## MORE SHIPS TO BE BUILT AT PORT OF PRINCE RUPERT

THAT IS INTIMATION GIVEN BY MAYOR McClymont in  
REPORT TO COUNCIL—GOVERNMENT WILL  
TAKE OVER RAILWAY AND  
OPERATE IT

That the Government will be ready to let more contracts to the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. for ships to be built here and that the Dominion Government will definitely take over this line of railway and operate it and run the steamships between Eastern and Pacific ports. The report is in part as follows:

On arrival at the capital we were joined the following day by Mr. Newman Erb, and our member, Col. Peck, made arrangements for a meeting with the Hon. Dr. Reid, Minister of Railways and Canals.

### Would Purchase or Lease.

This being duly arranged for, your committee introduced the proposed trans-Pacific steamship line from this port and that in Mr. Erb had a man who was willing either to purchase or lease a number of ships for this service. Mr. Erb then dealt with all details of what he was prepared to do and that if he had such a line now he could guarantee carriages both ways for the next six months, calling at Vladivostok, Yokohama, Hong Kong and Manila, and would arrange the necessary organizations throughout these parts for a continuation of this trade, your committee enlarging by pointing out that as the Government had a large interest in the G. T. P. it was in the interest of the country that such a steamship line be established at once, as without this outlet the railway was a dead end.

### Take Over Railway.

In reply Dr. Reid said that the Government would neither sell nor lease their ships, but that they would be put in operation to run in conjunction with the National Railways, the minister stating that the Government will take over the G. T. P. and this information was verified by members of the House as well as G. T. P. representatives who are at present in Ottawa.

The point was raised whether the Government could get the same efficient service for the shipping of freight at Oriental ports for their ships as private companies, especially competitors such as the C. P. R. and Japanese. To this the Minister replied that the Government had arranged with both the White Star and the Grand Steamship companies to run on the Atlantic in conjunction with the National Railways and that the Government lines would have the benefit of the organization of these companies in acquiring freight for the Pacific route.

### Free From Politics.

On inquiring what method the

Government proposed to handle the National Railways, which will be composed of the C. N. R. and G. T. P., the minister replied that a company would be formed and an executive appointed to handle all the lines, the wish being to free this from all politics and a two-thirds majority of the House would be required before any member of the executive could be dismissed.

"In the forming of this Board we pressed for a G. T. P. representative, as at present Mr. Hanna, late of the C. N. R., is chairman of the National Railways and as the Government will have two Pacific terminals there might be a danger of bias towards the southern terminus, to show justification for the construction of the C. N. R.

### Rupert Need Not Fear.

"Dr. Reid replied that while he was minister of railways, Prince Rupert need not fear the diverting of trade that was hers owing to merit.

"The next point raised, was it the intention of the Government to run a line of ships from the Atlantic to Oriental ports, as reported in the press. The minister said this was not the case, but that a line would be operated from Montreal and Halifax to Canadian Pacific port via the Panama and would be a purely Canadian coastal service from Atlantic to Pacific. This service would handle steel plates and lumber as the rail freight was too high on these goods.

### Plenty of Steel.

"He said the Government had contracted for 50,000 tons of steel plates for five years with the Dominion Steel Company and as the war was over, would be glad to get rid of this and suggested to Mr. Erb the shipping of some of this steel to Prince Rupert for further ship building on a percentage basis and to this Mr. Erb stated that his present contract would be through in about 18 months and that he would be pleased to enter into further negotiations with a view to getting further contracts.

"In closing the minister stated that he would be in Prince Rupert this summer to go over the ground and see the situation for himself, and in your committee's opinion this would be a time for the citizens to further press their claims.

## VON JAGOW ON THE WORLD WAR

Former Foreign Minister of Germany Blames Own Military Authorities for Trouble.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, May 6.—An imaginary invasion of German territory by the French was the pretext for the declaration of war on France, says Gottlieb von Jagow, former German Foreign Minister, in a book just published entitled "The Universal War, its Causes and Beginning."

Alleged French incursions were reported to the German staff by subordinate officers, von Jagow says, and the staff communicated the information to the Government without attempting to ascertain the facts.

The former Foreign Minister asserts that before the war he was convinced of the necessity of accord with Great Britain and expresses regret that Germany unfavorably received the offers of alliance made in 1899.

