## HAWKER AND GRIEVE ARE RESCUED BY DANISH SHIP; IN WATER HOUR AND A HALF

MACHINE STOPPED BECAUSE OF ENGINE TROUBLE; AVIATORS ON WAY TO LONDON WHERE THEY SHOULD ARRIVE THIS EVENING

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, May 27.—The British Admiralty officially announced last night that the Danish steamship Mary had rescued the famous aviators Hawker and Grieve and that they were in perfect health. They were in the water only one hour and thirty minutes.

The machine stopped on account of the water filter in the feed pipe from the radiation being choked. The Mary was not equipped with wireless but she signalled the land station at Butt off the Hebrides. The Admiralty at once dispatched a fast torpedo boat destroyer which overtook the steamer and transferred both men, whom it is expected will reach London at seven o'clock Tuesday evening.

## CIVIL SERVANTS ASK RAISE IN SALARIES

At Meeting Last Night It Was  
Decided to Ask for 25 per  
cent Advance.

At a meeting of the Prince Rupert branch of the Civil Servants Association of British Columbia it was decided not to affiliate with other branches of labor until every other means of securing a raise of salaries had been exhausted. A resolution was passed recommending a raise of 25 per cent for all those whose salaries were less than \$150 a month. It was pointed out that no advances had been received since 1914.

E. S. Woodward, president of the Victoria Trades and Labor Council addressed the gathering on the advantages of affiliation. Mr. J. Ledlie presided and W. S. Fisher was appointed secretary in place of R. Scoble who has been transferred to the forest branch at Victoria.

## MEN LEAVE WORK AT THE SHIPYARD SLIPS

Employees of J. R. Morgan & Co.  
Quit Without Notice and Ask  
More Money.

Yesterday after lunch about 75 men employed by J. R. Morgan & Co. at the drydock left their work demanding an increase of pay from 50c. an hour to 65c. These are the muckers and laborers.

Mr. Morgan told The News that he had received no notice of the intention of the men to leave their work. As soon as they had eaten their lunches yesterday a small group told the foreman that they were not going to work any more unless their wages were increased to 65c. They then left. J. L. Mullen of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., who had let the contract to the Morgan Company, said last night that it would be impossible for them to continue the other work if the construction of the ways was held up. He would have to let out a lot of men almost immediately as it was useless continuing the construction work if they were to be delayed on the slips.

The men in notifying the employers that they were quitting said that they belonged to no organization and that no official action had been taken in connection with their decision.

## RED CROSS LIBRARY TO CLOSE

Unless Steps Taken at once to Provide for its Continuance.

The Red Cross Library is about to go out of business. The Red Cross Society closes its doors this week and there is no provision made for continuing the lending department. Mrs. Backus who has had charge of it will be leaving the city shortly and if the library is to be continued some permanent provision will have to be made.

It will be a great pity if the only library in town is to be closed. This is a town where something of the sort is badly needed for the wet days.

The Society is ready to sell the books. The 300 volumes could be purchased for about \$75 or \$80 and they would make a good nucleus for a city library. Possibly arrangements might be made to continue the use of the hut to house the books.

## REV. W. S. A. CRUX IS LEAVING ON JUNE 8

Place Will be Taken by Rev. T. H. Nuttall of Anyox.

Rev. W. S. A. Crux who arrived home on the last boat from Vancouver after attending the Methodist Conference at New Westminster, says that he will be leaving for the south on Sunday, June 8, and will preach his farewell sermon here on that day. His new field at North Vancouver is a large one and the church numerically strong.

Mr. Crux will be replaced here by Rev. T. H. Nuttall who has been in charge of the church at Anyox for the past two years. He is a graduate of Wesley College, Winnipeg, and for some time was a tutor at the college. He was ordained in Manitoba for special work and was received into full connection in this district.

Mr. Nuttall married Miss Eason a sister of Mrs. Ling and of Miss Josephine Eason of the local teaching staff, so that he comes here among friends.

Dr. Spencer, of Port Simpson, is the new chairman of this district.

There has been considerable unrest around town this morning over the strike situation and it is understood that a few people quit work on orders from their headquarters received last night. Most of the checkers at the dock are out and some of the clerks.

## APPLICATIONS FOR WEIGH CLERK JOB

A Returned Soldier With Wife  
Applies for Position Worth  
\$30 a Month.

Applications were read last night at the meeting of the City Council for the position of weigh clerk at the city scales. The applicants were P. Dawson, H. G. Hillard, P. J. Gibbons, and Henry J. Clerk. The last mentioned explained that he was a returned soldier who had received a gunshot in the leg. He was married and his wife would be here in a few weeks.

Some discussion took place as to whether a married man could live on the pittance allowed for this work. In summer there was hardly anything made over and above the \$30 allowed by the council. In winter the fees for weighing would not equal another \$30. This was not good enough to offer a returned soldier.

It was decided to refer the matter to the Finance Committee who could interview Clerk and explain the situation to him.

