"MAILED FIST" PEACE, PREMIER OF PRUSSIA SAYS; ASKS NATION TO HELP MAKE IT "PEACE OF RIGHT"

**Germans do not Like Medicine; Delegates Say Terms are beyond
Most Pessimistic Outlook; "Unfulfillable" and "Instrument
of Robbery" Are among Expressions Used to
Characterize It**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Berne, May 9.—A Versailles correspondent of the Berlin
Zeitung, interviewing the German peace delegates, quotes Oe-
bert as follows: "We must make peace with Russia and invite
Russian troops into Germany."
Herr Landsberg is quoted as saying: "The terms are beyond
the most pessimistic forecast. After our observations the only
alternative for us will be to answer yes or no."
Paris, May 9.—The engagement for joint action by Great
Britain and the United States to assist France in case of an un-
provoked attack, excited more interest and satisfaction in French
official and military quarters than the treaty.
Berlin, May 9.—Condemnation of the peace terms is ex-
pressed by all newspapers here, those of the extreme right re-
ferring to the conditions as "unfulfillable" and to the treaty as
"an instrument of robbery."
Premier Hirsch of Prussia, speaking in the Prussian National
Assembly, characterized the peace terms as representing purely
the mailed fist, a peace which would mean slavery for the Father-
land and fresh bloodshed for Europe.
"The Government appeals to you," he said, "to close your
ranks, preserve calm and avoid indiscretion in case of dissensions.
The entire nation must stand behind the Government to convert
this projected peace of violence into a peace of right. This,
the most mournful day in our history, must find us strong."

PREPARATION OF TREATY FOR AUSTRIA NOW

Council of Four Busy Already on
Document for Presentation
to Other Enemy
Countries.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, May 8.—The Council of
Four, with Premier Orlando of
Italy present, began today to ar-
range a program for the presen-
tation of peace terms to the Aus-
trian, Bulgarian and Hungarian
delegates. The Austrian treaty
has begun to take form. From
the portions already drafted it
appears that, instead of Germany
being required to pay the entire
reparations demanded by the Al-
lies, a considerable sum will be
demanded of Austria, estimate of
this sum being 5,000,000,000
crowns.

DELEGATES CONSULT HOME GOVERNMENT BEFORE SPEAKING

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, May 8.—Intimations
reaching the Peace Conference
from Versailles lead to the belief
that two or three members of the
German Peace delegation will
probably return to Germany to
consult with the government,
others remaining at Versailles.
Germany has not yet submitted
any communication with regard
to the peace treaty. All exchanges
between the delegation at Ver-
sailles and the home government
are being kept secret. Copies of
the treaty are on their way to
Berlin. A German courier left at
9 o'clock last night bearing them,
with Count von Brockdorff Ran-
taus' first report on the negotia-
tions.

CANADIAN WHEAT FOR THE AMERICAN MILLS

New York, May 9.—G. Barnes,
United States wheat director, an-
nounced that he had completed
negotiations to bring 4,000,000
bushels of Canadian wheat into
the United States for distribution
to the mills. Negotiations have

GUNBOATS ACTIVE AGAINST BOLSHEVIKI

Attack Made on Allied Troops Was
Repulsed Near Maloberesenick

Archangel, May 9.—British
gunboats were active against the
Bolsheviks for the first time Tues-
day. They co-operated with a
strong patrol, broke through the
enemy outpost north of Tulgas
and destroyed the dugouts and
ammunition dumps. The Bol-
shevik attempt against British,
United States and Russian posi-
tions at Maloberesenick was re-
pulsed.

GOVERNMENT WILL BUILD MORE SHIPS, MINISTER OF MARINE SAYS IN COMMONS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