## FINED FOR TROLLING WITHOUT LICENSE, BOATS CONFISCATED

Two Finlanders were fined this morning by Magistrate McMullin for trolling salmon without a license and their rowboats confiscated. William Manners was fined \$10 or 30 days in jail and chose the latter, while J. Usitalo received the light fine of \$5.

This being the first offence, the men were let off light, but Manners for making a fuss in court was fined double the amount of Usitalo.

It was decided by the City Council at their meeting last night to purchase a diving outfit at an approximate cost of \$1,200. This is needed in connection with the water pipe line.

An application to the City Council last night from John Joy and a number of other city employees for an increase in wages was referred to the committee for report.

## ITALY WINS; GETS FIUME

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, May 6.—According to a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Paris the question regarding Fiume is settled in full agreement with the Italian Government on the basis that Fiume shall remain an autonomous port for two years, when it will be assigned to Italy.

## ISOLATE GERMANY IF SHE REFUSES

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, May 6.—Complete economic isolation of Germany is being considered by the council of foreign ministers of the peace conference as a measure to be adopted in the event Germany refuses to sign the peace treaty.

## WILL ENLARGE SCOPE OF MUNICIPAL LEVIES

Hon. John Hart is Investigating, and Will Discuss Subject With Councils.

In a statement made by the Hon. John Hart, Minister of Finance, there is an intimation that the Provincial Government will consider steps during the coming summer for enlarging the scope of municipal taxation.

"Many of the municipalities, including the city of Vancouver," stated the minister, "are very hard pressed to find means of raising revenues from the citizens at large without infringing on the provincial revenue. The cry is raised that in the cities and towns ninety per cent. of the taxes is contributed by ten per cent of the people."

Following the elimination from the Vancouver city bill of its special taxation clauses last session, Hon. Mr. Hart stated that he had undertaken to see that the question of widening the scope of municipal taxation would be dealt with before the next session.

"I am planning," he said, "as soon as my department has got all its new program from recent legislation well in hand, to take a month or so and with the assistance of the heads of my office arrange for the municipalities to be heard and new schemes for municipal taxation to be considered. Our object will be to devise methods whereby persons who now escape the payment of municipal taxation would be dealt their fair share."  
If a conference can be held during the summer, pointed out Mr. Hart, this will enable the matters to be fully discussed and the report of the taxation officers to be considered by the municipalities before the recommendations come before the next session of the Legislature for enactment.

## SWIMMING CLUB ASKS FOR GRANT

Delegation Waits on City Council With Request for \$1,000 to Improve Bathing Facilities.

A delegation from the Prince Rupert Swimming Club waited on the City Council last night for the purpose of asking for a grant toward improving the bathing accommodation at the Salt Lakes. J. C. Brady was the chief spokesman. He outlined the need of improvements and the value of swimming, especially to the children. He said that they were not begging for any money for there was nothing that would tend to betterment like spending money on the Salt Lakes. They wanted \$1,000 this year and then there would be no further necessity for grants for the same purpose. There had been \$1,700 spent at the lakes so far and this year they were proposing to do a good deal of work.

L. W. Patmore referred to the need of a sloping sandy beach for the children. This was work they intended to do this year.

The mayor expressed the opinion that there was no argument against what had been said. They had to pay interest and sinking fund amounting to \$2,600 a year on the recreation ground and they had started improving the city park and intended continuing it. The matter was referred to the Finance Committee.

## AVIATORS TO FLY ACROSS THE ATLANTIC

Over a Score Awaiting Favorable Opportunity, Probably Tomorrow.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

St. Johns, Nfld., May 6.—The northwest wind prevailing here today contributes to favorable weather conditions for flying, but Atlantic conditions are not promising. Aviators await the midday bulletin before deciding as to making a start.

New York, May 6.—A score of naval aviators, youths in their twenties and young men in their early thirties, yet experts in flying, navigation and motor mechanics, are ready for a start soon after daybreak tomorrow in an attempt to drive three giant hydro-aeroplanes of the American navy across the Atlantic. With favorable weather predicted both in the vicinity of the home station at Rockaway Point, Long Island, and along the coast of Newfoundland, the terminus of the journey's first leg.

The airmen expect to launch at least two and possibly all three planes scheduled to make the cruise.

## NEW PIPE LINE TO BE BUILT ACROSS SHAWATLANS PASSAGE

At the City Council meeting last night it was decided to construct a new pipe line across Shawatlans Passage. There are two mains beneath the water, but one of these is in a very bad state of repair.

