

TRADES COUNCIL DECIDES AGAINST GENERAL STRIKE AT MEETING LAST NIGHT

WILL GO OUT, HOWEVER, IF PRICES OF FOOD ADVANCED HERE—GOOD STOCK OF PROVISIONS ON HAND; BOATS ALL GONE SOUTH

The Trades and Labor Council at a meeting last night turned down a proposal to go on strike on Monday next. The vote was rather close, there being 13 for and 16 against. There was considerable discussion before the vote was taken.

It was also decided that if advantage was taken of the strike to advance the price of food supplies there would be a general strike called. Many of those who voted against striking next Monday favored action along that line.

The last of the boats went south today when the Prince Albert left for Vancouver by way of the southern Queen Charlotte Islands. There will be no further steamship arrivals here until there is a settlement of the strike. Happily the wholesale houses are pretty well stocked and there will be enough of the necessities of life to last for a month or two although some of the luxuries will very soon be scarce or even impossible to secure.

It may be possible to secure some supplies from Ketchikan by fishing schooners, but that would be but a temporary measure and would not relieve the situation to any extent.

FOURTEEN FISH BOATS SELL CATCHES TODAY

Over 130,000 Pounds of Halibut Disposed of at Local Exchange.

Over 130,000 lbs. of halibut were sold this morning at the local fish exchange to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd. and the Atlin Fisheries, Ltd., at the average price of 10c and 5.5c per pound. Following are the catches:

Albatross, 15,000 lbs.; Navigator, 16,000; Alameda, 4,000; Hilda, 8,000; Eastern Point, 7,000; Valid, 2,500; Polaris, 55,000; Nidaros, Muirnae, 10,000; Gifford, 6,000; Ila, 3,500; Nautilus, 1,500.

Salmon. Two Salmon catches also sold today at 12.1c per pound for the reds, and 4c per pound for the whites. The catches are: Hilda, 1,300 lbs. to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd., Ruth, 1,700 lbs. to the Inverness Cannery.

ALBERTA CROP PROSPECTS GOOD

Grain is Up and Waving in the Wind—Cut Worm Troubles.

Edmonton, June 6.—The crop prospects were never brighter for this part of the country. All seeding is completed, with the exception of some green feed, and practically all of the grain is up with the early wheat high enough to wave in the wind. Speaking generally, the growth has been even, but there has been quite a bit of the country where the wheat and oats have been just stubbled in. With plenty of moisture during the season this will be all right, but it is taking a big chance. The farmers claim that it is to conserve the early spring moisture that they did not turn over the ground any more.

The good prospects for Alberta grain are general all over the province. Around Calgary, although they were very ready for the rain that came the last part of last week, still there was a good reserve of moisture in the ground and the germination took place remarkably quick. In some cases the grain was showing above the ground inside of three or four days after it was sown.

Cut Worm Troubles. There has been a little trouble from the cut worm, in the central part of the province, but the rains and snows of last week will curtail their activities to a great degree. A few fields had to be re-seeded, but the damage was not serious in a general way, although it is always a hardship to the individual farmer who has to re-seed any considerable area.

The acreage put in crop this year is greater than last and the acreage in wheat, taking the province altogether, is also increased. The increase, so far as wheat is concerned is altogether in the south, the northern parts going back more to their fodder grains, which bring a surer return, and provide feed for their cattle.

Spring Earlier. The spring was from two to three weeks earlier than ordinarily and this was a great assistance to the farmer, who could not do the usual amount of fall plowing last year, on account of the very dry year. Not being able to plow last fall, is also one of the reasons advanced for stubbling in the crop this spring.

Good acreages are being reserved on most northern farms this year for roots, which are usually a pretty sure crop in northern Alberta and are being stored more and more for winter feeding of cattle.

There is plenty of moisture in the ground now to carry the crop through pretty well into the summer and with the ordinary June rains and no July frost should bring a bumper crop to Alberta, and from reports from the East Canada will need a big crop from this province. Ontario is flooded and has not been able to get its seed in the ground, and Manitoba is still dried out.

PRINCE RUPERT PEOPLE SELL MINING CLAIMS

Valuable Properties in Omineca Purchased by Consolidated Mining Co. for Nearly Quarter of Million.

DEAL WAS ARRANGED BY LOCAL MINING MAN

A mining deal of more than usual interest to central British Columbia was closed today when the first payment was deposited by the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. of Canada, Ltd., at the Bank of Montreal here in payment for 29 claims in the Omineca district which are changing hands at close to a quarter of a million dollars.

