**RAILWAY MEN WILL ACT AS
MEDIATORS WITH VIEW TO
SETTLING WINNIPEG STRIKE**

**WILL PRESENT TO METAL WORKERS NEW TERMS OF
NEGOTIATIONS FROM EMPLOYEES IN ALL
LINES OF INDUSTRY**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Winnipeg, June 3.—Steps which it is hoped will lead to a termination of the Winnipeg strike are being taken today when representatives of the trainmen's unions act as mediators. They will present to the striking metal workers new terms of negotiations from employees in all lines of industry. It is believed that the new terms and efforts at mediation may open the way for a settlement.
The committee which will negotiate will consist of representatives from the following organizations: Locomotive engineers, locomotive firemen, railway conductors, railway trainmen, maintenance of way employees and railway telegraphers.

**GERMANS MADE
PEACE BECAUSE
WILSON'S WORD**

**Brockdorf Rantzaus Says Fourteen
Points Responsible for
Surrender.**

Berlin, June 3.—Brockdorf Rantzaus, leader of the German plenipotentiaries at the peace conference, is credited with saying that the theme of President Wilson is a very ticklish one, for Wilson is the father of our surrender in arms.
The German people counted on him and voluntarily made itself defenceless on his fourteen points. The amendments to the treaty our country proposed were based on them.
Brockdorf is reported as denying the persistent criticisms as to differences between the members of the delegation and the cabinet or that the meeting at Spa had any significance.

**CHINAMAN FINED
FOR SELLING OPIUM**

**Indian Girl Allowed Out on Sus-
pended Sentence and Will
Leave Town.**

Ken Seng was fined \$100 or three months in default this morning by Magistrates McClymont and Collison in the police court for selling opium. In the evidence given, it appeared that the accused gave Helen Carlson, the Indian girl who was yesterday morning charged with having opium in her possession, the opium which he put in the bottom of the match box, thereby getting the girl into trouble.
A pipe and other paraphernalia used by opium smokers, were seized by the police from the residence of the Chinaman.
Helen Carlson was let out on suspended sentence and will leave town.

**GENERAL STRIKE CALLED
IN VANCOUVER TODAY AT 11
SAYS WIRE RECEIVED HERE**

**R. T. J. ROSE, ACTING SECRETARY OF TRADES AND LABOR
COUNCIL, GETS MESSAGE—LOCAL RAILWAY
MEN DO NOT RETURN**

R. T. J. Rose, president of the Machinists Union and temporary secretary of the local Trades and Labor Council, received a wire this morning from Vancouver saying that a general strike was called this morning at 11 o'clock.
This means that a large part of organized labor in that city will be on strike, but it does not apply to all trades.
Locally the employees of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway met yesterday and decided to remain out in spite of the ultimatum sent them by the management.

**BOTH SIDES AT EDMONTON
SEEM TO BE CONFIDENT;
NUMBER OF MEN RETURNED**

**MAKING BID FOR SUPPORT OF SOLDIERS WHO STILL
MAINTAIN THEIR NEUTRALITY—NO REASON
TO BE DISCOURAGED SAYS STRIKE
SECRETARY**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Edmonton, June 3.—The central strike committee report everything orderly. The secretary expressed the opinion that from a strike standpoint they had no reason to be discouraged.
The local railway superintendents report that quite a number of men resumed work Monday. Those who did not return, he said, would have no grounds for reclaiming their positions, and as far as the railway is concerned they are dismissed from the service.
The Great War Veterans Association reiterated their intention to stand by their strict neutrality attitude to the very letter. The strikers are apparently making every effort to win over the returned soldiers either individually or collectively and passed a resolution at a strike meeting favoring a two thousand dollars cash bonus for returned men. The Veterans Association regard such action as "salve" and "bunk."
A miner who voiced his opinion yesterday is said to have properly summed up the motives of the strikers by saying: "We will have to do something for the returned men or how can we expect to get them."