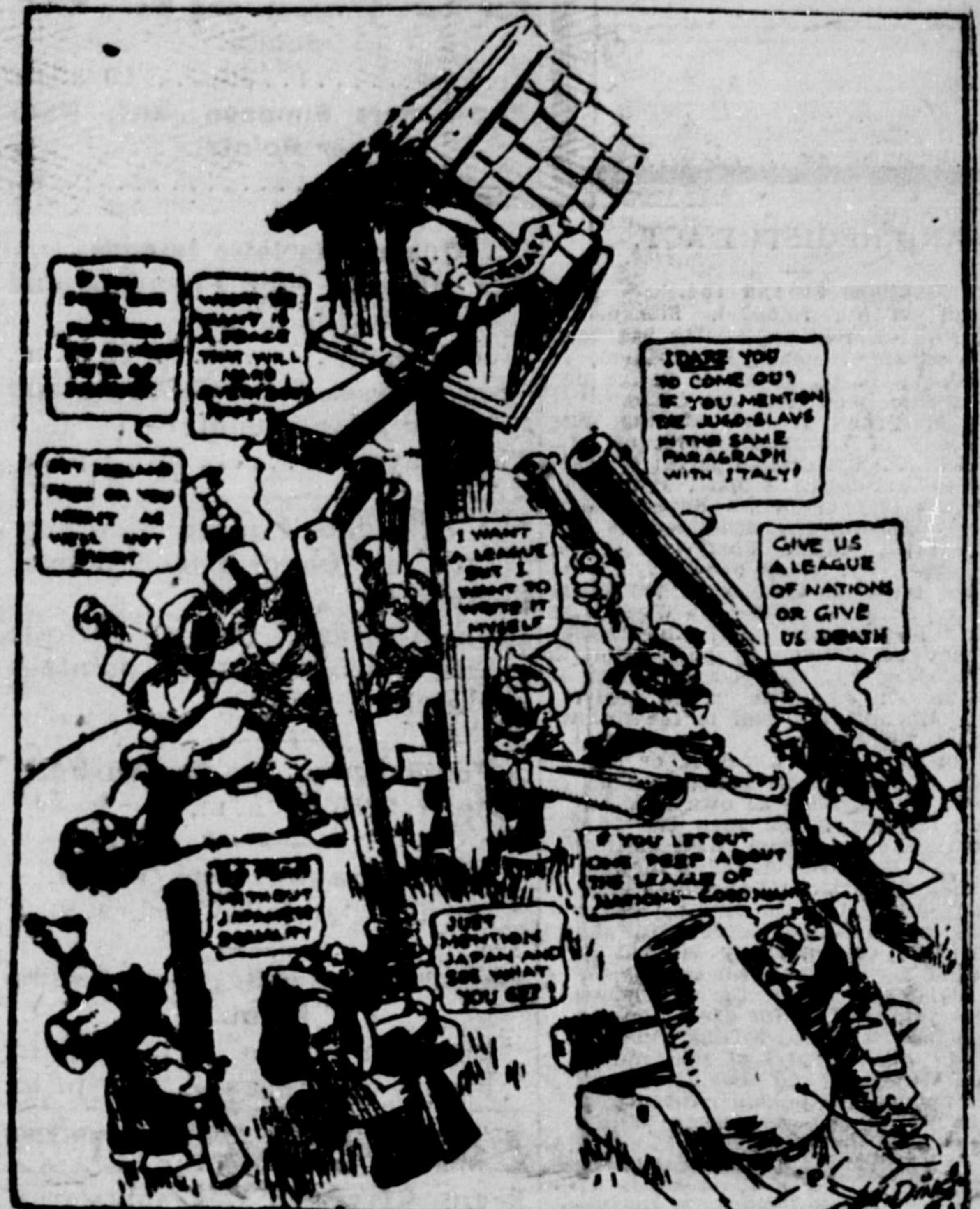
Ottawa, May 9.—The Dominion Government intends to give
more orders for ships. It is not the intention of the Government
to cease the shipbuilding program now. They are going to keep
the yards requiring business busy throughout the balance of 1919
and probably into 1920, declared Hon. C. C. Balantyne in the
House of Commons yesterday.

Shipping was under discussion practically during the whole
day. The debate commenced when the House went into com-
mittee on supply on the estimates for the Marine Department.

The particular vote under discussion was one for \$30,000,000
to complete the shipbuilding program already announced, and
when the House rose at 6 the vote had not passed.

In the evening the House reverted to a discussion of the war
vote of \$350,000,000 and again discussion centred around the
Marine Department and the Fisheries and Naval service.

