## SOLDIERS EXPRESS SYMPATHY WITH WINNIPEG STRIKERS AND WISH TO DISCUSS ENEMY ALIEN

### Newspapers Tied up through Pressmen and Stereotypers Walking Out; Shops and Restaurants are Closing; Telephone Operators Latest to Join the Strike Movement.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Winnipeg, May 16.—The pressmen and stereotypers have joined the general strike, thus preventing the issue of newspapers. The Typographical Union members remained on the job but without the other trades the issue of papers is impossible. The strike committee announced it might authorize the issuing of a paper under the auspices of the strike committee.  
Supplies for retail stores were depleted by the rush yesterday afternoon and this morning several butchers and grocers report that they were notified by individual strikers that if they did not close they would be made to. Nearly all restaurants are closed.  
The first day of the general strike in sympathy with the building trades and metal workers passed without disorder. The last employees to declare in favor of a walkout were the telephone operators.  
Full sympathy with the purpose of the present strike and pledges to use every legitimate means to preserve law and order and that after the strike is settled labor and the returned soldier will get together and discuss the deportation of the enemy alien, was included in a resolution unanimously passed at a mass meeting of veterans.

Vancouver, May 16.—Subject to the approval of Mr. Justice Murphy the winding up judge in the Dominion Trust liquidation, depositors will participate in any dividends on liquidation with preferred creditors in the ratio of one to two. That is, for every dollar paid preferred creditors, depositors will have fifty cents available to them.

### U. S. DIRIGIBLE SWEEP FROM MOORINGS AND CARRIED OUT TO SEA

St. Johns, May 16.—The United States navy dirigible C-5, which escaped from its moorings dropped into the sea 85 miles off shore according to a radio message received by the cruiser Chicago from an unidentified British steamer. The steamer, it was said, was standing by the dirigible. The destroyer Edwards started at once to salvage the airship. The giant balloon burst from its moorings in a gale and swept out to sea soon after it arrived from Montauk Point, after being in the air continuously 25 hours and 45 minutes.

### KETCHIKAN MAKES EYES AT STEWART

At the head of the Portland Canal lies a rich mining district, both on the American and Canadian sides, says the Ketchikan Times. On the American side is the thriving little town of Hyder, and back of it are a number of prospectors, miners operating on a small scale, and properties which give evidence that they will develop into big producers.  
Although but a comparatively short distance from Ketchikan, little or no business from that district is coming to town. Prospectors from that country, as well as men in other lines of industry, have indicated time and time again that they would like to trade with Ketchikan, if they could get the facilities.  
At the present time passengers and freight go by Canadian vessels and are transhipped at Prince Rupert and then shipped to Hyder.  
Through an unwarranted spirit of magnanimity, Uncle Sam, when the boundary lines were to be located, did not follow the natural dividing line north from the head of Portland Canal, and now it develops that a rich mining property was presented our neighbors across the line. But even a part of the trade of that mine may be secured if a boat service is established between Ketchikan and Hyder, with stops at camps along the canal.

### HON. E. D. BARROW IS TO VISIT RUPERT

"We expect to settle communities of returned soldiers on the splendid agricultural lands along the Grand Trunk Pacific this summer," said Hon. E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture to the Vancouver Sun. Hon. Mr. Barrow is preparing to leave on an extended tour of the northern lands, accompanied by Dominion government representatives and will go out over the Canadian Northern railway and back to Prince Rupert over the G. T. P.  
"There is one particular area up there, about 115 miles by 200 miles," said Hon. Mr. Barrow, "and this place is about the finest farming proposition in the whole province today. We are going to look it over and decide just where the soldier settlers will be sent. They will get the best available land, and it may be understood that if owners hold out for highly inflated prices they may look forward to expropriation proceedings. We intend to see that the veterans get a square deal in this settlement matter, and the object of this trip is to make certain that the boys will be given the best land in the country. On the lands which we now have in view the clearing is very light, being mostly brushwood and alder, and the tracts are every way highly suitable for immediate colonization."

### DEATH RESULTS FROM BURNS

Mrs. Hutchinson, Wife of G. T. P. Agent at Pacific, Victim of Accident.

A most distressful accident, which has had fatal results, happened yesterday morning at Pacific when Mrs. Hutchinson, wife of the G. T. P. agent there, was horribly burnt through her clothing catching fire. The injured lady was brought to town on last night's train and taken at once to the General Hospital, where she succumbed to her injuries early this morning.  
Mrs. Hutchinson was going about her usual household duties in the forenoon yesterday in her home, in which was an oil heater. It is assumed that the heater exploded, as the unfortunate woman had carried it outside the house with her clothing alight, and ran some distance before she rolled on the ground to put out the blaze. Assistance was given her at once, and the blaze extinguished, but Mrs. Hutchinson was burned so badly by this time that she became unconscious.  
**First Aid.**  
First aid was at once given and there being no doctor in the district the patient was placed on the train, which came along shortly afterwards.  
At Terrace Mr. Campbell, the druggist who rendered such valuable aid there during the influenza epidemic, was picked up later, and along with Rev. T. H. Marsh, accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Hutchinson to Prince Rupert and on the way down did much to alleviate the pain which the patient suffered.  
**Everything Possible Done.**  
The burning was so severe that there was hardly a square inch on Mrs. Hutchinson's body from her neck down which escaped. On being taken to the hospital here, everything possible was done last evening, but the injuries were so severe that Mrs. Hutchinson died about 3 o'clock this morning. She was a young woman of twenty-two years of age and comparatively recently married. Her home was in Winnipeg whither the remains will be sent for burial by the B. C. Undertakers on tomorrow's train.

