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THING IS TAKEN FROM GERMANY FOR ALL TIME TO COME BY PEACE TREATY WHICH SHE HAS TO SIGN

to be Hedged in on every Hand and Crippled on Land and Sea
and made to Replace what She has Stolen or Destroyed.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Versailles, May 8.—The terms of the peace treaty end Germany as a military power. She will be deprived of virtually all her fleet and the army will be cut down to nominal dimensions and sharply restricted along lines which might seek to work her to rehabilitate herself.
Economically her future course is hedged about with stipulations intended to insure her ability to pay the indemnity demanded and prevent her from exploiting from time the resources as a struggling competitor of the nations about her which were devastated during the war.
Germany for a period of years at least is deprived of the coal output of Saare basin which goes to France in repayment of damage caused by destruction of the French coal mines. She will be compelled to make restitution for damage in other ways done to France and Belgium and the various other countries which suffered depredations. In numerous other ways she is made to realize that the more than four years career of destruction must be made good.
The Germans will be allowed only a definitely fixed time within which to sign the treaty.
Peace Treaty briefs:
Danzig is to be permanently internationalized.
Germany agrees to territorial changes toward Belgium and Denmark and Russia.
Germany cedes most of upper Silesia to Poland.
Germany renounces all territorial and political rights outside Europe.
Germany recognizes the total independence of German Austria, Czechoslovakia and Poland.
The German army is reduced to 100,000 men including officers.
Conscription within German territory is abolished.
All German forts for 50 kilometres east of the Rhine are to be razed.
All transportation, exportation and real production of war materials stopped.
Germany renounces to China all public property and concessions in China except Kia Chau.
Germany renounces all rights in Morocco.
Germany recognizes the British protectorate over Egypt.
Germany cedes to Japan all rights in Shantung peninsula.
Germany must demobilize within two months after peace is signed.
All German munitions establishments must be closed within three months after peace is signed, except where otherwise provided by the Allies.
The ex-Kaiser is to be tried by an international high court.
Other violations of the laws of war are to be tried.
Holland is to be asked to extradite the ex-Kaiser.
France gains permanent possession of the Saar coal mines, regardless of the result of the Saar plebiscite.
Germany restores Alsace-Lorraine to France.
All Hohenzollern property in Alsace Lorraine goes to France without payment.
Germany cedes to Belgium 382 square miles of territory between Luxembourg and Holland.
Germany's cession to Poland isolates East Prussia from the remainder of Germany.
Germany's cessions to Poland comprise 27,686 square miles; France, 5,600 square miles (Alsace Lorraine).
Germany must reimburse all civilian damages, beginning with an initial payment of 20,000,000,000 marks, subsequent payments in reparation to be secured by a bond issue approved by a reparation commission.
Germany must pay shipping damages, ton for ton.
Germany must devote her economic resources to rebuilding devastated regions.
Germany is forbidden to build forts controlling the Baltic.
Kiel Canal is to be open to all nations.

BLOCKADE IF GERMANY DOES NOT SIGN UP

More Rigorous Than During War
Will be Restrictions; Economic
Annihilation if They
Refuse.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, May 8.—That Germany will make known her decision regarding the peace treaty with a few days' discussion was the opinion that prevailed in Allied circles today. Already reduced to virtual military and naval impotence, the Germans additionally face the prospect of economic annihilation if they dare refuse the terms presented at Versailles yesterday afternoon.
The blockade division of the supreme economic council under the direction of the "Big Three" has begun the preparation of plans under which an even more rigorous blockade than obtained during the war will be clamped down on Germany in the event of her defiance.
Premier Clemenceau in his speech yesterday made it plain that the Allies are prepared to sign the treaty as soon as the Germans make known their decision regardless of the day this occurs.
The German plenipotentiaries will know that they have a maximum period of 15 days to present in English and French written observations on the whole of the treaty. Before the expiration of that period German delegates will be entitled to send a reply on the particular headings of the treaty or to ask questions regarding them.

SPECIAL MEETING AT VICTORIA TO ARRANGE TO GREET COL. PECK

Victoria, May 8.—A special meeting was held last night in the rooms of the Comrades of the Great War for the purpose of making final arrangements to give Lieut.-Col. Peck, V.C., a proper reception on his arrival at the capital with his men. He will be met at the boat by a band and escorted to the hotel, and other arrangements will be perfected as soon as it is known exactly what day and time he will arrive.

