ITALIANS DECIDE TO RESUME PLACE AT PEACE CONFERENCE PRIOR TO SUBMITTING TERMS

General Security of Europe Provided for in Terms Formulated by Council of Three; Meetings with German Delegates are already being Held at Versailles.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, May 5.—The Italian delegates are returning to Paris, the Italian ambassador informed Foreign Minister Pichon this afternoon. The Ambassador said Premier Orlando and Foreign Minister Sonnino are leaving Rome tonight and will arrive Wednesday morning.

Paris, May 5.—Premiers Clemenceau, Lloyd George and President Wilson, composing the Council of Three, today sent a communication to the Italian Government inviting it to resume its place at the Peace Conference. The Council's invitation is of such a nature that it is believed Italy will accept and the relations temporarily broken by the recent departure from Paris of Premier Orlando and Foreign Minister Sonnino be restored by the presence of the Italian delegates at the conference before the treaty is delivered to the German delegates.

Territorial Status.
Paris, May 5.—The territorial status of Germany as definitely settled by the Council of Three will, in the view of the Council, provide for the general security of Europe. The section of the treaty which deals with the relations between Germany and her neighbors puts an effectual veto on the "Drang Nach Osten" movement which the Germans desire to pursue and prevents an alliance with the Russian Bolsheviks and forbids the incorporation in Germany of German Austria.

Meets With Germans.
Meetings with the German Peace delegation are already under way at Versailles. The question of steps in regard to making peace with Austria has been taken up. One detail that has been made known is that the Austrian peace delegation upon its arrival will be housed at St. Germain, a suburb of Paris.

Brussels, May 5.—The Belgian Government has decided to sign the treaty of peace which was discussed at a town council here last night.

Paris, May 5.—It is now certain, according to the French press, that a treaty of peace will be solemnly handed to Count von Brockdorff Rantzau, German foreign minister, by Premier Clemenceau at Versailles on Thursday afternoon.

ROBERTS TO HANG AT PRINCE ALBERT

Geneva, May 5.—The Roumanian forces entered Arad, 145 miles southeast of Budapest, and occupied the Czan bridgehead on the Theisse River north of Arad, according to advices from Bucharest and Hermannstadt. Everywhere Roumanian and Allied troops are being welcomed as liberators.

