**PAPER PUBLISHED IN INTERESTS OF SUFFERING CITIZENS
HAS SCATHING FRONT PAGE EDITORIAL
DEALING WITH CONDITIONS
IN THAT CITY**

A copy of "The Winnipeg Citizen," a paper published in the interest of the citizens of the prairie capital during the strike, has just arrived and on its front page in large type is the following:

"The authorities have taken adequate measures to enable you to go about your work and business in safety.

"Workers are returning to their positions. Business houses are opening and the necessities of life are again within the reach of the people.

"The authorities assure you of adequate protection and advise you to go about business as usual.

"The Strike Committee is no longer able to intimidate citizens and prevent them getting the necessities of existence.

"Permission to Live" Cards Go.

"Permission to Live" cards are being removed from bread and milk delivery wagons. The wave of resentment against Bolsheviki legends required on these conveyances, "Permitted by Authority of the Strike Committee," has caused the late temporary government at the Labor Temple to order these "yellow tickets" taken off.

I. W. W. Ideals Don't Appeal to White Men.

"The tyranny of the five in control at the Labor Temple deprived us of bread, milk, fire protection, telegraph, telephone, mail and communication with the outside world. Is this your ideal of freedom and democratic government? Our opinions may differ about other problems of the day but we stand united against the I. W. W., Bolsheviki and Soviet Government.

"Let Us Settle the One Big Issue."

"Is every individual dispute between employer and employee to continue to disrupt the life of the whole community?"

"Fly your flag and let none forget what it stands for!"

"As you walk to work 'by permission of the Strike Committee' just think it over."

SEVENTY-FIVE BUSINESSMEN EXPECTED HERE

Board of Trade Excursion From Vancouver and Victoria Being Arranged.

A party of seventy-five business and professional men from Vancouver and Victoria are expected to visit Prince Rupert and the interior country during the course of summer. The excursion is being arranged and it is hoped that the city will have the opportunity to greet the visitors and show them what is being done here and what it is intended shall be done. The following letter from the Vancouver Board of Trade in connection with the outing has been received by President McCaffery of the local Board of Trade:

"At the suggestion of the Honorable the Minister of Lands, T. D. Pattullo, this Board in conjunction with the Victoria Board, is endeavoring to arrange a business man's excursion through certain parts of the upper country.

"We have suggested the following itinerary: Vancouver to Prince Rupert, Prince Rupert to Prince George, Prince George to the head of the Pacific Great Eastern and back to Vancouver.

"We are endeavoring to secure at least seventy-five men to take this trip—about fifty from Vancouver and twenty-five from Victoria. We have not yet decided upon the time but will do so shortly. I should like to feel that we have the co-operation of your Board and your citizens in the endeavor we are making to have this trip a success.

"As soon as I am able I will let you know when we purpose arriving in Prince Rupert so that you can make your own arrangements.

HALIBUT GOES UP TO FIFTEEN

On Few Select Lots of Fish Sixteen Cents Was Realized Yesterday.

Halibut has been gradually increasing in price from the low mark of nine cents a pound until it has in some small select lots been fetching as high as sixteen cents. As a result many boats that have been tied up on account of the low prices are again being operated and the amount of fish offered for sale here will increase accordingly. The average price paid yesterday for number one fish was slightly over fifteen cents. The following were the sales:

WONDERFUL FEAT OF ARMS OF CANADIANS OVERSEAS RECOUNTED BY COL. PECK

VERY INTERESTING ADDRESS BEFORE CANADIAN CLUB AT LUNCH ON SATURDAY AFTERNOON—ASSET OF BRAVERY, SAYS BISHOP BUNOZ

The wonderful feats of arms in which the Canadians took part were described by Lieut.-Col. Peck at the Canadian Club lunch on Saturday. His subject was "The War in 1918." After telling very briefly of the conditions which led up to the last campaign, the speaker told of the days when Paris was being shelled and when there had been reverses in the north. Then that great military instinct, General Currie, organized the wire protection in connection with machine gun battalions. The finest Bavarian troops were against them, but the Canadian positions were not attacked. The Germans had a good idea of the stamina of those troops.

