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GERMANY WILL SIGN TREATY, BUT WILL NOT PAY INDEMNITY, SAY DELEGATES TO PEACE CONFERENCE

Document Presented on Fourth Anniversary of Sinking of Lusitania---Franco-Prussia Treaty was Signed at Versailles Nearly a Half Century Ago After Germany Won War

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, May 7.—German delegates to the Peace Congress declare they will sign the peace treaty but Germany will not pay the indemnity.
Versailles, May 7.—Germany today was told the terms upon which the allied and associated powers will make peace with her. The terms were contained in a treaty 80,000 words in length handed to German plenipotentiaries at a memorable assembly here, attended by delegates of twenty-seven nations which are parties to the peace pact.
Versailles, May 7.—The Germans received the terms of the peace treaty this afternoon on the fourth anniversary of the sinking of the Lusitania. Four years ago Germany challenged civilization by torpedoing the Cunard liner without warning, killing 1,154 civilians. Today she learns the price she must pay in finances, territory and loss of national prestige. The penalty in blood already has been exacted.
The selection of Versailles as the setting for this world drama is significant in that nearly half a century ago the modern German Empire was born here at the conclusion of the Franco-Prussian War. Germany's dream of world dominion began and ended in Versailles. The ceremony of presenting the treaty to the Germans took place in the Trianon Palace Hotel.

GENERAL TURNER CABLES REGARDING Y. M. C. A. ACTIVITIES

Vancouver, May 7.—General Turner cables from England that he heartily endorses the Y. M. C. A. work carried on since the armistice. Never before has the Beaver Hut and the London work generally been so appreciated. The Association camp activities are invaluable for the contentment of the men awaiting sailing. "I hope," he says, "that the same efficiency of organization may continue in Canada for the welfare of us all."

COLONEL PECK AND 100 MEN EXPECTED HERE ON SATURDAY

RECEPTION COMMITTEE WILL MEET THIS AFTERNOON TO ARRANGE TO MEET THE MEN AND GIVE THEM A GOOD TIME WHILE THEY ARE HERE

Word has been received by Mayor McClymont that Lieut.-Col. C. W. Peck, V. C., is leaving Winnipeg today for Prince Rupert with 100 men en route to Victoria. They should arrive here on Saturday evening and leave for the south on Sunday evening.
There will be a meeting of the reception committee this afternoon at which arrangements will be made to give the Colonel and his men a real reception, and combined with it will be a reception to Capt. John McGregor, V. C., who is also a hero of the war, one of the greatest.

CONTRACT LET FOR COMPLETING EXTERIOR EXHIBITION BUILDING

At the meeting of the executive of the Agricultural Association held last evening, tenders for finishing the exterior of the Exhibition Building were opened. John Currie's figures were, for red cedar rustic, 1,140, and for spruce rustic, \$975. R. Lawrence quoted for red cedar rustic \$900 and spruce rustic \$790. The lowest tender was accepted and spruce will be used.
The executive decided that this year there will be no selling booths inside the building and all the space therein will be devoted to exhibits and the space will be given free. The booths will be placed on the grounds around the building. The arrangements for this year's exhibition are well in hand.

PEACE TREATY PRELIMINARIES ARE NOW READY

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, May 6.—It was officially announced last night that the preliminaries of the Peace Treaty will be communicated to the Allied delegates this afternoon and to the German plenipotentiaries on Wednesday afternoon. This announcement agrees with the unofficial reports of the intentions of the Peace Conference.

THOUSANDS GREET THE "BLACK DEVILS"

Citizens of Winnipeg Turned Out in Thousands to Meet 90th Regiment.
Winnipeg, May 7.—The citizens of Winnipeg turned out in thousands last night to greet the returning victors of the second battle of Ypres, the boys of the 8th Battalion, whose record in war proved them true successors of the men whose deeds of valor in the days when Western Canada was in the making gained for them the name of dread, "The Little Black Devils." Returning home with the men of the 90th regiment was a detachment of the 10th Battalion, "The Fighting 106th" and of the Canadian Engineers, the combined units numbering 37 officers and 618 men.

