## THE STRIKE SITUATION AT WINNIPEG IS BECOMING MORE ACUTE EVERY DAY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Winnipeg, May 22.—The hardships of the strike orders are being felt more every day and are becoming more acute. There is no water in any of the buildings above the first story and in the event of a fire there would be great danger. It is also feared that the resultant sanitary conditions may prove a menace to the community.  
Motor cars are pretty well tied up and gasoline may only be secured by permit from the strike board, the decisions of which are arbitrary.  
Business is practically paralyzed and many people, who are able to do so, are leaving the city. The work of the farmers and others throughout the district is being badly handicapped through the failure of feed and other supplies to come through.  
None are being inconvenienced more than the workingmen who find it difficult to carry on, and many of whom are already feeling the loss of steady income, storekeepers being loath to give credits to men who are out of work.

## STRIKE VOTE TO BE TAKEN AT EDMONTON

Workers to Decide Whether They Will Down Tools on May 26.

Edmonton, May 22.—The labor men of this city are considering a general strike. For some time past the matter has been mentioned in labor circles, but the Winnipeg trouble has brought it to a focus and as a result the following resolution was passed by the central labor body last night.  
"That the executives of all the local unions be notified to take a strike vote, the said strike to take place Monday, May 26, at 11 a. m., and the result of such voting to be returnable by Sunday, May 25, at 3 p. m., and that a copy of this resolution be sent to all labor organizations through the Prime Minister of Canada."

## BONE DRY ACT PASSES COMMITTEE AND IS REPORTED BACK UNCHANGED TO DOMINION HOUSE OF COMMONS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, May 22.—There is to be no amendment to the liquor Act this year. That is the decision of the Dominion Government as expressed in the House of Commons.  
Hume Cronyn advocated the permitting of the manufacture of beer in Ontario for export in committee and the matter was discussed at some length, but was defeated and eventually the "bone dry" bill was reported to the House of Commons unchanged. This means that for a year at least there will be no transfer of beer, alcoholic cider or spirituous liquor transferred from one province to another except on the order of the provincial governments.

**GERMANS GET MORE TIME TO SEND REPLY**  
Today at Noon Was Original Time Set for Receiving Suggestions.

Paris, May 22.—An extension of time for replying to the peace terms, which originally was to have expired at noon Thursday, was granted at the request of the Germans who advanced the plea that more time was required in order that they might formulate arguments of such importance and length that, were the original date adhered to, it would be impossible to complete them. Thus the time has been set forward to Thursday, May 29.

It was a close run and the final score of 8 to 7 is an indication how things were going. If the chaffeurs tune up the machine a little, they will probably win the next time.

## COLONEL PECK RECOUNTS DEEDS OF VALOR DONE BY THE MEN OF HIS BATTALION

HAD REASON TO BE PROUD OF FINE SOLDIERS WHO WENT FROM HERE AND WHO STOOD AGAINST FINEST TROOPS OF EUROPE

There was a great night at the Central Hotel last night when the two Victoria Cross men, Lieut.-Col. Peck and Captain John McGregor were entertained at a banquet by the veterans. The boys who had fought side by side in the trenches sat together at the banquet table and sang the old songs and heard tales of the old days. Peter and Mrs. Black provided a splendid repast and all enjoyed themselves to the utmost, with Tom Silversides presiding as toastmaster.  
The feature of the evening was the address by Col. Peck, who recounted the deeds of the men he had led. He told of their organization here before leaving, of the pride he took in leading a band of men from a pioneer country like this and of the great inspiration it was to associate with them. They were not perhaps as polished as in some parts of the country, but they were great strong men, ready to compete in industry or to wrestle with nature. He had led forth a little band of such men from this town and others followed to engage in the noble work. All the men who went with him were good fellows. He had known them as fine warm-hearted men, but no one knew what they would do when they met the finest troops in Europe.  
**Reason for Pride.**  
The Colonel told of their training at Victoria and in England, and of their fear lest the war would be over before they had a chance to take part in it. When they met the enemy and took part in the victories of Vimy, of Hill 70 and of Passchendaele the horrors of which would never be erased from their memory, when these great troops went forth time and time again under terrible perils it was easy to see what reason he had to be proud of them.  
Later they took part in Foch's great shock army which broke the spirit of the German people until the final tramp when they marched into Germany. He recounted briefly the whole story of the regiment and said that the men had always been found doing their duty and performing great deeds of valor on the field of battle.  
**Envied Capt. McGregor.**  
Colonel Peck said he was glad to be associated with Captain McGregor. The only thing he was sorry for was that he had been too old to start in the ranks himself. In his battalion no less a number than 175 had been produced.

