GOVERNMENT IS LIKELY TO TAKE OVER GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY IN NEAR FUTURE

**SUGGESTED BY OTTAWA CORRESPONDENT THAT ACTION
WILL BE TAKEN WITHIN FIVE OR SIX WEEKS—MUCH
MONEY TO BE SPENT ON WESTERN SECTION
WHEN SETTLEMENT IS REACHED**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, May 23.—(By mail). The general impression prevails here in Government circles that the Grand Trunk Railway and the Grand Trunk Pacific will be taken over by the Dominion Government within the next five or six weeks.

There is always the possibility that the Grand Trunk may make an offer to the Government that may be considered a better deal than for the Government to take over the whole system, but any such proposition will have to be very attractive or it will not be considered, as the Government seems bent on nationalizing the road.

Hon. Dr. Reid, Minister of Railways, has on several occasions expressed the determination of the Government to secure the road if it is possible to do so, and other ministers have been equally outspoken.

Government reports received here in connection with the G. T. P. are to the effect that a large sum of money must be spent on the western section of the road in renewing ties and generally improving the condition of the road and making other improvements. This cannot be commenced until the future of the road has been decided upon.

LOUIS ROSS GETS FINE OF \$300

Bill Keeper Found Guilty Yesterday Afternoon.

The trial of Louis Ross who was charged with keeping an illicit still on Comox Avenue was continued yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock in the police court before Magistrates T. McClymont and W. E. Collison, with W. E. Fisher for the prosecution and L. W. Patmore for the defence. The accused was found guilty and fined \$300 or six months in jail in case of default.

MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE VISITS CITY

Hon. E. D. Barrow Pleased with Progress Being Made in Farming Communities of Central B. C.

Hon. E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture in the Oliver Government, was here last night on his way to Victoria after having visited the farming communities along the line of the G. T. P. Arriving on the train he was met by Alex. Manson, M. P. P., and he took occasion to meet a number of Prince Rupert people at the ball last night at the Prince Rupert Club, where he remained until shortly before his boat left for the south.

Settlement Areas.
Mr. Barrow expressed himself well pleased with the progress made in settling the country. He said that many people were already coming in and that steps were being taken to increase the number. Two new settlement areas would be declared within a short time, one near Prince George and the other at Vanderhoof, and what was more important still, the Government was about to put into force the provisions of the bill passed at the last session of the Legislature which gave them power of compulsory purchase within the settlement areas.

Advanced Steps.
In the two areas already defined in which there was already considerable settlement they were about to take over the lands which they had been unable to secure by negotiation and to pay for them the value set by assessors. These lands would all be open for settlement, and he expected would be quickly taken up. Mr. Barrow is very optimistic over the future of agriculture in the north, especially of the stock farms which have been aided by the Government in the matter of purchasing stock and selling to settlers on terms. He sees a great future ahead of the industry which is the most stable of any in the province.

LADY SHOT BY POLICEMAN AT POST OFFICE

Miss Moffat of Quesnel Victim of Infatuated Man Who Wants Her to Elope.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Quesnel, May 23.—A shooting assault, which narrowly escaped having a fatal termination, occurred here last Wednesday evening when Provincial Constable H. V. Harris, who has held that position here for more than two years, shot Miss Eveline Moffat, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Moffat, through the breast, the bullet lodging under the right shoulder blade.

At P. O. Wicket.

The affair occurred at the delivery wicket of the postoffice and after being shot the victim walked into the drug store with the statement that she was shot, and was immediately taken to the hospital where she was given treatment. In the meantime Harris, after the shooting, walked from the postoffice corridor into the drug store with the revolver in his hand, where he was disarmed, and then taken to the jail where he has since been confined under strict guard.

Chief Constable Aitken was immediately communicated with, at Clinton, and arrived here early next morning. He immediately took charge of the case, and after spending some time investigating laid a charge against Harris of attempted murder. The preliminary hearing will be before Magistrate Lunn and John Holt, P. J. The bullet which lodged in the shoulder of the victim has been removed and she is now said to be out of danger.