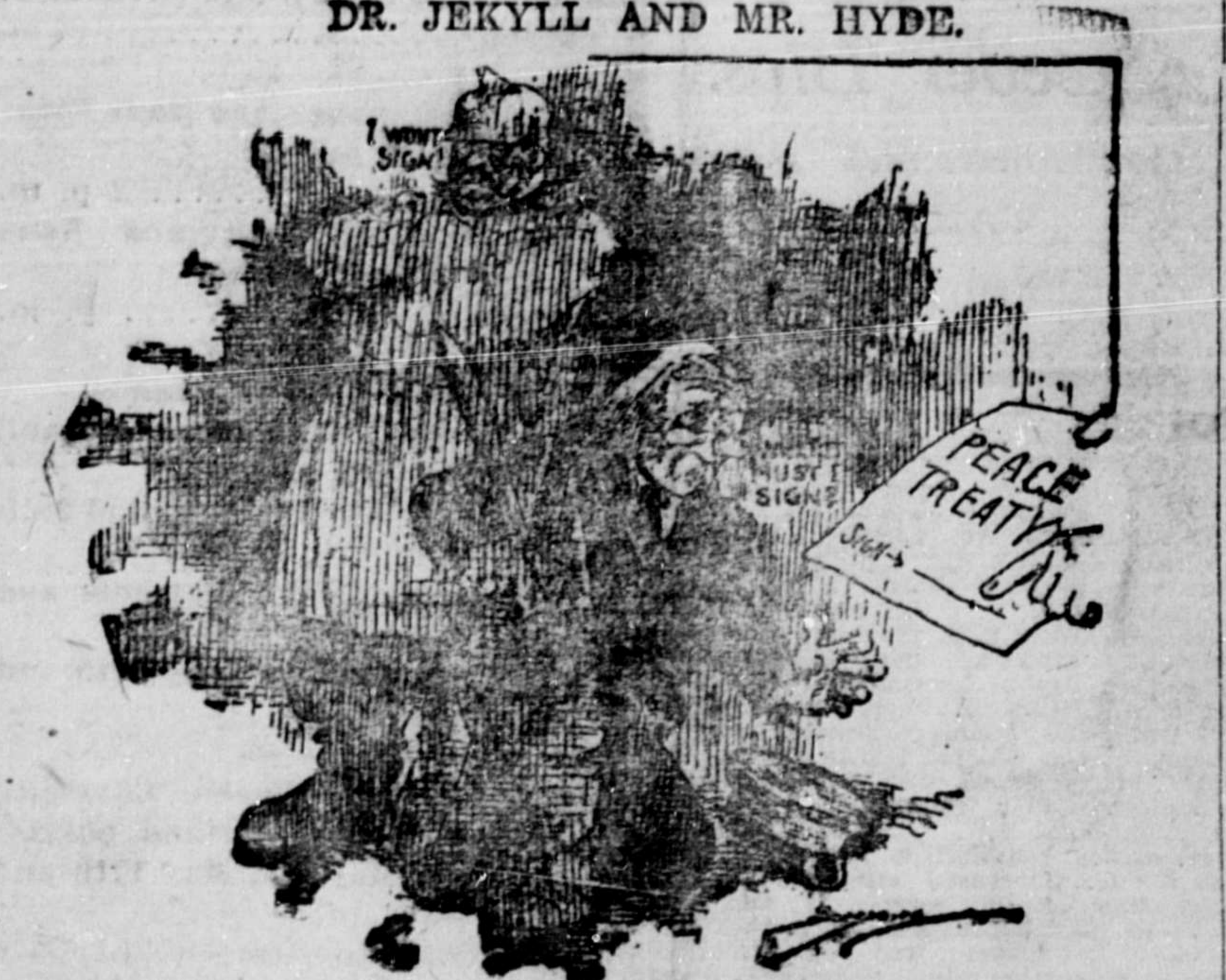
HUNGARIAN SOVIET SAID TO HAVE CAPITULATED TO ADVANCING ROUMANIANS

MATIN OF PARIS CLAIMS TO HAVE CONFIRMATION OF REPORT—HEAD OF SOVIET GOVERNMENT HAS DIFFICULT TIME WITH SOLDIERS' AND WORKMEN'S COUNCIL

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, May 5.—The Matin declared it had received confirmation that the Hungarian Soviet Government had capitulated. Direct word from Budapest Saturday at noon reported the Roumanians had crossed the Tisza River and were within 50 miles of the capital.

Berlin, May 5.—Budapest is a scene of the greatest panic, according to a despatch to newspapers here. Recent statements on the situation by Bela Kun, Soviet foreign minister, have led to a complete disappearance of order and Bela Kun himself is reported to have had a narrow escape from violence at a meeting of the Soldiers' and Workmen's Council.

Red guards have patrolled the streets of the city, threatening the bourgeois.



PRINCE RUPERT MILL REOPENED THIS MORNING

Nearly One Hundred Men Employed and Number May be Increased Soon.

The Prince Rupert lumber mill reopened this morning with a full gang of men and it is expected will continue to cut spruce all summer and well into the autumn. At present they employ between ninety and one hundred men, but this number may be increased.

The mill is under lease to the Prince Rupert Spruce Mills, Ltd., with Mr. Ewart as manager. The spruce logs which are being cut were purchased from the Imperial Munitions Board.

PRESENTATION MADE TO MR. AND MRS. DUBY

A large number of the employees of the Prince Rupert lumber mill under the former regime, gathered on board the steamer Prince George last night to bid farewell to Mr. and Mrs. E. F. DUBY, where the employees of the former presented them with a beautiful case of silverware, consisting of knives, forks and spoons. Also this was accompanied with a wooden miniature circular saw on which was inscribed the names of all the former employees.

The presentation was made by J. A. W. Bell, Vancouver manager and representative of Mr. Emerson, who said a few complimentary words of the retiring manager and spoke of the hospitality and general bonhomie of both Mr. and Mrs. DUBY.

Both the recipients replied, thanking the men for the beautiful present. They said they particularly appreciated it on account of the feeling which prompted the gift.

Mr. and Mrs. DUBY have gone to Vancouver and have not yet decided where they will locate. Mr. DUBY is interesting himself in a power and pulp proposition in this district and may be back in this neighborhood before long.

RED GUARDS MASTERS AT PETROGRAD

Finns March Into Russian Capital and Arrest Danish Red Cross Members.

London, May 5.—Finnish Red Guards are now masters of the situation in Petrograd, according to a despatch from Copenhagen. They have arrested the members of the Danish Red Cross in that city and report they intend to march against the Finnish White Guards.

