He told his hearers that he favored the admission of Orientals to this province under proper conditions. What he was apparently meaning was that as long as there was ignorance and a low standard of living in any country of the globe there could not be complete freedom in any other. No nation can live to itself any more than can any person live to himself. The policy of hedging the country in and picking the immigrants may be all right as a temporary policy, but eventually all nations have to be

educated up to the others and their standards of living raised else there can be no true democracy.

To bring about a condition like that mentioned is of course ideal. It is only necessary to travel through Asia to see how immense is the gulf between those countries and ours. Only the want. "While Japan is further advanced than any of the other countries, judging from appearances, even there the life of the people is crude and in China it is repulsive. 



How Returned Men Can Decome farmers

DVERY returned man who wants to become a farmer and is qualified for that vocation can get real, practical help through the Soldier Settlement Board.

The Government's programme includes:-

- (1) The securing of land.
- (2) The loaning of capital needed to purchase equipment and live stock, and erect buildings.
- (3) Agricultural training and farm supervision.

The Loans Granted

Loans may be approved by the Loan Advisory Committee, according to the needs of the settler, on the following basis:-

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land.
- (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements and other equipment.
- (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings and other permanent improvements.

The first and third are repayable in twenty-five equal annual instalments; the second in four equal annual instalments beginning the third year, no interest being charged for the first two years.

On all these loans the low interest rate of five per cent. will be charged. A cash payment of ten per cent. of the purchase price will be required on the land-but this may be waived by the Board in special cases.

Qualified settlers on Dominion lands may secure loans up to a maximum of \$3,000 on a plan similar to the above for farm equipment, live stock, and erection of buildings, provided security offered justifies the loan.

To Whom Granted

To be entitled to these privileges a man must have served with an honourable record in the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war or outside of the country in which he enlisted (service in U.S. or Bermuda not included). Others eligible are:

A British subject who lived in Canada before the War and who was on active service with the Allied Forces in an actual theatre of war.

A member of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who served in Canada only, but is in receipt of a pension for disability occasioned by such service.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

A Broad Policy

All soldiers whose best interests will be served by taking up farms will be assisted. Only suitable land will be approved. That is (a) land that is near to existing railways or organized communities; (b) land that will make money for the soldier; (c) land that will provide a first-class home.

In addition to these advantages the Board has planned a system of collective purchase, so that it can guarantee settlers the best value obtainable anywhere in live stock, implements, lumber, and other needs. It will also assist soldier settlers with advice and supervision, if necessary, in the management of their activities, so that the best results will be obtained.

J. T. C. Williams, inspector of fisheries, who arrived on the WANTED - Girl for housework. afternoon of Saturday after visiting all the salmon fisheries in the southern portion of his district, WANTED — Teamster, Lindsay applying for gill-net licenses in all portions of the district, and WANTED-Room for single man, provision has been made to supply these men with boats and nets and the arrangements made by the inspector in each of the areas visited have proved very satisfactory. The returned soldiers, fishermen and all interested have expressed themselves as entirely satisfied.

Gill Net Licenses.

On the Skeena river this year one hundred and twenty-seven salmon gill-net licenses are reserved for returned soldiers, and these will be held until the 1st of June. The reason for such reserve being made is that returned soldiers who take out licenses by June 1 up to the number stated may have no difficulty in obtaining a boat and net. It is believed that this will prevent the shortage of bait that has been so detrimental to the halibut fisheries.

Extension of the weekly close season for salmon gill-net and seining fisheries has been extended six hours, and instead of running from six a. m. on Saturday to six p. m. on Sunday, the weekly close season will commence at four o'clock on Saturday morning and terminate at ten o'clock on Sunday night.


