FOCH'S MILITARY PLANS ARE LAID BEFORE COUNCIL OF FOUR IN EVENT OF WAR

**GERMANY WILL BE GIVEN EXTENDED TIME TO ANSWER
"YES" OR "NO"—REPRESENTATIONS BEING
MADE BY THE POPE REGARDING
MODIFICATIONS**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, May 20.—Marshal Foch is ready for any warlike steps that may be necessary.
Today Marshal Foch laid before the Council of Four his plan for military operations that are to be put into effect in case of the German plenipotentiaries declining to sign the peace treaty.
After the conference between Marshal Foch and the Council of Four, President Wilson had a talk with General Pershing. It became known later that General Pershing's visit to London may be postponed in order to await developments.

Time Extended.
The Germans probably will have until the end of the first week in June to say "yes" or "no" regarding their signature to the peace treaty.

The German counter proposals are expected to be so elaborate and voluminous that if submitted by May 22, the time limit for the German reply, the inter-allied delegates can scarcely finish their consideration before June 1.

Rome, May 20.—Responding to an appeal from the entire German Episcopate, Pope Benedict is taking steps to bring representations for modifications of the peace terms to the conference at Paris.

Paris, May 20.—Count Brockdorff-Rantzau and eleven prominent members of the German peace delegation with their baggage left here for Berlin.

Austria's Case.
Viscount Milner, British Minister for the Colonies, will preside this week at the meetings of the commission appointed by the peace conference to examine the Italian colonial claims. Henri Simon and French Colonial Minister and Signor Crespi of the Italian delegation are also members of the commission.

The Italians request the insertion in the peace treaty of a clause providing for the return of all art treasures removed by the Austrians.
An exchange of credentials took place between the Austrian peace delegation and the Allied powers at 3:30 p. m. yesterday.

DEEP SEA PIER TO BE BUILT HERE THIS YEAR

**Captain Nicholson of G. T. P. Steamships sa's Another Wharf
Also Needed for Increasing
Traffic.**

Work on construction of one unit of the deep-sea piers in Prince Rupert, in conformity with the Bogue plans, will be commenced this year, according to information given by Captain Nicholson of the G. T. P. Steamship Service to the Vancouver Province. This unit will cost \$500,000, and will be constructed at Fairview. It will include a double-decked warehouse—the only one in British Columbia—and full equipment for handling cargo.

It is also altogether likely that the G. T. P. will build another coastwise pier, 1000 feet long, to handle coast traffic. The expectation is that 750,000 cases of Alaska salmon will be handled at Prince Rupert this year, and the company is making this preparation to handle it.

AUSTRALIAN AVIATORS ARE PROBABLY LOST—NO WORD OF THEM HAS BEEN RECEIVED

London, May 20.—(Noon.) There is no news of the Australian aviators and it is thought that they have been lost, unless they have been picked up in any of the smaller coasting boats. The sea is being thoroughly searched for any trace of them.

London, May 20.—London spent yesterday in tense suspense waiting the result of Hawker's bold attempt to fly across the Atlantic and after a day of anxious inquiries and unverified rumors, and speculations the fate of the gallant aviators Hawker and Grieve was still unknown. The fate of Hawker and Grieve cannot be definitely stated and last night it was impossible even to assert that the machine found at sea was Hawker's.

The weather off the Irish coast Monday was boisterous with rain and haze. The Admiralty has sent out all the ships possible to search for the aviators.

Washington, May 20.—The steamship Iona picked up the United States airship N. C. 1 in the ocean near the Azores. The N. C. 3 is still missing and N. C. 4 is still at Azores.

Ponta Delgada, Azores, May 20.—The N. C. 1 fell into the sea two hours outside the islands. The airship carried a crew of six men and 1,650 gallons of gasoline.

St. John's, May 20.—Two aviators were injured when the Martinside plane in an attempt to make a get away on Sunday.

New York, May 20.—There is an unofficial report that the Hawker machine has arrived at Ireland.

London, May 20.—Hawker and his companion have not been officially heard from since starting on their daring night.

ALDERMEN GET WARMED UP AND MAKE CHARGES

**Alderman Rochester Complains of
A Vote Being Railroaded
Through at Former
Meeting.**

A somewhat heated discussion took place at the Council meeting last night over the action of the Council at a previous meeting in increasing the salary of T. C. Duncan, superintendent of utilities. So warm and personal was the discussion that the mayor had to request aldermen to address the chair and not talk across the room to each other.

