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## PREPARING TO RECEIVE THE AUSTRIAN PEACE DELEGATES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, May 3.—Preparations were begun at St. Germain today for the reception of the Austrian peace delegates. Although no date has been set for the arrival, this activity indicates they will be here before the German delegation leaves for Versailles. St. Germain is located on the Seine, seven miles north of Versailles and ten miles northwest of Paris.

According to recent information separate treaties with Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria are to be taken up in succession immediately after the Germans receive the terms of the pact they signed.

## MILITARISM BROKEN SAYS HINDENBURG

Berlin, May 3.—"German militarism is broken forever," is a statement attributed to Field Marshal von Hindenburg, the reason of whose resignation have been received here. General Hindenburg, former head of the German army, who is now chief of staff, is mentioned as his chief successor, according to news received from Kolberg.

## ARRESTED FOR HOUSE BREAKING

A charge of breaking and entering, Sam Albert, a pre-emptor of Porecher Island, was arrested at Seal Cove this morning by Principal Police Constable Logan and will come up before Magistrate McMullin tomorrow afternoon.

Constable Logan has just returned to the city after a patrol of Porecher Island, where he received complaints of many cabins being entered and information laid.

## GERMAN WAR SHIPS NOT TO SINK

Paris, May 2.—The naval terms included in the peace treaty with Germany do not provide for the sinking of the larger German warships. Disposition of the vessels will be made later by the Allied powers.

## LECTURE TOMORROW IN WESTHOLME THEATRE

R. Crowe-Swords to Speak on  
"The Alien Enemy and the  
Returned Soldier."

R. Crowe-Swords, returned soldier, and late industrial adviser under the Military Service Act, will be the speaker at the Westholme Theatre at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon.

By special request Mr. Crowe-Swords will deal extensively with the alien question and by reason of his former official position, is considered an authority on this subject.

He will also deal with the atrocities committed by the Germans, going into this subject fully. French life will also be touched upon, of which Mr. Crowe-Swords tells many amusing incidents, which keep his audience in laughter.

Over one hundred and fifty British and Canadian official pictures of the front line and other scenes will be shown on the screen, including a series of humorous slides by Captain Bruce Bairnsfather, as well as pictures showing what is being done by the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment in the re-educating of disabled soldiers.

A lecture such as this promises to be, should interest all citizens of Prince Rupert, being not only entertaining but educational. Mr. Crowe-Swords is said by all who have heard him at various points to be an exceptionally fine speaker. He is also a veteran of the South African war, where he served with both the Canadian and Imperial forces.

Peace Conference Leaves Germans With An Army of 100,000 Men.

## WORST STORM ON PRAIRIES EVER KNOWN

Calgary, May 3.—The worst snow storm for this time of year recorded in many years was raging during the past night, is the information in general over the province. The storm which raged here is also raging at Lethbridge in the south where the storm was the worst recorded outside of winter.

Snow is heavy at Olds and is reported drifting along the fences two and three feet deep.

## DEFUSE DEMAND BUT CONSIDER REQUEST TO SECURE EX-KAISER

London, May 3.—It is now stated that the Dutch hold that the former Emperor of Germany cannot be extradited for trial by the Allied Entente. They will refuse a demand for his deliverance of the ex-Kaiser, but will consider a polite request.

## GILL NET LICENSES FOR RETURNED MEN

Allotment of Licenses in Northern Waters Shows a Percentage for Soldiers.

Fresh from Ottawa, full of schemes for his department, Lt.-Col. F. H. Cunningham, chief inspector of fisheries in British Columbia for the federal government, has arrived back, says the Vancouver Sun.

Inspector Cunningham states that although many matters were discussed with the acting minister, everything is still before the minister who only returned to his office yesterday after a lengthy illness, consequently any business done will have to receive the approval of the minister before it becomes effective.

One matter, however, was settled, and that was the question of issuing fish licenses with the object of caring for the returned soldier, at the same time not losing sight of the fact that there is a necessity for conservation.

