INSECURITY OF LABOR IS CAUSE OF INDUSTRIAL UNREST SAYS MATHERS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, April 30.—"We have been impressed with the insecurity of labor as one of the great causes of the present industrial unrest, it is hanging over the workingman like a cloud," Chairman Mather of the Royal Commission on Industrial Relations, in the course of the session here.
N. G. Neill, manager of the Employers' Association of British Columbia, favored strongly the creation of industrial councils for every trade group, with a provincial executive of employers and employees as a court of appeal and a federal council constructed in the same plan as a final court of last resort. It was his view that such a system of industrial government would eliminate arbitration and strikes, because disputes would be settled in a reasonable way before they reached the danger point.

NO AGREEMENT WITH JAPAN

Three Fail to Reach Settlement at First Session; Peace Terms Not Ready.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, April 30.—The Japanese delegates and the "Big Three" failed to reach an agreement in the Sino-Japanese territorial controversy in their first session. The British are reported to have agreed that the first meeting of the League of Nations shall be held in Washington with President Wilson presiding.
Because of the 24-hour strike for May 1, especially affecting transportation and communications, some doubt is expressed whether the peace terms would be presented to the Germans on that day.

COMMUNISTS FIRE ON GOVERNMENT AIRPLANES AT MUNICH

Great Difficulty Found in Feeding Populace and Many Soldiers.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Berne, April 30.—Airplanes of the Hoffman Government forces flying over Munich have been fired on repeatedly by Communists, and as a result thirteen civilians have been killed and 100 wounded. The Communist Government has forbidden firing at airplanes.
This measure is said to have been taken, however, with the view of saving ammunition.
The Communist Government in Munich is said to be experiencing great difficulty in feeding the populace and a large number of soldiers are concentrated there.

BRITISH CONTINGENT IS RETURNING HOME

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Victoria, April 30.—Bringing the first large contingent of Canadian troops back from Siberia, the C. P. O. S. Montegale is scheduled to arrive here Tuesday next. The Montegale, which sailed from Vladivostok on April 21, has on board 55 officers and 1,026 men of other ranks for Vancouver and Victoria.

JAPANESE ARE IN LIMELIGHT AT CONFERENCE

Proposal of China to Pay and Keep Territory Not Favored By Neighbor.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, April 30.—The session of the Council of Three ended late this afternoon without any decision on either the Japanese or Belgian questions. A compromise was proposed to Japan with respect to the Kiao Chau problem but no conclusion was reached. It is understood that further consideration will be given the matter at an early date.
Kiao Chau is now rivaling Fiume as a peace stumbling block, and is attracting much attention. The Chinese proposition is to let Japan keep Kiao Chau and the former German concessions for one year under a pledge to turn them back upon China reimbursing Japan for the cost of capturing Tsing Tau. This is unfavorably received by the Japanese.

EMPLOYERS TAKE PART IN INQUIRY AT VANCOUVER CITY

Vancouver, April 30.—At Vancouver at the opening session of the industrial relations commission, presented a contrast to Victoria in the organized presentation of the case by employers. In the latter city all evidence from both sides, although interesting, was desultory since neither would the Trades and Labor Council appear officially, nor were the employers well organized. In Vancouver the Trades and Labor Council will ignore the commission, but employers had a continuous lineup of witnesses at the sessions.

ITALIAN REPORTS ARE DISQUIETING

Paris, April 30.—Disquieting reports from Rome reached here late today. Conferences between Premier Orlando and American Ambassador Page are said to have been unsatisfactory. A number of anti-American demonstrations have taken place.

NO ACTION REGARDING RESPONSIBILITY OF EX-KAISER WILHELM

Paris, April 30.—Doubt has arisen whether the responsibility of the former German Emperor will be included in the peace treaty owing to the failure of the plenary session to take action on the report of the Council of Four recommending his prosecution which was on yesterday's agenda. Parliamentarians say that the council might still include its report in the treaty, but as the subject is one on which the plenary conference was ordered to report, inaction on the report prevents its inclusion in the treaty unless the secret plenary session of the conference directs further action.

THE TRANS-ATLANTIC FLIGHT POSTPONED

May Not Take Place For Two Weeks Owing to Weather Conditions.