**PUBLIC SERVICE EMPLOYEES
DIFFERENT FROM PRIVATE,
SAYS SIR ROBERT BORDEN**

**DISTORTION OF PUBLIC UTILITIES CANNOT BE PERMITTED
—COLLECTIVE BARGAINING SHOULD HAVE
AN EXACT DEFINITION AS TO
MEANING**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, June 3.—Major Andrews of Winnipeg asked the Prime Minister in the House of Commons yesterday what was the attitude toward collective bargaining.
Premier Borden replied that the Government was thoroughly conscious of the condition of industrial unrest throughout the world, but was hopeful that in this country matters would not go far. He reminded the House that the Government had under consideration conditions that might arise in the change from war to conditions of peace.
The Premier mentioned the activities of the Royal Commission under the chairmanship of Mr. Justice Mathers, which commission was still actively engaged.
Referring to the Winnipeg strike, Mr. Borden stated if the needs of the people as a whole were to be remedied a complete distortion of the public services today could not be permitted when founded upon such reasons as those forwarded by the employees of Winnipeg. Employees of the public service were in different position from those of private employers. Services in which public servants were engaged had a direct relationship to the maintenance of law and order.
Sir Robert said he expected to receive the Mathers report by June 15.
Explains Further.
Later in reply to questions by Mr. Rogerson regarding collective bargaining the Premier said that what was called the right of collective bargaining as it had been interpreted might have an unfortunate effect so far as the problem was concerned. It might have the effect of placing the men and labor unions in such a situation that they could not make their bargains except subject to some central body. The term collective bargaining should have an exact definition as to what it meant.

**AUSTRIAN TERMS
RESTRICTIVE**

**Nation Not to Exceed Six Million
in Population—Borders
Defined.**

Paris, June 3.—The terms of peace submitted to the Austrian delegation yesterday define and restrict the borders of the new nation of Austria and limit the population to six millions.
The Allies gave the Austrians fifteen days to sign the treaty.
With the exception of France all the major powers would undoubtedly agree to the admission of Germany to the Council of the League of Nations, but France is unalterably opposed to it. Consequently there is no possibility of this being done, according to a member of the peace delegation.

Germans Must Sign Treaty.

Lloyd George says that Germany must sign the treaty of peace. If she will not sign now, the armies on the field will march right to Berlin and dictate peace there.

Many people would like to see German occupation by the Allies. They feel that France and Belgium endured all the horrors of German occupation and they think Germany should feel something of what it means to have foreign invaders marching through her streets.

Reign of Hate Follows Strikes.

There is always a lot of bad feeling engendered at the time of a strike and so strong is the feeling on either side that the reign of hate lasts for many years. That is one of the bad features of the system.

Hate is like sand in the wheels of life. It injures most the person who holds the feeling against the other. It is a boomerang. It always strikes back.

Because of this aftermath of big industrial struggles there is a great responsibility on the leaders on either side. The man who is always setting class against class and urging the men to take drastic action and to look on agreements as scraps of paper, is largely responsible on one side; and on the other is the man who treats his employees unfairly, who underpays them and makes them work under bad conditions.

Too Much Waste After Utopia.

The difficulty with the worker of today is that he wants to arrive at the gates of paradise at one bound. The stirring events of the great war have shown him that so many things are possible, that he cannot see why he cannot bring about a Utopia right here and now.

The difficulty with the employers is that they fail to recognize the changed conditions following the war and they are unwilling to give way in the least.

As long as this feeling exists there can be no industrial peace. Friction is bound to continue, and in many cases the innocent are the ones who suffer.

\$100,000 IS COMING HERE TO PAY WAGES

Dolly Varden Employees to Get Large Sum of Back Wages Earned on Railway.

Within a few days a sum of something over \$100,000 will be sent to this city to be paid out in back wages to the men who were employed on the construction of the Dolly Varden Railway but who were unable to cash their checks when the company went into liquidation. This will be good news to many who have been seriously handicapped through the failure to receive their wages. This money will be paid through Williams & Manson who represent about one hundred of the men who placed liens on the property. The current number of the B. C. Gazette tells of the formation of a big mining company known as the Taylor Mining Company, capitalized at a million and a half dollars, which it is understood is taking over the property and will operate it.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he purchases land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead sites, and improved after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted agreements to purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any applications made after this date will be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

WAR VETERANS ARE PLEASED WITH TRIP

In a letter to Premier Oliver, C. Wesley Whittaker, president of the Provincial Branch of the Great War Veterans Association, expresses official pleasure in connection with the recent trip undertaken by the Association's nominee in company with the Hon. E. D. Barrow, Minister of Agriculture.