In Shock Army.

Then the Canadians were put in Foch's great shock army. The Germans drove to within thirty miles of Paris and this army of Foch's was to the last defence. They were not needed for defence so they were used in the great blow which won the war.

France was in desperate straits. "I have a great admiration for those people. They were kindly and always ready to sacrifice anything to win the war."

The Colonel then told of the splendid work done by Major Gen. Jack Stewart in building light railways and giving the allied forces that mobility which was necessary. This helped a great deal in the final attacks.

Drove Germans.
The speaker told of the blow after blow that was struck, of the great Amiens fight which Ludendorff had said lost the war for the Germans. In that fight one division leap-frogged the other and drove the Germans before them.

How the Canadians broke the Queant line and overcame all difficulties and how the Germans gave up in shoals was told, and of the battle of Cambrai in which the Canadians took part and of the particular work of the Sixteenth in holding a position until the engineers came up with bridges and allowed the troops to pass. These were the strenuous days. After that it was a "perfect gentleman's war." The taking of Valenciennes was the final act in the drama. Few divisions had had a more enviable record than the Canadians.

Black Canadians.
Of the final march into Cologne and of the terror of the inhabitants who were expecting the "Black Canadians." As the Colonel said, "it was a great thing to be pouring through the city, silent, dignified and indifferent to the population. We showed them a great democratic army which had fought to make liberty and civilization safe again."

Judge Young presided and introduced the guest of the day in a neat speech. He also welcomed the representative of the G. W. V. A., Tom Silversides. They regretted that they had been unable to find Capt. McGregor to invite him.

Vote of Thanks.

In making a vote of thanks to the speaker, Bishop Bunoz said that the Canadian Club in honoring Col. Peck was honoring itself. The Canadians had left an imperishable name in France and Flanders and won for us great glory. They had acquired for Canada an asset of bravery. The Canadians had endeared themselves to the people among whom they had been billeted through

their fearless conduct and respect for womanhood.

School Children Make Good Showing.

Surprise was expressed Friday afternoon that there were so many children in town, as they marched through the streets, forming a line a quarter of a mile long. Splendid children they were, healthy and strong, giving mute evidence of the fact that this is a fine climate for young people.

Besides being numerous and healthy and strong the children were well behaved. Taking into consideration the conditions, the order maintained was wonderful and was a credit to teachers, children and parents. Even though some of the speeches were fired well over the youngsters' heads they did not seem to give way to mischief to any considerable extent in order to fill in the waiting time until they should hear something that would appeal to them.

On the whole the event was most successful and the Daughters of the Empire are to be congratulated.

Public Schools Basis Of All Education.

Seeing the little folks marching together with one purpose last Friday, called to mind that much of the work of the future citizens rests with the public schools, just as much as with the higher institutions of learning. It is the groundwork that counts. First impressions of school life are either discouraging or inspiring, and the junior teacher that can inspire a pupil sends his influence on along the course, through the high school and university and into the harder school of experience which comes later.

When pupils do well at the university it must be remembered that the public schools laid the groundwork, the high schools carried it on and the university professors did their part. Given a poor start, however, the chances are against the success of a pupil. There must be groundwork on which to build and this groundwork is laid in the lower school.

Women Taking Place of Soldiers.

"It is gratifying to know that Canada leads in the work of rehabilitating returned soldiers," says the Canadian Courier. "In this the soldier must help the employer—and vice versa. It is not necessary that returned men should go peddling sings and adhesive tape. Every employer should make room for a returned man whenever possible. Many employers are doing it. There are hundreds of women in homes who want maids, willing to pay good wages, and can't get them; thousands of girls who are holding men's jobs and keep the men out on the street. Some of these women are running elevators. The Labor Department should take a census of all women employed everywhere. As long as homes are destitute of needed help and men walk the streets looking for jobs we shall have to consider the advisability of taking returned men into the kitchens—where without doubt, many of them would soon be more efficient than the average maid of recent years. The employer who refuses to pay the difference between a girl's wages and a returned soldier's, and the returned man who wants a job but doesn't want to work at it, are both queering the game for other people."