The properties referred to are in five adjoining groups known as the Silver Tip, Black Bear, Silver Bell and Great West. They are situated approximately 20 miles south of the Sibola Mountain and 50 miles north of Kimsquit (Dean Channel).

At present the claims are reached from the Grand-Trunk Pacific Railway by travelling 100 miles in a southwesterly direction, but eventually it is expected that the coast route will be opened when a railway from Dean Channel is extended through Garde Pass.

Formed Syndicate. The first discovery of ore in the district should be credited to a prospector and trapper by the name of John Michelsen, who together with his partner, W. H. Harrison, and his partner's two sons, Ed. and Clifford Harrison, in turn succeeded in interesting Alfred Garde, consulting mining engineer of Prince Rupert, in the property. Mr. Garde formed a syndicate and managed to interest several well known citizens of Prince Rupert. He was thereby enabled to increase the scope of the syndicate beyond the original plans to include an area of considerable magnitude. Several excellent veins of high-grade silver-lead ore were located and surface work carried on there extended for many claim lengths. A highly promising copper deposit was also found on the Great West.

Compared With Slocan. The area is bounded on the north and south by the Big Ent-seeek and White Sail Lakes and is in the heart of the Coast Range of mountains. Both "true" fissures and contact deposits are found and the surface showing compares well with any of the discoveries of the Silvery Slocan of the Kootenays. Extensive work is planned and

WAR VETERANS AND OTHER CITIZENS ORGANIZED AT WINNIPEG AGAINST STRIKE

COMMITTEE WAS OFFERED SETTLEMENT BEFORE MEN WENT OUT, BUT SAID IT WAS TOO LATE; WAS ATTEMPTED REVOLUTION

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Winnipeg, June 6.—The War Veterans and citizens organized solidly yesterday against a continuance of the present condition and the labor leadership has declared that the alien must go. Many men returned to work today when they better understood the motives behind the Winnipeg strike.

It has been shown here that the strike committee were offered a settlement of any labor dispute previous to the walkout, but they informed Premier Norris and the cabinet that they were too late as it had already been decided to strike anyway.

There never was any doubt that any labor trouble was at issue. It was an attempted revolution under the One Big Union which it is clear is identical with the I. W. W. and alien question, in so far as this city is concerned.

Conditions are gradually righting themselves, but already infinite harm has been done the labor cause. The conditions revealed make it clear that Senator Robertson was right when he said that this was a revolutionary movement.

TO PROSECUTE MANUFACTURERS OF WET GOODS

Retailers Will Not Be Proceeded Against at Present But Prohibition Commissioner Informed.

The retailers whose samples of beer and other drinks were recently analyzed and found above two and a half per cent in alcohol will not be prosecuted just now but the result of the analysis will be forwarded to the prohibition commissioner with the suggestion that he prosecute the manufacturers who it was pointed out were the chief offenders. This was the action taken last night by the police commissioners.

In connection with this a letter was read from the acting solicitor W. E. Williams, saying that both the wholesalers and retailers were liable to prosecution under the act for making sales, but the real responsibility in the case of bottled goods was on the manufacturer. He suggested that it was costly to prosecute the manufacturers and for that reason they should interest the attorney general in the matter, and ask him to prosecute.

The chief of police said that the manager of the Silver Spring Brewery had called in all his beer that went over proof.

The matter was discussed at some length by the commissioners and all were agreed that in the case of bottled goods the manufacturer was the one who should be prosecuted, but on beer or cider on draft the retail vendor would be responsible.

Commissioner Hill was very emphatic that the sale contrary to law must be stopped, even if they had to prosecute the manufacturers themselves. He thought they should do it regardless of expense.

**Men Decide
 Against Strike.**

The local unions last night voted against a general strike in the city at the present time. There was a long discussion in which the pros and cons of the subject were recounted. Naturally at a time like this there is a good deal of feeling and sentiment is a large factor, especially in influencing those who wish to enter the fray.

There is a conciliatory spirit abroad among a large number of the labor men, who realize that nothing is to be gained by striking, but that much is to be lost, both on the part of employers and employed. There is no local quarrel, except in some minor affair between a few men employed at the shipyard slips and J. R. Morgan & Co. The whole movement here is a sympathetic one.

Naturally with so much unrest in the country and with news coming every day from various points that the strike bug has invaded new territory, the local situation becomes tense. Wise counsels have prevailed so far, however, and it is generally hoped that they will continue.

