## WINNIPEG ISOLATED THROUGH TELEGRAPHERS ALL JOINING IN THE BIG SYMPATHETIC STRIKE

Press Service to Coast will be Continued by Connecting Port  
Arthur with Regina Direct, but All Commercial Business  
will Cease until Strike is Declared Off

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Winnipeg, May 17. (11:45 a. m.)—In fifteen minutes this city will be isolated from the rest of the world as the telegraphers stop work and join the strikers at noon.

Winnipeg, May 17. (10 a. m.)—Winnipeg will be isolated at noon today, the telegraph operators having decided to join the strikers. There is a complete but orderly tie-up of all business. Scores of local unions are involved in the cessation of work. With the telephone operators out the decision of the commercial telegraphers to join the strikers will practically shut Winnipeg off from the outside world. The press service will be maintained by a direct "drop" between the head of the Lakes and Regina. The commercial telegraphers of the Canadian Pacific, Great North Western, Grand Trunk Pacific and telegraphers in the employ of the Canadian Press, Limited, and all brokerage firms in Winnipeg at a meeting last evening voted in favor of a sympathetic strike to take effect at 12 o'clock noon Saturday, May 17, isolating Winnipeg from the outside world.

Ottawa, May 17.—The Federal Government announces that it will take no steps to interfere in the Winnipeg strike but will await developments. The matter was mentioned by Hon. Gideon Robertson, Minister of Labor. The action of the postal clerks in joining the strike was censured.

### HOUSING PLAN IS APPROVED BY PARLIAMENT

Objection Taken to Measure, But  
With No Result—Bankruptcy  
Act Disposed of.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, May 17.—In Parliament yesterday the House of Commons dealt with the housing plan under which \$25,000,000 is set aside to be loaned to the provinces at a low rate of interest for the purpose of helping in the pressing housing question. Many members expressed disapproval of the measure, but it was passed.

Another question which came before the House was the granting of more pay for the Mounted Police. It also carried.

The fertilizer and bankruptcy acts were disposed of.

The housing scheme was first passed as an order-in-council under the War Measures Act. Under it Prince Rupert is to get \$50,000 for building loans to returned soldiers and dependents. It is expected that arrangements will be made for handling the money locally in a very short time. A number of applications have already been made for it.

### LOCAL STUDENT WINS A \$75 SCHOLARSHIP

Work of H. M. Shockley Recognized by Faculty of Applied Science.

Word has been received from Vancouver that a Prince Rupert boy, Henry Maurice Shockley, has been granted a scholarship amounting to \$75 at the University of British Columbia. This recognition is from the Faculty of Applied Science in the first year course.

Shockley also did well in mathematics, getting 100 per cent in descriptive geometry and first in mechanics.

## STEEL BEING SHIPPED FOR CONSTRUCTION WORK AT THE LOCAL YARDS; FOUNDRY OPEN

BENDING SLABS ARRIVED YESTERDAY ON PRINCE JOHN;  
GOOD PROGRESS BEING MADE IN ALL DEPART-  
MENTS; NEW FOUNDRY WILL EMPLOY  
20 TO 30 MOULDERS

Advice received by the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. from the Department of Marine at Ottawa is to the effect that the steel is being shipped for the vessels which are to be built here and that it will be here in good time so that the work will not be delayed when the works are ready.

Yesterday the steamer Prince John brought in forty tons of bending slabs. These were ordered before it was decided to open the foundry here or they might have been made right here.

### Open for Business.

The new foundry is now open for business and already some brass work has been moulded. Material is arriving for it and it will soon be equipped for any kind of work up to twelve tons or in emergency up to twenty tons.

The foundry is one of the most modern, with overhead travelling crane and rails up the centre so that railway cars may be backed in and loaded or unloaded without difficulty.

When it gets going in full swing this foundry will employ from twenty to thirty moulders and will be a local industry that will bring business to the port permanently.

In addition to the foundry the company is putting in an electric cutting and welding machine for the welding of broken propeller blades, castings, etc.

Plate and angle furnaces are going up and all sorts of small work is being done, all of which will contribute to the general scheme in this big plant.

