PECK TO BE GUEST OF MANY ORGANIZATIONS IF SUITABLE ARRANGEMENTS CAN BE MADE

A banquet is to be tendered Lieut.-Col. Peck on Monday evening by the returned soldiers of the city organized by the Great War Veterans. The event will take place at 8:15 at the Central Hotel, subject to the approval of the Colonel. Messrs. Wearmouth, Crewe and Frost are a committee to arrange and they hope that every returned soldier in the city will be present, reporting first to a member of the committee.

It is expected that the Unionist executive will banquet the Colonel on Tuesday and on Wednesday Tsimpsean Lodge of the Masonic Order will have the distinguished soldier for their guest. It is also expected that arrangements will be made for a Canadian Club lunch at which the Colonel will be the guest of honor.

In regard to the arrangements tomorrow there will be no charge so far as was known this morning. The train is expected to arrive at 7:30 and all citizens will be present, and meet the officers and men at the Exhibition Building, when the presentations will be made.

CITY'S FAILURE DISAPPOINTING TO MR. MULLEN

President of Shipbuilding Concern Expected to See House Building in Progress.

"I had hoped that there would be some house building going on when I returned, and that provision would have been made to take care of some of the employees of our company ere this," said J. M. Mullen, president of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., last night to a Daily News representative. Mr. Mullen returned from Pittsburgh last night, where he has been conferring with Newman Erb on the work there.

Mr. Mullen was visibly disappointed at the failure of the Prince Rupert people to do anything to meet the crisis in the city's history. He said that the city could not hope to get the full advantage from the shipbuilding program if the local people did not bestir themselves.

In regard to the operation of ships from this port Mr. Mullen said that Mr. Erb confirmed the information that had been brought back by the delegates to Ottawa. He told Mr. Mullen that the Government had definitely promised to operate ten vessels from this port and to give the local firm the work of overhauling them.

MCKENZIE SUPPORTS THE SHIPBUILDING PROPOSALS

SAYS HE HOPES NOTHING WILL INTERFERE WITH AN ADVANCED PROGRAM AND FURNISHING OF STEEL; CALDER'S IMMIGRATION BILL REPORTED BY COMMITTEE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, May 10.—Calder's Immigration Bill was received from the committee in the Commons last night. Hume Cronly's amendment, which would have shut out immigrants from southeastern Europe for five years, after some further discussion, was withdrawn, the minister explaining that officials of the immigration department had reported that the plan would be difficult to work out.

Some new amendments proposed by the minister were adopted in committee before the bill was reported. One prevents the bringing into Canada of concealed weapons. During the earlier part of the sitting good headway was made in committee with the new Bankruptcy Act, but several contentious clauses were left over for consideration at a later date.

Discussion of the Government shipping program was resumed in the afternoon when the House went into committee on supply to consider the estimates of the Department of Marine and Fisheries. Referring to the Government's contract for steel plates with the Dominion Steel Co., D. D. McKenzie remarked he hoped nothing would interfere with an advanced program of shipbuilding and furnishing of the plates.

CHINESE MAY NOT SIGN THE PEASE TREATY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, May 10.—It seems unlikely that the Chinese will sign the treaty of peace unless China be given written assurance that Japan will return Kiao Chau to her. The Chinese delegates say the clause in the treaty contains no such provision, their only basis for believing that such restitution will be made being a verbal agreement.

A portion of the German treaty not yet made public contains a provision that German Austria's separation from Germany shall be "inalienable" unless approved by the Council of the League of Nations. Use of the word "inalienable" is for the purpose of settling the question, not only for the present but for a long period.

CANADIAN SCOTTISH, THEIR GREAT ADVENTURE ABROAD AND SERVICE TO THE EMPIRE

"There's surveyors, miners, lumberjacks and drummers, There are men who've peddled real estate in lots, There's oldtimers and the greenest of newcomers; Mix 'em up and there you have "Canadian Scots".

The 16th Battalion was formed at Valcartier soon after the outbreak of war. It was originally composed of one company and a half of the Seaforth Highlanders of Vancouver, one company of the 50th Gordon Highlanders of Victoria, one company of the Cameron Highlanders of Winnipeg and half a company of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders of Hamilton. From this it may be seen that as originally formed it was a composite Canadian battalion and was given the name of the Canadian Scottish.