**Effect of Strike
 On the Community.**

Only a week ago everyone here was lighthearted and all went about their work with all the appearance of enjoyment. Today as a result of the troubles many faces are drawn and people go about suspicious of each other, depressed, serious and with a chip on the shoulder. The spirit of contention is rife, and yet there is no quarrel here.

The spirit of comradeship is shown in this sympathetic strike which possibly will eventually make for good government. Men who have never seen each other are willing to go on strike in order to support them. A brotherly spirit is being cultivated and while just now many are of opinion that it is not wisely used, it is different from anything that has ever been heard of in the past. Possibly the spirit of the war is entering into the people.

**Ready to Strike
 Against Profiteering.**

It is understood that the Trades and Labor Council decided last night that they were ready to strike against any cases of profiteering in the city. While we doubt if striking would be effective to punish such an act, we are thoroughly in sympathy with the intention. There is no reason why there should be profiteering at any time. That is what has done more than anything else to rouse the workmen of the country who feel that they are being exploited to provide these excess profits. There is no reason why the Government should not deal with the question and make profiteering impossible. It is not a thing that it is impossible to remedy. The Daily News has always stood for the abolition of profiteering. Again and again opinions have been expressed along that line and that is still our attitude.

UNITED STATES ADVERTISES PRINCE RUPERT

Consular Report Contains Good Description of Shipbuilding Operations Here by Consul Wakefield.

Prince Rupert is getting world wide advertising through the United States commerce reports which is issued daily. In the number for May 23 there is an article on the shipbuilding at Prince Rupert by Consul E. A. Wakefield which reads as follows: After long delays the splendid dry dock built by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Co. at Prince Rupert is to be operated and shipbuilding on a very considerable scale has been begun at this most northerly Pacific port in Canada. This dry dock, which has a capacity of 20,000 tons, was completed in 1916 but has not been used to any extent.

The Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., Ltd., has recently leased the dry dock for the purpose of establishing a shipbuilding plant at this port with a big repair plant as an auxiliary. The company is financed by American capital and has New York offices at 42 Broadway.

Building Canadian Ships.

A contract has been signed with the Canadian Government to build two 8,100-ton ocean freighters of the standard traverse type to cost over \$1,500,000 each. The ships are to be 400 feet long, 52 feet beam, 31 1/2 feet hold depth, speed 11 1/2 knots, and developing 2,500 horsepower. They are to be completed within 18 months after signing the contract. The ships are to be built side by side to be launched stern first. While construction work on one of the ships will slightly precede the other, both will practically be built at the same time. It is the expectation of the officials of the company that this is but the beginning of an important permanent industry in northern British Columbia.

In connection with the shipbuilding plant particular attention is to be given to ship repair work and no effort is to be spared to make this a complete success. Full lines of repair parts and replacements for vessels of every type are to be stocked in connection with the repair plant. This will prove a very great convenience to ships in northern waters as the nearest dry dock is the Government dry dock at Victoria, B. C., which is often not available and the next nearest is at Seattle, 900 miles south. The dry dock is a modern structure in every detail 600 feet in length and having a capacity of 20,000 tons. It is built in three sections, each capable of independent action, measuring 29 feet over the keel blocks and 97 feet wide in the clear. Compressed air and fresh water are both laid on in the dock floor. A power house equipped with two 1,000 kilowatt generators supplies electric power for driving all shop machines and tools, air compressors, and dry dock pumps. In addition to the dry dock the plant comprises a 50-ton electric shear-leg derrick, a 15-ton locomotive crane and large, fully equipped machine, blacksmith and wood-working shops and foundry. All shops are supplied with overhead traveling cranes and have special fire protection both municipal and private.

Location and Natural Advantages.

Situated at the Pacific terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Co. on a fine harbor, landlocked, yet easily accessible, Prince Rupert has distinct advantages of location for a shipbuilding plant. This is particularly true in connection with conditions which may be expected to prevail in the comparatively near future.

These deposits of coal and iron in various parts of northern British Columbia merely waiting development and this seems certain to occur within a very short time. Mining activities are more marked today than at any time since the war started. Ship construction material will soon be at hand.

The launching foundations are ideal, being of solid rock with an easy slope and deep water frontage. Prince Rupert is nearer by about 500 miles to the markets of

the Orient and Siberia than any other Pacific port.

With a splendidly built trans-continental railway line for conveying merchandise from the Atlantic seaboard and interior points to this natural shipping port it is certainly well within reasonable limits to predict that Prince Rupert is destined to become one of the greatest of the Pacific ports. The splendid dry dock and repair plant will then justify its construction.