GENERAL JOHN W. STEWART IS ON WAY HOME

Built 3,500 Miles of Railway in
France and Will Now Operate
as J. W. Stewart & Co.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Winnipeg, May 8.—General J. W. Stewart, better known in western Canada as "Jack" Stewart, of the firm of Foley, Welch & Stewart, passed through Winnipeg last night on his way to Vancouver.
Mr. Stewart is one of the foremost railway construction men in the Dominion. In France he built 3,500 miles of standard gauge railway, which is more than the distance from Vancouver to Montreal. Besides this, many hundreds of miles of narrow gauge roads such as are used to take food and supplies up to the front lines, were constructed under his direction.
The company under which Mr. Stewart will operate this year is, known as J. W. Stewart & Co., the affairs of the old company, Foley, Welch & Stewart, having been to a large extent wound up. Mr. Stewart will continue to make his home in Vancouver.

WELL KNOWN CONTRALTO TO SING TONIGHT

Mrs. Dalby Brooks Morkill, of
Vancouver, Leading Vocalist
Tonight for Musical
Society.

Mrs. Dalby Brooks Morkill, who appears this evening at the Musical Society concert, is a singer of repute. In British Columbia she has been the leading contralto for the last eight or nine years, while living in Vancouver, and she has had a wide experience also in other parts as a concert singer.
Mrs. Morkill made a tour of the British Isles before coming to this country, and since then toured Canada with her own company under the management of C. P. Walker, of Winnipeg, at which time she visited every town of importance between Prince Rupert and Toronto.
Mrs. Dalby Morkill has made a special study of oratoria and is considered to have no superior on the coast in this branch of work. She was probably the first to give a concert in Prince Rupert, which she did in 1909.
Mrs. Morkill has been spending the summers in northern British Columbia, during which time Mr. Morkill was engaged in mining work in this district.

TIMBER CONTROLLER AND BUYER ON COAST

Hon. T. D. Pattullo Leaves for
the South Tonight to Meet
Sir James Ball.

Sir James Ball, the British timber controller, and Mr. Meyers, the British timber buyer, are on the coast to meet the minister of lands in connection with business with this province and to size up the situation for themselves. Because of this Hon. T. D. Pattullo has to leave for the south tonight and will meet the visiting officials at the beginning of the week. It is possible that he may be able to induce them to return east by this route and to visit the scene of the aeroplane spruce activities.
On Tuesday the visitors are to be entertained at a banquet by the timbermen of the province at Vancouver.
It is hoped that this visit will be the means of securing a good deal of business in the Old Country for this province.

Refreshments to visitors by ladies.
Return to boat.

The city will erect an arch opposite the City Hall on Fulton Street and there will be a general display of bunting and the agricultural hall will be decorated, the arrangements being in charge of Messrs. Silversides, Orme and Arneil.

