GERMAN GOVERNMENT FULLY UNITED AGAINST SIGNING; BERLIN PEOPLE HOSTILE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Berlin, May 19.—A semi-official announcement was made on Thursday that insinuations in the pan-German newspapers were false regarding the intention of the Ebert-Schiedemann Government signing the Allied peace terms. The Government, the announcement says, is fully united on declining to sign the treaty.

London, May 19.—British officers in Berlin have been ordered to wear civilian clothes out of doors lest they incite the populace to a demonstration.

The United States couriers in uniform have mostly been forced to remain in the Hotel Adlon, and there is a general feeling in the hotel that there will be trouble within the next few days.

Toledo, May 19.—The churches here are taking vigorous action to try to stop the Dempsey-Willard prize fight. Governor Cox, Sheriff James F. Mathison and Mayor Schrieber have been asked by the Ministerial Association, embracing 250 churches to prohibit the bout, preparations for which are now going on.

LIBERAL PLATFORM

Delegates From Labor and Soldier
Organizations Invited to
Convention.

A new Liberal platform is to be enunciated embodying the more advanced views of the members of the party and working out in concrete form the Liberal principles as adapted to present day problems. This will be done at the big convention of Liberals which is to be held the first week in August at Ottawa. Other purposes of the meeting will be the matter of party organization and the selection of a leader.

A manifesto calling the convention has been issued by the temporary house leader, D. D. McKenzie, in which the following paragraph is used:

"Owing to changed conditions arising out of the war and to the desirability for co-operation among all ranks of Liberal democracy in dealing with grave national problems, invitations will be extended to the Canadian council of agriculture, the Dominion Trades and Labor Council, the G. W. V. A. and the Canadian railway brotherhoods to send representatives to the convention for the purpose of presenting such views as these national bodies may desire to present prior to the drafting and adoption of a national Liberal platform."

DANGER OF LOOSING.

AUSTRALIAN AVIATOR LEFT LAST NIGHT FOR IRELAND —ENGLISHMAN'S PLANE LOST

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

St. Johns, Newfoundland, May 19.—The Australian aviator has started on his trans-Atlantic flight, the plane of his English rival has been wrecked, and the United States navy plane N. C. 3 is believed to have been lost at sea, while the N. C. 4 is safe at Ponta, Azores.

Harry G. Hawker, the Australian aviator, and Capt. McKenzie Grieve, his navigator, are winging their way across the Atlantic tonight on the most perilous aeroplane flight in history. They took the air at 5:55 p. m. today, Greenwich time (1:55 New York time) and expect to reach the Irish coast in 20 hours unless some accident forces them to plunge into the sea.

When the Sopwith biplane passed from view beyond the hills to the northeast headed for the open sea, it left behind with shattered hopes Hawker's, the English rival of Frederick Raynham who had hoped to be first across in a Martinsyde plane, to win glory and the \$50,000 prize of the London Daily Mail.

Washington, May 19.—The official naval department announcement tells of the arrival of aeroplane N. C. 4 at Ponta, Island of Fayal, Azores, at 8 a. m. Saturday after a 1,200-mile trip in 14 hours and 20 minutes.

APPEALS TO POPE TO INTERFERE ON BEHALF OF GERMANY

GARRISON IS UNDER ORDERS FOR WINNIPEG

Toronto Labor Men Declare Sol-
diers Must Not be Used as
Strike Breakers.

Toronto, May 19.—It is understood that a garrison here is under orders to proceed to Winnipeg at a moment's notice.

Labor men here demand that the use of troops during the present unrest be clearly defined and they say if widespread strikes are to be avoided in Canada soldiers must not be used as strike breakers.

LAND SETTLEMENT BOARD MAKES GOOD

So Says Visitor From the Bulkley
Valley Who Lives on
the Spot.

"The Land Settlement Board has made good," said R. E. Williams of Smithers this morning when seen by a Daily News representative. "This is the first time the interior country has ever been noticed by a Government. The farmers are being helped to build silos and a creamery is planned for the Bulkley Valley. A number of new settlers are coming in and many cattle were imported last fall through the Provincial Government."