## CALGARY AND EDMONTON TIED UP BY A STRIKE IN SYMPATHY WITH WINNIPEG

UNIONS VOTED LARGE MAJORITIES FOR QUITTING WORK  
IN BOTH CITIES—WORK TO RESUME  
WHEN WINNIPEG TROUBLES  
ARE SETTLED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Edmonton, May 27.—The Labor Unions on Sunday voted three to one in favor of a walk out yesterday unless the Winnipeg strike was settled. As a result at 11 a.m. yesterday the street cars stopped and all business was tied up. Provision was made to continue the police and fire protection and light and water services were maintained.

Thirty-four unions favored the strike, four opposed and some never voted. It was announced by the unions that work would be resumed as soon as the Winnipeg difficulties had been solved.

Returned soldiers individually reported that they were opposed to strike action. They could not see why they should suffer at this critical stage of their re-establishment into civil life.

Calgary, May 27.—The Calgary unions voted four to one in favor of a strike to commence yesterday at 11 a.m. The essential activities such as the provision for police and fire protection and the delivery of milk and bread are being permitted. Hotel restaurants have been requested to remain on duty.

## FISH PRICES HIGHER TODAY

Average Price Paid to Fishermen  
Is 17 Cents per Pound for  
First Class Fish.

The price paid for halibut is still higher. Today seven boats sold their catches at 17.5 cents per pound for the best grade and 11.1 cents per pound for seconds. The catches were:

The Yellowstone with 16,000 lbs., and Alliance, 6,000, to Atlin Fisheries, Ltd. The Brothers with a catch of 22,000 sold to Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd.

The Royal No. 3, 3,000 lbs.; Advance, 10,000; M. M. Christopher, 5,000, and the Viola, 4,000, to Booth Fisheries, Ltd.

Salmon.  
Two salmon catches are in port but up till noon no sales were made. The catches are the Bingo with 650 lbs. and the Fiaber, 500 pounds.

Two catches of halibut were sold yesterday, the Senator with 45,000 lbs. to the Pacific Fisheries at 15.4c and 13.2c per pound, and the Reynold, 2,000, at 14c and 7c to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd.

Price of Labor Too High in This  
Country to Allow Shipbuilding  
to Continue.

Victoria, May 27.—It is announced officially here that the Foundation shipyard is to be dismantled as soon as the present contracts are completed and that the plant will be removed to France where the ships can be built cheaper than here. There are plenty of men in France needing work and they are willing to accept a reasonable wage.

The same applies to the other western yards of the Foundation Company at Tacoma and Portland where similar conditions obtain to those in this city.

## Bottom Depth Touched By Stayathome.

Editor The News.—In its reception to returned men Prince Rupert does not shine very well, but surely the bottom depth is touched when "Stayathome" grudges the ex-soldier the glorious privilege of getting a job. That there is plenty of work here for all does not appeal to him since he believes in the traditional policy of belauding the fighting man in wartime and starving him when the danger is past.

Your disgruntled correspondent has suffered so much during the war that I suggest that he and his fellow sufferers—there are others of his kidney—should be presented with the addresses of welcome originally designed for the men who are having the fun in France. These men apparently all basely deserted Prince Rupert during the bad times to live a life of riotous enjoyment "over there" on the comforts supplied by the gallant hero who bravely carried on and starved over here. If he truthfully states his share it will be found that he once by mistake paid a dime for a tag instead of a nickel and has ever since been sore.

## Was An Insult To Men Who Died.

The fact that the boys who were fortunate enough to come back minimize the horrors and emphasize the bright spots of their army life gives no feathered civilian the right to describe their experiences as fun. They have no wish to paint the horrors of war, which are inconceivable by any civilian and indescribable by any soldier, but the memories of their dead comrades, who fell among the mud and awful desolation of Flanders and on the chalky ridges of northern France, makes the suggestion of fun in that connection an insult, both to the men who died and to those who came back. A soldier had to laugh in the face of death; if he had not laughed he would have gone mad.

What hardships our civilian friend suffered we know not, since everyone seems to have enjoyed three square meals a day and a bed to lie on. Poolrooms and cabarets seem to have flourished in spite of there being a war on. In view of the sufferings and privations of the poor people of Belgium, Serbia, northern France and Italy, the people here lived in Paradise.

## Repatriated Civilians.

One of the strongest memories the boys have is that of the scenes on the Cambrai-Valenciennes-Mons roads, when the repatriated civilians were trudging back in search of what remained of their homes—mostly crumbled brick and mortar. Old grannies and granddads, frail women and toddling wee things ploughed bravely through the mud and the throng of advancing troops, pushing barrows and handcarts containing their all.

Notwithstanding the toil and the miserable conditions these people had smiles on their faces and thanks from their hearts to the men from far off Canada, for they felt that their night of sorrow was over and the dawn was at hand. These scenes brought tears to the eyes of many a hardened warrior and every man did his utmost to help the weary pilgrims on their way. And "Stayathome" talks of hardships in Prince Rupert!