First Real Fighting.

With the remainder of the First Canadian Division the Canadian Scottish crossed to France in February, 1915, landing at La-Zaire. The unit was broken out into trench warfare at Fleurbaix by a brigade of the Imperial army. The first real fighting was at the second battle of Ypres, where in those critical days from the 22nd to 26th of April, 1915, the Canadian Division put up such a fight as has never been excelled, and where for the first time in history clouds of asphyxiating gas were used as an adjunct to an attack.

Pell Mell From Wood.

Before this gas attack the French colonial troops (colored) gave ground. The Tenth Battalion (white Gurkhas) were ordered to drive the Germans from a wood which had been taken from the Turks with the Canadian Scottish to support.

Before the Tenth could reach the wood, however, the 16th had caught up with the 10th and both battalions entering the wood with great dash and élan, cheering, cursing, making catcalls and altogether making a perfect pandemonium of noise, drove the Germans pell mell from the wood.

Decorations.

For the good work done on this occasion Lieut.-Col. J. Edwards Leckie, now Major General Leckie received the C. M. G. and Serjts. McDougall and Lunn the D. C. M. Probably the first Rupert men to be killed were at this action. Gamble of this city and Jessop of Masset, both of whom enlisted under Colonel Peck, were killed during the charge on the wood at Ypres.

It is well to mention here that decorations were very scarce during the first year and a half of the war and neither the military cross nor military medal were instituted.

Festubert was the next action of importance that the 16th were in. It was less than a month after the second battle of Ypres, where the 16th had sustained close on 500 casualties. The notable exploit during this action was the capturing of the orchard at Festubert.

The Brigade of Guards had lost 2,000 men in the effort to capture this place and the 16th were so much below strength that numbers one and three companies were placed under one command.

Drove Germans Out.

Despite a perfect hail of M. G. and artillery fire the 16th drove the Germans out of the orchard. Captain Don Moore was killed in

this engagement. He was last seen sitting with his back to a tree, wounded in the head and on being offered help said: "You go on, boys, I'm a goner." Several Rupert boys were killed or wounded in this engagement, Metcalf, Blake Allan and Lionel Crippen were among the killed, though Crippen was with the 7th Battalion. Lieut.-Col. (then major) Peck was wounded in the leg in this engagement but stayed on the field for some hours after being hit.

Brilliant Counter.

The 16th were next in at Giv-enchy and then went to Ploeg-steel for some months where the Second Division was broken in to the mysteries of warfare. After several months there the 16th went into new trenches at Hill 60. It was here that the Germans broke through on the (Continued on Page Three).

Welcome to Returning Heroes.

A few days ago we were able to publish a summary of the peace treaty which is being imposed upon Germany. This was made possible through the sacrifices of men some of whom are returning here tomorrow. Through their splendid work we are in the position of victors instead of feeling the heel of the Hun on our necks.

Prince Rupert people fully realize the obligation they owe to the gallant men who fought for them overseas. They also recognize that every private who went did just as much as the officers. In giving special recognition to Colonel Peck tomorrow it is not because he is an officer, but because he has won the greatest of honors, the Victoria Cross. Equally with him will the people recognize the services of Captain John McGregor who also won the same recognition, with the added distinction of having risen from the ranks.

What makes the recognition of Colonel Peck perhaps more distinctive is the fact that he is well known, that a large number of Prince Rupert men served under him, and that in doing so they found that the Colonel was a democrat in office just as he was in private life. He treated his men well and they respect and revere him for it. He is their hero.

If it should happen that the Colonel gets a little more recognition than others it is partly because of the facts already mentioned and partly because he is personally so well known and so popular, and because he is the member for the constituency in the Dominion Parliament.

All Will Join In the Greeting.

The News is glad to join with the rest in honoring the brave men who are returning. Had it been we who were forced to sign a dictated treaty, there would have been a sad tale to tell. The burden which the Huns are being forced to bear would be as nothing to the burdens which would have been forced on us. Sad to say many have had to sacrifice their lives for the cause of freedom. Others have lost limbs or have been otherwise incapacitated. We cannot escape from the debt we owe them. None recognize it more than we do.