BIG EXPLOSION AT BRUSSELS; MANY KILLED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Brussels, May 7.—A depot of German ammunition, shells and bombs of every calibre and many gas shells exploded since yesterday morning at the railway station at Groenendaal, six miles south of Brussels where the Canadian troops were inspected by King Albert eight days ago. The depot has been under guard of 150 Belgian soldiers and six hundred German prisoners have been at work near it. It is believed there are many killed and wounded, but the number of victims will not be known for several days. Many houses in the neighborhood have completely collapsed.

GOVERNMENT MUST AID IN GRAIN EXPORT

United Farmers of Alberta Concerned Over Marketing of Expected Big Crop.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Calgary, May 7.—Unless an early date adequate steps are taken by the Dominion Government to assist in financing the export of the grain crop of 1919, Canada will be confronted with the greatest conceivable disaster, is the opinion of H. W. Wood, president of the United Farmers of Alberta.
"If the present prospects are fulfilled," said he, "the harvest of the present season will be the greatest in history, and exactly for this reason it is our duty and of the utmost importance that steps should be taken to insure an outlet. I can conceive of no more serious crime against the people of the country than for the authorities to fail to take the necessary steps. The Government has plans but we certainly have heard nothing of it and it is of the utmost importance that the farmers be reassured in this matter. The vital interests, not only of the farmers, but of the whole community are bound up in agriculture."

FARMER TO BE TRIED FOR MURDERING SON

Blind Man 35 Years of Age is Alleged to Have Been Pushed Into River.
Hull, Que., May 7.—Louis Forget, an aged farmer of Namur, Labelle county, Quebec, was brought here this afternoon to stand trial on a charge of having murdered his son, Abroise Forget, aged 35, by pushing him into the Little Rouge river. The son had been blind from infancy.
The crime was committed in October last, E. Forget telling the neighbors at the time that he was taking his son to a house of refuge in Ottawa. The body was recovered on May 1 by some river drivers.

TREATY WITH GERMANY READY FOR SUBMISSION TO THE PLENIPOTENTIARIES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, May 7.—The Plenary Peace Conference completed its work today so far as Germany is concerned and at a secret plenary session communicated the terms of the Peace Treaty to all the members of the Peace Conference. This was the last act before delivery of the treaty to the Germans at Versailles tomorrow. The session was held in the Foreign Office with the same setting and distinguished personnel as previous public sessions except in the case of Italy, who today was represented by Dr. Silvio Crespi, former food administrator, pending the arrival of Premier Orlando and Foreign Minister Sonnino tomorrow.

W. S. FIELDING LEADS RAID ON CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS

Objects to Directors Controlling Revenue Without Reference To Parliament—Bill Passes.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, May 7.—The bill to incorporate the Canadian National Railway Co., which had rough times in committee, and was finally put through that stage of consideration under the operation of the closure, failed to secure the usual formal third reading in the House of Commons yesterday, but was put through on a division. The main attack was led by Hon. W. S. Fielding, who in committee objected to the proposal that the directors should be given control of revenues of the government without reference to Parliament, maintaining that this system would not give public ownership a fair trial.
Mr. Fielding, seconded by A. R. McMaster of Brome, moved that the receipts and expenditures of this company be subject to the provisions of the consolidated fund.

PRINCE RUPERT ON THE CIRCUIT OF BIG SINGERS

Musical Society Fully Prepared to Give Good Account of Themselves Tomorrow.
Tomorrow evening the Prince Rupert Musical Society will give their second concert this season, and, as before, it may be expected that the Westholme Opera House will be crowded with music lovers to hear it. The getting up of a concert of this nature is not without its difficulties and it also represents many months of hard work by the choir and the conductor. Judging by the last rehearsal, however, the work of the chorus during these months should be full justified by the results to be given to the public tomorrow night.
In Touch with Others.
"Excelsior" might well be the motto of the society and as this second concert shows progress made since the first one, so ought the second season's programs to excel this one. The aim of the society is to place before the public the best music possible, and arrangements are in hand for having the most famous singers who come to Vancouver, Seattle and Victoria also placing Prince Rupert on their circuit. Col. Peck Leaves For Rupert Today.

Lieut.-Col. Peck and one hundred of his men are expected to arrive here on Saturday. That is the news received this morning. He is expected to leave Winnipeg today. This is good news. While the men will probably want to get away on Sunday night it will give them a good visit here and Prince Rupert people will certainly do their very best to make them welcome and to give them a good time. It is a great event and Prince Rupert will undoubtedly do herself proud.

