ANGLICAN SYNOD IN FINAL SESSION DEALS WITH UNION OF CHRISTIAN CHURCHES

ADDRESS ON SUBJECT GIVEN BY ARCHBISHOP—REPORT BY REV. W. E. COLLISON ON THE RIDLEY HOME

Archbishop F. H. Du Vernet, following the celebration of Holy Communion which opened the second day's meeting of the Anglican Synod on Thursday morning, read an important document in which the members of the Synod showed their heartiest approval. This document was signed by all the prominent clergy and ministers of all the Protestant denominations of the church in the British Isles. It was also signed by many of the great statesmen and educationists across the Atlantic. The document embodied a most optimistic outlook upon the vital matter of church union.

The bishops of the Anglican church have given their earnest support to recent movements towards church union. Whitsunday, June 8, has been set apart all over the British Isles as a special day of united prayer "for Christian unity and for the reunion of the separated members of the body of Christ." Archbishop Du Vernet has set apart Whitsunday for this purpose in the diocese of Caledonia.

Visited Presbyterians.

In this connection the Archbishop reminded the synod that at the recent meeting of the presbytery in Vancouver the four bishops went as a delegation to the Presbyterian synod to show their willingness to support and promote any movement which would lead towards closer cooperation and unity.

Rev. W. E. Collison read the report of the Ridley Home, which was most encouraging. The home has had practically no sickness and managed to escape the ravages of the influenza epidemic. It was pointed out that the institution is badly in need of funds and it is a home which is filling a very great need in the province.

Miss West and Miss Davies were heartily commended for their work in connection with the Ridley Home.

his work among the Japanese. He reported regular evening services and Sunday school. He also works among the men in the canneries and Japanese quarters.

Archdeacon Collison spoke to the synod on the topic with which he is peculiarly familiar, the Indians of the northwest coast. He told of the opening of the new hall at Kincolith at which all the tribes from Metlakatla to the upper Naas River were present. The archdeacon referred to the land question and said that the government should settle this matter which is still troubling the native people.

A vote of thanks was passed for the splendid way the congregation of St. Andrew's had spontaneously received the delegates under the able direction of Canon Rix. A vote of thanks was given to the press for its courtesy in printing the reports of the synod meetings.

EIGHT CARLOADS OF FISH AWAIT SALE

Twenty-One Boats Held Up By Strike Situation—King & Winge With 48,000 Pounds.

Seventeen halibut fishing boats with about eight car loads of fish are in port awaiting a sale, which may not take place owing to the strike. Two independent fishery schooners are included in the following list:

J. P. Todd with 25,000; Flattery 6,000; Lumen, 10,000; Fram, 10,000; S. & S., 8,000; Johanna, 18,000; Joe Baker, 7,000; P. Doreen, 7,000; Giffen, 4,000; Molly May, 12,500; Pair Jacks, 13,000; Minnie V., 6,000; Mayflower, 4,000; Road, 800; Ingrid H., 3,500; King & Winge, 48,000; Scandia, 35,000. The last two mentioned are of the Independent Fisheries.

Four salmon boats are also awaiting sale as follows: Half Moon, 6,700 lbs.; Kyua Maua, 2,300; Star, 1,750, and the Myrtle, 600 lbs.

UNIONS TO VOTE ON QUESTION OF GENERAL STRIKE

Will Decide Tomorrow Whether All City Will be Called Out in Sympathy With Winnipeg.

The question whether or not there will be a general strike will be decided tomorrow when a ballot will be taken from 12 to 8. The little Carpenters' Hall was crowded last night for two hours when the matter was being discussed and there were people outside looking in at the windows.

For something like two hours the pros and cons of a general strike were canvassed by the delegates. The lack of information regarding the progress of the Winnipeg strike made it impossible to ask the members of the unions to decide definitely for the strike but what is being asked is that the power shall be given the committee to call a strike if they think it necessary from information which may come to hand.

The opinion seems to be held that a place so remote as this and so insignificant could have little effect on the struggle in Winnipeg.

FINED \$50 EACH

Two Germans Have to Pay Penalty For Not Registering According to Law.