Mr. Williams said that the spring had been rather dry and cool, but the prospects were good and everyone was optimistic in the valley.

AUSTRIAN INDEMNITY IS SET AT FIVE BILLION GOLD MARKS

AMOUNT IS ONLY ONE TWENTIETH THAT DEMANDED OF
GERMANY—ALLIED FORCES LAND AT SMYRNA
UNDER DIRECTION OF PEACE
CONFERENCE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, May 19.—The indemnity asked of Austria in the treaty with that country which is being prepared here is five billion gold marks. While this is a large sum it is only one-twentieth the amount demanded of Germany.

Smyrna reports the landing of Allied forces and the occupying of all the forts and strategic points. This move was directed by the peace conference to preserve order.

Smyrna is a city of about 200,000 inhabitants and an important fortified seaport in Asia Minor on the Aegean Sea.

London, May 19.—A British fleet is anchored outside the east Prussian port of Memel close to the Russian frontier.

TREATY WITH AUSTRIA NOT READY YET

Portions of Document Had to be
Redrafted Because of Failure
Of Hungarians.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, May 19.—The Austrian treaty, according to indications today, will not be ready for presentation before the latter part of this week. It is understood that the failure of the Hungarian delegates to arrive and the uncertainty regarding conditions there, caused a considerable re-draft of portions of the document concerning overlapping questions in the former dual monarchy.

John McKenzie, of Vancouver, brother to deceased, arrived by the Prince George and continued the operations for the recovery of his brother's body, which others had been conducting without success. He dragged again over the spot where the accident happened and brought it to the surface. The remains will be taken to Vancouver for burial.

Deceased was a native of Scotland and belonged to Drumbeg, Sutherlandshire.

Prince Rupert Pupils Make a Good Record.

All the Prince Rupert pupils have passed their examinations successfully at the University of British Columbia. One has secured a scholarship and one leads his class. This is an excellent record. It shows that the groundwork at the local schools was well laid and that the pupils have ability and strength of character to carry on.

All Prince Rupert people will be pleased to hear of the success of the young people and the News joins in extending congratulations.

Mackenzie King Studies Conditions.

W. L. Mackenzie King, who was minister of labor in the Laurier cabinet, has gone to England to study reconstruction problems, especially as they affect labor.

Mr. King has a great deal of ability as an investigator and as a writer. His book "Industry and Humanity" is looked on as an authority on industrial conditions. He is also an able speaker and a good many Liberals still look to him as the man who is best able to lead the party.

Women No Longer Silent in Church.

Even the churches are being liberalized. Women were allowed as delegates at the Methodist conference at New Westminster this year for the first time. The local delegate, Mrs. M. Kergin, was given a seat with the other lay delegates, along with nineteen others.

This is a distinct gain. It shows that the precept of Paul that women should keep silent is not being obeyed literally just as the mandate to turn the other cheek is not obeyed.

There are certain things that common sense tells us are wrong no matter where they are written. It is possible that Paul fell in with some women who talked too much, just as there are said to be some women in these days. Under these conditions he probably wrote them to keep silent in the church and give the men a chance. That does not mean that all women for all time must keep quiet. They do not do it anyway, even the most religious of them, and they never will.

The state has now recognized the right of women to take their place in the councils of the state, and the church, which is supposed to lead and advise fellows when it finds its position untenable.

The News is not taking a position antagonistic to the church, but feels that in this case it must draw attention to an anomaly. We are glad to see the church following when it cannot lead.

The Flyer is New Monthly.

It is a clear indication of the general trend of affairs that a new magazine devoted exclusively to the interests of flying should be issued at Vancouver monthly. The second number of "The Flyer" has been received and is a very creditable production. The editors are Lieutenants Cornyn, Templeton, Brooks, and Fenton and the work is endorsed by the Air Service Association of British Columbia.