AFGHAN TRIBES AT KHYBER PASS ARE RESTLESS

Unfriendly Attitude is Assumed
By New Amir Toward
Great Britain.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, May 9.—Afghan tribes
close to the Afghan border with
the assistance of Afghan regu-
lar troops have occupied positions
on the Indian side of the border.
Military precautions have been
taken by the British who address-
ed a vigorous note to the Amir.
It has been reported for some
time that the new Amir had
adopted an unfriendly attitude
toward the British and contem-
plated the invasion of the north-
west front of the Khyber Pass,
the principal northern pass into
that country from India.
No large number of tribesmen
were concerned, but occupied
some heights of importance com-
manding two roads leading across
the frontier.

CANABALISM AMONG THE REFUGEES IN SOUTHERN CAUCASUS

New York, May 9.—Horrible
stories of cannibalism are coming
from the region where starving
refugees are huddled in southern
Caucasus. A number of cases
have been reported of mothers
killing and eating their own child-
ren.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT ON WABASH RAILWAY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Cayuga, Ont., May 9.—Owing to
the breaking of a brake beam No.
3 Wabash train, westbound, met
with a serious accident eleven
and a half miles south of Can-
boro. Three passenger and two
baggage cars were badly smash-
ed, the road torn up for 1,100
yards and an engine turned over.
Engineer Fred Bechey and Fire-
man Emory Bellows were killed
and forty passengers slightly in-
jured.

SHIPMENTS OF HALIBUT ON INCREASE

Nearly a Million Pounds More
Sold Here in April This
Year Than Last.

The increase in the amount of
halibut marketed here for April
of this year over the same month
last year is nearly a million
pounds. The total amount sold
at this port amounted to 2,542,-
000 lbs., whereas last year for
the corresponding month the
amount marketed was 1,636,200
lbs. This is a most significant
increase and one that shows what
development is possible at this
port.

The total amount of halibut
marketed here this year so far
is 5,054,600 lbs. up to the end of
April. The prices have ranged
from 10c. to 19c. per pound for
first class fish and from 7c. to
14c. a pound for second class.

Unfortunately there has been a
slight shortage of cars here re-
cently which will have an effect
on the May returns, much of the
fish having to be sent to Ketchi-
kan or Seattle instead of being
shipped from here. In spite of
that, however, it is expected that
this port will keep her lead.

Peace Treaty is Very Complete.

Anyone who took the trouble to read through the resume of the Peace Treaty as set out in yesterday's News must have been impressed with its completeness. It seems to cover every point. It has been evolved by the best minds of the world. It is the work of the Big Four in consultation with all the other members of the conference.

Under the treaty Germany will be tied down in such a way that military dominance will be impossible and trade dominance will be out of the question for a long time to come. She will be held in such a way that she will not be able to escape making restitution for the wrongs she has done.

Great Work of Local Organization.

The Daily News is glad to add its meed of praise to those of all who heard the Musical Association's choir and the symphony orchestra at the concert last night. Those who have had charge of the work must have been pleased at the reception they received and the members of the choir themselves must have felt gratified that they have been able to do such good work. Possibly there might be a larger representation of the younger people of the city in the choir. There might also be a membership for those who, while not singers, might like to be identified with its activities and help in its support. If the big professional singers are to be secured, money will be needed.

Soldiers Returning From Siberia.

The soldiers are being brought home from Siberia as fast as possible. It seems to have been a mistake to send them. Before their embarkation the armistice had been signed, and most of the men went much against their wills. They joined the corps to help win the war, not to interfere with the interior economy of Siberia or Russia. So great was the dissatisfaction at having to go that there was almost a mutiny at Victoria before embarkation.

There must have been many mistakes in the war. From time to time we shall hear of them. The operations were so big and there were so many amateurs enlisted to do professional work that mistakes were bound to be made. Canadians will, however, be glad to know that no more precious lives are to be wasted in interfering with the quarrels between sections of Russians.