Tomorrow there will be no holding back on the part of anyone. All will welcome the heroes. All will greet the men who are going south but who come this way with the Colonel.

Aeroplanes for Saving Life at Sea.

Dr. S. F. Tolmie, the member for Victoria, B. C., in the House of Commons during a recent discussion on aeronautics drew attention to the possibilities of the use of planes in saving life at sea.

The News suggests that the Dominion Department of Marine might work in conjunction with the Provincial forest patrol service. One or two water planes might be kept ready for use in connection with the prevention of forest fires and also be used to save life at sea.

It is just possible that until such time as passengers are carried in the air instead of on the water, Hydroplanes may be of great use in rescuing people from wrecks such as that of the Princess Sophia. Just how it is to be done is for the air men and engineers to work out, but there seems to be a possibility in that direction. The air plane must become more than a toy. It is bound to enter into the daily life of the people in the future, to an extent not yet dreamed of.

CANADIAN SCOTTISH, THEIR GREAT ADVENTURE ABROAD AND SERVICE TO EMPIRE

(Continued From Page One.)

left of the 16th and Generals Mercer and Williams were killed. The enemy advanced as much as three miles in some places, until stopped by the 7th, 10th, 14th and 15th Battalions. The 16th counter attacked on June 13 and recaptured all the territory which had previously been captured by the Germans.

The battalion proceeded to the Somme in September, 1916, and went over the top three times and suffered 1,260 casualties in three trips, being reinforced three times. For work on the Somme where he was killed Piper Richardson was posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross.

Helped at Vimy.

From the Somme the battalion was ordered to the vicinity of Vimy Ridge and spent the winter in the trenches in that district. The capture of the ridge on April 9, 1917, is still fresh in the memory of all, where Cy Peck led the battalion with Piper Jimmy Groat who received the military medal for this exploit.

After a spell "in" at Hill 70 during the summer, the 16th went with the rest of the First Division to Passchendaele, which was probably the bloodiest battle of any in which the Canadian Corps took part. Heavy casualties were the rule in every battalion there.

From Passchendaele the Canadian Scottish were allotted to a sector of trenches in the Lens district. It was there that Lieut. Wilfrid Reddihough was killed, while bandaging a wounded comrade.

In the spring and early summer of 1918, during the German drive the 16th having been sent to stay the fresh attack, were in the trenches at Lens and Arras. They took their part in the British offensive at Amiens, which was the start of what is known as the Cambrai scrap.

Hike to Germany.

When Fritz was fairly on the run the battalion started on the long hike to Germany. About a month before the armistice was signed Rupert lost two more of her originals in Capt. E. O. Reitchel and Corporal Algy Hastings, so probably the first and last Rupert boys who made the supreme sacrifice were with the Canadian Scottish.

On arrival at Cologne the men just grabbed "Old Cy Peck" and packed him on their shoulders into the city.

The Officers.

The Sixteenth had three colonels, but Peck held the job down the longest, both his predecessors being made major generals. The Battalion has the unique record of having six V.C.'s on its roll, four of whom are alive. Among the notable officers who served in the 16th are Major General R. G. Edwards Leckie, C. M. G., Major General Jack Edwards Leckie, D. S. O., Major R. O. Bell-Irving, D. S. O., killed in action, Major Godson Godson, D. S. O., Major J. A. Scroggie, Russian order of St. Michael and French Médaille Militaire, who went over as a private and who is now second in command, Capt. Tommy Brewer, M. M., who held every rank up to a captain, Captain E. O. Reitchel, "a brave and gallant gentleman," Lieut.-Col. Walter Flewin (48th Batt.) of Port Simpson, who was a private with Rupert's originals in the 16th, Lieut.-Col. William Rae, D. S. O., Lieut. Wilfrid MacDonald, who is now minus a leg, but with as big a heart as ever.

The last of the "originals" from Rupert of the rank and file has recently returned in the person of Malcolm Lamb.