In district No. 2 comprising that area of the northern waters between Smith's Inlet and the boundary line on Portland Canal including the Queen Charlotte Islands, there is a limitation on boats engaged in gill net fishing, as follows: Rivers Inlet, 700; Skeena River, 850; Naas River, 275; Smiths Inlet, 115; Bella Coola, 100; Dean Channel, 80; Namu, 40, and Butedale, 60. On Rivers Inlet, Smith Inlet, Bella Coola, Dean Channel and Butedale a 30 per cent. allotment has been reserved for returned soldiers up to June 1. On the Naas 20 per cent, Namu 20 per cent and Skeena 15 per cent. This totals up about 500 gill net licenses reserved for soldiers. When the full complement has been made up of boats on any area any privileges for additional licenses have been reserved for soldiers only.

In the matter of seining licenses of which it is understood there are over 100 applications by soldiers, the inspector stated that although that matter had been discussed nothing definite was done until the minister returns to office, but Mr. Cunningham expects to hear any day now of the government's decision in this matter, together with other important questions discussed while he was at the capital.

A Chinaman by the name of Gee Dew, appeared before Magistrate McMullin this morning in the police court charged with having opium in his possession to the value of \$60. He was fined \$25 and the opium confiscated.

## BEER SOLD IS MUCH ABOVE TWO AND HALF

Report to the Police Commission Shows That of Twenty Samples All Were Above Legal Percentage.

If the police undertake to prosecute all who have been selling beer and cider in contravention of the Prohibition Act, all the grocery stores, the hotels, the pool rooms, bars and peanut stands and wholesalers in the city will have to pay fines into the civic exchequer. According to a report made to the police commission yesterday all the samples which have been analyzed, numbering about twenty in all, were above the two and a half per cent allowed by law, and the end is not yet. One sample of cider went as high as nine per cent. Beer contained over seven per cent alcohol, and no sample contained less than 2.9 per cent.

Much of the beer was of standard brewing, coming from well known breweries. It was properly labelled and bottles in many cases were sealed. In others there was neither name nor label and bottles were simply corked.

In the discussion that followed the report, it was shown that both wholesalers and retailers were probably innocent of any offence in most cases. In other cases warnings had been given that drinks being sold were not within the legal requirements. It was suggested that it was the duty of the Government to test the beer before it was sent from the breweries in order to protect the innocent dealers. If the stuff was certified it would protect the dealer and make the work of enforcement easier.

The police commissioners decided to take legal advice before commencing prosecutions under the Act. This will be done immediately and a course of action decided upon.

## Acropolis Hill as Site for New School.

The proposal to have the new public school erected on the hill near the exhibition building in order to be in the centre of population and to provide immediately large play grounds for the pupils without further expense to the city, has been very well received. It is generally recognized that the ordinary city block is much too small to accommodate an eight or ten roomed school and at the same time to give space for playgrounds both for the boys and girls. This is clearly shown at the King Edward school where the boys may not play baseball for fear of breaking the windows.

The King Edward School provides for all the pupils in the direction of Hays Cove. There is still a room to spare at Seal Cove, but the only accommodation for the southwesterly District is the Borden St. School, part of which is used for a high school. It was built for a high school and it is suggested that it continue to be used for that purpose for the present.

The only objection taken to the use of Acropolis Hill is the climb for the children. But when did a climb hurt a child? The healthy child enjoys a climb. Up there the youngsters will be away from the smoke and dust and noise of the city. There does not seem to be any alternative proposal that is worth considering.

The News would like to urge on the school trustees the need of taking immediate action to provide for the pupils, no matter what site they choose. It is not fit that the pupils should be taught in buildings that have been built for stores and which are not suited for school purposes. The city population will be increasing rapidly and it takes much longer to erect schools than houses. If the structure is to be of a permanent nature, as it is to be supposed it will, an immediate start is necessary to cope with the present situation.

## Samuel Gompers Opposes Bolshevism.

Bolshevism was bitterly denounced by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, in his address before the National Civic Federation after his return to America.

"All of you who know me or know of my attitude in regard to labor conditions know my absolute opposition to Bolshevism in theory and to Bolshevism in fact," he said.