Flower Gardens and Cultivation of Art.

There are some beds of bulbs in bloom here just now that are just as fine in every respect as any grown in other parts of the world. They are a trifle later than those at Vancouver or Victoria, but otherwise there is little difference.

Anyone wishing to plant a flower garden will find it is not yet too late. Most of the plants should be set out about June 1 in order to get the best results. All the ordinary flowers that are found in the gardens to the south bloom equally well here, with the exception of those which require a very dry climate.

The mossy soil that is found in the gardens here is suitable for flowers if it is well cultivated and manured.

The man or woman who plants a garden and cultivates it is not only getting much enjoyment, but is engaged in public spirited work that is of great value to the community. It develops the artistic taste and cultivates a love for the beautiful and is one of the best methods of preventing slums.

Shipbuilding Already Creates Payroll.

Already the preparations for the shipbuilding has created a payroll in this city of 250 in addition to those engaged in erecting houses and stores. This is giving a healthy impetus to business and as the work progresses the number employed will increase.

This increase in the number of employees at the yards, the employment of a large number of men at the sawmill, and the increase in the halibut fishing all spells better business for the city. It means progress.

Rule of Road to Be Changed Next Year.

A year from now it is proposed to change the rule of the road to make it conform to the states to the south. For many years this has been talked of but it was not until the last session of the Legislature that it was decided to make the change next year. The chief difficulty in the way has been the B. C. Electric Railway.

The officials of the road recently waited on the Provincial Government and suggested that even yet the time was short for them to make the necessary change to their plan to conform with the requirements of the law. This would cost them a large sum, variously estimated from half a million dollars upwards. While the suggestion does not seem to have been made directly the idea seems to have been conveyed that the Government should pay at least part of this amount.

We do not propose to discuss who shall pay for the alterations, but we do think that there should no longer be delay in changing from the present system in view of the fact that there is so much travel across the boundary line both ways. It is necessary for safety and convenience to have only one rule of the road on the continent and the convenience of the corporation should not be allowed to stand in the way of the change, especially in view of the long notice which has already been given.

# PRESIDENT OF LABOR COUNCIL RESIGNATION

Committee Appointed to Work out One Big Union—Appreciation of Local Lawyer.

Because he is likely to be hiring labor during the coming season, W. E. Thompson resigned his position as president of the Trades and Labor Council at its meeting Wednesday evening. The resignation was accepted with regret.

Mr. Thompson explained his position and said that owing to the action of a certain faction in the labor ranks action had been taken by him earlier than it otherwise might have been. As an example of what he referred to he cited the recent visit of Jack Kavanagh to this city recently. The meeting had been arranged without any reference to him. He was now stepping down to make room for the "progressives" who while the hardest battles for labor had been fought had been conspicuous by their absence.

### Expressed Regret.

Regrets were expressed by S. D. Macdonald, L. Dawson and Sid Cox, all of whom spoke of the good work the president had done, never sparing himself and always working in what he believed to be the best interests of labor.

The question of building a labor temple in the city was discussed and progress reported, the committee giving an estimate for the work at something like \$10,000.

The question whether it was right for the president of the Trades and Labor Council to accept an invitation to go to meet Colonel Peck was discussed. President Thompson told of having gone with the party of citizens on Sunday. He felt he had been correct in doing so because Col. Peck's attitude at Ottawa had been fair and square.

Delegate Casey took some exception to the attitude of the president especially to his having been influenced by the tone of letters received from Ottawa.

### No Apologies.

S. D. Macdonald did not consider the president had any apologies to offer for Colonel Peck was a gallant and distinguished soldier. It was creditable to everyone to unite in doing honor to a man who had won such renown. A motion to endorse the action of the president passed without dissent.

G. B. Casey, Lester Dawson, R. T. J. Rose, George Rudderham and J. Pilford were appointed a committee to draft a platform in conformation with the principles of the One Big Union, it being reported by George Casey that it was likely to carry by a large majority.

An appreciation of the work of Alex. Manson, M. P., in defending two loggers who had gone to Queen Charlotte Islands to work and had found the camp closed and then returned here without a ticket was expressed by some of the delegates, it being mentioned that this was not the first time that Mr. Manson had vigorously and successfully defended laboring men.

# PRESENTATION TO MR. AND MRS. MOORE

A presentation was made last evening at the Inlander Boarding House to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Moore by the friends of Mr. Moore who board there.