Discussing the progress of the work yesterday, Mr. Mullen said that good progress was being made throughout in such a manner that all the departments would be completed about the same time. The boarding house would be completed in from ten to fifteen days and all the other work was progressing satisfactorily.

### CHANGES MADE IN THE CRIMINAL LAW

Man and Woman Must Not Register at Hotel as Man and Wife.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, May 17.—A number of changes are being made in the Criminal Act, particularly dealing with the age of consent and with penalties. All the changes are made with the purpose of making the law more stringent. One interesting clause in the amendment reads as follows:

"Every one is guilty of an offence and liable, under summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding five hundred dollars or six months' imprisonment, who, at any hotel, boarding or lodging house, whether by registering in any book kept in such hotel, boarding or lodging house or otherwise, represents or pretends that a woman or man to whom he or she is not married is his wife or her husband, as the case may be."

### HON. E. D. BARROW IS AT PRINCE GEORGE

Is Preparing to Report Regarding  
Proposed Settlement Area  
In District.

Prince George, May 17.—Hon. E. D. Barrow, provincial minister of agriculture, is at present in the district with a party of soldiers' delegates, also a Dominion representative of the Soldiers' Settlement Board.

Mr. Barrow is visiting various parts of the district with the object of preparing a report recommending to the government the lands to be comprised in the proposed settlement area hereabouts. The Dominion representative is taking advantage of the minister's visit to acquire data on the lands available and suitable for soldier settlement under the Dominion act. The soldier delegates will report back to their comrades at the coast their opinions of the land in this section.

Mr. Barrow and party visited the district east of the city in the vicinity of Gunn's ranch. On their return they reported themselves greatly pleased with the country visited, Mr. Barrow stating that he had received an agreeable surprise from his visit. The soil he examined is of excellent quality, he declared, and it was the greatest surprise of all to note the large acreage many of the settlers in that region had put under cultivation.

Ottawa, May 17.—The Military Department has been advised that the Empress of Japan, carrying 632 members of the Canadian Siberian Expeditionary Force, will probably dock at Vancouver on May 21.

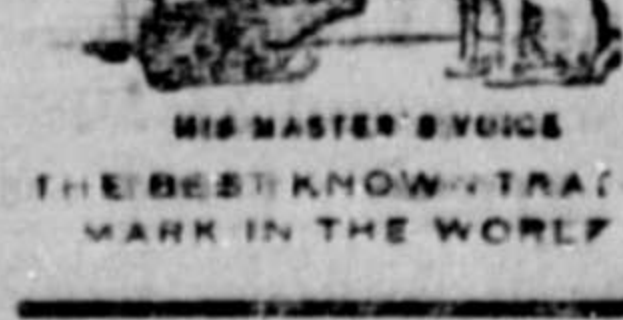

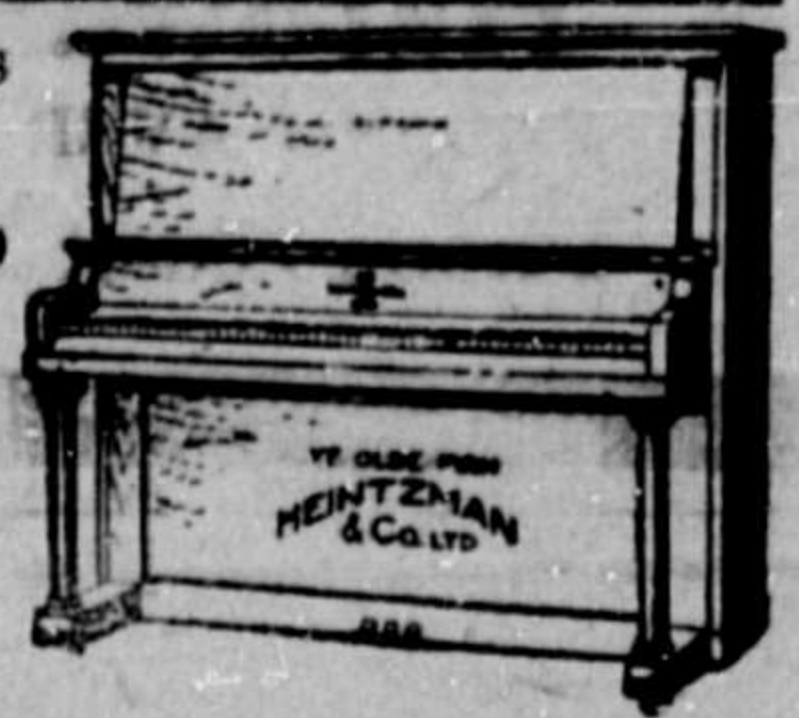

MARKET PRICES REMAIN FIRM

New Fruits Coming in With Changing Season—Flour Being Out.