In theory Bolshevism is an impossibility. In fact, if it were put into operation, or could be put into operation, it would mean the decadence or perversion of the civilization of our time. To me the story of the desperate Samson who pulled the Temple on his head is an example of what is meant by Bolshevism. I am not willing that all of the genius of past ages should be flung to the winds. And I am not willing that the little service that I may have been able to render during the long years that I have attempted to improve conditions in a constructive way should be destroyed by maddened desperation. And so may I say to you that it is well for us to see now that our house is kept in order."

## PRINCE GEORGE SETTLES DOWN AFTER RIOTS

"Citizen" Gives Full Account of  
Troubles Which Resulted in  
Several Leaving Town.

Damage to the Arcade building estimated at \$2,000, Max Schenk's real estate office was wrecked, the interior of Conrad Reinharz' office suffered a like fate and a plate glass window demolished in the Princess block, says the Prince George Citizen. This summarizes the damage wrought Thursday night when a demonstration led by returned soldiers and civilians finally settled down.

The attack on the Arcade building, the soldiers allege, was made because of a letter written to the city council by Joseph Tadin and published in the Citizen on the 16th inst. The returned men further state that Tadin's letter was intended to discredit the city police force, of which a war veteran, Alex. Stewart, is chief constable.

The trouble had been brewing for some days, and on Thursday evening the Great War Veterans held a special meeting at which it was decided to give notice to some alleged trouble makers that their room was greatly to be preferred to their company as citizens. Violence of any kind was forbidden and so understood by the veterans. Among those to whom notice was to be given were Joseph Tadin and former Chief of Police Dolan, who, the returned men say, was really the man behind Tadin in making trouble for the present chief of police.

**Germans Tagged.**  
Accordingly, the meeting broke up about 10 p.m., the soldiers lined up on George street, formed fours and marched off in search of Tadin and Dolan. Neither could be located and procession disbanded with the understanding that the "disturbers" would be located next day. A number of Germans whose alleged activities and sympathies had become distasteful to the veterans were also tagged for deportation, and these included Reinharz and Schenk.

Up to the time the soldiers disbanded the proceedings had been orderly and evidently without thought of violent methods. A majority of the soldiers dispersed to their homes and it was thought all danger of destructive demonstration had passed.

Nearly two hours later a group of soldiers and civilians gathered opposite the Arcade building, when the destruction of the front of that building commenced.

**German Opens Fusillade.**  
Mayor Carney, who had arrived on the scene, states that the first stone was hurled by a German resident of this city. A perfect fusillade of rocks and missiles of all kinds followed and the destruction of the interior of the building was rapid and complete. Martin Zadelovitch, half owner of the building and Tadin's partner, informs the Citizen that in addition to the damage wrought, a large quantity of clothing, blankets and his complete stock of provisions were carried away, also a typewriter and some valuable jewelry.

The demolition of Max Schenk's office across the street quickly followed, and the crowd then proceeded to Conrad Reinharz's office in the Princess block, where the fixtures were broken up and the safe rolled into the street.

**Left in a Hurry.**  
Tadin, Schenk, Reinharz and ex-Chief Dolan did not question the order to depart from hence, and without waiting for trains took a tie-pass early Friday morning with their faces to the east. Also a number of suspicious characters believed by the police to be bootleggers were given running orders by the authorities.

**Citizens Will be Protected.**  
A regrettable aftermath of the disturbance was the indiscriminate ordering from the city of responsible residents irrespective of nationality. The Great War Veterans properly disclaimed all responsibility for this action and promptly took the offenders in hand. While the orders for departure were being handed out thick and fast a delegation of business men waited upon Mayor Carney requesting that the people be given assurance that they would not be molested should they fail to obey the mandate




## WATER ACT, 1914. RIPARIAN RIGHTS

NOTICE is hereby given that under the provisions of Section 6 of the Water Act, 1914, every riparian proprietor claiming any right to divert water or to the exclusive use of water for any purpose by virtue of his being such riparian proprietor is required on or before the first day of June, 1920, to file a statement of claim setting forth the particulars of his claim. Such statements of claim shall be filed in duplicate with the Water Recorder of the Water District in which the water is diverted or used.  
After the first day of June, 1920, no right to divert water or to the exclusive use of water for any purpose shall exist by virtue only of any ownership of land. Forms of statement of claim can be obtained from the Water Recorders of the several Water Districts in the Province or from the Comptroller of Water Rights, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B. C.