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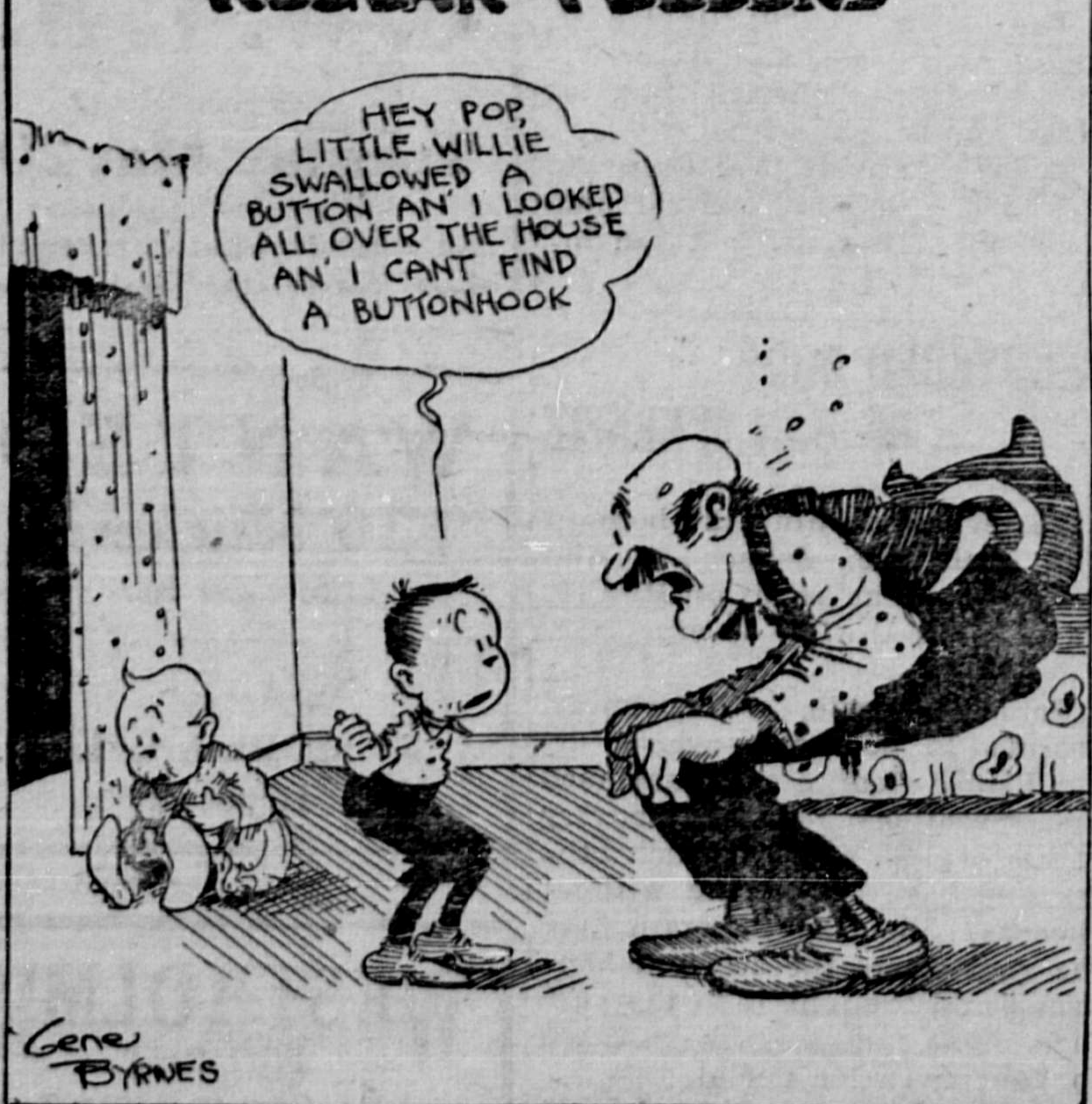

REPORTER TELLS HOW IT FEELS TO GO FLYING

Archie Willis Goes Up in New
"Pathfinder" at Victoria
and Describes Sensation.