Successful Mission Of Ottawa Delegates.

The visit of Mayor McClymont and J. G. Scott to Ottawa seems to have been most successful. Not only were they assured by the members of the Government that ships would be operated from this port to the Orient, but they also intimated that more ships would be built here, after the two already under contract are completed. That would mean continuous operation of the shipyards at this point.

Apparently Prince Rupert is being placed on the map as never before. She is to become, what was originally intended for her, a Pacific port with steamships plying to and from the East. That means that we are to be a big city with a great future.

Newspaper Censorship Is Officially Raised.

The press censorship has been lifted against books and newspapers printed in English and French. That does not mean that prohibited books or papers are restored to their former status. It simply means that there will no longer be any supervision by the censorship of the papers and books that are issued from this time on. Publishers will still be required to keep the provisions of the War Measures Act.

Since the signing of the armistice the press censorship has been almost forgotten. It was full of anomalies and injustices and is remembered by newspapermen largely as one of the humors of the war. An example of its workings was shown in Victoria in connection with shipping news. For many months not a word of shipping news of any interest to readers was allowed to be published. Before the United States went into the war there were no restrictions on that side of the line. Ships would arrive from the Orient and Victoria papers dare not say one word about them. On the same day the Seattle papers were sold on the streets of Victoria, shouted by the newsboys and hundreds of them distributed and each copy contained a full account of the arrival of the ship, of the people she brought, where she came from and the adventures she had.

The attention of the censorship was drawn to the farce, but no relaxation was allowed the local papers nor were any steps taken to stop the others coming in.

That is simply one instance of dozens which were not only unjust but foolhardy. Further than that, many officials tried to take upon themselves the censorship duties. Naval officers sent word that certain things were not to be published and tried to take to task for others that had been published. That, however, was quickly nipped in the bud. The newspapers recognized no authority but the censorship office.

Many newspapers ignored the censorship rules to a large extent and got away with it. Usually when orders were received that a certain class of news might be published, the newspapers had all been publishing it for weeks without waiting for permission. The censorship was the standing joke of the newspaper offices and mention of it always provokes a smile from any person who ever had anything to do with it.

London, May 6.—British troops broke up a forbidden meeting at Athlone, Ireland, Monday night. A number of people were wounded.