With the exception of flour, one of the features of the local market this week is the firmness in most staple products. Eggs, butter and sugar are showing no tendency towards a drop in price, and, if anything, it is expected by the larger merchants that sugar, if it does change at all, will go higher yet. The low price of flour has a local significance only as some of the merchants seem to like to sell it for less than they pay for it.

With the advancing of the season new lines in fruits are coming in. New cherries arrived today and Mediterranean oranges—the kind with the pips—have arrived. The season for these does not last long. Local rhubarb is showing and is good at 10c., while California grape fruit is very much better in quality than heretofore, and seems to be ousting the Florida variety.

NEW WASH PLANT

The Granby Consolidated Smelting and Mining Company is building a 1,000-ton washing plant at its new coal mine at Cassidy on Vancouver Island. Work has just started under the direction of R. R. FARM LOANS for SOLDIERS



How Returned Men Can Become Farmers

EVERY returned man who wants to become a farmer and is qualified for that vocation can get real, practical help through the Soldier Settlement Board.

The Government's programme includes:—

- (1) The securing of land. (2) The loaning of capital needed to purchase equipment and live stock, and erect buildings. (3) Agricultural training and farm supervision.

The Loans Granted

Loans may be approved by the Loan Advisory Committee, according to the needs of the settler, on the following basis:—

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land. (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements and other equipment. (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings and other permanent improvements.

The first and third are repayable in twenty-five equal annual instalments; the second in four equal annual instalments beginning the third year, no interest being charged for the first two years.

On all these loans the low interest rate of five per cent. will be charged. A cash payment of ten per cent. of the purchase price will be required on the land—but this may be waived by the Board in special cases.

Qualified settlers on Dominion lands may secure loans up to a

maximum of \$3,000 on a plan similar to the above for farm equipment, live stock, and erection of buildings, provided security offered justifies the loan.

To Whom Granted

To be entitled to these privileges a man must have served with an honourable record in the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war or outside of the country in which he enlisted (service in U.S. or Bermuda not included). Others eligible are:

A British subject who lived in Canada before the War and who was on active service with the Allied Forces in an actual theatre of war.

A member of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who served in Canada only, but is in receipt of a pension for disability occasioned by such service.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

A Broad Policy

All soldiers whose best interests will be served by taking up farms will be assisted. Only suitable land will be approved. That is (a) land that is near to existing railways or organized communities; (b) land that will make money for the soldier; (c) land that will provide a first-class home.