After donning a thick helmet, a pair of goggles and a heavy flying coat, and satisfying several persistent friends that \$24.50 would be quite sufficient for my funeral expenses, I was informed that the front seat of the "Pathfinder" had been reserved for me.

Without further questions I proceeded to take my seat and, just to show the world that I was a novice at the game, crashed my head on the upper wing, a somewhat similar experience to the person who gets into a lower berth on a Pullman for the first time, and, on stretching, finds that an upper berth makes certain limitations to his movements.

On getting adjusted to the narrow confines of the aeroplane a large, smiling mechanic stepped on to the wing and stated that, as the Aerial League did not wish to drop their passengers in mid-air he was going to fasten me in. Accordingly he pulled a six-inch canvas belt around me, made fast the quick release, and, to further ensure my remaining with the machine, inserted a split pin in the quick release.

Pilot Clemence, as nimble as a kitten, sprung into his cockpit in the rear and commenced finger-ling the controls. The large, smiling mechanic went to the front and commenced to turn the propeller after the style of a man who tries to spin a Ford when it is fussy about starting. Then a small man placed two chocks in front of the small wheels. The large mechanic brought the propeller to a horizontal position. The pilot and mechanic commenced to talk to one another in aeroplane language and with a lunge the mechanic swung the "prop" and the engine commenced to fire. As the engine was opened up there was terrific draft, scented with the exhaust fumes of oil and petrol. Every cylinder was hitting beautifully and when the carburetor was opened wide there was a perfect purr, which indicated that everything was O.K.

The engine was shut down and the chocks removed. Once more the engine was opened out and a mechanic straining on each wing tried to hold the plane in check. Finally they broke into a run and on a wave of the pilot's arm they let go and the "Pathfinder" was off. Running along the grassy oval for about 100 yards the plane gained speed very rapidly. One could feel that the tail of the machine had lifted off the ground as he assumed a more upright position. Then the ground commenced to recede slowly, indicating that the plane was in the air. A slight dip followed by a steep ascent to the left known in the aviation world as a "climbing turn," the "Pathfinder" commenced to make height very rapidly.

Water Transparent.
The thing which strikes one most forcibly in a flight over water is the transparency of the water. One can see to great depths and can easily understand why the seaplane was used so extensively in conducting the warfare against the German submarine. Where the surface is free from ripples it is possible to see down a great depth, and no doubt the aeroplane some day will be used in conjunction with steam whalers for the purpose of spotting whales.

It is impossible to convey to the lay mind the magnificence of the view obtained from the sky. No earthly comparison can be drawn. The nearest approach to a comparison might be the submission of the view obtained from the Summit when looking northward up the Saanich Inlet to Salt Spring Island and across the peninsula to the Gulf Island and multiplying this panorama a hundred fold.

The rapidity of travel does not dawn on one until he commenced to mark objects on the ground, and even then he is not aware that it is himself that is moving. The ground appears to do all the movement. One minute you find yourself directly above the main thoroughfares, where small groups turn their heads upwards

and their faces flash in the sun, and other people bent on business dart across the streets.

Looping Loop.
After straight flying for about twenty-five minutes, I received a slight kick in the back from the pilot, and on turning around saw him smile and make motions with his hands, with a view to have me repeat the same movements. Accordingly I placed my hands on the front of the cockpit, a sort of bracing precaution. Why this was necessary I was not aware at the moment, but was suspicious that probably the pilot was contemplating a stunt. The object of the precaution was not long in being revealed. The nose of the plane turned slightly downward and speed was rapidly increased. Suddenly the world disappeared from beneath, and the machine appeared to be going over. As I looked down expecting to see the earth, I saw the sky, and on looking up I saw the earth, so decided that I must be upside down. The engine was shut down so that the swish of the propeller was quite discernible above the drone. With lightning rapidity the world rushed in beneath, and there seemed a great pressure on top of my head, as though the plane was trying to press me down, and also a doubling up sensation. Then the plane flattened out and the pilot indicated that this had been the loop.