Poor Attendance at Canadian Club Lunch.

It is a pity that the citizens did not feel it incumbent on them to attend in larger numbers at the lunch of the Canadian Club on Saturday in honor of Lieut. Col. Peck. Places were laid for nearly one hundred but very little more than half that number attended. The club is a representative public institution and it is most discouraging to make preparations and have no hearty response. The occasion was unique, the address was intensely interesting, but the attendance was most disappointing.

BUILD MORE SHIPS HERE SAYS PECK

Proposal to Construct Even Larger Vessels and to Operate Them From This Port.

INTERESTING ADDRESS BY LOCAL MEMBER

One of the proposals made to the Government by Newman Erb recently was that the Government should supply the places for a number of ships which Mr. Erb would build here and operate from this port. Some of the ships would be even larger than those which are now being laid down. We must have ships and it would not be a very big matter for the Government to stand the loss on the plates. This was part of the address to the Board of Trade at their meeting on Friday afternoon by Lieut.-Col. Peck, member for this district.

Colonel Peck outlined at some length his activities since he returned from France. Dealing with the fisheries the Colonel said he was wholly opposed to the monopoly in canneries. A monopoly was immoral in principle. Some of them talked loud but not as clear as he could wish. He moved a resolution of want of confidence in the late commission which was carried. Eventually they came to a compromise, but compromises did not settle things. Two-thirds of the fisheries were in this riding and it was his policy to break away from the south to be independent of the other members. It did not seem right for the tail to be wagging the dog.

Oriental Shipping.

The question of Oriental shipping was dealt with and the Colonel said that in company with Capt. Barney Johnson he had gone to Lloyds and found that the same insurance could be secured as from Vancouver and Victoria.

There was naturally a good deal of opposition to the development of this port. The delegation to Ottawa had done good. No statement of policy would be announced by the Government, however, until the road was taken over. Ocean docks would have to be built and the Alaska docks extended. He hoped to induce the minister to visit this city during the summer. Mr. Ballantyne was a broad minded man and if they could show him the condition it would be an advantage. He would see that the marine station, the quarantine station and everything necessary was here.

Local Improvements.

If the Government took over the line they should put on one or two boats in the Alaskan business. He was endeavoring to have the marine department separated from Victoria. He had already asked for a light at Alfred reefs, and dolphins at Metlakatla bar, where a survey was about to be made. He had also been looking over the site at Seal Cove where he was trying to have a dock erected. He was convinced that it was essential to the small fishermen where there had been a great development of the fishing industry.

Visit From Ministers.

There was a great many other points touched on indicating the activities of the member. He emphasized again the importance of getting the members of the Government, Mr. Ballantyne and Mr. Reid especially, to visit the port. He advised the Board of Trade to concentrate their efforts on the things they really expected to get. He looked to that body and to the city council for advice.

In introducing the speaker, President McCaffery congratulated the member on behalf of the Board for the part he had taken in the winning of the war, and also on his energy in connection with their affairs at Ottawa. It was satisfactory to have a member who lived here and who knew what we wanted.

G. W. Nickerson said it would be presumption to offer advice to one who had been intimately connected with the fishery business. The condition was, however, a disgrace to the country. One government had been as bad as another.

G. A. Woodland moved, and G. W. Nickerson seconded, a hearty vote of thanks to Col. Peck which was carried by acclamation.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS FELT ON ISLANDS

Spring Salmon Run Late at Queen Charlottes—Cannery Being Moved From Naden Harbor.

Masset, May 23.—An earthquake occurred at Graham Island on Sunday morning at 2:45, followed by a second shock at 3:15, both were of long duration, but no damage was done.

The spring salmon run is late this year. Few of the trolliers are making phenomenal catches. The boats are arriving on the grounds off Naden Harbor daily.

Several tug boats are engaged in towing logs and rafts from Buckley Bay, Port Clements and Sewell. One raft stranded on Masset bar, but the tow floated off during high water in a storm and was found by a boat from the Naden whaling station.

Nigel Sherwood and Jasper Amos, returned soldiers, returned to Masset after serving in the Canadian forces overseas for three years. Mr. Sherwood was accompanied by an English "war bride." Both were heartily greeted by their many old friends on Graham Island.