Created Stir.

The sad affair has created a great stir among the citizens, both of the principals being well known. The causes leading to the tragedy are veiled in mystery, although there are various rumors current. Principal of these rumors is that Harris had for some time been troubling Miss Moffat with his attentions and had at various times proposed that she elope with him. These proposals were treated as a jest by Miss Moffat, and on the evening of the tragedy it is stated Harris approached her at the post office, where she was employed, and demanded a reply to his importunities. Miss Moffat refused to listen to his proposals, whereupon he drew his revolver and fired.

Harris is a married man and has an invalid wife and little son.

MANHEIM CITIZENS BECOME PANIC STRIKEN AT IDEA OF OCCUPATION BY ALLIES

STORM MUNICIPAL SAVINGS BANK AND HOLD MEETING OF PROTEST AND OTHER DEMONSTRATIONS; ALLIES READY TO ADVANCE EVERYWHERE

Cologne, May 23.—It is said that the Allied troops everywhere are ready for an immediate advance into Germany should it become necessary.

Manheim, May 23.—Alarmed by the belief that Germany will not sign the peace treaty and that the Allies will occupy Manheim, citizens became panic stricken today and stormed the municipal savings bank. Many persons have fled. Large crowds later gathered and held protest meetings and other demonstrations which added to the general confusion in the town.

An official expression of regret has been published in Berlin that the people of Manheim appear to have lost their heads.

Pension Inequalities
Are Still Discussed.

The B. C. Veteran which is the official organ of the Great War Veterans' Association discussed the matter of pensions and cites some of the inequalities. It mentions that an officer suffering from occasional epileptic fits was given a pension of \$75 a month, and a private in an exactly similar case got \$10 a month. Most pensions are too low and some are so small as to be absolutely useless. When a man has lost part of his power in serving his country in the war he should be recompensed to that extent so that he may start on an even footing with the civilian. To handicap him because he was loyal to his country is a shame. To give a private less money than an officer just because he is a private is also a shame. We pretend to be a democratic people but that system is the antithesis of democracy.

Pensions may well be revised from time to time. If a man is suffering from shell shock or some nervous disorder brought on by war conditions it may be necessary to give him a considerable pension for some time. If he recovers, he no longer needs state aid. The average man would prefer to be independent of the state if possible.

Many Settlers for
Vacant Farm Lands.

The lands up the valley between here and Prince George are being taken up by new settlers who are coming in very fast and whose presence is having a stimulating effect on business at all points along the railroad. At Hazelton and Telkwa and many other points there is a steady stream of landseekers and the same is true at Prince George, where a settlement area is to be opened under the Land Settlement Act. Speaking of the conditions in the Nechaco valley the Vanderhoof Herald says:

"Never a week goes by without at least one car load of settlers' effects arriving in the Nechaco valley. This district is settling up remarkably fast, and the land is being cleared so rapidly that the eyes of the older timers are wide open with amazement. Every time our farmers motor into town they witness fresh areas of cleared land. At every point of the compass our new settlers are industriously building new homes and barns, and clearing the land."

Increased Powers for
Dealing With Land.

Hon. E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture, who was in the city last evening announced that the provincial government was about to take over the lands within the settlement areas. These lands will be sold to settlers on the terms and under the conditions set forth in the land settlement provisions and will prove a great stimulus to development in those districts.

Mr. Barrow is himself a farmer. Also he has done a good deal in helping the farmers of the lower Fraser to organize and to market their products. Being a practical man he looks at everything from a practical point of view and the result should be decidedly beneficial to the industry which he represents. He is very matter of fact and when he says that he is pleased with the progress being made in connection with land settlement it means that something is doing. He is not an artist with words but is rather a practical farmer with enough good common sense to be able to help other farmers. His visit to the farming communities along the G. T. P. should prove decidedly beneficial.