Sports.

In sports the battalion has always held up its end, winning the brigade football championship in 1917 and in 1918 No. 3 platoon won the Canadian Corps championship as the smartest platoon in the corps, every battalion competing for this coveted honor.

The regimental motto is "Deas Gu Cath," which means "Ready for Battle," a most fitting motto for a regiment with such a distinguished record as the 16th Canadian Scottish.

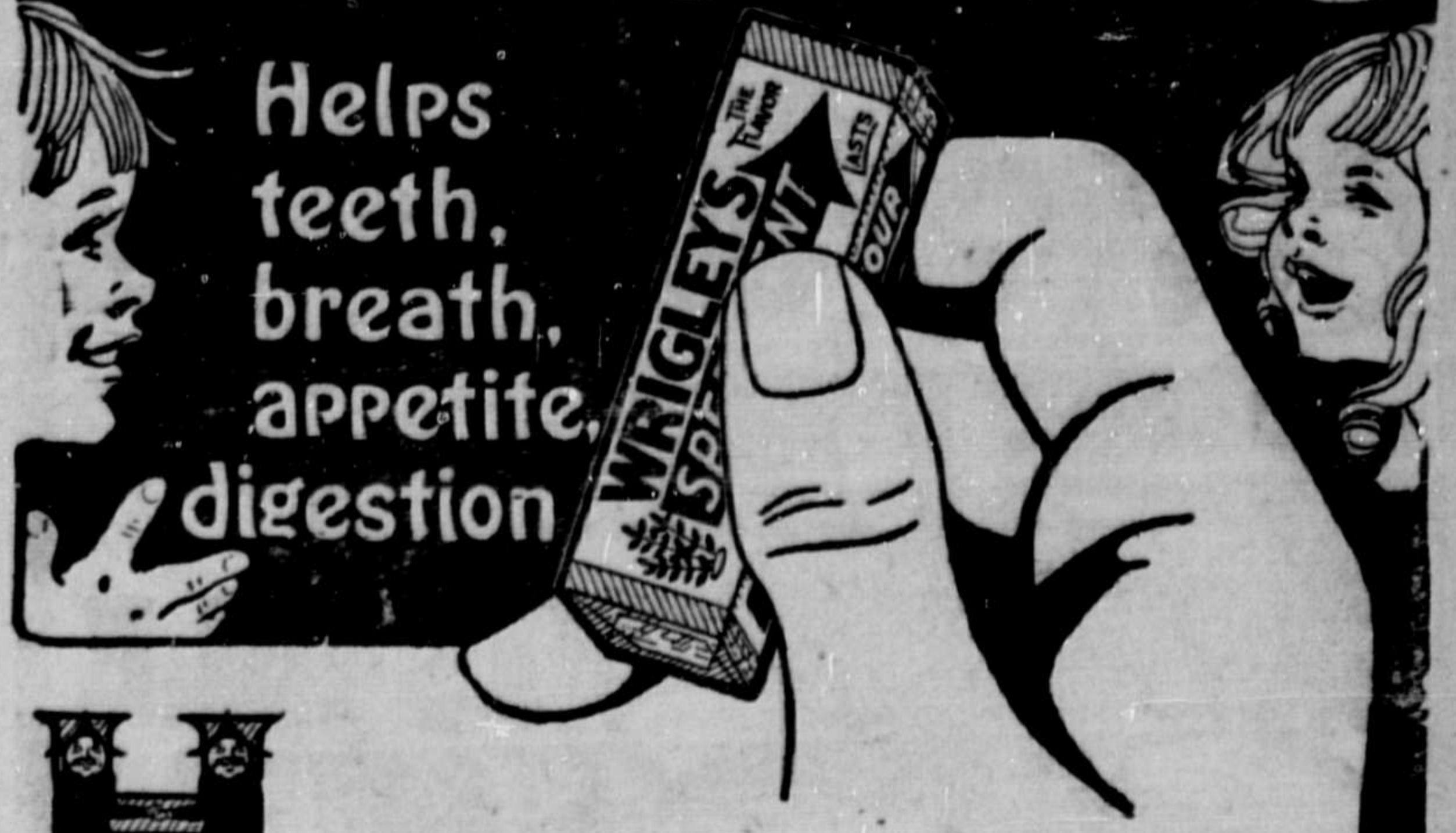

WELCOME TO RETURNED MEN BY ST. ANDREWS

Enjoyable Time Spent Last Night
By Sons of Scotland in Their
Club Rooms.

