## CHURCH MUST LEAD IN ALL GREAT REFORMS IN KEEPING WITH SPIRIT OF THE AGE

### ARCHBISHOP DU VERNET URGES THAT WELFARE OF THE WHOLE PEOPLE BE SUPREME STANDARD, IN CHARGE TO SYNOD OF DIOCESE THIS MORNING

With the great war over the great work of reconstruction has begun, said Archbishop Du Vernet in his charge to the Synod this morning. There has been a vast explosion and a world upheaval. Old customs, old traditions, old methods, old beliefs have been shaken up. The shattered fragments may fall back, but things in the economic, the industrial, the social, and the religious world can never be the same as before. There must be a rearrangement of these fragments, and there should be such a readjustment to present conditions as will lead to a better order of things in the home, the community and the state as well as in the society of nations.

#### Church Must Lead.

If the Church misses the unparalleled opportunity now being given it to lead in great reforms it will be brushed to one side as a useless relic of the past.

The mission of the Church is to inspire the people with the Spirit of Christ, which is the spirit of brotherly love and mutual service, but the Church must not be content unless this spirit works itself out in a better order of things.

Only a comprehensive Church can reach the whole people. Only a united Church can have sufficient spiritual life and power to inspire the community, the nation, and the world. For this reason the very first piece of reconstruction work undertaken should be in the way of Church Union.

#### Sectarian Evils.

As the first great impetus towards Church Union came from the Foreign Field where the iniquity of importing sectarian strife was quickly felt, so it is right that the second great impetus towards Church Union should come from the missionary districts of our own country. We who are working under pioneer conditions in outlying districts are far more alive to the evils of sectarianism than are those at the crowded centre.

### COMMITTEE GIVEN POWER TO PURCHASE

#### Site for Labor Temple on Sixth Avenue May be Secured At Once.

At the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council held last night the building committee was empowered to secure an option on two lots on Sixth Avenue for the purpose of erecting a labor temple as a centre of operations for the One Big Union.

It was explained that two lots on a corner could be secured for the sum of \$2,000 and that the site would be an extremely good one. The committee will meet tonight to discuss the matter further.

### OIL TANKER BRINGS 60,000 BBLs OF FUEL

#### Richmond Arrives Last Evening and Will Leave Southbound Tomorrow.

The 4,500-ton oil tanker Richmond with a cargo of 65,000 barrels of fuel oil, arrived from Richmond last night about seven o'clock. She called at Seattle on the way north. The steamer is discharging 60,000 barrels. She was here about a year ago and her last two trips were made from San Pedro to Honolulu. She reported the weather fairly fine, meeting with a few bad storms, but nothing to hurt.

She will be ready to sail again for the south tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.

It was announced at the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last night that word had been received from Winnipeg to the effect that the strike leaders there had agreed that the men should return to work at the old rate of wages on condition that all the strikers be reinstated and that the unions be recognized. Recognition is what they are fighting for now, not wages.

### PRESIDENT ELECTED

#### Trades and Labor Council Fills Vacancy Caused by Resignation of W. E. Thompson.

After several ballots of the members of the Trades and Labor Council last night Sid Cox was appointed president for the remainder of the term and W. A. Pilford was elected vice-president. The vacancy was made through the resignation of W. E. Thompson who is now an employer of labor. The other names before the council were Messrs. Clark, Shaw and Gillis.

### ANGLICAN SYNOD IS IN SESSION TODAY

#### Proceedings Opened This Morning in St. Andrew's Church; Delegates From Outlying Districts Present.

The Synod of the Anglican Church met at 10:30 this morning in St. Andrew's Church, at which representatives were present from all the missions in the diocese, except the Rev. J. B. McCullagh, of Aiyansh, Rev. F. P. Thorman, Telegraph Creek, and the Rev. J. H. Kerr, of Pouce Coupe, who are situated in very isolated districts. These delegates sent word of their inability to attend and expressed regret for their absence.