A report made to the Council last night showed that it had been examined by Capt. Brennan and it was found that many of the joints were weak and likely to break at any time. There was one break which it would be difficult to repair. The report was endorsed by the city engineer and the Board of Works, so it was decided to have the pipe taken up and relaid.

According to the report this line was put down by contract and never tested, and it had never been used much.

**Peace Conference Again United.**

The Peace Conference seems to be a unit once more. The Italian delegates are returning and all is again happy. The difficult question with Japan has been settled and it would seem as if the peace treaty would be signed soon.

Scraps of information in regard to the treaty have been leaking out from time to time or have been given out by the members of the conference for its own purpose. According to the despatches it would seem that some of the provisions are very drastic.

It will be difficult for Germany to do anything other than sign. If she refuses, Foch's armies will march to Berlin and dictate peace there. Discretion will be the better part of valor with them. Already they have suffered somewhat from internal dissension, but they will suffer much more if the armies march through the country and force their way into the capital.

The condition in Austria is different. There a good deal of the country is in turmoil and until conditions become more settled it will be hard to enforce the peace terms. The Bolshevik rebellion in Budapest seems to have been largely for the purpose of getting away from the peace provisions.

**Things Beginning to Hum in Prince Rupert.**

Things are beginning to hum here. The mill is running, the fish is coming here in large quantities, preparations are being pushed forward for the laying of the keel for the first steel ship and everybody is busy. That is what we have been looking forward to. The only thing that is being delayed is the building of houses. However, that will right itself in time. Rents are showing a tendency to rise and that will stimulate building.

The News is not going to attempt to justify very high rentals. At the same time rents must be high enough to pay interest on the investment, else people will not build. That has been the cause of most of the delay in the erection of dwellings. Now it is plain that rents are becoming high enough to pay interest, even on the high cost of building. Those who have had any idea of building should certainly start while the weather is good.

**Swimming Club Worthy of Support.**

Last night a number of members of the Swimming Club waited on the City Council to ask for a grant of \$1,000 towards improving the accommodation at the Salt Lakes. They were well received and promises of consideration were given.