The letter reads as follows: "The appointee of the Great War Veterans' Association, T. A. Barnard, who accompanied the Minister of Agriculture on his trip up country, has returned. I am happy to say is delighted with the situation as he found it and speaks in glowing terms of the treatment accorded him by the Minister of Agriculture. He states that every facility possible was granted him to make a complete survey of the lands of that area."

It will be recalled that the trip was undertaken by the Minister for the purpose of "spying out" suitable tracts of land adaptable for conversion into settlement areas for soldiers and others. It was to get the soldier point of view on the spot that Mr. Barrow asked the returned men to select a representative to go with him. The above is the result.

SALE ARRANGED FOR HARRISON CLAIMS

According to reliable information current at Hazelton, the next few weeks is almost certain to see the signing of papers for the biggest individual mining transaction so far consummated in this section of the country, says the Interior News. The consideration is somewhere between two hundred thousand and a quarter of a million dollars and the property involved is the Harrison group of claims located on Whitesail lake. One of the strongest companies on the continent will take the property, and the price set is said to be mutually satisfactory.

The Harrison property consists of twenty-nine claims, the principal groups comprising the Great West, Silver Tip, Silver Bell, Nickle Plate and the Black Bear. It is a silver-lead proposition and assays show the silver and lead to run very high, while there is also a good gold return.

Competent authorities declare this property to possess the strongest surface showing in the country. No work on an extensive scale has yet been undertaken but the deal is made on the exposure of a strong vein, the continuity of which has been established for a distance of a mile and a half.

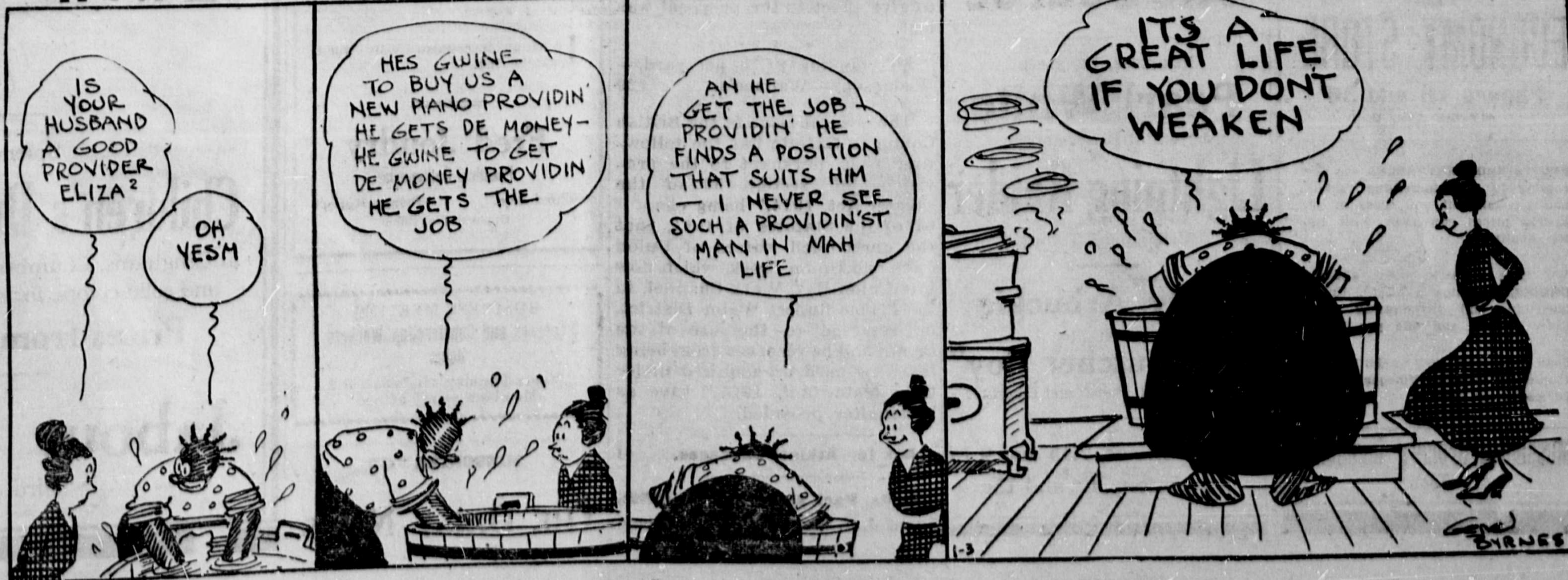