Such comparatively small additions as may be required for the construction of steel ships are now under way or will be commenced at once. These consist in part of plate and angle furnaces, bending slabs, and an assembling shop.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may pre-empt, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and records maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be issued after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stamp duty.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining an army with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Provision made for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

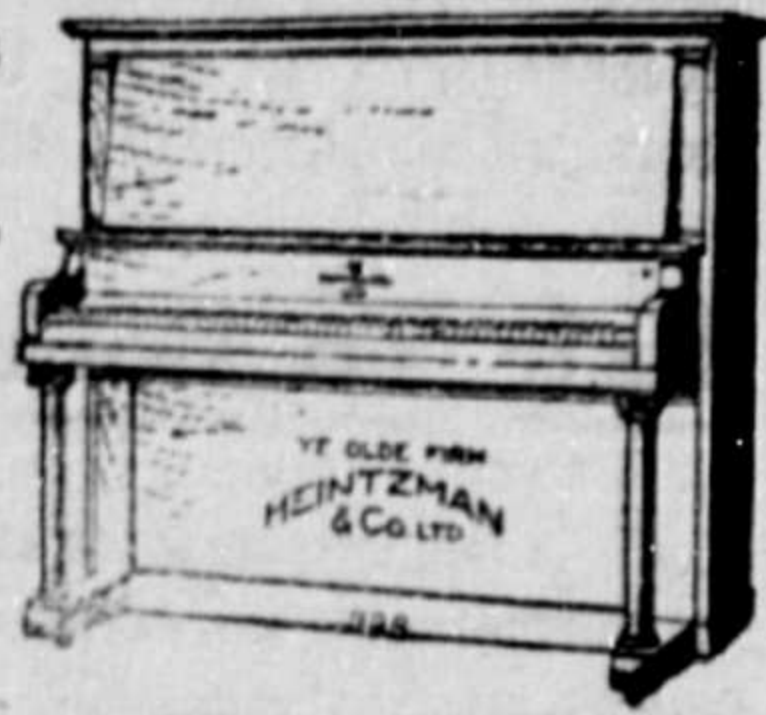

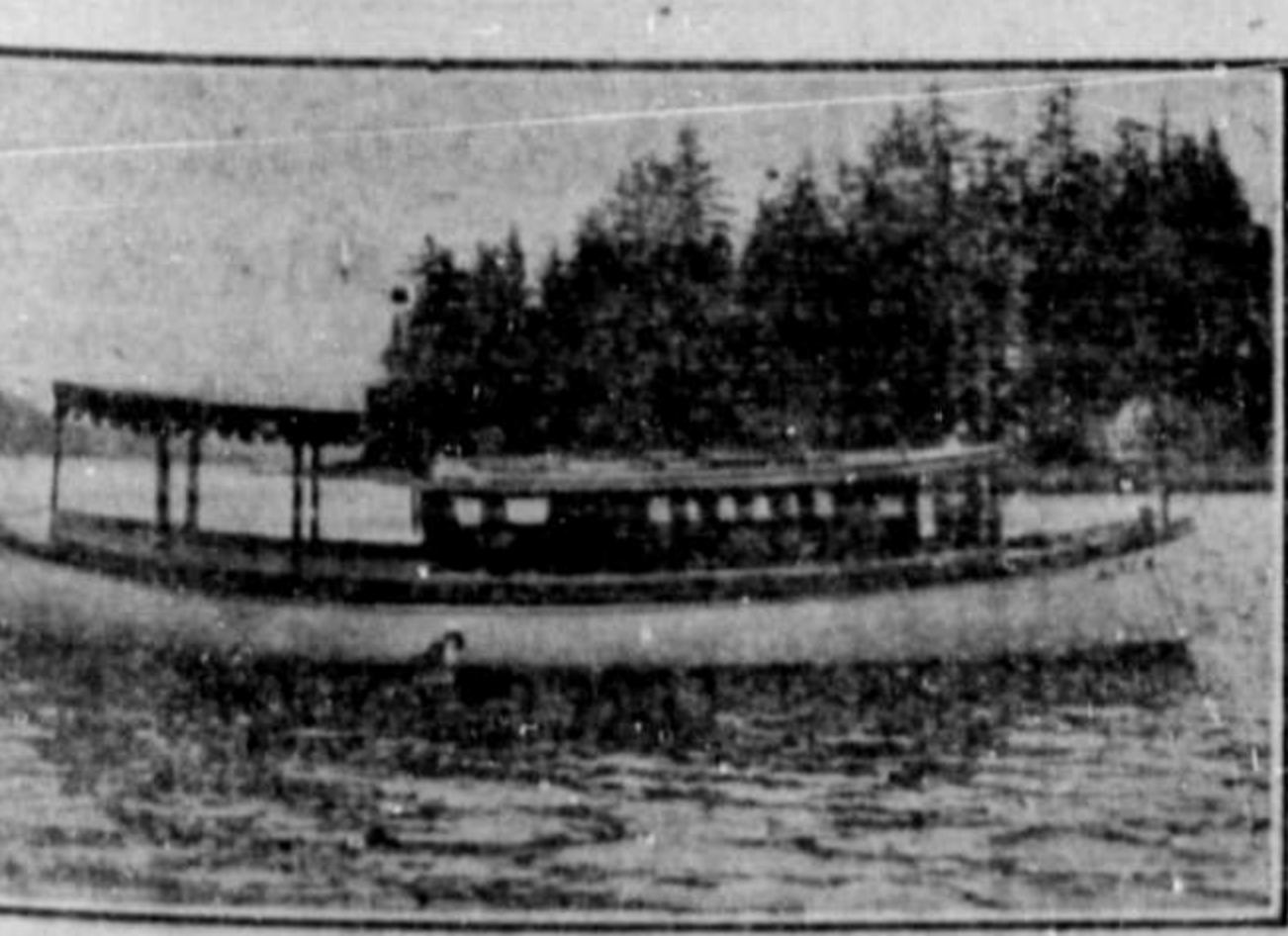

for SOLDIERS**



**Agricultural Training For
Soldier Settlers**

A SOLDIER is entitled to the benefits of the Soldier Settlement Act if he can satisfy the Agricultural Qualification Committee in his district that—

- (a) He has performed the required military service;
- (b) He is sincere in his intention to make farming his permanent occupation;
- (c) He is physically capable and is fitted in general to make a success of the farming business.

If he is otherwise qualified, but has not had sufficient practical agricultural experience, the Committee may recommend that he be given agricultural training. A generous scale of allowances for soldiers in training has been adopted.

Training Centres For Soldier Settlers

The applicant who is recommended for instruction in agriculture may first be sent to a Training Centre, specially operated for the purpose, where he will learn, by practical experience, how to handle and feed horses and other live stock; milking; the operation of farm machinery, ploughing, etc.; general farm building work; farm blacksmithing; the different kinds of soil and rotation of crops; the selection and judging of live stock and the marketing of farm products. Short lectures on the business management of a farm will be given.