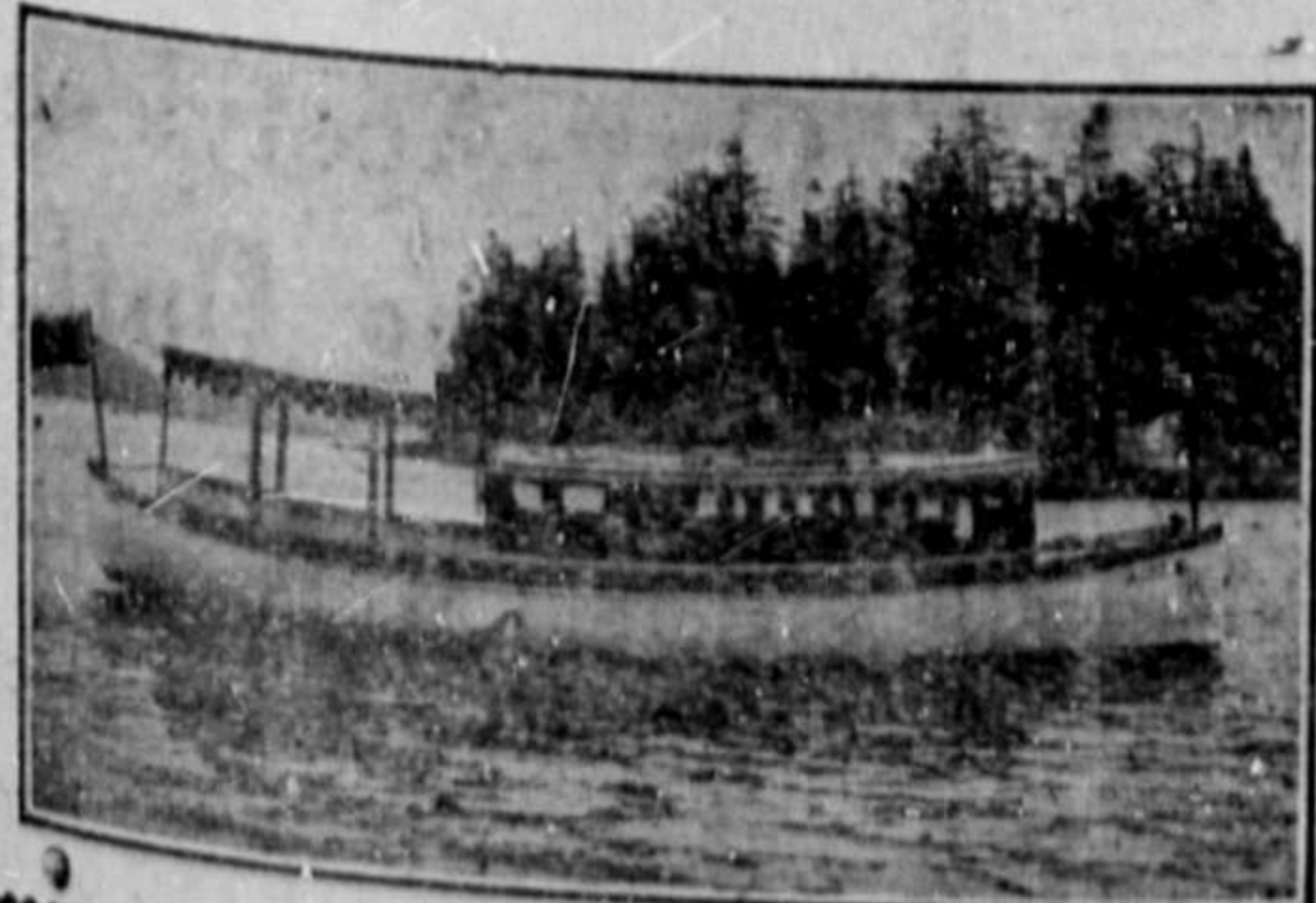

J.S. WOODSWORTH WOULD ADMIT THE ORIENTALS

Advocates Internationalism of Labor as Well as Capital; Defends Bolsheviki and Advocates Labor Members.