Charles and Frank Zieman, two Germans who were charged yesterday afternoon with failing to report as enemy aliens during the war, were again brought before Mayor McClymont and W. E. Collison this morning in the police court, and after finding the accused guilty imposed upon them the penalty of \$50 each.

The magistrates pointed out to the men that if the father had taken out naturalization papers soon after landing in Canada his son might be termed a British subject.

Frank Zieman explained that he had offered himself for military service but had been refused.

NEW PLAN FOR THE PILOTAGE OF B. C. COAST

Prince Rupert Not Mentioned in Report of Commission Just Handed Down.

The Robb Pilotage Commission which last summer investigated pilotage conditions on the British Columbia coast, has handed down its findings to Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Marine. Among the recommendations made in the report were the following:

That the pilotage districts of Vancouver, Victoria and Nanaimo, as at present constituted, be amalgamated and form one district, with the Minister of Marine and Fisheries as the pilotage authority.

That the Minister of Marine and Fisheries should appoint a master mariner, with sea-going experience, as superintendent of pilots for the above district. Such superintendent should not at any time have been a pilot for any of the above districts; but should be conversant with local conditions.

That such superintendent should organize and administer the affairs of this district and be directly responsible to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

Pilots at Ports.

That qualified assistants be provided to assist the superintendent at the different principal ports in the district, such as Vancouver, Victoria and Nanaimo, to receive reports from the pilots, convey the orders of the superintendent, and delegate the pilots to the ships requiring them.

That the headquarters of such superintendent should be at Victoria.

That the principal station for boarding all vessels in the district be situated at William Head, where a suitable building should be erected for this purpose, and proper boat or boats maintained for the use of pilots.

Advisory Committee.

That an advisory committee be appointed, composed of one member from each of the Boards of Trade of Vancouver, Victoria and Nanaimo, and one representative of the pilots, to consider and make representations to the Minister, through the superintendent, on any matters relating to the rates of pilotage or shipping conditions which they may deem necessary, such committee to act solely in an advisory capacity, and to have no administrative power.

That the present fifteen pilots of the respective districts under the age of seventy years become pilots of the proposed consolidated districts, and granted licenses as such.

Pension Funds.

That the Minister of Marine and Fisheries should create a pilots' pension fund for this district, deducting seven per cent. from the gross earnings for this purpose.

That, after giving consideration to the question of the pooling of the earnings of pilots, your commissioners are unanimous in recommending for your consideration the advisability of placing the pilots on salary, which can better be adjusted to meet local requirements from time to time.

HEAVIER FINES IN FUTURE FOR MOONSHINERS

Joe Vaccher Has to Pay \$300 for Having Still in His Possession.

Joe Vaccher, cook at the Cold Storage Co.'s boarding house at Seal Cove, was arrested last night by Constables Adams and Bailey after a part of a still was found in his possession. The accused was brought before Mayor McClymont and W. E. Collison this morning in the police court with W. E. Fisher as prosecuting attorney and W. E. Williams for the defence, and fined \$300 or in default three months in jail.

Find Still.

Evidence was given that last evening Constables Adams and Bailey discovered in the cook house of which the accused has charge, the top of a still made out of a lid of a 50-lb. lard pail, with a small worm attached, and which would fit any lard pail of that size.

Together with the still, three bottles of moonshine and ten bottles of mother's wine were found and seized.

High Tests.

Tests of the spirits were made by H. T. Cross of the Customs Department, which showed the liquor to contain from 15 per cent. up to 37.1 per cent. alcohol. The accused, it was pointed out in the evidence of Constable Adams, kept alcoholic drinks among a number of vinegar bottles, presuming that the difference might be overlooked. A stone crock was also in the possession of the accused, and judging by the scent, had been used for the storage of mother's wine.

Found Guilty.

After the evidence was given Mayor McClymont pointed out to the accused that as long as he had the illegal still in his possession it was against the law. It could only be used for one purpose. He would fine him \$300 or as an alternative three months in jail. Both the magistrates gave warning that the next case would be dealt with more severely as this manufacture of liquor had to stop.

