GENERAL STRIKE AT WINNIPEG WHERE 25,000 MEN TAKE PART; WAR VETERANS REMAIN NEUTRAL

Walk out took place Yesterday Morning but Police Remain on Duty to keep Order; Telephone Operators to Follow on Friday; Veterans say will Suppress Lawlessness or Bolshevik Tendencies.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Winnipeg, May 15.—A general walk out of workers occurred at eleven o'clock yesterday embracing 25,000 employees, including retail clerks, firemen, practically every branch of organized labor except the railway operating men, telegraphers and members of the Typographical Union. The telephone operators go out Friday morning.

The police union voted for the strike but were ordered by the Trades and Labor Council to remain on duty to preserve order. The Great War Veterans announce themselves neutral on the labor question, but will take any action necessary to subdue violence or Bolshevik tendencies. The strike was precipitated over the question of wages, but the main issue now is the refusal of the metal trades to recognize the unions involved in their business.

C.G.S. LILLOOET IS TO CONTINUE SURVEY

Lieut.-Commander P. C. Musgrave, R.N., She Will Take up Work in the Hecate Straits.

The C. G. S. Lillooet of the Hydrographic Survey, under Lieut.-Commander P. C. Musgrave, R.N., called in here yesterday afternoon after spending the winter at the naval dockyards at Esquimalt. She was commissioned on April 22, and after leaving Esquimalt visited Chatham Channel, Namu Harbor, Ocean Falls and Swanson Bay. The general work of the coming season will be to continue the survey of Hecate Straits. This will be the most important part of the duties this summer. The work was commenced in 1907 and has not yet been finished. Another part of the year's program will be the continuation of the survey of Esquimalt harbor.

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ILLICIT STILL CASE REMANDED

J. E. Gibault Charged Under the Inland Revenue Act Will Come Up Again on Saturday.

J. E. Gibault, charged under the Inland Revenue Act with conducting a still, was brought up in the police court this morning before Magistrate McMullin and the case was adjourned until Saturday. W. E. Fisher was the prosecuting attorney and Patmore & Fulton for the defence.

The capture of the man seems to have been cleverly arranged. On the evening of May 11 Constable Bailey, who had suspicions of the house on 6th Ave., having seen at various times suspicious persons wending their way up there investigated and by getting through a hole in the woodshed secured access to the interior of the house. Here he found a complete whisky still, which had only just stopped working.

Up-to-Date Plant.
The plant was an up-to-date affair, consisting of a 20-gallon retort to hold the mash, a gonne-neck connected to the worm which condensed the liquor from the retort. The retort was heated by three gasoline dome burners, connected with a Moore tank in the next room, which was a pressure tank to feed the gasoline. There was about 200 gallons of mash ready to distil in 5 large barrels, also wheat, potatoes, yeast, hops, and a very large quantity of molasses, about 200 lbs., to say nothing of twelve empty molasses cans which had held 56 lbs. each. There was also some of the real moonshine whisky.

PROHIBITION BILL PASSES FIRST READING

Introduced Into Commons by Sir Thomas White Yesterday To Give Effect to the Resolution.

COST OF OPERATING THE PENSIONS BOARD

Hon. N. W. Rowell Says Administration and Salaries Amount In All to \$1,250,000.

Ottawa, May 15.—During a debate on the question of national schools which was discussed in the Commons, Dr. Edwards, the member for Frontenac, started a discussion on a motion to go into supply. The debate was inclined to be heated and R. H. Butts as a mark of disapproval walked out of the House during the course of Edwards' speech.

The administration costs and salaries for the Pension Board last year amounted to \$1,250,000 according to a statement by Hon. N. W. Rowell while the House was in supply.

Sir Thomas White introduced a bill to confirm the prohibition order in council regarding the importation, manufacture and transportation of intoxicating liquor, a resolution regarding which passed the House yesterday. The bill was given its first reading.

ITALIAN QUESTION BEING DISCUSSED BY CONFERENCE; FORCES LAND IN DALMATIA

SEVENTY AUSTRIAN PEACE DELEGATES ARRIVE IN PARIS YESTERDAY—TREATY OF LONDON BEING WAIVED BY ITALIAN DELEGATES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, May 15.—Italian delegates to the peace conference are no longer insisting upon the fulfilment of the secret treaty of London and this part of the matter relative to territory on the eastern shore of the Adriatic is tending toward adjustment. The status of Fiume is still being discussed as the plan to make it a free city similar to Danzig has been everywhere just now.