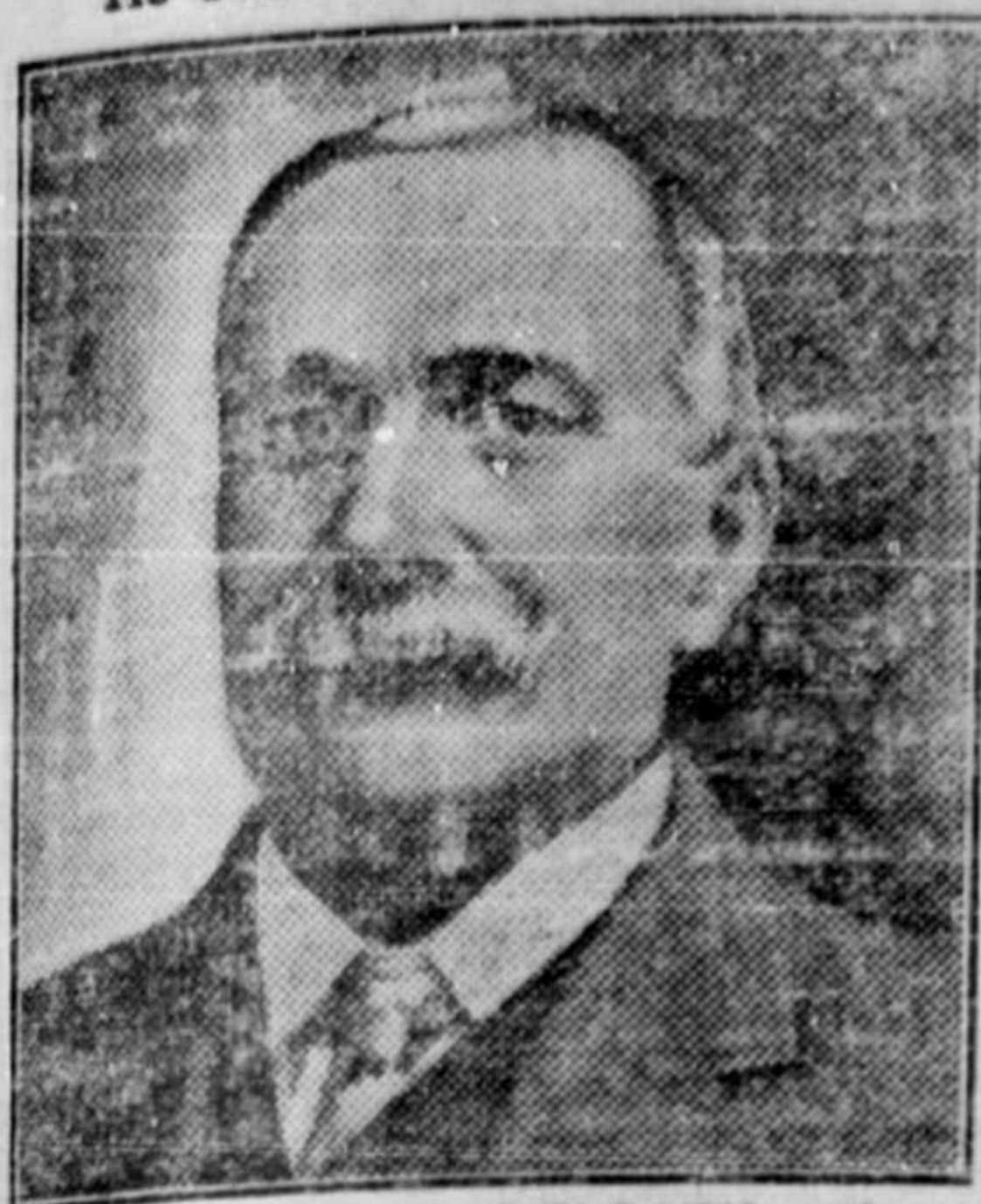

## NEW MACHINE SHOPS ON WHARF

Akerberg, Thomson & Co. Extending Their Business to Keep Pace With the Growth of Port.

In order to cope with their ever increasing business, important improvements have been made by the firm of Akerberg Thomson & Co., Ltd., on the leased waterfront adjacent to the Government wharf. Their wharf here has been repiled and redecked, and a gridiron or ways has been constructed, which is capable of landing boats up to 75 feet long. On the wharf above a 6,000-lb. derrick has been constructed, which will greatly facilitate the handling of heavy material to and from boats.

It is the intention of the firm to remove their machine shop from its present location on First Avenue to their wharf where work will be handled much more economically, to the advantage of their customers.

An oxy-acetylene welding plant both stationary and portable, has just been installed and the plant will be in charge of Mr. J. Davis, who has had a large and varied experience in this class of work, obtained in the C. P. R. shops in Vancouver and with Yarrows, Ltd., at Esquimaux.

They have also recently added to their plant a Hisy Wolf combination electric grinder, which tool will be used more particularly for grinding out cylinders, which is a more improved method than the old way of boring them.

Work will be commenced upon the new machine shop very soon and when housed there Akerberg Thomson & Co., Ltd., will have together a very complete equipment for the handling of machine work of every kind.

## PHILIP GIBBS AS WAR CORRESPONDENT

Philip Gibbs has rounded off the wonderful work he has done during the war by publishing his despatches covering the last year of it under the title of "Open Warfare."