Country Must Have  
Real Freedom.

When mention was made at the soldiers' banquet last night of the great fight for the peace of the world, what naturally came to mind was whether we were to have the peace which had been mentioned.

In Winnipeg and Calgary they are having anything but peace just now. The seeds of revolution are being sown throughout the country. Not but what some changes would be advantageous. Want and poverty and distress must go, insofar as it is humanly possible to get rid of them, or the sacrifices of the men in France and Flanders will have been in vain. There must not, however, come in place of the old condition a condition of anarchy where every man is a law to himself, and where the weak will be bound to suffer.

Political fights we must have, social fights there will sure to be, but there must be reasonable bounds to the ambitions of those who would stir up trouble. Men are in the humor for changes, but there must be a limit, or all sorts of injustice and suffering will follow. There has been enough of bloodshed across the sea and leaders at home will be well advised if they keep within reasonable bounds.

In this great west there are opportunities for everyone. There is such a great country here that everyone has room to expend his energies on the development of the natural resources. There is plenty of work to be done. There is a shortage of almost everything in the world owing to war conditions. As long as there are safeguards against any getting an inordinate amount of the riches of the country, the thing to do is turn our attention to producing.

Rehabilitating Will  
Take a Long Time.

The immense losses in men as a result of the war, attention to which was drawn at the banquet last night, must have a great effect on the world's supply of raw material and manufactured goods for many a year to come. It means that so many producers have been removed. The places of these men have been taken largely by women. For years to come many men and women will be engaged in rehabilitating the people of France and Belgium. This will make employment for immense numbers in every country.

At present prices of almost everything are increasing, largely because of the increased price of labor. The scarcity of food and material accentuates the condition and doubtless there are some profiteers who are taking advantage of the condition. There are profiteers even in Bolshevik Russia, men who are getting more than their share of the good things of the world.

Providing Work  
For Discharged Men.

The number of soldiers discharged in British Columbia is expected to be double the number that went away. It is an opportunity for many easterners to come west and locate. It will make the problem of taking care of returned men a difficult one.

So far as Prince Rupert is concerned all the returned men have been found employment of some kind and most of them are satisfied. The city and district has taken care of a number of outsiders as well as men who went away from here.

British Columbia has the resources if only they were developed, but unfortunately owing to the unrest and labor difficulties few people care to invest money in any new enterprises. They do not feel safe. It is better to keep the money in their pockets than to put it into development work.

If there were a feeling of security many people would invest and there would be plenty of work for everyone, but, unfortunately that is not the case. It is possible that in time things will settle down on some more solid basis, but in the meantime there is nothing to do but carry on.

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

moted from the ranks. This was a great war for democracy and on that account he would like to have risen from the ranks like Capt. McGregor.

Discussing the returned soldiers, the Colonel said all they wanted was a reasonable chance to make a living, not to be pampered and petted. Who were entitled to positions that were going? If it had not been for the soldiers there would have been no jobs to give. Had the Germans won they did not know what might have happened. There was a time when all the world gave up hope except the army at the front. Their hearts were beating strong and the men were Johnny-on-the-spot. Those boys together with those who slept in France and Flanders had kept the world from a military tyranny. He looked forward to the time when the men who had fought would be incorporated into civil and industrial life of the country.