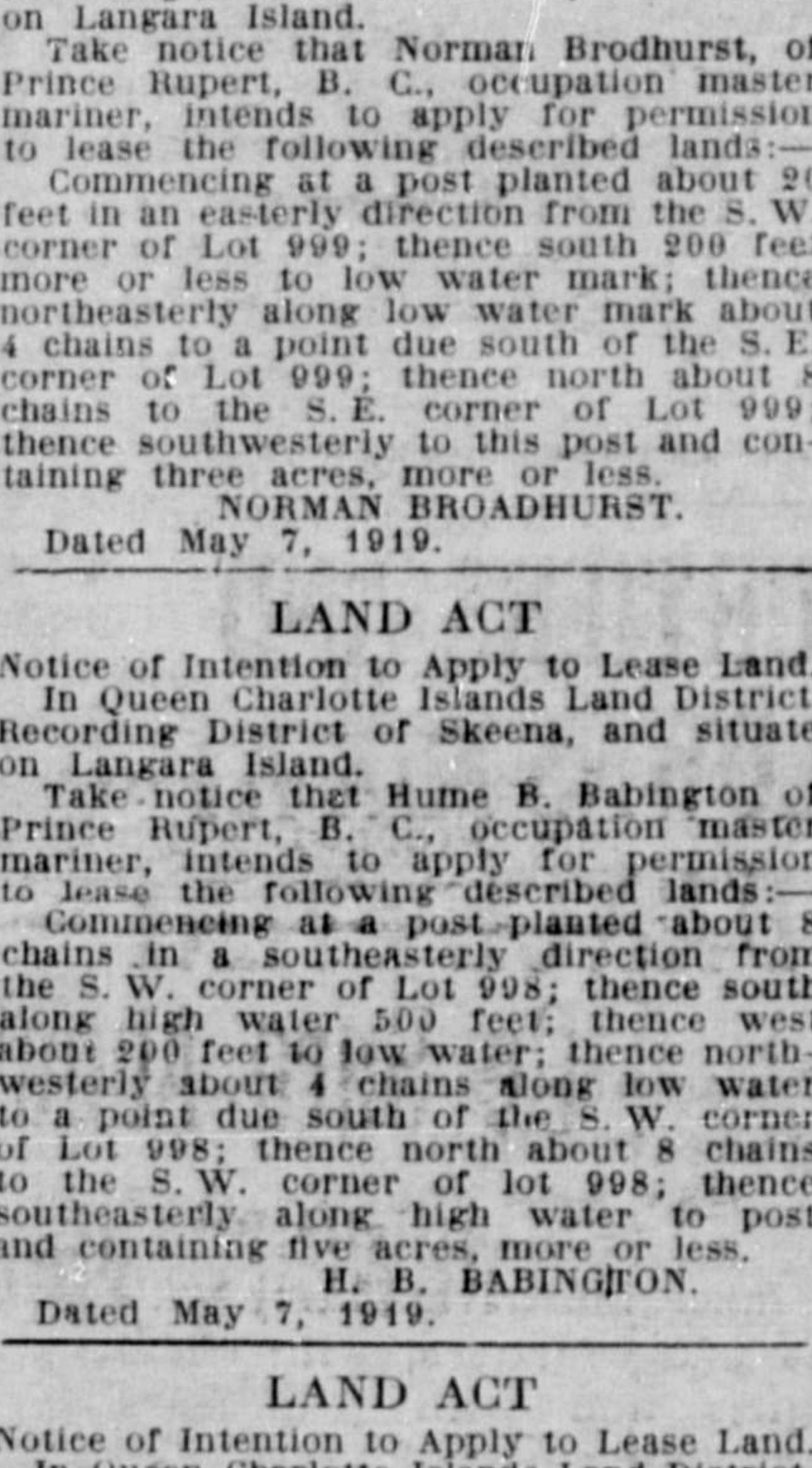

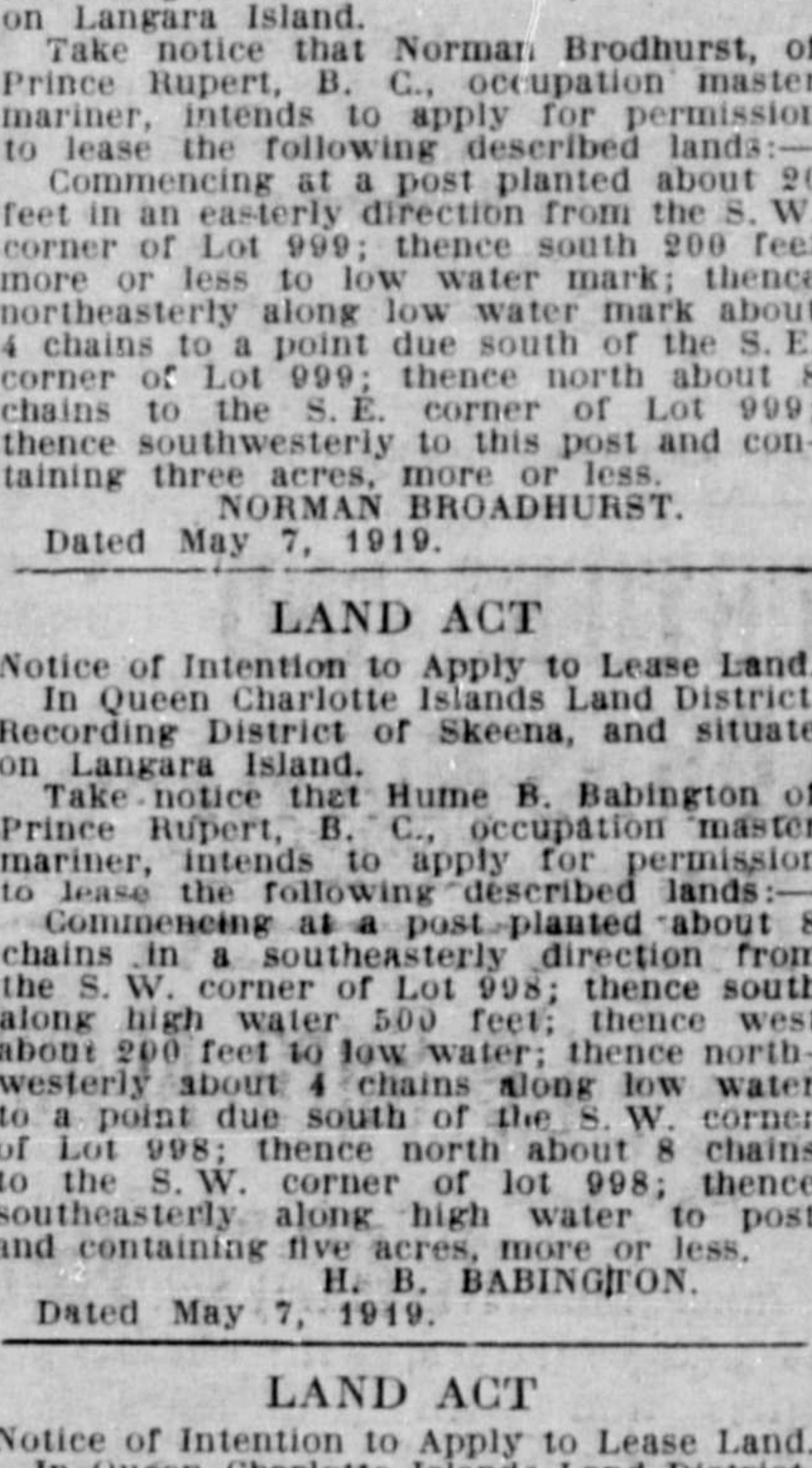

SERVICE WITH TRAMWAY UNIT

Q. M. Sergt. John Kelly Tells of Work of Light Railway Created By the Canadians.

That the Canadians were the pioneers in the building of light railways close to the front lines in France and Belgium and that their system was copied by all the other troops is clear from reports received from time to time. A Prince Rupert man was one who took a prominent part in this railway building. Q. M. Sergt. John Kelly is well known here. He was among the first to leave for overseas on the call going out for men, and he arrived home on Sunday last. He was on active service all the time while away, taking his share of trench fighting and pioneer work. It was his work in connection with the construction and operation of light railways, however, that was interesting.

Tramway Company.

The First Tramway Company of the Canadian Engineers was formed with men taken from every unit in the Canadian corps. They constructed the first light railways on the British front and these railways made possible many of the advances which in the early years of the war were impossible. Their duties were to carry ammunition forward, to pick up the eighteen pounders and take them forward in order to camouflage the actual strength of the forces, to carry forward the cloud gas to no man's land, to carry back the dead and wounded from the casualty stations.

By means of the light railways the armies could advance over shell-torn fields, or across seas of mud and could be sure that their supplies would follow. Although Mr. Kelly did not say so particularly, it is well known that these tramways were one of the big factors in the winning of the war.

Baptism of Fire.

Q. M. Sergt. Kelly left in February, 1915, with the 48th Battalion. Before the unit left Victoria they had distinguished themselves by putting out of business the Kaiserhof Hotel and the Deutscher Verein or German Club at the capital. In England, however, they were made into a pioneer regiment and had their first baptism of fire at Messines. There had been nothing doing there for months, but immediately on the arrival of the new unit the Ross rifles were brought into play and stirred up the Germans so a fierce attack was made by them.

Gone But Not Forgotten.