At the labor meeting held in the Westholme Theatre last night J. S. Woodsworth told a large audience that as a matter of principle it was right to admit Orientals to this country and that if, under proper conditions, the English-speaking people could not hold their own they would have to go under.

He went on to tell how the Japanese were organizing their own unions and were refusing to scab during a strike, and he urged his hearers to learn to rise above little nationalism and to become international in their views. They would have to rise to internationalism before the great questions before them were solved. Capital was international and labor would have to become the same. For the worker the working class was more important than the nation.

"Who owns British Columbia?" inquired the speaker. "Britishers? No the province is nearly all owned by Americans."

Defends Bolsheviki.

Mr. Woodsworth defended the Bolsheviki. They undoubtedly had failures and shortcomings, but William Allen White who had investigated said that there was no red terror in Russia, and the tale about the internationalization of women was not now believed anywhere. He quoted the London Daily News in regard to the virtues of the new movement and told of the cruelties of the Czechoslovaks.

Speaking of aliens and their deportation, Mr. Woodsworth said that only about half of Canada was British. Of the two millions who had come in during the few years prior to the war 38 per cent were from the British Isles, 34 per cent from the United States and about 27 per cent of all kinds of mixed races. He told how in some townships on the prairies nearly all were foreign and in one of them there was one Englishman with a Buckowinian wife.

"The politician who puts into the mouth of a man the cry 'deport your aliens' is either ignorant or criminal," he declared.

Labor Members.

Mr. Woodsworth spoke of the cause of the war, of the rise of woman and of her place industrially. He declared that the workers should use every means to their hand to improve conditions. He favored sending labor members to parliament and doing everything possible to change the present system which was absolutely and crushingly unjust. Social production which had come involved social control. No man could any longer live to himself. The difference between a soviet and parliament was that at present members were chosen from constituencies whereas under the soviet system they were chosen from the trades. The Russian soviets had restricted the vote to those who worked only. In this they were not as radical as St. Paul who said "If a man will not work neither shall he eat." The Bolshevists said "If he will not work he shall not vote."

At the conclusion of the lecture a collection was taken, amounting to \$105.25. W. H. Montgomery presided.

J. T. C. Williams, inspector of fisheries, arrived Saturday afternoon on the Crosby to resume his duties here. He is improving in health and hopes to be able to continue his work throughout the season. He has already visited all portions of the district and found conditions satisfactory. He reports that the outlook is good if weather conditions are satisfactory.

FARM LOANS for SOLDIERS



How Returned Men Can Become Farmers

EVERY returned man who wants to become a farmer and is qualified for that vocation can get real, practical help through the Soldier Settlement Board.

The Government's programme includes:—

- (1) The securing of land.
- (2) The loaning of capital needed to purchase equipment and live stock, and erect buildings.
- (3) Agricultural training and farm supervision.

The Loans Granted

Loans may be approved by the Loan Advisory Committee, according to the needs of the settler, on the following basis:—

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land.
- (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements and other equipment.
- (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings and other permanent improvements.

The first and third are repayable in twenty-five equal annual instalments; the second in four equal annual instalments beginning the third year, no interest being charged for the first two years.

On all these loans the low interest rate of five per cent. will be charged. A cash payment of ten per cent. of the purchase price will be required on the land—but this may be waived by the Board in special cases.

Qualified settlers on Dominion lands may secure loans up to a

maximum of \$3,000 on a plan similar to the above for farm equipment, live stock, and erection of buildings, provided security offered justifies the loan.