#### Capt. McGregor.

Capt. McGregor said he was sorry he could not reply in an eloquent speech. He appreciated the feeling which had prompted them all the same and he felt he owed the city of Prince Rupert a debt for the way in which he had been received back here. For five years he had lived between this city and Hazelton, making Prince Rupert his rendezvous and now he found that he had more friends than he ever dreamed of. In reference to decorations, which had been spoken of so much, the personal satisfaction of having had a cut at the Boche was worth more than all the decorations.

The toast to the guests of honor was proposed by Tom Silversides and seconded in neat speeches by Tommy Brewer and Jack Cargill. There were also speeches by Jimmie Neville, Lieut. R. L. Roberson, R. N. R., E. H. Shockley, Dr. N. M. McNeill and Canon Rix.

#### Canon Rix.

The Canon said that the men who had died had not died in vain. They had given us an opportunity to work out our destiny. Some men had gone to fight for an ideal others had gone because they had red blood in their veins, but it was not long before they had learned the ideal. The lives that had been given were a real sacrifice for the peace and liberty of those behind.

Canon Rix said that the soldiers in Rupert had never been unfair or foolish. They had been among the best citizens. They had been rather hilarious when the peace had been declared, but that was excusable. He had been tempted to be hilarious himself. He advised the men against government positions, saying that it was better to be independent. He spoke feelingly of those who had gone and said that out of the dead ashes the world would rise to better things.

Among those who contributed songs were Sam Massey, Tom Black, Slim Durham, Mrs. Phillips, Col. Peck, and Scotty Dennis entertained with recitations.

### WESTHOLME OFFERS GREAT PROGRAMME

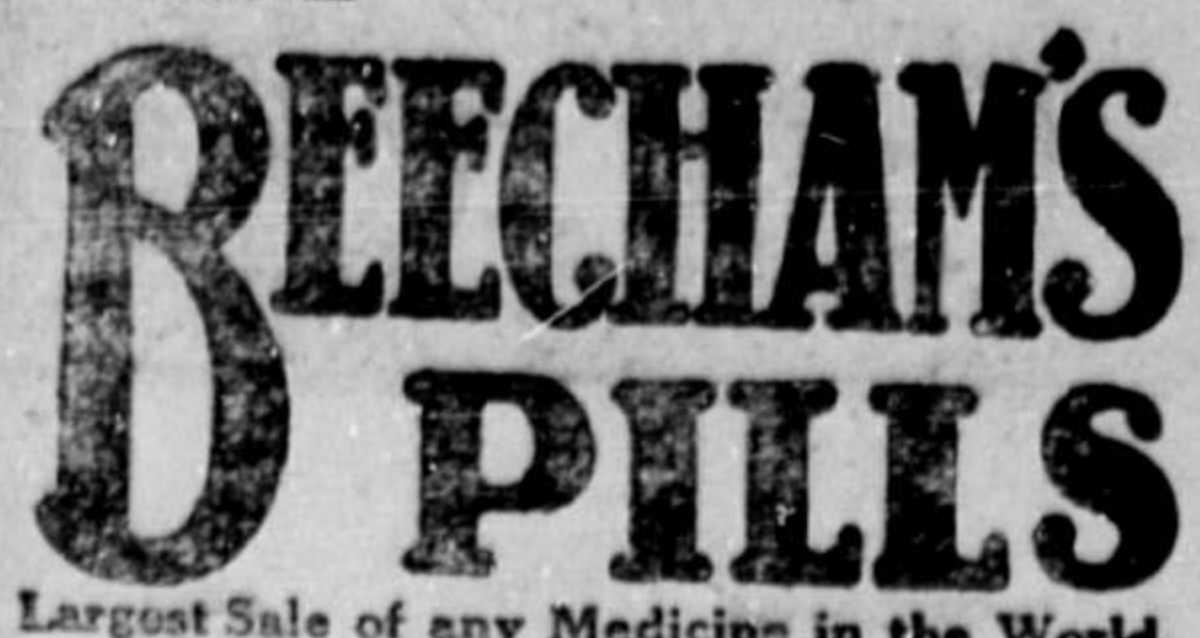
"The Fighting Roosevelts," a Life Story of America's Popular President is Big Draw.