With A Selected Farmer

After the course at the Training Centre, the length of which depends on the progress of the individual but

will not exceed three months, the man is placed with a carefully selected farmer in the district in which he intends to settle, to complete his training. During this period (not exceeding one year), the soldier is visited from time to time by representatives of the Soldier Settlement Board, who check his progress and recommend when he is considered qualified to take up a farm of his own.

It will be evident that by this system of preliminary training the soldier settler will gain a thorough practical knowledge of farming without expense; will learn to appreciate the responsibility involved in the venture, and at the same time gain a clear conception of just what farm life means.

On His Own Farm

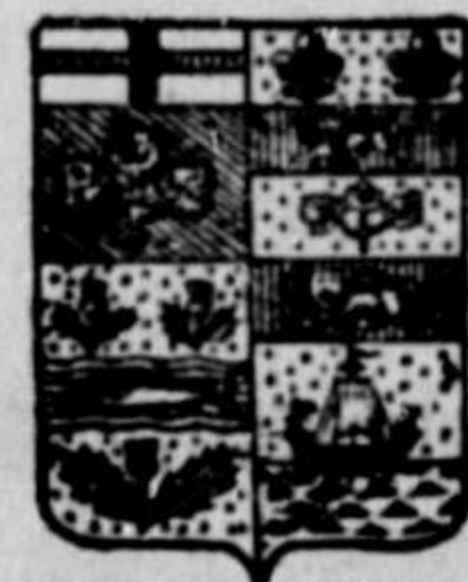
When a settler is deemed qualified by the Agricultural Qualification Committee, the Board will assist him to become established on a farm of his own, and will, through its Agricultural Advisers, continue to co-operate with him in his work, thereby ensuring his success and consequent ability to discharge his obligations and become permanently established.

Fair To Both

The procedure outlined not only gives the soldier an opportunity of first becoming familiar with his environment and of acquiring the experience requisite to success, but ensures adding to the nation's fundamental industry only competent and satisfied producers.