The St. Andrew's Society last night extended an official welcome to those members who have returned from overseas, and following out the custom, made a presentation to one who had returned with a Scotch lassie for a wife. There was a large attendance, so large that the gathering was held in the big hall. After a somewhat lengthy program of music and speeches, supper was served by the ladies in the rooms upstairs and following it was a dance which was kept up until Scotsmen's festive hours.

President Macdonald welcomed the men back on behalf of the society and mentioned that no less than 57 of their members out of 100 had gone overseas, and some would never return. He paid a tribute to the Scotchmen who, while not members, had made it possible for them to secure comfortable quarters, the best of their kind in B. C. Those who could not go overseas had felt it incumbent upon them to keep up the quarters in order to be in a position to welcome the members back. On behalf of the society he thanked those who had fought for them and for their families.

Sergt. Kelly.
Q. M. Sergt. Jack Kelly expressed his pleasure at being once more at home among friends and at finding the society more prosperous than ever. The news of how they were getting on at home encouraged them when at the front. They often met in groups over there and talked of the St. Andrew's Society. While Scotsmen were probably clannish, if everyone helped each other as they did it would be better for the world. Scotsmen had rallied to the flag, some of whom perhaps should have stayed at home. He had not thought he had so many friends in the world. The men at home had made it possible for him to go. The greatest worry had always been the possible answer to the question, "How are the folks at home?" He thanked the members for the way in which they had helped his family during his absence.

Dr. Grant.
Dr. Grant spoke of some of the problems of the present. There was the duty to the soldier who had gone and returned incapacitated, the duty to the widows and orphans, the re-establishment of the men in civil life. There was also the settling of the disturbance of civil society caused by the war. There was nothing to be gained by class division. The spirit of brotherhood must be shown in every walk of life so that every man might get his just due. He did not, however, believe in revolution but in evolution. At present all wage earners, and he was one, felt the pinch of the high cost of living. He spoke of the large number of millionaires in the United States and of the extremes of wealth and poverty, giving a number of figures to illustrate the point. This made for discontent. The men had fought autocracy and he hoped they were come back to fight plutocracy. They should stand shoulder to shoulder to see that everyone got his just due. This could be done, not by dividing society but by the spirit of brotherhood on a religious basis.

Home Problems.
J. C. Brady gave a short humorous address. He said that the world had changed when the men went away. The returned soldier philosophy he prophesied would permeate at home. He thanked the returned men for having fought on his behalf and on behalf of his household. The presentation of an art reading lamp to Mr. and Mrs. Massie took place at the close of the supper.

In the Letter Box

SHAWATLANS PIPE LINE

Editor Daily News,
The item on the Shawatlans Passage submerged main, published in your issue of Tuesday is hardly correct.

I laid this main by contract and I believe my price was less than one-third of the cost of laying the first one and was perfectly satisfactory to the Board of Works.

This main was tested for leakage by Mr. Mason, the city engineer, and Mr. Walker, the backwoods foreman, the leakage was found considerably less than the amount allowed in my contract.

The joints were made by the regular city gang whose wages were paid by me. The lead was furnished by the city. It was then examined from end to end by a competent diver whose report is on file at the city hall.

The main was placed in service as soon as it was completed and I believe was in constant use from June, 1915, to the winter of 1917, when the first break occurred.

I think this break and the bad condition of the main was caused by the severe shock it received at the time the large gate valve at the powerhouse was broken. Pipes were broken at the same time at McBride St., and also at Frederick St. The submerged main must have received a very severe shock at this time as it is the lowest point in the system.

There is another point that should receive consideration. The first main was laid with pipe made by Messrs. Howells, an English firm. This pipe is used for the mains under the Narrows at Vancouver, and has been in service for over twenty years and has given perfect satisfaction.