St. Germain, May 15.—The Austrian peace delegates arrived before six o'clock yesterday evening, numbering 70 persons.

London, May 15.—The Italians are landing a large military force at Zara and Zenebo on the coast of Dalmatia, according to a Reuter despatch from Belgrade, the Serbian capital. Troops are being moved eastward and are fortifying the ridges and passes.

SWIMMING CLUB TAG DAY TO BE ON SATURDAY

Effort to Raise Funds Locally and Lettergram Sent to Pattullo Asking for Government Help.

At a meeting of the Swimming Club executive held yesterday afternoon in the Wanderers Club it was decided to send a night lettergram to Hon. T. D. Pattullo asking for an assurance that they would get a grant for the improvements at the Salt Lakes and suggesting that as the city had granted \$500 the Government should do the same. The wire was sent by President T. C. Duncan later in the evening.

It was reported at the meeting that work was to commence on the improvements tomorrow, Captain E. Brennen being in charge of operations. The lake will be lowered, the bottom cleaned, a dam and flood gate put in and a sandy beach made in the shallow part so that children may use it without danger and may have an opportunity to learn to swim. There also should be a dressing-room for the men and this will be constructed if there is money enough.

In order that everyone may have an opportunity to share in the expense of the improvement to the lake, a tag day will be held on Saturday and it is expected that no one will escape on that occasion. The young people who are chiefly interested in the improvements will have the tag in hand and a large sum should be raised.

It was reported that the polo balls and outfit had arrived and that a course would be laid out at once at the lake so that just as soon as the weather is warm enough the games may commence. A benefit football game for raising money for the club was proposed, to take place May 24 and a committee was appointed to make arrangements.

ASK THE KING NOT TO GRANT MORE TITLES

No Objection to Right Honorable Nor to Medals for Military Service.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, May 15.—The committee of the House of Commons which has been considering the question of titles, at their final meeting yesterday adopted the sub-committee's finding in regard to titular distinctions.

The committee recommends that an address be presented to the King asking him to refrain from conferring titular distinctions upon British subjects resident in Canada, save such appellations as are of a professional or educational character.

The committee said that no objection was taken to the use of the prefix Right Honorable and it recommended the awarding of medals for military service.

BLOCKADE OF GERMANY IS DISCUSSED BY BIG FOUR; GERMAN NOTES ON TREATY

WILLINGNESS TO PAY FOR DEVASTATION OF BELGIUM AND NORTHERN FRANCE IS EXPRESSED, BUT NO ADMISSION OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR WAR IS ADMITTED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, May 15.—The Council of Four yesterday considered the question of imposing a blockade on Germany in case she should decline to sign the peace treaty. On the other hand the blockade will be entirely lifted immediately if the German delegates affix their signatures to the treaty.

The German note, dealing with the economic clauses of the treaty is declared to mean the ruin of Germany if enforced.

A note has been received on the territorial questions, particularly against the Saar Valley arrangements and the transfer of the Malmédy, Moreset and Eupn District to Belgium as well as the evacuation of a part of Schleswig.

The note on reparations does not protest against payment by Germany for the devastation in Belgium and northern France, which it says Germany is ready to do willingly. It is added, however that Germany will not pay for reparation on the principle that she was responsible for the war.

**Pensions to Be Increased,
 But Not Equalized.**

The Pensions Commission are talking of increasing all pensions twenty per cent. There is no proposal before them, so far as the report goes, to have the pensions equalized. It is pleasant for a man who was an officer to get a large pension, we are not objecting to that, but what we do object to is to his getting more than the private.

When the men enlisted they did it from patriotic motives. The private served his country just as well as the officer. There was no particular objection to the officer getting more than the private because in the old country where he went an officer was obliged to spend more than those of lower rank. Now that the war is over, however, it should be recognized that one man is just as good as another; that the private served just as well as the officer, and that he is deserving of just as much recognition. In this country there is no social distinction between the officer and the private, for the privates in very many cases became officers before the war was over. Why then the distinction in the matter of pensions?