FARM LOANS for SOLDIERS



The Soldier Settlement Act

Purpose

To assist ex-service men who desire to make farming their permanent occupation, and who, it is considered, are qualified to make a success of the farming business.

Procedure

The returned soldier who seriously intends to adopt farming as his life work, and desires financial assistance to purchase land, live stock, and equipment, may, receive full information and instructions how to proceed from the representative of the Soldier Settlement Board in the district in which he resides.

Financial Assistance Available

Loans may be granted qualified settlers, according to their needs, on the following basis—

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land for agricultural purposes or the discharge of encumbrances;
- (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements, and other equipment;
- (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings.

Interest at the rate of five per cent. will be charged.

Who Are "Qualified"

The qualifications of all applicants are investigated by an Agricultural Qualification Committee, composed of men of superior standing, who understand the farming business. All applicants are required to appear in person before the Committee in their district.

Military Service.—Any person who served with an honourable record:

- (a) In the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war, or (except in U.S. or Bermuda) outside of the country in which he enlisted;

- (b) In the forces of any of His Majesty's Allies in an actual theatre of war if he was a British subject resident in Canada before the war;
- (c) In the C.E.F. in Canada only, if he is in receipt of a pension for disability occasioned by such service.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

Other Qualifications.—After an applicant's eligibility, from the standpoint of military service, is determined, the Committee will investigate his physical condition, general fitness, and agricultural experience. An applicant must satisfy the Committee that he is aware of the individual responsibility resting upon those who would engage in farming successfully, and that he has the required energy to carry on farming in a successful manner. A Qualification Certificate is issued to qualified applicants. Agricultural training is available for men who fail to receive a Qualification Certificate only through lack of sufficient practical farming experience.

All Qualified Men Assisted

The applicant, after securing a Qualification Certificate, may then apply to the Loan Advisory Committee for financial assistance. Should he desire to purchase land he may indicate the particular parcel of land which he desires to acquire. The Committee will appraise the land with regard to its agricultural possibilities, and if it is satisfactory and its value is in keeping with the financial requirements of the Act, the land may be secured.

Equipment

The Loan Advisory Committee also determines the amount of loan to be granted to the soldier settler for the purchase of live stock and implements, and the erection of necessary buildings in keeping with the settler's absolute need. The Soldier Settlement Board has made arrangements to secure these needs for the settler at specially low prices.

Supervision

The Soldier Settlement Board has a staff of agricultural advisers, whose duties are to promote the prosperity of the soldier settler by timely advice and assistance. It is also enlisting the co-operation of experienced and successful farmers, located near at hand, who will direct and assist the settler to make a success of his undertaking.

Special Transportation Rates

The Railway Companies of Canada have offered special rates to soldier settlers who travel for any of the following purposes:

- (a) First trip to appear before Qualification Committee, to work with farmer, to attend an agricultural school or to look for land;
- (b) To return to his home for the purpose of transporting his family or goods to his farm.

The rate will be allowed on the production of a certificate issued by the Soldier Settlement Board.

To the Editor:—
I have been looking for some abler pen than mine to take up the cause of the men who kept things going at home during the time when the others were away fighting. Many of them underwent many hardships, some losing all they had in the world through the stress of hard times and now, if they lose a job, they find it difficult to get another because every new job must go to a returned man. It does not matter whether our wives and families starve or not, the men who left during the bad time, whether they got to France or not, are given the first chance at everything.

There is no objection to the returned soldier being well looked after. We all want to do that, but in many cases he had his fun, he enjoyed the sport of the big game while we kept things going at home and sent all we had to spare above bare living expenses to provide him with comforts. There has never been any recognition of our services, although the monotony of the life during those dark days was about as bad as the active life on the battlefield dodging shells or constructing railways.

The soldier is getting plenty of glory and most of the jobs and I do not envy him for I have a job and I hope to keep it, but I know others not as lucky as I am and there is likely to be worse time to come unless we make a protest now.