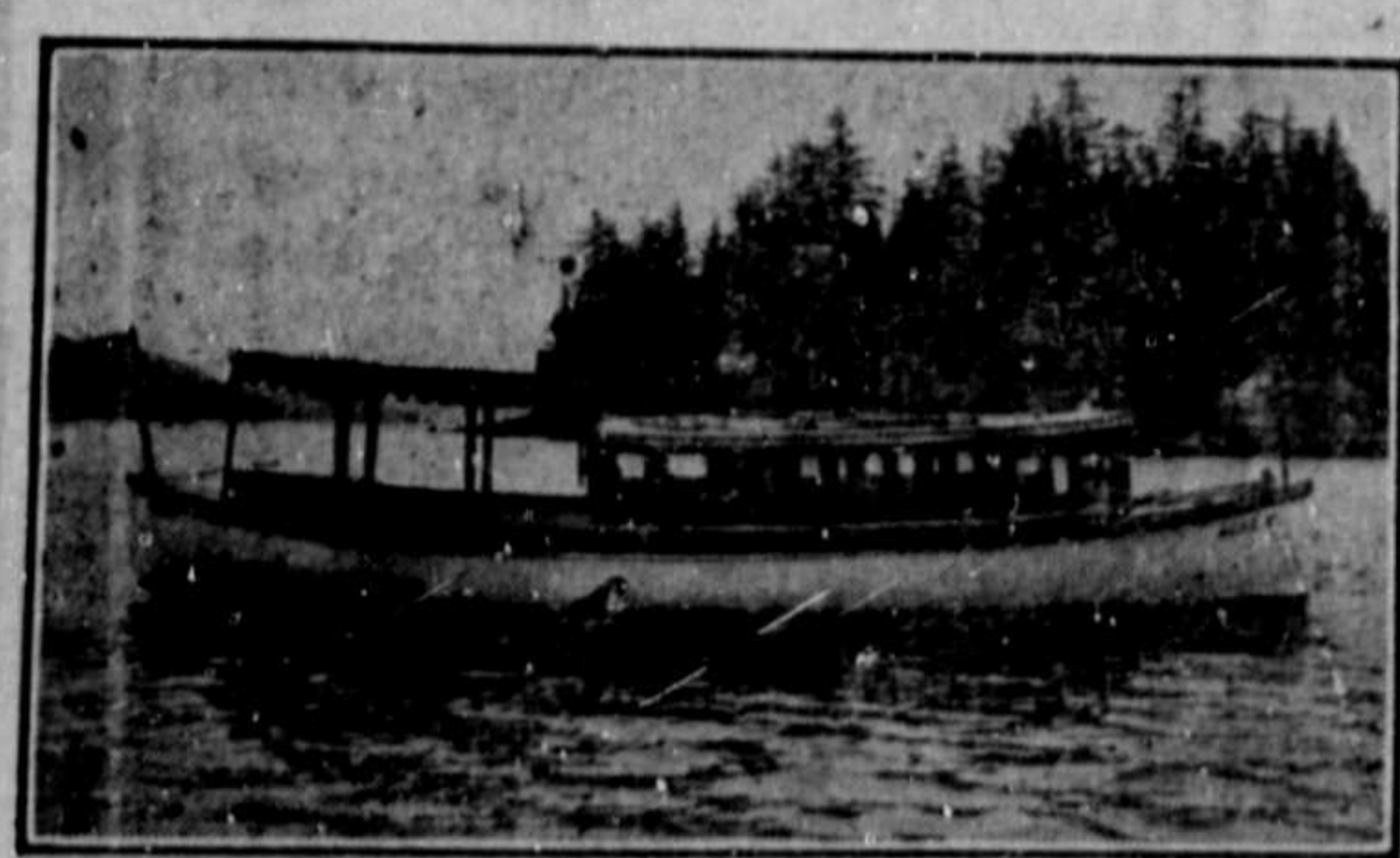

## COLONEL PECK DEFENDS HIS WAR COMRADES

Canadian Medical Corps Was  
"Johnny on the Spot" Every  
Time Doing Duty.

Discussing the recent charges made by General Smart in the House of Commons against the military administration, Hansard gives the following report of the speech of Lieut. Cyrus W. Peck, member for Skeena, as follows:—

"I do not rise to justify the whole administration of the Militia Department or the Government overseas. It is one of our customs to think that the Government is responsible for all its officers and employees. Our Government is in a very bad situation in that regard, because a great deal that takes place in connection with administration in England is not known here for a long time afterwards. I do not mean to justify all that has taken place in Argyll House or in connection with the administration overseas; I may have occasion later to bring some of these things to the attention of the House. But I shall not do anything of that kind for the sake of cheap notoriety or of attaining some cheap political purpose. I saw a great deal of the administration over there, and I would not be doing my duty as a soldier or as a Canadian citizen if I did not stand up here and say that whatever mistakes have been made by Sir Edward Kemp, he is a very conscientious, hard-working patriotic minister.

### General Turner.

"Certain charges have been flung against General Turner. I repeat that I am not going to justify the administration of Argyll House, not for a moment. But no man who ever served his country did it with the same absolute patriotism and the same fine sense of loyalty as did Major-General Sir Richard Turner, V. C. "With regard to the administration in Canada, I do not say that I will not criticise it sometime, but I believe that the present Minister of Militia and Defence (Major-General Mewburn) in his policy and in his conduct is as straight as he is in his personal carriage and appearance.

"I have risen simply to say a word or two with regard to some statements made by General Smart in the Quebec Legislature. Whatever any one may say as to his statement, it was directed against the whole Canadian Army Medical Corps. I saw General Smart a few days ago. He seemed to think that I had a sort of Bolshevik notion, and I said to him at once: 'There is one respect in which I do not agree with you; if you have anything against the administration of the army medical corps in England, that is all right but you should not also make a charge against the whole Canadian Army Medical Corps.' He said: 'I do not do that.' But the reports in the press, including those referred to by the member for Maisonneuve (Mr. Lemieux), indicated that the statement was made against the entire medical forces overseas. Members may bring up anything they please by way of conducting a cheap political campaign or something of that nature, but nobody is going to play football with the reputation of my comrades in this war while I sit in this House.

### Efficient Service.

"And, Sir, if there ever was an efficient service in any army in any country, it was the service of the Canadian Army Medical Corps in England. To make a cruel, inconsiderate statement against that service should be beneath the dignity of any member of this House unless he has most ample proof. I have had considerable experience with these officers. I have seen them in times of peril and in times when we were out of peril. There was never too much danger for the officers, and the personnel of the Canadian Army Medical Corps to face. When it came to going into the trenches or when we were in action, your medical corps was there, 'Johnny on the spot' every time, doing their duty. No class of men made more sacrifices than the members of the medical corps. The great bulk of them were captains or majors, and up to last June the captains were drawing the magnificent sum of \$4.75 a day and the majors corresponding pay. I

know lots of men there who had a practice at home that brought them anywhere from \$5,000 to \$20,000 a year; yet they sacrificed it all, went overseas and served faithfully and uncomplainingly. And now we are forced to stand up in this House and defend that noble profession. I say, Sir, it is humiliating that such a duty should become necessary."