When one sees this war correspondent face to face one cannot help marvelling at his achievement. A small, almost dainty, man, frail you would call him, delicate too in his cast of countenance, and pale, who would have thought that he could have stood four such years of wear and tear?

"You'll be dead in a month," his friends said when he started for the Balkan War in 1912, and he himself thought it was quite possible. As a matter of fact he thrived on it, put on weight. At the beginning of the present war, when correspondents were not regarded with favor, he only succeeded in getting to the front by attaching himself to a Belgian ambulance.

The secret of his success as a despatch writer has been his wonderful powers of observation. He has the piercing eagle eye. This was apparent several years ago,

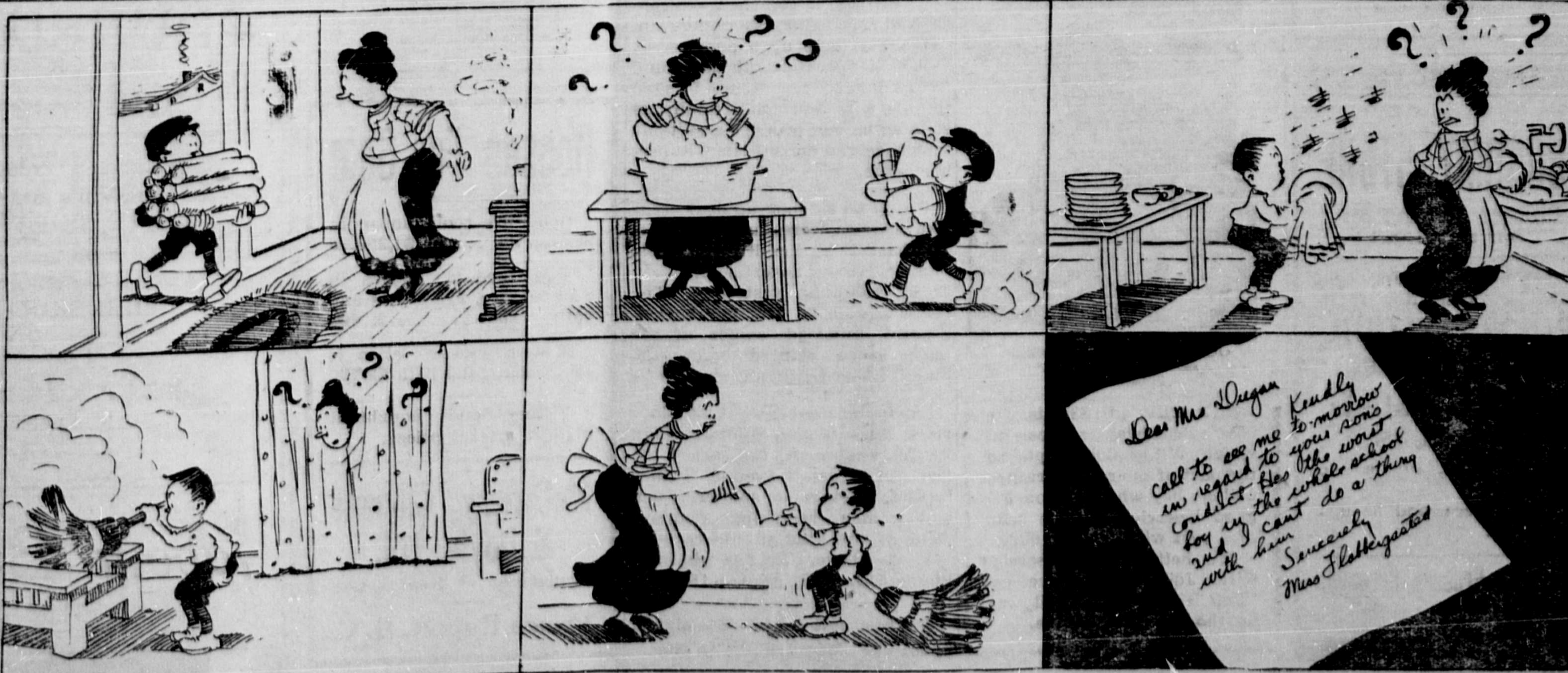