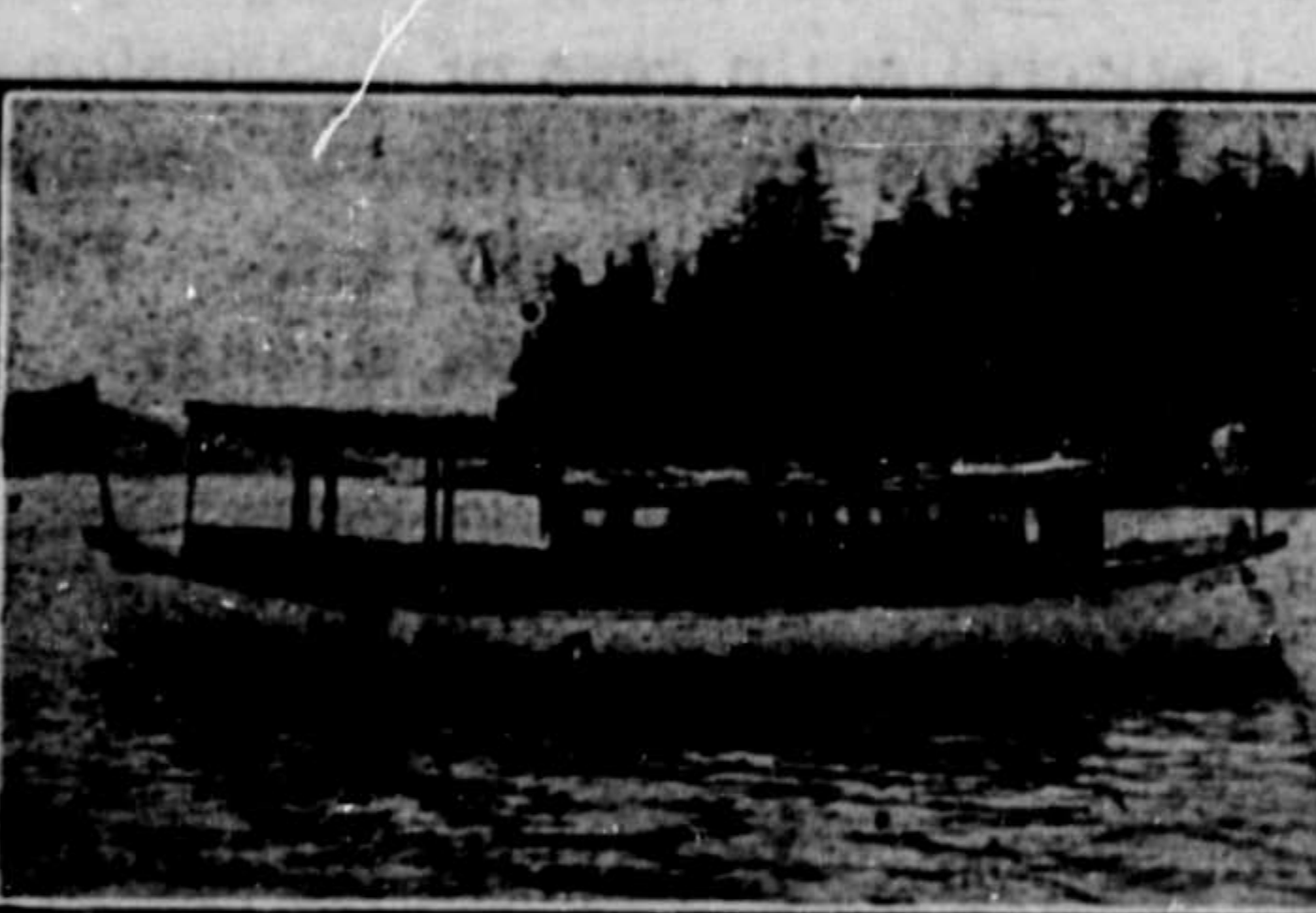

VAGARIES OF CUSTOMS RETURNS ILLUSTRATED

Drop This Month But Other Months of Year Have Shown Increases.

There is some variation in the customs returns from month to month often caused by special importations like new mine machinery or new boats purchased on the other side of the line. This month the returns compared with last year are down. They are \$10,704.40, as compared with \$29,719.91. For other months this year the returns were: January, \$14,300; February, \$20,013; March, \$36,600. Each of these amounts was higher than for last year, the difference in March being very marked.

ISLAND FISHING IS NOT VERY SUCCESSFUL

Victoria, May 9.—Owing to bad weather on the West Coast of Vancouver Island, the catch of spring salmon this year so far has been small, and the fish caught have been sold on the fresh fish market. With the exception of the Nootka cannery, none of the West Coast canneries have canned springs this year, and will not open until the regular time in July. Last year they opened early and canned a large number of springs.