**Mexico
 Under Carranza.**

A book issued by Doubleday Page & Co., "Mexico Under Carranza," is rather an indictment of the American policy and of the Government of Carranza than a sincere attempt to depict the condition of the country. It is very interesting and may be read with profit by students of Mexican affairs, but all the way through the writer leaves the impression that he is a lawyer proving a case. He certainly proves it, but that does not seem to get the reader anywhere.

The main indictments against Carranza and his followers is that they have treated the peons so badly that many of them have died of starvation and those who are left are almost without hope; that industry has been destroyed and the investment of capital made impossible, and that the Catholic Church and its influence has been largely destroyed or nullified.

The writer describes the awful condition of the country in some detail and quotes very largely from newspapers. The conclusion which he reaches at the close of his argument is that the American people should let the Mexicans alone except where American interests are involved and that those interests should be protected. One interesting paragraph gives an insight into the general purpose of the book:

"The experience of the masses of the people under the Carranza party furnishes a striking parallel to that of the Russians at the hands of the Bolsheviks. In every country there exists a predatory element whose chief ambition is to secure control of the machinery of government by violence and then to use it in depriving industrious, frugal people of the property they have accumulated and dividing it among themselves. This element is represented in Mexico by the Carranza party, in Russia by the Bolsheviks, and in the United States by the I. W. W."

**Many Birds
 Frequent New Park.**

One of the enjoyable features of the new park is the number of birds which frequent the place. On account of the little stream that flows through it and which is its chief charm, the birds come there a great deal. Probably the thrushes are the most numerous. They are small russet-backed thrushes of the west that are not much larger than a fox sparrow. Usually these birds are very secretive and keep well to the bush, but here they show themselves and seem to be everywhere just now.

Besides the thrushes there are juncos with their nobby black heads, western winter wrens that sing almost continuously at this time of year, and an occasional song sparrow. Other sparrows visit the place occasionally and robins are sometimes found there. Chickadees are seen in the hemlocks and passing finches and fox sparrows.

Now that the paths have been built those who like to see the birds will have a better opportunity to sit on the comfortable seats which are provided and get in touch with the inhabitants.

LARGE PROFIT ON GOLD MINE AT SURF INLET

Investment in Property \$1,295,-
726.36 and Net Earnings
\$323,242.06.

The annual report of the Tonopah Belmont Development Company, controlling the Surf Inlet Mine, shows that company's investment in the property to be \$1,295,726.36, says the Vancouver Province. From the year's operation the Surf Inlet Mine repaid all loans to the parent company. The report states the property was operated during the year under particularly arduous conditions, due to scarcity of skilled mine labor, higher wages, decreased labor efficiency, increasing cost of supplies, and in some cases the impossibility of securing them, adding:

"Notwithstanding these conditions, the Surf Inlet property became the leading producer of gold in British Columbia, and the operations for the ten months period, from the treatment of 83,142 tons of ore, resulted in net earnings of \$323,242.06, reduced, by general and legal expense, loss on mess house and hospital, and depreciation to \$274,169.17. \$45,569.77 was expended on houses for employees, school and store buildings.

The Pugsley Mine was under development, but on account of scarcity of labor, only 298 feet of work was done. Another 250 feet will be required to reach the downward extension of the ore shoots in the upper workings. \$21,502.69 has been expended on the development of this property under the option."

Returns.

The returns for concentrates shipped to the Tacoma smelter amounted to \$744,432.08. Costs of operation were: Mining, \$247,-854.33; milling, \$133,823.11; loading, \$19,818.45. The following was the metal production: Gold, 36,606 oz.; silver, 23,364 oz.; copper, 433,399 lbs. of a gross value of \$854,537.20. The average extraction was 92.13 per cent. Operating costs and losses were \$7,185 per ton, and profit was \$3,888 per ton. Losses in mill tailings were \$0,846 per ton. Costs were \$2.22 per ton for stoping; \$0,361 for development; milling, \$1,278 per ton, and royalties on flotation, \$0,116 per ton.

Development Work.

Development aggregated 893 feet of drifting; 241 feet of cross-cuts, and 753 feet of raises. The winze was converted to a three-compartment shaft, with ore pockets, and equipped with electric hoist and skips.

Mine development during the year exposed ore bodies of large size, particularly on the west vein on the 320 and 430 levels, and to the north of the ore reserves previously estimated. Development had increased the ore reserves by 153,790 tons. The average amount of ore treated at the mill was 272.6 tons a day, but the mill has shown a capacity considerably over its rated capacity of 300 tons a day.

