Winnipeg, May 17. (11:45 a. m.)-In fifteen minutes this city will be isolated from the rest of the world as the telegraphers stop work and join the strikers at noon.

Winnipeg, May 17. (10 a. m.) - Winnipeg will be isolated at noon today, the telegraph operators having decided to join the strikers. There is a complete but orderly tie-up of all business. scores of local unions are involved in the cessation of work. With the telephone operators out the decision of the commercial tele- flight to Europe. graphers to join the strikers will practically shut Winnipeg off from the outside world. The press service will be maintained by a direct "drop" between the head of the Lakes and Regina. The rommercial telegraphers of the Canadian Pacific, Great North Western, Grand Trunk Pacific and telegraphers in the employ of Canadian Press, Limited, and all brokerage firms in Winnipeg at a meeting last evening voted in favor of a sympathetic strike o take effect at 12 o'clock noon Saturday, May 17, isolating Winnipeg from the outside world.

The Fight is the Thing.

Fighting is so deeply a part of human nature that it will be centuries probably before it is eradicated. The average healthy human likes to fight or to watch a fight. Nothing else pleases

him so much as a scrap.

Nearly all boys like to read of the wonderful Richard, Coeur de Lion, who loved a good antagonist much more than a peaceful friend. They also like tales of adventure in which there are fights with grizzly bears, with Indians or between parties of whites. As they get older they still like to read of Jess Willard or Jack Johnson.

In the earlier stages of the development of the race men fought for existence, women fought to protect their children. People such as Quakers, who object to fighting, are keen on the industrial struggle which crowds some to the wall and is really a fight for the survival of the fittest.

Labor leaders enjoy their fight among themselves or they set the men at variance with their employers and try to accentuate the class distinction and to make war between them.

Even in social life there is a struggle. Women as well as men take part in it. The story of woman's inhumanity to woman is no fiction. It is a part of the battle instinct which often breaks out and vents itself on rivals.

Letter Writing is A Useful Art.

To write a good letter is one of the most useful arts. People who talk well often cannot write a readable letter. Paper Manufacture By Japanese.

The manufacture of paper has been carried on in Japan for many centuries. The product now generally known as Japanese paper was described by the early Dutch traders nearly 250 years ago. This product has served all the uses to which we put paper -book printing, covering for doors and partitions, writing and wrapping—and, in addition, has been utilized by the Japanese as a substitute for string, cloth, oilcloth, leather, and even wood, iron and glass. Its excellent lasting qualities and its superiority over machine-made papers have led to its utilization for a number of purposes for which foreign paper would be unsuitable. These advantages are due to the fact that in making this paper you were the assessed owner thereof. the Japanese use the tough and pliant inner bark from three or four species of deciduous trees, possessing long, tough fiber cells and this bark is not cut or hacked in transforming it into pulp, lands in the name of Thomas McManamon but is separated by pounding and beating, so that the long cells proceedings to establish your claim, if remain unbroken.

In the manufacture of this paper the form is held so that the parallel splinters or threads run from left to right. How Returned Men Can Become Farmers

LVERY returned man who wants to become a farmer and is qualified for that vocation can get real, practical help through the Soldier Settlement Board.

The Government's programme includes:-

- (1) The securing of land.
- (2) The loaning of capital needed to purchase equipment and live stock, and erect buildings.
- (3) Agricultural training and farm supervision.

The Loans Granted

Loans may be approved by the Loan Advisory Committee, according to the needs of the settler, on the following basis:-

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land.
- (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements and other equipment.
- (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings and other permanent improvements.

The first and third are repayable in twenty-five equal annual instalments; the second in four equal annual instalments beginning the third year, no interest being charged for the first two years.

On all these loans the low interest rate of five per cent. will be charged. A cash payment of ten per cent. of the purchase price will be required on the land-but this may be waived by the Board in special cases.

Qualified settlers on Dominion lands may secure loans up to a

maximum of \$3,000 on a plan similar to the above for farm equipment, live stock, and erection of buildings, provided security offered justifies the loan.

To Whom Granted

To be entitled to these privileges a man must have served with an honourable record in the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war or outside of the country in which he enlisted (service in U.S. or Bermuda not included). Others eligible are:

A British subject who lived in Canada before the War and who was on active service with the Allied Forces in an actual theatre of war.

A member of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who served in Canada only, but is in receipt of a pension for disability occasioned by such service.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

A Broad Policy

All soldiers whose best interests will be served by taking up farms will be assisted. Only suitable land will be approved. That is (a) land that is near to existing railways or organized communities; (b) land that will make money for the soldier; (c) land that will provide a first class home.

In addition to these advantages the Board has planned a system of collective purchase, so that it can guarantee settlers the best value obtainable anywhere in live stock, implements, lumber, and other needs. It will also assist soldier settlers with advice and supervision, if necessary, in the management of their activities, so that the best results will be obtained.