The fish salting industry at Sidney Inlet has apparently ceased, and Capt. George Heater, who was operating the plant there, brought the purse-seiner Lena F. down from Sidney Cove a few days ago to Victoria.

Capt. Stanley Fraser, who is now superintendent of the Clayoquot Cannery, came down on the Princess Maquinna a few days ago. He has been up the West Coast some time getting things in shape for the coming season. Capt. Fraser was formerly with the Clayoquot concern, but left several years ago. He captained the cannery tender Bonilla for the Lummi Bay Packing Company last season.

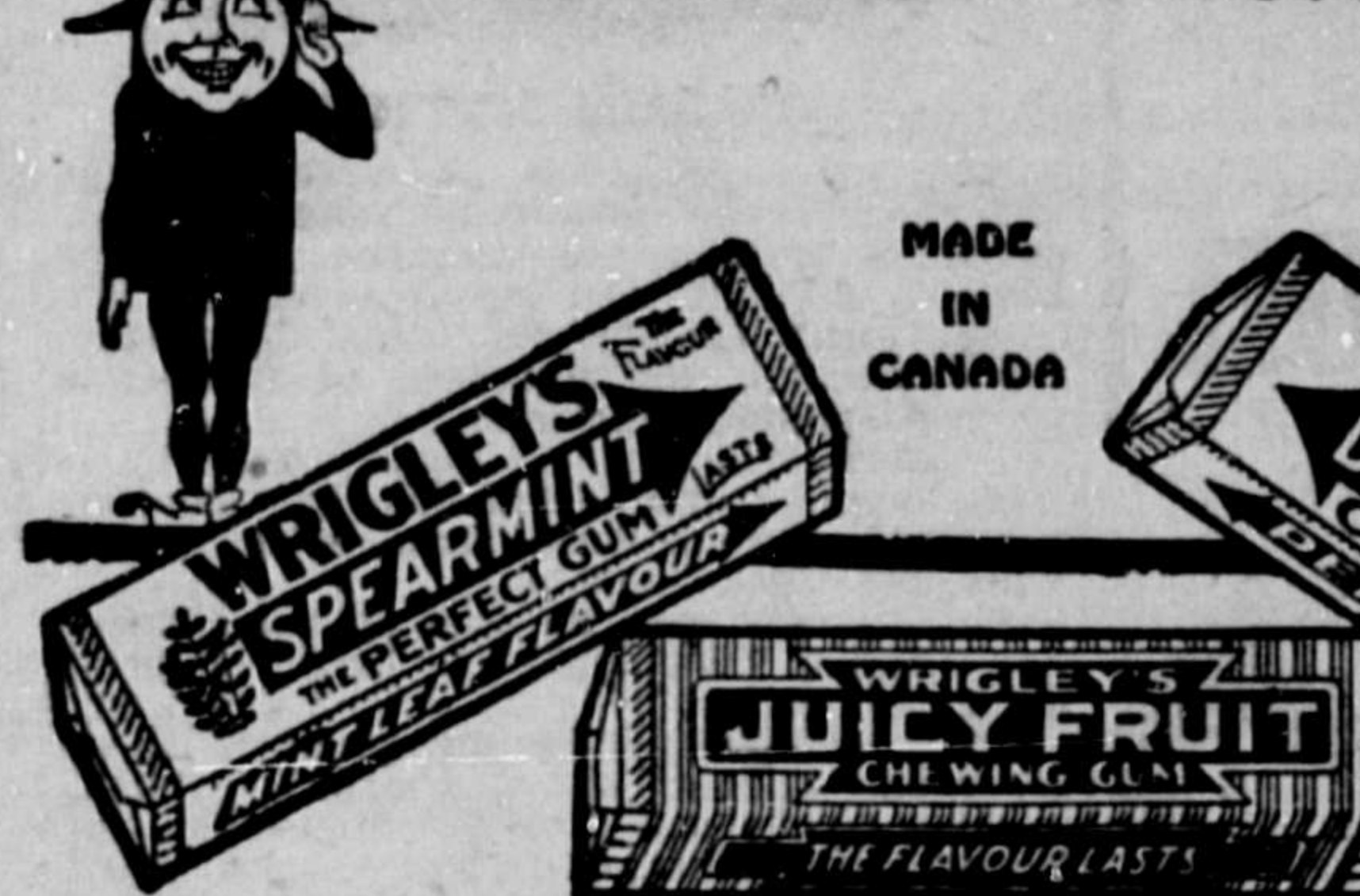

MUSICAL EVENT PROVED A VERY GREAT SUCCESS

Choir and Orchestra and Splendid
Soloists Delighted Large
Audience at Westholme
Theatre.