Archbishop F. H. Du Vernet presided and opened the proceedings by the annual Episcopal charge, comparing the work of the Anglican Church during the last two years.

### TELEGRAPH WIRES OUT OF BUSINESS

#### Eight Miles of Line of to Made Good Before Trouble Wended.

As a result of slides along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway something like eight miles of telegraph line has been carried away, most of it now being in the Fraser river. That accounts for the interruption in the telegraph service on that line. Linemen are out trying to get a wire through in order to connect up with the east.

The Dominion Government wire is also down, a bad hurricane in the Burns Lake section having played havoc with the wires. For two days the linemen have been out working on them, but up to noon today the ticker was dead.

Should Continue Red Cross Library.

Yesterday mention was made of the need of making provision for taking over the Red Cross Library and preventing it being broken up or leaving town. It would not take much money to keep it open.

The chief difficulty is in providing a suitable librarian. The person who has charge of the library must know the books and be in a position to recommend to the borrowers. Mrs. Backus who has had charge since the inception of the library had read every book. The result was that she was able to give first hand information in regard to them.

It has been suggested that the Daughters of the Empire might undertake the work until such time as the city was in a position or became sufficiently interested to take it over from them. That seems like a good suggestion, if they will undertake the duty. The difficulty there will be to arrange for a librarian who will interest people in the books and make the job worth doing.

Anglican Church Meeting Situation.

The charge of the Archbishop of Caledonia to the Synod this morning was a notable document. It is an indication of the trend of the times. Taken in conjunction with a statement by Bishop Bunoz of the Catholic Church a few days ago to the effect that he was glad to work in harmony with the other churches, it is an indication that the church is awakening to its responsibilities and is keeping in line with modern developments.

Archbishop Du Vernet is one of the leaders of thought among Anglicans. Judging from his public utterances and writings he believes in social and spiritual reform, and also he senses the fact that there are depths of spiritual knowledge that have not yet been fathomed. Readers of this paper should not fail to peruse the charge which is printed on another page.

Hawker and Grieve Rescued From Death.

Great satisfaction was expressed Monday evening and yesterday when the news was given out through a Daily News bulletin that Hawker and Grieve, the intrepid aviators, had been rescued. The fact that Hawker was an Australian did not in the least detract from the admiration all felt for his daring. He had something of the Canadian spirit when he cast off his carriage and floated off over the ocean.

When the news was received here everyone expressed the greatest pleasure at the news that he and his daring companion had escaped.