St. Johns, April 30.—With another sudden change to bad weather the start of the trans-Atlantic flight of Harry Hawker, Australian, and Capt. Frederick Raynham, his British rival, may be postponed from two days to a fortnight hence, when the full moon may bring hopes for flying conditions. Out of a clear sky at breakfast time strong easterly winds swept down on this section of the Newfoundland coast bringing rain in its wake.

GERMANS DEPORTED

Melbourne, April 30.—All interned Germans are to be deported from Australia, commencing the latter part of May, it is officially announced.

Y. M. C. A. HELD ORGANIZATION MEETING HERE

Number of Officers Chosen to Handle the Campaign For Funds.

A meeting was held last night to organize for the Y. M. C. A. campaign for funds to carry on the general work of that big organization. Officers were elected and a general committee is being chosen to get the campaign under way.

Treasurer, D. Donaldson.
Executive—Rev. Canon Rix, Rev. Dr. Grant, Rev. W. W. Wright, Mr. Fuller and Mr. Breen. Others are being interviewed today with a view to have them join the committee.
Mr. Welch who is looking after the organization explained the big work which has been done by the Y. M. C. A. in France and in the other countries wherever the Canadian troops have gone. He also told of the need for the Y. M. C. A. in Canada now that the boys are returning, in connection with reconstruction. The sum being asked from the people of Canada is \$1,100,000, of which \$175,000 is to be given to the Y. M. C. A. for helping girls.
The campaign commences in a few days and no time will be lost in seeing that the people here be given an opportunity to do their bit.

PRICE SMASHING OF WHEAT AT CHICAGO

United States Government Ceases to Prevent Speculative Hoarding for Present.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
St. Louis, Mo., April 30.—Commenting on the tremendous price smashing that took place on the Chicago Board of Trade today, Julius Barnes, Federal wheat director and president of the grain corporation of food administration, tonight said the Government will discontinue until further announcement export purchases of wheat as a preventative of speculative hoarding.

MORE CARE TAKEN REGARDING SETTLERS

Ottawa, April 30.—Hon. J. A. Calder's Immigration Bill and Major General Mewburn's Militia Department estimates occupied the attention of Parliament yesterday. While emphasizing the necessity of increased population and greater production that the waste spaces of the country may be filled, Mr. Calder recognized that there must be more attention paid in future to the class of people allowed to come into Canada while more must be done to make the new arrivals good Canadians than in the past.

ITALIANS VOTE CONFIDENCE IN THEIR PREMIER

Immense Majority, 382 to 40, is Given in Chamber of Deputies At Rome.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Rome, April 30.—The Chamber of Deputies last night voted confidence in the cabinet by a vote of 382 to 40, the latter being cast by Socialists. The vote followed an address by Premier Orlando, which was constantly interrupted by applause and ended in an ovation in the Chamber, even the Tribunes joining.
Former Premier Luzzatti followed the Premier and was also applauded except by the Socialists, whose spokesman, Deputy Turati, explained why Socialists could not give a vote of confidence to the cabinet.
Paris, April 30.—The British Prime Minister has again intervened in the Italian situation by sending a trusted associate to communicate personally with Premier Orlando at Rome. While the desire is to conciliate Signor Orlando, the Premier is advised against the inclusion of Fiume under Italian control, as likely to make a settlement difficult, if not impossible.

W. P. HINTON AT BOARD OF TRADE

General Manager of G. T. P. and Minister of Lands Expected To Meet Members.

W. P. Hinton, general manager and vice-president of the G. T. P., arrived this afternoon and will meet the Board of Trade along with Hon. T. D. Pattullo this afternoon at 5, at the City Hall. It is expected that there will be a good attendance to meet the minister and the head of the railway company in connection with the needs of Prince Rupert.

Labor Discredited By Its Spokesmen.

The remarkable statement of the president of the Victoria Trades and Labor Council that if dictator of Canada he would expropriate the C. P. R. and advertise for tenders for operating the trains, gives a pretty good idea of what would happen if the country were in the hands of the absolutely ignorant. No one but an ignoramus would have suggested such a thing as advertising for tenders to run trains. Here is a class of work which requires the highest type of intellect, that requires the most perfect organization in order to have everything safe for the general public. Men devote their whole lives to the business and make a study of it, and then some Bolshevik would come along and let the work to a wholly new organization just because they put in a lower tender. That would be the way to send the travelling public to Hades by the shortest route.