The second grand concert of the Prince Rupert Musical Society took place last night in the Westholme Theatre and was a great advance over the previous one, not in attendance, although that was good, but in the quality of the performance.

Both choir and orchestra showed great improvement since the last event of a similar kind. The voices blended and balanced well, there was good attack and the shading was much improved. Not at any time was there an indication that the singers had got out of hand. In fact the programme throughout was entirely pleasing.

Of the symphony orchestra enough cannot be said. The change from the previous Musical society concert was most marked. The unity of expression, the attack and the balance had been perfected to such an extent that the orchestra may now be looked upon as one of the creditable organizations of the city. Under the leadership of Professor Harvey, who has undertaken the training since the beginning, the progress of this group of instrumentalists has been wonderfully improved.

The Soloists.

For the soloists also there can be nothing but praise, words fail to express the enjoyment of the audience, but recognition was given in full after each song. Mrs. Dalby Morkill was in good voice, not so good perhaps as at some of her performances, but so good that the audience insisted on recall after recall. In her rendition of the popular Irish and Scottish airs she was particularly popular.

Dr. Large was in splendid voice and his solos were very much appreciated. It seems a pity that with the doctor living so near by he is not heard here oftener, for his singing is an education. That lullaby bit that he gave last night was perfect.

Will Edmunds fairly excelled himself in his 'cello solos and his accompaniment to Mrs. Morkill in "My Rosary" was most pleasing.

The quartette, Mrs. J. H. McLeod, Miss Edmands, J. E. Davey and A. Clapperton was very nicely balanced and proved a most enjoyable number.

The instrumental trio by Professors Harvey, Edmunds and W. J. Pitman was possibly one of the best bits of the evening. It was the Intermezzo Sinfonica from Cavalleria Rusticana and was an art production of a high order.

Splendid Work.

It is seldom in a town so removed from the great centres as is Prince Rupert that a group of musicians of such high order is gathered. Mr. Pitman's accompaniments added a great deal to the general effect of the evening. It is, however, to the two leaders, to J. E. Davey and to Professor Harvey, that the major portion of the praise is due. Mr. Davey has worked almost day and night to train his voices, both en masse and in groups and the art production of last night certainly must have been pleasing to him as it certainly was to the audience.

Professor Harvey, too, has gathered a group of instrumentalists, many of them with little previous experience and has knit them into a pleasing whole which at his command emits delightful harmony.

At the close of the concert W. E. Williams thanked the performers and the audience and said a few appreciative words of the work of the choir and orchestra, mentioning what was in everybody's mind, that the city should be proud of having such an organization here.

POSSIBILITIES OF STEWART AND ALICE ARM

Minister and Member Visit District in Connection With Suggested Government Road.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo and Frank H. Mobley, M. P. P., who have just returned from Stewart and Alice Arm district speak glowingly of the outlook in that district this year.

The steamer Prince John arriving there Sunday took in sixty-five passengers, while the Albert arriving on Monday carried 27 head of stock for packing purposes and a heavy consignment of goods.

The general interest in the district is very keen and it is now felt that the camps have been sufficiently developed to put the future beyond peradventure.

During last session when south attending to his legislative duties Mr. Mobley brought to the attention of the government the necessity of making ample provision, from a governmental standpoint, to properly cope with the situation which is developing and the visit of Mr. Pattullo was made with a view to having a member of the government get first hand knowledge.

Keep Trade Canadian.

In order to insure that all possible trade shall be retained on the Canadian side, the government is constructing a road from the end of the wharf at Stewart to Hyder to connect up with the road there. This will give Stewart access to the wonderfully rich properties on the Canadian side of the Salmon river. The new road is a costly piece of work as there is some heavy cutting to be done, but it is realized that in order to retain the trade for home merchants the work must be done.

It is expected that the Alice Arm situation will be cleared up within the next month and work should start there on an extensive scale at an early date.

The north seems to be coming into its own.