One Big Union Plan at Work.

Unless some little difference is settled between two parties in Winnipeg Prince Rupert must suffer. That is the dictum of the One Big Union. It is the principle which is to be followed in future under the plan of the new organization. The union is not really organized but the methods are already in vogue.

In Edmonton the strike was brought on by a vote of 1,600 men in a city, the population of which is, say 70,000. That is a very small proportion. It is possible that a few of the others favored the strike but the vast majority undoubtedly were opposed to it. It is one of the cases where the minority imposed their will on the majority. The minority were organized, whereas the majority were not.

In Prince Rupert, judging from opinions heard on the street, the vast majority of the people are opposed to a strike. A few people will vote and decide whether to tie the city up or not. They will stop all business, interfere with the food supply and all the commodities of life, and the disorganized mass that does not approve will stand helpless by and watch all their boasted liberties being taken away by a few.

Prince Rupert has been On Strike for Years.

Insofar as any activity is concerned Prince Rupert has been on strike for years past. She has been industrially dead and it will not matter much if the corpse stays dead for another year or not. There were signs of coming to life, a slight stirring of the dry bones, but let her lie. Who cares? Nip the little activity in the bud. Club the reviving corpse and let it rot by the wayside. It is but a small one and perhaps will be better out of the way.

Strike is a Joke In a Place This Size.

A strike in Prince Rupert is a joke. Here are a few hundred people, a community, isolated and struggling for a place in the sun. The people are trying to hew streets out of the rock and muskeg, to lay the foundations for a city, to build schools at which to educate their children, to slowly develop until they may be of some influence on the continent. Then a few of the hundreds call a halt. They object to interfering with the course of nature. Back to the clam bed is their cry. Shut things down. Strike.

Suitable Suggestion For the Occasion.

Here is a suggestion to the strikers who seem bent on killing the town. Send Mullen and his shipbuilding crowd back to Pittsburg or wherever they happen to come from, set the drydock adrift, close down the cold storage plant and the mill for all time, destroy the few little temporary wharves that have been built here and then take a few siwash canoes and go and live on one of the islands.

Possibly the next generation will have sense enough to form an anti-strike league which will be composed of three fourths of the men and women of the community. These will pledge themselves to look upon any striker as a scab that must be removed from the rest of the body politic and to treat him accordingly. They will be perfectly organized like the armies that fought against the Huns. They will sit as judges on the merits of any dispute between capital and the Big Union and if either treats the other unfairly, they will adopt the old method our fathers used when the boy disgraced himself.

Workingman Should Get Share of Good Things.

The average wage earner has been badly used in days gone by. There is no denying that. There was no alternative for him but to strike. It was his only weapon. Now the strike bug has become so virulent that it deserves to be scotched. To go on strike because there is a quarrel 1,500 miles away is unwarrantable. To leave work without conferring with the employers as was done here recently is also unreasonable. For employers to pay wages that are not high enough to keep a family decently is unwarrantable. There must be give and take, but to strike just for the sake of upsetting things generally is criminal.

NEW STEAMER WILL PLY TO ALICE ARM

Taylor Engineering Company has Just Completed Small Vessel For General Carrying Business.

Coincident with the taking over of the Dolly Varden Mines by the Taylor Engineering Company the latter company is today running the trials of its new large power freighters for the British Columbia coast trade, says the Vancouver Province. The Taylor Management Corporation, which will control the fleet, proposes to use the craft in conjunction with the operation of the mines, carrying supplies and general cargo to all way points en route to Alice Arm and to the Dolly Varden properties, and bringing back cargoes of concentrates from the mine property.

Additional war-time interest is lent to the new craft inasmuch as her crew will consist entirely of men from the motor boat patrol service, under the command of Lieut. E. C. Godfrey. Lieut. Godfrey, who is the son of Mr. Godfrey of the Bank of B. N. A., recently returned from lengthy service overseas, where he was in command of a motor launch on anti-submarine and patrol work in the Adriatic.

The New Boat.