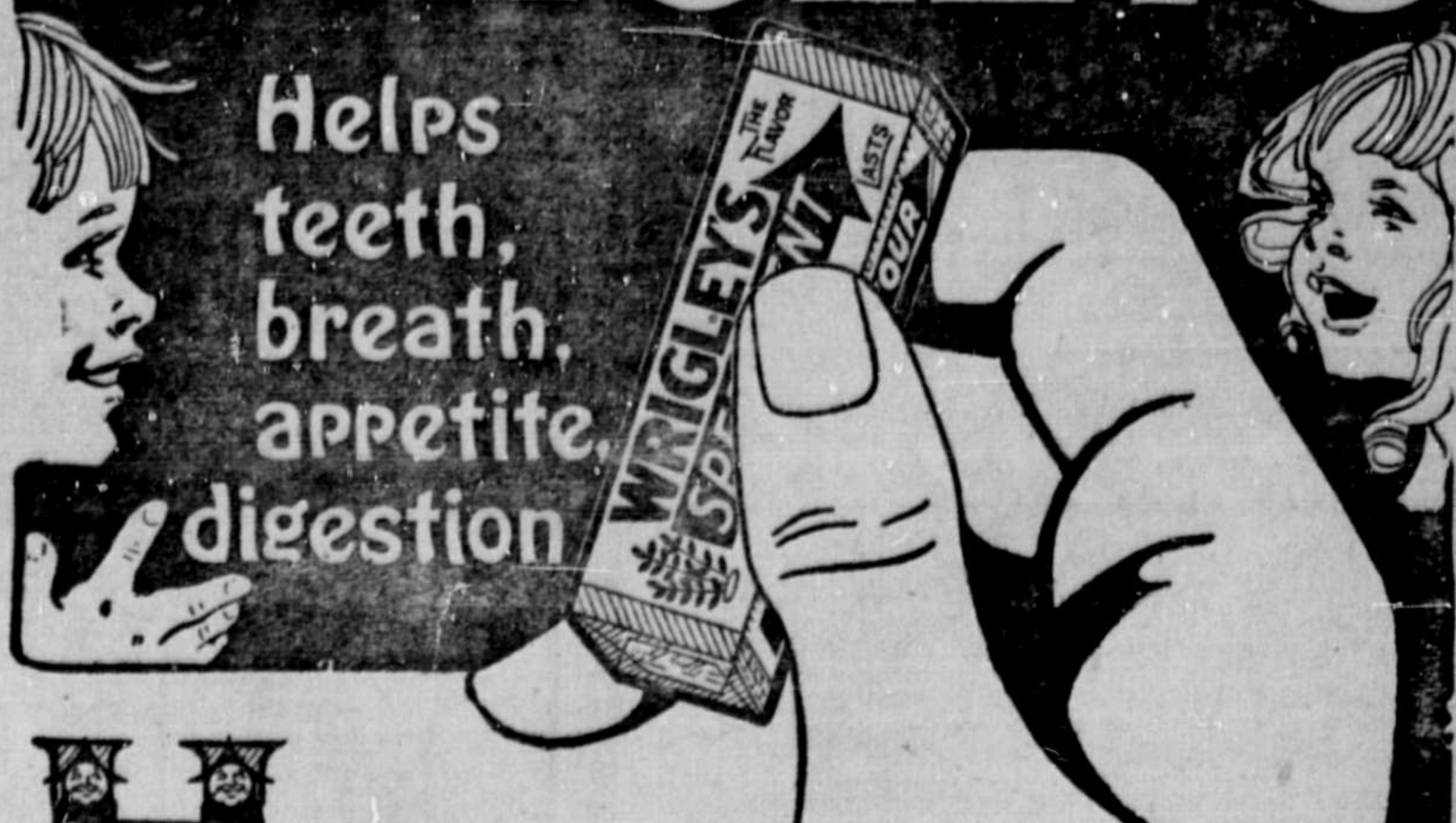

RESIDENT REPLIES

Editor News,

In reply to "Would-be Resident," I should like to ask him, how much of his money will go to keep up the useless parks and beauty spots in the city?

It seems to me the most of it will come out of the poor taxpayer and I think if the civic heads feel like fixing up some of the beauty spots surely we who came here in the early days and put our money in the city and helped things by paying taxes are entitled to it.

Resident says what we want here is houses. I quite agree with him, but the same condition existed nine years ago. When we arrived here we had to rent a house in those days too, such as it was, and paid a dollar a day for it, and before we had been in the place three days we bought lots and started building houses. Then we built some more houses, and they all were taken before we got them finished. Then in a year or so hard times came, rents went down to less than half what they were, and some of the houses stood empty for a year or two. Then we had to let some of them go because we could not keep up the taxes. We still have some that we are hanging on to by the skin of our teeth.

I wonder sometimes if it is worth while holding on when we have to rent a house within five minutes of the post office for ten dollars a month. This house rented for twenty-five dollars in the early days. Now when some of us feel we ought to raise the rents a little and try and save what is left of the property, "Would Be Resident" places us on the same level as a pickpocket and thinks we ought to be in the city lockup for a while. That would be giving it to us in the neck, as I expect we have to keep that place up, too.

Now if "Would Be Resident" will figure it out he has not very much kick coming as he can save up and get out, and if he does stay long enough perhaps when the park is finished the city fathers might let him put a tent up and he might live in that like some of the old timers did. Men that stop two days in a town or country generally think they know more about conditions than natives.