## Men Who Joined Were Good Citizens.

The men who joined up were not bums nor men out of a job, but some of Prince Rupert's citizens who left business and good jobs when the call came. On ceasing to be soldiers it is to their credit that they so speedily resume their citizenship. "Nothing is too good for the soldier" was a common phrase during the war, and your correspondent agrees with the word if not with the spirit by wishing to offer less than nothing plus a little spite and jealousy.—"SCOTTY."

## THE TELEPHONE SYSTEM ALMOST REACHES LIMIT

Large Expenditure Necessary in Near Future if New Plant is Installed.

Prince Rupert is very near the limit in the number of telephones that can be installed and very soon new residents will be unable to have phones put in their homes. That was gathered from a discussion following a report on the telephone and lighting system by T. C. Duncan, superintendent of utilities, at the City Council meeting last night. That report showed that the present system had pretty nearly reached its limit.

The mayor explained that the matter had already been discussed by the committee and that it was not thought wise just now to install a new plant. A new system would mean the erection of a new building. The present system would stand another seventy phones, and it may be necessary to give business phones the preference and not allow any more residential phones very soon. He thought it better that a few should suffer inconvenience than that the city should be plunged into a tremendous expenditure. The matter would be again dealt with by the committee.

Alderman McRae said that the pipe line and dam at Woodworth Lake would have to be repaired as it was in bad condition. They had visited the place recently in company with the officials and found it as reported.

The report of T. C. Duncan, superintendent of utilities, for the year ending January last was a long one and dealt in detail with the work of his department and showed what improvements had been effected and savings made.

## MUSICAL SOCIETY IS RECOGNIZED IN SOUTH

Mrs. Dalby Morkill Gives Much Praise to Local Organization.

In view of the fact that the annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Musical Society is to be held tonight it will be of interest to have an outside opinion on their work. The following is from the Vancouver Province:

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for a title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

## MEDICAL AUTOCRACY

The injustice, cruelty and complete absence of the first principles of honor, to say nothing of the lack of loyalty recently exhibited by the medical examining board of our province, is such that it calls for a vigorous protest on the part of all fair-minded citizens for the elimination of this instrument of oppression. This can be done if sufficient pressure can be brought to bear upon the powers that be at the next session of the provincial legislature.

## A Glaring Example.

Let me give you but one instance of the outrageous injustice of this legally constituted board of autocratic medical practitioners. Dr. —, a graduate of the University of Manitoba of seven years' standing, who also passed the qualifying examination to practice in the province of Saskatchewan, left his practice and went to the front in his country's service. He spent nearly two years in active service doing excellent work in France. Upon his return he wished to live in our province and appeared before the provincial medical examining board.

This august body comprised some of less age and experience than the candidate, others not any better qualified and yet others not any better qualified who have never been in khaki, declared this man unfit for the practice of his profession in this province, when he is eligible for registration in Great Britain.

## Direct Insult.

Ye Gods! Was ever the "protection of the public" cry carried to a greater extent in absurdity? Was ever a greater insult given to the faculty of Manitoba University and the examining board of a sister province? Was ever a more direct insult given to the returned soldier or a greater farce played under the guise of examination test of efficiency?

These very men who set themselves up to test others, set themselves in opposition to a system that would test them every five years, if they continued to hold any worthy rank in the medical profession.

Coupled with this glaring instance of injustice we may note the fact that one more medical man has been prevented coming to the province while the Victoria Medical Society has given notice of increase of fees.

How long is the public willing to submit to such a condition that has been but inadequately hinted at in this letter.

# The Soldier Settlement Act

## Purpose

To assist ex-service men who desire to make farming their permanent occupation, and who, it is considered, are qualified to make a success of the farming business.

## Procedure

The returned soldier who seriously intends to adopt farming, as his life work, and desires financial assistance to purchase land, live stock, and equipment, may, receive full information and instructions how to proceed from the representative of the Soldier Settlement Board in the district in which he resides.

## Financial Assistance Available

Loans may be granted qualified settlers, according to their needs, on the following basis—

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land for agricultural purposes or the discharge of encumbrances;
- (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements, and other equipment;
- (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings.

Interest at the rate of five per cent. will be charged.

## Who Are "Qualified"

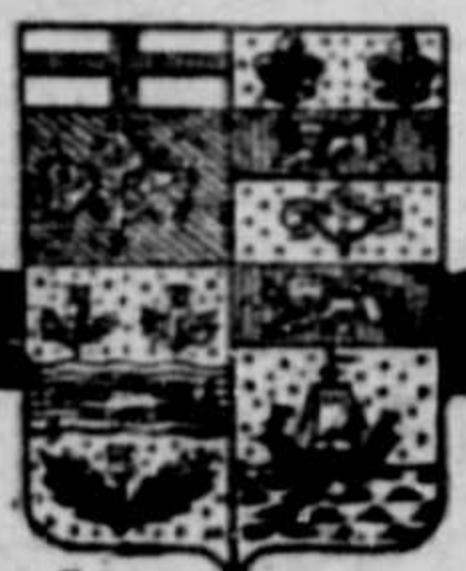
The qualifications of all applicants are investigated by an Agricultural Qualification Committee, composed of men of superior standing, who understand the farming business. All applicants are required to appear in person before the Committee in their district.
