up with the Boards of Trade at Vancouver and Victoria. It seems to me that an understanding of each other's needs is a very vital factor.

Returned Soldiers.

"With reference to what is generally known as the soldier problem, we are trying to meet the situation comprehensively and we believe that we are doing so. I do not think there is any other province in the Dominion that is doing more, if as much, than we are. At the recent session there was not one single suggestion made that we had not anticipated. We must not look upon the result (continued on Page Four.)

turned soldier as a liability. He is a great asset. Every able-bodied man is a great asset. In fact the human is the one fundamental asset. It is the duty of each and all of us to do everything possible to bring about the rapid assimilation of the returned soldier into civil life. Criticisms, of course, are offered from time to time, but that is to be expected.

"Of 178 appointments to the civil service since last July, 148 were returned soldiers and of the remaining 30, most of them were girls and messenger boys.

"I shall be in town for two or three days, and will then proceed with Mr. Mobley, who is returning tomorrow, to his district, to see how matters governmental are proceeding in that district.

"Northern British Columbia surely has great potentialities and it may interest people to know that seven-eighths of British Columbia is represented by one-eighth of the legislature, which is an indication that what we need in this northern country and in fact in all parts of the province are people and more people."

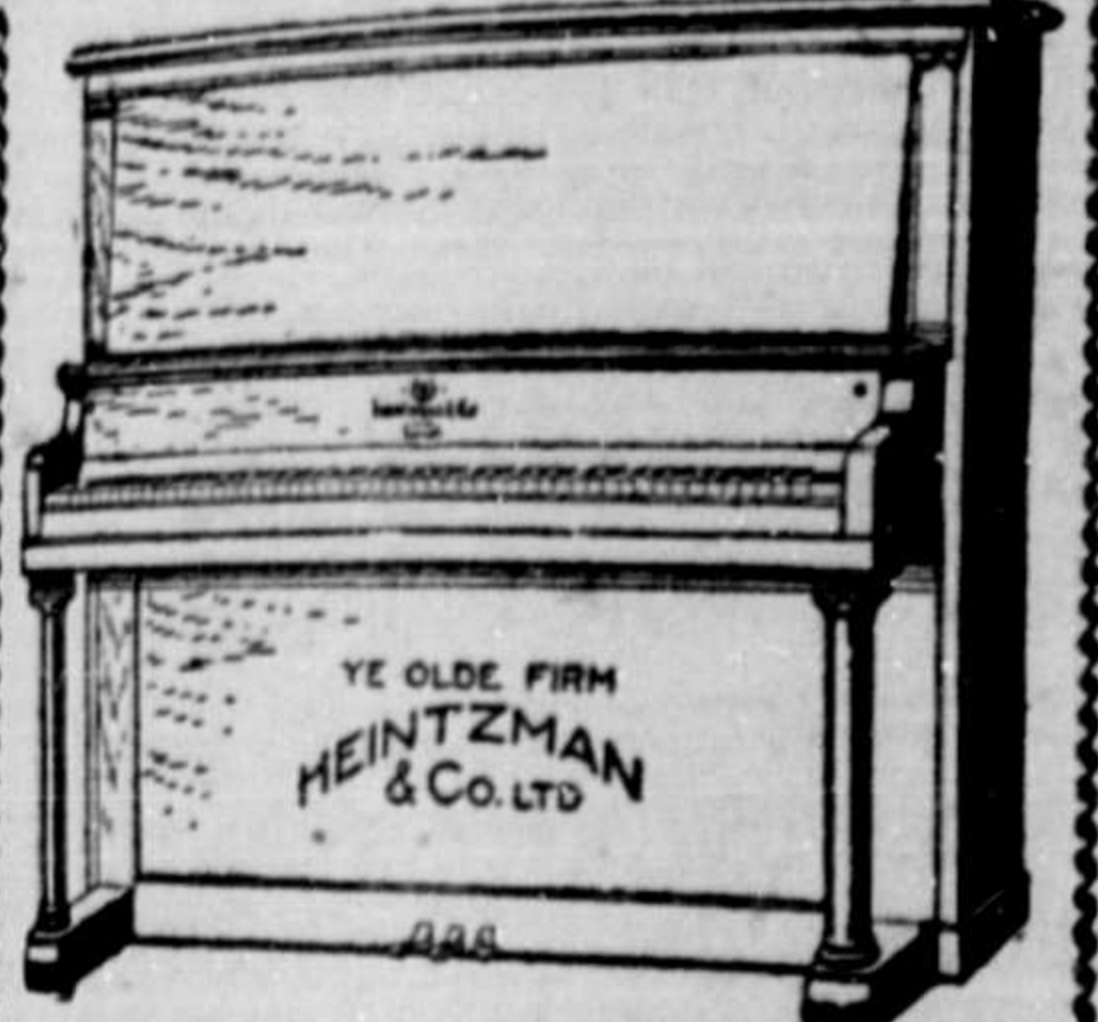

GOOD PROGRESS WITH SEEDING OPERATIONS IN SASKATCHEWAN

Wheat Above Ground in Some Districts—Fine Weather Prevails There.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