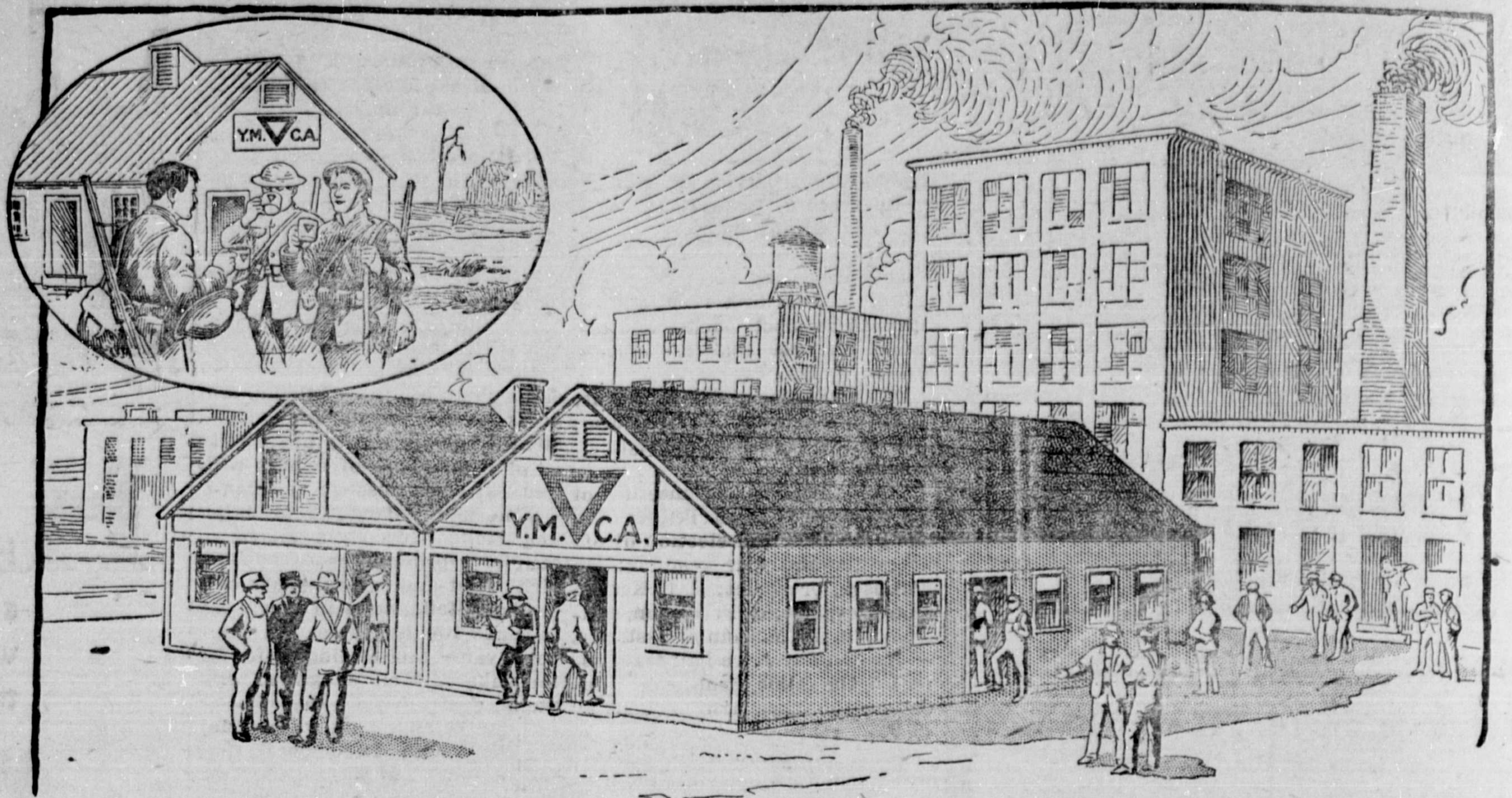

From the Trenches in Flanders to the Industries in Canada

Y.M.C.A. good cheer helped the soldiers win the war. Y.M.C.A. good cheer will help the soldiers of industry win the battle of life. The Red Triangle went with the

The Y.M.C.A. is promoting the establishment of Red Triangle huts in the big industrial plants and factory centres under the auspices of the employing companies.

It is promoting the erection of Y.M.C.A. huts in isolated

industries, such as mining and lumbering.

Special activities for factory workers of the big cities are planned for the local Y.M.C.A. buildings.

Towards the promotion, inauguration, and superintending of this Industrial Extension of the Y.M.C.A. to the workers, a part of the Red Triangle Fund, for which your contribution is requested, will be devoted.

Our plan for Y.M.C.A. extension to the industries is to enlist the sympathy of the president of the company or the heads of the firm, and the management of the plant, to explain our scheme of improved industrial relationships based upon the happiness and the welfare of the workers, and to get the employers to undertake the erection of a Y.M.C.A. building, fully equipped, situated right in the plant.