## WHALING ENGINEERS STRIKE CONTINUES

But There Are Indications That Settlement Will Soon be Reached.

Victoria, May 5.—The strike of whaling engineers still continues but there are indications that a settlement of the dispute will shortly be reached.

The secretaries of the National Association of Marine Engineers state that they are ready at any time to meet the Consolidated Whaling Corporation with a view to bringing about a settlement.

The wages asked for by the engineers in Victoria, they point out, is less than paid to American engineers employed by the company under identical conditions.

The following schedule is given showing the difference in the wages paid American and Canadian engineers employed by the company on whaling vessels:

American rate: Chief, \$225 per month; second, \$200, for season.

Victoria rate demanded: Chief, \$200; second, \$175, for five or six months, or an average of \$100 per month for twelve months for chief and \$87.50 for second engineers.

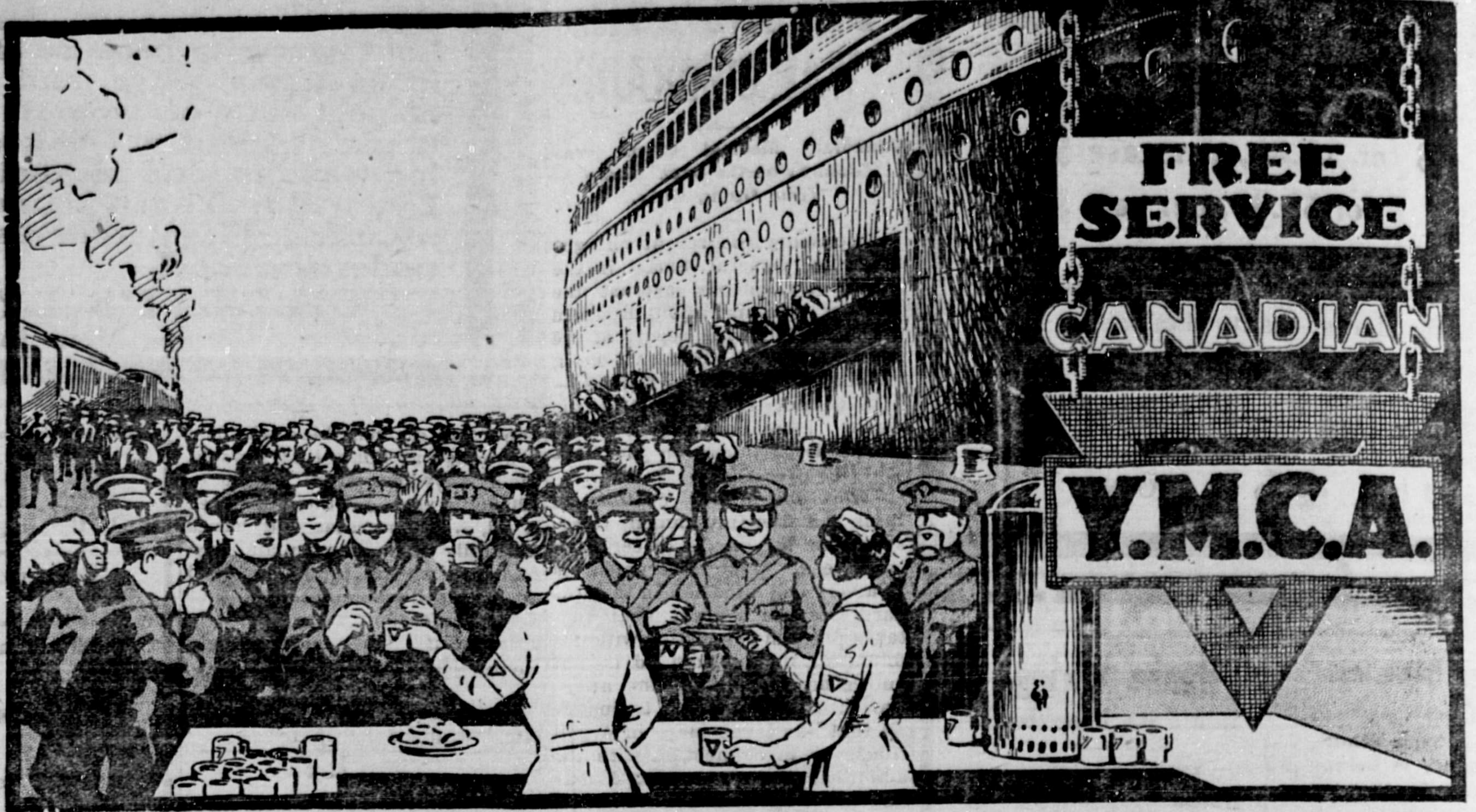

## What We Are Doing for Returning Soldiers

On every troop ship a trained Y.M.C.A. man is on duty. He carries a supply of literature, writing materials, games, a magic lantern and slides, a gramophone and records. In some cases he has a piano or an organ.

He takes charge of the entertainment of men, organizes concerts, lectures, sing-songs, religious services, sports and games on ship-board. He helps and advises, explains the government plans for re-establishing soldiers into civil life, stimulates sociability and wholesome good cheer.

### At Ports and on Trains

When the transport reaches Halifax, St. John or Quebec, The Red Triangle welcomes the soldier back to Canada. Free canteen service awaits him on the dock, with hot coffee, or tea, cold drinks, eatables and cigarettes. Reliable information is furnished. Facilities for telegraphing home are at hand. If the men have to wait for trains, the Y.M.C.A. is there to organize entertainment.

Every troop train leaving the ports of debarkation has on board a Red Triangle man. He distributes cigarettes, candies, and other eatables, reading materials and games—free of charge. He furnishes needed information, and helps, by entertainment, to make bearable the monotony of the train

journey. Every one hundred dollars subscribed provides these facilities for one troop train.

In each of eleven big Canadian Cities stretching from coast to coast, where soldiers are held over, or where they may have

business, the Y.M.C.A. maintains a fully equipped Red Triangle Club, where soldiers are provided with comfortable board and lodgings at nominal rates. Here they may meet to talk, play or read, write letters and make themselves at home generally.