The matter was introduced by Alderman Rochester who said he understood that the Utilities Committee had recommended an increase to \$250, and when it came to the Council it was changed to \$275.

Alderman McRae, chairman of the committee, said they were undecided as to the amount, but when they met a second time they were unanimous in regard to the recommendation.

Alderman McMeekin said the utilities had been put on a paying basis and the superintendent should be well paid for it.

Rates Were Raised.
Alderman Casey remarked that the paying basis was reached by raising the rates. He thought \$275 rather much of an advance, at least \$25 too much, but he supposed the aldermen had their eyes open when they did it and he would not take any further action in the matter.

Alderman Perry referred to the superintendents at Anyox and Ocean Falls each getting \$300 and a free house.

Alderman McRae said that Mr. Duncan was earning \$275 and they should pay it to him. When he had left the employ of the city the profits dropped and when he returned the profits increased. He was a good conscientious worker and was doing good service. They were not paying him more than he earned.

PROPERTY LOSS IN BIG FIRE AT EDMONTON

Damage Yesterday Afternoon is Estimated at \$35,000 in South Side of City.

Edmonton, May 20.—Property loss resulted from a wind-swept fire on the south side of the city. The damage will exceed \$35,000. Blackened shells of offices and charred piles of debris representing a property loss of at least \$35,000 are the aftermath of a fire which swept its way through a portion of the business section on Whyte Avenue Monday afternoon and was only checked by the herculean efforts of the entire fire fighting equipment of the city after it had developed into one of the most dangerous and damaging fires in the history of the south side. The origin of the fire is a mystery.

We in British Columbia are on the border line between the Occident and the Orient and the Oriental question is naturally a very important one here.

CHARGED THAT LIQUOR BEING SOLD OPENLY

Alderman Kirkpatrick Brings Up Matter at City Council Meeting.

When the business of the City Council was completed last night Alderman Kirkpatrick spoke of the way in which the prohibition law was being carried out. Individuals in this city had voted for prohibition in order to protect themselves from the temptation to take liquor, but they could get it here now and said that they are worse off than ever. They allege that they can buy drink anywhere. It was being stated that this was the worst town on the coast. Liquor was being sold openly. She was told that anyone could get whisky by asking for it. Signs were up in the windows when there was a stock in.

Defends City.
The mayor said he knew liquor was being sold. People who read the signs of which Mrs. Kirkpatrick spoke would be doing their duty as citizens if they reported to the proper quarters. He attached no importance to the suggestion that this was the worst town. Statements such as this were easy to make. From the amount of business being done in the stores since prohibition came into force he felt assured that things were not as bad as they were. He did not hope to see the time when there would be no drink around. The police always came in for a good deal of censure. As chairman of the police commission he knew it was difficult to put a stop to selling. This talk about a worse city than other places, however, was so much piffle. The British born were not in a majority here and the ideals of the others were not the same as ours. For a new frontier city we were well off. Conditions were not as they ought to be but he was confident they were not as bad as they were said to be.

Alderman Kirkpatrick said that men knew where to go and she thought it a pity it should be so. Alderman Casey dryly remarked that the beer he got in Vancouver was better than that sold here.