Again the president of the Victoria Trades and Labor Council would let the work to the lowest tenderer, which means that the labor would be sweated in order to earn dividends, even worse than at present.

Why is it that the workmen do not choose their leaders or their presiding officers with care. The Victoria Labor Council is supposed to represent the workers of Victoria, and yet that is the best idea he can put forward. Surely the world war has made lunatics of us all!

The News has no plea for the C. P. R. It is a corporation that has been successful in doing a great work for Canada, but like most other corporations it has been soulless. It pays good dividends to the shareholders and often it does that at the expense of its employees. At the same time it is better than anything else that offers for the work, better probably than government ownership. One of the first things for labor to do when it gets into power should be to hang a few of its few fool spokesmen who discredit it on every occasion.

League of Nations Adopted by Conference.

The League of Nations yesterday came into being. It is ridiculed in some quarters and prophesies of its uselessness are made in other quarters, but the fact remains that it is the first honest attempt to have the nations of the world get together and settle their differences without recourse to war. It may fail, but if it does it may point the way to future improvements. President Wilson has carried his point and everyone will wish it may be successful in its working out, for no one desires war unless it be a few profiteers who make money out of it.

Idleness Does Not Mean Happiness.

In a remarkable address before the Leeds Luncheon Club, W. A. Appleton, secretary of the General Federation of Trade Unions in Great Britain, declared that one general misapprehension was that idleness made for happiness. Continuing, he said, as reported in The London Times:

If people who were striving for more leisure were only doing so in order that they might do nothing, he was sure that they were not going to be any happier. It was the exercise of thought and creative capacity that afforded the highest happiness. He was afraid we were getting into trouble by imagining that shorter hours necessarily meant less unemployment. The effect would be seriously to increase the cost of production and the selling price in overseas markets. He feared they were making the mistake of assuming that the grievances of the minority were more important than the welfare of the majority. They were having lightning strikes, which were stopping production and holding up the whole country. We were running after will o' the wisps, and later on we would have to pay for the foolishness that had kept us more or less idle for the past three months. Three occupations were today combining to compel the rest of the workers to pay additions to their wages. He wanted the miners, the railwaymen and the transport workers to have a good time, but they should realize that every penny put upon the community handicapped the other fellow.

At the meeting of the Hospital Board last night an increase in salary was granted to Miss E. M. Stewart of the Hospital staff. She will receive \$60 per month, beginning May 1.

Divorce! "The one great black spot" of which Cardinal Gibbons complains, will be shown in all its intensity in "The Blindness of Divorce," at the Westholme tonight.

At a meeting of the Hospital Board last night in the mayor's office the question of sending delegates to the hospital convention at Vancouver in July was discussed and it was decided to appoint D. C. Stewart delegate, as he will be there at that time.

A very great need for a tuberculosis sanitarium was brought up at the meeting of the Hospital Board last night by W. E. Collison. The opinion seemed to be that it should be erected in the Hazelton district, on account of the dry climate there. The need will be brought to the attention of the Government.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but prices not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 50 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the value of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality.

The rights of persons to whom the purchase of this Act is enlarged to apply are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

WANTS STRIP OF ALASKA

Archbishop Du Vernet Suggests All-Canadian Route Into the Atlin Country.

The following letter has been received for publication:
To the Editor—Now that the Peace Conference has introduced to the very sensible idea of a corridor to allow a shut-in nation access to the sea we should press the Canadian Government to secure a corridor up Taku Inlet in Alaska to allow the Atlin District to have a Canadian sea port. A narrow strip of territory about twenty-five miles long would be quite sufficient, and as there are no settlers there at present there would be no complications as there would be at Skagway. The shortest and easiest way into the rich mineral region of northern British Columbia (once a road were made) is up the Taku river. The Taku and Nakina rivers form almost a direct line to Teslin Lake at the north end of which is the placer gold field lately discovered. It is well known that almost every creek in the Atlin district carries gold but inadequate means of transportation retards the development of the country. The Government of the United States is now in a most friendly mood towards Canada, and a greater output of gold is demanded.

MUNICH SURROUNDED BY GERMAN TROOPS

BOLSHEVIKI DRIVEN OUT

Helsingfors, April 28.—A national assembly has been formed at Olonetz, 110 miles northeast of Petrograd, where the Finns have driven out the Bolsheviki. The town was captured, according to reports, by volunteer troops.