J. G. Scott was spokesman for the party and he mentioned the high esteem in which Mr. Moore was held by his messmates, and on their behalf made the presentation of a fine chest of silverware.

Mr. Moore made a fitting reply thanking them all on behalf of himself and wife for the valuable present. Mr. and Mrs. Moore are living at the Inlander temporarily.

# GERMANS OBJECT TO TRIAL OF EMPEROR

Paris, May 16.—The German peace delegates will oppose the signing of that article of the peace treaty which provides for the trial of the former Kaiser.

# FARM LOANS for SOLDIERS



# How Returned Men Can Become Farmers

EVERY returned man who wants to become a farmer and is qualified for that vocation can get real, practical help through the Soldier Settlement Board.

The Government's programme includes:—

- (1) The securing of land.
- (2) The loaning of capital needed to purchase equipment and live stock, and erect buildings.
- (3) Agricultural training and farm supervision.

### The Loans Granted

Loans may be approved by the Loan Advisory Committee, according to the needs of the settler, on the following basis:—

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land.
- (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements and other equipment.
- (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings and other permanent improvements.

The first and third are repayable in twenty-five equal annual instalments; the second in four equal annual instalments beginning the third year, no interest being charged for the first two years.

On all these loans the low interest rate of five per cent. will be charged. A cash payment of ten per cent. of the purchase price will be required on the land—but this may be waived by the Board in special cases.

Qualified settlers on Dominion lands may secure loans up to a

maximum of \$3,000 on a plan similar to the above for farm equipment, live stock, and erection of buildings, provided security offered justifies the loan.

### To Whom Granted

To be entitled to these privileges a man must have served with an honourable record in the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war or outside of the country in which he enlisted (service in U.S. or Bermuda not included). Others eligible are:—  
A British subject who lived in Canada before the War and who was on active service with the Allied Forces in an actual theatre of war.

A member of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who served in Canada only, but is in receipt of a pension for disability occasioned by such service.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

### A Broad Policy

All soldiers whose best interests will be served by taking up farms will be assisted. Only suitable land will be approved. That is (a) land that is near to existing railways or organized communities; (b) land that will make money for the soldier; (c) land that will provide a first-class home.

In addition to these advantages the Board has planned a system of collective purchase, so that it can guarantee settlers the best value obtainable anywhere in live stock, implements, lumber, and other needs. It will also assist soldier settlers with advice and supervision, if necessary, in the management of their activities, so that the best results will be obtained.

## WOMEN ARE IN ARMS AGAINST HIGH PRICES

### Meetings Being Held at all Centres To Make Emphatic Protest.

Subsequent to conferences with Attorney-General and Minister of Labor, both at Victoria and in Vancouver, on the subject of how to attack the high cost of living, organization is now well under way on Vancouver Island and on the Mainland for a campaign of nation-wide magnitude. Meetings have already been held in Vancouver, New Westminster, Nanaimo and Duncan under the auspices of a number of energetic women with the result that at all points warm approval has been given to the plan, and local action has been promised. For the Government Mr. Farris has already given an assurance of co-operation in the cause.

At the Nanaimo meeting Mrs. Johnston spoke at length on the situation that had been brought about by the abnormal high cost of the necessities of life, it being proposed to unite the women of Canada in a movement to have the Dominion Government pro-

hibit the export of foodstuffs and to control prices, and to secure and make public information as to what food supplies Canada possesses.

### Not For Profiteers.

The women of Canada, she declared, had gone without food willingly for the sake of the soldiers overseas, but they would not go without food in order that money be put into the pockets of profiteers. There was a spirit of unrest abroad and unless the Government took prompt action and dealt with the high cost of living there was no telling what the results might be. It was time, the speaker declared, that the women all over Canada banded together and made representations to Ottawa to remedy these evils. The boycott was of no use for the simple reason that the profiteers could ship their stocks out of the country or by means of the large cold storage plants could store up even perishable goods for an indefinite period, and the purchasing of food supplies by carload lots would not solve the problem, the speaker declared, by reason of the fact that it would not be possible to supply all who would wish to purchase.



**30,000,000 CARIBOU IN NORTHERN HERDS**

Department Report Refers to Them as Possible Meat Reserves.

The Dominion Parks Branch of the Department of the Interior has made a very extensive investigation as to the possibility of utilizing the vast herds of barren land caribou to supplement the meat supply of the Dominion, according to the report of the Commissioner of Dominion Parks, J. B. Harkin, in the annual report of the Department of the Interior for the last fiscal year, which has just been issued.

As stated in the report, it is estimated that there are at least 20,000,000 to 30,000,000 caribou in the north. As a food, caribou meat is of a first-class quality. The hide when tanned is equal to the best chamois. It is only a question of time, the report states, when these vast herds will constitute a valuable asset to the Dominion.

"The only difficulty in the way of the utilization of these animals today," the report continues, "is one of transportation. After full investigation, it was felt that while, undoubtedly, caribou meat could be brought out now at fairly reasonable prices, the meat situation in the Dominion was scarcely such as called for immediate action. The caribou today constitutes a great meat reserve for the country."