#### SYNOPSIS OF

### LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such portions of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

**20,000,000 DEATHS FROM WAR CAUSES**

Canon Rix Tells Soldiers at Banquet of Tremendous Toll From Various Countries.

As a result of the war it is calculated that there have been 20,000,000 deaths, and of that number Canada gave a goodly share, according to figures given at the soldiers banquet last night by Rev. Canon Rix. A number of statistics which he quoted were very interesting. Even soldiers, he said, did not understand the immense losses which had taken place.

In Great Britain alone there were 1,000,000 killed and missing—the total casualties for Great Britain being 3,049,000; in France the casualties were 4,762,000 with nearly 1,500,000 killed; German casualties, 7,000,000; Russian, 7,000,000; Austria, 5,250,000; the United States, 237,000. The Canadian casualties were 280,000 out of 400,000 who went overseas, these figures showing that Canada was often the spearhead of the armies.

The Canon spoke of the splendid work of the British Guards who went into action with 16,000 men and their ranks had to be replenished again and again. They lost no less than 14,000 killed and 30,000 total casualties. There were battalions from which only 125 officers and men returned after an engagement.

Besides the army casualties there were those abominable deaths of thousands and tens of thousands of civilians, men women and children who had been victims of Hun rapacity, making in all, it was estimated, something like twenty million deaths during the war.

Interest at the rate of five per cent. will be charged.

The qualifications of all applicants are investigated by an Agricultural Qualification Committee, composed of men of superior standing, who understand the farming business. All applicants are required to appear in person before the Committee in their district.

# SOME ENTRANTS IN FLYING COMPETITION

## Britishers Are Experienced Airmen Each With a Record of His Own.

Everyone is interested in the Atlantic air flight for the Daily Mail prize and in the men who dare the dangers of the long passage across the ocean. In view of this it will be of interest to learn something about the Britishers who are taking part in the competition. The entries from the Royal Aero Club were:

Martinsyde, 100 miles per hour—F. Raynham, pilot.  
Fairy, 120 miles per hour—S. Pickles, pilot.

Short, 95 miles per hour—Major J. C. P. Wood, pilot.  
Sopwith, 100 miles per hour—H. G. Hawker, pilot.  
Whitehead, 115 miles per hour—Capt. A. Payne, pilot.

### Pilots With Records.

The contest has interested the most famous pilots and aeronautical constructors. Sydney Pickles, Harry Hawker (both Australians) and F. Raynham were prominent in air navigation before the war, and Major J. C. P. Wood, who will pilot the Short-Rolls-Royce biplane, has a fine record in the Royal Air Force.

Capt. C. W. F. Morgan, R. A. F., assistant pilot and navigator of the Martinsyde-Rolls-Royce biplane, lost his right leg just below the knee in the war. Capt. Morgan, however, says his artificial limb does not hamper him in the least when flying, and he "can even jazz on it."

Sydney Pickles, pilot of the Fairey-Rolls-Royce biplane, in July, 1913, was piloting his mother from France in a seaplane when the engine failed over the Channel, but refusing assistance from a steamship he repaired the engine on the water and "taxied" into Folkstone.

Mr. Pickles learnt to fly in a Bristol "school" biplane and flew

the earliest types of Caudron, Grahame-White, and Handley-Page machines. Since then he has flown nearly every type. He was married in 1916 to Miss A. R. E. Marks, of Hampstead, and shortly before the wedding took his fiancé up to a height of over 10,000 feet.

Capt. Arthur Payne, the first British entrant, has had some remarkable escapes. While flying over the lines in France he was hit in the head by shrapnel and fell several hundred feet before regaining control of his machine.

Major Wood is probably the youngest airman in the competition. His early experience was in the East African campaign, and afterwards he was on the western front, where he gained the reputation of being "a very stout pilot." He has flown over 1,000 hours in service flights.