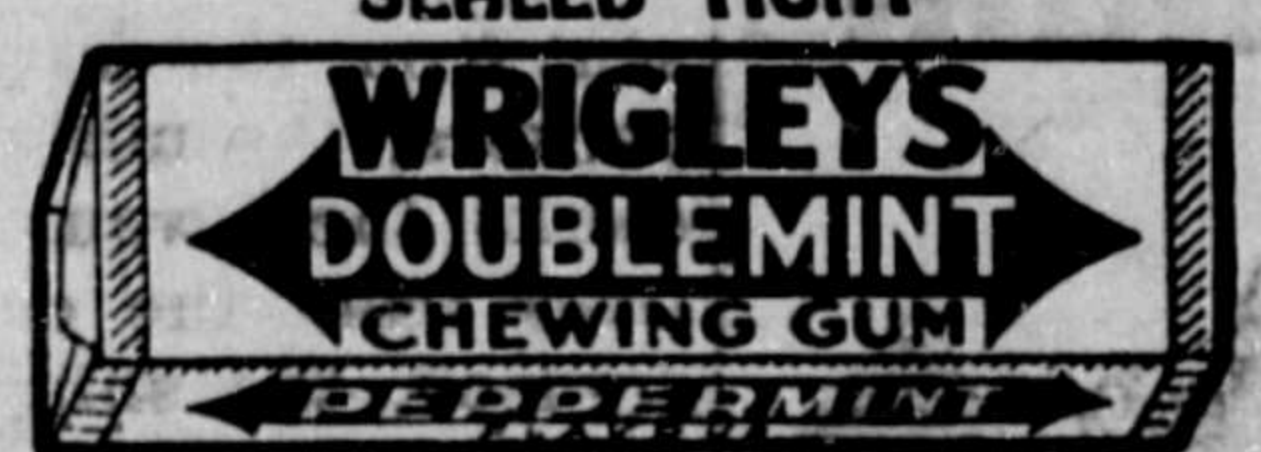

## ONE BIG UNION ORGANIZATION BEING PLANNED

George Rudderham is Delegate to Present Local Views at the Calgary Convention.

The One Big Union committee is organized in Prince Rupert, according to a report made to the Trades and Labor Council at its meeting last night. The chairman is Alderman Casey, Secretary W. A. Pilford and the other members of the committee are Messrs. Dawson, Gillis and Rose.

The delegates chosen last night to attend the organization meeting at Calgary is George Rudderham, secretary of the Trades and Labor Council.

While the delegate is left free to vote and act as he thinks wise, a scheme has been prepared by the local committee which he is expected to bring before the convention. Under this scheme there would be a central governing body at some point such as Winnipeg or Calgary to which all per capita dues would be sent and which would have power of arranging for unity of action in case of a strike.

### District Bodies.

District bodies would be formed composed of delegates from the various industries in the place. In Prince Rupert, for instance, instead of delegates being sent from the carpenters, the fish packers, the millworkers and the clerks, there would be representatives from the cold storage, the drydock, the shipyards, the mill, the machine shops, etc. Delegates from the cold storage would represent all the interests at the cold storage whether fishpackers, clerks, laborers, engineers or firemen, and the same would apply to other industries.

A shop steward would be appointed for each industry and this man would be the intermediary between the employers and the employees. In case of his failing to adjust the differences between the employers and the men, the matter would come before the district body, and further efforts would then be made to arrange terms before a strike would be called. This may not be the scheme finally arranged, but it seems to be the local idea of what it should be.

### To Prevent Strikes.

In the course of discussion it was stated that the idea of the One Big Union was to prevent strikes. The men always were losers from strikes even when they won their point. It was to the advantage of labor that there should be no strikes. No provision was made in the local scheme for strike pay, it being the opinion that in case of action being necessary the strike would be so short that strike pay would be unnecessary.

A question was asked whether the One Big Union would recognize trades which were objectionable, such as that of bartenders where the members sold poison, which injured the members of the community or munition makers where the object was destruction. It was pointed out that there would be numerous questions which would have to be settled from time to time by the organization.

It was reported that the four western provinces, as far east as Port Arthur, had so far gone overwhelmingly in favor of the One Big Union. As long as a few locals wanted to keep the charter of the Trades and Labor Council they could do so, but the opinion seemed to be general that they would all want to come into the new organization.

## MRS. G. B. HARRISON DIES AT SEATTLE

Indian Agent Thomas Deasy recently received the sad intelligence of the demise of his sister, Mrs. G. B. Harrison, of Seattle. The deceased lady was a native daughter of New Westminster, where she was born 58 years ago. Many friends throughout the province will be grieved to learn of the death of this pioneer lady, so well and generally known by the many old timers, whose ranks are becoming depleted rapidly. A large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends followed the remains to Calvary cemetery at Seattle, where the body was interred alongside that of her eldest son.



## FARM LOANS for SOLDIERS



# The Soldier Settlement Act

### Purpose

To assist ex-service men who desire to make farming their permanent occupation, and who, it is considered, are qualified to make a success of the farming business.

### Procedure

The returned soldier who seriously intends to adopt farming as his life work, and desires financial assistance to purchase land, live stock, and equipment, may, receive full information and instructions how to proceed from the representative of the Soldier Settlement Board in the district in which he resides.

### Financial Assistance Available

Loans may be granted qualified settlers, according to their needs, on the following basis—

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land for agricultural purposes or the discharge of encumbrances;
- (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements, and other equipment;
- (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings.