In some cases, a number of smaller firms would co-operate, and the Y.M.C.A. building would be centrally located for the convenience of a whole group of factories.

Recreation for Workers

This work has already been inaugurated in Sault Ste. Marie, London, St. Catharines, Port William, Port Arthur, Vancouver, and Toronto. Y.M.C.A. buildings are built and equipped on lines similar to those in the soldiers' camps, or like regular Y.M.C.A. buildings in the cities, according to the amount appropriated for the purpose by the companies. They should be furnished with a gymnasium, shower bath, swimming pool, canteen, reading and writing room, billiard tables, and an assembly hall for sing-songs, lectures, motion pictures, concerts, social gatherings, etc. To promote and superintend this project for our soldiers of industry part of the Red Triangle fund will be devoted.

The Y.M.C.A. went right into the front trenches in France and Flanders and elsewhere in the war zone to serve the Canadian troops.

It is going now into those isolated districts where industrial workers like our miners and lumbermen are fighting the battle of life in the front trenches of civilization.

For Women and Girls

What the Y.M.C.A. aims to do for the men and boys of Canada's industries, the Young Women's Christian Association aims to do for women and girls. The Dominion Council of the Y.W.C.A. has prepared a budget calling for an appropriation of \$175,000, and it is proposed to set aside that amount from the Red Triangle Fund for their use. The Dominion Council expenditure covers the expense of National work as distinct from the expenses of local Y.W.C.A. work. One of the chief items this year to be provided out of the Dominion Council fund is that of caring for the soldiers' wives and dependents journeying to their homes in Canada from overseas, helping them with difficulties and worries of all kinds.

With the support of the operating companies, Red Triangle huts will be established and equipped with canteen, billiard and

pool tables, reading room, motion picture and concert hall, baths and, in some cases, swimming pool and gymnasium. This service tends to eliminate the restless transient, the man who is "fed up with his job," gives him something profitable to do in his leisure hours.

In some districts where lumbering operations are active, trained Y.M.C.A. men drive from camp to camp during the winter equipped with portable stereopticon lantern outfits. They give illustrated talks, and entertainments introducing the element of play among the hard-working shanty boys by such games as volley ball, boxing, etc.

A Lumberman's Endorsement

One lumber operator says, "You have put my man-catcher out of business. Where before I had three gangs hired—one on the way in, one at work in the woods, and the other on the way out, now I need only one."

At the local Y.M.C.A.'s special programmes for industrial operatives will be aided from the Red Triangle fund. They will be offered recreation, entertainment and opportunity for self-development. Classes in various subjects of special interest or value to industrial workers will be held.

In districts where a considerable non-English-speaking population prevails, a knowledge of the English language, of Canada and of the principles of Canadian citizenship and of social responsibility will be promoted by the Y.M.C.A.

Help the "Y" complete its work for soldiers, help extend "Y" service to Canadian boys, help bring the Red Triangle to the Army of Industry and to Rural Canadian Life.

FISHING WAS DISCUSSED BY DELEGATION

Mayor McClymont and J. G. Scott
Placed Local Views Before
Ministers at Ottawa.

At the Council meeting Monday
night the following report was
made by the mayor in connection
with the recent visit to Ottawa.
"An interview was had with
Mr. Hunter, the deputy minister
of fisheries, wherein it was pointed
out the lack of accommodation
and shelter for fishing craft and
suggested the building of a wharf
and necessary shelter at Shaw-
atlans Passage, stating that un-
less accommodation was provided
there was a danger of losing much
of this business, which is a great
asset to the country.

"We pointed out that we did
not seek a very large appropria-
tion but would like to see a start
made in this direction, which
would be added to from time to
time as occasion demanded.
"This has already borne fruit,
as the district engineer has been
instructed to prepare plans and
submit data.

"Your committee understood
before leaving that if the Demin-
ion Government would do this
work that the Provincial Govern-
ment would deed the land.

Salmon Fisheries.
"Regarding the salmon fishery
we had an interview with the Hon.
A. K. McLean, acting minister of
fisheries, and pointed out the
benefits to be derived by having
more independent fishermen
instead of them being tied to the
canneries as at present, and
which method simply made work
for Oriental fishermen who did
not build up the community.

