A very heavy run of coho salmo was reported this week on the trolling grounds of Dundas Island and elsewhere outside of Prince Rupert Harbor. With many boats out, the production was large and packers were making daily trips into Prince Rupert. The big run attracted some gillnetters out of the Skeena River to troll for the cohoes.

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1932 season up to and including yesterday totalled 9,089,050 pounds as compared with 10,599,440 pounds up to the corresponding date last year. American landings this year to date have totalled 6,188,800 pounds as against last year's 6,202,640 pounds at a similar date while Canadian landings this year had reached a total of 2,900,250 pounds in comparison with last year's 4,396,800 pounds.