Most of the two and a half years of pioneer service was spent at Ypres, Vimy and on the Somme. Then the unit was broken up and today there is at La Target a small gravestone surmounted by a cross on which is the following inscription: "48th Battalion; raised by Patriotism, March, 1915; killed by Politics, May, 1917. Gone but not forgotten."

Mr. Kelly was gassed twice with mustard gas, but he carried on. He had many close shaves for his life but was never wounded. On

one occasion a big 5.9 shell destroyed one of the light trains near him and there were sixty casualties, of which forty were dead. At Amiens 25 men were killed right beside him from a bursting shell.

Final Work.

Toward the end of the war the chief work of the unit was converting the German railways for the use of British transports, and even after the armistice had been signed work was continued at Lens clearing up and salvaging where every building had been levelled with the ground.

Mr. Kelly is feeling first rate and glad to be home.

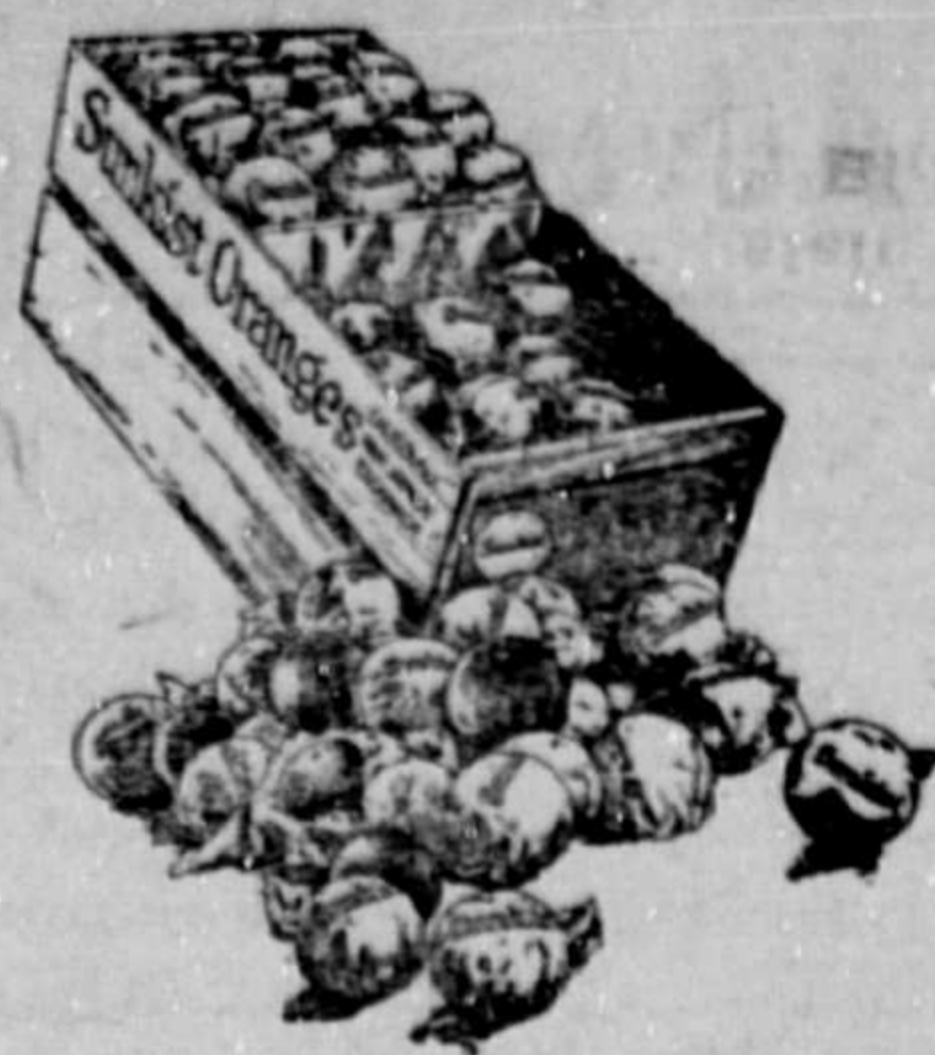

Germany must accept highly detailed provisions for internationalization of roads and rivers.

Germany is to accept the league of nations in principle but without membership.