"We insisted that gas boats be
allowed in our district so as to
enable independent fishermen to
market their fish in the best
market as well as enabling them
to get more quickly to and from
the fishing grounds.

Cannery Monopoly.
"We protested against the can-
nery monopoly, claiming the right
of any one to enter this business
if they saw fit like any other in-
terest, and that this would in no
way impair the supply as the
Government could take proper
steps to meet the situation by
having a longer closed period.

"We also raised objection to
the fishery inspectors, claiming
that they were too closely asso-
ciated with the cannery interests
and the community had no con-
fidence in them.

No Faith in Commission.
"The minister pointed out that
a commission had dealt with all
these matters and reported its
findings, but we insisted that the
whole situation be reviewed, as
there was a great amount of dis-
content owing to present methods,
further pointing out that the pro-
posed thirty licenses to be given
to returned soldiers might not be
taken advantage of to the fullest
extent, as many of these men
might not be physically able to
handle row boats and their aim
of providing work for these men
would thus be defeated.

"In all of these matters we had
the strong backing of Col. Peck
and the situation unfolded was
such that the minister agreed to
have the whole situation in Dis-
trict No. 2 reviewed.

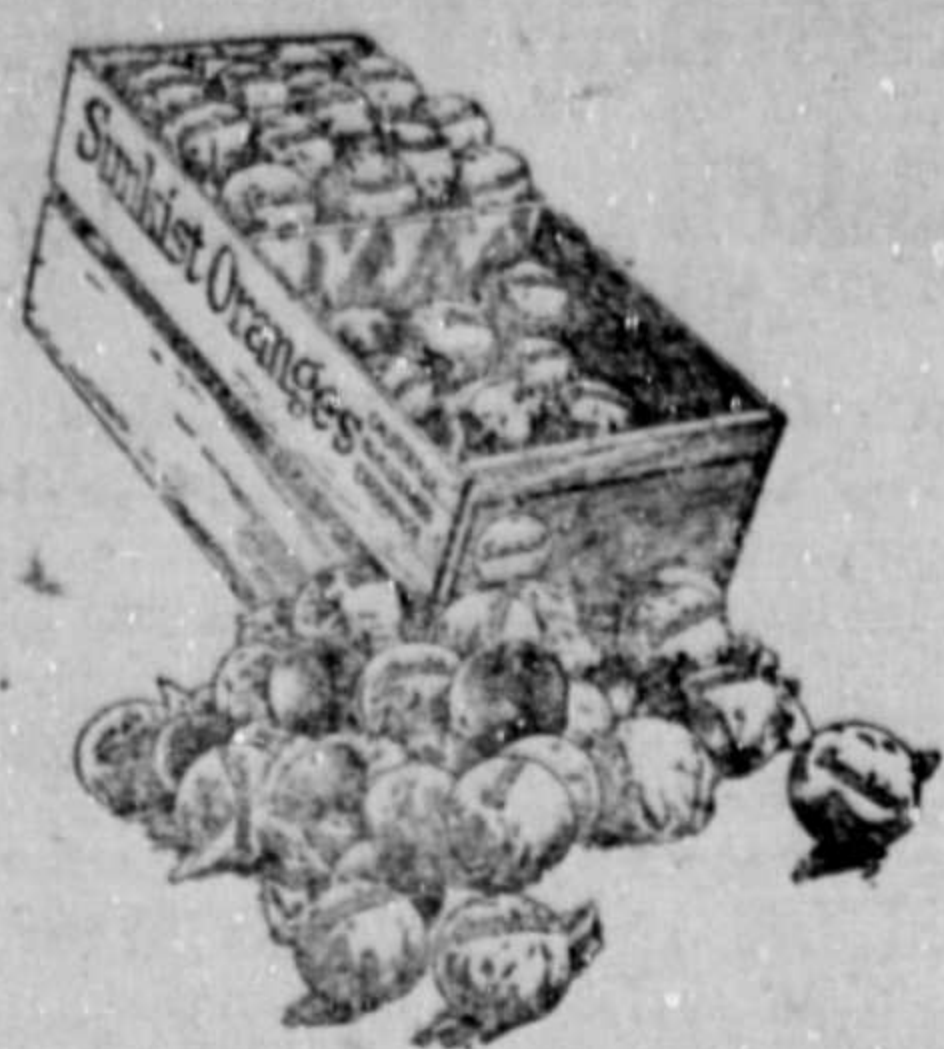

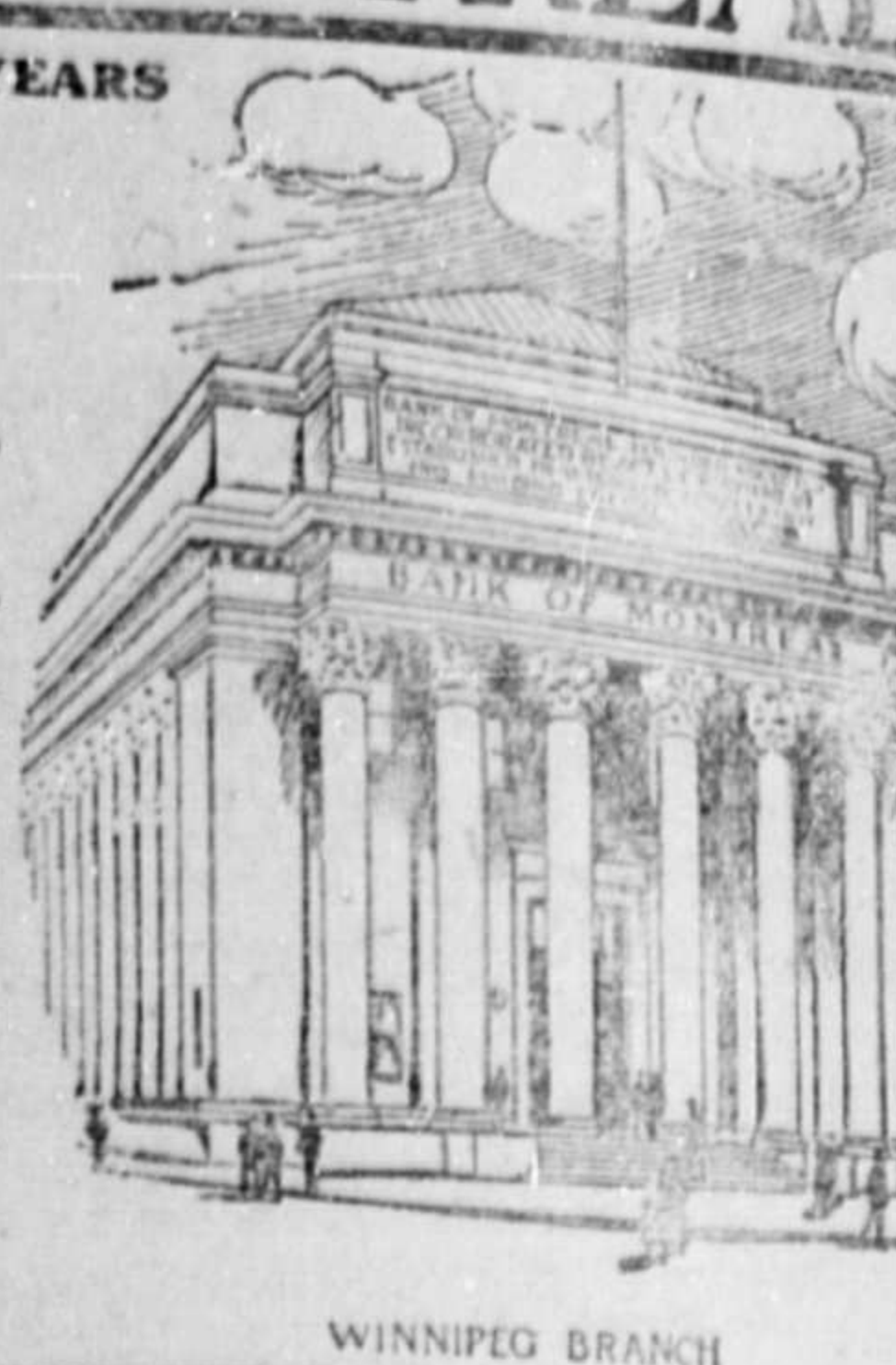