The hydro-electric power plant has proved a great success, its operating cost being \$1.23 per h. p. month, or 25 per cent. of the cheapest power sold to mines by power companies.

Since this report was compiled the dividends referred to in last article have been declared.

IMBRECARIA FITTED AS OTTER TRAWLER

With the completion of preparations to send the fishing trawler Imbricaria to sea, the flat fishing season will be inaugurated as far as Vancouver is concerned by the New England Fish Company this week, says the Vancouver World of recent date. The Imbricaria will be in charge of Capt. Hanson, one of the best-known fishermen on the coast, and will have a crew of eight fishermen in addition to the regular crew.

The Imbricaria is an otter trawler and made several fine catches last year, her first in the trawling game. She will be used as an otter trawler during the whole season if her first trip or two proves successful.

Meyer, the British timber purchaser, in their suite at the Hotel Vancouver, says the Vancouver World.

The matters under discussion were principally the financing of these orders and the arrangements for securing shipping facilities for conveying the manufactured lumber from British Columbia ports to England.

Sir James Ball and Mr. Meyer on the conclusion of their conferences with the lumbermen here will fall in with the plans of the British Columbia Lumbermen's Association as far as possible and will visit whatever camps can be reached during the limit of their stay on the coast.

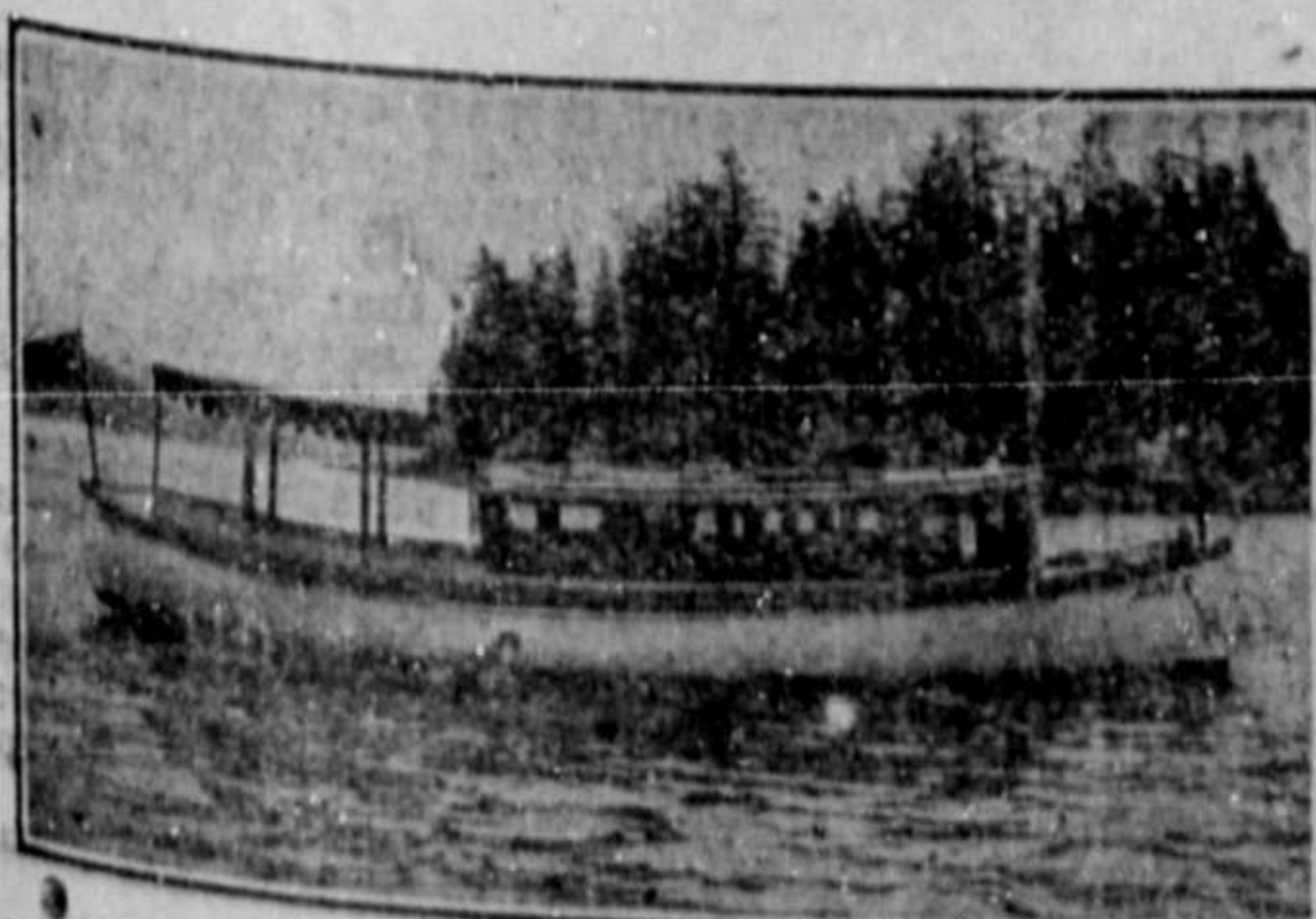

GOOD MANY HOUSES TO BE BUILT SOON

Unaccountable Delays are Criticized by Man on Street Who Cannot Understand Inactivity.

D. Zarelli is making arrangements for the erection of three houses, one near the Windsor Hotel on First Ave., the work on which has already commenced. There are also a number of other houses going up in addition to those already mentioned. Capt. Groves is excavating on a lot on Fourth Ave. near the top of the steps next to Mr. Pillsbury's residence.

In all it is estimated that at least twenty houses will be under construction within a week or two and only four of these are to be financed under the fund raised by the recent campaign.

There is a good deal of criticism of the present directors of the Prince Rupert Housing Ltd., for their apparent inactivity in regard to the building campaign. It is stated on the street that men worked hard to secure the money and that when the money was obtained no effort was made to use it, and the scheme has been held up.

Whether or not anyone is at fault, it is clear that the building has not been going ahead as expected.

It is thought that something will be done very soon in regard to the Government housing scheme. South Vancouver is advertising for tenders for the erection of houses under the scheme but the Prince Rupert City Council does not seem to be as active in this regard as is the Commissioner for South Vancouver.