According to reports received Saturday from Paris the Finnish forces had occupied Petrograd, but the identity of the troops at the Russian capital was not established.

EIGHT-HOUR DAY FOR MOOSEJAW EMPLOYEES

Moosejaw, Sask., May 5.—A special meeting of the city council will be held on Tuesday afternoon to consider the demands of the civic employees union for a 48-hour week, plus an increase over the wages they have been receiving for a 60-hour week. The council is also considering the question this afternoon in committee, in an effort to avert a strike, which the union officials declare will take place Monday afternoon if the ultimatum is not acted on.

Housing Problem Is More Pressing.

Every day that passes makes the housing problem more pressing. Prince Rupert is losing a great deal financially, socially and morally from having too few houses.

It is to the advantage of the place to have families here. If they are to come, however, there must be accommodation for them.

There was a great deal of enthusiasm for building a month ago. That enthusiasm has died down, but it must be renewed if results are to be obtained.

The condition is accentuated by the opening of the mill this morning and the employment of a large number of men there, many of whom have just come from the cities to the south.

Road Out of City Is One of Needs.

One of the pressing needs of the city is a road connecting with the Skeena river canneries. This road could be made a part of the scenic road to Hazelton which the Provincial Government propose to survey.

It is not expected that the whole of the road will be built this year. What is needed is the building of a portion of the road so that it may be extended from year to year and eventually will provide an outlet to the points along the Skeena.

FOOD RIOTS IN SPAIN WHEN TEN ARE KILLED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Madrid, May 3.—Ten persons killed, 16 seriously injured and a large number slightly wounded is a result of disorders arising from demonstrations as a protest against the high cost of living in the province of Tarragoua on April 28.

There were several clashes between gendarmes and civilians on the previous day, so the governor decided to reduce the price of food 25 per cent.

The following day when selling provisions at the old prices crowds pillaged the stores and were charged by gendarmes, and revolver shots exchanged. The disorders lasted into the night, and there were numerous violent street battles between gendarmes and the public.

FORCING POPULACE TO LEAVE PETROGRAD

Bolshevik Taking People to Grain Centres to Feed Them

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, May 3.—Reports received from British official sources today announced the Bolsheviks are compelling the civilian evacuation of Petrograd, and a number of other places in the vicinity. The movement is being carried out according to plans announced a year ago whereby withdrawal was to be made to Moscow and other grain centres to enable more efficient feeding of the population.

Paris, May 3.—Petrograd has probably been taken by the Finns.

CHISHOLM MUSHED INTO DAWSON CITY

Among the returned soldiers in Dawson is J. A. Chisholm, recently of the Second Canadian Tunneling Company, says the Dawson News. He was taken prisoner by the Germans at the third battle of Ypres, June, 1916, and, after several months' confinement, escaped and traveled over 200 miles through Germany until he finally reached safety in Holland. Mr. Chisholm reached Dawson a few days ago. He was mushed in over the trail from Whitehorse. He is a member of the Prince Rupert branch, G. W. V. A.

300,000,000 WAR
CERTIFICATES SOLD
IN GREAT BRITAIN

Splendid Record Made by War Savings Committee During Three Years—Still Carrying On.

In the United Kingdom the War Savings campaign has been a great success and will be continued on a peace basis. The third anniversary of the inauguration of the movement was, on March 1, made the occasion for the issuing by the National War Savings Committee of a statement setting forth the work done since the latter end of February, 1916, as well as announcing plans for the future. From the statement the following has been reproduced.

"During almost exactly three years, 300,000,000 War Savings Certificates have been sold. During the first two years to March 1, 1918, 158,803,447 certificates were sold, or an average of 79,401,723. During the third year to March 1, 1919, 142,353,201 were sold, being nearly double the average for the previous two years. This progress of the sales is the more remarkable when it is realized that no individual may hold more than 500 certificates, and, consequently, the number of purchasers is being steadily reduced.

"It is, however, important that it should be understood that the raising of money for the State was not the main object for which the National War Savings Committee was established. The primary object of the committee was to secure for the nation all the benefits which would accrue from the successful establishment of a safe, convenient and profitable method of investment for people of small means, rather than the more narrow object of merely raising money to pay for the war. It is in this direction that lies the important social aspect of the movement, a movement which promises to become of permanent benefit to the wage-earner.