A force of men will remove the Naden Harbor cannery buildings from Virage Sound to the mouth of Woden river, preparatory to commencing operations during 1920. With a cannery, several sawmills in operation, and new wharves under construction, a busy year is expected.

Several parties are out along the west coast of Graham Island locating coal and oil, and prospecting for precious metals. With the mining work in progress at the south end of the islands, and the discovery of a number of good prospects in various localities, the coming summer may bring many surprises to the uninitiated outsiders, who know little of the possibilities of the vast territory lying almost at the doors of Prince Rupert.

FARM LOANS for SOLDIERS



The Soldier Settlement Act

Purpose

To assist ex-service men who desire to make farming their permanent occupation, and who, it is considered, are qualified to make a success of the farming business.

Procedure

The returned soldier who seriously intends to adopt farming as his life work, and desires financial assistance to purchase land, live stock, and equipment, may, receive full information and instructions how to proceed from the representative of the Soldier Settlement Board in the district in which he resides.

Financial Assistance Available

Loans may be granted qualified settlers, according to their needs, on the following basis—

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land for agricultural purposes or the discharge of encumbrances;
- (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements, and other equipment;
- (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings.

Interest at the rate of five per cent. will be charged.

Who Are "Qualified"

The qualifications of all applicants are investigated by an Agricultural Qualification Committee, composed of men of superior standing, who understand the farming business. All applicants are required to appear in person before the Committee in their district.

Military Service.—Any person who served with an honourable record:

- (a) In the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war, or (except in U.S. or Bermuda) outside of the country in which he enlisted;

SCHOOL PUPILS AT PATRIOTIC DEMONSTRATION

Great Gathering of Juveniles at Westholme Theatre Under Auspices of Daughters of the Empire.

The Westholme Theatre was none too large to hold the children that assembled there Friday afternoon for a patriotic demonstration under the auspices of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire. It was a great crowd of young humanity, each unit absorbing impressions, and the impressions should have a good effect.

Mrs. McLennan presided and with her on the platform were the regents of the local chapters, the chairman of the school board, the speakers and standard bearers with their flags.

Short addresses were given by L. W. Patmore, chairman of the school board, Rev. Dr. Grant, Rev. Canon Rix, Rev. Father McGrath, and Rev. W. W. Wright. Just as the last was speaking Lieut.-Col. Peck arrived and gave a short address. There was also singing of patriotic songs and Mrs. Jarvis McLeod sang alone and was given a hearty encore.

Colonel Peck.

Colonel Peck spoke of the grim and ghastly struggle through which they had passed and at the conclusion of which right had prevailed. It showed that no matter how well organized a nation could not win unless it had behind it the principle of right. He told of the wonderful patriotism of France that inflamed the whole population, young and old, and of the wonderful battlery, "France Must Live and Conquer." He hoped that if ever this country was put to the test she would exemplify her patriotism in the same way.

L. W. Patmore who was the first speaker mentioned the value of building up a national sentiment. In the United States the young people were taught to venerate the flag. It was this spirit that drove the hyphenate out of the country on the outbreak of war, and made it possible for her to meet the issue squarely. The greatest duty the teacher had was to instil in the pupils a love of country.

The Clergy.

Dr. Grant spoke of the immense size of the empire and of its great population, but her greatness consisted not in size or population but in the innate traits of character. The cross in the flag stood for sacrifice and service. It was this spirit which animated their two school fellows who lost their lives in the service of their country. Frank Holland and Jack Dowling. History taught us that the flag stood for service to country and service to God.

Canon Rix gave an interesting talk on the different flags of the empire illustrating the more important ones.

Father McGrath spoke of this Empire Day being a red letter day in the history of Prince Rupert. He commended the activity of the Daughters of the Empire in bringing out the children beneath the flag.

Rev. W. W. Wright spoke of the pride they all felt in their native land and of the desirability of standing by the old flag. He paid a tribute to the women of France who were worthy of emulation. He also spoke appreciatively of the Prince Rupert teaching staff.