BIG MOVEMENT TO PEACE RIVER COUNTRY

Edmonton, May 15.—A total movement of no less than 102 cars of freight was made to the north country by the E. D. and B. C. Railway during last week. Four hundred and twenty-two persons also travelled towards the Peace over the same line and how very firm is the intention of many of them to make their homes north is evident in the fact that with them went eight cars of live stock, 22 cars of settlers' effects and 72 cars of merchandise.

The past week's business reveals a big increase over that of the previous week. The number of cattle shipped into the country was considerably larger and the same can be said of the effects. Good farm machinery is also being carried north in big quantities and contrary to the expectations of many, new settlers are taking with them the best modern farming appliances that money can buy.

Tractors are being used on many locations and with the appliances of modern methods, increased acreages are being sown with the result that this year will see the Peace and Grand Prairie countries reap a harvest from the biggest area yet cultivated north of Edmonton.

How Returned Men Can Become Farmers

EVERY returned man who wants to become a farmer and is qualified for that vocation can get real, practical help through the Soldier Settlement Board.

The Government's programme includes:—

- (1) The securing of land.
- (2) The loaning of capital needed to purchase equipment and live stock, and erect buildings.
- (3) Agricultural training and farm supervision.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

A Broad Policy

All soldiers whose best interests will be served by taking up farms will be assisted. Only suitable land will be approved. That is (a) land that is near to existing railways or organized communities; (b) land that will make money for the soldier; (c) land that will provide a first-class home.

In addition to these advantages the Board has planned a system of collective purchase, so that it can guarantee settlers the best value obtainable anywhere in live stock, implements, lumber, and other needs. It will also assist soldier settlers with advice and supervision, if necessary, in the management of their activities, so that the best results will be obtained.

ing for the fish trade of Lesser
Slave Lake: Alberta Fish Co.,
Arctic Fish Co., Strand-Stevenson

Minzie Fish Co., R. W. Jones Fish
Co., J. H. Lyons Fish Co., and the
Northern Fisheries.

These companies have a total
of about fifty motor boats, one
steamer and a large fleet of dories
at their service.

times catch an odd lake trout
weighing up to forty pounds, these
are also of excellent flavor."