At the time it was decided to lay the second main, it was impossible to get the English pipe, so pipe of American manufacture was used. This pipe is twenty-five per cent lighter and has a different joint.

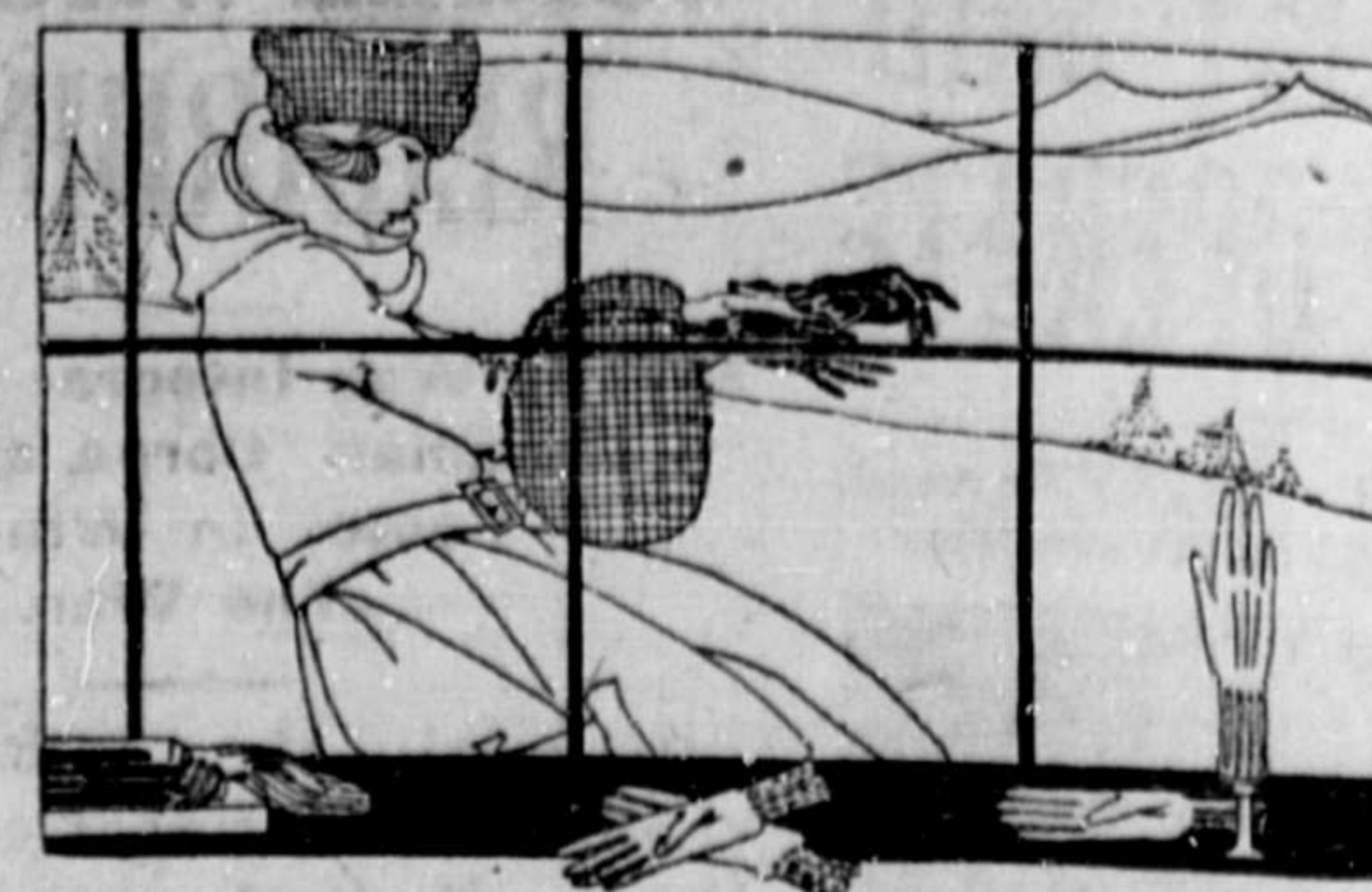