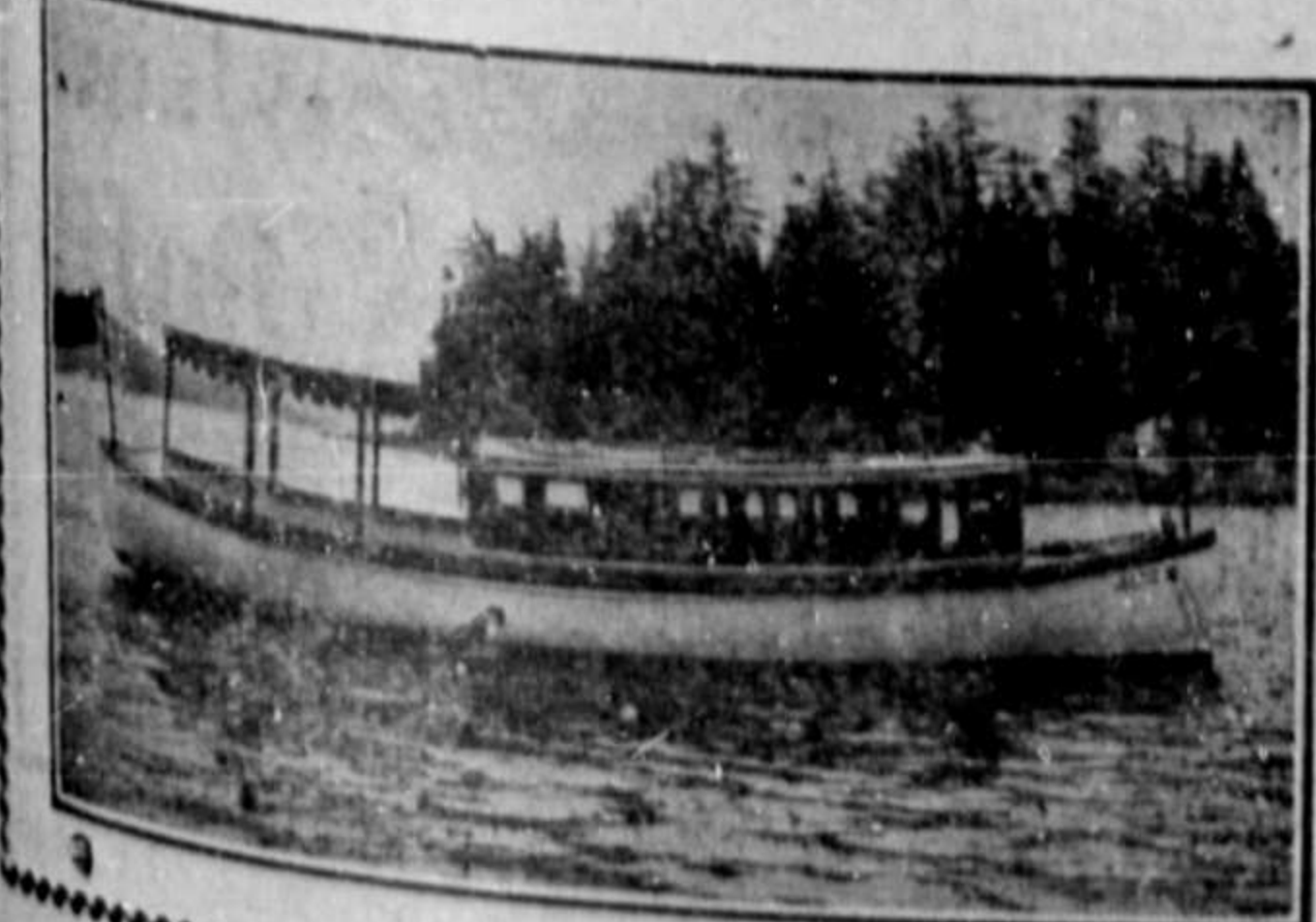

EMPLOY MANY RETURNED MEN IN FISHERIES

Inspector Williams Tells of Work Being Done in This Fisheries District.

J. T. C. Williams, inspector of fisheries, who arrived on the afternoon of Saturday after visiting all the salmon fisheries in the southern portion of his district, says that returned soldiers are applying for gill-net licenses in all portions of the district, and provision has been made to supply these men with boats and nets and the arrangements made by the inspector in each of the areas visited have proved very satisfactory. The returned soldiers, fishermen and all interested have expressed themselves as entirely satisfied.

Gill Net Licenses.

On the Skeena river this year one hundred and twenty-seven salmon gill-net licenses are reserved for returned soldiers, and these will be held until the 1st of June. The reason for such reserve being made is that returned soldiers who take out licenses by June 1 up to the number stated may have no difficulty in obtaining a boat and net. In the event of a returned soldier being unable to take out a license before June 1 then the inspector will endeavor to arrange for him to obtain a license if he so desires.

Employing Returned Men.

Clearing streams of obstructions to the ascent of salmon to their spawning grounds is another work that is already under way, and parties of returned soldiers are being employed in different parts of the district to carry out this work. This not only gives employment to returned men but is also of the greatest importance to the fishing industry.

Thirty returned soldiers are employed in this district on patrol work alone, exclusive of those employed in hatcheries, or in the removal of obstructions, etc. The employment of a number of men is made possible by the increase of license fees, all of which will be expended on the fisheries of the province.

Herring Pounds.

Pounds for herring fisheries have been established and permission given to some of those desiring to participate in this industry for the purpose of providing live bait for halibut fishermen. It is believed that this will prevent the shortage of bait that has been so detrimental to the halibut fisheries.

Extension of the weekly close season for salmon gill-net and seining fisheries has been extended six hours, and instead of running from six a. m. on Saturday to six p. m. on Sunday, the weekly close season will commence at four o'clock on Saturday morning and terminate at ten o'clock on Sunday night.

The prospects for packers and fishermen in all branches of the fisheries in District No. 2 are brighter, and it is believed if