To Whom Granted

To be entitled to these privileges a man must have served with an honourable record in the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war or outside of the country in which he enlisted (service in U.S. or Bermuda not included). Others eligible are:

A British subject who lived in Canada before the War and who was on active service with the Allied Forces in an actual theatre of war.

A member of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who served in Canada only, but is in receipt of a pension for disability occasioned by such service.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

A Broad Policy

All soldiers whose best interests will be served by taking up farms will be assisted. Only suitable land will be approved. That is (a) land that is near to existing railways or organized communities; (b) land that will make money for the soldier; (c) land that will provide a first-class home.

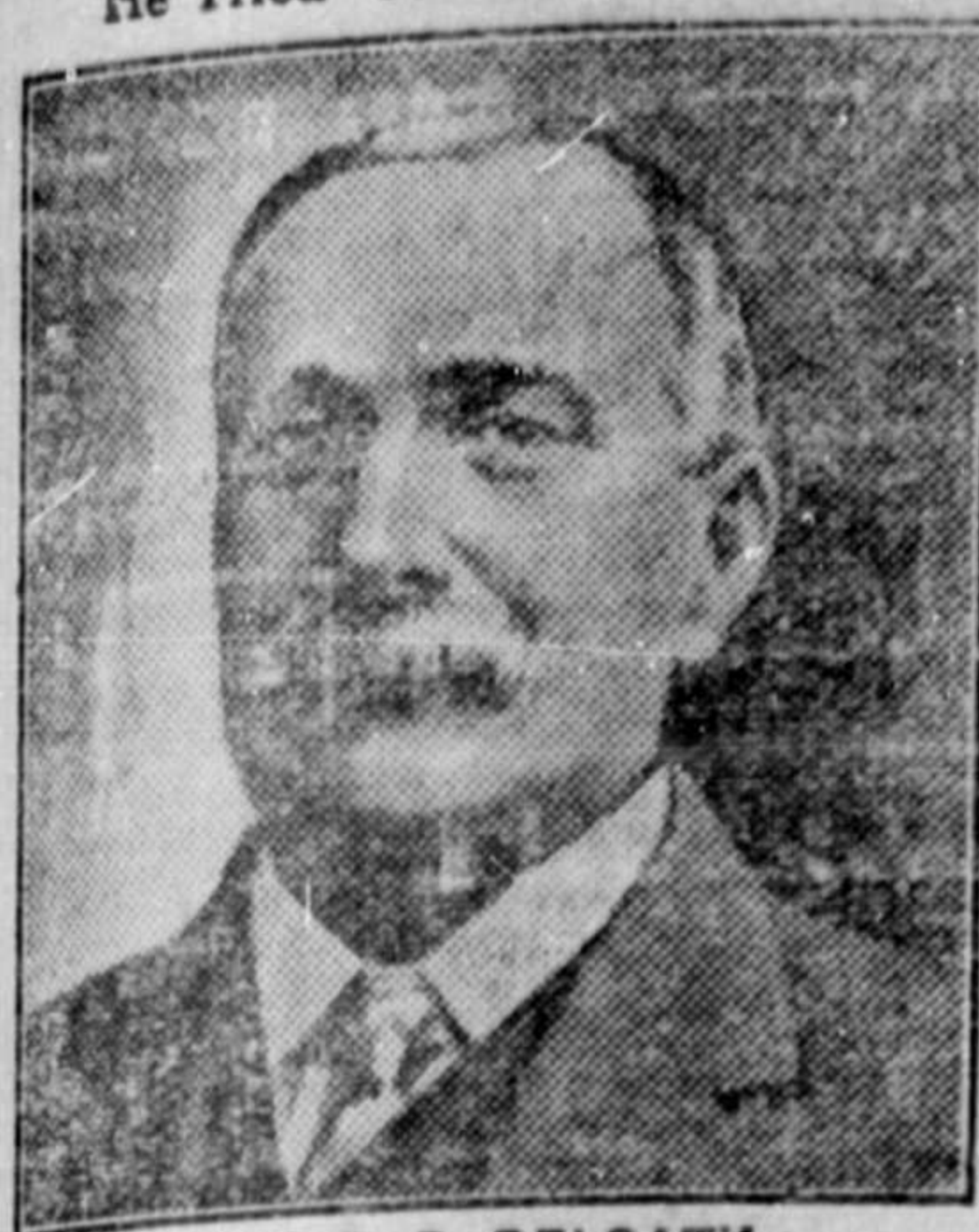

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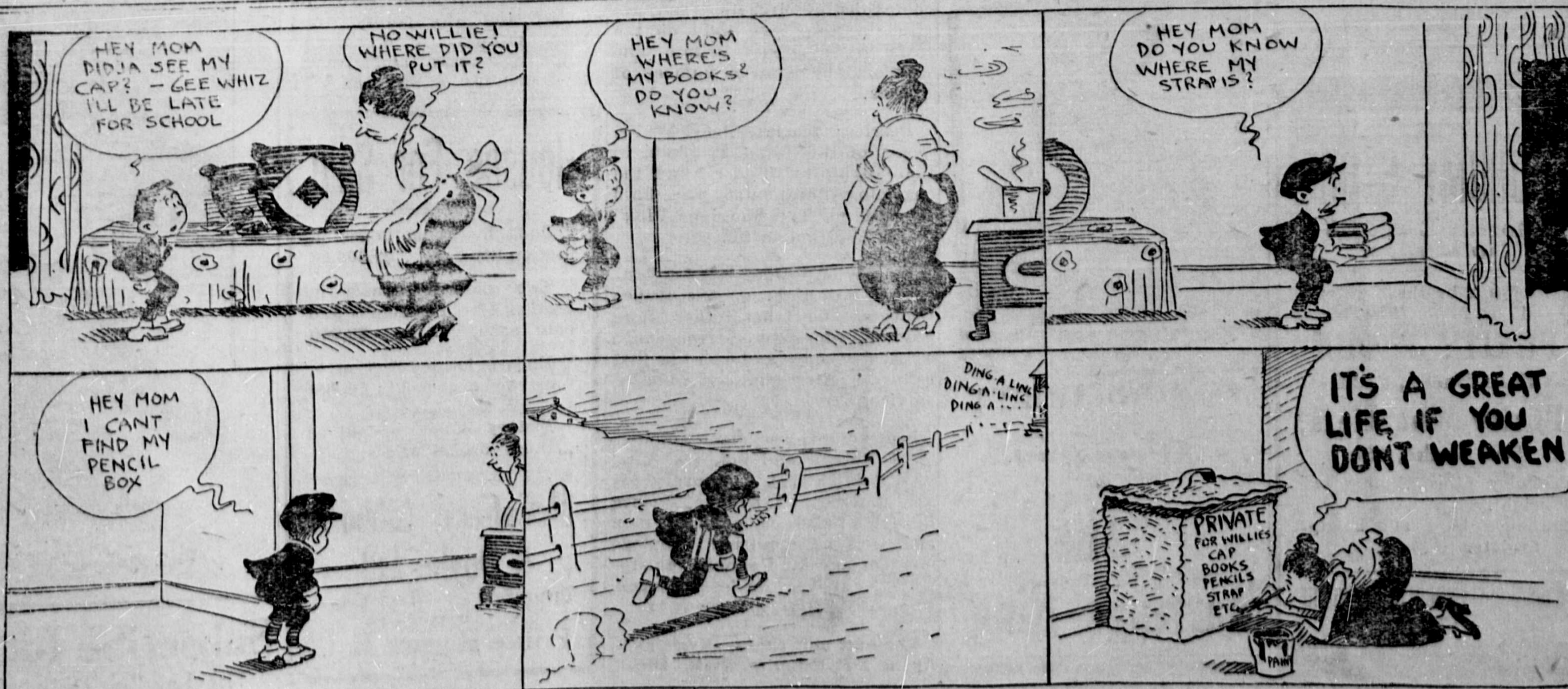