At every dispersal centre in Canada, the Y.M.C.A. maintains its Red Triangle service, with free canteen, reading and writing facilities and information bureau.

### In Military Hospitals

In each of the military hospitals in Canada, in the military camps and barracks where men remain on duty during demobilization, the Y.M.C.A. place a trained man in charge of full Red Triangle service, providing entertainment, recreation, instruction and social stimulus.

Besides the work for the men returning, your support is asked for the maintenance of four Red Triangle Secretaries and auxiliary staff with the Siberian Canadian Expeditionary Force.

Every returned man is offered six months' full membership privileges free, in any local Y.M.C.A. The National Council is aiding the local Y.M.C.A.'s to meet the cost of dormitory accommodation, bathing facilities and other privileges and the employment of special secretaries in connection with local service to these men.

### For Soldiers' Wives and Children

Out of the Red Triangle Fund \$175,000 will be set aside for the Dominion Council of the Young Women's Christian Association, who are looking after soldiers' wives and children coming to Canada. Y.W.C.A. secretaries help mothers on boats, and render to the women and children a service similar to that which the Y.M.C.A. does for the men. Y.W.C.A. rest rooms and refreshment service welcome the soldiers' families at the ports of arrival. The sick are attended, children cared for, and the women folk cheered with the kindly word and the helping hand. At the big railway stations the Y.W.C.A. representatives are there to help, comfort, advise and direct. And in certain cases, where money is lacking, funds are provided to complete the journey. The budget of the Dominion Council, Y.W.C.A. provides also for the extension of its many forms of service among Canadian girls.

### For Coming Men of Canada

The Y.M.C.A. asks your support for a greatly enlarged programme of service to Canada's boys this year, as the most valuable reconstructive work that can be done to repair the awful war-wastage of Canada's man power (30,383 dead and 158,799 wounded.)

The Red Triangle will be carried to the boys and men of the towns and villages and the open country this year, upon a plan of county organization.

# "BETTER 'OLE" SIMPLY GREAT

## The Real Trench Life as Seen by Bairnsfather Wonderful in Detail and True to Type.

It is so difficult to describe "The Better 'Ole," the picture that was shown last night at the Westholme Theatre, that anyone who has not seen it is at a loss to understand the enthusiasm of those who have.