Interest at the rate of five per cent. will be charged.

### Who Are "Qualified"

The qualifications of all applicants are investigated by an Agricultural Qualification Committee, composed of men of superior standing, who understand the farming business. All applicants are required to appear in person before the Committee in their district.

**Military Service.**—Any person who served with an honourable record:

- (a) In the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war, or (except in U.S. or Bermuda) outside of the country in which he enlisted;

- (b) In the forces of any of His Majesty's Allies in an actual theatre of war, if he was a British subject resident in Canada before the war;
- (c) In the C.E.F. in Canada only, if he is in receipt of a pension for disability occasioned by such service.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

**Other Qualifications.**—After an applicant's eligibility, from the standpoint of military service, is determined, the Committee will investigate his physical condition, general fitness, and agricultural experience. An applicant must satisfy the Committee that he is aware of the individual responsibility resting upon those who would engage in farming successfully, and that he has the required energy to carry on farming in a successful manner. A Qualification Certificate is issued to qualified applicants. Agricultural training is available for men who fail to receive a Qualification Certificate only through lack of sufficient practical farming experience.

### All Qualified Men Assisted

The applicant, after securing a Qualification Certificate, may then apply to the Loan Advisory Committee for financial assistance. Should he desire to purchase land he may indicate the particular parcel of land which he desires to acquire. The Committee will appraise the land with regard to its agricultural possibilities, and if it is satisfactory and its value is in keeping with the soldier's ability to comply with the financial requirements of the Act, the land may be secured.

### Equipment

The Loan Advisory Committee also determines the amount of loan to be granted to the soldier settler for the purchase of live stock and implements, and the erection of necessary buildings in keeping with the settler's absolute need. The Soldier Settlement Board has made arrangements to secure these needs for the settler at specially low prices.

### Supervision

The Soldier Settlement Board has a staff of agricultural advisers, whose duties are to promote the prosperity of the soldier settler by timely advice and assistance. It is also enlisting the co-operation of experienced and successful farmers, located near at hand, who will direct and assist the settler to make a success of his undertaking.

### Special Transportation Rates

The Railway Companies of Canada have offered special rates to soldier settlers who travel for any of the following purposes:

- (a) First trip to appear before Qualification Committee, to work with farmer, to attend an agricultural school or to look for land;
- (b) To return to his home for the purpose of transporting his family or goods to his farm.

The rate will be allowed on the production of a certificate issued by the Soldier Settlement Board.

## CHURCH MUST LEAD IN ALL GREAT REFORMS IN KEEPING WITH SPIRIT OF THE AGE

(Continued From Page One.)

a question—"No, it is denominationalism."

**Ministers Refusing.**  
 Our young ministers of all churches to their great honor are beginning to refuse to go into such a field already occupied, reporting to their superintendents that there is no call for more than one Protestant minister in such a district.

The heads of the denominational churches must face a strike among pioneer ministers unless there is some practical arrangement to prevent overlapping. Life in the Far West has taught us to rise above many of the restrictions of the conservative east.

In this Diocese we have not fettered our newly built churches by making them selfishly exclusive. In many places our little church (with its sanctuary screened off) is the only available building for a social centre, and anything of an uplifting character can be allowed to take place in it. What is for the good of men must be to the glory of God.

**Varied Services.**  
 Not only have we now our revised and enriched prayer-book which gives greater elasticity; not only have we the sanction of the Canadian House of Bishops for the use in church of extempore prayer, when deemed desirable, in addition to our regular service, but in this Diocese unhampered by antiquated canons, while loyal to our church standards, we are at liberty under pioneer conditions to try different forms of worship, ranging all the way from an evangelistic meeting to a cathedral service.

In places where our clergyman is the only Protestant minister it would be quite allowable for him to have a strictly liturgical service in the morning for our own church people, and a more informal service in the evening for those not accustomed to our prayer-book.