The Teo, which was designed and built by the Taylor Engineering Company, will have a 300-ton deadweight cargo capacity, and is so constructed that she can be turned into an oil tanker at 72 hours' notice. She is 125 feet long with a 23-foot 6-inch beam and driven by 200 h. p. Bolinder type engines. Her fuel capacity will give her a 1,600-mile cruising radius and she is designed to develop a speed of 8½ knots when fully loaded. She has accommodation for a crew of twelve men.

After her trials the Teo is to be docked and is expected to take up her regular run in three weeks time upon the arrival and installation of a special quickhandling deck winch of a new type.

Taking Over Mine.

A. J. Taylor, head of the Taylor Engineering Co., is in Victoria in conference with Hon. John Oliver in regard to the taking over of the Dolly Varden property. It is expected that work will begin at the mines within a few days, as there is over 500,000 tons of ore blocked out and ready for shipping. The composition of the mine staff is said to be now under way.

The action of the Dolly Varden Mines Company in petitioning the Legislature for the act under which the Taylor company now assumes the property, and in admitting under the act the Taylor company's claim for a charge of \$462,500 out of the profits of the mine is regarded by Mr. Taylor and his legal advisers as greatly simplifying the work of organizing the new company which will take charge of the mine development. With the new fleet of vessels plying to Alice Arm and the railway to the mines in operation for general traffic, it is expected that considerable development will come to the Alice Arm district apart altogether from the development of the mineral areas.

UNFROCKED BISHOP AND ESCAPED CONVICT

Harold Lockwood in Intensely Interesting and Odd Story At Westholme.

"Pals First" is a curious story. It is the tale of an unfrocked bishop who has degenerated to a tramp and who is joined by Harold Lockwood in the guise of an escaped convict, but who is in reality a scion of a noble family of Tennessee. Of the adventures of this pair and of the way in which the title of the play "Pals First" is worked out is a psychological study that is worth seeing. Harold Lockwood is dead but this, his work, still lives and instructs as well as entertains the people.

A gazette of unusual interest is shown with this film. It is the work of the tubercular soldiers, something like three thousand strong, who are under government care and are trained to do things suitable to their condition and with a view to their cure.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant. Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Full title and record improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims for less than 5 years with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years. Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his own, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land. Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company. PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive. TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may apply for their interests and apply for proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction. CHURCH WILL TRY TO RAISE \$2,500,000

Anglicans of Canada Set Out on Big Undertaking for Spiritual Welfare of Country.

The closing session of the Synod of British Columbia was devoted to the consideration of what is termed "The Anglican Forward Movement." This movement the speaker, Rev. Archdeacon Heathcote, explained had two objectives, spiritual and financial, but both are included in this great effort to make the Anglican Church 100 per cent. efficient.

To give the church this efficiency the sum of \$2,500,000 is needed. This is the financial objective of the great movement. The speaker showed in a striking manner the need for this large sum in the various departments of the church. He assured the synod that this movement had been the result of the needs found to exist in all the Christian denominations and the programme about to be launched will be wholeheartedly supported by all the denominations in Canada.

The archdeacon urged all interested in the work of the Christian Church throughout Canada to approach the campaign, when it is launched, in a generous manner.

ENGLISH MEMORIAL TO BRAVE BELGIANS

Proposal to Erect Chapel on Site To Be Chosen by Cardinal Mercier.

An influential committee, including Lord Edmund Talbot, Sir Arthur Downes, late Medical Inspector of the Local Government Board, and Sir H. C. Munro, has been formed for the purpose of providing a lasting memorial of English sympathy with Belgium and with the exiles who were driven into this country in consequence of the barbarities of the German invaders.

The memorial is to take the form of a memorial chapel, the site of which is being selected by Cardinal Mercier, and it will be the sanctuary of gifts of great beauty which have been bestowed by sympathisers upon places of worship which were provided for the Belgians during their residence in this country.

The committee, of which Canon Sprankling, rector of the Catholic Church, Weybridge, Surrey, England, which is so closely associated with the French Royal Family, is the treasurer, propose raising £2,000 for the memorial, and any surplus is to be devoted to the restoration of the ruined church to which the memorial chapel will be attached. A church in Lierre has been mentioned as being suitable for the purpose.