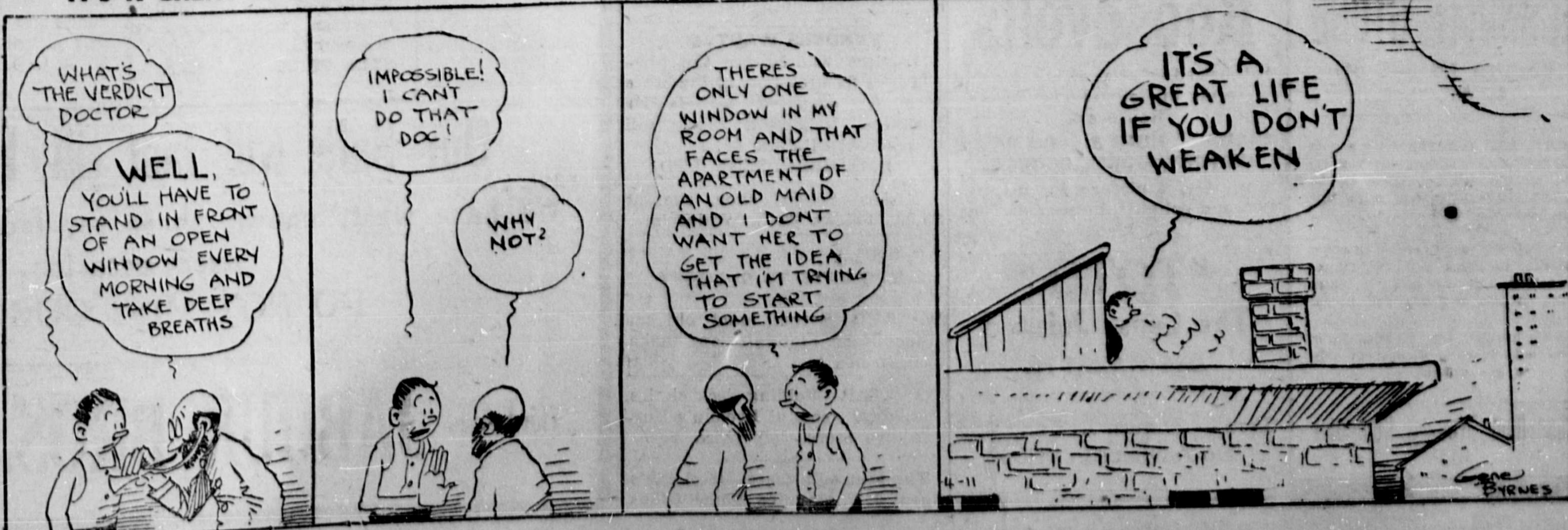

**BISMARCK THE BEAST AS SEEN BY BOYD**

Among the many notable personages to whom Frank M. Boyd introduces us in "A Pelican's Tale" are Moltke and Bismarck, both of whom Mr. Boyd saw in a State procession in Cologne in 1881. Moltke "was a very curious looking old man with a dull red face lined with thousands of wrinkles. He had no eyelashes or eyebrows, and the fair hair he wore on the top of his withered old face was his only right of purchase." He seemed to Mr. Boyd like "a singularly observant old owl."

Some trivial accident had upset Bismarck, and his face wore "an expression of absolutely pectial bad temper." Another characteristic of Bismarck's is illustrated by a story Mr. Boyd tells.

On one of the great Chancellor's visits to London he was taken over a brewery, where he was shown a huge glass which it was reckoned a feat to empty at one draught. Bismarck had it filled with specially strong ale, and emptied it twice. A few minutes later he observed, "I am droonk," an insisted on being led to the Thames Embankment—not to drown himself, or history might have been different—but to sit down and look at the river. After two hours' contemplation of "al-laying Thames," or as much as he could see of it through the rim of his hat, he rose and walked to his carriage without assistance.