**Community Spirit.**  
 In every possible way we need to encourage in our new settlements the community spirit. "The fellowship of Christ's religion" must be made a reality, helping to bind together all classes of people.

In many of our country districts returned soldiers are taking up land, a majority of these have written "C. of E." after their name. The Church of England should, therefore, be awake to the new situation. Such have been accustomed to comradeship in arms. They will look for fellowship in Church members. Let us not disappoint them.

**Fuller Life.**  
 All the unrest in the world today is really caused by a craving for a fuller life, which can only be attained when the needs of both body, mind and spirit are truly satisfied. Better wages, better houses, better surroundings, better enjoyments, better health, better knowledge, better relationship with our brethren, better fellowship with our Father-God, this is the fullness of life which we should earnestly seek not only for ourselves but for others.

The democracy of the new era upon which we are entering while doing justice to the rights of each individual and every class must make the welfare of the whole people the supreme standard and the controlling purpose.

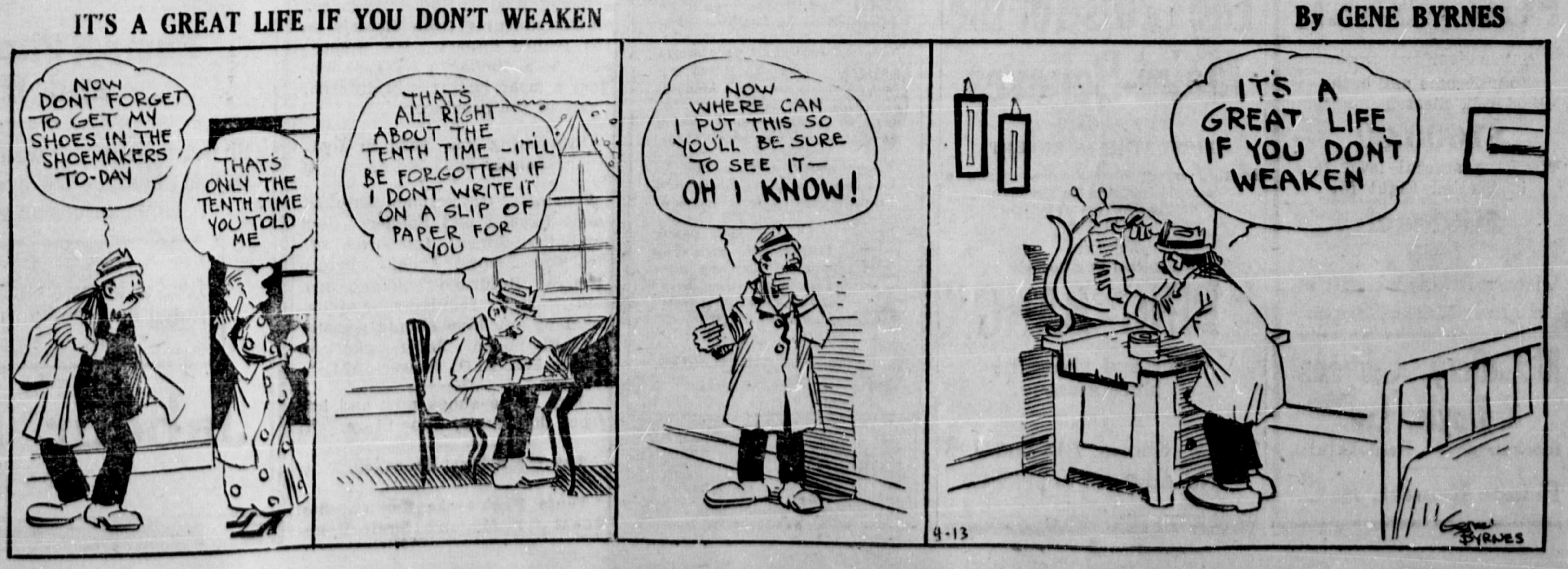