PRINCE RUPERT LADY ON S.S. CASSANDRA WHEN IT STRUCK BERG

Mrs. E. N. Valentine Among Four Hundred Who Had to Put Back to St. Johns.

Mrs. E. N. Valentine and son were aboard the Donaldson liner Cassandra when she struck an iceberg 160 miles off Cape Race a few days ago. The vessel returned to St. Johns, Newfoundland, with her forefoot stove in from striking the ice. Four hundred passengers were aboard and all are reported well. There will however be very considerable delay in getting to Glasgow.

Mrs. Valentine left here on Saturday, May 10, and joined the ship at Montreal. A number of applications were made here for berths on the steamer, but to the disappointment of the local people the accommodation was sold out. They had to get to Scotland by way of Liverpool.

By collective buying in large numbers for cash, it can also offer soldiers the lowest possible prices on horses and other live stock.

It can supply a good harness set for approximately \$31.50 at point of manufacture.

All these concessions are in addition to the Board's offer to secure for the soldiers good

land, conveniently located, and to give financial assistance in the way of loans to establish them on the land.

Land and Loans

With certain exceptions, a soldier who has served with good conduct in the Canadian, Imperial or Allied forces in an actual theatre of war or outside the country in which he enlisted (or widow of any such man) may secure loans to purchase land, live stock and equipment and erect buildings—

- (1) Up to \$4,500 to cover the cost of the land and discharge encumbrances.
- (2) Up to \$1,000 to erect buildings. Both these loans to be paid on the instalment plan. Payments extending over 25 years.

(3) Up to \$2,000 to buy implements, live stock, and equipment. The soldier will begin to pay off this loan in the third year, and will have four years to pay.

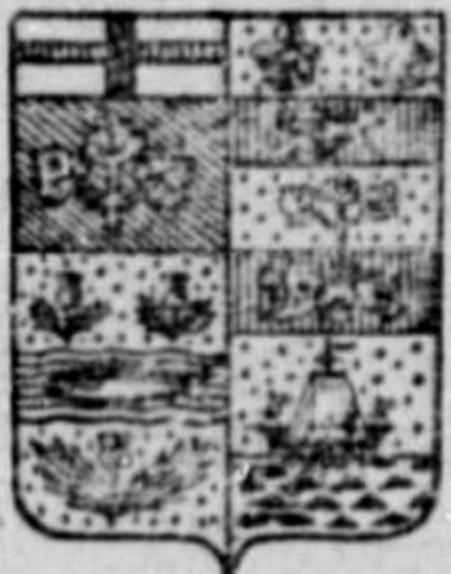
Only five per cent. will be charged on these loans.

A cash payment of one-tenth the price of the land will be required, except in special cases.

Qualified settlers on Dominion Lands may secure loans up to a maximum of \$3,000 on a plan similar to the above for farm equipment, live stock, and erection of buildings, provided security offered justifies the loan.

THE LARGEST BEAR KILLED IN ALASKA

Head of Monster Weighed 40 lbs. and Skin 150 lbs.—Length Was 13 feet.

Dr. W. H. Chase of Cordova recently killed what he believes to be the largest bear ever killed in Alaska. Its skin measured 13 feet in length, and weighed 150 lbs. The head weighed 40 pounds, and it is estimated that the bear weighed 1,800 pounds. It was 26 inches from the tip of the ear to the tip of the nose, and 18 inches from ear to ear. Dr. Chase killed the bear with two shots from a .401 Winchester, the second and fatal shot being fired at a distance of 20 feet and struck the big animal, which was coming for him, exactly between the eyes.

People are wondering now whether or not Dr. Chase has killed the "big Hinchinbrook Island bear." For years the tracks of an immense bear have been seen from time to time on that Island, and many hunting parties have been organized to go out and get the animal. It is a pet story at Cordova that these parties, after seeing the tracks of the bear decided that they did not want to get any closer to him, and returned by the shortest possible route to their homes. Dr. Chase's big bear was killed on Hinchinbrook Island.
